History:

In History, we will be focusing on Historical vocabulary, Historical periods; Timelines; Power and rule; Historical artefacts; Significant people—Alfred the Great, William the Conqueror; Henry VII, Elizabeth I, Queen Victoria, Elizabeth II; Byeaux tapestry; Feudal system; Actions and impact, Historical models.



Art/DT

Children will start this unit of work by looking at royal portraits and what makes them special. model Kings and Queens,. We will construct models of castles, palaces—Using materials—we will learn ho w to sew different materials.

English:

Children will read a picture book called `The Princess and the White Bear King'. A dark adventure story book stirring of betrayal, showing how love can be reclaimed through perseverance, endurance and compassion and finishing our own versions of the story. We will be writing Information leaflets, Kennings poems, Comic strips.

Geography:

Children will learn about types of royal residency includes palaces and stately homes, include Buckingham Palace in London; Balmoral Castle in Aberdeenshire; Sandringham House in Norfolk. We will be using maps to locate royal buildings and what makes these building extra special for their royal residence.

Computing:

We will be making Presentation on the different monarchs using computer to explore royal residences (google maps). Children will also use Purple Mash in all lessons to help build their computing knowledge and learn about coding and how it works in the real world.

Science:

In Science, we will be learning about animals and human life cycles, healthy living, basic needs of animals including humans and the importance of exercise.

PE:

This half-term children will be learning Gymnastics on Wednesdays and Fridays. These include freeze tag, animal forest, follow my leader, animal troll, traffic lights and bridge tag.

Maths:

Children will be comparing the mass of two/three objects and use the appropriate vocabulary. They will also begin looking at solving word problems, involving addition and subtraction of mass, Money and 2D shapes.

HOME LEARNING

Research historical concepts such as continuity and change, cause and consequence, similarity, difference and significance, and use them to make connections, draw contrasts, analyse trends, frame historically valid questions and create their own structured accounts, including written narratives and analyses.

Create historical information in a simple non-chronological report, independent writing, chart, structural model, fact file, quiz, story or biography.
