# **Eight Rangers Awarded** National Honor

ight Royal Rangers traveled to Missouri in July to attend the 2000 ✓ National Rendezvous, in which about 1,000 members of the Frontiersmen Camping Fellowship attended. Though the event itself was grand and worth the travel from across the nation, they had come for even another motive: to receive special recognition during the Rendezvous as the 2000 National Royal Rangers of the Year.

The eight regional finalists were named National Royal Ranger of the Year on July 18 during the morning service at the National Rendezvous. They were presented one of the highest and most prestigious awards known to Royal Rangers.


The national Royal Ranger of the Year award goes to those who win their outpost, sectional, district, and regional competitions. This follows months of rigorous competition among hundreds of Royal Rangers, with only eight receiving the top award.

The winners of the 2000 National Royal Rangers of the Year competition, listed by region, are as follows: Jonathan Wolfson, Great Lakes; Benjamin T. Barnett, Gulf; Matthew D. Brown, North

Central; Jason Beall, Northeast; Neal J. Bradshaw, Northwest; Joshua B. Johnson, South Central; Christopher M. Privette, and Jeremy Schaefer, Southeast; Southwest.

Jonathan Wolfson, of Calvary Church in Naperville, Ill., is age 16. Benjamin Barnett, of Farragut Assembly in Knoxville, Tenn, is age 18. Matthew Brown, of Maple Grove Assembly in Maple Grove, Minn., is age 17. Jason Beall, of Worship Center in Lancaster, Penn., is age 17. Neal Bradshaw, of World Outreach in Boise, Idaho, is age 16. Joshua Johnson, of Glad Tidings Assembly in Altus, Okla., is age 15. Christopher Privette, of Green Acres Assembly in Sumter, S.C., is age 17. Jeremy Schaefer, of Central Assembly in El Sobrante, Calif., is age 18.

As national winners each Royal Ranger will serve as an honorary member of the National Royal Rangers Council for 1 year and will serve as a volunteer member of the national staff. Each will also have opportunity to travel within his region for special speaking engagements at various Royal Rangers functions.


### **UPCOMING EVENTS**

bout 1,000 members of the Frontiersmen Camping Fellowship made way to Eagle Rock, Mo., to participate in the grand National Rendezvous, July 17-21. We endured the heat and even a storm with 70-milean-hour winds, which destroyed several lodges the FCF'ers

had set up. And though we faced the spiritual opposition ever witnessed at a National Rendezvous, the fresh Spirit of God did mightily move. Several Young Bucks and Old-timers alike renewed their walk with God. Numerous Young Bucks were called into ministry.

The Rendezvous gathered members from across the nation to present a great spiritual awakening. Each day began with a morning devotional and ended with an evening service. Special speakers for the

Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your old men will dream dreams, your young men will see visions." ### THE COMMANDERS OF

Unlike the 70's and 80's, there are more and more of us who have seen all sides of the program —as boys and now as commanders... and fathers. I have many commanders in my own "Book of Heroes," and I must admit that to see some of my Pioneers now wearing commander's bars, oak leaf bars, or in other forms of full time ministry gives me great pride. But I'll be most proud when the 'roll is called up yonder," and they'll be there!

The one commander I cannot shake is the very first commander I had back in 1973 as a Pioneer. He now happens to be my father-inlaw. My brother-in-law was one of my highest achieving Pioneers in the 80's and who wore commander's bars-long before I ever met and married his sister.

Rangers is my family bloodline, and it won't wash out. Now my own boys—ages 8 and 10-are infected with "Ranger itus." Their current hero is their old commander, Simon Tanner (Rick Dostal)-no better an example to my boys than that. Of course, he's pretty high up on my list too!

Perhaps this note will prompt others to take a moment to reflect on their past and to pick out those who've made the impressions that formed their lives.

Martin ("Lil' Green Frog") Kelly: The senior commander who talked me out of quitting Rangers at 17. His favorite quote was always, "Don't up give on Rangers until you've tried JLTC." Never have I had a commander beg me to go to a camp until Martin worked me over about JLTC; it changed my life and put Rangers in my blood to stay.

Gary Marentis: He is the Trailblazers/Trail Rangers commander who spent hundreds of his personal hours working with me to make sure I could earn every award my vest holds. His favorite quote was always: "What do you mean you didn't have time? Did you sleep?" And here's his other: "Why stand ye thar gazing? Get to work!'

Kent ("Tall Eagle") Teeters: Ken was once my district commander. He took me under his wing and treated me better than I deserved. My favorite quote of Kent's, when he would walk into my campsite to see me working on something, was, "Do you understand all you know about what you're doing?" His son, Doug ("Tall Turkey') Teeters, and I used to hang out together with Duane ("Chili Raccoon") Velos at Traces and Pow Wows-loads of pranks and fun!

Cat ("Big Chief") Velos: He was a mentor, father figure, and a man who understood the heart of a confused 16-year-old boy. He has one of the biggest hearts there is! His favorite quote is too long to tell, but suffice it to say I still tell his eagle story to this day. It was he and Kent Teeters who inspired my love for bald eagles.

Ken Moran: He's the man who ensured that I knew his name was not spelled "moron" during my first JLTC. He was the mentor who helped guide my ministry and who always knew how to discern God's voice—and who wasn't afraid to lay it on the line with me.

Dwane Truman: He was a former divisional commander who ensured I understood that my age didn't matter-that I could make a difference, even though I was young.

Pat Rielly: The man's smile—through his thick beard-will melt the heart of the most hardened person. If you want to know about a commander who understands unconditional love, that would be ol' Bearwaller!

> Rick Dostal: This man actually put up with me in his outpost, even through my hectic schedules, personal pains and troubles, the hard times I faced in marriage, and child rear-

ing days. He was always there with a smile, a shoulder, and some type of varmint on the spit to fill my belly.

Bob ("Screemin" Eagle") Chapman: He was the district FCF president when I was but a "mere varmint" in the old FCF initiation ways. He's the one who donned me "Parson" with

the FCF parson's hat that I wear any time I speak at an FCF function. My "preachin' hat" was one of his favorite hats that I hounded him about my entire time as a Young Buck. After I did some time in college, I was elected the first district FCF parson in NCN at the Territorial Rendezvous that year. He called me over to his lodge and took off his parson's hat and put it on me saying: "Here now; your the parson after all." It fell down over my ears! I promptly stuffed it full of "mountain money" (toilet paper) and wore it with great pride. I still get a lump in my throat, thinking of that moment.—though my head is much thicker now, so I don't need the tissue stuffing any more.

Rich Mariott, our new national commander: He was my divisional commander back when I was 14 years old. Then, when I was a Young Buck, he served as my district FCF president. Later he served as my district commander... and now as the national commander! 'Nuff said. He's risen to the top of the pile by God's grace, but no better man for the job. His vision is inspiring, and his dedication is unwavering. He has a tremendous love for the lives of boys.

There are many more great men I could name, but I'll save those for the book I'll probably never get around to writing. Thank the Lord for all the godly commanders in my life. Rangers is my life, but more importantly... it was the tool God used to keep me in the Kingdom. Blessings on y'all!

revise the entire Royal Rangers program. Throughout the new material forthcoming in 2002, we will be introducing a new cartoon


character, which will become the central character used in relating to and teaching the boys. The cartoon character prototype has been drawn and will be introduced as Buzz Beaver. Curriculum development

Ranger Kids writing assignments have been given out. Brian Hendrickson is working with his Ranger Kids resource members on curriculum development.


Discovery Rangers and Adventure Rangers writing assignments have been given out by Mike Laliberty, who is working with his resource members on the curriculum development.
