How to Trade Patches by Timothy Trower

A fun part of Camporama for every Ranger is patch collecting and trading. This is an activity that everyone, regardless of age, can enjoy.

To begin patch collecting, all you need are some extra Pow Wow patches or any type of patch from any type of Ranger event. Two or three patches is enough to get started with. All you need then is another individual who also wants to trade with you.

Usually if you are in a group and have your patches handy, you can find someone to trade with. Just spread your patches out on any flat surface--such as a table, stump, or your leg--to avoid stepping on them or putting them on the ground.

To start, look over the patches that the other fellow has for trade. Select one that you would like and begin. A good rule of thumb is that one patch is worth another of equal value--so one Pow Wow patch is worth another from about the same time

period.

Take into account if the patch is used, for this will drop the value somewhat. Two sectional patches are worth one Pow Wow patch. And national patches can be worth five, ten, or even more Pow Wow patches. Foreign patches are generally worth two or three Pow Wow patches each.

Remember, the final value of a patch is determined by how bad you want it. Be ready to trade two, three, or even more for a patch that you really want. Just remember that a patch is worth what the other trader is willing to trade.

You can collect one patch from every district or all of the patches from your own district. You might even collect just patches that have animals pictured on them.

Be patient, though, because it might take 10 years to get every patch you want. It's a hobby that you can take with you back home and continue to trade to any Ranger event.

On display in the lodge is a collection of Pow Wow patches from the different districts, as well as national patches, and many old-fashioned Ranger patches no longer use in the Ranger program. Be sure to take a look at them this evening.


You will find that collecting patches is rewarding, in that you not only can easily build a collection, but at the same, time have a great way to meet new friends.


WATER RESCUE YOU CAN HELP even if you can't swim






THE EIGHT DEFENSES

- Medical exam—to indicate when activities should be limited and when there are defects that may be remedied. Those physically unfit to swim must be kept out of the water.
- 2. Adult supervisor with water-safety training or assistants who are qualified. There must always be a responsible leader in charge.
- 3. A safe place where bottom and depths are known. Areas for swimming divided for ability groups.
- 4. Lifeguards on duty. Lightweight ready line should be used—chain knot or pineapple method.
- 5. Lookout up high to watch entire swimming area.6. Swimmers classified according to swimming abil-
- ity—each group swims in prescribed area.

 7. Buddy plan with check-in and check-out system.
- 8. Intelligent discipline—rules that boys understand and that they have a part in making and enforcing will be more readily obeyed.

As each of us daily search our hearts while on our knees before God, we must question whether we have truly done all we can to "reach, teach, and keep" as many boys as possible for the Master Ranger. Have you been content with the number of boys you already have in you outpost?

Each of us must keep before us the

vision of a spiritually lost boy who is without Christ and who is bound for hell. Every boy has a soul. Every boy must one day stand before the Lord. The soul of just one boy is worth more than all the world's treasures.

"Let the little children come to me . . .," said Jesus, "for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these' And he took the children in his arms, put his hands on them and blessed them" (Mark 10:14,16, NIV).

Let's not hang our heads in shame for what we have not done. Rather, let's all gain a greater vision for the young lost souls we can reach for Christ. Let's set new and higher goals for our outposts and communities. Teaching our boys that they should be "spiritual" by witnessing is not enough unless we teach them how! We must first be examples to our boys, then they will follow suit.

Remember, He who has provided us with this Royal Rangers mission will likewise provide us with the health, energy, and anointing required to do the job. Let's join hands as never before and be God's end-time servants - READY at any moment to wit-

Your Fair Share

Do your fair share. An obtainable goal that could result in the salvation of thousands of boys is to use the multiplication principle.

Here's how it works: Let's say you were to win one boy to the Lord within a 3-month period. If this new believer were to lead another person to the Lord within the next 3 months, then you would have two new believers in Within another 3 your outpost. months these two new, excited Christians could easily lead another two people to Christ. Now you have four new believers. These four, in turn, could win another four unbelievers to Christ. Within 1 year your initial effort of leading one person to Christ could be multiplied to eight new believers.

Just think, if your outpost had only 10 boys who would catch this vision, you could have 80 new Royal Rangers in your church within a year.

Through the anointing of the Holy Spirit, the multiplication principle can and will work. Why not try it?
