think is the happier?

As she questioned him she became convinced that he was really in need. The columnist hesitated, looked back toward her house, then toward the station where her train would arrive in a

few minutes.

"I must catch that train," she said, "but of course if you're hungry, you must have something to eat." Snatching her key from her purse, she gave it to him saying, "here's my key. Go into the house No. 64, and help yourself. Everything is messy, but there is food in the ice box. When you leave, put the key under the door mat, so I can find it tonight when I come home."

The day was busy, and it was not until she caught the evening train that she began to wonder and worry a little. She felt easier when she could see the house. Hurrying to the porch, she found the key under the mat. Then she unlocked the door and entered. She could hardly believe her eyes. She had left a messy house, but now it was clean and

in order—dishes washed, clothes hung up, floor swept, beds made. The house was clean from cellar to attic.

When she went into the kitchen she saw a note on the cleanly scrubbed table. It said, "I have just been released from jail. Thanks for trusting me. You will never know how much good it has done me."

Businessmen tell us that 98 percent of the people are thoroughly honest and can be trusted. Our entire system of credit is built upon this fact.

Trusting them is good for them and for you. Why should we treat everyone as though he were part of the 2 percent? Ouestion and Answer Time:

1. Do you guys like the feeling of

being trusted? "Discuss"

2. Do you believe people trust you and why? "Discuss"

3. Have you had people mistrust you when they should have trusted you?

4. Who do you believe is the person you can most trust? "Discuss and lead to the answer Jesus."

I believe Jesus must feel sometimes like "Why don't they trust me?" as we talked about a minute ago, people not

trusting us.

Continue the discussion until the point is reached that Jesus wants you to trust Him, that Jesus can be trusted, and that we all should try to act and do as Jesus might act and do. Close with a prayer.

SQUIRREL TAILS

(Submitted by Carroll Pitts, Jr. Auburndale, Florida)

Players are evenly divided into two or more teams. Each player has a cloth strip (a tie or handkerchief) slipped through his belt behind. At signal, all players rush to a central point where there is a treasure—peanuts or nuts of some kind. Players try to get some of this treasure and return with it to their home base. A player may be "killed" by an opponent pulling out the tail. This puts the player out of the game and makes void any treasure he has captured on that particular raid. Players are safe when home. Thus they are trying to capture the tails of opponents and pick up some of the treasure. At the end of the game each peanut or nut counts one point. Each tail counts five points.

BIBLE RAILROAD

Each player has succeeding turns until he misses. The first player mentions a Bible proper name; the next takes the last letter of that name as the initial for the next, "hooking one to another" until someone fails to do so. He drops out. The last one in wins the game.

#### BIKE-A-ROAD

On the church parking lot set up a course to be ridden on a bike at a specified rate of speed. Include such things as a narrow, winding course with boundaries of golf balls which when touched will move.

#### TENT PEG RELAY

Equipment: Hand axe, chopping block and mallet, plus wood for stakes for

each patrol.

Each patrol member makes a tent peg in advance (no speed requirement). Patrols then line up in relay formation. All patrol pegs and a driving mallet are placed about 50 feet in front of the team. At signal, the first player for each patrol runs out to the pegs, drives them all into the ground sufficient for them to stand. He then runs back and touches the next player who runs forward, knocks down all the pegs, then drives them into the ground again. The first patrol to finish correctly wins.

#### POOR PUSSY CAT

One boy agrees to be the Pussy Cat who of course is "it." The other players remain seated while pussy goes to each one in turn, kneels down, and begins to purr, mew, scratch and do anything else he can think of that a lonesome pussy cat would likely do. The seated player must fondly stroke the pussy cat's head and must say three times, "Poor pussy cat, poor pussy cat, poor pussy cat." If he can do this without laughing or smiling, the pussy cat moves on to the next person. But if the player's lips so much as twitch, he must then take pussy cat's place. The boy who maintains a solemn face the longest without laughing is the winner.

BOUNCE BALL

Equipment Needed: A chair, 2 waste-baskets (weighted with a brick) and 2 large rubber balls.

How to Play: Each player tries to bounce the ball over the chair and into the basket. Give them 5 to 10 tries. Set up your own scoring system.

LESSON 11: THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL MEET OBSTACLES

When Pharaoh let the Children of Israel go, God led them by way of the wilderness toward the Red Sea. This route of travel was more difficult than the easier way through the land of the Philistines. God sent them the longer way because He knew they were not capable of defending themselves against the fierce Philistines.

God also wanted to give them rules and regulations to live by. God wanted to organize them into a nation. Most of the people had spent their lives as slaves, and therefore did not know how to be leaders or fighting soldiers. Exodus 13:21 says, "And the Lord went before them by day in a \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ to lead them the way; and by night in a \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ to give them light; to go by day and night."

Another obstacle was the lack of food. After reading Exodus, chapter 16, answer the following questions:

- 1. What kind of food did they find?
- 2. How often were they to gather the food?
- 3. What was the name given to the bread-like food?
- 4. What did it look like?

A third obstacle was the lack of drinkable water. After reading Exodus, chapter 17, answer the following questions:

- 1. Why did the people complain to Moses?
- 2. When Moses stood on the rock at Horeb, what did he do?
- 3. What came out of the rock?
- 4. What name or names were given to that place?

God knew that the new nation of Israel needed qualified leaders to give constant help to the people. Many questions developed because of the large numbers of people living so close together. Over a million people living in tents can present many problems. Moses had so many matters to judge that he spent nearly all day long every day judging situations that came to his attention. Because Moses needed more help in reaching important decisions, God made it possible for Moses to get good assistance in leadership. Good leaders were necessary for good government. After reading Exodus 18:12-26, answer the following questions:

- 1. What kind of men were chosen to assist Moses? (verse 21)
- 2. Moses was to handle "every matter ..." (verse 22)
- 3. The other rulers were to handle "every matter..." (verse 22)

LESSON 12: THE GIVING OF THE LAW

Our last lesson revealed God's plan for the government of the new nation of Israel...men who ruled over tens, men who ruled over fifties, men who ruled over hundreds, and men who ruled over thousands. After Joshua had died, the Children of Israel drifted into a "backslidden" condition -- that is, they continually sinned, repented, and simmed again, thus arousing God's anger. The Book of Judges records 7 backslidings, 7 slavery periods to 7 ungodly nations, and finally, 7 deliverances from slavery.

One of the important things to remember about Judges is this: The people murmured (criticized) much of the time, greatly displeasing God. They also "did that which was right in their own eyes," and nearly destroyed themselves by "getting their own way." God's law demands that sin must be punished. And God allowed the Israelites to be punished severely because of their rebellious attitudes.

Some of the judges were good and some were evil. Let's trace the actions of each judge and YOU decide if the judge was Godly or ungodly, according to the way he did or did not keep God's commandments. Fill in his name and classify him by circling the correct description of him:

#### DON'T BE TOO EASY ON YOUR RANGERS

How easy do you make it? How many kids do you know who have ever had to suffer a little, including your own? When the boys' biscuits burn and soup falls in the fire, do you come prepared with a little "extra" so they won't be hungry? Come on now, confess.

Does this make you wrong? Well, not many people are going to get down on a guy for being nice to kids. But look at it this way. Think of the golden opportunity you are missing to do this boy a favor.

Seldom does any boy today get very inconvenienced over anything. If he is late for dinner, good old Mom warms it up. If he misses the school bus, good old Dad takes him to school. Then we take him to outpost meetings and help him with his advanced awards.

Out of all these things we do for our boys we miss the boat on one big important issue. How can we expect them to ever learn to value anything when they have never had to "sweat it out"?

I would say that the boy who burned up his second class meal on a hike and had nothing else to eat would learn to cook by the time of the next one. Sure, the poor little fellow looks hungry.

"Hey gang, remember the time we went on that ten-mile hike and I had to go to bed hungry because I dumped my dinner in the fire," will be a story he will tell and retell.

He will have taken one more step on the road to self-sufficiency. If he is handed another dinner, what will he learn? Just that, like the free-ride society, someone will take care of him. Why worry?

As a leader you have an opportunity and an obligation to teach boys the practical meaning of the Ranger code. Think about the word courageous. To most kids it means dashing into a burning house and saving someone. This is fairy-story stuff.

When you take them on tough hikes and make them earn those awards, when they are caught in unusual or even dangerous situations, when they are tired and hungry and can't go another step, tell them what courageous means—having the fortitude to do something, even if it hurts or you are miserable and don't happen to want to.

Character in a boy is a slow-growing thing. Every day of his life, everything he sees and does forms small pieces of his character. Give him the right and opportunity to be proud of himself. Teach him to be ashamed of always being on the receiving end and never on the giving. "A Royal Ranger is Ready."

Help your Rangers. You can help them in some ways no one else, not even their parents, can. Help them learn to stand on their own feet and be men you can be proud of—but what's more important—men they can be proud of.

Don't be too easy on your boys.

# ROYAL RANGER WEEK

June 20 - 27 is National Royal Rangers Week! This is the week to spotlight your Royal Rangers. Below are several suggestions which can be used. Select one or more of these suggestions, add a few of your own, and develop a well-planned program for Royal Rangers Week.

#### FATHER AND SON ACTIVITIES

<u>Campouts</u>: Plan an overnight campout for fathers and sons. Encourage fathers and sons to become a team during the campout. Have them pitch their tents, cook their food, play camp games, hike, and attend the evening council fire together. Sharing camping activities can build a bond of fellowship between a father and son that could last a lifetime.

Banquet: Make this banquet a big affair. As much as possible, use father and son teams throughout the banquet. For example, a father and son team could sing a duet or combine two teams and have a quartet. With careful planning, a father and son team could serve as master of ceremony. Climax with a special speaker.

<u>Picnics</u>: Arrange for appropriate activities for the occasion such as father and son ball game, sack race, tug-o-war, etc. It is a big day in a boy's life when he and his Dad have pulled together as a team to win some event. Climax with a big picnic lunch, wiener roast, or watermelon feed.

#### GROUP RECOGNITION


Arrange with the pastor to have the Royal Rangers attend one of the church services during Royal Rangers Week as a group. Reserve a special section of the church for Royal Rangers. See to it that every Royal Ranger is present and wearing his uniform. Have the pastor recognize the group during the service. #### OUTPOST OPEN HOUSE

Plan an outpost open house during Royal Rangers Week. Display craft items the boys have made, show the Bible study lessons the boys have completed, display charts showing advancement, etc. If you have room, pitch a tent and display the outpost's camping equipment. Let the boys give demonstrations of the skills they have learned. These demonstrations could include knot tying, lashing, first aid, etc. If you have a suitable area, you may want to have a cooking demonstration and give samples to all visitors.

## RECRUIT NEW MEMBERS

This week would be a good week to recruit new members. Invite as special guests to your Royal Rangers Week activities, boys and their fathers who are not now enrolled in Royal Rangers. Invite boys and men from the neighborhood as well as from your church. It is very possible that these men and boys can be directed to Christ.





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
