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

2. "Convict the world of righteousness... because I go to My Father and you see Me no more;"


3. "Convict the world of judgment... because the ruler of this world is judged."

This is a true story about one experience that I had as a Royal Rangers leader.

The story begins in late August in the summer of 1985. We had taken our Pioneers on a last campout before school started. We also gave them the opportunity to bring along any of their friends who might be interested in becoming Royal Rangers. In addition to our 10 Pioneers, there were two "guests."

After the evening meal was finished and the camp was set up, we gathered around a rather large campfire to sing songs, have a struct or two, and enjoy the fellowship. As the commander, I had prepared a short talk about how God is always ready to help us in time of need; all we have to do is ask Him. I explained that prayer is our way of asking for God's help. I then asked the boys if any of them wanted to come forward for special prayer or salvation. A couple of boys came forward for special prayer and we all gathered around and prayed together. I looked up and saw one of the boys holding back. I left the group and went over, knelt down and asked if there was something wrong. He shook his head no. I then asked if he wanted me to pray with him. He mumbled, "If you want to." So I put my arm around him and prayed, asking for God's protection from any harm and for his health and happiness.

The prayer service having ended, we had snacks for the boys and let them play for a few minutes, and then sent them off to bed.

It was shout 1.00 c.m. The hear and the land happiness.

It was about 1:00 a.m. The boys and other leaders had been asleep for a couple of hours. I was sitting beside the fire, watching it slowly die. In the distance I could hear some coyotes calling. I had let my mind wander, sometimes praying, sometimes thinking. I couldn't help but think about those boys. Twelve young boys were sound asleep in a clearing surrounded by forest, trusting their leaders to protect them. I doubt if they realized that it was God much more than the leaders. As I sat there, I felt as though I was not alone. Looking up, I saw Arnold standing next to me. He was the boy I had prayed with earlier.

I turned, "What's the matter, Arnold, can't you sleep?"

"No," he replied

"Do you want to sit here with me?" I asked

"Yes," he replied

Tes, he repied.

I moved down on the log to give him room, and he sat down beside me. It was a little chilly, so I put my arm around him. I tried to make a conversation, but he was very quiet. Suddenly, he looked at me and said, "Commander George, what does it mean to be saved?"

I knew that I must be very careful in what I said. Arnold was only 10 years old and I knew nothing of his background. We talked for a few minutes with my asking him questions trying to determine how much he knew. I soon realized that he had a fairly good understanding of right and wrong. We must have awakened one of the other leaders because he stuck his head out and asked if everything was all right. I

Arnold and I continued talking, all the time following the steps that I had learned to lead a boy to Christ. Before I realized it, he was on his knees, quietly praying, asking for forgiveness. I knelt beside him and we both prayed, sometimes in a low tone and sometimes silently. We finally straightened up and I saw that both of us had been crying.

He said, "I think I will go to bed now, Commander George." I walked with him to his tent, went inside to be sure he was covered. I think he was asleep before I left the tent. I went back to the campfire and sat there for a few minutes.

You might think that this is the end of the story, but this is only the first half!

In the summer of 1998, at our District Pow Wow, a young man walked up to me. He stood out in his uniform with more fruit salad than a four-star general. He had the chevrons of a Trailblazer Master Rating and I could see the ribbon of the God Medal of Achievement. He gave a snappy salute, I returned it, and he said, "Commander George, do you remember me?

I looked at him for a minute. He was several inches taller than I was and thin and trim. I said, "Your face is vaguely

familiar but I can't put a name with it."

He said, "I am Arnold!" Suddenly it all came back. The campout, campfire, kneeling together, praying, crying, all of it. We put our arms around each other and we both started to cry.

After a couple of minutes, I regained my composure enough to step back and get a real good look at Arnold. "I see

you are a Royal Ranger," I said.
"Yes," he replied. "Shortly after that campout, my dad was transferred to St. Louis, Missouri. One of my school friends was a Royal Ranger and he invited me to go with him. I joined the program and started earning advancements. Because of me, my folks started going to church and my dad even became a leader."
"What are you doing now?" I asked. "Are you in college?"
"Well," he replied, "I am a senior at Central Bible College and have been on the Dean's List every semester. I have a

GPA of 4.0.

We talked a few more minutes and he put his arm around me and said, "Thank you, Commander George, the seed you planted sprouted and grew and grew." His friends were waiting for him so we exchanged addresses and said our good-

Seeing that young man walk up to me 13 years later, having him remember me and that campout, made all of the ticks, chiggers, poison ivy, snow, rain, heat, cold, raw food, burned food, and the many other inconveniences of camping

worth every minute! That night I reached, I taught, and seeing that young man walk away, I also kept him! That is why I am a Royal Rangers leader!

We arrived at the road leading to the cabin after dark and shoveled out enough snow to get the vehicles off the main road. Once that was done, we loaded up our packs and carried our gear the short distance down the road to the cabin. It was already a cold, crisp night. I looked toward the heavens and could see the stars. There was no cloud cover. That meant it was going to get a lot colder.

When we got to the cabin, I flipped on the circuit breaker, and we stepped into the cabin. Well partner, it "weren't no" ski resort, which suited us just fine. Since the cabin was only used in the summer, it was not insulated

SNOWSHOEING SNOWSHOEING

–It's wintertime in Colorado.

Time to crawl into a cave and hibernate, huh? Wrong! Not for Outpost 129; it's time to grab those snowshoes and head for the mountains.

The first shadows of dusk were just settling in on a late Friday afternoon in mid-February as another Rangers leader and I waited for the Trailblazers group of Outpost 129 (Twin Peaks Church, Longmont, CO.) to arrive for our first winter outing. As the boys arrived, they loaded their gear and snowshoes in the back of my pickup and started talking about the overnight activity.

Although it wasn't in the plan, a few of the boys were saying, based on the good weather we were having here in Longmont, that they would probably be sleeping outside tonight. There was an element of excitement in their voices since this winter overnighter was the final goal of 5

weeks of work at the outpost meetings.

As soon as everyone had arrived, we headed our two vehicles west toward the Front Range of the Rockies. Our destination for the overnighter was the small mountain town of Meeker Park. It was located at an elevation of 8,500 feet, just outside the eastern boundary of Rocky Mountain National Park.

The snowshoeing idea had all started a few months earlier after I was asked to serve as the Trailblazers commander. I learned during one of the first meetings the group had never been on any type of winter outing. It was a young group of Trailblazers and a small church (less than 100 people), so the boys (five of them) had little cold weather gear, and neither did the church.

After some discussion and planning with the Pioneers commander who would join us, the decision was made to introduce the boys to the feel and concepts of winter camping without camping overnight in the snow. This would be accomplished by staying overnight in a small, rustic log cabin built in the early 1940s, and then going

snowshoeing the next day.

As soon as the Christmas holidays were over, I started the winter camping skills program features, and everyone in the Trailblazers group started making their own set of snowshoes, including me. The snowshoe project was an excellent team building activity, since we had to work or heated, and the water had been shut off and drained at the end of summer. Who'd ever "hear'd" about taking a bath in the middle of winter anyway?

The boys soon discovered that their breath fogged inside the cabin too. The jackets and stocking caps were going to stay on awhile. There was a large stone fireplace near the center of the cabin and a loft above. As soon as the boys spotted the loft, they claimed it as their sleeping area and then headed directly for it.

Once their gear was stowed, a couple of the boys were given the duty of getting a fire going in the fireplace. Then the cooks prepared supper. Maybe it was the cold mountain air, but I remember those chili dogs being delicious. By the time supper was over, the fire had warmed the cabin enough so we weren't able to fog our breath anymore. In fact, those near the fireplace could feel comfortable with their gloves off and coats unzipped.

Later that evening, we had our council fire service right there around the fireplace. It was a good time for everyone. Next came the roasted marshmallows and S'mores. Naturally, the boys discovered that the loft was the warmest place in the old cabin, so they willingly headed for their sleeping bags, although we all know that the "S" in sleeping bag actually stands for "stay up" and talk awhile.

Of course, this was a good time for the to ask which boys had volunteered to sleep outside earlier. There was a whole lot of backpedaling and no volunteers. With a smile, I dropped the subject. In the meantime, the Pioneers commander had laid his sleeping bag out on one of the beds in the back of the cabin. I found a cozy spot in front of the fireplace and dozed off.

The sunrise was awesome the next morning. Since we had arrived at the cabin in the dark, the boys didn't realize until morning that the cabin was located about 5 miles directly east of Longs Peak. The sun dropped its reddishyellow light down its sheer face like a lowered veil.

The 14,255-foot peak is the unmatched king of the northern Front Range. Colonel Steven Long made the first recorded American sighting of the peak that now bears his name in 1820, but it remained an unconquered mountain until 1868. Its fame spread quickly, even to the extent of

becoming the fictional site of a 280-foot telescope in Jules Verne's *From the Earth to the Moon* in 1866.

We are breakfast looking at the mountain, awed by God's creative power. During breakfast the boys had started asking about when and where we were going to try out our snowshoes. In order to get the best snow conditions, it was decided that we would travel another 30 minutes by vehicle to the trailheads at Bear Lake in Rocky Mountain National Park.

With that goal in mind, the boys quickly finished breakfast cleanup, prepared the sack lunches for the noon meal, loaded up their gear, and straightened up the cabin in record time. They were being beckoned by the "call of the wild."

We arrived at the Bear Lake trailhead about 9:30 a.m. It would be another beautiful day in the Colorado Rockies. The sky was clear, and the sun, bright. We got out the sunblock. Sunburn occurs easily at the 9,500-foot elevation.

Within a few minutes we had our snowshoes strapped on and were heading up the trail. The boys felt awkward at first because of those big pontoons on their

at first because of those big pontoons on their

feet, but within a half hour they were getting the hang of things.

The trail we were on was packed powder, so I motioned the boys off the trail to test their snowshoes in the soft powder. The snow was 3 feet deep, but the snow-

shoes only sank a few inches into the deep powder. A couple of the boys put their snowshoes to the ultimate test by jumping up and down to see if they could drop deeper into the snow.

The effectiveness of the snowshoes was quickly demonstrated a short time later when one of the boys accidentally stumbled into the deep powder. It took a couple of his patrol mates to pull him out of the hole he had gotten himself into and onto his feet again.

By the time the lunch hour had rolled around, we had snowshoed a 3-mile loop to the backside of Bear Lake. We came out of the woods onto a large flat cliff, which dropped 30 feet straight to the frozen lake below. The sun had melted the snow off the rocky area of the cliff, so we took off our snowshoes, and found places to sit and soak up the warmth of the sun.

This was a scenic spot to have lunch, since we had a


great view of the lake and the wooded valley that stretched beyond it. We stayed at this location for over an hour, while some of the boys found creative ways to enjoy the snow or the snow depth. Others just stretched out on the cliff area to doze in the sun. The boys were really enjoying this break, so some were disappointed when they found out the time had come to get back on the trail again.

On the return to the trailhead, we took a short loop down the gentle slope on the north side of the cliff. Then we cut directly across the frozen lake to its mouth, which takes us down to the trailhead.

By the time we reached the vehicles, the boys were ready for the cold pop and candy bar that awaited them. Everyone agreed it had been a fun-filled day, but that they were ready to head back home for a hot shower and a warm, homecooked meal.

Aaaaahhh, home sweet home!

Home is sweet indeed, but it's not a place to hide out during the winter. It's the time to get out and enjoy the wonders of nature, the friendship of other Rangers, and the challenges of winter activities—like snowshoeing!





members at The General Council of the Assemblies of God decided that the Men's Department would be responsible for the program, but that it should be tied in with another organization for financial reasons. I checked out the other program's curriculum but felt it was not what we had envisioned.

How far we would have missed the plan of God if we had gone with that program! I think about the prayers that we prayed back then, for we knew that the prayers then would have an effect

on things we could not know.

In late 1961, Brother Zimmerman, who served as the general superintendent for the Assemblies of God, requested that I proceed with implementing a boys' scouting program. We all felt that it was a miracle that the Executive Committee had reversed its initial decision to tag onto another current scouting program.

By 1962, we had picked a committee composed of "team" men to brainstorm about all facets of the program. First on our list was finding a man to head up the new program. We earnestly

prayed for a man to come along to fill the newly named position of "national commander.

Shortly thereafter, Marshall Calloway, from Indiana, called me about Johnnie Barnes, then D-CAP from the North Texas District. I contacted Johnnie and asked him to pray about becoming the national commander. After meeting with him and reporting the events to Howard Bush, Howard suggested that Johnnie come to Springfield for an interview. Upon meeting him, the committee felt the Holy Spirit saying, "That's the man!" He was talented in writing and artistic endeavors, and he had a country boy charm about him that we knew boys and men alike would relate to. Besides, he had an all-American name, Johnnie, and his last name noted an outdoors term, Barnes! He was offered the position and he became the first national

commander in early 1962.

First on our list was finding a man to head up the new program. We earnestly prayed for a man to come along to fill the newly named position of "national commander."

I would see Johnnie, the artist, in his office drawing and envisioning what is now known as the Royal Rangers Emblem. Before Johnnie came to the office, as the team members who

brainstormed about what a camping program would be like, we realized that a strong two-or-three-component name was needed. That's not easy to come by. The committee spent much time and

ONE-ON-ONE The Man Who Had a Vision

The information below is based on a taped interview with Burton Pierce. Burton served as the Men's Fellowship (now HonorBound Office) director. He was instrumental in casting the vision for Royal Rangers and the one who hired our first national commander, Rev. Johnnie Barnes, now deceased.

ooking out into this sea of faces, my mind goes back to long ago when we were talking about a program like this. A Scripture verse came to me this afternoon, "Son of man can these bones live?" (Ezekiel 37:3). Boy, has there been a heap of living.

In 1960, I left my pastorate and the position of district coordinator of Men's Ministries in the Northwest District, under the invitation of Howard Bush, to take over the Men's Fellowship Department, now called HonorBound. The Holy Spirit had already been dealing with my heart about a change.

During those early days, it was a real priority that we were moving in the will of God when we began discussing a boys' program. The executive

Decorating Your Room

NATIONAL BUCKAROOS-STRAIGHT ARROWS COORDINATOR

That a delight it would be to have a room in the church that could be dedicated solely to your Straight Arrows or Buckaroos Outpost. I have visited a number of churches that have given the freedom to their commanders to decorate their rooms. One good example is the Buckaroos room of Commander Dorothy Goodwin in Albany, Georgia. She has spent many in time, effort, and money to make a very pleasing, exciting, and well-designed cowboy setting. However, most commanders have to share their rooms with Sunday school or Bible study classes and are not able to decorate their rooms to be the exciting and inviting place that it should be. Therefore, the question is, "How can I decorate my room to be an exciting place with limited resources and many permissions?" Below I have outlined a number of ways to decorate your room.

First, contact the senior commander and ask him to help you get permission to decorate the room. He may want to see a plan and/or design to determine how much you will decorate, but this can be done after your initial contact with him. He might already know what you can and cannot do and will assist you in accomplishing your project. The senior commander will then secure permission from the pastor or custodian.

Second, make a plan that will account for the time involved, the money needed to purchase the equipment, and the design of how the items will be placed in the room. It is better to have things written down on paper instead of a verbal agreement with the pastor or senior commander. It is always best to keep everyone apprised so that there are no surprises!

Third, now we get down to specifics and the available options.

OPTION #1: Ask for a closet to be built, or for a portable closet that you can keep in one corner of the room. You can then keep all the materials stored for the outpost and take them out to decorate the room as needed.

OPTION #2: Contact the other users of the room and ask to have one wall that you can decorate. Many teachers are more than willing to work with you. Posters and colorful displays should be used as much as possible and changed on a regular basis. Ask Sunday school teachers or schoolteachers for ideas and/or assistance.

OPTION #3: Build a thin display unit that will take up only a 4-foot by 8-foot part of the wall. This can be done by buying two nice pieces of plywood or particleboard, three 8foot 2 by 4s, 6 hinges, a latch, and a corkboard. Cut and screw together the 2 by 4s and one piece of plywood and line the inside with the corkboard. Attach the hinges to the 2 by 4 frame (three on each side). Cut the second piece of plywood in half lengthwise, and attach them to the hinges on the 2 by 4 frame. The latch will be attached to the cut plywood on the outside to keep them secure. Decorate the inside of the unit, but keep it closed when not in use. You can decorate it with Royal Rangers posters, cowboy, and/or Indian items. The corkboard can be used to display ideas, the boy's work, or demonstration items. This unit can be permanently attached to the wall, or it can be mobile and placed into the room whenever it is needed. Make sure the unit is appealing, safe, and in a place that will allow you to use it anytime. This was used during the Southeast Regional Conference and Commander Derek Goodwin demonstrated how it worked.

Lastly, the best way to get permission for decorating is having a good relationship with the church. Make sure that you are an example to the other commanders, members of the church, and pastor. Attending other services, participating in the other ministries of the church, such as Honorbound, Women's Ministries, and Sunday school will do a great deal to demonstrate to your pastor that you are a viable member of the church. Always keep your area, room, or closet space clean and organized. You will make great friends with the other users of the room by keeping a neat and orderly room. The best way to cement good relationships within the church is to pray! You will accomplish so much more by praying for the success of your pastor, the other teachers, and fellow commanders than trying to manipulate others to give you what you want.

A Story About MICHAEL **GURIAN**

How Society Fails Boys and What We Can Do About It

Michael Gurian is worried about boys.

"Underneath their sometimes gruff I-don't-need-your-help exterior, boys are fragile beings who hunger to be shown the magic path to manhood," says Gurian, family therapist, educator, and author of the best-selling The Wonder of Boys.

"Boys want challenges; they want discipline; they want to learn how to create and shape and fix and build," Gurian says. "They want to feel a sense of their place and their worth in the world. They want to make meaningful sacrifices for the betterment of their family and community. They want to discover their personal mission—whether that mission involves music, science, or sports-and then spend their years pursuing it with success."

And they need the proverbial village to help them attain that

"An adolescent boy needs a clan of caregiving personnel to help him into adult masculinity—the core self by which he will not only survive in adult life, but flourish with passion and dignity," Gurian says. "If a boy has a clan in place before he enters adolescence, he'll maneuver through adolescence much more

"But instead of actively helping boys to discover their core selves, their best potential," Gurian says, "our society has collectively turned its backs on boys. When they're young, we work hard to stifle their energy. Boys who sit still for long periods of time playing quietly with toys are labeled 'good,' while energetic boys who run and jump and climb and rarely ever want to sit still are labeled 'bad.' And when they're teens, we fear their physical size, emotional turmoil, and strong sexuality."

Rarely do we meet boys head on and give them the attention, information, and love they need in order to thrive. The result is a generation of boys who do not have the direction they need to grow into the stable, secure, and motivated men our society needs.

"Adolescent boys are now, arguably, our most undernurtured

population. They bring their yearning to their society, but often they are not rewarded with careful and forceful human love," Gurian says. "One of the great tasks of the new millennium is certainly the invigoration of a healthy, robust, compassionate, and successful masculinity for our adolescent males" (pp. 3, 277, A Fine Young Man).

Gurian feels hopeful that task can be accomplished with better education of parents, teachers, and other mentors, and with national and local programs that help boys grow into the best men they can become. He mentions scouting as an example that will help meet our boys' needs.

Michael Gurian became interested in researching male development in the 1980s, when he realized that the then-current theories about child development—which assumed that boys were doing fine, but girls were suffering in our culture-just didn't ring true for him. Since then, he has lectured and written extensively about male development, including The Wonder of Boys, published in 1996, and A Fine Young Man: What Parents, Mentors, and Educators Can Do To Shape Adolescent Boys Into Exceptional Men, published in 1998.

"I have two daughters, and I would never want the culture to forget them," Gurian says. "But if we look culture-wide right now, we have to see that it's our males who are in real trouble" (personal interview).

Gurian's books offer guidance for promoting the healthy development of young boys and adolescents. "First and foremost," Gurian says, "boys of all ages need three families: 1) The 'nuclear' family; 2) the extended family, including blood relatives, close friends, male mentors, teachers, peers, and day-care providers; and 3) culture and community, including religious groups, influential community figures, and the media.

"Most of our ancestors were brought up in some form of a three-family culture. Most of our own American predecessors lived close to their grandparents, aunties, uncles, or lived in small neighborhoods. When they moved to another city, they usually moved to another family member's neighborhood and thus felt, soon enough, that they belonged in more than one family, and their kids would be raised by far more than one adult" (p. 60, The Wonder of Boys).

But by the time Gurian was growing up in the 1960s and early '70s, that three-family safety net was already beginning to split apart, as he points out in The Wonder of Boys. While most families still had two parents, the number of single-parent families was already on the rise. Although many still lived near large extended families or long-term friends who were as close as family, an increasing number of nuclear families were striking out on their own as our society was becoming more mobile. And the age of media stars and media influence was upon us.

"Today," he says, "we see those trends in extreme. Vast numbers of boys are being raised in single-parent households without a male role model. Extended family is rarely nearby, and also might not include any male role models. And, considering the widespread influence of various media and media stars-TV, movies, professional sports, video games, the Internet, etc.-the 'third family' today often teaches boys values that are contrary to what their parents want them to learn.

"Family and community systems that once guided boys have been replaced by vague cultural signals from media characters with whom the boys will never be personally intimate. The culture of sex and sexuality is in the faces of our adolescent boys as never before, but the boys are provided too little commensurate sexual guidance," Gurian says.

"We used to have systems set up where boys could turn to their parents or 20 other adults-including many males-who

were part of their lives. And the scariest thing today is that boys just don't have that anymore. In fact, so many boys don't have any males at all in their lives-not even dad. The statistics about what's happening to boys right now are scary" (personal interview).

The statistics Gurian refers to in A Fine Young Man include the facts that adolescent

- · significantly outnumber females in diagnoses of most conduct disorders, thought disorders, and brain disorders.
- · are significantly more likely than females to be left back a grade.
- · drop out of high school at four times the rate of adolescent females.
- · are four times more likely than adolescent females to commit suicide.

"When I put all these statistics together and saw how bleak the landscape was, it surprised even me," Gurian says. "And we can see that it's the result of not having the male system well nurtured in our culture" (personal interview).

"When boys are not well nurtured," Gurian says, "they grow into adolescents and young men who take out their frustrations on their families and others. The result can be chaos and violence in the home and on the street—a result that shows up more and more often in the daily headlines."

Gurian first became aware of the severity of the problem when he started tracking gang violence in 1983.

"At that time, the message didn't get through to the general public-because that violence was affecting mainly black males," Gurian says. And as long as the majority didn't feel the problem was theirs, it was ignored. "And then Jonesboro happened. And now we are absolutely waking up.'

"Jonesboro" refers to the March 1998 shooting death of four students and one teacher at Westside Middle School in Jonesboro, Arkansas. Two boys, ages 12 and 14, were found guilty of the murders.

Gurian says that, after Jonesboro, he started hearing boys' violence being addressed as a major national crisis. People began to genuinely question what could cause this behavior, instead of just shaking their heads and feeling powerless.

That "sea change" in attitude, as Gurian describes it, is a big step in the right direction. Because in order to help our boys-in order to give them the chance to grow into fine young men-we have to understand what makes them tick.

To Gurian, the answer begins with biol-

Biological reality is the fact that boys have one type of brain, and girls have another. That doesn't mean that one brain type is inherently better than the other overall; they are just different. But if we ignore that difference, we will never be able to understand who our boys are and what they really need from

Gurian says that brain researchers have identified seven structural differences between the male and female brain that lead directly to the following behavioral differences: 1) Males do better on average than females in spatial tasks; 2) Girls in general do better in reading than boys; 3) Females are more verbally oriented than males, in general; 4) Males are more single-task oriented than females, in general; 5) Females are usually more successful at accomplishing a variety of tasks at once than males; 6) Females are able to more accurately identify the emotions on another person's face than males.

And then there's testosterone.

Although both males and females produce the sex hormone testosterone, by the end of puberty boys produce more than 20 times as much testosterone as girls, and it is released into their bodies in five to seven surges each day. On average, testosterone is responsible for males having greater muscle mass, a higher sex drive, and higher levels of aggression than females. (It's important to note that aggression, not violence, is a natural result of testosterone production. Violence can result if that natural aggression isn't dealt with appropriately. But violence is not a "natural" tendency for boys.)

Testosterone causes boys to become tense easily, and to need a release for that tension. It causes them to want to solve problems quickly, even complex problems that require time and effort. And when they can't find that quick answer, that quick release, that testosterone drive causes their frustration.

Abundant contemporary examples show us that none of these biologically-based differences is so overwhelmingly significant that society should lock individual males and females into certain vocations and professions-or bar them from others. "What these biological differences do mean," Gurian says, "is very simply that our boys are fundamentally different than our girls. Yet we have been ignoring those differences for decades."

Instead of working to give boys healthy outlets for their natural tendencies toward aggression and competition, we have either ignored those needs or actively encouraged boys to stifle them. Instead of recognizing that our older boys might find it inherently difficult to understand their girlfriends' emotions, we berate them and tell them they're insensitive rather than help them to learn better communication. In general, our culture's message to our boys is that there's something

wrong with them.

So what is it exactly that our boys need? What can we do to help them grow to their full and uniquely male potential?

"First," Gurian says, "and perhaps most importantly, we need to respect the male way of doing things, and show our boys that we value those ways."

For example, our society values the female model of nurturing-compassionate conversation, shared thoughts and feelings, and tender hugs. Rarely do we give equal validity to the male model of nurturing-a model that involves competition and testing.

"Competition, for boys, is a form of nurturing behavior. They have formed cultural constructs in which to gain self-image through this strategy," Gurian says. "Nurtured competition is crucial to male development and self-image. Boys must find ways to compete and see themselves as performing well" (pp. 20, 39, The Wonder of Boys).

And second, in order to help boys attain their own unique potential, we need to provide them with a support system. They need: male role models and male mentors: experiences that connect them with the natural world; a healthy competitive outlet; the physical, mental, and emotional skills they need to become a healthy adult; and an opportunity to develop a sense of purpose and mission.

In many parts of the world, societies still recognize and meet these male needs. As examples, Gurian cites the Shavante people of Brazil, who purposefully teach their preadolescent and adolescent boys the skills of hunting, the rules of conduct for relationships with females, the appropriate way to interact with elders, and how to become independent from their mothers and even their entire village. He also cites Jews of every country who help their sons through the years of study and preparation for their bar mitzvah, the rite of passage from childhood to adulthood in their community.

"But in general," Gurian says, "American society has turned away from meeting those basic needs of male development.

"Our males used to seek a depth of relationship with nature, in which they learned not only to hunt the fruits of nature, but to transform the relationships between man and nature into emotional and physical nurturance for whole communities. They have little time for this direct contact with nature's divinity now," Gurian says (p. 37, A Fine Young Man). "But perhaps the biggest mistake our culture has made in its history has been its forgetfulness of the essentiality of both the father and the male role model" (p. 44, The Wonder of Boys).

"And that," Gurian says, "is where scouting comes in. Scouting—along with some church groups, and local and national mentoring programs such as Big Brothers—is one of the few institutions that parents and boys can count on now to fulfill that mission of the 'third family."

"[Scouting programs provide] boys a way to build self-esteem with male mentors in a safe and nurturing environment," says Gurian. "I just don't think you can beat [a scouting program] for that" (personal interview).

In addition, scouting stresses that all-important concept of

"Honor and honor codes are essential to boys and men," Gurian says. "Boys develop personal codes of honor, and they are sponge-like in the absorption of codes of honor suggested to them by their nurturing systems. They watch their parents' honor codes like hawks. The word 'honor' must be revitalized in our human conversation if we are to fully develop our boys into men."

According to Michael Gurian, the Boy Scouts program fulfills seven important needs of growing boys in the following ways:

Goal setting: The program of merit badges teaches boys how to set goals and work methodically toward accomplishing them, and provides an opportunity for achievement and recognition.

A healthy hierarchy: Boys like a hierarchical system, one in which their position is clear to them. Scouting provides that type of emotionally healthy hierarchy.

Mentoring: Boys hunger for male heroes to emulate. Scouting provides both adult male mentoring and healthy peer mentoring.

An experience of nature: For boys, nature is a living organism, and boys need to bond with that natural life. Boy Scout camping takes them out of the cities into that natural environment.

Spiritual development: Boys must have a spiritual language within which to understand concepts such as character and moral development. A Scout leader who is a devout person offers, but doesn't push, that spiritual language.

Character development: There aren't a lot of places these days that just come right out and say that they're about character development. Through Boy Scouts, boys hear the message that character counts.

Discipline: The discipline that is provided by the structure of scouting helps boys build their own self-discipline.

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The national Royal Rangers Office now offers an audio and video series on outreach ministry, which deal with

allas Metro Royal Rangers Outpost 557 of the North Texas District Council of the Assemblies of God was founded in 1997.



Since Dallas Metro was operating out of its former location on Oak Lawn Avenue (now the Peoples Church of the Assemblies of God), it was decided to



delay the starting of the outpost until we settled into our present location of Ft. Worth Avenue. It is also believed by Commander Baumann that the Metro director wanted to see empirical proof that once this outpost was started, it would continue and not be dissolved at an early stage and preferably go on until Jesus comes to take us all home. Commander Baumann's tenacity, along with the Master Ranger on our side, allowed Dallas Metro Outpost 557 to hold its first meeting on 12 September 1997. Our charter boys included: Senior Guide Carlos Castillo; Eagle Patrol Guide Marcos Rodriquez; Ameroan Beard, Willie Beard, Jorge Gutierrez, Enrique Rodriquez, and Le Roy Rodriguez. The charter meeting included Commander Clay Wallace as outpost chaplain, Commander Philip Pacheco as assistant senior commander and Commander John J. Baumann as senior commander. Since then, the Lord has blessed our outpost with new leaders. They include Commander Ronnie Nelson, Metro's chief information officer; Commander Elijah Chavez, and Commander John Stanley.

Bryan Matthew Wagner, Royal Rangers commander, youth pastor, and dedicated Christian, was born August 10, 1973, and passed on to glory unexpectedly on January 15, 2000. He joined Royal Rangers outpost 188 of Mount Zion Fellowship, Poway, California, as a Pioneer commander in 1993. He later became our Trail Rangers commander. He loved working with the boys and even after being appointed youth pastor of our church, he wanted to continue as a Royal Rangers leader.

In the city of Chicago, one cold, dark night, a blizzard was setting in. A little boy was selling newspapers on the corner. People were moving inside and out of the cold. The little boy was so cold that he wasn't trying to sell many papers. With that response, the lady opened the Bible to John 3:16 and began to explain about Jesus. Right there in front of that big, old fireplace, the young boy gave his heart and life to Jesus. He sat there and thought, John 3:16...I don't understand it, but it sure makes a lost boy feel safe.

You know, I must confess I don't understand it either, how God would be willing to send His Son to die for me, and how Jesus would agree to do such a thing. But it sure does make life worth living.

John 3:16-18: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved. He that believeth on him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God" (KJV).

If you aren't ashamed to do this, please follow the directions. Jesus said, "Whoever is ashamed of Me...of him the Son of Man also will be ashamed when He comes in the glory of His Father" (Mark 8:38, NKJV).





FCF (African) BEADS

HISTORY: Before metal was pounded into the first coin, beads were used as money. The African continent was one of the early sources of beads. To signify relative wealth of the individual, beads were used as trade items. Often Indians would trade for the beads with staples that the mountain man needed. Today beads come in many forms; glass, plastic, wood, metal, etc., but their value remains strong. Beads are still considered valuable and beautiful, and it is very common to see FCFers adorned with beaded necklaces.

MATERIALS:

- Colored construction paper or brown paper bag
- Glue
- Toothpicks
- Ruler
- Markers
- Sinew, yarn, or string
- Scissors
- Pencil or pen

INSTRUCTIONS:

Figure 1:

Cut a piece of paper into a square. Mark the top edge of the paper in 2-inch increments. Mark the bottom edge in 2-inch increments, but make the first mark 1 inch from the edge.

Figure 2:

Draw lines as shown in order to form skinny, long, isosceles triangles. Now cut along the lines. You may need to repeat this process on two or three sheets of paper to make enough beads.

Figure 3:

Before rolling up the triangles you may wish to color the edges or make designs on the triangles. You won't know the results until after you roll up the paper, but it will be fun to see the results. Take a toothpick and roll the triangle tightly around the toothpick.


Figure 4:

Put a small dab of glue on the tip and hold it onto the new bead for about 30 seconds. This might be a good time to paint or color the new bead.

Figure 5:

Remove the toothpick from the rolled bead. To add shine to the bead you may want to make a glue and water mix and brush the entire bead with the mixture, except for the holes on either side of the bead. Now thread the beads with the sinew or string and tie the string with a square knot. You now have a nice looking necklace to use in the outpost meeting.

CONCLUSION: Each necklace can and should be unique. Plastic or glass beads can be added. Likewise, the width and style of paper, magazines, etc., can be used to make a very different or unique necklace. It is always important to experiment, as was true of the early mountain men. It was not uncommon for a mountain man to have a mixture of Indian clothing, accoutrements, and decorations based on his ability to make or trade for each item unique to him and his needs.

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rude oil is the second most common liquid on earth. Water is first. When exposed to sunlight, crude oil turns into pitch, a sticky tar like substance. God instructed Noah to dab his ark within and without with pitch. The use of pitch, which was probably tar from crude oil, made the ark waterproof.

Crude oil had few uses. Ambitious salesmen sold the foul smelling stuff as medicine. It tasted so awful it had to be good!

In the late 1850s, chemists learned how to make fuel, called kerosene, from crude oil. It replaced the more expensive whale oil in lamps.



Edwin L. Drake, a retired railroad conductor, believed he could pump oil from below ground. Drake began drilling in June 1859, near the small town of Titusville, Pennsylvania. People called the project Drake's folly. Two months later, Drake struck oil at a depth of 69.5 feet.

The value of crude oil grew because it became the source of fuel for automobiles. People called it black gold.

One hundred gallons of crude oil can make about 50 gallons of gasoline. Oil companies turn the other 50 gallons into many useful products such as heating oil, lubricating oils, and greases. Petroleum jelly, is better

known by the brand name of Vaseline. People rub it on dry skin and chapped lips as an ointment.

Paraffin wax is a milky white solid. Candles have a cotton wick surrounded by paraffin. When the wick is lighted, the paraffin burns and gives light.

The paving material asphalt is what remains when everything else is removed from crude oil. When pitch bakes in the sun, it changes into asphalt.

Petroleum is conveniently located for use by mankind. This is one evidence of how God provides for us. If it were deeper, recovering the oil

would be nearly impossible. If it were located less deeply than it is, and found its way to the surface, it would turn into hard asphalt. God is a loving Father; He provides us with the oil we need for cooking, motor heating, fuel, and other everyday products.

This is because of the standard of excellence that Brother Crabtree has by his involvement, encouragement, and support set for the Royal Rangers," says Jim Barger, regional coordinator for the Great Lakes Region and president of the National Royal Rangers Council.

"This standard covers not only programs and events, but facilities as well. Ohio is currently constructing a district Royal Rangers facility that is second to none. Again, this has come into being because of Brother Crabtree's vision. Around the nation he is recognized as a district superintendent that is involved, that cares, and that supports the ministry of Royal Rangers."

An Inspiration for Leaders

District Commander Harry Hunt, who oversees Ohio's Royal Rangers ministry's 800 leaders, 3,500 boys, and 140 chartered outposts, says Crabtree has been a role model for leaders there. The superintendent's decision to complete the LTC, Hunt says, has had a positive impact on the state's Rangers ministry.

"We train anywhere from 95 to 130 leaders a year. We have a (LTC) completion rate of 92 percent. That's very high," he says. "It makes all the difference having a superintendent that's been through that. You have a real assurance of his support."

Hunt, district leader since 1988, continues: "Training is actually the foundation of the Royal Rangers ministry. Without trained commanders, the ministry can't properly function."

Crabtree sees other benefits for completion of the LTC program. "You've got to know the Scriptures. Also, it teaches men to be Christian witnesses and good models," he says. "I think the Royal Rangers program is about equally important to men as it is to boys."

Barger, who was honored to present Crabtree with his Leaders Medal of Achievement, says that by taking the LTC, the superintendent was "making a statement to not only our men, but to our pastors, saying, 'Hey, this is important. You need to do this. Reaching, teaching, and keeping boys for Christ is a priority.'"

Barger and Hunt agree that Crabtree's FCF membership is also a boost to Ohio's leaders and boys.

"He's gained a lot of respect; they take a lot of pride in that," Hunt says.

"Joining FCF," Barger says, "was a major feat for a district superintendent and another statement to leaders. Crabtree was saying to the men, 'I'm one of you. I got here just like you did. I know where you're coming from. I have empathy for your calling."

Rangers Facility

Hunt said that the lodge at Heartland Conference Retreat Center is being constructed on property the district purchased about 4 years ago.

The building (which will include room to sleep 56, a main conference room, four breakaway rooms, a kitchen, and baths) will be used for youth camps, family camps, and district, regional, and national Royal Rangers training and activities. Outside there will be a high ropes course, low ropes course, and BMX and mountain bike tracks.

"It'll be worth over a million dollars. We aren't spending that much. We're doing some of the work ourselves," the superintendent says.

The project is being funded by the district, but "the Royal Rangers have been part of the fund-raising," he says.

"The Spirit of Royal Rangers"

Crabtree says being involved with the Royal Rangers of his district has been a blessing. The district Rangers leaders, he says, "have become a very special support group for me. We have a strong fraternal relationship. They're a special prayer group.


"They don't require anything of me, they just want to serve. They've given me my uniform, they gave me my FCF and that's money. They just give and give. The spirit of Royal Rangers is giving. The giving extends to other district ministries and local churches,"


"I see them building a tremendous network of lay leaders. Many of them are board members or serve in other local church positions. They're involved in missions projects. They get involved with Light for the Lost and they're really encouraging the boys to give. I think that's a sign of their willingness to cooperate outside of their own organization. In churches," he says, "Rangers leaders are committed.

"They are usually strong supporters of the pastors and their churches. They are givers. Pastors who know how to work with Royal Rangers really benefit."

As superintendent, he's seen firsthand how the program and its Scripture-based teaching have touched boys. He says that some are now ministers.

"Here's something that excites me. I read all the files of credential applicants; I'm looking to see why a person feels called to be in ministry," he says. "There are some of them who felt called at a Pow Wow or at an outpost meeting. That's really powerful."


"You see all these people?"

hock waves swept the sports world when 1988 Olympics officials denied the Gold Medal to Canadian track superstar Ben Johnson. But the verdict stood, because Tests showed he had injected anabolic steroids into his body. But believe it or not, some athletes and nonathletes alike still persist in taking anabolic steroids. And it's not only the college football player or professional weight lifter that makes the big mistake of using them. According to results of a study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association, an estimated 50,000 students in American high schools are using anabolic steroids.

Many teenagers think steroids will enhance their self-image. Some use the drug because they feel insecure about their appearance. Others hate their skinny bodies. Young people who use steroids desire to look, perform, and feel better—at almost any cost. They ignore or deny warnings about health risks. Some teenagers just want to see if "those things" really work. They want to believe in the power of the drug. Of

course, they don't realize the very real dangers.

Do you know what anabolic means? The word means "growing or building." Anabolic steroids are artificial testosterone, a natural made hormone. These steroids usually come in pill form, but sometimes people inject them into their bodies. Only relatively recently have people become aware of the serious side effects these steroids can cause. The most alarming is a chance of contracting AIDS. You can transmit HIV if shared needles are used to inject the drug.

Steroid use is illegal. Users acquire these drugs through criminal channels, and many of the supplies may be contaminated. In 1988, Congress passed the Anti-Drug Abuse Act, making the distribution or possession of anabolic steroids for nonmedical reasons a federal offense. Unlawful distribution and possession with intent to distribute anabolic steroids is a federal crime, punishable by up to 5 years in prison.

The medical field does approve anabolic steroids for use in treating diseases like anemia, osteoporosis, and certain cancers. Medical authorities know what to expect from the label dosage and they administer accordingly. Still, as with any drug or hormone, there are risks; and for medical use the risks and side effects are carefully monitored to ensure they are minimal.

When people take anabolic steroids that are not prescribed by a physician, they end up playing a dangerous game. As anabolic steroids enter the body, they signal a stop to the natural male hormone testosterone. As a result, steroids can halt growth prematurely in adolescents. Even a small dose can cause this effect. Anabolic steroids cause bone ends to close off early, so users can end up a lot shorter in height. Another major effect is hair loss. Loss of hair from the top of the head might result, and hair can start growing in other areas — such as out the ears and nose.

Besides shortened height and hair loss, there are many other responses to anabolic steroids. Short-term reactions include: nausea, vomiting, severe acne, premature balding, dizziness, chills, drowsiness, muscle tremors, bloating associated with water retention, and greasy skin. These are all effects that may or may not be very serious. Long-term steroid abusers can experience fever, fast heart rate, slowed heart rate, bloody diarrhea, seizure-like movements, lowered blood pressure, breathing difficulty, breathing cessation, blood clots, cardiovascular problems, liver disease, cancer, heart attack, stroke, or death.

Women who use anabolic steroids tend to develop some male characteristics, such as permanent thickening of the vocal cords, facial hair growth, and decrease in breast size. These changes are irreversible!

Anabolic steroids can also affect reproductive organs in both males and females. In female steroid users the damage makes it impossible for most users to have children. In males sperm levels will drop and testicles will shrink, resulting in sexual dysfunction.

Psychological as well as physical effects come from steroid use. Users can become uncontrollably aggressive, even with persons they love. When users try to stop taking the drug, they can experience "roid rages." This means the person blows up or "loses it" for no reason at all. One 16-year-old boy (he later took his life after trying to go off steroids) startled his mother one day while driving her to the store. At a stoplight the car behind them tapped the bumper. The boy flew into a rage; he jumped out of the car and lit into the other driver. His mother had never seen him act like that before. His family wasn't aware of psychological effects that could occur as a result of going off steroids.

When athletes and nonathletes alike try to stop taking the drug, they get deeply depressed. Paranoia and anxiety usually set in. Since athletes strive for bigger, more muscular bodies through anabolic steroids, they often feel a sort of "reverse anorexia," always seeing their bodies as small and weak regardless of actual size. Many former steroid abusers attempt suicide. And, of course, many succeed. When trying to go off anabolic steroids, the person should be under a doctor's supervision. In fact, many doctors will insist on hospitalization.

"Steroids belong in the garbage, not in your body," says Dr. Bob Goldman of Chicago, an international expert on steroids. "Your body is your future, and you

should take good care of it."

In a survey Goldman conducted, more that 100 top athletes were asked if they would be willing to take a magic drug that would allow them to win every sporting event they chose to compete in, but would then kill them 5 years after they began to take the drug. Shockingly, 52 percent of the athletes he surveyed said yes.

If you are an athlete, think of how ridiculous it is to engage in something that might result in your death. Then too, your tendons could rip free from their skeletal system because of overgrowth of the muscles. And weight lifters can elevate their blood pressure so high that blood will run from their noses, eyes, and ears when they

Some athletes imagine that anabolic steroids might have a reputation for turning a wimp into a winner or a runt into a hulk, but the truth shows it takes a lot more to make a star athlete. Athletic power depends not only on strength and endurance, but on skill and mental ability. Also important are a good diet, rest, overall mental and physical health, and genes. Any responsible athlete will want to work out naturally.

Athletes can produce athletic excellence without reliance on dangerous drugs. You can develop into a winner athletically and socially without harming your health. You can derive a mental edge for sports without putting drugs of any kind into your body. Athletes on steroids never really experience the good things they can learn from sports. One of these things is how to lose. Winning is great, but competing is even better. Remember, it's the whole process of athletics that counts. There is actually more than winning! By using steroids in athletics, you doubly cheat yourself. If you can't do something without cheating, why do it?

Remember, the key to this problem is never to start doing these dangerous drugs. Steroids don't work out as an alternative for someone who "won't work out." They are not worth the danger.




