There are 2 reasons for burn out:

1. selfish. You ask how can this be? You get tired of fighting the battles by yourself. You are the only one in your church that cares, you are the only one. Sounds like Elisha doesn't it? Commanders, that is one of the reasons I ask you to get involved with section and district functions, when you do this you will see that there are more commanders over the next hill as did Elisha.

2. Tired. Never make a decision when you are tired, sick or mad. It will come back to haunt you. You also have to take time to replenish your walk with the Lord. You have to take time to pray for yourself and your church. You need to spend time in the WORD and under your pastor's preaching.

The nut could be tasty if warmed and would be short lived enjoyment. As I continued to think the nut was actually a seed. When planted, it could become a large tree capable of producing many nuts. Some nuts could be enjoyed as snacks and others producing more

trees or lumber for furniture or other items.

The aluminum was in the form of a cross. It was a light weight material and easily bent. Obviously, the item was not strong and could not be used for anything requiring high stress levels. It was not even particularly attractive.

Flint, A rock. It was very hard and very brittle so it cannot be used for building. For any of us who have been to Camporama, it is something that can cut us very quickly if we fall on it. It even taints the water that runs over it.

The lead ball was an item that could be used in a black powder rifle to provide food or as a defense. But lead is even softer than the aluminum and more easily bent. It has been linked with several serious disabilities if ingested.

The antler tip was something was only about three inches in length and 1/4 to 3/8 inch in diameter. It was not something for which I could have much use. With some work, I might be able to make some art items with it.

The leather bag was just something in which to keep every thing. It was easily accessible, flexible but would deteriorate over time.

As I pondered these items, God began to reveal more spiritual meanings to each item. He often sends the common items to bring forth the highest form of glory to Himself.

The flint, instead of brittle and inflexible, represents our unwavering commitment to the assignments God has given each of us. Isaiah 50:7 states "Therefore, I shall not be confounded: therefore have I set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be ashamed." God wants us to complete the tasks he has sent us to accomplish. The psalmist declared that God is the rock of our salvation.

Lead is one of only six metals listed in Numbers that can come out the fire cleansed. It represents our ability by God's grace to go through the fire and not be destroyed. We must be sure the things we keep in our life will be able to go through fire.

The antler tip symbolizes strength. The horn is used by the buck deer to defeat potential competitors to the does. The horn of the ram (the shofar) is used to call people to worship. We typically don't worship enough. Worship is the strength of our Christian walk.

Things are not always as they appear. Those strange combinations of items can come together to present a new perspective of worship and serving God.

And the pouch? The pouch is the Holy Spirit that holds all these things together to accomplish His will. It is given freely. You add the contents.

Yes, meditate on these things!

Council Fires are being planned along with activities and all things worthy of this anticipated event.





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ACADEMY OF RANGER TRAINING (ART)

Commanders, Proverbs 22:6 says, "Train a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not turn from it" (NIV). This scripture applies to adults likewise. The training I received and the lessons I learned as a child and later as a Royal Rangers commander definitely have influenced my life time and time again.

Because training is so essential to becoming qualified leaders, every year we offer all **NEW** Royal Rangers commanders working with Discovery, Adventure, and Expedition Rangers the necessary training tools to reach their potential goals in giving boys a memorable camping experience. Already, preparation is in the works for our next **"ART"** training event in **February 2007**.

The **LTA CAMP-OUT Module** is held annually at Lakeview Camp located in Maypearl, Texas as an alternative camp to attend instead of a National Training Camp, . Also, in order to achieve the LMA award, this is a required Module and held only <u>ONE TIME</u> during the year. Mark the date February 16-17, and check the NTD web-site for continual details. In the meantime, refer to the following:

LTA CAMP-OUT PURPOSE -SKILLS - UNIFORM:

• The purpose of this camp is to provide trainees with the basic outdoor skills necessary to safely and effectively take a group of boys on an overnight camping activity

• All classes and activities will only focus on introducing and developing basic camping skills and will not include any material relating to more advanced outdoor skills or the use of the Patrol System

• Camp Cooking, Fire Craft, Tool Craft, and other interesting skills will be taught

• All Trainees must wear the "Class B" Royal Rangers uniform during the Trainee Orientation at 6:00 PM; at the 8:00 AM Morning Assembly, and at the 4:00 PM Afternoon Final Assembly

LTA CAMP-OUT EQUIPMENT LIST:

The word Ranger brings an aura of almost superhero status whether we talk of Tolkien's character in "The Lord of the Rings" Aragorn who begins the series as a Ranger; or the "The Lone Ranger" or "Walker Texas Ranger" of western fiction fame. We also have an awe of our modern day U.S. Army Airborne Rangers. So let's look at the term Ranger.

The Webster's Dictionary definition of ranger is 1: a warden who patrols forest lands 2: a member of a body of troops who range over a region 3: an expert in close in fighting and raiding tactics. The Bladesman definition is "one who overcomes challenges to reach their goals, and adapts to their environment." Thus "Overcome and Adapt" (my personal motto).

The term Ranger first shows up in the 1670's during the time of "King Philip's War." King Philip, also known as Metacomet, was a Wampanoag War Chief who started raiding and destroying colonial settlements in what is now known as Massachusetts, and Rhode Island. To stop this, a British officer named Captain Benjamin Church asked for men to volunteer to fight King Philip's Wampanoag's with unconventional tactics. Captain Church knew continental (European) combat tactics would not work so he trained his men to range nine to fifty miles on foot(thus the term Ranger) to live off the land and fight like their opponents. The new tactics worked and King Philip was defeated in 1676.

The next time we see the term is during the French and Indian



War, when a colonial farmer from New Hampshire named Robert Rogers called for volunteers to fight like their enemies. They were called Rogers Rangers. They wore distinctive green berets as well as green jackets, and their campaigns were very successful. Rogers developed tactics to train his troops known as "Rogers Ranging Rules." Even today our U.S. Army Rangers, and Army Special Forces are trained with the same tactics.

Closer to home we will now look to the legendary Texas Rangers. They were formed in 1823 by the Father of Texas, Stephen F. Austin, to defend his colony. Now their ranging was on horse back yet their tactics were just as unconventional as their predecessors. They would help Texas win its independence, and would go

on to be the oldest (as they are still active) as well as the most respected law enforcement agency in the United States.

We now go to World War II, 1942,(yes I know later than the 1840's) and the U.S. Army needed unconventional troops who were self-reliant, and could survive behind enemy lines with no means of support. Giving birth to the "Airborne Ranger" their

ranging came from leaving (jumping out of) perfectly good aircraft, and landing behind enemy occupied territory. The new Rangers would help in freeing Europe from the Nazi grip of tyranny, from D-day to V-E (Victory in Europe). The Army Rangers continue to serve to protect America's freedoms.

With all this information, where do we go to next. Let's start in 1962. A man known as Johnnie Barnes had a vision for a ministry for boys that would incorporate the best of camping/woodcraft, as well as bringing the Gospel of Jesus Christ to those same young

men. He asked for volunteers who could think on their feet, be willing to be unconventional in waging spiritual warfare for the souls of men, and boys. They would also take the fight to the enemy. They would be lead by the King of kings, and Lord of



lords. They would be the King's (Jesus) own, thus royal, and they will range all over the world thus Rangers.

Royal Rangers are now all over the world in over sixty countries(with more coming) with over 2.5 million members (I proudly say I am one). We have gone beyond camping, we are in the sea learning sailor skills. In the air earning pilots licenses, we are building churches in far away parts of the globe. We do not surrender, we do not retreat, we leave no Ranger behind. We stand as one, led by the Master Ranger.

I would like to pass on some advice Robert Rogers passed on to all Rangers; "Such in general are rules to be observed in the ranging service; there are however a thousand occurrences and circumstances which may happen, that will make it necessary, in some measure to depart from them, and to put other arts and stratagems in practice; and which cases every man's reason and judgment must be his guide, according to the particular situation and nature of things, and that he may do this to advantage, he should keep in mind a maxim never to be departed from by a commander, vis. to preserve a firmness and presence of mind on every occasion."

With all that said any time you put on a Ranger Uniform whether it be class A,B,C, or Dress Blues, and claim to be a member of the Royal Rangers. Think of heritage you represent and be proud of the title Royal Ranger.

Eulogy given at funeral, July 26

Todd "Fox Tale" Haddix was a beloved husband, father, commander, friend, and servant of the Lord. All of us here today have our own memories of Todd that have brought us together to celebrate his homecoming. Todd exemplified what it meant to be a godly man and a man seeking God's will. His life became witness to the character that God had built within.

Todd showed God's call on his life when he began to serve in the Royal Rangers ministry. Todd arrived for a training class with James Harris and Ralph Andrade. The three of them wanted to start Royal Rangers in their church.

He exhibited patience and commitment as he came to every class. 6 months of classes and homework, and even tried to "save" Ralph during the soul-winning practice.

He showed great perseverance during the training campout. The temperature was 13 degrees and there was a burn ban. Cold is not an adequate description. There was Todd, getting up in the middle of the night to put on another layer of clothes, Ralph peering out the hole in his sleeping bag asking what he was doing, and Todd simply replying trying to get something else on to try and stay warm.

He showed his love in many ways. Helping make a pinewood derby car, a school project, teaching you how to throw a hawk, tie a knot, or cook a dump cake in the dutch oven.

He illustrated compassion as he went on mission trips and helped with the ministries of the church.

His humility and servant's heart was seen repeatedly. During Todd's Frontier Adventure where he was joining FCF, Frontiersman Camping Fellowship, it rained a little. And then it rained a lot. It rained so much that tents and air mattress beds began to float. Many people just wanted to get out. Todd helped the other FCF men to ensure that everyone got their equipment out. Knee deep in mud, soaked all the way through, he kept helping to finish the job, before taking care of himself.

He showed his kindness and gentleness, every time he prayed with his family, every time he met a boy at the altar, every time he shared his faith of what God was doing in his life.

Todd's family and friends loved him very much as illustrated today. He was described last week by one of the commanders as a guy everyone wanted to have as a friend. He touched all of our lives in many ways and impacted us in ways that will last a lifetime. One of his rangers, Lance Corporal Harris, took leave from his active duty post to be here today and honor the man who touched so many.



Todd loved his family, his friends, his boys in his rangers class, and he loved to worship and praise his Lord and Saviour.

While we grieve at his passing, let us rejoice in the knowledge that Todd is walking down the streets of gold, dancing around the throne, and singing praises to our God. It is us who are left behind that feel hurt and loss. We are the ones still awaiting our homecoming to join Todd. Todd knows no pain, no hurt, no loss, only the every present love of his God and the joy of worshiping Him all the day long.

God was in the Details! By NTD FCF President Gary Bierschwale

Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will make your paths straight. Prov. 3:5-6

What a joyous and humbling experience it is to be used by God and to clearly see His direction in our lives! How blessed we are to serve an awesome God who cares so much for us that He continuously shows Himself to us, even in the smallest details! And how encouraging it is to spend time with people of strong, unfailing confidence who trust in God's ability to make a way through difficulties and answer prayer after prayer! My wife Sheri and I were astonished, delighted, and grateful this summer to have been a part of an incredible adventure where we witnessed God's outpouring of blessings and love on His children.

In July – in the middle of the ninth hottest summer in U.S. history– 27 Royal Rangers made the trip from Germany to Missouri via Texas to attend Camporama 2006. The trip took more than a year to plan and involved dozens of people on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean. Sheri and I watched in amazement and gratitude as Royal Rangers throughout Texas showed their big hearts and generous spirits as they worked tirelessly on behalf of their German brothers and sisters in Christ.



Germ of an Idea

The seeds for this adventure were planted more than four years ago when Sheri's employer sent her to Germany to work for several months. As part of her compensation for the assignment, the company paid for me to join Sheri for a month. I spent wonderful days touring the beautiful German countryside and learning about the places from which my ancestors immigrated to Texas in the mid-1800s.

During the trip, I was blessed to meet fellow Royal Rangers and was invited to several German Royal Rangers outposts where I participated in their meetings and camps, visited their churches, and made friends with many of the leaders. Two very special people I met were Dana (pronounced "Donna") and Werner (pronounced "Verner") Aufleger. Werner is the "Regionalleiter," or Regional Royal Rangers Leader, for the Frankfurt/ Rüsselsheim area of Germany, while Dana serves as the praise and worship leader at their church. The Auflegers welcomed us into their home, their church, and their hearts, establishing an enduring friendship.

During visits with the Auflegers, we suggested that they come to the United States- especially to Texas - for Camporama 2006. In 2002, the idea seemed unlikely to ever come to fruition, but in the spring of 2005, Werner said he began to hear from God that he and other Royal Rangers were supposed to make the trip. He began to pray earnestly for direction and to speak with other leaders in the country about the idea. On June 29, 2005, Dana sent the first of many dozens of e-mail messages to us to let us know what they were planning and to ask for help and advice in putting together an itinerary.

Planning an Adventure

The Auflegers said that not only did they plan to attend Camporama 2006, but they also wanted to spend an additional two weeks sightseeing in Texas. Thinking that only the Aufleger family and a few others would be making the trip, Sheri and I offered them the use of our house and a car while they were here– but God had other ideas! It wasn't long before Werner learned that Royal Rangers from all over Germany wanted to join the adventure. We knew most of the folks coming over would be young people on a very limited budget, and we were determined to help them stretch their euros just as far as they could go!

A Place to lay Their Heads

When we heard that 27 men, women, boys, and girls would be making the trip, we knew that we needed to find somewhere affordable for them to sleep that would be more comfortable than the floor of our house. The Lord placed the lodge at Lakeview Camp in our minds, and when I approached North Texas District Commander Paul Patterson, he was immediately open to the idea and committed the use of the lodge. However, we also needed to find lodging for our friends closer to some of the places in Texas they would be visiting. We knew the group wanted to visit San Antonio, New Braunfels, and Austin, so Sheri got on the Internet and looked for a campground that would be in a central location, while I, knowing one of their destinations was to be Corpus Christi, sent out a plea to our South Texas Royal Rangers brethren.

Almost immediately, South Texas Deputy District Commander Jason Andersen sent us a note that his church, Trinity Worship Center in Corpus Christi, would be pleased to open its fellowship hall to us. To the great delight of our German friends, we discovered that the pastor of Trinity Worship Center and his wife, Jerry and Phyllis Weiss, had been missionaries to Germany for 10 years and spoke fluent German! They were very excited to welcome the German delegation! What a coincidence, huh?

In the meantime, Sheri had talked to the manager of The Mermaid Cove Campground at Spring Branch, Texas, close to Canyon Lake. The campground offered air-conditioned cabins and a lodge with a kitchen and dining area that could easily accommodate the group. Rick, the manager, must have wondered, "What was I thinking?" as he offered to reduce the rates not once, but three times! During the course of several conversations Sheri had with him, he kept lowering the price of the cabins and the lodge, so that by the time an agreement was reached, the price had dropped from \$68 per night per cabin to less than \$45 per night per cabin. That was less than \$11 per night per person! Our God is an awesome God!

Moving From Here to There

So, how do you move 27 people and more than 75 pieces of luggage from place to place for under \$2,000? We checked into tour buses, van rentals, camel caravans, and mule trains. Tour buses were too expensive, ditto 15-passenger vans since we'd have to have four of them. Mule trains were too slow, and camel caravans...well, camels spit. We should have known that our Lord had this worked out, too. Our good friend, Mark Woods, the Senior Commander at Terrell Assembly of God, knew a guy, who knew a guy who worked for the Terrell school district's school bus depot. We discovered that it was possible to rent school buses. And so the search was on for a person to drive the bus. This person ideally would be friendly, not prone to running red lights or driving in front of fast moving trains, and have three-weeks of vacation to dedicate to our adventure. We also discovered that in order to drive a school bus, a driver must have a commercial driver's license (CDL). We couldn't find anyone who met all the criteria. So, I went to the DMV and picked up the CDL handbook, which I studied for the next three months. I had to pass seven written tests and one driving test to gualify for a CDL. For three months, I had to listen to my wife say, "Think like a bus! Be the bus!" But I passed the tests with flying colors!

Now, here's another marvelous "coincidence." We had been worried about how our German friends would handle Texas heat in July and August. We knew they didn't have any idea of how miserable it could be. We needed air-conditioned vehicles. If we rented 15-seat passenger vans, we would have air conditioning, but we would need four of them, and the price was too steep! Although we could get the school bus for about the same cost as only one van, we knew school buses typically were not air conditioned. We were concerned about the Germans being out in the heat all day at the various activities and then having to get on a hot, hot bus. We were afraid they would all have heat stroke. Sheri kept asking me to find out if any of the buses had air conditioning, but I knew I'd never seen one. I didn't want to ask, because I knew the answer would be negative. One day, as I was at the bus yard for a practice session, I "just happened" to pass a group of bus drivers who "just happened" to be discussing a new bus. "Did you see the new bus the school district just got? It has air conditioning!" Now you know that a school district must plan for the purchase of a new bus and get budget approvals well in advance. Our awesome and all-knowing God knew that our German friends would be coming to Texas in the heat of summer, and He loved them enough to provide an AIR CONDITIONED BUS!

What God needed to do was provide a bus driver who knew how to operate the air conditioner! I had never driven the bus with people in it, and during our trip up to Eagle Rock, I was still getting familiar with the bus. The dashboard on

these buses runs from the left side all the way around the steering wheel with all kinds of toggle switches, buttons, and switches. It was rather confusing, but I did the best I could. It was about 103 degrees, and my German friends were about to melt, even with the A/C. About half way to Eagle Rock, I had several of them come to me and say they were very hot in the back of the bus. I told them it was hot outside and the A/C was doing the best it could. Just before we arrived at Eagle Rock, one of the passengers came up front and said, "You have got to be doing something wrong." That was when he noticed that I had the passenger heater on! Those poor hot Germans! I almost created an international incident by cooking them all. I figured out where the heater buttons were and did not make that mistake again.

Mom, What's for Dinner?

Dana and Werner told us that they budgeted about \$12 per day per person for food and wanted to know if we thought this was a good estimate. Of course, we didn't! Even a fast food meal can cost almost that much. To help them stretch their food money, we asked for help from the NTD Royal Rangers; in response, we were able to give them more than \$3,000 in donations of food, money, and other supplies! Dana and Werner expressed surprise and gratitude at the generosity of the NTD Royal Rangers and said they were not used to such help. Dana said she didn't understand why we would go to such lengths for strangers. Sheri told her that she thought the answer could be found in Proverbs 3:27-28, "Do not withhold good from those who deserve it, when it is in your power to act. Do not say to your neighbor, "Come back later; I'll give it tomorrow" when you now have it with you."

After the delegation arrived in Texas, they were treated to at least four feasts by various churches and groups. Three out of the four were barbeque dinners that, I have on good authority, the Germans really liked! The fact that they were subsisting mainly on sandwiches throughout their visit probably contributed to their enjoyment, but I do believe Texans KNOW BBQ!

Places to Go, People to See Dana and Sheri worked together for more than a year to develop an itinerary that would give our friends the widest possible view of Texas during their short visit. Dana had prepared a preliminary list of things she thought the delegation would enjoy, and Sheri worked with State officials and park representatives to find German-speaking tour guides and obtain special pricing on many attractions. It was difficult to plan activities that would satisfy the entire group; the ages of the people in the group ranged from nine years old to 47 years old, with most of them being teenagers between 15 and 19. Ultimately, the group settled on the following events and venues:

- Visiting Celebration City in Branson, Missouri – Teenagers and go-carts; need I say more?
- Touring the Cherokee Heritage Center in Tahlequah, Oklahoma – The staff at the Center was very helpful and welcoming, greeting the delegation personally and arranging a catered meal of Indian tacos. Our German friends heard the story of the Trail

of Tears and learned a bit of our frontier history.

Driving through Dallas, Texas, at night – The new High-Five Interchange on US 75 was described as something out of the *Star Wars* movies, and the skyline was declared impressive.

Sleeping in real beds at in the air conditioned lodge at Lakeview Camp - Do you take it for granted? According to the group, after a week at Camporama 2006 sleeping on the ground in sweltering heat, this was one of the highlights of their trip! The day after their first good night's sleep in a week, our German friends experienced Texas-style shopping at the Bass Pro Shop and Grapevine Mills Mall, where many of them bought jeans and cowboy boots. Crossways of Life Church in Duncanville welcomed our friends on Sunday for worship. Liz Musquiz and others at the church made sure we were well fed on our Texas adventure!

Tubing on the Guadalupe

River – After months of drought, the river was so low that the kids had to carry their tubes over low spots, and the water was bath-water warm. But, if the photos were any indication, the kids still had great fun.

Playing at Schlitterbahn Water Park in New Braunfels – Sun and water and 105 degrees! We had some very pink Germans, but I don't think they complained much. "It is great present from North District Rangers for us! What can we do for them? It is sooo hard to take present for something that you have not done (can you understand it?)

We Europeans are not used to the grace. We [feel that we] have to earn everything we receive... I feel so much mercy and grace!"

- Touring the Alamo, El Mercado, and the River Walk in San Antonio – When asked at the end of their trip what was the most memorable experience, many of the Germans declared San Antonio to be their favorite and wished they'd had more time to spend in this historic city.
- Spending a day at Sea World in San Antonio – Another 105 degree day! The teens were looking for any place where they could be splashed by dolphins.
- Swimming and sunning on the beach at Corpus Christi – The group was warmly

welcomed by the folks at Trinity Worship Center. They visited the beaches, the Texas State Aquarium, and the USS Lexington flugzeugtraeger (aircraft carrier). Pastor Weiss and his family knew from their time in Germany just what the group would be missing and prepared a basket of goodies. German coffee and chocolates, Nutella (a chocolate-hazelnut spread), and other items gave them a taste of home.

Touring the Texas State Capitol and the Bob Bullock Museum of Texas History in Austin – The Germans were politely impressed with the tallest capitol building in the U.S. and admired the inlaid marble state seal, which is reportedly where Johnnie Barnes got the inspiration for the Royal Rangers insignia. The Bob Bullock Museum guided them through various parts of our state's history.

Experiencing cowboy culture at the Double N Texas Longhorn Ranch – John Permenter invited the group to visit his mother's beautiful ranch an hour west of Waxahachie, where our German friends were able to feed and pet longhorn cattle, tour



the house and gardens, and enjoy a delicious barbeque dinner. This visit tied with San Antonio as their favorite experience, and many expressed a regret that they had earlier turned down a visit to a Texas rodeo as being "too brutal."

John and his family gave the Germans what was probably the best view of our state culture and heritage of any other experience.

Free day at Lakeview Camp – The day before our German friends left Texas for Germany, the NTD gave them a day to remember at Lakeview Camp. They experienced the highropes challenge course, shot clay pigeons on the gun range, threw knives and tomahawks, listened to traditional Texas music provided by Ken and Tom Harris and the Gumpert girls, and delighted us with their own singing and music. Pastor Mike Eddy and his beautiful family came from Jacksonville to provide a devotional message and join in a delicious farewell dinner.

All Good Things Come to an end

The adventure ended all too soon. Like other much anticipated events, it seemed that the time would never arrive, and then, in a flash, it was over. With heavy hearts and dragging feet, we loaded the bus with our 27 German friends and their many pieces of luggage for the trip to DFW International Airport. It was hard to let go; there were hugs and handshakes, and tears and laughter. One by one, the members of the German delegation, wearing their new boots and jeans, along with hats and bandanas from John Permenter, disappeared through the doors of the terminal following the skycaps and the piles of baggage. Finally, only Sheri and I remained on the sidewalk. We were reluctant to leave, hoping for one last glimpse of our beautiful friends, but finally, we boarded the empty bus and drove away praising God for a wonderful adventure!


