




Thanks for your prayer, brothers. It is very reward-



FROM WHERE I SIT...

The book of Job opens up a door for us to see a godly father. Most people think the book of Job has to do only with suffering and faith, but the book begins with the story of a godly father. Look at these verses: Job 1:1-5 *"In the land of Uz there lived a man whose name was Job. This man was blameless and upright; he feared God and shunned evil. He had seven sons and three daughters, and he owned seven thousand sheep, three thousand camels, five hundred yoke of oxen and five hundred donkeys, and had a large number of servants. He was the greatest man among all the people of the East. His sons used to take turns holding feasts in their homes, and they would invite their three sisters to eat and drink with them. When a period of feasting had run its course, Job would send and have them purified. Early in the morning he would sacrifice a burnt offering for each of them, thinking, 'Perhaps my children have sinned and cursed God in their hearts.' This was Job's regular custom."* The book begins with a view toward a godly dad. Job demonstrates two great callings in this book; (1. Job the Father (2. Job the Faithful). No doubt the later temptations Job had to face reminded him of the example he had given his children earlier, and perhaps this had given him strength to remain faithful so as not to blow that example.

So how do we demonstrate to our boys a godly lifestyle as men and as fathers? The key to the passage and the book is really found in the very first verse of this book: *"he feared God and shunned evil."* These are the two things we men are called to in our life. The first is a positive, the second a negative. It is important that we understand that true godliness as men is first of all a positive thing: *"To fear God"*. This does not mean to be afraid of Him, it means to honor and respect and revere Him. If we are to show the boys that are a part of our lives either as fathers or as Royal Ranger leaders we must first of all demonstrate to them that we are men who hold in highest honor our Lord. We do this by obeying the Word of

God. While Job's children were old enough to be on their own and he could no longer control what they did, he still prayed for them and gave them an example of godliness by bringing them before the Lord. His role modeling of godliness here would serve to guide them through their life. We can hardly expect our children to walk with God if they see us stumble around in our own faith. Job showed his children that he was a man who *"feared God"*. It was not enough however to just fear God, he also *"shunned evil"*. Job demonstrated a lifestyle that steered away from even the temptations of sin. If Job lived in our day this would mean keeping his life free from pornography, avoiding issues of gossiping, anger, backbiting, lying, cheating, etc. Our boys face many many challenges and temptations in this modern world, they need to see their fathers *"shun evil"* so they see that it is possible to live a godly life even in the midst of a difficult age where all kinds of temptations are easily available. Job's life can really be summed up in that first verse, *"fearing God"* and *"shunning evil"* is the calling of all men of God.

Satan picked on a godly father and he lost! The story of Job is the story of a dad who was so in touch with God that he was also in touch with his family. Far too often these first 5 verses of Job are hardly mentioned, but the book opens with a view of a father. It is interesting to note also that the book ends with Job the father: Job 42:13-17 *"And he also had seven sons and three daughters. The first daughter he named Jemimah, the second Keziah and the third Keren-Happuch. Nowhere in all the land were there found women as beautiful as Job's daughters, and their father granted them an inheritance along with their brothers. After this, Job lived a hundred and forty years; he saw his children and their children to the fourth generation. And so he died, old and full of years."* Isn't it interesting to note that in the end Job had the same number of sons and daughters? It was considered a man of God's favor to have 7 sons. The only difference in the end from the beginning is that Job had more cattle and animals and more money. What stayed the same was the role of dad and the role of being a godly man.

Dads and men, are we like Job, *"revering God"* and *"shunning evil"*? The best hope for our children is still in the example of our lives. Let's show them men who are godly, this is the calling of a "Royal Ranger"

53 Rangers Attend National Camporama

Fifty three Rangers and Leaders left for the 1998 Camporama on July 10, 1998. We met at White River Junction, Vermont to pick up our rented vans and load up for our adventure. We formed a convoy of two pickup trucks with trailers and four rented fifteen passenger vans. Leaving White River Jct. in the early evening, by dawn we were traveling along the southern shore of Lake Erie in northern Pennsylvania. The convoy stopped for a late breakfast at a McDonalds somewhere in northern Ohio, where they surprised to be asked for Egg McMuffins and juice for fifty three hungry Rangers.

By early afternoon we arrived at the Assembly of God church in Dayton, Ohio where we spent the evening. After unloading, a trip to the National Air Force Museum at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base down the road from the church was in order. This museum, which is mostly indoors had everything from pre World War I planes up to and including a Stealth Bomber. Following a hearty meal by Commander Bustard all went to bed, although not all went to sleep.

Bright and early the next morning we arose for the second leg of our journey. However, before we could get going the enemy struck in the form a serious illness to Commander Don Felina. Commander Don had to be transported to a local hospital for treatment. As it was determined that Commander Don would be in the hospital for several days we had sadly to leave without him. He was not left alone though, as Jesus and Commander Dick Bar were with him, as well

as our prayers.

Due to our late start we did not get to Springfield, Missouri until late afternoon. Following a brief stay in Springfield we left for the last leg of our journey to Eagle Rock. Arriving in Eagle Rock at dark our tents were set up with the help of the vehicle lights.


Monday morning began our first full day at Eagle Rock. After another hearty

There were no Camporama events until Monday evening so we had all day to visit. The place that seemed to be the favorite was the FCF village. If you think the one at Pow Wow is cool you should see the one at Camporama, it was enormous. Many of the Rangers were able to meet and

get the autograph of Fred Deaver, National FCF President. Red Fox, who we all remember from Pow Wow was set up with his usual assortment of goods. There were many other traders there with more goods than even the most ardent FCF brother would want.

The first regular Camporama event was held Monday evening



meal by Commander Bustard, we set out to set up our campsite. After a review of what we did the night before it was decided to take down most of our tents and reset them. The large canopy usually seen at the staff area at Pow Wow was set up for a kitchen and dining area. This canopy also became a place to get out of the hot sun during the heat of the day.

After setting up the camp we were free to explore the grounds. One of the first places I wanted to see was the Johnny Barnes Lodge. I had seen many pictures of this and wanted to see it and stand on the large porch overlooking the grounds. I was not alone as there were many people doing the same thing. The inside of the lodge had all kinds of interesting things like stuffed animals, a bear skin rug and many pictures of past Ranger events. They also had a bank of computers set up for our use to visit a Camporama web

at the amphitheater. The Camporama theme was "Let Freedom Reign," and each of the evening services revolved around this theme. The Monday evening theme was Freedom from Personal Slavery. The speaker was James Barger, president of the National Royal Ranger Council. The pageantry was fabulous, with the Monday evening pageant revolving around Rome and featured such things as fight between gladiators. The acting and the scenery was as good as any professional play. Following the pageantry and the preaching there was an altar call. The response was fantastic as the power of God was there in a powerful way. There were thousands at the altar on this and all the evenings.

The official opening of Camporama was held Tuesday morning in front of the lodge. We poised for the official group picture, all 5300 of us. Following this there was

a super parade, which seemed to include just about everything. We had nineteenth century U.S. horse Cavalry, medieval knights, frontiersmen, colonial soldiers, old testament Egyptians, motorcyclists and even a gorilla driving a tractor. We had a fly over by large radio controlled planes, one of which landed in the trees, and ski divers coming down near the lodge. It was quite a start.

The Tuesday evening theme was "Freedom from Political Slavery." The speaker was Fred Deaver, National FCF president. The pageantry included a reenactment of a revolutionary battle with guns and cannons firing and explosions all over the large stage. The altar call again drew thousands to the alters. Many were saved, filled with the Holy Spirit and even slain in the Spirit. It was really awesome to see how God was moving in the lives of both Ranger and leader, as we all know God is not a respecter of persons.

The Wednesday evening theme was "Freedom from Spiritual Slavery." This was one of the favorites. The speaker was Robb Hawks, whom you may remember as the writer of the "Major Bummer" series. The pageantry included an urban Ranger outpost meeting and a gang fight outside the meeting. Who can forget when the real Missouri State Police car which drove right up on stage to arrest the gang bangers. Even more impressive was the rebuke of the devil by one of the Rangers. We all learned a little of the power we have in Christ and the phony that the devil really is.

Thursday was our final evening there and our final evening service. This service consisted of a Freedom Rally. Our speaker was Terry Raburn, superintendent of the Peninsular Florida District. Who can forget the singing and the celebration of our Christian heritage and Christian freedom. We ended with a candle-lighting ceremony and fireworks. It was amazing how fast the lighted candles spread throughout the crowd of more than 5000 from just a few initial lighted candles. Shows how the gospel can multiply if we only apply ourselves.

In addition to the evening services there was more to do during the daytime than one could possibly do. The campground was divided into six theme parks representing the six millennium. Our theme was Days of Noah and his ark. There were all kinds of

events developed around these themes. Who can forget sticking his head in the mouth of the great fish that swallowed Jonah, or taking part in a Roman Senate judging and punishment, or fighting medieval knights, and many more, just too numerous to tell.

Come Friday morning it was time to pack up, boy did the week go fast. Although this was the end of Camporama it was not the end of our adventure. After leaving Eagle Rock we went to Bass Pro in Springfield, Missouri. This place is enormous with more hunting, fishing and outdoor gear in one place than just about anywhere. They even had their own indoor McDonald's which we certainly tried out. After leaving Springfield we headed home, it sure seemed like a long way.

Our first destination was Dayton, Ohio where we had sadly left our brothers Don Felina and Dick Barr. Don had spent four days in the hospital and then flew home for additional treatment. We picked Dick up and continued our journey. After what seemed like forever we arrived in the Buffalo, NY area and set up in the basement of a local Assembly of God church. After unloading we went to Niagara Falls. What an awesome sight this is. The creative power of God is certainly displayed there.

Following our last supper by Commander Bustard we went to sleep to rest up for our final leg of the journey. At about 11:30 p.m., the middle of the night, we loaded the vans and headed home. We drove through the remainder of the night arriving in White River Junction, Vermont about 11:00 am, Sunday morning, journey over.

This was really more than a trip it was an adventure, a journey. We covered a total of about 3000 miles in less than four days of driving, with six vehicles and 53 people. We learned to get along and had our squabbles, but we also had an opportunity to draw close to God. We may not know until eternity what impacts were made on the lives of the Rangers and leaders. The weather was hot and the water was awful but it was worth it we have memories and experiences that can not be taken away from us. They will last a lifetime. Are you ready for the next Camporama in 2002 if the Lord tarries?

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
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A Nutty Idea?

Peanut Butter in Space? If you think that sounds like a nutty idea; your right! That's exactly what it is and it was such a good idea that Nasa choose Commander Jay Hoffmans' experiment to go up on a shuttle flight late this year or early next. Commander Hoffman was selected this past summer as one of only 275 educators in the country to participate in an educational workshop. Jay came up with the idea for the experiment in July at the NASA Education Workshop for Math and Science Technology at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Maryland, after a NASA representative asked for ideas. Jay devised the experiment with high school teacher Melissa Morrow of Winsted, Conn., and each of them will have their own group of test tubes on the flight. The experiment will gauge how 11 brands of peanut butter are affected by the rigors of space where temperatures in the shuttle's payload section rise as high as 200 degrees Fahrenheit and drop as low as 90 below zero.
