This is the report from the Audit Committee for the reporting period of October 1st, 2024, through December 31st, 2024 (Quarter 2). This committee met twice this quarter, once in October and once in December.

During the October meeting, the Audit Committee met to review Quarter 1 variances and utilization of resources by the Executive Committee (EC). As always, every quarter, we will continue to evaluate Executive Committee expenditures/utilization of resources such as sick leave and TOIL, and organizational budgetary variances to ensure full fiscal responsibility and accountability as stewards of Students' Association Fees.

Additionally, as it was the final meeting of the 2023/24 cycle of Voting Members, the Audit Committee conducted its annual Audit Review and reflected upon our auditor's findings, identifying emerging issues, and how we can strategically adapt and address those concerns through enhanced internal controls.

During the December meeting, which convened a new cycle of Audit Committee members, we went through the Terms of Reference for the role, appointed an Audit Committee Chair, Nathan Poon, and went through the 2024/2025

Tuition and Fees Consultation Process 2024/2025 Report

Tuition and Fees Consultation Overview

Tuition and Fees are regulated provincially by the Tuition and Fees regulation made under the Post-Secondary Learning Act (PSLA). The PSLA is the piece of legislation that governors the post-secondary sector and is the fundamental reason that SAMU exists the way that it does.

The <u>Tuition and Fees Regulation</u> governs how post-secondaries determine tuition and fees increases for both domestic and international students, exceptional tuition increases, how institutions publish their fees and how they consult with their students.

The regulation states that the University is to consult with the students' association annually and have at least two meetings per year. In these meetings the university must provide a statement with the anticipated increases to tuition and Mandatory Non-Instructional Fees (MNIF's) for a 4-year period and provide all necessary information to compare the revenue from MNIF's to the costs of the specific goods and services paid for by the MNIF.

Following consultation with the Students' Association, the tuition and fees proposal goes to the MacEwan Board of Governors for approval. First going through its Finance, Property and Investment Committee, SAMU's VP Governance and Finance sits on as a student member.

It is important to note that while Student Associations used to have veto power regarding the cost of tuition and fees, that is no longer the case. Student Associations are only consulted, meaning ultimately, they have no control over the outcome, they can only advocate on behalf of students for the best possible outcome regarding the cost of education at their institution.

Consultation Format

Our consultation process went beyond the required 2 meetings, this year, SAMU and MacEwan had a total of 4 meetings during this consultation. Our first meeting kicked off at the beginning of August where we meet to establish baselines for the process, request information and clarify any expectations.

Meeting 2 also occurs in August and was where MacEwan provided their financials including a report of tuition and MNIFs for the mandated 4-year period per the PSLA's Tuition and Fees Regulation and a revenue vs cost report of the MNIF's. SAMU was to verbally express the needs of the study body at this meeting.

Meeting 3 occurred in mid-September and was where MacEwan officially presented its proposed domestic and international tuition increases and any increases to MNIF's. After this meeting SAMU was provided one month to send in writing our position to the presented tuition and fees increases.

Meeting 4 occurred at the beginning of November and was a wrap up meeting where MacEwan responded to SAMU's written submission.

As well during this consultation process, MacEwan provided SAMU with the opportunity to provide a written submission stating where in-year allocations should be spent to best serve students, and to provide a written submission regarding budget expenditures for the upcoming fiscal year.

The Proposal

This year, the proposal provided included a legislated cap of a 2% increase in domestic tuition applied equally across all programs, a 5% increase of international tuition applied equally across all programs, the waiving of the Student Technology fee for Winter 2025 semester and the 2025/2026 academic year, and all remaining MNIFs having a 2% increase applied.

Our Advocacy

Tuition and Fees

SAMU Executives have used the findings from the 2024 annual spring survey and findings from the 2024 affordability survey to draft our response to the tuition and fees.

In our response to the University's proposal we:

- Opposed any increase to tuition and MNIF's due to the ongoing affordability crisis students are facing.
- Did not support an across the board increase to MNIF's
- We believed that the Medical Clinic fee could not increase or else it would not be in compliance with the regulation and should be reduced in the cost to remain within compliance
- While pleased with the waiver of the Student Technology fee we believed that the fee should be waived completely for students at the Ponoka site as they do not reap any of the benefits from the tech fee.
- We believed that MNIF's should not increase in cost and that MacEwan has the
 operational budget to offset any increase of cost to the current programming as seen in
 their year-over-year surpluses and their current projected surplus.

In Year Allocation

As a part of the In-Year Allocation process, SAMU was asked to provide feedback on areas in which university funding and investment can be increased based on student needs. SAMU has compiled our asks and have summarized them as follows:

- Waiving the Student Technology and the Medical Clinic Mandatory Non-Instructional Fees
- 2. Creation of a Learning Materials Bursary
- 3. Allocation of funds to Food Insecurity measures on Campus

- 4. Allocation of funds to remunerate students sitting on department Student Advisory Committees
- 5. Allocation of Funds to the Textbook Affordability project
- 6. Allocation of Funds to subsidize Material Special Fees in faculties with high material special fees within courses.

The Outcomes

Tuition and Fees Consultation

Despite our advocacy, MacEwan went forward with the 2% increase in domestic tuition and 5% increase in international tuition. Regarding MNIF's, SAMU was able to advocate for the permanent removal of the Tech fee for Ponoka Site students, as they do not reap any of the benefits that the tech fee provides students on the city centre campus. SAMU was also able to provide a strong case for MacEwan to not raise the cost of the Medical Clinic fee as we were not provided with sufficient evidence that the cost of the clinic had exceeded the amount the MNIF was collecting. MacEwan decided to then decrease the MNIF to \$10.00 moving forward indefinitely.

In-Year Allocation

The in-year allocation conversation is where SAMU saw significant wins. After the submission of our proposal MacEwan's Executive Council reviewed it and recommended the following:

- 1. Waiving the student technology MNIF in the Winter 2025 term this is a reduction of total student fees of \$650,000.
- 2. Reducing the medical clinic MNIF in the Winter 2025 term this is a reduction of total student fees of \$80.000
- 3. Contribution to SAMU's food pantry operations to support food insecurity of \$100,000
- 4. Allocation of \$100,000 to explore innovative food projects with trusted collaborators to find options for healthy and affordable markets for students
- 5. A \$500,000 contribution to the Textbook Affordability Project, led by the library
- 6. A \$500,000 contribution to existing scholarships, awards and bursaries.

U-Pass Referendum

Do you support the renewal of a mandatory Universal Transit Pass (U-Pass), subject to the following conditions/changes:

- 1. The U-Pass would provide unlimited usage of regular transit services from Edmonton Transit Service (including Route 747), St. Albert Transit, Strathcona County Transit, Spruce Grove Transit, Fort Saskatchewan Transit, Leduc Transit, and Beaumont Transit (excluding special events, contracted and charter transit services offered by any municipalities, or any transit service for which regular transit fares do not apply) to all Students' Association of MacEwan University members and affiliates who are enrolled in courses on Grant MacEwan University campuses located within the Edmonton City Limits for:
 - Fall Term (Aug 25 December 31);
 - Winter Term (January 1 April 30); and
 - Spring/Summer terms (April 20 August 31).
- 2. The cost of the U-Pass to each participating student would be mandatory. The rate will be as follows:
 - 2025/26: \$180 per each term for the Fall, Winter, and Spring/Summer
 - 2026/27: \$182.50 per each term for the Fall, Winter, and Spring/Summer
 - 2027/28: \$185 per each term for the Fall, Winter, and Spring/Summer
- 3. The U-Pass would be optional for the following:
 - a. Students registered for Disabled Adult Transit Service (DATS) or any other accessibility transit service within participating municipalities;
 - b. Students with a valid Canadian National Institute for the Blind (CNIB) registration card;

- c. Students in a co-op or practicum program who are taking no on-campus credit courses lasting more than 8 consecutive weeks of a School Term, and are fulfilling their course requirements outside the boundaries of participating municipalities for the majority of that School Term;
- d. Students who are currently a full-time continuing employee of MacEwan University taking credit courses;
- e. Students employed by any of the participating municipal transit services;
- f. Students enrolled in another post-secondary educational institution and are required to participate in a transportation program similar to the U-Pass Program being offered by MacEwan University.
- g. Students who are, or will be turning 65 years of age or older during the relevant School Term;
- h. Students with a valid registration in the Assured Income for the Severely Handicapped (AISH) program during the relevant School Term; or
- i. Students whose principal residence is outside of a 100 km radius, measured from the main campus on which their in-person courses are delivered.
- 4. The U-Pass will expire upon the outcome of a subsequent referendum or if it is no longer practicable for the Students' Association to adhere to any of (1) through (4) above.
