LIVING LIFE STRAIGHT

Purpose: To emphasize the need to live a clean Christian life from now on.

Equipment Needed: Two 4-foot long $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch ropes, and a knife.

Commander: This rope (holding one of the ropes up by one end) represents a person's life: his birth, childhood, youth, manhood, old age, and death (moving the hand down the rope to illustrate advancing age). I want to tell you a tragic story about a young man who really tied his life (raising the rope) into knots.

When John was just a boy about your age, he disobeyed his Christian parents and hung around with a group of unsaved boys who coaxed him into helping them steal some petty items from a neighborhood store. How many of the Ten Commandments did John break?

Answer: Two, he disobeyed his parents and stole.

Commander: He committed at least two sins (tie two knots in the rope, about 6 inches from top end). Well, it wasn't long until the boys, John included, had moved on to bigger sins. By the time John was 18 years old he had helped rob a filling station, beaten up and robbed an old man and stolen a car (tie three more knots in the rope). John's worldly friends convinced him that he was a sissy if he didn't smoke and drink (tie two more knots). One night when John was driving home from a "night on the town" with his friends he lost control of his car, hit an oncoming car head-on and was killed (cut the rope off just below the last knot). Now, fellows, what happened to the rope every time I tied a knot?

Answer: It got shorter.

Commander: (Compare the knotted, cut rope with the new straight one.) Which rope would you like to represent your life?

Answer: The long one.

Commander: Do you know that God tells us in the Bible how our lives can be like the long, straight rope? (Read Deuteronomy 5:16 and Psalm 91:1, 16.) Every time we disobey God's laws we tie a knot in the rope of our lives. If we obey Him and live according to His laws, we are promised a long, happy life. Wouldn't you fellows like to "live life straight" and have the assurance that God is caring for you?

WHAT ARE YOU WORTH?

You boys look at yourself for a moment. Now what do you think you are really worth? Probably not very much. But look at Don Drysdale, Wilt Chamberlain, Arnold Palmer, and a host of other professional sportsmen. Don't you imagine they are worth quite a bit? But as a Royal Ranger how much are you worth? How much money do you have? How much property do you own? How much money do you make in a year in allowances or a part-time job? How many bicycles do you own? Yet, with all of this, you are not worth much.

Scientists tell us that our bodies are worth very little. If we took all the calcium, iron, phosphorus, and all the other chemicals in our bodies and put them in a package, you would bring about 98c. Some of you are not even worth that much because you are so small.

Now take your parents for a moment. They believe you are really worth something. Think of all the money they spend on groceries, clothing, dental and medical bills, hobbies, and all the other

things you need and want while you are growing up. Yet this does not prove the value of what they think you are worth.

God looked down and He saw you and me and He said, "That Royal Ranger is worth something." Because He thought you were worth something, He gave His Son Jesus Christ to die on the cross for our sins. In the sight of God you are very valuable, so valuable that He wants you to have eternal life through His Son Jesus Christ. To gain this recognition you must accept Jesus Christ as your Master Ranger.

A HARDBOILED PRISONER

Equipment Needed: Milk bottle and hardboiled egg. Remove shell of egg and grease so it will slide easily (Rinse the bottle with very hot water and quickly place the egg into the mouth of bottle. Suction will draw the egg into the bottle. Do this before devotion.) Keep bottle in paper sack and out of sight until later.

Story: Did you fellows know that tonight we have with us a prisoner? That's right. There is a hardboiled prisoner right here in this room (pause and then present bottle with egg in it). This egg is a prisoner in this bottle (shake bottle, turn upside down, and shake some more). No matter how hard it tries it cannot get out.

This reminds me of when Peter was in prison. However Peter was not hard-

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boiled. He was a kind Christian man and was unjustly imprisoned. It seemed like Peter would never be able to get out because Herod had placed a special guard over him. But Herod forgot one thing and that was that God answers prayer. HOW TALL ARE YOU?

Equipment Needed: Have the Rangers bring a tape measure or some kind of a rule for measuring height or length.
Commander's Purpose: To encourage Rangers to become conscious of their growth in Jesus Christ.

Commander: The story is told of the little boy who came to his mother and said, "Mom, I'm nine feet tall." "How do you know you are nine feet tall?" the mother asked. "I measured myself with my own ruler," he answered. Upon investigation the mother found a little stick that the boy had used. It was his own measurement guide. She measured and compared his with the standard measurement and found the difference.

Discussion: Let the boys comment on their own growth or the growth of a younger or older brother or sister.

Scripture: Ephesians 4:11-13. Paul the Apostle speaks and here writes to one of the churches telling them of the Holy Spirit ministries to the members of the church. He explains the reason for them and their importance in the Body of Christ. He then ends the direct explanation with this statement, "...till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of

the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the *measure* of the stature of the fulness of Christ." It is not how tall is Jesus physically but growth in stature of purity, truthfulness, honesty, Christlikeness is what God wants.

THE BURNING BUSH

Equipment Needed: A set of runner's starting blocks. These may be obtained from a high school Athletic Department.


Commander: (Open by asking the boys to identify the starting blocks and to explain their use. Continue with the following:)

A runner uses the starting blocks as a diver uses a diving board—to get off to a good start in a race. Oftentimes a race is won or lost by the start the runners get at the beginning. Runners in Olympic competition take great care to adjust the starting blocks just right. They want to be sure they are getting off to the best start possible. How does this apply to living a Christian life? (Wait for one or two answers, then continue.)

It is important for boys to get a good start in the race of living for Jesus. And we have spiritual starting blocks to help us: the Holy Bible. Two Timothy 3:15, 16, 17 tells us that the Bible is the inspired Word of God and that it teaches us how to live for God and prepares us for Christian service. This passage also tells us we should know these words from the time we are Royal Rangers age on through adulthood. Knowing God's Word not only helps us get a good start but also keeps us going for God.

GAME IDEAS

BACK-TO-BACK RELAY

Equipment Needed: At least eight players. Ten minutes playing time. Two lines about twenty feet apart.

The boys are divided into two teams and take their places behind the starting line. Two members of each team race at same time. They stand back-to-back and link arms so that one Ranger will walk forward and the other backwards.

At the starting signal the two sets of partners head for the goal line and then come back with the player who had been walking backwards now walking forwards. They touch off the next couple and the race continues until one team has finished.

BALLOON STOMP

Give each boy a balloon to blow up and tie the end into a knot. Then give them each a string approximately 18 inches long. One end of the string is tied to the balloon and the other on their ankle. When everyone has done this the game is ready to start. All gather into a circle or area. When the leader says "Go," they all try to step on each other's balloon and break them and at the same time try to keep their own balloons from getting busted. When a player's balloon is busted he leaves the game. The last one with a complete balloon is the winner.

SOCK/SOCK

A heavy wool sock is stuffed with other socks until the toe and lower foot section of the sock is full. A member of the group is blindfolded and becomes "It." He then stands in center of room or area and attempts to "sock" another player while keeping one foot stationary. Players should attempt to touch player who is "It" from time to time without being tagged. When a player is tagged he becomes "It."

POISON TOWEL

Equipment Needed: Ring of chairs and one tea towel.

Any number above six can play the game. A number of chairs totaling one less than the number of players are formed in a large circle, facing inward. (If only a few are playing, the chairs should be spaced somewhat apart to make a large circle.) One player, "Mud," stands in the center of the circle, all other players seated. Mud throws a towel to any member of the circle, who passes it to any other member in the circle. If Mud taps the person in possession of the "poison towel" before he passes it, that person goes to the center of the circle and becomes Mud, the former Mud taking his seat in the circle. No player except Mud can leave his chair at any time except after having been tagged. The game continues until everyone has been Mud or until time expires.

FLYING DUTCHMAN

Boys form a circle by holding hands. Two members are chosen to start the game. They run around the circle and hit the joining hands of any two boys. The boys who were tagged run around the circle in the opposite direction and try to get back into the break in the circle before the other team does. The first team to fill the gap gets to stay while those who are "It" go around the circle and tag someone else.

ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSE INSTRUCTIONS

USING THE ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSES IN YOUR OUTPOST

1. Have copies of the lessons run off by ditto or mimeograph reproductions.
2. Make extra copies to have a supply for new Rangers when they join your outpost.
3. Each Commander must complete the courses in advance. There are no answer sheets.
4. Explain the purpose of the Bible Study Courses to your outpost. Be enthusiastic!
5. Hand out the first lesson to everyone in the outpost, explaining they should take the lesson home and work on it by themselves. (Young Pioneers may need help from Mom or Dad.)
6. Have the boys return the lessons at the very next meeting. Give recognition to those returning lessons each week. Keep interest high by making weekly reports to the outpost on those doing good work.
7. Distribute the next lesson just before the boys leave for home. This keeps the lesson from getting lost, torn, or wrinkled. Repeat each week.

HOW TO GRADE THE ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSES

1. During the Bible Study period review each question and give the correct answer. Let the boys grade their own lessons. This will give the fellows a chance to review each lesson, and will also save the Commander a lot of valuable time.
2. Collect the lessons and record grades in the Outpost Record Book. After recording grades, return the lessons to the boys.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY

LESSON 39: ANIMALS: BATS

Although the bat can fly, it is an animal not a bird. Most of the bats in Palestine live in caves or some other dark place. Their living quarters are just the type of places people throw things they no longer want. This may have been the reason Isaiah said the people would throw their gods of silver and gold to the bats and moles. (Isaiah 2:20)

Bats usually sleep during the day and do their feeding at night. Thus most of their waking hours are spent in darkness. Bats are equipped with an unusual guidance system for their dark life. As they fly, they emit a high frequency sound. When the sound waves hit an obstacle, they are reflected back to the bat. The bat is able to detect these reflected waves and from them tell the location of all obstacles. This allows the bat to fly safely in complete darkness. Did you know that Christians also have an unusual guidance system which helps them avoid the snares and pitfalls of Satan.

The first part of this system is the Bible. We receive guidance as we read and study God's word.

The third part to the guidance system is God speaking to us and telling us what to do. The guidance system may come as it is recorded in Isaiah 30:21, "And thine ears shall _____ a word behind thee, saying, This is the _____, _____ ye in it." You may have an experience similar to Jeremiah's when he just had to speak for God. Jeremiah 20:9, "But his word was in mine heart as a _____ shut up in my bones, and I was weary with forbearing, and I could not stay." Or it may be as you are praying, God suddenly lets you know what to do. You do not hear a voice or see a vision but you know in your heart the way to go. Every Royal Ranger needs to tune into God's guidance system and let God guide him throughout his life.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY

LESSON 40: ANIMAL BEHAVIOR

In the past lessons we have been studying birds and animals. Did you notice that each species of birds and animals has a pattern of action which it follows throughout its life? The reason for this is that their actions are governed by instinct.

Although it is impossible for animals to change their actions, the Bible does tell us some unusual things birds and animals have done. Let us look at three of these strange actions.

1. In Numbers 22:28 what did the ass do that was unusual? _____
2. In I Kings 17:4 and 6 what animal or bird carried bread and flesh to Elijah? _____
3. What swallowed Jonah? (Jonah 1:17) _____

The actions of the ass, raven and fish were unusual. Why do you think they acted as they did?

4. Who opened the mouth of the ass? (Numbers 22:28) _____
5. Why did the raven feed Elijah? I Kings 17:4, ". . .and I (the Lord) have _____ to feed thee."
6. Who directed the fish to swallow Jonah? (Jonah 1:17) _____

We can see that God directed the animals to do what they did. The animals obeyed even though they were asked to do the unusual. Should we be as obedient? Let us see what men of the Bible did when spoken to by the Lord.

7. God asked Abram (Abraham) to leave his father's house and relatives and go to a strange land. (Genesis 12:1) Did Abram do this? yes no
8. In Exodus 3:10, God asked Moses to go to Pharaoh and lead the children of Israel out of Egyptian bondage. Did Moses go? yes no
9. God asked Paul to be a minister and witness for Him. (Acts 26:16) Did Paul obey? yes no
10. God asked Noah to do an unusual thing when He asked him to build an ark. Did Noah build the ark? (Genesis 6:14,22) yes no

Just as these men and animals obeyed God, we also should obey Him. God may ask you to be a pastor, evangelist, or a missionary. Or God may ask you to be a witness in your home or neighborhood. Whatever the case may be when God asks, "_____ shall I send, and _____ for us?" (Isaiah 6:8), each Royal Ranger should be ready to say as Isaiah, "Then said I, _____; send me."

BE A PEPTIMIST

A pessimist closes an eye and says, "It can't be done." An optimist beams then says, "It can be done," then lets someone else do it. But a peptimist takes off his hat, rolls up his sleeves, and does it.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY

LESSON 41: INSECTS: LOCUSTS

We now leave the subject of animals and move in our studies to the subject of insects. In this lesson we will study the locust. The locust of Palestine is similar to the North American grasshopper and is approximately two inches long. They feed upon grass and leaves although locusts will eat any green plant life. In Leviticus 11:22 the locust is listed as "clean" and could be eaten. Matthew 3:4 tells us that they formed a part of John the Baptist's diet, "...and his meat was _____ and _____." The people of the East still eat them.

As long as the locust stay within normal bounds, they fill a need in the life of the poor. There are times when conditions are just right that the locusts multiply too fast. Soon there are millions of locusts moving across the land eating every green thing in their path. Exodus 10:15 gives a description of the damage they can cause. At times like these the locust becomes a curse to mankind.

Like the locust, our emotions are beneficial as long as they are kept within God-given bounds. However once they get out of bounds, they become harmful to us. Let us look at some of these emotions.

ANGER

Anger is an emotion Royal Rangers need to keep under control. Anger which is not controlled often causes one to do things for which they are sorry later. The Bible gives us some good guidelines concerning anger.

1. Ephesians 4:26, "Be ye _____ and _____ not: let not the sun go down upon your _____."

LESSON 42: INSECTS: FLIES

A feature which distinguishes flies from other insects is flies only have one pair of wings. Just behind and a little below these wings are a pair of "balancers". Without these "balancers," flies would not be able to fly. Flies vary in size from the "no-see-ums" which are one-twentieth of an inch long to a wood-boring fly of South America which is three inches long with a wing span of nearly three inches. The common housefly carries bacteria from their breeding grounds of manure, garbage, and other filth to human food stuffs. Other members of the fly family transmits germs in other ways; thus, placing the fly among the most dangerous pests known to man.

An example of how flies sometimes contaminate things is found in Ecclesiastes 10:1, "Dead _____ cause the _____ of the apothecary to send forth a _____." Flies had gotten into the perfumed oil and died. Soon the fragrance of the ointment changed to a stench making the ointment worthless and unwanted.

We now turn to an insect which the Bible uses as an object lesson. Proverbs 6:6, "_____ to the _____, thou sluggard; _____ her ways, and be _____. Although we are not sluggards, there are several things we can learn from the ant.

FIRST, THE ANT PREPARES FOR THE FUTURE.

The ant referred to in Proverbs is the harvester ant. This ant is long-legged, black or brown and often one-third of an inch long. The harvester ants use their jaws to pick up seeds and grain which have fallen to the ground and to cut seed from weeds and grass. The kernels thus gathered are stored inside their nest and the husks are thrown outside the entrance. All summer they are busy adding to their store preparing for the future.

Each Royal Ranger has a future for which he should prepare. This future includes life on earth and eternal life. We can best prepare for our earthly life by first preparing for eternal life. John 5:24 tells us how to prepare for eternal life.


