North Texas Junior Leadership Training Academy

June 7 – 12, 2009





Discovery Training Camp (DTC) - Sunday - Wednesday

DTC is a 3 day camp for the Discovery Ranger who is at least 9 years old and completed 3rd grade. The purpose of DTC is to train and prepare Discovery Ranger boys for leadership roles in the local outpost. To learn the importance of the patrol system and how they, as leaders, can promote the outpost and an esprit de corps among boys. This camp gives special emphasis in the basic camping and camp craft skills.



Academy Merit Camp (AMC) - Sunday - Friday

AMC is a 5 day camp for boys who are 10 years old and completed DTC, or are 11 years or older. AMC is a camp designed for the purpose of helping boys earn advanced merits on their way to earning their Gold Medal of Achievement. Each boy can choose from a list of advanced merit classes offered.



Adventure Training Camp (ATC) - Sunday - Friday

ATC is a 5 day camp for Adventure Rangers who are at least 11 years old, or have completed the 5th grade. Boys will learn to camp in a basic "outpost" setting, working as patrols, sharing duties and responsibilities. Focus merits include: Camp Safety, Cooking, First Aid Skills, Fire Craft, Rope Craft, and Tool Craft. Each day is filled with exciting classes and balanced with recreation.



Frontier Brigade Camp (FBC) - Sunday - Friday

FBC is a 5 day camp for boys who are at least 12 years old, or have completed 6th grade. FBC is a camp designed to generate a learning environment that challenges boys to learn, excites boys about FCF, and brings a spiritual emphasis of personal growth. Classes will be taught in an FCF Village setting by instructors in FCF outfits, creating a unique atmosphere and learning experience for the boys. The FBC camp will present each boy with a fun and exciting atmosphere.



Junior Training Camp (JTC) - Sunday - Friday

JTC is a 5 day camp for Royal Rangers who are at least 13 years old, or have completed the 7th grade. JTC is designed to give boys training in camping and leadership in their local outpost. JTC trains boys in these specific areas: The Patrol Method, Cooking, Lashing, Nature Study, Compass, Camp Safety, Soul Winning, Junior Leadership, Council Fires, Camp Recreation, and Overnight Backpacking Trips. Boys will work in patrols to accomplish each day's activities and guided recreation designed to build leadership skills which can be applied in their outpost.



Advanced Junior Leadership Training Camp (AJTC) - Sunday - Friday

AJTC is a 5 day camp for Royal Rangers who are at least 14 years old or have completed the 8th grade and who have successfully completed JTC. AJTC is designed to give boys advanced skills training and build on the leadership training of JTC. Key areas of focus: Advanced Leadership, Soul Winning, Conducting Council Fires, Orienteering, Pioneering, and The 16 Fundamental Truths.



Junior Canoeing Expedition (JCE) - Sunday - Friday

JCE is a 5 day camp for Royal Rangers having completed 9th grade and successfully completed AJTC. Those participating in JCE will assemble on Sunday at the Lakeview Camp in Maypearl, TX, and will travel for the expedition. Graduation from JCE will be held with the rest of the camps Friday evening at Lakeview Camp. Due to the physically strenuous nature of JCE all participants must be pre-approved to attend this camp.

North Texas Junior Leadership Training Academy June 7-12, 2009 Lakeview Camp, Maypearl, TX

To register to participate in one of the camps in the North Texas Junior Leadership Training Academy (JLTA), you need to complete both sides of this registration form and both sides of the attached medical information/release form. There are multiple places for parents/guardians to sign. Applications postmarked on or before April 24, 2009, will receive a \$25 discount on the total camp fee. Also, there is an additional \$10 discount available to members of chartered outposts.

The price includes camp meals, special beret or ball cap, camp patches, three camp t-shirts, insurance, activities, merit patches, transportation (depending on camp and merits chosen) and much more.

FLYING BY THE SEAT OF YOUR PANTS!

It had been a week full of distractions and I really wasn't ready for Ranger Kids class, but there I was. On top of that, even my most serious kid was jumping off the furniture! I quickly harness the energy into playing Bible story charades.

The last scene they act out is the story of Noah building an ark. I decide that's a good story and launch into the drama, emphasizing how Noah obeyed God and was saved; and how the people rejected him and made fun of him and were lost. As I tell it, the children interject their questions along the way.

"Did it really rain 40 days?" Yes! "Did they really take all those animals on the boat?" Yes! "Did God tell the animals to go on the boat?" Yes!

I throw out the answers as I go and then transition into how the story correlates to our lives today. It was then I realized my most serious student was no longer jumping off furniture — he has his head in his arms sobbing! I try to comfort him as I struggle to keep the story going at its most important spiritual application point, my mind racing to figure out what I said to put him in tears.

"Did those people really die?" Yes! "Are we all going to

die?" Yes!

I have taught myself the lesson tonight. There is a vast difference in "Seizing the Moment" under the anointing of the Holy Spirit and "Flying by the Seat of Your Pants!"

"Flying by the seat of your pants" means to do or take action without a plan, to go by feel, to make decisions in the moment. This phrase dates from the early years of aviation when airplanes had few navigational aids. The pilots relied greatly upon their own experience, intuition and senses to gauge the plane's position and performance. With the seat being the largest point of contact between the pilot and the plane, it was from the seat of his pants that the pilot could feel how the airplane was reacting to his controls and how well the engine was operating.

hands-on projects, merit work, and conversations with missionaries and 15 different Royal Rangers leaders who have been involved in various missions projects over the years the Rangers gained a thorough understanding of what missions work entails. NTC 7/8/09 - 7/12/09 Chandler, Oklahoma

National Training Camp is designed to give leaders professional training in camping and leadership, plus the opportunity of outstanding fellowship and adventure in the outdoors. 2009 will be the last year that NTC is offered. Starting in 2010 it will be replaced by the National Rangers Ministry Camp.



ANTC 11/5/09-11/8/09 Maypearl, Texas (Lakeview Campgrounds)

Advanced National Training Camp is designed to provide Royal Rangers leaders with additional training beyond that offered at the National Training Camp and will help inspire leaders to greater involvement in the Royal Rangers ministry. A leader must have attended National Training Camp before enrolling. This will be the last ANTC ever offered anywhere. If you have been holding off attending ANTC, don't wait any longer.



RKTC 10/2/09 – 10/4/09 Ruidoso, New Mexico

Ranger Kids Training Conference is designed to give leaders training in various techniques and methods of leadership. Leaders will also receive training in various aspects of the Ranger Kids ministries.



NTT 12/3/09-12/6/09 Salt Flat, Texas

National Training Trails allows leaders to participate in outstanding, rugged outdoor activities surrounded by some of America's most beautiful scenery. Leaders will be on the trail 4 exciting days, carrying all their gear and food in backpacks.

Why Charter?

Chartering is the annual process of registering your outpost with the district and national offices, and of financially supporting these two areas. The charter year in North Texas runs from October to September. Every church should recharter during the month of October.

Charter packages were sent to every church in the district, and to every senior commander in our database, in mid-August 2008. If you did not receive your charter packet, you can request one from our <u>district commander (jonathan@royalrangers.net</u>) or on the <u>Chartering page</u> of the North Texas District web site (http://ntd.royalrangers.net). If you need forms, or if you prefer to fill them out electronically, you will find links to the forms on this page also.

Completed charter applications were due by October 31. If your form is mailed after that date, it is subject to a \$25 late fee.

You may ask "why charter?" Here are four reasons for chartering:

- 1. **Discounts**. Every district-level Royal Rangers event will provide a discount to chartered leaders and boys. For example, chartered outposts that attend the District Pow Wow this April will receive a \$10 per person discount on their registration fee. Many sections will begin offering similar discounts for sectional events. In addition, the national Royal Rangers ministry will soon be providing discounts; look for details in the near future.
- **2. Participation**. In order for leaders to receive their annual leaders service awards your outpost must be chartered.
- **3. Participation, part two**. This is one of those intangible benefits to most outposts. Chartering is a main source of financial support for both the district and national Royal Rangers offices. Often commanders wonder why the district or national office can't do more. The answer is frequently because it takes money to do more, and if outposts don't charter, or don't charter everyone, there are limited financial resources available to help further this ministry throughout the North Texas District and across the country. Charter funds are a major source of funds for the national Royal Rangers ministry.
- **4. Publications.** The district maintains a mailing list of chartered leaders, and several different mailings are sent each year, including the Pow Wow packet and notices about publications like this Signal Fire. In addition, the national office will soon be mailing the first issues of *Rangers Now*, the new publication that replaces the High Adventure magazine. As of the last weekend in February the *Rangers Now* are off the presses at GPH and being prepared for mailing. Outposts will also receive the first of what is to become an annual media kit with videos, PPT templates, and graphics for posters, letterhead, business cards, and more.

They each set the goal years ago to earn this honor, and when they completed the Junior Missions Camp in early January they completed the final requirement to earn their coveted saber. It is our goal in North Texas to see many more Rangers earn this honor over time.



To earn the Academy Saber requires completion

of five JLTA training camps and a minimum of 25 Spirit Challenge lessons. The JLTA camps for the saber begin with Junior Training Camp (JTC) and Advanced Junior Training Camp (AJTC). After that, the Rangers can complete any three elective camps from a pretty long list of camps: Junior Survival Camp, Junior Training Trails, Junior Canoe Expedition, Junior Missions Camp, and Elite Junior Leadership Camp.

Sabers will be presented to those who earn them at the end of their fifth training camp. An application for the saber is available on the district website at http://ntd.royalrangers.net

Starting this summer we will also be honoring boys who complete the Trail to the Tomahawk. This new award is for boys who complete three specific training camps: Discovery Training Camp (DAC will count if the Ranger has already completed it), Frontier Brigade Camp, and Adventure Training Camp. We will be presenting these ceremonial tomahawks during the JLTA graduation ceremony in June. North Texas District Royal Rangers Annual Report 2008

We have seen many areas of continued improvement in the Royal Rangers ministry this past year. Charter numbers and participation in events are both up, training is increasingly available to leaders in their local area, and boys are being ministered to and mentored by godly men and women who work with them every week.

Charter Numbers

In our most recently completed charter year (2007-08) we saw a net gain of ten churches chartering Royal Rangers. This was almost a twelve percent increase over the previous year. This is against the backdrop of continuing declines in charter numbers nationwide. One of our churches (Christ Church in Ft. Worth) is now one of the twenty-five largest outposts in the country.

Event Participation

We have had strong participation in all of the district events this year. One recent example is our Winter Camp held November 14-16 at Lakview. In 2007 we had about 330 boys and leaders in attendance. This year, despite the very cold weather, we had over 560 boys and leaders in attendance. They had a great time with the activities on Saturday, and enjoyed the ministry of Jason Abney and the youth praise and worship team from Church of Living Hope in Tyler. Saturday night the entire camp responded to the altar call from Pastor Jason.

We held our very first Ranger Kids Day Camp in the district since the early 1990s in October. Over 330 boys, leaders, and parents participated in this camp, and all had the opportunity to hear the Gospel message during the devotion time. Many responded to the message.

Training

National training has returned to North Texas after an absence of several years. Men and women from across North Texas (and across the country) received outstanding training at our National Training Camp, Ranger Kids Training Conference, and World Class Outpost Seminar.

We held a series of Leadership Training Academy (LTA) sessions at Lakeview earlier this year, and many sections have stepped up their level of training of leaders as well. We are way ahead of where we were last year in terms of total training modules taught, leaders taught, and Leaders Medals of Achievement earned.

One outpost that attended our Winter Camp brought the most boys to a camp they ever have. In conversation with the leaders it is obvious that the training these leaders have received through the LTA and the national training events in our district this year is directly impacting their ministry to boys in their community, leading to growth in their ministry.

Ministry

We have seen incredible responses to the gospel message at all of our camps and events this year. At Pow Wow, the Junior Leadership Training Academy, Ranger Kids Day Camp, Winter Camp, FCF Family Days and Brush Poppin, etc. the focus has always been ministry to the boys. Our methods are to use activities and events to attract boys, but boys and men alike return over and over because of the dynamic evening services. Throughout 2008 countless boys have been saved and/or filled with the Holy Spirit through our Royal Rangers ministry.

(This annual report was recently submitted to the North Texas District for the annual District Council to be held in June, 2009.)

Ask the District Commander

Here are several questions that have recently been asked of our district commander and his responses:

- Q. Why is the fee for Pow Wow so high this year?
- A. Starting with the 2007 Pow Wow (the Great Texas Pow Wow) we have included all meals in the registration price. The meals are catered by CiCi's Pizza (Friday night) and Lakeview Camp for the remaining meals. This allows leaders to spend more time with their boys at the camp. In addition, Pow Wow includes a custom-designed ball cap and hat pins for the boys, plus new activities (this year BMX bikes and RC car races). These items and events cost money and unfortunately have to be included in the Pow Wow price. Our goal with Pow Wow is to have so many activities that your boys won't have time to do them all so they will be excited about coming again next year.
- Q. What are your goals for Royal Rangers in the North Texas District?
- A. The national Royal Rangers office just asked us to establish five-year goals for our district. The goals I turned in are to double the number of chartered churches and to double the number of boys and leaders in the district. This may seem like a stretch, as that would give us 190 chartered outposts. However, when you consider that in our peak year for charters in the early 1990s we had 161 chartered outposts, this isn't that much of a stretch. Nationwide charter numbers have declined since 1990, and our district has mirrored that trend. But if we can encourage more A/G churches to start/restart Royal Rangers, and to reach out to non-A/G and PCCNA churches, we can reach this goal. The thing about this goal is that it's not about the numbers, but about the number of boys who would be reached for Christ through the Royal Rangers ministry.
- Q. Why are there so many events on the district Royal Rangers calendar?
- A. Because it takes a wide variety of activities to interest all of our boys. And many of the activities on the calendar are training events that will help us, as leaders, do a more effective job of ministering to the boys. The interesting thing about having a lot of activities scheduled is that it's not the boys who complain about having too much to do. Often they complain that they don't have enough to do. Whether it's a district event, a sectional event, or just a local outpost activity, the boys want and need activities.

Pow Wow/Camp Work Day

On Saturday, March 28 we will be holding a work day at Lakeview Camp to help get it ready for Pow Wow. We only have one work day a year to work on our campground, and we need your help. The Lakeview Camp staff do a great job of mowing and making the grounds look good. We need to do some work on our pageant site, our buildings, clear brush, etc.

Bring your tools and your boys to help with this work day. Lunch will be provided for those who are working. If you want to come out the night before and camp with your boys you are certainly welcome to do so.



2009 FCF Territorial Rendezvous

"Where the Plains meet the Mountains"

The Plainsmen Territory will join with the Mountainmen Territory (SW region) this summer for the 2009 territorial rendezvous. More than 300 FCF members from the southwest part of the country are expected to come to Tres Piedras, New Mexico. We will be above 9,000 feet for this camp.



The camp will be held July 14-18, 2009 with an optional Frontier Trek two days before that. We will

also be holding a Wilderness Vigil the day before Rendezvous for those who qualify for the Vigil.
