GLOSSARY OF ROYAL RANGER CAMP-OUT TERMS

MOSQUITOES--

TENT--

CAMP-OUT--

The first step in the formation of towering cumulus clouds which contain rain, thunderstorms, hail, and high winds.

CAMPSITE--

CAMPFIRE--

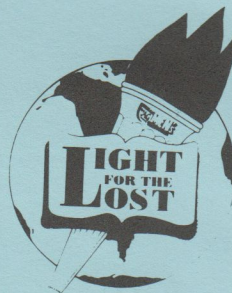
LIGHT FOR THE LOST JUNIOR COUNCILMEN PROGRAM IN ACTION

The Light-for-the-Lost Junior Councilmen program has been on-line for a little over a year. Anthony Raduano, 1993 Northeast Regional Ranger of the Year, was the first junior councilman in the nation. Anthony became a Junior Councilman by first earning his LFTL Advanced Merit, and then by joining the program. To date, there are between 60 to 70 Junior Councilmen nationwide. Many more have earned their LFTL Advanced Merit and are in the process of

signing up as a LFTL Junior Councilman. Have you started your LFTL Advanced Merit yet?

It is very easy to start. All you have to do is view the *Carry the Torch* video, attend a LFTL banquet/rally, obtain a tract signed by a missionary, write a LFTL report, and complete the *LFTL jr. Councilman Study Course*. That's all there is to it! Once you earn your LFTL Advanced Merit, you can become a Junior Councilman. The dues are only \$15 per year and you get a great patch and begin receiving the Spotlight newsletter.

For more information about earning your LFTL Advanced Merit or signing up as a Junior Councilman, stop by the Light-for-the-Lost display in Jerry Scott, LFTL administrator, is here all week to help you with the program. Meet Our Evening Speakers

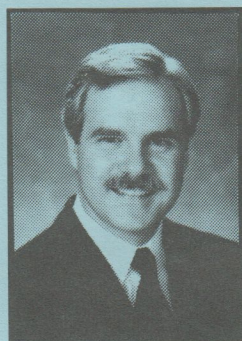
Evening Pageantry, Music, and Special Speakers

Terry Raburn

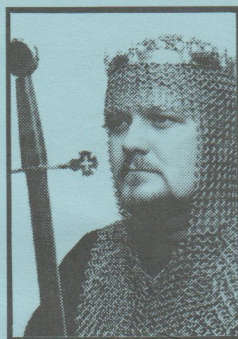
Terry Raburn, director, Division of Church Ministries. He has served as national director since 1990. Rev. Raburn began his ministry while in high school. He since has

Preceding his appointment, Commander Hunt served as editor/promotions coordinator for the national Royal Rangers Office. He leads nearly 400 individuals who serve as district, regional, and national commanders.
