As you surely know by now, we have been blessed with a new location for the FCF Village. The new area is just north of the pavilion and is a beautiful, grassy field that was covered with wild flowers this spring. Currently, there are no structures there, but we have ideas and dreams! Among the first things we want to build are a palisade to establish the boundaries, and a cabin and blacksmith shop in the center front of the FCF Village. The cabin is planned to be about 20' x 30' with a lean-to cover and corral for the blacksmith shop. We have plans for the cabin to house the FCF Mercantile, in which we can sell handmade items from our members, along with other goods appropriate for pre-1840s camping. Additionally, the cabin will give us space for a museum of Shawnee Trail history.


2016 Family Days Camp

The Next Frontier Adventure Beckons

Shawnee Trail Frontier Adventure October 7-9, 2016 - REGISTRATION DEADLINE SEPTEMBER 10

It's time again to fill the ranks with new members of the Shawnee Trail Fur Trading Company. If you are an Old Timer or Young Buck, then you need to identify those men and boys who show exceptional interest and outstanding achievement in Royal Rangers and begin to help them prepare for the next Frontier Adventure by stepping up to mentor them into our chapter. The company recently published a new guide book for all greenhorn trappers that is an excellent guide for you to use in getting your candidates ready for employment with the Shawnee Trail. You can find the new guide, called the Frontiersman Workbook, on-line at the District website, ntxrr.org. Sponsors/mentors, you need to read and use the new workbook because changes were made - primarily regarding which scripture verses need to be memorized. Although it is not a requirement for candidates to complete the Frontiersman Workbook prior to the Adventure, it will be extremely advantageous for them to do so.

In order to aid the staff in preparation a pre-registration deadline of September 10 will be strictly enforced. Cost for all camp volunteers, to include sponsors/mentors, will be \$30. The \$30 fee will pay for your food from Friday night dinner to Sunday morning breakfast. The applicant fee is \$40 and should be paid by the sponsor/mentor at the same time as registration.

Requirements for Membeship:

Both boys and leaders

• You must be an active member in a chartered outpost

Boys only

- Graduate of the 5th grade
- At least 11 years old
- Have completed either the Discovery Rangers Gold Eagle, the Adventure Rangers Bronze Medal, or the Expedition Rangers E1 medal.

Leaders only

- Must have completed Ready and Safety levels
- Must be a member in good standing in your church with a completed background check

Shawnee Trail - Don't delay. Be aggressive in identifying candidates and then let's all work together to aid our Greenhorns into becoming all that God wants them to be.

REGISTRATION DEADLINE IS SEPTEMBER 10. You have three months to get ready. Let's make this the biggest Frontier Adventure ever.

Saturday morning dawned gray and cool. The pioneer campers in the FCF Village desired fire to warm their bones, so dry tinder was obtained and a fire started. Many pioneer campers gathered around the fire to seek the comfort that emanated from the bright flames.



What wonderful fellowship. All were excited about the soon to come adventures offered by the "Rangerlympic Games" on Saturday.

During the day, many pilgrims braved the harsh environment and found their way to the FCF Village. The pilgrims, pioneers and fur trappers of the Shawnee Trail joined together in archery and fell many of the forest animals with well aimed bow shots. Several wild pigs were taken and then prepared for the evening feast. Wild turkey, deer and even a few black bears were slain in order to provide sustenance for the many pilgrims in the camp.

The awesome splendor of our Creator was on full display as the sun suddenly burst through the mists of the air. With extreme brilliance the sun heated our bodies and we all sought relief in the shade of our

shelters or the shade God gives us in the pleasure of the trees He created.

In spite of the heat, Pilgrims and fur traders, and pioneers, continued to press into the FCF Village so that they could take aim with the tomahawk and throwing knife. When the evening on the second day finally arrived and sun dipped below the horizon, the evening cooled and gave everyone relief from the sun's scorching blaze. There were men with giant muscles - like Samson from the Bible. Incredible hair! And a strong man pulled some other men in a cart - what great strength. As God's presence fell on us, we all gathered into small groups and prayed. What power. We all felt like our spirits were the big muscle man we saw earlier. Nothing seemed impossible with God helping us.

The pioneers and fur traders all headed back to the FCF Village. We could see the twinkling lights from our candles - they guided us on our trip through the time warp back to 1836. What blessed comfort were our shelters and beds that night. Again, the buzzing and hammering of Old Timers snoring could be heard all throughout camp as we all slumbered peacefully under a beautiful, starry night.

It was a great Pow Wow in the FCF Village. Several shelters contained wonderful boys and men of the Shawnee Trail. Sunday, we all packed our belongings onto our pack horses and wagons and headed back to civilization. All of us look forward to our next adventure back into the glorious past when the FCF Village will come back from the past and be set-up again.



So, You're Ready for Buckskin, Are Ya?

First thing you need to know is the next time we will be doing Buckskin testing is at Winter Camp. The sponsor and mentor can be the same person, and they are welcome to be at the testing to cheer you on, and at your Buckskin ceremony that evening if you are successful in your journey. What do you need to do to prepare for Buckskin? Everything you need to know is in the new Buckskin workbook that is available on nationalfcf.com. You must complete this workbook prior to your testing. The application for advancement to Buckskin is available on the district website (www.ntxrr.org).

You will need a name when you advance to Buckskin. This name needs to be unique in our chapter, so you should contact our scribe, Mark Oliver (mark@ntxrr.org) with your proposed name. He can check our records to make sure your chosen name is available.
