Prior to his superannuation in 1949, he pastored churches in Alberta, Michigan, Wisconsin, and California. He pioneered churches in Yakima, Wash., Helena, Mont., and Hebron, N. Dak. He also did evangelistic work.

He is survived by his wife Lillian and two daughters (Janet, wife of retired pastor H. K. Richardson, Stanwood, Wash. and Orpha, wife of Pastor J. A. Benney, Red Bluff, Calif.).

Mia O. Gustafson, 73, of Eugene, Oreg., passed away September 14, 1970.

Ordained in 1927, Mrs. Gustafson served as assistant pastor with her husband, Carl J.

Gustafson, for 42 years. Their pastorates were in Washington, Montana, and Oregon.

Sister Gustafson is survived by her husband, two sons, and two daughters. A son, Philip, teaches at Northwest College of the Assemblies of God in Kirkland, Wash. A daughter, Mrs. O. C. Alexander is a missionary to Indians in San Carlos, Ariz.

Joseph J. Murphy, 76, of Tacoma, Wash., went to be with Christ September 13, 1970.
