New Screening Guidelines for Prostate Cancer: The Hope Health Letter, produced by the Hope Heart Institute, reported in its September 1993 newletter:

"Men over age 40 with no prostate symptoms should have an annual digital rectal exam to screen for prostate cancer," states the publication, which reported on the American Cancer Society recommendations. "Men over age 50 should have an annual digital rectal exam and a prostate-specific antigen (PSA) test.

"...Prostate cancer is the second most common cancer in men (lung cancer is No. 1). This year, about 35,000 American men will die of this cancer."

Recycling Throw-away Kids

I viewed the television news magazine in a state of sadness, even horror. Portrayed on the screen was an endless chain of latchkey children, failed families, misplaced priorities, skewed values, and "throw-away kids."

What an awful term: "throw-away kids"! Could it actually be that just as spent cola cans are tossed into the trash bin, some persons in our society have reached a comfort level with "disposing" of America's children

when "it doesn't work out?"

Concurrent with my shock and dismay was the reminder of the unique relationship between churches and the youth-serving agencies that offer a "recycling" program for children, youth, and families. Linking the church's message of hope with concerned leaders is a solution that cannot be ignored. Once individuals are grounded in faith and prepared for living—spiritually, mentally, socially, and physically—it is inconceivable that anyone could entertain the idea of "throw-away kids." Like the spaghetti sauce commercial touting the ingredients, we can say with assurance of the church/youth serving agency mix that whatever the needed ingredient ... "it's in there!"
