FLAMES THAT CONSUME

Equipment Needed: Several slips of paper with various things we say or do which are displeasing to God written thereon; enough pine cones for each boy attending the service to have one; two containers to hold the slips of paper and pine cones; and a good campfire.
Scripture Reading: Malachi 3:1-3

Have the boys sit down in a circle around the campfire and pass the containers with the pine cones and slips of paper. Let each boy take one pine cone and two or three slips of paper. Have each boy read what is written on his slips and tell if they relate to his life. (This may require some help from the leader.) After all the boys have completed this, have them fold their slips of paper and place them between the burs of the cones. Then ask them all to bow their heads and close their eyes and toss the cones into the fire. While their heads are bowed and their eyes are closed, say a simple prayer which will parallel the service (one or two minutes long). Then ask them to raise their heads and look into the fire and try to identify their cones. (The papers will have been consumed and the cones charred so all will look alike.) At this time you can emphasize that with God all people are equal, and as the fire consumed the paper and the cones, so will His Spirit consume the things that are displeasing to Him, if we will let Him come into our lives.

Conclude with prayer and ask if there is any boy who desires to renew his vows to God or accept Him for the first time.

GAME IDEAS

BALLOON BASKETBALL

Lay out a designated basketball court in play area. Divide the boys into two teams. A leader will stand in a stationary position at each end of the court with a toothpick in his hands. They are the "goals." After "jumping" for the ball (balloon), the boys on each team endeavor to drive the balloon through the air and burst it on the toothpick at their goal. Each burst balloon counts two points. The basic rules of basketball are followed except the ball (balloon) is kept in the air instead of being bounced on the floor.

CARRY THE MARBLES

Place two marbles on the floor in front of two rows of boys lined up for a relay. Have the boys remove their shoes and socks. LESSON: 5 "READY" TO DIE

As we continue our study of the Royal Ranger Motto, we come face to face with a subject not too pleasant to think about, but which each of us must face sometime. This subject is death. Our motto says a Royal Ranger is "READY" for anything, so as Rangers we need to be "READY" to die. Let us see what the Bible teaches about death and how we can be "READY" for it.

THE BIBLE TELLS US THAT ALL WILL DIE.

Heb. 9:27, "It is _____ unto men once _____,..."

Here the Bible tells us all men, whether great or small, must die. It also tells us something else will happen to everyone after death.

THE BIBLE TELLS US AFTER DEATH WE WILL BE JUDGED.

Heb. 9:27, "...but after this the _____."

We can see from this scripture that we will all die and be called before God to be judged. For many of us it will be a long time until we stand before God, but for some of us it may be tomorrow or even today. Since none of us knows how long we will live, we need to be "READY" at all times. Be sure to plan several special activities during this week and put the spotlight on your Royal Rangers as they celebrate "their week."

Try one or more of the following suggestions for Royal Ranger Week.

FATHER-SON CAMP-OUT

Arrange an overnight camp-out for men and boys. Encourage fathers and sons to pitch their tents together, cook their food over a campfire together, play camp-type games together, hike the woods together and share a campfire service together. Some men may hesitate because they dread certain discomforts. Proper camping can be a pleasant experience and the benefits of a father-son camp-out far outweigh any possible discomforts. Sharing camping activities together can build a bond of fellowship between a father and son that could last for years.

Urge all of the men to participate. If a man does not have a son encourage him to adopt a son for the event.

GROUP RECOGNITION

Arrange with the pastor to have the Royal Rangers attend one of the church services during Royal Ranger week as a group in uniform. Arrange for them to sit in a special section of the church together. Recognize or have the pastor recognize the group during the service. Some pastors will probably want to slant their message toward men and boys on this occasion.

FATHER-SON BANQUETS

Men who do not have sons should be encouraged to "adopt a boy" for the banquet. Make this a big affair. Boys love to sit with Dad during the banquet. Climax with a special speaker.

FATHER-SON PICNICS

Arrange for appropriate activities for the occasions such as father-son ball game, father-son sack race, father-son tug-of-war, etc. A wonderful atmosphere can be created when men and boys play together. It is a big day in a boy's life when he and Dad have pulled together as a team to win some event. Climax the event with a big picnic lunch, wiener roast, or watermelon feed.

NEW SERVICE STARS

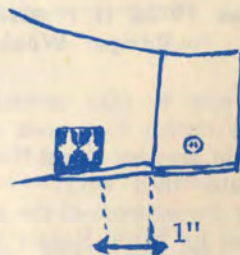


A new embroidered service star has been designed for Royal Rangers. These service stars are worn on the uniforms by both men and boys to denote the number of years of service in Royal Rangers. One gold star is worn for each year in the program. For each five years of participation, a silver service star is worn to replace the previous gold stars.

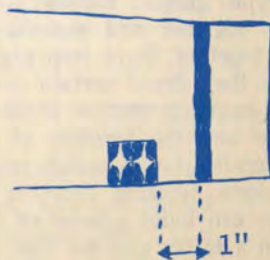
On uniform shirts: The stars are worn on the right sleeve, beginning one inch in back of the cuff. The bottom of the service stars is lined up with the opening at the bottom of the sleeve. (See illustration)

On uniform coats: The stars are worn on the right sleeve, beginning one inch in back of the sleeve braid. The bottom of the service stars is lined up with the bottom seam on the coat sleeve. (See illustration)
