Scripture: Isaiah 59:10

MAKING MY LIFE BRIGHTER

Preparation: The leader gives each boy a very rusty or corroded piece of metal. Just a small piece. Build a large campfire with the boys and leaders sitting in a circle around the fire.

Ceremony: The leader begins by rising and stepping slowly to the fire. He holds up his rusty piece of metal and says: This was my weak and tarnished life that I had lived until I gave myself to Jesus to be cleansed by His spirit. The leader drops the piece of metal in the fire.

Each boy in turn does likewise. When all have finished, the leader explains the likeness of sin to the rust corroded metal and tells how God can make us clean. Then with a pair of tongs, he takes a piece of metal from the fire and shows how it is burned clean and clear of rust and corrosion.

ETERNAL LIFE

Purpose: To show that there is only one way to receive eternal life.

"The Winchester Mystery House at San Jose, California, has 160 rooms and sprawls over six acres. It had 17 rooms when it was purchased in the late 1800's by Mrs. Sarah Winchester, widow of the Winchester rifle manufacturer. She had turned to spiritualism after her husband and only child died. She moved from Connecticut to California on the advice of a medium.

The medium also told Mrs. Winchester she would live forever if she kept building onto her home, never letting the work stop. The architect who had built the house was employed at first to oversee the work, but he soon quit in disgust. Then for 36 years, the widow supervised a construction crew 7 days a week.

She admitted no visitors except spirits, and persons whose occupations put them beyond the vale. Her superstition shows in the gold and silver chandeliers with 13 lights, ceilings with 13 panels, and rooms with 13 windows. Most of the 40 staircases, which go nowhere, have 13 steps. She thought her spirit friends liked variety, so most of the pillars are upside down.

But the unceasing construction failed to bring Mrs. Winchester eternal life. She died half a century ago. Her house was sold and became a tourist attraction. Today guides show visitors through acres of ghostly rooms. There are 2,000 doors, 12,000 windows, 6 kitchens."

Fellows, we all know that we must face death and that no man lives forever. How much better it would have been had Mrs. Winchester spent her life preparing her soul and not her house for eternity.


GOD WAS IN MY FOXHOLE

A young boy was brought up in church, but was always told that he couldn't do this or do that. He soon developed the attitude that God was a mean old man who was just waiting to punish someone. Soon he no longer went to church at all, and felt that he could get along without God.

One day, however, he was drafted into the army and sent to Korea as an infantryman. After some time his name was in the paper and stated that he had been decorated with a medal for heroism in action, and was credited for holding off the enemy practically single-handed. He wrote home and said: "You probably read about the little episode that we had over here, but I want to tell you what really happened. First, I found out that fellows over here don't laugh at you when you read your Bible, there are no atheists over here. I have also been reading my Bible quite a bit because you never know when your time may be over. As for what happened, we were in an outpost, (about 6 to 8 men) for the purpose of holding off the enemy in case of attack until the main company could deploy and get ready. There must have been at least a company of the enemy who attacked. Somehow we drove them back but there were only half of us left, and as the enemy massed again for another charge we all knew that this was the last for us, that there was no hope. I knelt down in my foxhole and I prayed as I had never prayed before in my life. And as we prepared for what we knew was to come, we watched the enemy massing for the final assault, when suddenly they turned and fled without any apparent reason. I have found out that God is one who cares for us and is concerned about us and that He does hear and answer our prayers." (This is a true story. In fact the letter is in my possession now.)

Ceremony: Fellows, this same God is concerned about you, and if you give your heart to Him he will watch over you, take care of you, and answer your prayers as He did for this young man.



THE AWFULNESS OF SIN: Sin is not only disobedience to God, but also it is doing violence to the soul itself in loss of power, decay of love, enfeebling of the will, general atrophy of the nature, and condemnation of the soul.

REPENTANCE: Repentance is not conviction of sin or the breaking off of some sins. Fear is not repentance. Remorse, fasting, afflicting the body, or even reading the Bible is not repenting.

What then is repentance? Repentance is to feel pain or sorrow on account of something done or left undone; especially for sins committed.

The Bible says: "Turn ye, turn ye." Repentance is a right about face. We humans are born with our faces turned away from God. When we truly repent, we turn right around toward God: "... And the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin. 1 John 1:7. FAITH: Faith is common, natural, reasonable, sublime. You put it to its highest power, its loftiest use, when it is turned to trust Jesus in the word that He has spoken and in the love that He has displayed on Calvary.

LET US SEE JESUS: If you have done nothing but seen Jesus in your life, you have done well. If you have presented to your companions truths that were sweet to you, it will give you unspeakable joy; that you have attracted them to Christ simply by seeing Jesus.

MAKING MEN OUT OF BOYS

I. Quest for normalcy

A. Boys desire to live a normal life that brings them the acceptance of adults as well as their peers.

B. Royal Rangers is designed to give boys guidance in the adjustments of life that help them develop into normal, happy adults.

C. The most normal life for a boy is the life that is Christ-centered and

Holy Spirit-motivated.

D. Christ set the example of normalcy in each problem a boy must face.

- 1. He was tempted in all ages of boyhood and manhood (Hebrews 4:15)
- He will extend mercy to boys in need (Hebrews 4:16).
- He will run to assist boys in crisis (Hebrews 2:18). (Succour means "run to the assistance of.")

II. Areas of normal development (Luke 2:52)

A. Wisdom-mental development

 Boys need opportunities for learning knowledge and how to handle it. This is a major Royal Ranger function.

Boys need encouragement to excel. The Royal Rangers award program gives such encourage-

ment.

B. Stature-physical development

- Royal Rangers activities inspire physical fitness which is necessary for the body that is the temple of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 6:19).
- Boys should be taught the facts of life to give them a spiritual interpretation of the physical changes in their bodies.

- Boys should be given guidance in anticipating the frustrations that accompany their emerging manhood.
- C. Favor with God—spiritual development.
 - Each boy needs to be led to a personal commitment to Christ.
 - Through Royal Rangers boys are given opportunities for Christian service.
 - Examples in devotion and consistency are given boys through the Royal Ranger leaders and men who cooperate in the program.
- D. Favor with man—emotional development.
 - Boys desire to be accepted by others their own age and by adults.
 - Boys need the security of controls and regulations. As they learn to live by the rules of Royal Rangers they have experience in decision making that will prepare them for wise choices in later years.
 - Along with the arts and crafts of the Royal Ranger program, boys are given the opportunity of developing a Christ-centered personality.

III. What boys need most

- A. Adult male patterns as models for Christian maturity.
- B. Adult male understanding and guidance in resolving frustrations.
- Adult male guidance in planning for the future.
- D. Adult male encouragement in committing their lives to Christ.



GAME IDEAS

POTATO RACE

This is a relay race. Arrange two sides with even numbers. Set up a start-

ing line and finish line.

The potato is placed on top of the first boy's foot on each team. They must go to the finish line, walking with the potato on their foot. If they drop the potato, they must start over. They race to the finish line, then turn around and return to the starting line. The side finishing first is the winner.

DEER STALKING

On a signal, they all move toward the deer, using whatever cover is available. When the deer sees a boy, he yells for him to stand. The boy who comes the closest to the deer wins and becomes the next deer.

TEST OF GRIP

Let one boy and his opponent face each other standing about twenty-four inches apart, with arms extended upward. They grip a broom handle and pull downward trying to force the handle to turn in their opponents hands.

FIND YOUR SHOE

Divide the boys into two equal groups. Line them up for a relay game. Have all the boys take off their shoes. The leader places all the shoes in a pile. At a given signal, the first boy from each team rushes to the pile, finds his shoes, puts them on, and hurries back to tag the next man in line for his team. The group that finds all their shoes first is the winner.



SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND THE RANGER CODE

LESSON: 13 A ROYAL RANGER IS LOYAL. HE IS FAITHFUL TO HIS CHURCH, FAMILY, OUTPOST, AND FRIENDS.

In the past 12 lessons we have studied what the Bible teaches about a Royal Ranger being alert, clean, honest, and courageous. Read the story that tells of the loyalty of Paul's nephew, Acts 23: 12-23.

Many of the religious leaders during the time of Paul wanted to stop all preaching about Jesus Christ. Since Paul had been traveling all over the Roman Empire winning many people to Jesus Christ, these leaders wanted to kill him.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND THE RANGER CODE

LESSON: 16 A ROYAL RANGER IS COURTEOUS. HE IS POLITE, KIND, AND THOUGHTFUL.

In this lesson we are continuing the study of the Bible and the Ranger Code. "A Royal Ranger is courteous" is the next point of the code. The Bible tells us to be courteous in 1 Peter 3:8, "Finally, be ye all of one mind, having compassion one of another, love as brethren, be pitiful, be "

Being courteous is showing respect or consideration. This can be done through our speech and through our actions. Quite often both speaking and action are required in order to be courteous.

Being Courteous in our Speech

In Luke 17:11-19 there is the story of ten men who asked Jesus to heal them. Jesus sent them to see the priest and as they were going, God healed them. One of the men showed by his actions and words that he was courteous and thoughtful. Turn to Luke 17:15 & 16 and see what he did that was courteous.

"And one of them, when he saw that he was healed, ______, and with a loud voice glorified God, And fell down on his face at his feet, _____ him _____." This man showed courtesy by saying "thank you".

Being Courteous in our Actions

As Moses was resting by a well, Reuel's seven daughters came to the well to water their father's flock. As they were drawing water for the sheep some shepherds drove them away. Let us see how Moses was courte-ous.

"And the shepherds came and drove them away: but Moses stood up and them, and their flock." Exodus 2:14. Moses showed courtesy by helping.

When we say "please" and "thank you", we are being polite. When we say "yes, sir" and "no, sir" to our leaders, or "yes, ma'am" and "no, ma'am" to our teachers, we are showing respect. When we hold a door open for a lady, we are showing consideration. If we make a habit of doing what is polite, thoughtful, and respectful, we will become a courteous person.

It is not a sign of weakness to be a gentleman. Some of the greatest he-men of all times knew how to be courteous. In fact, a real top-notch Royal Ranger will be a gentleman at all times.



ROYAL RANGER WEEK

June 19-26 is National Royal Ranger Week!

Be sure to plan several special activities during this week and put the spotlight on your Royal Rangers as they celebrate "their week."

Try one or more of the following suggestions for Royal Ranger Week.

FATHER-SON CAMP-OUT

Arrange an overnight camp-out for men and boys. Encourage fathers and sons to pitch their tents together, cook their food over a campfire together, play camp-type games together, hike the woods together and share a campfire service together. Some men may hesitate because they dread certain discomforts. Proper camping can be a pleasant experience and the benefits of a fatherson camp-out far outweigh any possible discomforts. Sharing camping activities together can build a bond of fellowship between a father and son that could last for years.

Urge all of the men to participate. If a man does not have a son encourage him to adopt a son for the event.

GROUP RECOGNITION

Arrange with the pastor to have the Royal Rangers attend one of the church services during Royal Ranger week as a group in uniform. Arrange for them to sit in a special section of the church together. Recognize or have the pastor recognize the group during the service. Some pastors will probably want to slant their message toward men and boys on this occasion.

FATHER-SON BANQUETS

Men who do not have sons should be encouraged to "adopt a boy" for the banquet. Make this a big affair. Boys love to sit with Dad during the banquet. Climax with a special speaker.

FATHER-SON PICNICS

Arrange for appropriate activities for the occasions such as father-son ball game, father-son sack race, father-son tug-of-war, etc. A wonderful atmosphere can be created when men and boys play together. It is a big day in a boy's life when he and Dad have pulled together as a team to win some event. Climax the event with a big picnic lunch, wiener roast or watermelon feed. It will be a day both men and boys will long remember.
