## Knights Theme is a Hit at District Pow Wow

Imagine standing only yards away as the renegade knight Sir Thomas the Black (alias Keith Poirier) and the King's representative Sir Eric the Red (alias Mike O'Connell) crashed these huge swords at one another.

This was an awe inspiring demonstration of swordsmanship that left everyone thrilled. Following this sword fight (which was only the start of an exciting story throughout Pow Wow), the participants went for an outstanding evening council fire.

Participating in events such as The Knight's Challenge, The Battle Horse, The Quest, The Lost Maiden, etc., the boys had a great time. The afternoon's events were interrupted for a fun Catapult War. During this time, water balloons were seen flying all over the place as each outpost demonstrated their ability to build and aim their catapult.

Near supper time, the cry rang out though out the camp-ground that Sir Thomas the Black had been captured. All of the people were assembled in the council fire area where the judgment of 'death' was pronounced for the rebellious knight. However, before the sentence was carried out, the knight was given a chance to turn away from his rebellion and accept the King's forgiveness, which he did. 

## DREAM A DREAM

Tom Dempsey was born with half a right foot and a deformed right arm. But he had a ton of faith. Dempsey wanted to be a football player. He became a kicker for his high school team. But that wasn't enough. He wanted to play college ball. Again, he became the kicker for his college team. But when he graduated from college, his dream became even wilder and more fantastic. He wanted to be a professional football player! A professional football player with half a foot and a deformed right arm. Right! Impossible! No coach would ever accept him. They all shook their heads. All except one, and it was ironic and more than coincidental that Dempsey became a kicker for the New Orleans Saints. The rest is history. In 1972, I along with several hundred thousand TV viewers witnessed Dempsey kick the longest field goal ever - 63 yards! All because he was not realistic. All because Tom Dempsey had faith in Jesus Christ who gave him the strength to do what he had dreamed.

Joseph had a dream as a very young man (Genesis 37:5-11). It was a significant dream. A dream of power - a dream that he would make a significant impact and contribution to life. Do you remember the dreams? Joseph sheaf stood up right while his brother's sheaves bowed down to his. Again he dreamed that the sun, moon, and eleven stars bowed down to him. As I again read the story of Joseph's life, I rediscovered several things that we need to realize about dreams that are birthed within us.

**First, people aren't always as excited about our dreams as we are.** Joseph's brothers despised him all the more because of his dreams. Jacob, his father, rebuked him for sharing the dream. How many parents have said, "Get realistic." How many parents have said, "You can't do it." Royal Rangers leaders encourage our

young boys to dream a dream.

**Second, our dream isn't likely to be fulfilled immediately.** Joseph was 17 years old when he dreamed his dreams. He spent 10 years in Potiphar's house and 3 years in prison. He was 30 years when he became Pharaoh's chief administrator. There were then 7 years of abundance in Egypt and 2 years of famine before Joseph reintroduced himself to his brothers and family. Joseph was 39 years old before he saw the fulfillment of his childhood dream. Royal Ranger leaders need to remind our young boys to be faithful and consistent in their walk with God.

**Third, there is a tendency to lose the passion of a dream over a long period of time.** Pharaoh's renaming of Joseph to Zaphenath-paneah means "the salvation of the world" or "the rescuer of the world." The names Joseph gave to his two little boys suggest that he had finally arrived. Manasseh meant "forget." Ephraim meant "fruitful." His dream appears to have come to be fulfilled. But the dream has not been fulfilled. Appearance may say so, but there is more. Joseph's brothers show up to purchase food. After some testing, we come to a very moving and emotional moment as Joseph reveals himself to his family. It's the fulfillment of that childhood dream. Royal Ranger leaders cannot allow the dreams of the young boys in their outpost die.

## WHAT IS A TRAINING CHIEF?

I can't tell you how many times I've had that question asked. In fact, I asked that question myself many years ago. I started off by noticing that some people in the district had gold pins on their collars. I assumed this was something special but never bothered to ask or to look it up. Then one day, while looking up something else in my leaders manual, I noticed the pins. "Training Chief" said the leaders manual. "Okay", I said, "Now I know what the pins mean but, what is a training chief".

I soon learned that a training chief is a leader who goes around the district teaching the LTC. They are basically teaching leaders how to be leaders. Having gone through the LTC by correspondance, I was curious what the advantage would be to take the course with a teacher. After all, I thought, I don't need someone to read the books to me, I can do that myself. At this time, they had just come out with book 5 of the LTC so rather than do the last book via correspondance, I decided to take the last book in a class with a teacher to see what it was like. I was impressed. The class flowed, the teacher really knew his stuff and I learned far more than what was in the book.

You see, a training chief's job is not to read the book to you. His or her job is to help you become a better leader. They do that in a variety of ways. First they bring the material alive by using a variety of visual aids. Second, they add material that may not be specifically covered by the L.T.C. The third thing they do to make it better is to share their **experiences** with the students. Many of the people who are training chiefs have years of experience as commanders. Part of being a training chief is to share with new leaders some of the things they have learned.

I believe that the greatest way we can help leaders in our district is to train them. There are many men and women who have started out as commanders with enthusiasm but are often no longer in the ministry. Have you ever wondered what happened to them? I think many of them

# DISTRICT HOSTS 2ND NATIONAL TRAINING CAMP!

On September 19<sup>th</sup>, 46 men gathered in Wilmont, NH to attend the National Training Camp. This was only the second time our district has hosted this event. For those of you who don't know, a National Training Camp is THE training event for leaders. The camp was blessed to have Paul Stanek, the National Training Coordinator as the camp commander and Jim Eubanks, District Commander from Oklahoma, as the camp's Senior Guide. For three and one half days, these 46 men from Northern New England, Southern New England and New York were taught by some of the finest men in Royal Rangers on how to be a great commander.

After arriving on Thursday, the men where assigned patrols and, as one participant said, "one of the greatest things I've ever experienced" began. For the next few days, these men learned what it means to be a Ranger commander. They also learned about teamwork, fellowship, hard work and discipline. Each evening the men experienced great times with the Lord. And what was it like to attend? Here are a few comments from leaders who took up the challenge.

*"I just got back from the N.T.C. in Wilmont, NH and I had to share what it meant to me. God is good. His presence was all over the camp in Love, brotherhood, cooperation, comradery and unity. It was exciting to work together with men from all over the district to learn how to reach, teach and keep boys for Christ.*

*The four days at camp were four of the best days I have ever spent. We learned all about the Royal Ranger ministry, what it is to be a Ranger leader and a boy in Rangers. At N.T.C. we learned about first-aid, lashing, safety, compass, firecraft,*

*ropecraft, tool craft, nature study and a whole lot more. I strongly suggest that if anyone is a Ranger leader, that they attend an N.T.C. It will give you a fire for our Lord Jesus Christ, for boys and the Royal Ranger ministry. If you feel that you can't afford to go because of the cost or lost wages, just trust the Lord and remember Phillipians 4:19. I thank God he has called me into this ministry. N.T.C. helped me to realize what an honor it is to be called by God the creator of heaven and earth to minister to boys". - Ken Hatch, New Life A/G Bethleham, NH.*

Ed Christiansen, reported how he had hesitated to attend N.T.C. He had heard horror stories about what N.T.C. was like. He was extremely pleased after attending and reports *"Don't get me wrong, discipline was strict and the standard of NTC was upheld and we were treated with respect, it was a trifle severe at times, but discipline isn't easy. For what it is worth, my opinion of this NTC is that it was top notch, effective, instructive, and gave me a much greater appreciation for Royal Rangers, as well as allowing good friendships to form".*

What does this all mean to you? It means that the next time their is an N.T.C. nearby, you'll want to make sure you attend. For those of you who have attended an N.T.C. you can now attend other exciting training camps such as the Advanced National Training Camp, The National Training Trails, The Winter National Training Camp and the National Canoe Expedition. got discouraged and quit. One of the easiest ways to get discouraged is by trying to run a ranger meeting without having learned how to have a **SUCCESSFUL** meeting. Week after week, leaders go to meetings with great ideas only to have the meeting turn out a dismal failure. How do we prevent that? One of the key ways is to teach leaders how to run the meeting. How to plan a meeting. How to make a meeting interesting and exciting.

That's where the Training Chief comes in. By sharing the LTC material with the students and by imparting to the students the experience that they have had, they help a leader to be **READY**. It is a fact that if you get a leader trained you have a leader for a long time. The percentage of men and women who are in the ministry years after taking LTC is extremely high verses those who have not taken the LTC. Training Chiefs have seen the need to train leaders and have taken up the challenge.

To be a training chief, you have to have completed your LTC and attended a National Camp such as NTC or BSTC. In addition, you must have been a ranger commander for at least 2 years. As a Training Chief, you will work as a team with other Training Chiefs to teach men and women how to be a leader. You'll be asked to teach several times during the year. I've often thought of a training chief much like a mentor. Take a few new leaders under your wings. coach, nurture, impart and watch them take off. The satisfaction of seeing a leader still in the ministry years later makes it all worth while.

What about you? Would you like to help men and women become better leaders? Would you like to be a better leader? Why not take up the challenge of being a training chief? You'll be glad you did.






# FOCUS ON THE STAFF


