Brother Barnes is an instructor-trainer for ARC and certifies a large number of first-aid instructors at Royal Rangers Advanced National Training

Camps. Both he and Paul Stanek are recognized by the American Heart Association as instructor-trainers for heart massage.

The American Red Cross recently developed a new training program for cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) or heart massage. The new CPR training program will be incorporated also at Royal Rangers training camps.

Following his visit to the National ARC office, Commander Barnes announced that Red Cross CPR training will be made available at the next Advanced National Leadership Training camp at Marshfield, Mo., in September 1975.

Some 100 Royal Rangers leaders from across the nation are expected to attend this camp.
