Dear Commander:

This has been another great year for the Royal Ranger program! Royal Ranger chartered outposts increased to 3,141. With an estimated 4,000 unchartered groups, this would make a total of approximately 7,040 units using the program.

The enrollment of men and boys climbed to 35,750 with approximately 58,000 unregistered men and boys. This would make a total of about 93,750 involved in the Royal Ranger program. In addition to this, several groups have been organized in various foreign countries.

The Leadership Training Course has reached an outstanding enrollment of 6,429 leaders. One hundred and six (106) Leader's Medals of Achievement were awarded to leaders for completing the entire course.

Spiritual achievements have been outstanding! Annual reports from local outposts reveal there have been approximately 7,200 boys saved and 3,600 filled with the Spirit in our chartered outposts. Praise God!

We praise God for the contribution Royal Rangers is making toward the social, mental, physical, and spiritual development of boys. ress and the pace of the program depends greatly upon you. fore, deeply appreciate all your efforts. May we also encourage you to join us in pledging to do more in the coming year to reach, teach, and keep boys for Christ.

May we also take this occasion to wish you and your outpost a very merry Christmas and a happy new year!

THE HOMING PIGEON

(Submitted by Walter C. Enoch Theodore, Alabama) Scripture Reading: Psalm 48:14

Since 1943, scientists of Pennsylvania State College and later those of the U.S. Signal Corps at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, have been studying the homing instincts of pigeons. Their experiments show that pigeons have unusual, tiny canals in their ears which seem to respond to the earth's spin. The earth's spin is known as coriolis effect, an electric east-and-west pull created by the rotation of the earth on its axis. By the sensitiveness of these ear canals to the coriolis effect, the bird apparently can judge its latitude. The variation in pressure acts as a compass. Moreover, the pigeon can fill a small sac at the entrance of these canals and shut out the local wind pressure, in order to take his bearing. From this outer, overall coriolis force, God provides pigeons with a natural radar set by which they know the way.

Would God do less for man as he launches out upon the sea of life? No! He gave His son, Jesus, to show us the way. As we lift the anchor of faith and launch out on life's uncharted sea with Christ as our pilot, we can be assured of a safe passage home.

ROCKS

rocks

Display four different size rocks. Ask which rock should be used in a sling-shot. The answer, of course, will be the smallest one. Next, ask which one should be used as a paperweight for a desk. The answer will be the next one in

size. Next, ask which rock should be used as a block for a car tire to keep an auto from rolling down a hill. The answer would be the next one in size. Finally, ask which rock should be used as a landmark while on a hike. The answer would be the large, odd-looking one. Then explain to the Royal Rangers that we are like rocks. APPLE SEEDS

As long as I keep this apple seed out of the ground, it will potentially be an apple tree but will never become one. COLLECTING THINGS

Scripture Reading: Psalms 24:1; 106:16
Many teen-agers are collectors of rocks, butterflies, Indian relics, and stamps. Others make valuable collections of coins and foreign dolls. Many have made quite a collection of records and photographs. Each of these collections mean much to the collector.

There are other collections we can make that have a value we can never really measure. It is fun and it also enriches our lives. Here are some ideas for such collections.

COLLECTING SMILES: Try it for just one day. You'll be so pleased with your collection that you'll want to keep right on collecting. Of course, to collect smiles you have to smile at others first.

You start with the first person you meet when you get up in the morning and keep on throughout the day. Sometimes people will not smile back. It may be they are too tired or worried or sick. Or maybe they are just so surprised at seeing you smile that they don't respond right away. But keep right on smiling and sooner or later you will get some smiles for your collection. The smiles that are the hardest to get will be the ones you prize the most.

collecting beautiful scenes: This is not something you can put in a scrapbook, but something you can file away in your memory. It is something you can turn to and enjoy when things are going badly or that you can enjoy in moments of quietness. If you have a collector's eye, you will find all sorts of things; tiny frost crystals on windows, the lace of bare, black branches against a red sunset, tall grass shimmering in the sun, white clouds reflected in a pond. There is a wealth of beauty around us just waiting to be collected.

collecting pleasant sounds: It can be a redbird's song in the dead of winter, or it can be the soft lap-lap of waves on the shoreline in summer. It might be the high, clear notes of the Meadow Lark across a wheat field, or it might be the symphony of insects at night when everything is quiet. Sort out the beautiful sounds from the ones you've grown accustomed to such as automobiles, airplanes, radios, and televisions. Keep these sounds and store them away. There will be many times when you can turn to your collection as a source of enjoyment.

THE CROOKED RIVER

Why are rivers always crooked? This can be easily answered by saying that water always flows downhill and a river just follows the path of least resistance. When it approaches a hill or some other obstacle, it just flows around it. The river continues to follow the pull of gravity downward.

Man has many characteristics of a river. The "natural man" is crooked until he is changed by Christ. Human desires lead downward until they are overcome by God's power through being born again. But even after becoming a Christian, the "natural man" still wants to pull down and it takes the Holy Spirit's power to overcome. This power comes from the infilling of the Holy Spirit and by prayer, Bible study, our testimony, Christian fellowship, and by obeying God's will. By doing these things, the river of your life will run straight, A minister once said concerning the river of life, "Any dead fish can float downstream, but it takes a live and healthy one to ascend the rapids to the fresh headwaters of spiritual victory."

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BOLO TIES

A good outpost craft project is to make bolo ties. (See statement below on when to wear bolo ties.) If possible, the bolo tie string should be the same color as the group ties. This string may be found in most hardware stores. (You may also use small nylon rope or leather boot strings.) We suggest that each patrol make a different type bolo slide. This will help identify their patrol. There are almost unlimited possibilities for bolo slide designs. These illustrated are only a few examples.



Bolo ties may be worn as a part of the uniform instead of the dress tie during hot weather or on campouts. They should be worn loosely with the shirt collar open. Bolo ties are available from the Gospel Publishing House. However, the outpost may make their own bolo ties as a craft project, if they wish.


lack somewhere.

GAME IDEAS

FOOT HOCKEY (Submitted By Edwin C. Anderson, Saratoga, California)

Boys are divided into two teams. A chair is placed at each end of a room or designated area. The boys are spaced four feet apart facing the other team. The two team captains are in the center, facing each other. The referee begins the game by dropping a tennis ball between the two captains. Each boy must stay in his position with one leg stationary at all times. The object is to kick the tennis ball under the chairs, which are the goals. The team that has the most goals at the end of the time limit is the winner.

This game can be played inside or outside and with any number of boys.

MOON MINING (Submitted by Curtis C. Parker Olivehurst, California)

Place two pie tins on two chairs, approximately four feet apart facing each other. Fill one pie tin with cotton balls (weightless moon gold). Line up the group by patrols in relay formation. Blindfold the player at the head of the line and give him a spoon. The object is to see how many cotton balls (moon nuggets) he can move from one pie tin to the other in one minute. The patrol that mines the most moon gold wins.

SHIPS IN THE FOG (Submitted by Wayne Aldrich San Diego, California)

Equipment Needed: Chairs, neckerchiefs Patrols line up in relay fashion, with the first man in each line blindfolded. Between the starting point and the far wall, scatter chairs at random. On a given signal, the first Ranger in each line tries to go across the room to the far wall without touching a chair. If he touches a chair, he must go around the chair three times before proceeding. Once he reaches the wall, he removes his blindfold and races back to the next Ranger in line who should already be blindfolded and ready to go. Team members who are not blindfolded may assist the player who is on the "ocean" by shouting directions to him. First patrol to guide all its members across the room (ocean) and back wins.

SMASH THE CRACKER (Submitted by Mel Rimmer La Puente, California)

Equipment Needed: Rubber bands, crackers, newspapers rolled in a loose roll.

This game can be played boy against boy or patrol against patrol.

Slip a rubber band over the head and under the chin of the players. Insert a cracker under the rubber band on top of the player's head. The object is to smash the opponent's cracker. No holding is allowed. Player's free hand may be used only to ward off opponent or as a shield. If a boy hits his opponent anywhere except on top of the head, he is disqualified and the other boy wins.

ROYAL RANGER SALUTE

A suggested Royal Ranger salute is to use the four fingers of the right hand with the thumb tucked under. The angle of the salute would be the same as a military salute. The four fingers would symbolize the four gold points of the emblem, which are the four ways a boy should grow. Perhaps you would like to use this salute for your outpost.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY

LESSON: 6 BIRDS: EAGLES (Part A)

In the past five lessons, we have studied the geographical aspect of the land of Palestine. Starting with this lesson, we want to turn our attention to the wildlife mentioned in the Bible. We will begin with a study of birds. In our study of birds, we will not only learn about some of their habits and characteristics, but we will also learn spiritual lessons. The first bird we will study is the eagle.

Members of the eagle family are found in many countries. Three members of the eagle family; the golden eagle, the bald eagle, and the sea eagle, are found in the United States. The bald eagle (our national bird) is only found in North America while only a few sea eagles are seen in North America. The golden eagle is not only found in North America, but it is also found in many other countries, including Palestine.

The eagle, as this verse states, picks a high, inaccessible place to build its nest and raise its young. In mountainous regions, the nest is located on a high cliff which cannot be reached either from above or below. In regions without mountains, the eagle builds its nest near the top of a tall tree. Usually the tallest tree available. The eagle seems to know it is much easier and safer to build its nest away from danger and enemies.

We can learn a lesson from the eagle. It is much easier to live a Christian life if we keep away from sin and temptation. If you choose boys who smoke, drink, and are troublemakers to be your best friends, it will be much harder to live a Christian life than if you choose Christian boys as your best friends. The Bible warns us against evil companions. Let us see what it says.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY

LESSON: 7 BIRDS: EAGLES (Part B)

The eagle's habit of building her nest high above her enemies and danger was the subject of last week's lesson. We learned it is better to avoid sin and evil rather than trying to overcome the temptation to sin, which comes from associating with it. In this lesson, we want to study the eagle's eyesight and see what it teaches us.

THE EAGLE'S EYESIGHT

Job 39:29, "Her eyes behold _____."

The writer of Job speaks of the eagle's marvelous eyesight. The eagle has such keen sight that while flying thousands of feet in the air, the eagle can see a rabbit. Not only can the eagle see at great distances but it can also see the fleas and insects which sometimes get on the eaglets (young eagles). The sharp eyesight makes it possible for the eagle to pick off these insects without harming the eaglets.

Thus far in our study of the eagle we have learned two characteristics of the eagle. In the first lesson, we discovered the eagle always builds its nest high above dangers and enemies. From this characteristic of the eagle, we learned we should avoid temptation and sin. In the second lesson, we learned the eagle has tremendous eyesight. This reminded us that God's eyesight is even better and He can see all we do. We are continuing our study of the eagle by studying the eagle's speed while flying.

THE EAGLE'S SWIFTNESS OF FLIGHT

The eagle is one of the fastest birds. Many times in the Bible when the writers want to show the speed with which an event will take place, they will compare the speed of the event with the speed of the eagle. This is what Moses does in Deuteronomy 28:49, "The Lord shall bring a nation against thee from far, from the end of the earth, as _ as the _

The speed with which the eagle power dives on its prey is amazing. As we watch the eagle mount up in the sky, we think of a time when we also will rise in the air, only much faster. This event is called the Rapture. Let us see how fast the Rapture will take place, who will be taken in the Rapture, and when it will take place.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY

LESSON: 9 BIRDS: EAGLES (Part D)

In our last lesson, we learned of the great speed of the eagle. It reminded us of the Rapture when Christians shall be caught up to meet Jesus in the air. In this lesson, we want to study another interesting characteristic of the eagle and learn how the eagle teaches the eaglets (young eagles) to fly.

In Deuteronomy 32:11, we find a brief description of an eagle teaching her young to fly. "As an eagle stirreth up her nest, ______ over her young, ______ abroad her wings, taketh them, them on her wings."

When a young eagle is old enough to fly, the mother eagle will flutter around the nest as if she were showing the eaglets how to fly. If the eaglet has enough courage, he will try to fly. As he makes his attempt of flying, the mother eagle flies close by him. Whenever the eaglet becomes tired and is in danger of falling, the mother eagle quickly flies under him and catches him. The eaglet will then ride on his mother's back until he is rested. He then tries to fly again.

Sometimes an eaglet seems to be afraid and will not try to fly. If this is true, the mother eagle flies to the nest and pushes the eaglet out. The mother bird always stays near the eaglet and catches it on her back whenever the eaglet becomes tired or starts to fall. In a short time, the eaglet becomes a strong, capable flier. From then on, the eaglet is often seen high in the air, flying, sailing, and diving. It is never again contented just to sit in the nest.

The lesson God wants us to learn is that He watches over those who serve Him just as the eagle watches over her young. There are many scriptures which tell us this. Let us see what some of them say.

In this lesson, we will study the great strength of the eagle.

The golden eagle has been called the "king of the birds." He has earned this title because of his ability of flight and strength. The eagle's ability to fly enables him to fly higher than any other bird and faster than most birds. The eagle will often fly upward toward the sun until he is out of sight, even to a man with a pair of binoculars. The eagle's strength enables him to lift weights nearly equal to his own.


