TRYING FOR PERFECTION

(Submitted by James Wisecarver Oklahoma City, Oklahoma) Equipment needed: Transit or level.

How many boys present ever saw a transit or level? The transit or level stands upon a tripod with three legs. This instrument is a precision piece of equipment. A builder of buildings will not start a building unless he has one of these instruments. They are used to make sure that the foundation has the right depth and is brought up the right level. This way the brick masons and carpenters can raise the walls of the building level and true. A level has a part that is called a transit, which will traverse up and down. First, a person using the transit must level the instrument so that he may move it in any horizontal direction, keeping the instru-ment perfectly level. There is a bubble and some lines; when the bubble stays between the lines then it is perfectly level. Also, upon a transit there may be a compass so that the person may establish lines true with the north or south of any degree of the compass. Along the various parts that have been mentioned, looking into the tube you will find two lines and one of these is horizontal and the other is vertical. You turn

the plans of the architect.

Let me remind you that if this instrument becomes untrue, then it is of little value to the builder, so he guards the instrument with care so that it is in perfect working order and ready when he needs it. We too can be a precision instrument for God and be ready when God needs us. First, we must be saved and filled with the Holy Ghost. Then, pray every day and be sure all our sins are under the blood of Jesus. When we keep our life in tune with God we can become a useful instrument in His hands.

A LEAD PENCIL

Material needed: A variety of pencils; some new, a stub, an eversharp, some large, and some small.

The lesson: "My heart is inditing a good matter: I speak of the things which I have made touching the king: my tongue is the pen of a ready writer." Psalm 45:1.

The lead pencil is a very common article, but a very useful one. The artist and the architect, the businessman and the schoolboy, the doctor, all of us use the pencil. It is similar to man's life in its everyday work, and teaches us some valuable lessons.

The thing that counts most in a lead pencil is the quality of the lead. If it is too hard, crumbly, or gritty, no matter how pretty the outside is, it is of no use. So it is with each of us. The body may be almost perfect in stature and physique, yet if the soul is bad, that life will not count for much. King Saul was a fine looking man but he had a very defective soul. David was a much less imposing man, yet God chose him because he had a good, honest, and humble heart. It was his inner life that made him acceptable.

The wood of this pencil must be whittled away before it is usable. The self-ishness, pride, and self-will must be whittled away from our lives before we can be used by God. If the pencil could feel the wood being cut away, it would hurt. But the cutting gives it a point and makes it useful. Trials and discipline will do the same for us; they give us a clearer edge and finer point.

Mistakes are sure to happen and that is what this eraser was put here for; to correct them. This speaks of forgiveness. Our nature is such that we make mistakes and sin, but if we will ask His forgiveness, He will forgive us and erase

our sins.

A human life is never in competent hands until it is placed in the hands of the Master. Paul, until he gave himself into the Master's hand, was a blasphemer and a murderer in heart. When he said, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" and became obedient to Christ, he became one of the greatest of men in the Bible. The secret of Dwight L. Moody's life was that he put himself fully into God's hands.

This new pencil looks the best, but this stub pencil shows that it has done much work; and who knows how important that work may have been? There is more honor in old age, after a life of service to God, than in a life that has never become involved in service.

This eversharp reminds us of "everlasting life." Ordinary pencils wear out and are thrown away. This eversharp may last for a lifetime. Our lives, like these ordinary pencils, wear out and come to an end. But Jesus tells us: "Whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

A GOOD SOLDIER

ARE YOU THERE, CHARLIE?


(Submitted by Ottis Griffin Anniston, Alabama)

The chameleon is only mentioned once in the Bible. This one place is Leviticus 11:30, where it is listed as an unclean animal. However, the chameleon is an interesting animal and can teach us several lessons.

The chameleon is an "Old World" animal belonging to one of the families of lizzards. There are no true chameleons in the United States. However, some of the North American lizards have many of the same characteristics as the chameleon.

The first thing you would probably notice while watching a chameleon is its ability to change colors. Wherever the chameleon goes it changes color to match the colors around it. After watching the chameleon as it moves from place to place you may wonder what its true color is.

The chameleon's ability to change color reminds us of some Christians. When they are in church they act like Christians, but when they go to school they go along with the crowd and do not show their true Christian colors. You never really know what they are because they are always changing.

LESSON 27: ANIMALS - CHAMELEON (Part C)

In the last two lessons we discussed the color-changing ability of the chameleon. In this lesson we want to turn our attention to another interesting characteristic of the chameleon, his tongue.

One of the interesting aspects of the chameleon's tongue is its ability to stretch. It can extend it's tongue a distance exceeding the length of it's body and withdraw it at an amazing speed. Another feature of the chameleon's tongue is the sticky spot on the tip.

The chameleon uses it's tongue to secure food. It either stalks a fly or insect or waits for one to fly into range, shooting out it's tongue with lightening speed to catch its prey.

So far we have considered two characteristics of the chameleon, it's color-changing ability and it's tongue. In this lesson we will study another characteristic, the chameleon's eyes.

The chameleon's eyes are unusual. The eyelids are circular and cover all the eye except the pupil. Each eye can be moved independently. One eye can look forward while the other eye is used to look in the opposite direction. Both eyes can also be focused upon the same object. This enables the chameleon to judge distance so he can catch insects.

The chameleon's eyes remind us of the Christian's eyesight. A Christian sees with both physical and "spiritual eyes." The spiritual eyes operate through faith, allowing the Christian to see the eternal values which are beyond the things of this world.

The Encyclopedia Britannica describes the hyrax as plump, having a "...pointed head, short neck, relatively short slender legs, and squat tailless body..."

There are three interesting characteristics of the conies which we want to mention. The first is their climbing ability. The pads on their feet make climbing easy for them, allowing them to scale surfaces which are almost vertical. The second characteristic is their choice of living quarters. Their choice is described in the Bible, Proverbs 30:26, "The conies are but a yet they their in the ." And, Psalms 104:18, "The high hills are a for the wild goats; and the for the ." The third characteristic is their natural helplessness to defend themselves when attacked. In the Book of Proverbs the conies are called, "but a feeble folk."

The conies make up in wisdom what they lack in strength. Knowing their natural helplessness the conies have made their homes in rocky places. In this retreat they are stronger than all the powers that come against them. We also have a "Rock" to which we can flee. In this "Rock" we are stronger than all the powers that can come against us. Let us see what the Bible says about this "Rock."


