WHAT IS MAN?

PURPOSE: To impress the boys with God's omnipotence and omniscience, yet show He is concerned about them.

STORY: Being in the great out-of-doors and wide open spaces seems to hold somewhat of a thrill for everyone. Being able to observe the handiwork of the Creator in the stars, moon, mountains, and streams has caused many ardent agnostics and athiests to pause and reconsider. Notice the stars. Some of that light began its interspace journey to the earth millions, and in the case of the quasi-stellar stars, billions of years ago. Notice the intricacy of the orbit of the planets. For instance, the earth revolves about the sun to produce just enough centrifugal force to overcome the force of the gravity of the sun on the earth. This keeps the earth from plunging into the sun in a fiery death.

THE COMPASS PLANT

SCRIPTURE: Romans 10:15, "As it is written, how beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!"

STORY: Did you ever stop to think how words originated? Let us take the term "posthaste," which indicates speed and rapidity. This particular term goes back to the time of King Henry the Eighth. During his reign postmasters employed relays to carry messages throughout the English countryside. (America's version was the "Pony Express.") It was the responsibility of each postmaster to endorse the letters with the exact time the message reached his hands. The dispatchers were told to ride for their lives. This also had a very literal meaning. To delay the message of the sovereign could bring the final penalty of hanging. As a matter of fact, correspondence in the 16th century was often ornamented with drawings of a poor dispatcher-carrier, suspended from the gallows. Beneath the figures was the admonition, "Post, haste!" Those laws lasted a number of years, and as a matter of fact, not until the 19th century was the statute revoked. The old expression, posthaste still lingers on.

You fellows know, spiritually speaking, our King, the Lord Jesus Christ, has given us a message that must be delivered to all men. The Bible reminds us forcefully that the King's business required haste. The exhortation is, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel." There's no death penalty involved, but rather rewards promised for faithfulness and obedience.

THE WEDGE

We as Christians can learn a lesson from the oyster. We should take those irritating things in our lives and turn them into something beautiful and valuable for Christ.


DODDER, GOLDEN WEB OF DEATH

STRING BURNING

(Submitted by Thomas I. Coker

Anniston, Alabama)
EQUIPMENT NEEDED: Stakes, string, wood, axe, knife, and two matches.

SCORING: Team burning through both strings—60 points. Team burning through 18-inch string—40 points.

The Royal Rangers are divided into Teams of two. Two strings are stretched tightly between two vertical sticks—one string 18 inches above the ground, the other 24 inches. The teams gather wood, and make a fire-lay under the strings. Top of fire-lay must be at least four inches below the 18-inch string. Only natural tinder and wood may be used. On signal, the fire is lighted. (Two matches only.) After lighting, the fire must not be touched nor extra wood added.

CROSS STICKS

(Submitted by Ray C. Cook Seaside, California)

This is a deceptive little game, but one which is very interesting. Everyone is seated in a circle. The leader takes two sticks and explains to the fellows that he is going to "receive" and "pass" the sticks properly. Each player is instructed to watch carefully, then try to do it correctly when their turn comes. If they receive and pass the sticks properly they remain seated, but if they do it incorrectly then they must stand up. Each player will be given two chances and if they fail they are "out" and must sit on the floor. The leader begins by saying, "I take these sticks crossed (or uncrossed)". He then passes them to the player on his right. That player then turns to the next person and says, "I receive these sticks crossed (or uncrossed)." The secret is whether or not the speaker's legs are crossed or uncrossed. At first it is best to make both the legs and sticks correspond. Little by little a few will catch on. Make sure these keep the secret to themselves. Of course it is helpful to have one or two players who also know the trick so that the fellows see it done properly from time to time. Remember, it doesn't matter whether or not the sticks are crossed or uncrossed, only the legs of the speaker count.

USING THE ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSES IN YOUR OUTPOST

- Have copies of the lessons run off by ditto or mimeograph reproductions.
- Make extra copies to have a supply for new Rangers when they join your outpost.
- Each Commander must complete the courses in advance. There are no answer sheets.
- 4. Explain the purpose of the Bible Study Courses to your outpost. Be enthusiastic!
- 5. Hand out the first lesson to everyone in the outpost, explaining they should take the lesson home and work on it by themselves. (Young Pioneers may need help from Mom or Dad.)
- 6. Have the boys return the lessons at the very next meeting. Give recognition to those returning lessons each week. Keep interest high by making weekly reports to the outpost on those doing good work.
- 7. Distribute the next lesson just before the boys leave for home. This keeps the lesson from getting lost, torn, or wrinkled. Repeat each week.

HOW TO GRADE THE ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSES

- During the Bible Study period review each question and give the correct answer. Let the boys grade their own lessons. This will give the fellows a chance to review each lesson, and will also save the Commander a lot of valuable time.
- Collect the lessons and record grades in the Outpost Record Book. After recording grades, return the lessons to the boys.

LESSON 35: ANIMALS - SHEEP (Part B)

Sheep can live without water for long periods of time. The Encyclopedia Britanica tells us that by feeding on lush forage which is occasionally wetted by dew or rain, sheep can go days and even weeks without drinking water. Sheep are also sure footed, bold climbers. characteristics make them an ideal animal for the mountainous and wilderness areas of Palestine.

Sheep live and move in flocks or herds. They want to be with other sheep. When a sheep becomes separated from the flock it is because he is either lost, ill or injured.

Just as healthy sheep will stay with the flock, there are some things a Royal Ranger will do if he is healthy spiritually. Let us look into God's Word for some of the qualities of a healthy Christian.

LESSON 36: ANIMALS - LIONS (Part A)

The lion's size and majestic bearing have won for them the title "king of the beasts." The most outstanding feature of this "king" is probably the mane of the male lion. It is usually yellowish brown in color, although some lions have reddish manes and occasionally one will have a black mane.

Lions are different from the other members of the wild cat family in that they live together in groups, having from four to 35 members. The ancient Persians made use of the lion's ability to live together peaceably and kept them in dens for execution purposes. Daniel was thrown into one of these dens when he disobeyed the law and prayed to God. Daniel 6:16, "Then the king commanded, and they brought Daniel, and him into the _____." (Read all of the sixth chapter for the full story.)

Not only do lions live together, but at times they also work together to capture prey. When an animal is spotted, one or two lions silently circle the victim, driving it toward the other lions who remain hidden. When the victim comes within reach, one of the hidden lions will bring the prey down with its paws. By working together, the lions are able to secure food they would not be able to capture alone.

Often in the Christian life Royal Rangers need to work together to accomplish things that one Ranger can not do alone. There are several examples of this type of cooperation in the Bible. One example is found in Exodus 17:8-13. Read this passage and answer the following questions.

NEW LOOK FOR OLDER ROYAL RANGERS

To maintain the interest of older Royal Rangers and encourage them to continue in the Royal Rangers Advancement Program, revisions have been made in the program for boys ages 15 to 17.

AIR-SEA RANGERS

In the present Air-Sea Rangers advancement program, the boys earn four ratings--second class, first class, advanced, and master rating. Under the revised program the boys will work their way through master rating in Trailblazers and then proceed to earn three additional ratings as listed at right.

Changes will be implemented gradually so they will not handicap boys engaged in the present Air-Sea Rangers program. However, new members in this age division may adopt the program immediately.

The basic Air-Sea Rangers program will continue unchanged with the boys using the same ties and name tabs.

TRAIL RANGERS

Boys who do not wish to become Air or Sea Rangers may, at the age of 15 become Trail Rangers. They will wear a special maroon tie and name tab. The emphasis will be on advanced camping, outdoor lore, and survival techniques. To earn the "Gold Medal of Achievement," a Trail Ranger will be required to earn the master rating as a Trailblazer, and three additional stations in the program. Badges for these stations will be worn in the center space of the master rating patch.


NEW HANDBOOK

The revised Air-Sea Rangers ratings and the new Trail Ranger program are contained in a new revised handbook entitled, "Air-Sea-Trail Rangers Handbook." (Avaliable from G.P.H.)

ONE KIND OF ADVANCED AWARD

Instead of both Trailblazer and Air-Sea Rangers awards, there will be only one type of advanced award. The award will be blue, and the requirements will be the same as present Air-Sea Ranger awards. Boys holding present Trailblazer awards (red) can upgrade these by completing that portion of the award requirement not listed in Trailblazer awards.

LESSON 37: ANIMALS - LIONS (Part B)

In this lesson we are continuing our study of the lion. Last week we learned that lions sometimes work together as a team when hunting. In this lesson we will learn what other methods lions use when hunt-

Lions usually hunt at night. One method the lion uses is to creep silently under cover of darkness toward his victim. The lion makes a sudden charge covering the last few feet before his startled victim can get away. A second method used by lions is referred to in Psalms 17:12. "And as it were a young lion in Using this method, the lion waits quietly hidden until his prey comes within reach. Then, with a sudden lunge the hunt is over.

The tactics of the lion remind us of the tactics of Satan as he tries to capture Christians. Peter compares Satan to a lion. Let us see what he said in 1 Peter 5:8. "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the _____, as a roaring _____, walketh about, seeking whom he may___

In spite of his strength, the lion fails to capture over 50 percent of the animals he attacks. He fails because the prey follows three rules. They avoid all lions, they run if attacked, and if cornered, they fight. These are three methods we can use in our war against Satan.
