

Personal, social and emotional development:

Explain the reasons for rules, know right from wrong and try to behave accordingly.

Work and play cooperatively and take turns with others.

Understanding the world:

Children describe their immediate environment using knowledge from observation, discussion, stories, nonfiction texts and maps.

Draw or paint a place from observation or imagination.

Parent information:

Let's explore:

This project teaches children about the environments that they share with others, including their homes, school and places in the local community.

Commutation and language :

Offer explanations for why things might happen, making use of recently introduced vocabulary from stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems when appropriate.

Mathematics:

Children count reliably with numbers from one to ten, place them in order and say which number is one more or one less than a given number.

Numbers follow a sequence. Each number is one more than the previous number. The last number reached when counting tells you how many there are in total.

Literacy:

Listening actively rhymes, songs and stories.

Distinguish between speech sounds and orally segment and blend words.

The topic books: Owl Babies Going on a bear hunt Oh no George

Physical development:

Hold a pencil effectively in preparation for fluent writing – using the tripod grip.

Children will participate in rhymes and songs. Also, they will partake in imaginative role play.

Children to show good control and coordination in large and small movements. 30-50: Moves freely, and uses one-handed tools and equipment.

Expressive arts and design:

Safely use and explore a variety of materials, tools and techniques, experimenting with colour, design, texture, form and function. Painting of a place is called a landscape. Draw or paint a place from observation or imagination.
