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GETTING RID OF SIN

At this point the Commander reads Romans 10:13, and unsaved boys are invited to accept Christ.

CEREMONY: Every Ranger stands and places his hands upon the boy that is facing him, and each prays that God will use him in His plan.

UNITED TOGETHER

While seated in our new church sanctuary just prior to the morning worship service, my eyes were drawn to the immense wooden arched trusses that support the roof of the church.

At the bend of the arch at the top of the side walls, the trusses appeared to be about four feet thick.

Examining the arches closely revealed that they were made up of short individual lengths of lumber, boards of uniform width and thickness all bonded together with glue and nails or pegs. Actually hundreds if not thousands of boards were used in the arches alone. The roofing that was visible also consisted of pieces of lumber fitted together. The wood used was straight grained, knot free, and pliable enough to be heated and formed together to make the immense arch.

As a church we are many people all making our singular contribution in our various ways to make the church successful and dynamic. Each one of us is like the many boards that are all blended together to make the strong truss arches of the church building.

THE KEEPING POWER OF JESUS

MATERIAL NEEDED: A sheet or two of newspaper, a board, and a table.

LESSON: I have had a number of boys say to me: "I would become a Christian if I thought I could hold out, but I am afraid I would not be able to live the life." This object lesson helps teach that we do not "hold out" by ourselves; we do not stay saved by our own strength, but by putting our trust in Jesus Christ and letting Him hold us. To illustrate how God is able to hold us, even though the devil tries to knock us down, get a board (of wood) rectangular in shape, about 30 inches by 8 inches which is thin $(\frac{1}{2})$ inches or less). (Actual measurements are not too important.) Place this board on the edge of a table so that nearly half of the board extends over the edge. Cover the part of the board which is on the table with sheets of newspaper laid flat on the table. Now instruct a boy to knock the board off the table with a sharp blow on the end of the board. After a few tries he may even hit the board

hard enough to break it but he will not be able to knock it off the table.

The air pressure exerted all over the newspaper builds up such a resistance that it would require several hundred pounds of force to move the board more than any man could deliver. (Of course a slow push instead of a sharp blow will knock the board off the table.)

When you and I have surrendered our lives to Jesus Christ and we are living in His will, He places around us a protective force that gives us the resistance that is necessary to stand true in our Christian experience.

"How many of you fellows have seen Niagara Falls? It is a beautiful thing to see, and the rapids above the falls as the water rushes to the falls is a beautiful sight. Item Needed: A small tree

POSTAGE STAMP

Items Needed: An envelope addressed to you.

SPIRITUAL COMPASSES

Equipment needed: A compass and a pinwheel.


Discussion: "What is this object?" (Hold up pinwheel.) "That's right, it's a child's pinwheel. Often you will see children holding one out of the car window to make it spin in the breeze. Notice how it spins when I blow on it. Now Fred, you blow on it. And you, Commander Smith. Notice how it spins no matter who blows on it? What kind of Christian does this represent? Those who are easily swayed, crowd followers, etc. This represents that period in Peter's life before Pentecost.

"Now observe this object. (Show compass.) Why does a compass show us direction? It always points north. What happens when I blow on it? Nothing. Suppose I turn it around? The needle still points north. What type of Christian does this represent? One who always points to Christ."

Ceremony: "Let us all stand around this fire and look at the North Star. The North Star represents Christ. Let us pray that we may always live in such a way that we might point others to Christ."

UNIFORM CHANGE

GAME IDEAS BALLOON DEPOSIT

(Submitted by Arthur Smith Phoenix, Arizona)

EQUIPMENT NEEDED: One yardstick for each team. One balloon for each team, (have extra balloons in case of breakage). A container to hold balloons (waste basket, box, etc.).

Divide the boys into two or more single-line relay teams. Give the first boy of each team a yardstick and a balloon. The player holds the yardstick by one end, and keeps the balloon in the air with the other end. He takes the balloon across the room and deposits it in a container. If the balloon touches the floor or the player touches the balloon he must start all over again. After depositing the balloon into the container the player runs with balloon and yardstick back to the next boy on his team. The first team to finish wins the game.

GUYANA "JUM" BALL

(Submitted by Fred Fredericks Georgetown, Guyana, South America)

Lay out an area 60 yards by 30 yards. Divide this to form two squares. Put a team of boys with a captain in each square. Assign a referee on the center line. Use a volley ball or similar ball. *GAME*: When all the boys are on their respective squares, the referee stands on the center line and throws the ball straight up into^{*} the air. The boys then try to keep it on their square until the referee blows his whistle, which is every two minutes. Whichever square the ball is in when the whistle blows, scores $1\frac{1}{2}$ points. The first team to score 10 points

within 15 minutes wins. (Or, the highest score in 15 minutes.) If the ball goes over the boundaries, the referee blows his whistle which stops play. He collects the ball, comes back on the center line, and tosses it up again. No player may hold the ball longer than one second. The ball must be kept moving, by passing it from player to player or by tossing it into the air. Boys cannot use their hands to hold or shove other players. If a foul is committed, the referee blows his whistle and deducts 1/2 point from that boy's team. He then takes the ball to the center line and tosses it up again. Two referees are needed. One to check time and keep score and the other to supervise the game.

DIZZY IZZY

(Submitted by Warren Bebout Arroyo Grande, California)

Line the patrols up for a relay race. Have the first Ranger in each line run up to a given point, place one finger on the floor, revolve around his finger seven times, and run back to tag the next Ranger in line. Repeat this until all have had a turn. The first patrol who has its last runner back wins the race. Keep the runners away from the walls or other obstacles.

BALANCE RACE

(Submitted by Eugene Morrison Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin)

Two lines, each consisting of three Indian clubs, are spaced about three feet apart (anything that stands about a foot and a half high, such as tall plastic bottles, may be used instead of Indian clubs). Two players start on signal from a line a few feet from the first club and hop on the right or left foot, as agreed upon, to the first club. Balancing on one foot, they touch their forehead to the top of the club, hop to the next club and repeat, and so on. They may finish by hopping back over the same ground, touching each club with their forehead; or they may hop directly back to the starting line. The team that finishes all of their players without having lost their balance or the team with the least number of falls wins.

USING THE ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSES IN YOUR OUTPOST

- Have copies of the lessons run off by ditto or mimeograph reproductions.
- Make extra copies to have a supply for new Rangers when they join your outpost.
- 3. Each Commander must complete the courses in advance. There are no answer sheets.
- 4. Explain the purpose of the Bible Study Courses to your outpost. Be enthusiastic!
- 5. Hand out the first lesson to everyone in the outpost, explaining they should take the lesson home and work on it by themselves. (Young Pioneers may need help from Mom or Dad.)
- 6. Have the boys return the lessons at the very next meeting. Give recognition to those returning lessons each week. Keep interest high by making weekly reports to the outpost on those doing good work.
- Distribute the next lesson just before the boys leave for home. This keeps the lesson from getting lost, torn, or wrinkled. Repeat each week.

HOW TO GRADE THE ROYAL RANGERS BIBLE STUDY COURSES

- During the Bible Study period review each question and give the correct answer. Let the boys grade their own lessons. This will give the fellows a chance to review each lesson, and will also save the Commander a lot of valuable time.
- Collect the lessons and record grades in the Outpost Record Book. After recording grades, return the lessons to the boys.

THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY SUBJECT:

LESSON. 50 SEA LIFE: FISH

Fish are mentioned several times in the Bible. Probably the two best known scriptures mentioning fish are Jonah 1:17, "Now the Lord had prepared a ______ up Jonah. And Jonah was in the belly of the fish three days and three nights," and prepared a John 6:11, "And Jesus took the _____; and when he had given thanks, he distributed to the disciples, and the disciples to them that were set down, and likewise of the _____ as much as they would."

There are over 30,000 different kinds of fish. They vary in size from the great fish that swallowed Jonah to the smallest of minnows. Fish are found in rivers, streams, lakes, and oceans. In fact, there are only a few waters that do not contain at least one kind of fish.

Fish has become an important part of many peoples diet. To meet the demand for fish, men have developed several different ways to catch fish. The Bible mentions three of these ways. Let us see what these ways are.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY

LESSON: 51 SEA LIFE: OYSTERS

The oyster is not mentioned by name in the Bible. However, pearls, a product of the oyster, are mentioned ten times. One of the more familar scriptures is Matthew 13:46, "Who, when he had found one ______ of great price, went and sold all that he had and bought it." Since pearls are made by oysters, we know that the people of Bible times knew about the oyster.

Oysters live on the ocean battom, mostly in inlets near shore where the water is usually quiet and not too deep. They are found in many parts of the world that have a mild or warm climate. There are many different kinds of oysters and most of them can form pearls. However, the pearls used as gems only come from the pearl oyster. These oysters live in tropical waters. Sometimes foreign matter such as a grain of sand or a tiny parasite gets between the oyster and its shell. When this happens, the oyster coats this partical with a thin layer of substance it makes called nacre.As soon as one layer is completed another layer is started; thus, making a pearl.

We can learn a lesson from the oyster. Instead of complaining about the sand or parasite, the oyster forms a beautiful and valuable pearl around it. There are times when things happen to us which hurt and are unfair. We can either allow these experiences to make us bitter or like the oyster, we can turn them into valuable experiences.

Yet they turned this experience into a joyous one by leading the jailer and his household to the Lord. With God's help you too can turn the hard things of life into a blessing. See Romans 8:28.

SUBJECT: THE BIBLE AND NATURE STUDY

LESSON 52: PLANTS: TREES

The Bible makes more than 300 references to trees and wood. In these references there are at least 30 kinds of trees mentioned. Trees are divided into two general classifications. The "needle-leaf" and the "broad-leaf" trees. Most needle-leaf trees retain their leaves year round. Although a few, such as the bald cypress and larch, do not. Most broad-leaf trees drop their leaves in the fall. Although a few, such as the live oak and hollytree, do not.

Each tree has features which help to identify it. The general shape of the tree; the texture and color of the bark; the size, shape, and arrangement of the leaves all serve as identifying features of a tree. However, the easiest way to identify a tree is by the kind of fruit it bears. When you see an apple on a tree, there isn't any doubt about what kind of tree it is. The Bible speaks of this in Luke 6:44, "For every__________ is known by his own_______. For of thorns men do not gather figs, nor of a bramble bush gather they grapes!"

WATER SAFETY BEGINS WITH YOU

New York (NAPS) -- No one knows when man first summed enough courage to jump into a body of water instead of walking around it. One thing is sure -- he's been doing it ever since!

After countless ages, swimming remains one of man's most useful, beneficial sports. Few other activities combine as much exercise, relaxation and sheer fun.

But swimming also has a serious side. Statistics show five to seven thousand Americans drown each year! The "culprit" is simple carelessness--over-familiarity that sometimes blinds swimmers to basic safety rules.

To reduce the dangers--and add to the fun of summer outings-experts of the 125-year-old YMCA have drawn on its 85 years of water safety experience to compile some valuable, professional tips.

First and most important rule, they say, is to learn to swim well. Because swimming seems so natural, some people ignore the need for skilled professional training. Yet the poor swimmer remains a constant menace to himself-and to others.

Non-swimmers pose a greater threat, according to YMCA water safety experts. Until they learn the basic fundamentals, the only advice is stay out of the water. Even wading can bring disaster if you step into an unexpected "drop off."

It doesn't matter if the choice is a pool, lake or beach--make sure a life guard is present. Other useful precautions: never swim alone, obey all warning signs. Many a noggin has been split in shallow water..many persons have been infected by polluted water because they thought the warning signs just part of the scenery.

It's also wise not to swim through patches of seaweed; it entangles you and saps your strength.

Because swimming is an exercise, personal safety often depends on physical condition. If you don't rest and cool off after exertion, YMCA experts warn, plunging back into cold water may cause you to black out from a sudden rise in blood pressure. It may also cause painful, disabling cramps.

Recognizing physical limitations--and refusing invitations to competitive swimming when you're not in shape--is no disgrace. Endangering a rescurer's life by collapsing from overexertion <u>is</u>! Learn how far you can swim and don't go beyond your limit. If you do compete, race toward--not away from--shore, and have a third person present.

Vital to measuring your ability is knowing the water's depth and the current's strength. Remember, you can't tell either from the surface and must make it a point to find out.

If you are trapped in a strong current, "Y" experts give this advice: don't fight it. Swim across the current and gradually work your way in toward shore.

Perhaps the greatest water menaces are the "would-be-hero" and the "water show-off." It's a grim rule, but performing dangerous stunts to impress people sooner or later gets you in trouble. Any rescue attempts by unqualified swimmers can multiply tragedies. No one should attempt a water rescue until he's passed an expert course in rescue techniques.

If a swimmer is in trouble--and you're not a rescue expert--try reaching him with a pole or clothing or throw him something buoyant to hang on. Sometimes it's possible to reach the swimmer by hanging on to a dock or float with your free hand.

Even if the rescued swimmer looks in hopeless shape, quick application of artificial respiration usually revives him.

That's all it takes to blunt the edge of danger; a little effort to know-and follow-- the basic rules.

One last item: the YMCA operates over 765 swimming pools. In each you can learn how to swim--or to improve your swimming ability.


