#### **Pathfinder Trip**

Are you ready for anything? We are having a Pathfinder trip August 3-9, 2014 at our campground, The Royal Rangers Camp at Lakeview.

Pathfinders is a missions effort of Royal Rangers and the Frontiersmen Camping Fellowship (FCF) that sponsors teams to undertake construction projects at home and abroad. This will be a great time for you to participate in a Pathfinder trip and to help get some much-needed work done on our own campground. This will be one of the few Pathfinder trips that you don't have to pay to attend; we just need you to show up and work. We will have several projects going on at the camp this year and the more people we have participate the more we can accomplish. Some funds for this trip have been raised by the members of the FCF and there are also funds available from the Future 500 fund.

#### **2013 New Buckskin Members**


Wow. Has it been a year already? Time has really flown since I was asked by our FCF President to be your Buckskin Representative. It has certainly been an honor to work with all our candidates.

#### **Buffalo Awards**

Buffalo awards provide additional advancement recognition for boys who have completed the advancement trail in their current age group. Discovery Rangers who have earned the Gold Eagle award may earn Bronze Buffaloes by earning the additional merits as stated below. Adventure Rangers who have earned the Gold Medal of Achievement may likewise earn Silver Buffaloes, and Expedition Rangers who have earned the E3 award may earn Gold Buffaloes.

#### **Bronze Buffalo Award Requirements**

- Earn the Gold Eagle award.
- Earn one additional RED leadership merit.
- Earn two additional BLUE skill merits.
- Earn one additional ORANGE Bible merit.

#### **Silver Buffalo Award Requirements**

- Earn the Gold Medal of Achievement award.
- Earn one additional GOLD leadership merit.
- Earn two additional GREEN skill merits.
- Earn one additional BROWN Bible merit.

#### **Gold Buffalo Award Requirements**

- Earn the E3 award.
- Earn one additional SKY BLUE leadership merit.
- Earn two additional SILVER skill merits.
- Complete 25 additional Spirit Challenge lessons.

#### Medals & Ribbons Order of Wear

Medals, ribbons, and awards serve to recognize individuals for their accomplishments in Royal Rangers. Some awards may only be earned by boys. Others may only be earned as leaders, while others may be earned by either boys or leaders.

Once a boy reaches 18 years of age (or graduates from High School, whichever comes later) he may no longer be considered a boy in the program and must graduate into the ranks of adult leadership. At that time, all awards earned as a boy must be removed from his uniform (with the exceptions noted below) and he may begin to accumulate new awards to represent his accomplishments as a leader. The following "order of wear" defines the awards that may be worn on the uniforms of boys and adults, as well as the priority of wear when multiple awards are worn.

When wearing multiple medals or ribbons on a Royal Rangers uniform, the highest-rated item must be worn on the left (when viewed from the front) or at the top. The following lists define the order in which these items should be worn.

#### Order of Wear for Adult Leaders

- 1. Medal of Valor
- 2. Medal of Courage
- Honor Gold Medal of Achievement
- 4. National Medal of Merit
- 5. FCF Flame of Honor
- 6. RRA Lifetime Service Award
- 7. National Outstanding Service
  Award
- 8. Medal of Excellence
- 9. Missions Project Award

#### **Leather Craft Tutorial**

Hello, my name is Spotted Bull and I am addicted to leather working...well maybe not addicted. But I really really really really like to do it! And people tell me that I am kinda good at it. So I thought that I would share some of the tricks and tips that I have learned in making shooting pouches and knife sheaths.

Now there are many leather workers in the Shawnee Trail. And all of what they do is great. Don't believe me? Just ask them, they will tell you! There are no real wrong or right or good or bad ways to do leather work. It's all up to the individual craftsman.

So, let's get started here. The first thing you want to do is decide what time frame you want the pouch to represent. Earlier pouches were smaller and worn high up under the arm. Larger pouches didn't really show up until the fur trade era, and still were not as big as some modern bags made today. I use several books as references. The foremost authority I guess is <a href="https://doi.org/10.10/10.20/">The Kentucky Rifle Hunting Pouch</a> by Madison Grant. Madison spent a great deal of time photographing and writing about authentic bags from the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> Century.







Another excellent reference is <u>Sketches of Hunting Pouches</u>, <u>Powder Horns and Accoutrements of Southern Appalachia</u> by Jim Webb. Jim sketched pouches and accouterments from the Appalachian region of the US and even includes rough patterns of the bags. I have copies of both of these books, if you would like to look at them. They are also available at various places on the internet.

The best book to have if you want to learn to make pouches is <u>Recreating the 18th Century Hunting Pouch</u> by T.C. Albert. Mr. Albert will guide you step by step in making the pouch, much the same way I will in this article. His decades of experience and special talents make this a "go-to" book for many craftsmen. There are pictures of period bags and lots of patterns based on those bags to trace out and use in making your own bags.

Now you have decided that that you want to make a small square bag with a simple leather strap without a buckle for adjustment. First thing you need to do is make a pattern. I use PowerPoint on my computer to make all my patterns. It allows me to make the curves and measurements even and is easier to remove lines than with pencil drawing. So make a pattern whichever way you want, and make it out of sturdy cardboard or thick paper. I then trace this pattern onto the suede or rough side of the pattern with a #2 pencil, or sometimes I use a ball point pen. But I recommend a pencil. It's easier to remove the lines with an eraser than a pair of scissors!

Most all of the leather that I use in my projects is vegetable tanned leather. For me, it's easier to use and it can be manipulated in many different ways. It can be dyed and shaped and formed and engraved and carved and whatever else you may come up with. Leather comes in different weights, or thicknesses. Here is a chart that will help you understand what I mean.

I generally use 2-3 oz. veg tan for pouches because it is more pliable and softens up easier than the thicker stuff. For knife sheaths I use 5-6 oz. for the body and 9-10 oz. for the welt. We will get into what those terms mean later.

Now some folks like to use a knife to cut out their leather pieces. I use a pair of scissors that I bought at Wal-Mart to cut mine. But again, no one way is best. I prefer to cut my pieces out just barely inside my lines, so that I don't have to make an effort to remove or hide the lines in my project. This is where the pencil comes in handier than the pen.

For a simple bag like this, you will probably want to keep the back of the bag and the front flap as one piece. Look at this bag and you can see what I mean.



Your pile of pieces should include: a front of the bag body, the back/front flap piece, the welt and the strap.

I bet you are wondering what a welt is. A welt is the piece of leather that you sew between the pieces in the seam. This welt protects the stitches on the bag. Grab the seam of your shirt and pull it open a little bit. See the threads in the stitches? The welt will keep you from seeing them, thus protecting them. Welts can be either flat or rolled, depending on what you want. On the higher end bags that I make, I use a rolled welt. It

looks like what is on your living room couch or your desk chair. Most modern ones have a thin little bead of cotton or synthetic material rolled into them. Flat welts can be extended beyond the edge of the bag and cut into fringe. Here are some pictures of welts and fringe. The picture on the left has 3 flat welts, while the picture of the right has a rolled welt and welt made into fringe.





#### **Tools**

You are going to need some tools to do this with. And this is where the initial expense of leather working really comes into play. There are four basic items that you really need to have to make your leather working look nice and neat. These are:

A professional type groover



An over stitch wheel



#### A diamond-shaped awl

#### And two needles





All of these tools are readily available from leather crafting stores like Tandy and lots of places on EBay. Do a little shopping around and find a good price on your tools. But don't buy cheaply made tools. These tools can last you a long time if you care for them correctly.

OK. Let's talk about what each tool is for and how they are used. The professional type groover is an improvement on a cheaper groover that Tandy once made.

I do recommend that you DO NOT use the cheaper item. It breaks easily and it not worth the money.

The pro groover is a very handy tool in keeping your stitches nice and even and straight. Further, the groove will protect the stitches by inletting them below the surface of the leather. With the adjustable guide arm that slides in and out, you can adjust how close to the edge of the leather you want your stitches. This is especially important for sewing bags that right side out that will display your stitches.

Once you have decided how close you want your stitches to the edge, tighten the nut that holds the arm. Position the center cutter at the top edge of your work.



Draw the groover down the piece, with the arm on the outer edge, with a little pressure on the center cutter to make the groove.



Do this on all the edges that you will be sewing. You will end up with a little pile of thin leather threads! These are fun to wad up and throw at your folks!

So you have this nifty little groove running along the edge of you pieces. Now you have to decide how close together you want your stitches. For beginners, I recommend using an overstitch wheel that will show 5 stitches per inch. This wheel comes with interchangeable wheels that are 5,6 and 7 stitches per inch. There is also a piece of leather that shows what each wheel will do to the leather. Tandy sells this overstitch wheel.



The wheel is designed to run down the groove that you cut with the groover. Sometimes wetting the leather slightly before using the wheel helps to see the indentions in the groove that are left.




Each indention is where you will punch your hole with the diamond shaped awl. The awl blade is actually shaped like a diamond. So no you don't have to buy an awl with a diamond tipped blade!




There is actually a really good reason for this. A round punch will tear or break the fibers of the leather. A diamond awl will simply part them to either side. The round punch will not try and heal itself and close back up. The diamond hole will.

But it is important HOW you punch your holes. ALWAYS punch at a 45° angle to the edge of the leather. This

little picture shows you why.



So this is how the holes will look when they are all punched.



Now that we have all of the holes punched, it's time to start sewing. But don't get me wrong. If you want to punch the holes one at a time and sew it up that way that is perfectly acceptable. Some people do that. Mostly this is done with the help of a stitching pony that holds the project. Here is an example of a stitching pony.



The styles and variations of them are limitless. Just do a Bing search on them and you will see what I mean.

I usually do punch all of my holes first, and I don't use a stitching pony. So what you need to know now is what type of thread to use in sewing the project together. I only use 1 type of thread — waxed Irish linen, usually 3 or 4 strand. Tandy and other leather suppliers sell this, but I have found it to be inconsistent in both wax content and tensile strength. I found a website that is my sole source of thread. Here is the website link.

The 100 yard spools last a very long time! And they have multiple colors that you can match to the dye you are going to use on a project.

Now why do I use waxed thread? Well there are a couple of reasons. One, the wax makes the thread slide through the holes a LOT easier! And the wax adds a small amount of water resistance to the project that can help keep water from getting gin through the holes.

Needles are you next concern. I generally use size 000 harness needles. These are long and sturdy and not terribly sharp. But they will stick poke you. I hardly ever make a bag that doesn't have at least a small sample of my DNA somewhere on it! The eye isn't too big, so it doesn't get caught in the leather or break off like some bigger eyed needles tend to do. They can be found at Tandy and EBay and everywhere.



This is how we set up the thread with the needles. The method that I use is called a double saddle stitch. It requires a needle on both ends of the thread like this.



Of course your thread length will be different! Just a quick note on thread length. One simple way to estimate how much thread you will need for a seam you are about to stitch is this; allow about 3 inches of thread on


the end, and then lay the thread along that seam. When you reach the other end, double it back over and allow another couple of inches and cut it off. You will probably have some excess, but that is just going to happen. Practice a lot and you will know by instinct how much you will need.

OK, you have a needle on each end of your thread. DON"T TIE A KNOW ANYWHERE ON THE THREAD! Your just gonna have to hold it and push the needle and pull the needle and be aware of where the thread is. On long pieces of thread, this can be a pain, but do it anyway.

Here is how ya do a saddle stitch. Push one needle through the holes you punched on both pieces, like Figure 1. Then push one needle through the next hole like in Figure 2. Then push the other needle through that same hole in the opposite direction, like in Figure 3.

Now pull it tight and proceed down to the end of that seam of stitches. But I bet you are wondering why this particular stitch is used in leather craft. Here is a picture as Al Stohlman explained it. He wrote the books on leather working!!!



Now that you finally have that little bitty bag all sewed up and it's looking pretty good. But that color of the veg tanned leather isn't exactly what you were looking for. There are many ways that you can dye and color that leather.

The easiest is to do almost nothing to it! Put some mink oil like you can buy at Wal-Mart in the shoe department and let the sun and use naturally age the leather. I have a throwing knife sheath that I did this

way and the leather has a nice mellow tan color. Further, you can just lay the entire project up in a window that gets a lot of sunlight and let the sun actually darken the hide, just like a sun tan. Just make sure that all the sides get about the same exposure.

Tandy and others make many different colors and types of dyes that can be used. I generally use a water based dye made by Feibing's. Bing will take you to their site.

But for black dye I make a vinegaroon solution. Take a hand full of rusty nails or maybe some clean steel wool and put it in a mason jar. Pour enough ordinary vinegar in the jar to fill it up. The vinegar will dissolve the metal and create a solution. Simple strain out the rusty stuff from the liquid and apply it to the leather. The ferric content in the solution reacts with the tannin in the leather and turns it black. Once the solution is set, rinse the leather well and then rinse again in water with baking soda in it to lower the pH. Then rinse in clear water and let dry, probably outside in the wind because it will still smell like vinegar. Then apply your favorite leather preservative.

I am sure that this little tutorial didn't answer all of your questions. It may not have answered any of them for that matter. But hopefully it will give you enough insight to get you started. I am always around at FCF and Royal Ranger events and will be more than happy to sit down and go over anything you need help with.



The updated Trail of the Grizzly will include new



### Arrowhead Merits

To encourage the development of different skills within the FCF, a new group of merits was developed called Arrowhead Merits. These 16 new merits are identified by the arrowhead shape in the background of each of merit. These are all silver skill merits, and can be used for Royal Rangers advancement steps.

You don't have to be a member of FCF to earn these merits, and they can be taught by any Royal Rangers leader regardless of FCF membership status.

The merit patches can be earned and worn by Ranger boys, while the Royal Ranger Leaders who work on these will earn an Arrowhead award certificate to indicate completion.

Upon completion of four Arrowhead merits, a Ranger or leader will earn the one of four Arrowhead medallion to wear with their FCF outfit. Each additional four Arrowhead merits completed will earn the next Arrowhead medallion. They are the Pilgrim, Pioneer, Trailblazer, and Patriot.

The Arrowhead merits themselves will be different from other merits in that those working on the merit will have their choice of requirements to complete the award. Each requirement has number of points associated with it, 15 points are required to earn the merit. Each merit also requires 5 hours of Christian Service to the local church, community or missions. Only after the service is performed and the points earned will the award be completed.

All of the requirements for these awards will be found in the Expedition Rangers track of TracClub.


These four areas have specific time requirements for service with a required number of hours for each of the areas of service. Information concerning these can be found in the new FCF Handbook.

# Mational Mational Motebook

Membership cards have been in use for well over 200 years. No one knows when the first membership card was used, but it has proved a valuable tool in identifying a member of a particular organization. Groups and clubs have used cards to show membership to pass into buildings, access special privileges and services.

From an early beginning, FCF has used membership cards to reflect active membership. Produced and distributed by the national Royal Rangers office, these have been a way to show you are an active member of FCF.
