One of the most interesting things in Royal Rangers is the advanced awards. The awards which have really stood out to me are the Bible, Camping, Canoeing, Christian Service, Church, First-aid Physical Fitness and the Wilderness Survival awards. All the awards are good, but I feel the ones which help boys the most are the Bible award, Christian Service award, and the Church award.

I owe a lot to Royal Rangers and to my outpost commanders who have shown such an interest in us boys.
