Equipment needed: Branding Iron

A SPECIAL FEATURE

IMPORTANCE OF GIVING PROPER RECOGNITION

Everyone desires recognition. Boys are no exception. If anything, boys, from the time they are old enough to talk and run around, seem to thrive and flourish on the recognition and acknowledgment given out by "dad" and the "older boys." This is a normal desire as you will discover while working with your Royal Rangers. To be deprived of legitimate recognition can be disastrous to a boy.

First, proper recognition must be given immediately at the conclusion of personal achievement. Delay of recognition creates disappointment and a disinterest in future advancement. Boys work hard to climb the advancement trail and they expect to be recognized upon completion of requirements. Your schedule should be arranged to meet this need and convert the enthusiasm into motives and desires for additional gain.

Second, proper recognition will automatically provide the spark a boy needs to assure a continued interest in his personal advancement. The Advancement Trail is only a yardstick by which measurement of spiritual, social, physical, and intellectual growth can be charted. In order to identify this progress, it is important to keep a continuous record of advancements, achievements, and accomplishments of each boy. Periodic measurements should result in proper recognition.

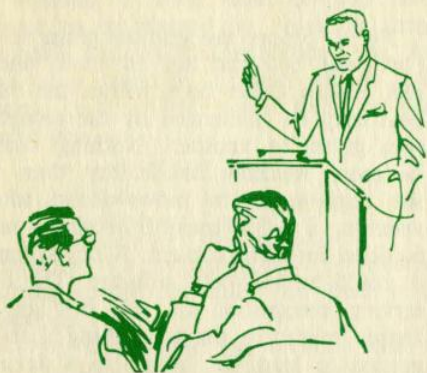
Third, proper recognition given to a particular boy can harvest many indirect results. Other boys within the outpost may be challenged by the recognition given to another. Nothing could be more welcome or healthy than to see boys eager to move ahead after watching a fellow member receiving recognition for advancement. A boy's family could be indirectly affected. The deserving recognition of one boy in a family might be the very thing that is needed to lead the family to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. Experience has taught us that when one person receives recognition, many are directly or indirectly affected for the good.

Fourth, proper recognition will produce a high level of morale. Morale is the backbone of any successful organization, which usually indicates a smooth-running and harmonious fellowship. Recognition of the individual in a successful group reflects pride and accomplishment upon the group as well. This produces high morale when each of the team members are aware of the advancements of others within the organization. This, in turn, motivates a greater desire for continued advancement and progress. Thus, we see a cycle within which proper recognition plays a major part in its completion and chain reaction, i.e. (1) requirements, (2) advancement, (3) recognition, (4) perpetuation, (5) high morale, (6) progress, and back to requirements.

Give each boy a piece of paper and pencil and ask questions about the person they had just seen; such as color of hair, type of clothing, color of different items of wearing apparel, his height, weight, size of shoes, etc.

Have the person to enter the room again and let the boys secure the right answer, then grade themselves. The boy with the most correct answers is the winner.

BIBLE BASEBALL

Equipment needed: (1) Questions on the Bible or on Royal Rangers. (2) 3 x 5-inch cards as follows: 5 marked "single," 3 marked "double," 2 marked "triple," and 1 marked "home run."
Instructions: Draw a miniature baseball diamond on the floor. Then line a patrol behind home plate. Leader asks a question from his list. If first Royal Ranger gives correct answer, he draws a 3 x 5-inch card to determine what kind of "hit" he made, and moves to the appropriate base.

If he doesn't answer correctly, he's "out." Three outs and the next patrol

comes to bat. Runners are advanced by their team mates.

Scoring: Patrol with most runs after a predetermined number of innings is the winner.

KANGAROO RACE

ROYAL RANGER BIBLE STUDY COURSE INSTRUCTIONS

I. HOW TO CONDUCT THE ROYAL RANGER BIBLE STUDY COURSES IN YOUR OUTPOST.

- A. Have copies of the lessons run off by ditto or mimeo reproductions.
- B. Make extra copies to allow supply for new Rangers as they join.
- C. Each Commander must complete the courses in advance. There are no answer sheets.
- D. Explain the purpose of the Bible Study Course to your outpost. Be enthused yourself.
- E. Hand out first lesson to everyone in the outpost. Explain to them that they should take it home and work on it in a room by themselves. Be sure to impress upon them that it is to be completed in one sitting. (If a boy takes more than one night to complete Course I the Holy Spirit will have a very difficult time convicting his heart.) Young Pioneers may have to get help from Mom or Dad. Unsaved parents could be led to Jesus by helping their boys with this lesson.
- F. Have boys return lesson the very next meeting. Give recognition to those returning lessons each week. Keep interest high by making weekly reports to the outpost on those doing good work.
- G. Hand out the next lesson just before boys leave for home from the meeting. This keeps the lesson from getting lost, torn or wrinkled. Repeat each week.

ROYAL RANGER BIBLE STUDY COURSE

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND THE RANGER CODE

LESSON: 7 A Royal Ranger is honest. He does not lie.

In the past six lessons, we have been studying what the Bible teaches about a Royal Ranger being alert and clean. This lesson starts a series of three lessons on the third point of the Ranger code, "A Royal Ranger is honest; he does not lie, cheat, or steal."

A good verse to remember in connection with "A Royal Ranger is honest" is Romans 12:17, "Provide things _____ in the sight of all men." For the second part, "He does not lie, cheat, or steal," Leviticus 19:11, "Ye shall not _____, neither _____ (cheat), neither _____ one to another." is a good verse to remember.

In this lesson we will study the Bible to see what it has to say about lying.

ROYAL RANGER BIBLE STUDY COURSE

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND THE RANGER CODE

LESSON: 8 A Royal Ranger is honest. He does not cheat.

In lesson 7, we started a series of lessons on honesty by studying about lying. In this lesson we continue our study of honesty by seeing what the Bible says about cheating.

The temptation to cheat is often present. You may be tempted to cheat while taking a test in school. A temptation may come as you are playing a game. You may be tempted to copy someone's home work and turn it in as your own. As you grow older, the temptation to cheat will take other forms. It may come when you are filling out a tax report or as you are making some business deal. Whatever form the temptation may take, remember, a Royal Ranger never cheats.

One of the ways people cheated in Bible times was the using of false weights and measures. In fact, they would often have two or more sets of weights and measures, each one a little different in size. They would then use the set which would permit them to cheat the other person the most. God warned against this practice in Deuteronomy 25:13 and 14, "Thou shall not have in thy bag _____ (different) weights, a _____ and a _____." "Thou shall not have in thy house _____ (different) measures, a _____ and a _____."

In the New Testament, a prominent way of cheating was done by the tax collectors. These tax collectors were known as publicans. The Roman government would set a certain tax to be collected and tell the publicans what it was. The publicans would then charge the people more than this and put the difference in their pockets. These publicans became quite rich by cheating the people.

The Bible tells of two publicans who were saved and followed Jesus. They were Matthew and Zacchaeus. You will remember in the story of Zacchaeus (read Luke 19:1-10) how he repented of his cheating when he met Jesus. He promised to return any money that he had made by cheating fourfold.

As Zacchaeus did long ago, let us bow our heads and ask the Lord to help us never to cheat in any form.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND THE RANGER CODE

LESSON: 9 A Royal Ranger is honest. He does not steal.

In this lesson, the last in the series on honesty, we will study the Bible to see what it has to say about stealing. Let us define stealing before we go further. Stealing is taking the property of another without permission. The Bible declares in Exodus 20:15; "Thou shall not steal".

We all know that someone steals when they rob a bank. There is no doubt stealing is involved when a person breaks into a store and takes merchandise or money. We know it is stealing when someone enters a home and takes things. But, did you know there are other ways to steal than these?

Let us turn to our Bibles and discover some of the other ways of stealing.

Read Leviticus 6:3.

In this type of stealing, a person finds a lost item and although he knows who the owner is, he does not return it. He just says, "finders keepers." At times, he may even lie about it to cover up his action.

Read Psalms 37:21.

In this form of stealing the person will say, "May I borrow this" I will return it later." Then they keep it, never returning it to its proper owner.

Read Jeremiah 22:13.

This verse shows that a person who owes someone something, such as a just wage, and refuses to pay them is also guilty of stealing.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND THE RANGER CODE

LESSON: 10 A Royal Ranger is Courageous. He is brave in spite of danger.

Courage is that which helps you do what you should in spite of danger. No one knows for sure if he is courageous until he is called upon to perform a duty in the face of difficulty. In order to show courage, three things must be present. First, there must be a duty that should be performed. Second, there must be some kind of opposition involved in doing this duty. The opposition may be in the form of actual physical danger. It may be disapproval or criticism from those around us. Or the opposition may take the form of a threat to you or to someone you love. Third, the duty must be completed in spite of the dangers, criticism, or threats.

Read Acts 19:21; 20:17-27; and 21:8-14.

In these verses, Paul displays courage. He was given a duty by God. There was danger in connection with the carrying out of this duty. Yet, Paul completed this task in spite of danger. Let us see what task God gave Paul to do.

Nebuchadnezzar not only gave an order to worship the image, but he made a threat to those who did not do as he told them to.

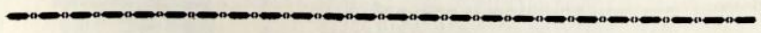
