What is it like to be a Royal Ranger in Spanish-speaking Latin America and the Caribbean?

If you were one of the more than 45,000 boys and men who make up the Spanishspeaking Royal Rangers Latin America and Caribbean ministry, you would call yourself an *Explorador del Rey* which literally means "Explorer of the King." "The King," of course, refers to Jesus Christ. You might live in any one of the nineteen Spanish-speaking countries of the region except Cuba, which due to local restrictions, does not have Rangers.

You would probably have an opportunity to travel to Costa Rica, Central America, for

You could wake up to the sound of howler monkeys, enjoy swimming in the river that flows along the back boundary of the property, go exploring for tiny red and black poisonous frogs or watch for beautifully-colored toucans and parrots. You would not want to miss seeing a "Jesus Christ" lizard run across the river ON TOP of the water!

The camp food you might get to taste would depend on what country you were in. Tropical countries have an abundance of fresh, juicy fruits. One kind of banana called plantain must be cooked (usually fried) and is delicious. Mexico and Central America would serve lots of tortillas and a variety of rice and bean dishes. The specially grilled beef (called *churrasco*) of South America would leave you wanting more. The live chickens tied under a camp shade tree would disappear the morning before a delicious chicken and rice (*arroz con pollo*) dinner.

Your outpost activities would be a lot like you are used to . . . weekly meetings where you have a balance of work and play. In areas where bamboo is plentiful, camp craft would be lashed to that instead of limbs. Emphasis on the patrol system would allow you to learn leadership skills and work together as a team. Christian service might include cutting the church lawn with a machete, the universal tool in Latin America. Recreation times would most likely include soccer, the favorite sport. Most importantly, you would learn Bible verses in Spanish and how to please Christ in your Christian walk.

When you really get down to it, being a Royal Ranger in Latin America or the Caribbean is just as much fun as it is in the United States of America . . . just different!

So You Want to Join FCF! Great! Here's What You Need to Do

If you or one or more of your boys want to join the Frontiersmen Camping Fellowship (FCF) during 2004, here's some information that you need to know. Every man or boy who wants to join FCF in 2004 must complete the Trail of the Grizzly, which requires the completion of the following merits: Rope Craft, Fire Craft, Cooking, Compass, Lashing, First Aid Skills, Camping, and Tool Craft. Once you have completed those eight merits, you qualify for the Frontier Adventure, during which you will receive training in many FCF-related skills. At the end of the Frontier Adventure, you will be a member of the FCF.

After completing the eight merits, you will need to complete a membership application. This application may be found on the district web site at www.royalrangers.net/ ntd/documents/forms.htm. This application form, along with the \$35 Frontier Adventure fee, should be sent to the district Royal Rangers office at: Royal Rangers, P.O. Box 1188, Hurst, TX 76053-1188. Checks should be made payable to the "North Texas FCF." Once your application is received, you will receive a confirmation letter from the district FCF officers with details about the Frontier Adventure.

The Frontier Adventure for 2004 will be April 23-24. You will need to be at Lakeview Camp by 5:00 p.m. with all of the equipment that will be listed in your confirmation letter. The Adventure will conclude by 7:00 p.m. on Saturday. There will be no "Phase I" test as there has been in the past. That test has been replaced by the Trail of the Grizzly.

FCF Youngbuck Earns Territorial Promotion


During the last Territorial Rendezvous in New Mexico we had one of our own youngbucks compete for the title of Territorial Scout and make it! Yep, Curtis Woods

Expedition Rangers Update



It is our hope that the materials you have received to date have been valuable, visually appealing, and well worth the money and wait. We have been hearing some good

reports from the field and from the boys as well. Although we have found some mistakes, such as the compass course game (the correction can be found on the national website: make sure to tell other commanders about this as well!) the materials have proven

to be very accurate and useful. We actually invite critique from the field in order to make corrections or obtain ideas for alternative methods of packaging materials.

As you might expect, we are also running behind with the Expedition Rangers materials. We recently met with GPH and they are confident they can get the handbook and Spirit Challenge lessons out to the field by the first part of

November. The Silver Merit Reference book will not be available until late January. However, there is a possibility that the answers for the first 10 - 20 Spirit Challenge lessons will be made available on the web after the first of November.

GPH has agreed to release all the support material (uniforms items, advancement material, silver merit patches, posters, etc.) at the end of August. In addition, all the merit requirements for approximately 80 of the 120 total Silver Merits will be placed on the website so you can download those requirements. The merits related specifically to the specialty programs will be released in November. The new catalog coming out in December will have all the Royal Ranger materials in it, including Expedition Rangers.

What about the materials coming from the national office? These materials are the Leaders Guides for the specialty programs (Air, Sea, High Action, and Trail). They will be released in November. They will be

> available on CD from the national office. These guides provide information directly related to the specialty programs, such as how to start a program, the specific advancement options, uniforms, etc. Contact the national office for specific details.

> It is our hope that the excitement in the field will result in many more boys entering into the Kingdom of God. As

always, it is the goal of the national office to be a resource to the commanders in the field, the laborers of God, as you reach, teach, and keep boys for Christ.





LMA Transition Module Deadline

If you completed your Leaders Medal of Achievement (LMA) through the Leadership Training Course (LTC), and have not yet taken the LMA Transition Module, you need to do so before the end of 2003. Instructors have until December 31st to get current LTC-trained leaders through the Transition Module so that they may earn the new LMA. After this date all current LTC-trained leaders who what to earn the new LMA will need to complete the required modules for the new LMA. The Transition module is 6 hours long; nothing less than that qualifies a LTC-trained leader for the new LMA. If you have questions about what the Transition Module consists of, or if you need to take the Transition Module before the deadline, check with your district training coordinator.

If you have at least four paid registrations from the same church, your pastor can register for FREE for the conference.

Boys who have earned their Gold Medal of a Achievement and who are willing to help out at the conference as a GMA Staff Aid will have their registration fee waived.

If you don't know how a blanket shoot works, here is the deal. Everyone who is shooting puts something of value on the trade blanket. 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Wild Wind's Wood Shop Corner

Build a Solar Oven

If there is anything we have plenty of in Texas, its sun light and heat. For all you campers that camp where fire wood is scarce, this is a nice little project you can build and cook without having to gather any firewood. Besides, who wants to cook over a fire when it is 100+ degrees outside anyway! The nice thing about the solar oven is that it is hard to over- cook anything; you don't have to be around when the food is ready to eat. Several more hours in the cooker won't hurt most foods: meats just get more tender. Food won't burn, so there is no need to stir or check on them until you are ready to eat. Also you can close the reflector flap on the glass and put a blanket over the cooker to keep food hot longer. Food will cook if there is at least 15 minutes of sunshine each hour. Another thing nice about this little solar oven is that it is made so you can knock it down for travel.

The scale of the diagram is 1/8"=1". You can make this project with one sheet of $\frac{3}{4}"$ plywood, a few other pieces of hardware, and some 1/16" thick sheet aluminum. The preferred way of attaching those pieces that need to be attached is with screws and woodworkers glue.

There are a few things you need to know about your solar oven to get the best use of it.

> This oven will cook about 10-15 pounds of food on a sunny day

>Only use black or dark colored pots with lids for cooking

>Prop top lid of oven open in such a way it reflects sun into oven

>Oven works best when sun is high in the sky

> This oven works much like a slow cooker, so the recipes would be about the same

How much time will it take to cook?

breads

Time - 3 hrs

brown rice


<u>Time - 4 to 5 hrs</u> dried beans beef
