ROPE TO SAFETY

Purpose: To teach that Christ is our "rope" to safety.

It was a beautiful, clear morning high up in the beautiful Sierras. The Royal Rangers of the Pioneer Outpost were on another high country hike. 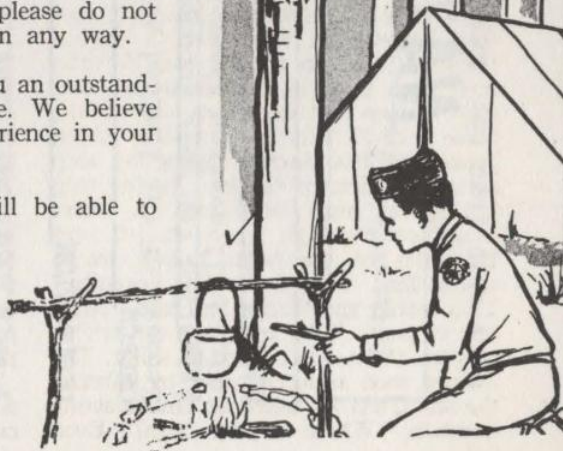
You have the privilege of selecting the camp of your choice. The average cost for the camps will be \$16. This may vary slightly in some areas due to difference in cost of camp rental, equipment, and supplies.

In order to reserve you a place in one of these camps, it is necessary for you to fill out the attached application form and mail it, along with a \$5 registration fee, to our office. Since the size of the training camps must be limited to 64 men each, candidates will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis until the enrollment reaches the camp capacity. We would, therefore, encourage you to send in your application just as soon as possible.

Also attached is a check list of personal equipment you will need. We would suggest you begin early to accumulate these items so you will be assured of having them by camp time. It is essential that you have these items in order to receive the maximum benefit of the training sessions. The N.T.C. will have very high standards, so please do not lower the standards of uniforming in any way.

These camps are designed to give you an outstanding training and camping adventure. We believe this will become a mountaintop experience in your Royal Ranger leadership training.

It is our sincere hope that you will be able to join us in this significant endeavor.

ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSE INSTRUCTIONS

USING THE ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSES IN YOUR OUTPOST

1. Have copies of the lessons run off by ditto or mimeograph reproductions.
2. Make extra copies to have a supply for new Rangers when they join your outpost.
3. Each Commander must complete the courses in advance. There are no answer sheets.
4. Explain the purpose of the Bible Study Courses to your outpost. Be enthusiastic!
5. Hand out the first lesson to everyone in the outpost, explaining they should take the lesson home and work on it by themselves. (Young Pioneers may need help from Mom or Dad.)
6. Have the boys return the lessons at the very next meeting. Give recognition to those returning lessons each week. Keep interest high by making weekly reports to the outpost on those doing good work.
7. Distribute the next lesson just before the boys leave for home. This keeps the lesson from getting lost, torn, or wrinkled. Repeat each week.

HOW TO GRADE THE ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSES

1. During the Bible Study period review each question and give the correct answer. Let the boys grade their own lessons. This will give the fellows a chance to review each lesson, and will also save the Commander a lot of valuable time.
2. Collect the lessons and record grades in the Outpost Record Book. After recording grades, return the lessons to the boys.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY

LESSON: 12 BIRDS: VULTURES (Part A)

In the last six lessons, we have learned some valuable lessons as we studied the eagle. With this lesson, we will turn our attention to the vulture and see what lessons this bird can teach us.

One of the first things that is noticeable about the vulture is its ability to soar. The vulture is able to find updrafts of air and mount thousands of feet up in the air without flapping its wings. By making use of the air currents, the vulture can soar and glide for hours as it looks for food.

Although the vulture has keen eyesight and a great ability in flight, there are some paths which it cannot see or use. Turn to Job 28:7. "There is a _____ which no fowl knoweth, and which the _____ hath not _____." The path Job is speaking about in this verse is probably the paths and tunnels which miners make as they mine gold, silver, and other metals and precious stones. The Bible also speaks of the road to heaven which only Christians know and walk upon. Let us see what the Bible tells us about this road which vultures cannot see.

THE VULTURE'S NESTING PLACE

The vulture builds its nest in the wilderness. Isaiah 34:13, 15 gives a description of the vulture's nesting and roosting place. v. 13 "And _____ shall come up in her palaces, _____ and _____ in the fortresses thereof: and it shall be an habitation of dragons, and a court for owls." v. 15 "There shall the _____ also be gathered, every one with her mate."

THE VULTURE'S EYESIGHT

Each morning the search for food begins. The vulture locates food by using its keen eyesight. Although the vulture may be flying thousands of feet in the air, it is able to see even the smallest animal. When a dead animal has been found, the vulture soars in circles slowly descending toward the ground. When the vulture determines it is safe it lands and starts to eat. Although not another vulture has been visible to the human eye in any direction, other vultures are soon winging their way to the meal. They had seen the descent of the first vulture and knew a meal had been found.

THE VULTURE'S WILLINGNESS TO SHARE

As each new vulture arrives, it joins the others in the meal. There is no fighting. The vulture which located the food willingly shares it with all newcomers. They eat together peacefully.

We can learn a lesson from the vulture's willingness to share. Let us see what the Bible says about sharing.

LESSON: 14 BIRDS: VULTURES (Part C)

In the last two lessons, we have learned of the vulture's great flying and soaring ability. With apparent ease it mounts up thousands of feet in the air and soars for hours at a time without once flapping its wings. We have also learned of its keen eyesight which enables it to see clearly for miles. With these abilities you would think the vulture would be popular; however, this is not the case. In fact, the vulture is repulsive to most people.

The main reason people do not like the vulture is because of the vulture's diet. Dead animals make up the diet of a vulture. It doesn't make any difference to this bird how long the animal has been dead or how bad it smells. The vulture eats it all.

The diet of the vulture reminds us of some people's talk. These people's food is not rotten but their speech is. All they talk about are wicked, sinful things. They mingle dirty stories with cursings and swearing. Let us see what God says about this kind of speech.

JUMP THE CAMEL'S BACK

(This game is recommended for older boys.)

Line up a patrol, one boy behind another. The first bends forward at the waist and braces himself. The next boy places his arms around the waist of the first boy and places his head under the right arm next to the boy's waist. The remainder of the boys in the patrol follow this procedure until the "camel" is completed.

Another patrol lines up in single file behind the "camel." Each boy in turn runs and jumps on the backs of the "camel" team until the "camel" collapses. The teams then reverse positions. The winner is the team that holds up the most boys without breaking.

The last player left in the game is considered the winner. Speed and accuracy are two main factors of this game.

TWENTY-ONE

Equipment needed: One basketball and one basketball basket: Use of basketball court would be best.

Any number of players is acceptable, but if there is a very large group, it would be better to divide into two or three smaller groups.

The object of the game is to be the first to score 21 points. If you go over 21, you are automatically out of the game.

One person is chosen to start the game. He makes three shots at the basket from any three positions. The remaining players must shoot from the exact positions and in the same manner the first player used. The first basket is worth three points, the second is worth three points, the second is worth two points, and the third is worth one point. Each player tries to get 21 points exactly. For example, if a player gets points totaling 20, he would try to miss his first and second shots and try to make his third shot which is worth the one point he needs to win the game. Remember, the first player to get exactly 21 points wins the game.

WOLF AND SHEEP!
