5.1. Written Questions

Phan – For the President:

NIAC x CASA x SAMU

What insights did you and the VPE gain from the discussion of how to appoint Indigenous student representative? Will that be helpful for our (SAMU) work in bringing Indigenous students together?

Pres – A. The VPE and I gained valuable insights from the "NIAC Delegate One-pager" which was provided during the meeting. We also had an opportunity to ask clarifying questions. Here are some of the most important initial "Steps to Follow" discussed:

1 Learn about local Indigenous communities.

2 Consider your capacity and history of your student union.

3 Consult local indigenous leadership (In SAMU's case, kihêw waciston)

B. Yes, insights gained from the meeting will undoubtedly help with our advocacy efforts as it relates to NIAC. Meeting with NIAC's leadership and learning about the importance of ensuring Indigenous self-determination ensures that local Indigenous communities are properly represented.

SAMU + MacEwan: Exec meeting

1 Could you provide more details on how the update on Spring, Summer, and Fall terms will affect students?

Pres - Dr. Craig Monk (Provost and Vice-President, Academic) provided an update on enrollment numbers. The student experience is only be impacted when enrollment targets are not reached. However, as per the last update, targets are being met. From a high-level perspective, there is no significant impact on the current student experience.

2 Is the \$15k Food Pantry Donation result from the negotiation effort of last year?

Pres - The donation did not stem from negotiations. It was a result of last year's advocacy efforts and partnership with MacEwan. During a "SAMU + MacEwan: Exec Meeting," MacEwan was informed of challenges with the pantry. As a result, different departments did food drives, donation drives, and SAMU received the recent \$15K donation.

CASA Policy and Strategy Conference

1 What were the situations that lead AUSU to ask SAMU's president to represent them during the conference? How does this impact your ability to represent SAMU's voice at the same time?

Pres – A. AT CASA, VPEs serve are Primary Delegates and Presidents serve as Secondary Delegates. Primary Delegates have voting rights, while Secondary Delegates do not. The role of Secondary Delegates during Plenary is to support their VPE and to act on behalf of their respective institutions in the event that their Primary Delegate is unable to participate. AUSU's VPE, Manmeet Kaur, hold a position at CASA's Board of Directors and thus represents CASA's interests. AUSU's President Naju Syed therefore serves as AUSU's Primary Delegate and represents AUSU's interests.

AUSU's President has a scheduling conflict with the conference date. In the interest of amplifying the collective voice, SAMU continually fosters positive relationships with other Students' Associations. AUSU asking me to represent them, rather than asking a different delegate, reflects SAMU's success in bullet 2.3 (Continue to build collaborative relationships with other Students' Associations and organizations to enhance the collective student voice with all government levels) of SAMU's Strategic Plan.

At the conference, two Plenaries were held. At the Opening Plenary held on the first day of the conference, the SAMU's VPE was unable to attend due to flight delays. Therefore, I served as the Primary Delegate on behalf of SAMU and did not represent AUSU. My priority lies with SAMU members. On the last day of the conference, SAMU's VPE served as SAMU's Primary Delegate, while I represented AUSU. I accepted AUSU's request because their interests during plenary aligned with SAMU's interests. Therefore, representing AUSU only served to amplify SAMU's voice.

B. SAMU's voice was never hindered during the conference.

2 What are the main points that CASA members provide the Gov of Canada representatives regarding CSFAP?

Pres - CASA members highlighted the importance of the program in ensuring that students' financial needs are met. A few key challenges that were noted:

- 1. There are still plenty of students who lack adequate funding to pay for post-secondary education.
- 2. Many students are subjected to additional barriers that prevent them from accessing postsecondary education.
- 3. Students often experience difficulty repaying student loans.
- 4. Issues surrounding awareness of supports, financial literacy, and ease of access.
- 5. Lack of consultation with student leaders.

Phan – For the VP Academic:

AI2 Working group

Will the report be available for the public?

Vpa - The report will be made to the public once it is approved by the Committee for Teaching and Learning. As long as there are no addendums or errata, it may be released after October 16th.

What are some of the next steps after the AI ethics and guidelines get submitted to the Committee on Teaching and Learning?

Vpa - After approval, the working group's report will be reassessed in the following term. The reassessment will be to counter future concerns that may arise, such as ChatGPT-5, new genAlmodels, genAl detection tools, ect.

OER

I wonder if there exists positive/negative feedbacks data on the implementation of these Open Educational Resources in MacEwan?

Vpa - A positive feedback would be to inspire more sessional instructors to decide to use more OERs in their classes, which in turn could cause a cultural shift among the faculty. I'm hoping I can inspire that change at the New Faculty Orientation event later this month.

FFAC Dean - SAMU

Do you think student groups play a role in increase campus engagement between different faculties? If so, were this topic part of the discussion? If not, what possible ideas that the dean and SAMU are looking to work on?

Vpa - Yes, they do. The more we get students to move around campus the more community events

and campus services they learn that they can access. It was a topic of discussion with the Dean. We have entered talks to see if an exception could be made for nursing students so they may attend more SAMU/MacEwan Committees as members or join the Students' Council. Talks are ongoing, but the Dean of Nursing has been very proactive in addressing shared concerns and goals.

Phan – For the VP External:

Project BHG

I am excited for your project! What outreach stragedy are you doing to increase awareness about this event?

Vpe - Glad to hear that there is excitement! I hope to see you there. Utilizing SAMU's marketing resources (Online postings and physical posters) as well as utilizing partner institutions outreach capabilities, which primarily involve an email list of students have been the main outreach strategies to increase awareness for the Beaver Hills Gathering.

CASA Update

1 Out of seven recommendations, which one(s) are most likely to succeed and why do you think so?

Vpe - Thank you for your question. In a perfect world, every ask that CASA makes would come true. It is important to recognize that CASA can only recommend and advocate on behalf of students at the federal level. The final decision, and how those decisions are put forth, ultimately does reside in the hands of the government.

The first recommendation, to permanently set Canada Student Grant maximums at \$4,200 per year and maintain weekly loan maximums at \$300/week has opportunity to come to fruition as the increase was discussed by the Liberal party as a platform priority, as well, the increase to \$4200 was made this past year and student need has not decreased in that same time frame. Maintaining a level of \$4200 per year for Canada Student Grant maximums and maintaining a weekly loan maximum of \$300 per week is a feasible and realistic ask of the federal government.

2 What are the Fed government standpoints on international students' work restrictions?

International students can work up to 20 hours per week. You can work more than 1 job to make up these hours as long as you continue to mee the conditions of your study permit.

From November 15, 2022, until December 31, 2023, you can work more than 20 hours per week off campus while class is in session if you meet certain requirements: If you applied for a study permit (or extension) **on or before October 7, 2022** If you applied for a study permit extension **after October 7, 2022**.

Phan – For the VP Governance and Finance:

GovWeek Planning

How different is this year's GovWeek from prior years'? Are there any improvements you wish to work on?

Vpgf - The biggest difference for this year's GovWeek will be its pre-promotion. In other words, the marketing campaign before the event. I plan on having a stronger social media campaign to promote not only the event but the prizes that students may be able to win by attending the GovWeek events through all our social media channels. For prizing this year, students will be able to potentially win 1 of 2 \$500 tuition credit; this will hopefully incentivize students to attend the GovWeek events.

Aside from the nominations tabling, campaigning 101, and How to Build you platform, and Students Council meeting, a new event will be the Councillor Q&A held in the SAMU Lounge. This event will be the last event where students will be able to drop-by and ask a councillor any questions, and afterwards, they will receive a free Vietnamese Sub.

Phan – For the VP Student Life:

Tim Tang, Mental Health working group

From last year, I have noticed an increasing presence of mental health resources and its promotion around campus. Does the committee collect data on how it has helped students and how accessible are the resources (such as the app) to students?

VpsI - In spring 2022, the SMHWG sent out a survey titled "American College Health Association National College Health Assessment III". This was available to all MacEwan students to fill out online and they surveyed questions pertaining to the use of resources on campus through questions like:

- Have you used the current campus health center in the past 12 months?
 24% of respondents said 'yes'
- I have visited my current campus health and/or counseling center in the past 12 months
 - o 40% of respondents said 'yes'

I am not sure which 'app' you are referring to, but the work of the Student Mental Health Working Group is to collect data on how best to inform supportive resources for faculty and staff when helping struggling students.

SAMU Consult on Registrar

Strat Bullet Point (ex. 2.4, 3.4)

As a part of the procedure for the cycling of the Registrar, The VPGF and I were consulted on our perspectives and concerns for students. While we are in the preliminary stages of finding who will be the head of the Registrar, we have kept students' needs and wants at the forefront of advocacy. We highlighted the results of the past few Student Spring surveys as well as new concerns, like Sunday exams. As the search continues, we will make certain that these issues remain on the forefront.

Student Supports

Student supports provided by SAMU are responsive to unique and evolving needs

Don't Go Textbook Broke OER Event

Strat Bullet Point (3.1, 3.2)

Textbooks, tuition, and living expenses are all things that keep on increasing in price. As apart of reducing those costs we have multiple projects aimed at confronting it piecemail. The Don't Go textbook Broke Event was aimed at sharing tools and services that could drastically reduce the cost of textbook expenses for students. With the help of the Library, we highlighted several services such as the *Print on Demand* service, rentals, borrowing, e-books, and free PDFs. We had a huge amount of engagement and I am looking forward to repeating this event next term as well.

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Strat Bullet Point (3.3)

SSJOC presented some keynotes over the past year and some new goals, including cyber security, streamlining operations, and the ERP report. Due to our highlighted concerns and advocacy, we will potentially be able to avoid having two Sunday exams in the 2024/2025 fall semester. In addition, the Textbook Transparency project has been added to the ERP task list. The Textbook Transparency project is slated to be completed by Summer 2024, however, the dates may shift to shorten this timetable. Talks are ongoing with stakeholders to investigate what supports may be available to shorten the timetable

Calendar Advisory Group

Strat Bullet Point (3.1)

We discussed the possibility of a 3-year degree for certain programs. However, there are multiple angles to this consideration such as: being able to do a 3-year degree is rare due to class schedules, the amount of stress it puts on a student, and what president this sets for other degrees. These concerns were highlighted and the discussion item ended.

Roxanne Tootoosis Memorial Event

Strat Bullet Point (3.4)

As a show of solidarity, I attended a celebration of life event for the late Roxanne Tootoosis, MacEwan's Indigenous Knowledge Keeper. While I did not know her personally, her affect on or community, campus, advocacy, and relationships is still deeply felt. I am happy to see the glow of her work even though she is not with us today.

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Strat Bullet Point (3.3)

Teaching students about cheaper options for textbooks extends beyond tabling events. To ensure that the momentum of OERs continues to flow I worked with the library to produce information packages for our new sessional, new professors, and staff that are joining our community. By teaching of these options early and often we can be sure to promote savings for students by sharing this knowledge with allies in the professoriate.

Phew, what a month. While this work keeps us busy it feels so invigorating to see our projects begin to flower and then bear fruit. I am looking forward to sharing those boons with you all as the year progresses into winter then daybreak of spring.

AFN (Assembly of First Nations)

Before the summer came to an end, I had the opportunity to visit Quebec City to be a part of a National Youth Water Summit put on by the Assembly of First Nations (**AFN**). The National Youth Water Summit brought together 40 youth (18-29 years old) from varying nations from across the country to discuss the ongoing systemic & institutional issues facing Indigenous populations across the nation. Specifically, access to reliable & clean drinking water. Reliable access to clean drinking water is a daily issue of varying severity faced by any student who does not permanently reside in the city. MacEwan's very own Ponoka campus has issues acquiring reliable & clean drinking water for its students. These issues are multiplied exponentially when individuals or families who do not have institutional supports are faced with the challenges of acquiring clean & reliable drinking water.

Throughout the summit I was able to voice my thoughts and opinions effectively to ensure that Treaty 6 issues were represented. Below is a photo of the final Vision Statement (A visual note taker was present throughout the summit, below is what came out of day 2), note the Treaty 6 influence under "OUR CALL TO ACTION". "As long as the sun shines, the grass grows and the rivers flow". This is directly from Treaty 6, and I am happy to have been so involved with creating an advocacy document that intends to land on parliament hill.

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Below is additional information to further Students Council's understanding of the

mandate of the AFN and its structure.

What is the AFN?

The Assembly of First Nations is a national Aboriginal advocacy organization acting through the direction of First Nations governments and their citizens. It exists to fulfill the goal of correcting the past and current injustices committed in the founding of Canada and in the ongoing exploitation of land and resources.

The AFN is a Chiefs organization who is committed to securing the rightful position of the First Nation Peoples in Canada's future, in partnership with the provincial and federal governments, and advancing First Nations self-determination.

In addition to exercising self-determination under First Nations structures and mechanisms, the AFN exists to promote the "restoration and enhancement" of the Crown-First Nations relationship and to ensure that it is mutually beneficial to the First Nations people.

Structure of the AFN. Based on the Charter of the Assembly of First Nations, which was adopted in July 1985. The principal elements of the AFN are; the First Nations Chiefs-in-Assembly, the Executive Committee; the AFN Secretariat. The AFN National Youth Council, the AFN Women's Council, and the Council of Elders.

The Executive Committee is made up of the ten Regional Chiefs (one for each province), the National Chief, and the Chairpersons of the Youth, Women, and Elder Councils. The First Nations Chiefs-in-Assembly are comprised of all Chiefs from across Canada. The AFN Secretariat is comprised of various administrative personnel and policy analysts that support the work of the Executive Committee, First Nations leaders, and communities. The AFN Youth, Women, and Elder Councils are comprised of representatives from each region throughout Canada.

CASA UPDATE

 The executive committee had the opportunity to discuss student priorities and give a tour to CASA's interim Executive Director, Wasiimah Joomun. In the weeks since, Wasiimah Joomun has been hired as the new Executive Director for the organization. With unrivaled experience from her time as the Member Relations Officer, CASA's Board of Directors and the SAMU Executive team are

excited for her to take on the role of Executive Director. We look forward to continuing the promotion of an efficient and beneficiary relationship between our organizations, for the students.



CAUS UPDATE

At the provincial level, our focus has been on the recent provincial report on campus gender-based and sexual violence, MacEwan students are calling on the provincial government to act on the three asks put forward by post-secondary students at colleges, polytechnics and universities in Alberta. The three asks, from SAMU's official statement & stance on the issue are as follows.

Along with our colleagues at the Council of Alberta University Students (CAUS) , SAMU is calling on the provincial government and the Advanced Education Minister to:

- 1. Create a ministry-led Sexual and Gender-Based Violence in Alberta Post-Secondary Education Working Group, with representatives from the Council of Alberta University Students, the Alberta Students'
- -based organizations, such as a representative from the Association of Alberta Sexual Assault Services.
 2. Dedicate funds to existing work both on prevention and support for survivors at Alberta's post-secondaries, including additional funding for the expansions of on-campus/institutional services, and the expansions of on-campus/institutional services.
 - **secondaries,** including additional funding for the expansions of on-campus/institutional services, and the development of these services at institutions where they may not already exist.

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3. **Sponsor a province-wide campaign around consent education at Alberta's post-secondaries**. Such a campaign would highlight what consent looks like in a variety of different contexts, using easy-to-understand language, and would also highlight the fundamental importance of consent more broadly.

Edmonton Student Alliance (ESA)

- The Edmonton Student Alliance (ESA) is made up of 8 member institutions representing post-secondary students within Edmonton. The Students Association of MacEwan University (SAMU), University of Alberta Students Union (UASU), University of Alberta Graduate Students Association (UAGSA), Concordia Graduate Students Association (CGSA), Concordia Students Association (CSA), Students Associations of Norquest College (SANQC), NAIT Students Association (NAITSA) and The Kings University Students Association (TKUSA).
- I have recently been elected by the various member institutions to sit as the Chair of the ESA to represent all post-secondary students in our city. 

Councillor of the Year Terms of Reference

Award Description

This award is presented to an outstanding Councillor, a person who has dedicated their time and energy to support student advocacy efforts, ensure good governance, engage with and consult students and other members of Students' Council, and demonstrate a commitment to the long-term success of SAMU.

One award is available each year. Presentation of the award occurs at the last Students' Council meeting of the elected year and the recipient will be acknowledged at SAMU's annual recognition event.

The successful nominee receives \$250 and a certificate of achievement.

Eligibility

Nominees must be current Councillors.

Criteria

Nominees show board-level engagement.

Nominees sit on one or more of the SAMU Standing Committees and/or Sub-Committees or MacEwan University committees.

Nominees consult with students.

Nominees demonstrate involvement in SAMU beyond Students' Council meetings.

Nominees consult with other members of Students' Council.

Nominees assist Councillors who are new to their roles.

Nomination and Selection

Any Students' Councillor may nominate a Councillor. Nomination forms and the award description are provided to all Students' Councillors. Councillors may not nominate themselves.

Completed nomination forms are submitted to the Governance Advisor.

The final selection decision is made by Students' Council. Students' Councillors determine the recipient by a secret ballot vote conducted at the September Students' Council meeting. Completed nominations are included in the agenda material for this meeting.

The Governance Advisor communicates the successful Councillor to the Awards Sub-Committee.
