Have you tried the BB gun range? It's fun!


"Sunrise with the Circuit Rider" is sure some kind if church service. (Did they really have church that early in the old day?)

KNOT TYING


In knot tying a rope has three parts:


The **end** is the end of the rope with which you are working when you tie a knot.

The standing part is the length of the rope not being used.

The **bight** is the central part of the rope between the working end and the

The Overhand Knot is the simplest and smallest stopper knot and is used to begin many more difficult ones. It is generally used on small cord or twine, since it jams and is hard to untie. To tie: Make overhand an Pass the end under and up through the loop. Draw up tight.





The Figure Eight Knot is a stopper knot and is easier to untie than the overhand knot. To tie: Make an underhand loop. Bring the end around and over the standing part. Pass the end under and then up through the loop. Draw tight.



The **Square Knot** is a joiner knot used to tie parcels or bundles and bandages in first-aid and to join two ends of rope or string of the same thickness. To tie: Pass the left end **over** and under the right end. Curve what is now the left end towards the right. Cross what is now the right end over and under the left. Draw tight.
