

**Royal Rangers
National Camporama
Eagle Rock, Missouri

Theme: "From the Regions Beyond"

Information for Foreign Delegates

Participation

- ❶ To maintain a proper balance of participation, the ratio of adult leaders should be one for each four boys.
- ❷ **Leader:**
 - Must be approved by his national commander.
 - Must be qualified, experienced, and actively involved in his outpost.
 - Must have these completed forms in order to attend:
 1. registration form signed by pastor
 2. medical release form
- ❸ **Youths:**
 - Must be at least a Pioneer 10 years of age by July 1, 1994, and have been currently involved in Royal Rangers the last 6 months.
 - Must have these completed forms in order to attend:
 1. registration form signed by parent or guardian
 2. medical release form
- ❹ Foreign national commanders will develop their own system for determining who will attend from their own nations.
- ❺ Due to advanced costs and other preparation, each participant must preregister and prepay.
- ❻ Each foreign national commander will inform the national Royal Rangers Office of the number of boys and leaders who will be attending from his country plus **submit registration fees** for himself and others attending from his nation **by April 1, 1994**. - ❼ There is no limit to the number of individuals who can attend as long as they meet the above requirements and have **preregistered by April 1**.

Cost

The National Camporama registration fee per camper is \$125 (U.S. currency). This fee covers the cost of Camporama meals (that is: The first meal served will be breakfast, July 12. The final meal served will be a continental breakfast, July 15. Other meals not within this time frame will be an additional cost per meal.) two Camporama patches, one Camporama cap, two Camporama T-shirts, a camp stool, a Camporama information packet, daily *Eagle Eye* camp newspapers, and many other expenses necessary to conduct this grand event.

Meal Service

National Camporama fees will cover the cost for the Camporama meals discussed within this paragraph. Meals will be served in a tent food pavilion. Meals will be served in shifts. When your group checks in at the Camporama, your group will be assigned a time period for meals. Meal tickets will be issued in each Camporama packet. The first meal served will be breakfast, July 12. The final meal served will be a continental breakfast, July 15.

Refreshment Centers

Refreshments can be purchased at numerous Camporama sites. A main refreshment stand will be stationed near the Johnnie Barnes Lodge.

Clothing

- ❶ **Uniforms:** Each camper must have at least one Class B uniform. Class B uniforms will be the official dress and will be worn at times specified by the camp coordinator.
- ❷ **Casual Wear:** During field activities and during campsite duties, boys are permitted to wear casual trousers, jeans, or short pants (cannot be more than 2 inches above the knee). They may be worn with the official Camporama T-shirt.
- ❸ **T-shirts:** Each camper will be issued two National Camporama T-shirts. (Additional T-shirts may be purchased at the Trading Post.)
- ❹ **Shoes:** Campers should wear regulation shoes while wearing the Class B uniform. During field events, sturdy shoes or boots are recommended. (Be sure shoes are broken in.)
- ❺ **Headgear:** A special National Camporama cap will be issued and worn during the Camporama.
- ❻ **Poncho or Raincoat:** Each camper is recommended to bring a poncho or raincoat.
- ❼ **Socks, Handkerchiefs, Underclothing, Etc., As Needed.**

Personal Items

- Sleeping bag • Ground cloth • Sunscreen lotion • Swimming suit • Toilet kit/soap
- Towels • Canteen • Air mattress or sleeping pad • Personal first aid kit • Pen or pencil
- Small Bible • Lip balm • Insect repellent

Optional Items

- Camera • Swap items • Pillow • Sun glasses • Camp cot • Binoculars • Nail clippers

Evening Events

This National Camporama will present three evening pageants produced by the national productions team. Special speakers will spiritually challenge boys following each of the nightly pageants. On the final evening an accomplished guest singer will present the Christian challenge.

The evening pageants will carry the National Camporama theme "From the Regions Beyond." Through colorful dramatization and sound, the story will unfold as a father and son travel through time to the Bible days to hear of Jesus, followed by a trip to the year 1420 to learn about religious freedom fighter Jan Zizka, then on to the challenge of the future: reaching the world for Christ.

Each evening service will end with an altar call. We are believing in God for another wave of His Spirit to fall as boys flee to the altar for salvation, rededication, and the infilling of the Holy Spirit.

Time Traveler's Trail

Campers can earn a special patch by completing the Time Traveler's Trail. Each district will be hosting special sports, games, and water activities within their district encampments. District workers will initial boys' Time Traveler's Trail cards once the boys have visited the encampments. Each boy who has completed the required points will then be issued a Time Traveler's Trail patch at the Trading Post.

Special Activities

Numerous activities will occur throughout the camp area. Some of the possible activities could include the following: • Hot air balloon rides • *Cool* water activities • Hiking • Canoeing • High- and low-ropes courses • Riflery • Famous Guests • BMX bike races • Go-cart races • Pine Box Derby races • Bible Quiz • FCF village with frontiersmen crafts • Chi Omega Rho encampment • Competition • Colorful Evening Pageants • Music.

Swap Area

Boys and leaders will be able to swap items of interest with each other within a designated area. The swap area will be one of the most popular spots during the National Camporama. Each camper can bring trade items—such as patches, novelty items, craft items, and state or country souvenirs.

Traders Row

Individuals who have been preapproved by the national office may sell items at the selected site called Traders Row.

Trading Post

A variety of camping and Royal Rangers items may be purchased at the Trading Post. Some items sold will be Royal Rangers uniform items, additional National Camporama T-shirts and

caps, handbooks, Camporama mugs, Camporama bolo ties, and National Royal Rangers Training Center items.

Frontier Encampment

The Frontiersmen Camping Fellowship will set up an FCF village, which will be patterned after an old-time frontiersmen rendezvous. FCF skills such as flintlock rifle shooting, knife and tomahawk throwing, and other FCF skills will be demonstrated each day.

Contests

Each foreign delegation is encouraged to build an archway at the entrance of its area. A prize will be awarded for the best archway. Each district should also display a standard or banner to identify its delegation. An award will be given for the best district standard or banner. Also, each foreign delegation should, if possible, build some type of camp craft item and display it in its campsite. Recognition will also be given for the best overall district or foreign delegation.
