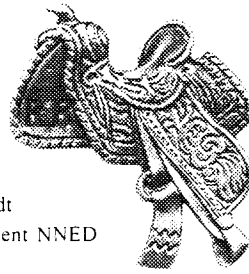

I have an Uncle who served for many years as the German District Superintendent, the district I grew up in. I have been blessed with many fine men to guide me. Royal Rangers certainly ties into this very important concept, for it is men living for God and steering the lives of young boys to become men of God. I was a young boy when the Lord called me into full time ministry. The ministries of my home Church and those who worked with us children continued to stamp on my heart a love for God. "Pitched a tent" has to do with the home. The second thing they did was establish the home, making it a safe place and a comfortable one. Here they shared life together. (3. "Dug a well" has to do with work. Work was the third priority, not the first! The order is quite important in these three.

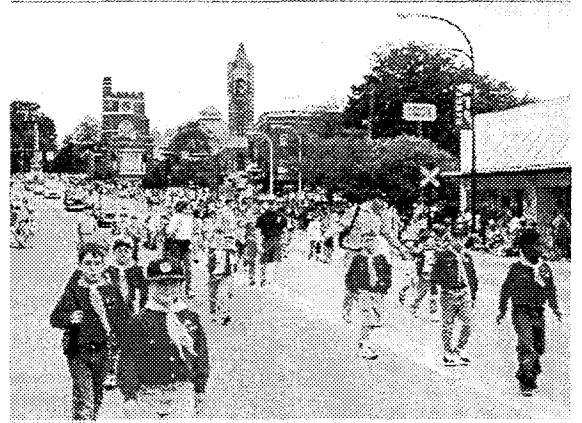

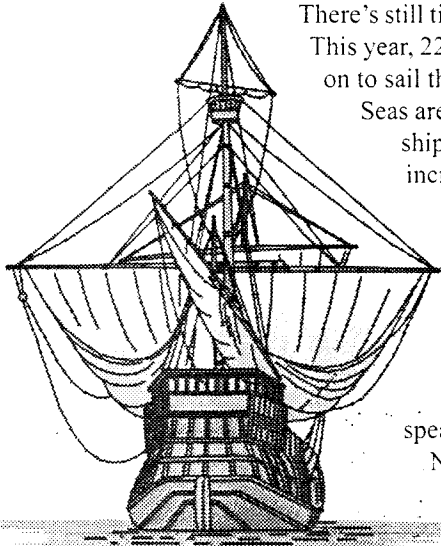

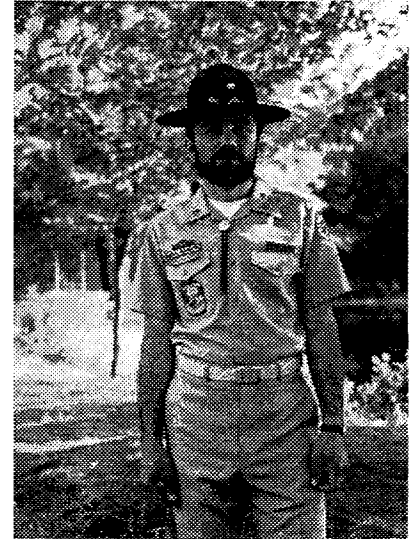
