Trinh - For President/VPE - (If either one can answer that would be great). Regarding the CASA meeting that you've attended, do you believe CASA is heading in a good direction with the workplans you covered and if CASA will be in a better position the following year compared to previous years? At least in theory.

Maybe it's a bit too early to give a proper answer but I thought it would be important to ask considering the problems SAMU had working with CASA, and how big CASA was in SC's decision making this year and will be for future years.

Pres – Thanks for your question Councillor Trinh.

It is currently too early to provide feedback on CASA's performance for the year, given that we are only halfway through the conference cycle for the year. As prescribed by the original Students' Council motion in March, we will provide an in-camera report to Council that will outline how CASA has progressed since the motion was made.

Trinh - For VPSL - After reading about your meetup with Chandelle Rimmer, I'm curious if there's any plans to directly involve SAMU into some of MacEwan's own Student programs. More specifically if you or Chandelle plan on having SAMU be integrated with these MacEwan Student programs and if that's a possibility to consider in the future.

While you did mention SAMU promoting these programs, I see a strong opportunity to improve the Student experience at MacEwan if SAMU was more involved in these programs (example: SAMU helping run/lead the NEST program). Perhaps this is something that can be tackled in the future and I was wondering if this was ever in consideration or being worked towards.

VpsI – Thank you for your question, Councillor Trinh. During my conversation with Chandelle, there were no plans regarding SAMU being directly involved in MacEwan's; however, we did talk about how SAMU could promote some of these services to students to increase awareness. Regarding programs like the NEST program, I don't believe there is an identifiable need for SAMU to be involved operationally, as MacEwan already has that covered. I see a great opportunity for SAMU to be involved in the promotion and feedback process of that service to improve the students in that regard.




NDP Roundtable meeting

Tuition & Fees Prep; Tuition & Fees Consultation Meeting #2

Like our first T & F consultation meeting with MacEwan, we had prepared rigorously in order to effectively highlight SAMU's stance on each individual Mandatory Non-Instructional Fee that MacEwan charges students, which encompasses the Tech Fee, the Mental Health Fee, the Medical Clinic Fee, the Sports and Wellness fee, and the Registrar Fee.

In addition, the President and I were able to speak on the initial needs from the student body, which allowed us to highlight affordability as a major area of concern when it comes students accessing food, housing, and education. We also emphasized our commitment to partnering with the MacEwan administration in order to tackle these issues. Lastly, we were given the opportunity to provide our in-year allocation requests, which included the expansion of food insecurity measures on campus, potential investment into learning material bursaries, improved student housing resources, investment into student wellness supports, and the waiving of locker fees.

Strat point 2.2

Fall Fest Advocacy Tabling and Student Leadership Week Planning

On Friday, September 5th, the Executive Committee, along with other members of Students' Council, conducted tabling at Fall Fest to bring awareness to various student leadership opportunities on campus, such as Students' Council, the Executive Committee, and SAMU and MacEwan committees, with a particular focus on Students' Council nominations and elections. Beyond that, the tabling was a fantastic opportunity for both EC and SC members to connect with new and returning students in a fun, informal environment (while giving pretty sweet freebies away, too!)

Health Campus Alberta will be hosting this year's Edmonton Regional Gathering at MacEwan University on November 21st!! I'm excited to share this news, as it's something I was really hoping for, and I'm thrilled that HCA chose our campus to host the event. There may also be some new additions to the gathering that will make it even more special for participants. Registration will be opening soon, so keep an eye out for that!

Student Supports

Meeting with my Counterpart Chandelle Rimmer:

At the end of August, I had another meeting with my MacEwan counterpart, Chandelle Rimmer, the Interim Associate Vice-President (AVP). In this meeting, I shared insights from the 2025 student survey data related to student engagement and feedback on mentorship, with financial support and health and wellness identified as top priorities. I also shared the recommendations from the research firm we hired, based on the Spring survey, and highlighted students' desire for more career-related initiatives such as LinkedIn workshops and networking opportunities. This served as a perfect transition to



another agenda item I wanted to discuss which was the collaboration with Ubuntu. As mentioned in previous reports, Ubuntu is a community-based nonprofit initiative focused on equity, education, and workforce development. I informed Chandelle about the organization and the various workshops it offers that align with some of the needs students identified in the survey. I also shared that I will be meeting with Faizel (Ubuntu's founder) and the Leadership Education Specialist, Nooshin, to further discuss potential collaboration.

First Week on Campus (NSO/ Fall fest/ Block Party/ KW)

The first week on campus was amazing! In the months leading up to the start of the semester, I made it a goal to attend as many student orientations as possible, and I'm proud to say I achieved that. I attended six orientations, including the Athlete Student Orientation, International Student Orientation, School of Business Orientation, and Indigenous Student Orientation. My goal was to ensure that our first-year students knew who we were and how we could support them throughout their academic journey, and I'm grateful to the different departments for giving me that opportunity.

Another highlight was the Block Party, which I attended alongside the other executives. We had the chance to connect with the MacEwan University admin team and student union members from Norquest College. It was awesome to see such a strong student turnout from both institutions.

As many of you know, the week wrapped up with SAMU's Fall Fest, and this year was definitely one to remember. I had the privilege of introducing the main act, Oliver Tree, who gave a humorous and engaging performance. It was also a pleasure to watch all the other artists perform throughout the day. I'd like to thank the vendors, security staff, volunteers, and SAMU staff for making this the BEST FALL FEST EVER! A special



thank you as well to the students and guests whose energy brought the event to life, and to the event staff for making it all happen.

Last but not least, I had the privilege of attending the Pipe Ceremony at the Kihêw waciston Indigenous Centre (KW), where I participated in both the smudge and pipe ceremonies for new and returning students, facilitated by Knowledge Keeper Tom Snow. I also had the opportunity to connect with students in attendance and share a bit about SAMU and the upcoming student council election. The following day, the entire executive team was given a tour of the KW space, which was an incredible experience.

Strengthening SAMU Operations

SAMU is an innovative and sustainable organization with an engaging work environment

Meeting with Darryl (GM):

Each month, I meet with our General Manager, Darryl, to discuss ideas for improving the student experience. As I often mention, Darryl is a great "idea filter"; he challenges me to consider factors like long-term costs and organizational liability, and I always value his perspective, even if we don't always agree. Between August and September, our conversations covered a range of topics, including the HCA Regional Conference, student groups, and campus services.

As some of you may already know, PAWSS has been rebranded as WAGGS. Along with the new branding, there are some notable changes: *student handlers are no longer included in the program, and cats have been removed*. These updates, along with other



related announcements, were recently shared by the Manager of Student Wellness Services via email.

Before the official announcement, I asked Darryl regarding the feasibility of hosting PAWSS/WAGGS in a dedicated space on SAMU grounds, where students could safely interact with the animals. However, Darryl clarified that even though SAMU is an independent institution from MacEwan, when it comes to building regulations, SAMU must still follow MacEwan's rules, with only a few exceptions (such as food catering).

Closing Remarks

Since the semester began, things have gotten busier, but I am grateful to be surrounded by such a supportive team. I want to thank the Governance Advocacy Support Team (GAST) and the SAMU staff once again for their guidance in helping me become the best VPSL I can be. Councillor of the Year Terms of Reference

Award Description

This award is presented to an outstanding Councillor, a person who has dedicated their time and energy to support student advocacy efforts, ensure good governance, engage with and consult students and other members of Students' Council, and demonstrate a commitment to the long-term success of SAMU.

One award is available each year. Presentation of the award occurs at the last Students' Council meeting of the elected year and the recipient will be acknowledged at SAMU's annual recognition event.

The successful nominee receives \$250 and a certificate of achievement.

Eligibility

Nominees must be current Councillors.

Criteria

Nominees show board-level engagement.

Nominees sit on one or more of the SAMU Standing Committees and/or Sub-Committees or MacEwan University committees.

Nominees consult with students.

Nominees demonstrate involvement in SAMU beyond Students' Council meetings.

Nominees consult with other members of Students' Council.

Nominees assist Councillors who are new to their roles.

Nomination and Selection

Any Students' Councillor may nominate a Councillor. Nomination forms and the award description are provided to all Students' Councillors. Councillors may not nominate themselves.

Completed nomination forms are submitted to the Governance Advisor.

The final selection decision is made by Students' Council. Students' Councillors determine the recipient by a secret ballot vote, using a rank order system, conducted on the day of the regular September Students' Council meeting. Completed nominations are included in the agenda material for this meeting.

The Governance Advisor communicates the successful Councillor to the Grants and Awards Sub-Committee.
