CAMPFIRE SERVICE

PREPARATION: Build a council fire and seat boys in a semicircle.

Fellows, you have been following the "Adventure Trail" for some time now and it has been fun. Another important part of your training is to be willing to serve Christ. Jesus is calling young men who are strong in body, keen of mind and prepared in heart to do His work.

I would like to tell you of a young man who did give his life to Christ and who became a missionary to the Delaware Fork Indians and the Stockbridge Indians.

Although some men mistreated the American Indians, David Brainerd spent his short life telling them the love of Christ. Since he had been left a lonely orphan at 14, he was prepared to face the hardships of missionary work among the Stockbridge Indians. Later he journeyed to the Delaware Fork Indians with the message of Isaiah 53 aflame in his heart. He was miraculously protected from wild animals and savage Indians while hiking over dangerous forest trails. Broken in health from hardships and exposure, the "Apostle to the Indians," died at the age of 29. The memory of Brainerd's deep spiritual life and the unselfish pioneering spirit greatly influenced other great missionary heroes. So fellows, why not let this young man's life be an inspiration to you. Ask Jesus to look into your hearts and call you into whatever service He wishes for your life.

HABITS AND WEEDS

Purpose: To show boys the danger of bad habits in their lives.

Setting: Out-of-doors, on a lawn.

Story: The story is told of a lad who was helping his dad weed the garden. The dad explained to him the difference between weeds and the small spears of

corn. "Because the weeds will grow very fast, they must be pulled out or they will suffocate the tender corn and it will not grow," his dad said. In other words, the weeds will outgrow the corn.

"So it is son, in your own life it is very important that you pull the weeds of bad habits out of your life so the good habits can grow and ripen, forming good character."

The boy started down the row pulling the weeds. Although he tried to be very careful, roots from the bigger weeds would quite often pull up one of the tender corn shoots.

His dad noticed his trouble and said to him, "This is the way with weeds (bad habits) in our own lives. We must get rid of them when they are young or we will have difficulty getting rid of them later."

Fellows, anything that you attempt to grow will probably become infested with weeds unless you constantly work at weeding. A lawn such as the one we are sitting on must have constant attention to keep it free of wild grass or weeds. Flower gardens must be weeded or weeds will take control.

It is the same with your life as a Royal Ranger. You must overcome bad habits in your life while they are small, before they become too large to uproot.

A CALCULATED RISK

At our home in the Verdugo Mountains on the outskirts of the city of Los Angeles, we sometimes see facets of nature that the city dwellers seldom see.

One night about midnight we were awakened by the neighbor's dogs barking as they chased something across our unfenced yard. Slipping on a robe and shoes, I reached for a flashlight and headed outdoors in the direction of the noise. To my delight and surprise, a tiny fawn deer ran through the ground cover followed by one of the neighbor's dogs. The dog ran up to the fawn and

sniffed at it and then turned and ran back to its home. The fawn then disappeared around the back of our home.

This is what may have happened. The doe, the mother of the fawn, had been surprised by several coyotes and she had dashed to safety by taking the little fawn right down into the midst of the dogs. She then escaped by jumping over a nearby ditch. Later she returned for her fawn. She could easily outrun the coyotes or the dogs by herself, but her baby would have been attacked and eaten by the hungry coyotes. Domestic dogs are regularly fed by their owners so they would not ordinarily attack a fawn.

In human terminology, the deer took what we would call "a calculated risk," and chose the lesser of the two dangers for safety.

She illustrated two points of the Royal Ranger code. Alertness and courage. With God's help we too can think quickly and react without panic during times of danger. We learn first aid skills and outdoor skills to prepare us for emergencies and disasters. It is also very important to prepare our hearts and minds for emergencies through prayer and the study of God's Word.

THE ORIGIN OF THE CHRISTIAN FLAG

The idea for the Christian Flag originated on September 26, 1897, at the Rally Day exercises of the Sunday school of Brighton Chapel, Coney Island, New York. One of the speakers for the occasion failed to reach the meeting on time. Mr. Charles C. Overton, superintendent of the school, had to give an extemporaneous talk. Since he had not made preparation, he decided to speak about the American Flag which was draped over one corner of the pulpit. While he was speaking he conceived the idea of a flag for Sunday schools and churches that could be used in any country and would remind men of their allegiance to God, just as national flags express loyalty to our country. After the meeting Mr. Overton contacted a well-known flag maker in New York and during the week after the rally the first Christian Flag was made and used in that little Sunday school. Through this superintendent and the flag maker, other Christian leaders were interested in the flag, and plans were made to give it wide publicity. Since that time this flag has been used all around the world. There is no copyright on its design and no commercial limitation on its manufacture and sale.

The salute was written by Reverend Lynn Harold Hough, D.D. It was first used on Christmas Eve, 1908, in the Sunday school of the Third Methodist Episcopal Church, Long Island City, New York.


"I pledge allegiance to the Christian Flag, and
to the Saviour for whose kingdom it stands;
one brotherhood, uniting all true Christians in
service and in love."

The meaning is that the Christian Flag is the banner of the Prince of Peace. It stands for no creed or denomination and contains no symbol of warfare. The white ground represents peace and purity. The blue field in the upper right corner is the color of the unclouded sky and the symbol of fidelity and truth. The cross of red is the emblem of Christian sacrifice.

CANADIAN FREEZE TAG

As many players as you wish may participate in this game, indoors or outdoors. Set the boundaries to allow ample running room for the number of players.

Two players are "it" (one in small groups). They try to tag each of the players. When a player is tagged, he must freeze where tagged. (They may spread their legs apart. They must remain in this frozen position until an unfrozen player unfreezes them by crawling between their legs, without being tagged. The object of the game is for "it" to freeze all the unfrozen players.

COFFEE AND DONUTS

This game of skill and accuracy is played in a dirt area. It can be played at an outpost meeting, campouts, etc. Bury two 3-lb. coffee cans either 10, 15, or 20 inches apart, depending on the abilities of the boys playing the game. The tops of the cans should be level with the ground. Six metal washers, at least three inches in diameter are needed. Paint washers contrasting colors. Three of one color and three of another color. The object of the game is to throw the washers into coffee can. Scoring five points for throwing washer in can, three points for coming within washer width of can, the first to reach 21 is winner. The game can also be played indoors with variations.

NECKTIE RELAY

The first player in each line is given a large cotton handkerchief. At a signal from the whistle, he ties the handkerchief around the neck of the player directly behind him. As soon as the bow is tied, the second player unties it, turns and ties it around the neck of the third player, etc. The team that finishes first wins the game.

COMPASS GAME

Make a set of sixteen cards for each patrol. List one point of the compass on each card. Draw a circle with chalk on the floor or with a stick on the ground, and place cards face down next to it. Rangers are arranged in patrol relay formation. Boys will run to the circle and pick up a card. Using a compass, he places the card on the circle in the correct compass position. Score one point for the patrol finishing first.

SLEEPING PIRATE

One boy is the "pirate." He is blindfolded, seated in a chair and instructed to guard an empty match box at his feet. The other fellows form a circle around him, about 50 to 100 feet away. The idea is to sneak up on the pirate, take the box and return with it to the starting point without being heard. If the pirate hears the player, he claps his hands and points. If he points to the boy, he is out. The successful stalker becomes pirate for the next turn.

CARRY THE MARBLES

Place two marbles on the floor in front of two rows of boys lined up for a relay. Have the boys remove their shoes and socks. The first boy in each line must pick up a marble between his toes and run to a given point and back without dropping the marble. If the marble is dropped, the boy must return to the starting point and begin again. The side with the most round trips in a given time is the winner.

ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSE INSTRUCTIONS

USING THE ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSES IN YOUR OUTPOST

1. Have copies of the lessons run off by ditto or mimeograph reproductions.
2. Make extra copies to have a supply for new Rangers when they join your outpost.
3. Each Commander must complete the courses in advance. There are no answer sheets.
4. Explain the purpose of the Bible Study Courses to your outpost. Be enthusiastic!
5. Hand out the first lesson to everyone in the outpost, explaining they should take the lesson home and work on it by themselves. (Young Pioneers may need help from Mom or Dad.)
6. Have the boys return the lessons at the very next meeting. Give recognition to those returning lessons each week. Keep interest high by making weekly reports to the outpost on those doing good work.
7. Distribute the next lesson just before the boys leave for home. This keeps the lesson from getting lost, torn, or wrinkled. Repeat each week.

HOW TO GRADE THE ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSES

1. During the Bible Study period review each question and give the correct answer. Let the boys grade their own lessons. This will give the fellows a chance to review each lesson, and will also save the Commander a lot of valuable time.
2. Collect the lessons and record grades in the Outpost Record Book. After recording grades, return the lessons to the boys.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY

LESSON 30: ANIMALS - HART (Part A)

The hart mentioned in the Bible is the male member of the red deer family. The hart normally lives in a wooded area where it can secure plenty of grass, moss and tender twigs to eat. The woods also provide a place to hide in time of danger. In addition to an adequate supply of food the deer requires a good source of water to meet it's unusual need for water.

When the hart successfully escapes from his enemy, he must run long and hard. Then every fiber in his body calls for water. The Psalmist uses this illustration to demonstrate how we should search after the living water. You can read it in Psalm 42:1, "As the hart _____ (longs eagerly) after the water brooks, so _____ my heart after _____."

There is only one person who can satisfy this thirst for living water. That person is Jesus. Turn to John 7:37 and after reading this verse answer the following questions.

LESSON 32: ANIMALS - FOXES

The fox is a very sly and cunning animal. It's ability to escape from hunters and avoid traps is known around the world. When chased by dogs the fox will double back on it's trail, wade through creeks and use many other tricks to make the dogs lose the trail.

Solomon refers to the fox in the Song of Solomon 2:15 and gives this warning, "Take us the _____, the _____, that spoil the vines, for our vines have tender grapes." These little foxes are able to slip into the vineyard unnoticed. Once in the vineyard the fox eats some of the grapes and spoils many more. They injure the roots of the vine in their digging. They damage the vine further by gnawing on the stems and young shoots, thus destroying both the grapes and vines. It takes constant watchfulness on the part of the husbandman to keep the foxes out and to destroy any which slip into the vineyard.

Like the husbandman, every boy has a field he must guard. This field is his heart. Many "little foxes" would like to slip into the heart, and it is up to each boy to keep them out.

It is a big day in a boy's life when he and Dad have pulled together as a team to win some event. Climax the event with a big picnic lunch, wiener roast, or watermelon feed.
