#### Ranger of the Year

The North Texas District was well-represented at the regional Ranger of the Year competition last November. Four Rangers from the district qualified to represent us at the next level of competition: two Adventure Rangers and two Expedition Rangers. At the Ranger of the Year competition, boys are recognized as either Excellent (with cumulative scores below 85%) or Outstanding (cumulative scores at or above 85%). In addition, the Expedition Ranger with the highest overall score is recognized as the region's National Ranger of the Year.

After a full day of evaluations and presentations, the following results were announced:

#### Adventure Rangers

Stephen Warne -- Excellent Spencer Phinney -- Excellent Expedition Rangers

Kiah Bennett -- Outstanding Chris Trower -- Outstanding In the Expedition Rangers, Kiah Bennett had the highest overall score, and he was named the South Central Region's National Ranger of the Year for 2004-2005. He is the recipient of, among other things, a college scholarship, free trip to the 2006 National Camporama, and special activities with the national Royal Rangers staff. In a very close competition, Chris Trower had the second highest overall score and was named the 1st Runner-Up in the Expedition Rangers competition.

Congratulations to all of these Rangers on their accomplishments. We encourage every commander to begin NOW to prepare your Rangers for the 2005-2006 Ranger of the Year evaluation process. ## **Enthusiasm or Hype**

We see it every day on television, newspapers and magazines: products that promise the perfect results: car dealers shouting at the top of their voices to sell their items, football players and cheerleaders jumping and shouting over trivial games, even Christians playing a holier than thou attitude. We can quickly lose sight of what is real and what is not.

We, as Christians and Royal Rangers leaders, must love and believe in our product, the gospel, and be excited about it before we can sell our product to others. If we aren't, no one will want it. We sell by words and we sell by our actions.

God commands us to do everything with all our might. This is a departure from the routine of every day life. Excitement is infectious. It is easily passed from one to another. It will make the most dull and mundane chore or activity less tiresome.

But excitement by itself can create over confidence. We have faith in our own abilities, not in God's. Overconfident football teams are usually easily defeated by an opponent who has abilities as well as confidence. Through hype alone, we become hypocrites, insincere and showing ourselves to be something we never intend to become. Through enthusiasm, we pass on excitement for what God is doing and will do in our lives. We live through His enthusiasm.

This even creeps into our churches. I have heard ministers tell the congregation how they must act to be enthused: jumping, clapping and shouting. Many do this to draw attention to themselves so other people can see "how much they love God." But God has given examples of how to praise Him: by laying prostate, praying silently, sitting still, standing with head bowed down or standing with arms raised as well as dancing. It is not the position but the heart that makes the difference.

I have heard at least one pastor mention that some of the people who show the least emotions are the most stable, sincere and successful in accomplishing tasks for the church. Consistent steady emotions will accomplish more than the spark of insincere temporary hype.

Below are the definitions of enthusiasm and hype:

**Enthusiasm:** To be possessed by a god. **Hype:** Derivative of hypocrisy; to play a part or pretend to be something you are not.

Praise God with all He gives you but make sure it is not just for others to see you. Two people may use the same methods of praise but have different motives. God judges the heart not the outward appearance. Make sure your enthusiasm does not become hype.

#### Change is in the Wind

As we start the new year, I feel I have an obligation to inform the FCF membership of changes in the future of the Buckskin advancement. The national Royal Rangers office has put out new guidelines, and I have been directed by our president to implement them starting in 2006. It is important to each Frontiersman that you fully understand the new procedures as they are going to greatly limit the number of Buckskin ceremonies we do in a given year. This year we had 3, next year we may only have one so you will need to plan accordingly.

So, what are the changes that you can expect to see? For starters, there will be ½ day of performance-based testing that will need to be accomplished along with the workbook. Previously, you were required to have your sponsor sign off that you had accomplished the work. It was the discretion of the FCF staff to check your work prior to the ceremony. I have always taken the approach that no FCF member will willingly lie to me. I checked with sponsors and if I was assured the work had been done, that was the end of it. However, the new program will require some testing. The following items will be evaluated by the staff.

- Proficiency with knife
- Proficiency with hawk
- Proficiency with black powder or archery
- · Trade item

- Memorization
- Outfit
- Flint and steel
- ID Staff
- Buckskin workbook
- Primitive cooking

Each of these areas will have a possible 10 points to earn. You must score at least 70 points in order to pass. This is not an insurmountable obstacle, but you will have to practice and become proficient in the things that you need to know to be successful in FCF.

Now, what does this mean to us as a group? First I think we will see more highly qualified members advancing to Buckskin. Second, I think that our sponsors will be much more diligent since they know for a fact the candidate will be tested. Third, I think it will encourage our members to practice their skills on a regular basis. The one disadvantage I see is this will cut down on the number of buckskin ceremonies we can offer in a given year. It becomes immediately apparent that you the Frontiersman will have to plan ahead. Will you have sponsored enough boys, done enough Adventures, etc. before the testing date? The date for the 2006 Buckskin Ceremony will be announced after the district staff meeting in January.

Please pray for the staff as we meet together to determine which direction God is leading us in the process.

#### **Pow Wow 2006**

Plans are under way for the 2006 Pow-Wow. You may remember Brian Bryan from the 2004 Pow-Wow. He was the leader of the Martial Arts ministry team known as the Combat Team. The team will be back this year as the speakers for our council fires and morning devotionals. We are excited to have them coming back to be with us this year. # 2006 Academy of Ranger Training (ART)

<u>February 17-18, 2006</u>. This is a required Module in order to achieve the Leaders Medal of Achievement (LMA) award and is held only <u>ONE TIME</u> during the year now. This is offered as an alternative to the LMA requirement to attend a National Training Camp. ART is held annually at Lakeview Camp located in Maypearl, Texas. So remember to mark your calendar for this important date coming up soon!

# <u>LTA CAMP-OUT PURPOSE – SKILLS – COST - UNIFORM:</u>

- The purpose of this camp is to provide trainees with the basic outdoor skills necessary to safely and effectively take a group of boys on an overnight camping activity
- All classes and activities will only focus on introducing and developing basic camping skills and will not include any material relating to more advanced outdoor skills or the use of the Patrol System
- Camp cooking, fire craft, tool craft, and other interesting skills will be taught
- LTA Camp-Out <u>pre-registration</u> is \$20.00 each; <u>at-camp registration</u> is \$30.00 each
- All commanders must check in at the Commanders Lodge for registration at 5:00 PM Friday, 2/17/06
- All trainees must wear the "Class B"

The evening service will be at 7:00 p.m. Friday night at the hotel; this service will feature a time of praise and worship, and the ministry of children's evangelist Robert T. **Special Guests.** Our special guests for the conference include:

Hotel Information. For 2006, the conference will be held at the Houston Hobby Airport Marriott in SE Houston. This location is very convenient to Galveston Island, NASA, and many of the attractions of the Houston area. The Marriott Hotel has been very nicely renovated and it is ready to host our conference. They have given us a special room rate of \$70 per room (1-4 people), or \$80 if you would like a junior suite. Registration. The registration fee for the conference is \$35 if you register online or \$40 if you register through the mail by the deadline. Registration at the conference will be \$45. Pre-registration fees may be paid by check or money order, or by credit card (credit card only if you register on the web). Two classes will require additional registration because of additional materials that must be purchased by the region for each attendee: the first aid course will cost an additional \$20, and the NTC Staff Update will cost an additional \$10.

Boys who have earned their Gold Medal of Achievement and who are willing to help out at the conference as a GMA Staff Aid will have their registration fee waived. Boys must apply to Tony Garcia (tony@copydocs.net) in order to be considered a Staff Aid and to have their registration fee waived.

Ladies Activities: If your wife is not involved in the Royal Rangers ministry, we encourage you to bring her along anyway. Everyone is welcome for the Friday evening service, and Saturday morning there will be a time for our wives to get acquainted and to have a devotion presented by Anay Schlipp, wife of our speaker who served as Biblewoman for at least one season with her husband. Following this, bus transportation will be available to Galveston Island for shopping on the historic Strand, or sightseeing on the island.

Class Schedule. On the class schedule is a wide variety of classes – some are LTA modules, while others are sessions for any commander. Certificates of Completion will be issued for each LTA module completed. All sessions are open to any leader with the exception of the IT Seminar (your district commander must approve your attendance) and the NTC Staff Update (you must have previously attended NTC Staff School or National Academy).
