

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# Interview with District Commander Paul Patterson

We had a conversation with Commander Patterson to get an update on the full time district commander project. At Pow Wow this year Commander Patterson unveiled a new fund raising program he was given by District Superintendent Vic Schober to raise the funds necessary for our district to support a full time district commander.

**Signal Fire** – Commander Patterson, can you give us a brief comment on our district funding a full-time Royal Rangers district commander?

Commander Patterson – Everyone in the district office with the exception of the three executive positions are self-supporting. This means that Royal Rangers, Youth, Men's Ministry, Youth Alive, etc. all have to raise their own funds to cover their positions. So having to raise funds for a full-time commander is not unusual, it is just that most commanders are not aware that district employees generate their own funds.

**Signal Fire** – At Pow Wow you covered a "new" way to generate the funds needed. A system given to you by District Superintendent Vic Schober. Would you review that method with us? Lots of commanders may not have gotten all the information at Pow Wow.

Commander Patterson – Brother Schober suggested that since we have close to 100 outposts chartered, that if each outpost would take responsibility for raising \$1,000 a year for three years the work could be spread over a large number of people. He then suggested we give each outpost an envelope with five envelopes inside them. There would be three envelopes requesting a \$20 per month commitment and two requesting a \$10 per month. That comes to \$960 per outpost per year. Outposts were to make arrangements with contributors inside and outside their church to support a full-time district Royal Rangers commander.

**Signal Fire** – What have been the results so far and what of the funds raised in the past under the old

method?

Commander Patterson – Commitments to date are less that 10% of what is required. That's kind of disappointing, but I am not certain we have effectively explained the reason for or method to obtain a full-time district commander. Funds pledged and collected previously are held in the district in a separate Royal Rangers commander supplement account.

**Signal Fire** – One of the reasons for this interview is to "get the word out." The method to raise the funds seems simple enough. Each outpost gathers commitments from various contributors to total about \$80 per month, but where can we get the paperwork? And a completely new subject you bring up is the reasons for a full-time district commander.

**Commander Patterson** – Contribution commitment forms are in this issue of the Signal Fire (page 18), are available on our web site, or commanders can call their sectional commander and have forms sent to their outpost. Why full-time? Royal Rangers will only be successful if it is communicated to those inside and outside our organization. Whether it is me or some other person who serves as district commander the North Texas District Royal Rangers requires a person that can completely devote their time and energies to promoting our boys, commanders, and our organization. I have personally contributed over four weeks of work time to Royal Rangers this year and we are just to the end of August. There are numerous meetings, activities, and seminars where Royal Rangers should be represented and currently no one attends. The better our pastors, youth pastors, CE pastors, and church members understand us the more successful we will be. People outside Royal Rangers and our church are significant supporters of our ministry. The more visible our success is the more support we receive from Christians.

**Signal Fire** – It seems then that you could fill a full year with Royal Rangers requirements when you are allowed the time to do so. With only 10% of your

required funds available how can you keep us up to date of where you stand and what is next?

Commander Patterson – We are adding a funds measurement Royal Rangers emblem to the Signal Fire and to our website. It will be a black and white Royal Rangers emblem that fills in color as funds are committed. You can easily measure the success of an outpost by the boys. When boys bring their friends to outpost meetings you can be assured you are doing well. Our district is growing considerably. In order to continue with this growth and be prepared for its effects, we must be talking, visiting, and showing pastors and sectional presbyters who we are and what we are accomplishing. As we

continue and increase the training of commanders, senior commanders, area commanders, and section commanders our organization will strengthen from the bottom up. Our boys will be strong Christians and we will be able to properly accommodate many, many more boys.

Commander Stewart works for the City of Grapevine Fire Department as a certified firefighter, fire inspector, fire investigator, fire service instructor, police officer, and emergency medical technician. 

# Are You Ready to be Fired?

When I was a boy, I used to make objects from modeling clay. I spent hours making gallant white (more likely gray) stallions, my favorite dog, the tallest giraffe or some other animal. Since I had little artistic talent, I especially liked to make snakes. They were always the easiest to make. Just roll the clay between my hands and I had a snake.

One of the best things about the modeling clay was when I was ready to do something else, I just rolled it all up in a ball. It would be ready for me the next time I want to make something.

Today, the kids use Play-Doh. I guess the old stuff was not healthy when we ate it. Now the grandkids make all kinds of objects. Some are really much more imaginative than my objects and some I can't quite identify. Still when they are done, they roll it up into a ball, put it in the container (so it won't dry out) and get ready for the next time.

We have a similar story in the Bible. It is the potter and the clay. It implies that if we are not just the way God wants us, He just rolls us up into a ball and starts over. We have been told for years this means to be pliable, flexible and easily molded.

But soft clay is of no use. Have you tried to carry water is an unfinished clay water jug or carry loaves of bread in an unfinished clay bowl? It doesn't work well does it? However, this story relates to a willingness within us to change to what God wants. To be useful soft clay must be finished or fired. A special coating may be applied for decoration or strength. Then, it is placed into a

furnace and baked.

Once complete, the item is ready to be used as planned: a dinner plate, a water jug or a mixing bowl. The item now has strength. It can hold up to weight, withstand pressure or carry a load. So what happened to the clay? It was put through the fire. We always ask God to protect us from trials but will we ever be "cured" if we have none? No one wants to go through trials. It can be uncomfortable, confusing or cause pain. But as long as we remain pliable clay, we have no strength. It is the trial that makes us strong and useful to God. He knows just the right amount of heat and time it takes to make you perfect.

The usefulness of the finished item has no comparison to its former form. The space shuttle is covered with millions of ceramic tiles that protect the space vehicle from the searing heat of reentry. How is the ceramic made to withstand the trial? It comes through the application of hours of heat in the manufacturing process.

Just know that God will not forget His creation. Be faithful. Once we go through the firing, we can be placed on the cutting edge of fighting evil, deflecting the attacks and heat of Satan against our boys.

Be willing to be fired!

I appreciate our district commander putting this team together and planning the trip. Most do not have any idea of the difficulties involved in just the planning phase. I have planned PTFs but that is nothing compared to the Pathfinder planning.

As with any trip, communication is essential. There were a few details the missionary left out. But this is where the spirit of team work comes in. We could have easily decided that this job was too difficult or was not worth the extra effort, but the team quickly found ways to accomplish the tasks anyway.

Thanks to Paul's and Mark Chapman's leadership, this team was able to do 5 days work in 3 1/2 even though it rained every day except the last Sunday. The missionary had to find work for us to

do. No job was too small or beneath us. All worked toward the common goal. We allowed God to have His way which caused the efficiencies that were achieved. There were no serious injuries or illness even though we were in the jungle and the rain forest. Even the mosquitoes did not bite most of us.

Each day, one of us did a devotion that related to what we were doing - present or future results. God set His alarm clock for us also. The howler monkeys would awaken us around 5:00am. If they didn't wake us, the lightning and thunder did.

Only God knows how many will be brought into His kingdom because of our effort and those preceding and succeeding us.

Several similar opportunities will be available through the North Texas District or the South Central Region in 2005. Try to attend one of these. You will be the one changed.

# North Texas Pathfinders to Costa Rica <u>To Give and To Serve</u>

Pathfinders - the missions arm of FCF - are simply put - <u>THE BEST</u>. I know, I have received and worked full time with MAPS construction teams every month for 6 years. In August of 2004 the North Texas Pathfinders continued this excellent level of giving, serving, overcoming challenges of weather, job site conditions and quickly surpassed the original work goal which they came to accomplish at Camp Summit.

Camp Summit is in the jungle rain forest of Costa Rica. It is the 1<sup>st</sup> Royal Rangers campground missions outreach in a foreign country. Royal Rangers from all Latin America and Caribbean nations come here for training in Royal Rangers and Men's Ministry. Of course the Costa Rican Royal Rangers are able to take full advantage of Camp Summit.

North Texas Pathfinders completed 15 fixed tents for Royal Rangers men and boys to sleep in. The wet jungle climate (it rains an average of 13' a year) has created the need for permanent tent-sized buildings. In February, North Eastern Pathfinders did the block work on these fixed tents. These and many other buildings at Camp Summit are the fruit of many Pathfinder teams coming to Costa Rica over the last 8 years.

Recently Mike King, Pathfinders coordinator, visited Camp Summit and he commented on the work of the North Texas Pathfinders. "I'm very proud of the North Texas work, carrying on the true spirit of Royal Rangers. I

could see boys coming out of these tents and meeting in their patrol groups honing their Royal Rangers skills. Knowing all this fun and fellowship will lead to the nightly council fires where a multitude will open their hearts to Christ."

With complete gratitude and appreciation I give a huge thanks to Paul Patterson for his leadership of the North Texas Pathfinder team and for his spiritual guidance. The incredible construction work was blessed by Mark Chapman's ability to build jigs and set the work pace. Welding, cutting, grinding was accomplished by Gary Bierschwale, Travis Brann, Alan Gell, Dick Harris, Mark Oliver, Martin Smith, and Randy Woods. A special thanks to electrician Wayne Word. # Pathfinder Trip to Camp Summit, Costa Rica

"Bienvenidos" was the Costa Rican welcome seen and heard by our NTD Pathfinder team on a most unique Missions trip. This valiant team of ten Royal Rangers commanders - Gary Bierschwale, Travis Brann, Mark Chapman, Alan Gell, Dick Harris, Mark Oliver, Paul Patterson, Martin Smith, Randy Woods, and Wayne Word - completed the construction of 15 'fixed tents' at Camp Summit, an 80-acre international training camp for Royal Rangers boys and men from all across Latin America. The campgrounds are located toward the central part of Costa Rica, surrounded by pineapple fields, mountains and at least one active volcano. The NTD Pathfinder team was assigned to the assembling and mounting of the steel roofs for the fixed tents. Each roof required over 50 pieces of steel to be cut, welded and screwed together, then welded into place on their concrete base. Other teams took four months to build 20 of these structures while the NTD team completed these 15 in only three days! In addition, they built 30 metal bed frames, 15 metal night stands, 8 window burglar bars, and other miscellaneous framing around the kitchen building which was used by the team as a temporary construction site.



While the NTD Pathfinder team worked hard, they played hard, too. They enjoyed a challenging day off of horseback riding, the infamous canopy runs, and white water rafting. And if you're interested in a new song that was born out of the domino game of 42, just ask Dick or Gary to sing you one stanza of "The Rookie Woopin"...

The country of Costa Rica is as beautiful as it is enchanting. As the camp is surrounded by jungle and bordered on one side by river rapids, the vegetation and animal life make you feel like you

are right in the middle of 'Jurassic Park'! Although we didn't run into any Velociraptors, we did see



geckos, lizards, a green iguana, poison dart frogs, and several native birds

including toucans and vultures. It was not uncommon during work to see a flock of colorful parrots or parakeets fly by. The land is plentiful with pineapples, bananas, coffee and coconuts. Red and white orchids are common. Many trees have at least 4 or 5 other plants or vegetation growing in or on them, and 3" diameter bamboo is readily available. I don't think anyone on the trip will ever forget waking up each morning to the almost eerie bellows of the howler monkeys. You could set your watch by their quite punctual 5 am sound-off.



The NTD team worked with them, played with them, and even worshipped with them. In the two Sunday services the team attended, it was easy to see why the Holy Spirit was mightily present. And thanks to the NTD Pathfinder team who made this trip a time well spent which I'll never forget.

After 2 years of frustration with setbacks, hospitalizations, and minimal progress through periodic therapy, we are starting to see the fruit of our hope and prayers. In January, God led me to a new therapy clinic just down the road from our home. I know God's hand was in it because I was told by an orthopedist that I needed therapy for arthritis in my knee-not for the ms. When he asked me where I wanted to go, I mentioned a large facility that I knew. He grimaced and that's when I remembered the new clinic. I asked him about them and he was much more enthusiastic. It is close enough that I have even been able to ride my power chair there and not worry about getting a ride. Wouldn't you know it-the owners/therapists are Christians and my therapist has a special interest in ms because her mother died from complications of ms!

The therapy and my twice weekly visits to the pool at the Y really improved my strength and stamina. However, in May, my

I couldn't afford the cost, so they offered me the opportunity to do a little clerical work in exchange for the therapy. Isn't God awesome!



I have continued therapy twice a week and pool workouts twice a week. I am now able to walk with loft-strand (forearm) crutches at therapy and also climb out of the pool using the stairs. They believe that before January, I will be using the crutches at home and to enter restaurants or on other short trips.

Over the last year, I have been able to participate in just about any activity I wanted. I have experienced none of the debilitating fatigue that I had in the beginning. My eyes have not bothered me in anyway as they originally did. I know God is healing me slowly but surely. Sometimes we assume that instant healing is the only way God works but He has shown through our journey that He uses many avenues to reach His goals. There have been times of great frustration but we have seen His hand in every step we have taken.

We absolutely would not be where we are without all of the prayer and practical help you have offered. We still need your prayers as God completes this miracle. God has been faithful to provide for our needs even though the medical and therapy bills have at times been overwhelming, we continue to need His intervention to provide in that area, I still experience some frustrating physical challenges and I still have a long way to go towards walking with confidence but oh how far He's brought me!
