Share the light continued

about your ministry as a member of the Christian team.

4. Determine the needs and opportunities (Galatians 6:10). List these needs of the Body and the community. Speak to your pastor or other leaders of the church about the needs they know about. Hurts of the community can also be found by searching the local newspapers.

5. Inventory your interests, abilities, talents, and past involvements. After you have completed the survey, pray and ask God for divine direction to meet the needs of others.


6. Match your abilities and interests with the needs and opportunities. Even if you're not sure about ability, reach out in love. Be a doeract. Love is an action word. Start! Go

in praver!

7. Give reports of the ministry. Share with someone about your opportunities in ministry. Of course, you can minister without public credit or recognition; but if your caring and serving is through the church, you should give an account to those overseeing this ministry. Pass along the exciting things God has helped you to do. It will inspire others.

One of the great discoveries of the church is that all members are needed. The joy of belonging to Christ is in giving. "His lord said unto him, Well done, good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy lord" (Matthew 25:23).

Later in the service he was anxious to testify to receiving the precious baptism in the Holy Spirit around the council fire.


