Asia Pacific: VANUATU

ROYAL RANGERS AROUND THE WORLD

When Robyn and I arrived in Vanuatu as Assemblies of God missionaries in January 2007 we found a very different type of Royal Rangers. The program had been brought to Vanuatu by Ron & Joy Killingbeck, US Missionaries to Vanuatu from 1973 to 1983. After the departure of these Missionaries the program slowly changed. The purpose of Royal Rangers to Reach, Teach and Keep Children for Jesus had become lost over the years. Boys were still called Royal Rangers, but there was no program. Instead, they came together to march and raise flags at special church events and conferences. Most of the groups throughout Vanuatu, while excelling in precision drills and marching skills, did not know the Royal Ranger motto, code, or pledge, had never seen the Royal Rangers emblem, and did not know of the ministry's evangelistic focus. Of all the groups in Vanuatu, only two groups running in Port Vila and Luganville had some sort of program and were working with very old American handbooks.

As we had both spent many years in different positions in Royal Rangers at our local church in Bendigo, Australia, the General Superintendent asked Russell to take on the position of National Director and stand the program up strong again in Vanuatu. He said he always felt that there was more to Royal Rangers than marching and raising flags.

VANUATU is a 'Y' shaped archipelago of 83 islands situated in the South Pacific Ocean about 1750 kilometers east of Australia. The 220,000 population is spread across 78 inhabited islands. The Ni-Vanuatu people speak 102 different village languages. Vanuatu is often called the modern day Babel as it has the highest concentration of languages per capita in the world. Until its independence in 1980 this country was governed by a Condominium which consisted of British and French Governments ruling together. There were French and English Hospitals, Police forces, Armies, Banks, currency and schools. The result is that some people speak French and some English. Because of the language difficulties they developed their own, a common pijin language, called Bislama which has become the nation's official language.

— continued Our first task was to look at the program and decide what the best way to make it work here in Vanuatu was. As we live at the Bible College, we were able to spend many hours talking to the Ni-vanuatuan students to find out what would work. We rewrote and simplified the Australian training manual, chose local names for the units to reflect the growth of a boy spiritually, socially, mentally and physically. These names are Gurmang (the small sucker that comes up behind a banana tree), Nambuka (a very pliable and soft wood) and Natora (the strong heartwood of a tree). The next step was to rewrite awards so that they fit in with the culture of the local people who are of Melanesian origin. Once completed, this work was then translated into the local pijin language which is called Bislama.

Since Vanuatu is an emerging third world country resource rich but currency poor, we have kept our uniform to a coloured vest, and three awards earned per year. Often we donate the material for the vest and the church pays for the emblems and awards. Each award takes 5 or 6 weeks

to earn. We have taught the leaders many new games to play and given game bags out to the poorer outposts. During the devotional time, the boys learn one small truth from the Bible that they can apply in their daily lives.

During the past two years we have set up Royal Ranger Outposts in 5 of the 6 provinces. Outposts are small, as most villages in Vanuatu are very small. On the main island of Efate we have 6 Outposts running. The leaders have taken to the new program and are enjoying teaching their boys about God, their culture, and various life skills. Where there is no Missionette group the girls have been allowed to join in with the Royal Ranger Boys.

Since travel between islands is very expensive, our training on islands outside of our own consists of one full day of Royal Ranger Basics and a second day spent running a group in the church with the newly trained leaders assisting. We then leave them with everything they need to run the program. The President of Royal Rangers on Malekula has set up 4 outposts

on his island with only this much training.

Last year we held our first field day in April of 2009. We saw 84 boys plus leaders gathering together for a sports day. Our speaker was Lori Ellison, the daughter of the Missionaries who brought Royal Rangers to Vanuatu so many years ago. We held our first camp, KAMTUGETA, last July with 36 boys and leaders. 15 of these boys gave their lives to Jesus at the camp. We praise God for what he is doing through the Royal Ranger Ministry in Vanuatu.

Two leaders joined us at the Australian Camporama in January 2010. They went back to their church in Pango Village with an excitement and enthusiasm for Royal Rangers. They immediately took their Outpost meeting from the church to the village and held it there. As a result, in one week their numbers went from 10 to 28. It is this outpost that hosted the Shefa Province Field Day this year. This group has included in their program visitation to the sick and lonely as well as evangelistic outreach.

The seven nations represented were Chile, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Honduras, Mexico, and Panama.

Primary topics covered:


- Promoting communion and unity among the national leaders
- Presentation by the Regional Committee
- Assuring that the Regional Committee has the support of RRI
- Reaching the countries that have never had a Royal Rangers ministry
- Implementing the Navigator software to help local outposts
- The strategic changes that will come in the future, which the national offices can apply
- Revising RRI's Operational Guidelines
- Web Page as a support tool to the national offices
- Planning and projection of youth training

The Regional Coordinator, Jeff Cooper, together with the national leaders, sharing in the unity of the body of Christ, projected the new work and development of the ministry in each country. The Latin America and the Caribbean region was divided into 5 regions to better coordinate the work in a more fluid way, and to better reach the member countries, that they may better apply what is in the leader's manuals and on the training CDs. In each of these 5 regions, a development coordinator has been named to be the bridge of communication

and support between ERLAC (Royal Rangers Latin America & the Caribbean) and the national offices.

We believe in the growth of Royal Rangers in Latin America and the Caribbean, especially in those nations that do not have the ministry, while at the same time supporting growth in the nations that already have Rangers, so the boys together with their leaders can grow in every area of development.

The next ERLNER meeting is scheduled for 2012 in the USA. 🌿
