#### ... IN ELA

INTEREST in the ministry of Evangelism Literature for America has produced a most gratifying growth.

In January an ELA literature project to provide new Indian-designed tracts to win American Indians was introduced. Within 3 months \$15,000 was pledged for the project.

More than 10 million pieces of ELA literature have been distributed since the Men's Department became responsible for this literature ministry.

ELA now has 40 different evangelistic and follow-up pieces of literature in use.

#### ... IN LIGHT-FOR-THE-LOST

MISSIONARY-EVANGELIST R. E. Jeffery wrote recently: "I have never personally worked in an area month after month that was as hard and difficult as Quito, Ecuador. Through Light-for-the-Lost we received \$3,000 for the literature needs. Every dime was spent on literature that met the need. In 4 months the church was averaging between 600 and 700 in attendance. Without LFTL we would not have this report to give."

Kenneth Weigel, missionary to India, writes: "We will never know how many have been blessed because of Light-for-the-Lost and the assistance it gives us each year. We do know that 45,906 enrolled in ICI

courses in 1973. Without the help of LFTL we would face serious difficulties."

More than a half million dollars was raised in 1973 by Light-for-the-Lost, reflecting considerable growth over previous years. The goal for this year is \$800,000, and present response indicates this will be achieved.

To support the fund-raising program, more than 700 men now hold membership in the National Council of LFTL. Funds for approved literature projects are provided to all Assemblies of God mission fields overseas.

The annual LFTL Day project has significantly assisted the target cities where great demands for evangelistic literature have been made. In each of these cities the literature has been used in conjunction with a Good News Crusade.

#### ... IN ROYAL RANGERS

RECENTLY a newly saved young man became anxious to work for Jesus Christ.

Fortunately he attended an Assembly of God that had a Royal Rangers outpost. An appeal for men to help was made in a church service, and he responded.

Immediately he was enrolled in a Royal Rangers leadership training course and began assisting in the weekly outpost meetings.

When he completes the basic training, eight regional National Training Camps and five National Training Trails will be available to him. Last year 265 men from 40 districts attended the National Training Camps, and 93 men attended the National Training Trails.

Two additional training experiences are now available to Royal Rangers leaders: the National Canoe Expedition in the Canada-Minnesota boundary waters, and the Advanced National Training Camp.

Royal Rangers is developing men and reaching boys.
