

Media Information

We hope to be back to normal for the 2021 football season, however, some restrictions and guidelines may be instituted for weekly and game day coverage, interview policies and weekly press conferences.

CREDENTIALS

Requests for working press credentials for Tulsa's home football games must be emailed to donaldtomkalski@utulsa.edu with the Tulsa Athletic Media Relations Office.

Media will still be asked to physical distance as best as possible in 2021. Masks are optional at this time, but possibly could become mandatory.

Members of the electronic media and those daily and Sunday papers covering Tulsa and its opponents on a regular basis will receive first priority for credentials.

Credentials will not be mailed. Credentials can be picked up at the TU Athletic Media Relations Office during the week of the game or on gameday three hours prior to kickoff at the press will call window at the corner of Gary and Florence Avenues.

All credentials are non-transferable and are limited to members of the working media only. Your cooperation in this matter will help ensure the best possible working conditions in the H.A. Chapman Stadium Press Box and on the sidelines.

PARKING

Media parking will be located in two locations: the Mabee Gym West Parking Lot (the corner of 8th Street and Florence Ave; enter on 8th Street from the west at Delaware Ave.) and the Blue Lot (the corner of 8th Street and Harvard Ave; enter 8th Street from the east at Harvard Ave.).

THE PROPER PARKING CREDENTIAL WILL BE NEEDED FOR ENTRANCE TO THESE LOTS. These parking credentials are issued by the Athletic Media Relations office. A limited number of parking spaces are available, therefore, members of the electronic media and those daily and Sunday papers covering Tulsa and its opponents on a regular basis will receive first priority. In order to park satellite trucks or vehicles for radio remotes contact the TU Athletic Media Relations Office in advance of the game.

TELEVISION TRUCK PARKING

Parking for Television Trucks is located on Florence Avenue at the corner of 8th Street and Florence Ave. The proper media parking credential for the Mabee West Parking Lot will be required. You can access this parking lot from the west only, off of Delaware Ave. and coming down 8th Street. Arrangements for TV stations must be made in advance.



PRESS BOX

The press box is located on the west side of H.A. Chapman Stadium. The Working Press Level is located the fourth floor of the Press Box. In addition to print media, Radio and TV Broadcast Booths are also located on the fourth floor. There is a TV Photo Deck located on the fifth floor. This level accommodates team video and television film crews.

INTERNET

Wireless and hardwire internet connections are available in the H.A. Chapman Stadium Press Box.

POST-GAME INTERVIEW POLICY

The Tulsa locker room is closed. Postgame interview policy in 2021 has not yet been decided.

The visiting team has access to a postgame interview room at the back entrance to the team locker room.

PHOTOGRAPHERS / VIDEOGRAPHERS

Field access for photographers and videographers will be limited in 2021.

Photographers and videographers are reminded that credentials must be properly displayed at all times. There will be a transmission area for photographers.

SIDELINE POLICY

Media will be required to social distance on the field as much as possible and do not crowd players or coaches when entering or exiting the field.

The team bench areas will be extended to the 15-yard line on each side of the field.

MEDIA IS NOT PERMITTED IN THE TEAM BENCH AREAS.

When passing behind the team benches to get to the other end of the field, please do not stop. Move as quickly as possible from one end to the next. **DO NOT TAKE PHOTOS/VIDEO FROM BEHIND THE BENCH AREA.**

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

All requests for interviews with Tulsa players should be made through the Athletic Media Relations Office. Please make your request a day in advance to allow enough time to arrange the interview. Interviews will not be allowed on student-athlete OFF days. The best time for extended interviews is normally between 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m., depending on the players' class schedules and team obligations.

Television stations usually will be able to do interviews of a shorter duration after practice, but make arrangements with the athletic media relations office. For any in person interviews, these will be done at a distance of 6-feet.

The last time for player interviews is Wednesday following practice, except on non-Saturday game weeks. Contact the athletic media relations office for exact days and times of media availability for non-Saturday game weeks.

Media is asked to set-up all player and coach interviews by calling the athletic media relations office at 918-631-3200.

COVERING PRACTICE

Tulsa's practices are closed to the public. Television video and photography of practice is allowed between Tuesday-Wednesday for a selected period of time.

All videography and photography will be from the sidelines at Chapman Stadium or at a predetermined distance on Harwell Field. NOT ON THE ACTUAL PLAYING FIELD.

Contact the Athletic Media Relations Office earlier in the day to request attending practice.

TULSA WEEKLY NEWS CONFERENCES

Tulsa Head Coach Philip Montgomery's weekly news conference will be on Tuesday from 12-12:45 p.m. Select players will be available following Coach Montgomery's availability.

In 2021, weekly news conferences will either be in person or via zoom.

All other requests for interviews with Coach Montgomery should be directed to the Athletic Media Relations Office.

Today, TU is Oklahoma's highest-ranked private university. It comprises a graduate school and five colleges: Kendall College of Arts & Sciences, Collins College of Business, Oxley College of Health Sciences, College of Engineering & Natural Sciences and College of Law. Popular majors include mechanical engineering, computer science, nursing, exercise/sports science, psychology and finance. Although TU is small, we have more nationally competitive scholars than all other Oklahoma colleges combined.

A leader in blending liberal arts, professional studies and career support, TU strives to produce the region's most well-rounded, life- and career-ready alumni. Across all of our programs, faculty and staff ensure that students – from the moment they step foot on campus until their graduation – receive the support and guidance they need to thrive in their studies and beyond. Tulsa, Okla. is "Green Country"

Geographically, Tulsa sits at the crossroads of America. Metaphorically, it is the crossroads of America. It's where creative expression, sophistication and down-to-earth hospitality all converge in a lush natural setting to redefine what it means to be a modern American city.

Tulsa is nestled in the northeastern quadrant of Oklahoma, right in the heart of "Green Country." The rolling green hills and wooded terrain of the city lies at an elevation of 700 feet above sea level and offers a temperate climate. Tulsa's enjoy 227 days of sunshine a year and an average daily temperature of 61 degrees.

What began as Tulsee Town in 1836 under a sturdy oak tree, which still stands today at 18th and Cheyenne Streets, is today the second largest city in Oklahoma. Tulsa was forever changed by the discovery of oil in 1901.

Today, Tulsa offers enviable low cost of living combined with big city attractions and amenities. From world-class outdoor spaces to legendary music venues, Tulsa has an unexpected, dynamic quality of life without the sticker shock of other regions.

Lots of cities have notable parks, but very few have a crown jewel like Gathering Place. This 100-acre riverfront park is situated in the heart of Tulsa. On par with visionary public spaces as Manhattan's Central Park and Chicago's Millennium Park, Gathering Place blends nature in an urban setting, providing Tulsans and visitors more space to play, relax and gather together along the Arkansas River. The park's highlights include an adventure playground, seasonal gardens, walking and biking trails, a pond and boathouse, two restaurants, and much more.

Downtown Tulsa is a treasure trove for lovers of architecture, with a concentration of Art Deco rivaled only by New York City and Miami. The central public space in downtown, Guthrie Green, is a year-round destination for live music, cultural programming and festivals. Just a few blocks northeast is ONEOK Field, home of the Tulsa Drillers, a Class AA affiliate of the Los Angeles Dodgers. The ballpark sits within the historic Greenwood District, Tulsa's resurgent Black Wall Street known internationally as a hub of African American entrepreneurship and resilience.

Nearby you'll find the Blue Dome and Arts districts, which offer visitors a variety of restaurants, bars



and galleries. Downtown's premier shopping and specialty stores – a confectionary, rare guitars, an indie bookstore and more – have something for every taste.

The BOK Center is downtown Tulsa's award winning and premier sports and entertainment venue, playing host to worldwide superstars and NCAA DI Basketball Championship tournaments. The venue was named the 2016 and 2018 Arena of Year.

"The Tulsa Sound" is as alive and well in 2019 as it was when Eric Clapton and George Harrison jammed with Tulsa's own Leon Russell and JJ Cale. Tulsa's historic live music venues, like the Cain's Ballroom and Brady Theater, are second to none. The multi-purpose BOK Center is a world-class entertainment venue, recently named the Arena of the Year for the second time in the last three years.

Take in a special afternoon of art, culture and history at one of the city's iconic museums, including the world's greatest collection of Western art at the Gilcrease Museum and the eclectic and thoroughly contemporary Philbrook Museum of Art. You'll also find the Woody Guthrie Center, which celebrates the acclaimed folk singer's life and legacy, and soon you'll be able to visit the permanent home of Bob Dylan's archives. Other family-friendly attractions include the Tulsa Children's Museum, the Tulsa Zoo and the Oklahoma Aquarium.

The crossroads of America wouldn't be complete without America's Main Street. Historic Route 66 runs the full east-to-west stretch of the city along 11th Street, offering nostalgic looks at the city's past and a bold vision of the community's future. From classic diners and burger joints to the new Mother Road Market food hall, Route 66 in Tulsa is one of city's newest culinary hotspots.

Further into the city, notable districts include Cherry Street, a seven-block hub of trendy shops, bistros, cafés and bars; Brookside, a nearly mile-long stretch of upscale shopping and dining; and the Pearl District, which has Tulsa's highest concentration of craft breweries. The Hard Rock Hotel and Casino, River Spirit Casino Resort and Osage Casino also feature restaurants, nightclubs and a constant stream of live entertainment.

Tulsa hosts a never-ending lineup of exciting games, tournaments and recreational events throughout the year. Sports spectators can look to The University of Tulsa, Tulsa Drillers baseball, Tulsa Oilers ice hockey and FC Tulsa soccer. Tulsa Tough is one of the most popular bicycle street races in the country, and the annual Tulsa Run the Route 66 Marathon appeal to runners from around the world.

Skelly Field at H.A. Chapman Stadium

The 2021 season is the 91st for football being played on the turf of Skelly Field at H.A. Chapman Stadium, the home of Golden Hurricane Football since 1930. The stadium first opened as Skelly Field, later was named Skelly Stadium and in April 2007 received the name of H.A. Chapman Stadium. The stadium underwent a major facelift in the summer of 2008 and on September 20, 2008, Tulsa opened the renovated stadium with a 56-14 victory over New Mexico.



On April 24, 2007, it was announced that the University of Tulsa had received the naming gift for renovation of the football stadium.

The H.A. and Mary K. Chapman Trust provided the financial gift for half of the estimated cost for renovation of the H.A. Chapman Stadium. Trustees of the H.A. and Mary K. Chapman Trust are Donne Pitman and Jerry Dickman.

Following the 2007 football season, a complete renovation of H.A. Chapman Stadium began.

The stadium renovation included new seating throughout the stadium, restrooms, concession areas, new press box with luxury suites and club level seating, and a new scoreboard on the south side of the stadium, among other amenities. A new FieldTurf was installed in April 2008, and again in 2013 and prior to the 2017 season.

The steel structure on the stadium's west side was removed, substantially improving the aesthetics of the facility. The structure on the west side has an exterior finish of pre-cast concrete panels trimmed with cast stone. This returns the façade to the original architecture of the stadium, keeping the traditional look and feel of other campus structures. The stadium now has a capacity of 30,000.

When the stadium was first constructed in 1930 it was originally named Skelly Field, but was changed to Skelly Stadium in 1947 when 5,000 seats were added to north end zone.

Opening Skelly Field was a dream come true for Coach Elmer "Gloomy Gus" Henderson. Before Tulsa played its home games in Skelly Field the Golden Hurricane used McNulty Park, the minor league stadium that was the forerunner of Oiler Park. McNulty was located near the corner of 11th street and Elgin.

An unprecedented wave of prosperity swept over America in 1928 and wealthy Tulsa oil men began listening to Henderson's dream. The trustees were proceeding with plans for a stadium on faith that a donor would appear. In April, 1930, William Skelly, a long-time friend of the University, gave \$125,000 to the stadium fund if another \$175,000 could be raised. The remaining money was raised by Tulsa businessmen who organized the Stadium Corporation of Tulsa.

Ground-breaking ceremonies were held on May 11, 1930 and the race was on to complete the stadium for the upcoming season.

Skelly Field opened on October 4, 1930 against Arkansas. Records show that 13,000 spectators were on hand for the game.

On the opening kickoff of that inaugural game, Arkansas fumbled and end Johnny Potts recovered for Tulsa. On Tulsa's first play from scrimmage, Billy Boehm scored the first touchdown in the north

end zone of the stadium. Later, Chet Benefiel scored the first touchdown in the south end zone. Tulsa went on to win the contest by a score of 26-6.

Since that day, some of college football's greatest stars have graced Skelly Field. Opponents the likes of Sammy Baugh, Ollie Matson, Bob Fenimore, Walt Garrison, Gino Toreta, Keith Jackson and Ladainian Tomlinson are a few of the games' greatest to step on the Skelly Field turf.

Tulsa's own Glenn Dobbs in the 1940s, the passing combination of Heisman Trophy runners-up Jerry Rhome and Howard Twilley in the 1960s, future NFL receiving greats Steve Largent and Drew Pearson in the 70s, the 1980s Palomino Express of Micheal Gunter and Ken Lacy and the stars from the 1991 Freedom Bowl Championship team thrilled Hurricane fans through the years.

In 2003, Tulsa's Humanitarian Bowl team excited fans by averaging over 37 points in six home games, while in the 75th anniversary year of Skelly Field the 2005 squad won the Conference USA Championship and advanced to a second bowl game in three years.

The 2016 season saw the Tulsa football team post an undefeated 6-0 home record and the school's season of 10+ wins.

The highest attended game in stadium history was 47,350 on September 26, 1987 against No. 1 — ranked Oklahoma.

H.A. Chapman Stadium Through the Decades



1930s

Oil man and longtime friend of The University of Tulsa, William Skelly, gave \$125,000 to the Stadium Fund Drive in the spring of 1930. The remaining \$175,000 was raised by Tulsa businessmen who organized the Stadium Corporation of Tulsa.

Ground-breaking ceremonies were held on May 11 and the season kicked off on October 4, as Tulsa hosted Arkansas in front of a crowd of 13,000. On the opening kickoff, Arkansas fumbled and Johnny Potts recovered for Tulsa. Billy Boehm scored on the very next play for the first touchdown in the north end of the stadium.

Chet Benefiel scored the first TD in the south end zone and Tulsa went on for a 26-6 victory. The Golden Hurricane won its first six games at the new stadium that year.



1940s

A couple years earlier, 1938, the University traded Skelly Field to the Tulsa Public Schools for the Philtower Building lot at 5th and Boston. TU then began to lease the stadium from the board of education.

In the 1940s, Skelly Field was home to some of the best teams in school history. The Hurricane became the first school to play in five straight New Year's Day Bowl Games and the 1942 team posted a 10-1 record and finished the season ranked fourth in the final Associated Press poll.

In 1947, William Skelly turned the first shovel full of dirt at ground-breaking ceremonies for a 5,000-seat north end zone expansion and the name changed to Skelly Stadium. The first home game that season saw Tulsa defeat West Texas State 26-13 on September 20.



1950s

The 1950s began with Tulsa going undefeated at Skelly Stadium in the decades first three seasons, posting an 18-0-2 record covering 1950 through 1952. In 1956, a Billy Graham rally brought a crowd of 28,000 on June 18, 1956.



1960s

The Stadium Corporation was reorganized in 1964 and planned to build two high school stadiums (LaFortune and McLain) in exchange for Skelly Stadium. Skelly would be enlarged to 40,235 seats and the total program would cost \$1,250,000. The track was removed, the field lowered and box seats added. The excavated dirt was used to support the new south end zone stands. Seating was added to the west stands plus a new two story press box, escalator and elevator. The third story photo deck was added the next year. Skelly Stadium was returned to become the property of TU in 1968.



1970s

The 1970s saw numerous players who went on to NFL careers grace the Skelly Stadium turf that decade, including NFL legends Steve Largent and Drew Pearson. The grass field was changed to Tartan Turf in the summer of 1972. Professional soccer made its debut at Skelly Stadium with a preseason game in 1977, and a year later the Tulsa Roughnecks made Skelly Stadium its home.

Tulsa won its 200th game at Skelly Stadium on September 15, 1979 with a 28-20 win over Southwestern Louisiana.



1980s

In the spring of 1980, a modern scoreboard and animated message center was installed above the south stands. John Cooper's 1980 team ushered in the new decade with an 8-3 record, including a 5-0 mark in home games. Tulsa's 10-1 record in 1982, including a 5-0 home record, was the fourth 10-win season in school history and just the second since Skelly Stadium was built.

1990s

Some of the biggest wins in Skelly Stadium history came in the 1990s. The Miracle on 11th Street was just the start on September 21, 1991, when the Hurricane came back from a 24-10 halftime deficit for a thrilling 35-34 victory over #15-ranked Texas A&M. In 1996, Tulsa opened its home season with a 27-20 win over #19 Iowa and two weeks later defeated Colorado State, 20-14, in its debut game of the Western Athletic Conference.



2000s

The 2000s began with the installation of a new FieldTurf, a synthetic artificial turf that looked and felt like natural grass. The north end zone stands were demolished in 2005 to make room for the new Case Athletic Complex that opened in 2007. It was also announced in 2007, that Skelly Stadium would have a new name – H.A. Chapman Stadium and in 2008 the stadium went through a complete renovation. The renovated stadium opened on September 20 with a 56-14 victory over New Mexico.

2010s

Three 10-win seasons came in this decade with the first coming in 2010 at 10-3. In 2012, Tulsa posted an 11-3 record and won the Conference USA Championship on its home turf with a 33-27 overtime win over UCF. Tulsa also claimed a 10-3 record in the 2016 season and was 3-0 at its home venue in the COVID-shortened 2020 season.

H.A. Chapman Stadium Highlights

1930 — Groundbreaking ceremony for the 14,500 seat Skelly Field occurred on May 11. The first football game was played on Oct. 4, 1930 in front of a crowd of 13,000. Tulsa defeated Arkansas 26-6.

1938 — TU traded Skelly Field to the Tulsa Public Schools for the Philtower Building lot at 5th and Boston. TU began to lease the stadium from the board of education.

1947 — Lease renewal for Skelly Field was signed. The 5,000 seat north end zone stands were added and the scoreboard moved to the south end zone. Skelly Field was the original name, but changed to Skelly Stadium when the north end zone seats were added.

1953 — In August, former TU star Jim Finks played for the Pittsburgh Steelers in an exhibition game against the Chicago Bears before a crowd of 10,000.

1956 — On June 18, Evangelist Reverend Billy Graham held a one-night rally and set what was to that date a stadium record crowd of 28,000.

1960 — Newly formed American Football League entries, Houston Oilers and Dallas Texans, met in an exhibition contest in August.

1964 — The stadium corporation was reorganized and it planned to build two high school stadiums (LaFortune and McLain) in exchange for Skelly Stadium.

1965 — Skelly Stadium was enlarged to 40,235 seats at a cost of \$1,250,000. The track was removed, the field lowered and box seats added. The excavated dirt was used to support the new south end zone stands. Seating was added to the west stands plus a new two story press box, escalator and elevator. Work was completed in August.

1966 — The third story photo deck was added to the press box. Skelly Stadium turned into a baseball field for one game on May 5. The St. Louis Cardinals baseball club played their triple-A farm team, the Tulsa Oilers, in an exhibition game. The contest drew a crowd of 18,904, which saw the Cards beat Tulsa 5-4.

1968 — Skelly Stadium was returned to the University.

1972 — Tartan turf was installed in the summer months.

1977 — Professional soccer made its debut at Skelly Stadium with a preseason game.

1978 — The Tulsa Roughnecks, an NASL professional soccer team, moved into Skelly Stadium.

1979 — Getty Oil Company and Getty Refining and Marketing Company made a \$350,000 grant for refurbishing and repairs to the Stadium.

1980 — A modern scoreboard and animated message center was installed above the south stands.

The sign package was donated by Dr. Pepper, KJRH Television and Getty Refining and Marketing Company. The largest crowd for soccer occurred on April 26 when the Roughnecks met the New York Cosmos before 30,831 fans.

1987 — The largest crowd in Skelly Stadium history, 47,350, saw Tulsa lose to the nation's number one-ranked Oklahoma Sooners, 65-0.

1982 — A new artificial turf was installed and the lighting system was replaced.

1984 — A new scoreboard above the north end zone and 25-second clocks were added in each end zone.

1991 — Stadia Turf, a new artificial surface, was installed in the summer. The football season had the highest season attendance average in school history with an average of 31,236 fans for seven home games.

1993 — A new scoreboard was erected in the south end zone. It was completed just one day before the home opener on September 18.

2000 — New FieldTurf was installed in the summer. The synthetic artificial turf looks and feels like natural grass. The visiting team locker room was refurbished.

2003 — Installed new stadium lighting.

2005 — The north end zone stands were demolished in February, thus clearing way for the new Case Athletic Complex. The stadium seating was reduced from 40,385 to 35,542.

2007 — The Case Athletic Complex in the north end zone was completed in June; and on April 24, it was announced that the H.A. and Mary K. Chapman Trust has provided the financial gift for half of the estimated cost for renovation of the newly named H.A. Chapman Stadium.

2008 — The H.A Chapman Stadium underwent major renovation and now has a new stadium capacity of 30,000.

2013 — A new playing surface, FieldTurf Revolution Cool Play featuring cork and rubber, was installed in the spring of 2013, as was an 80-foot LED electronic sign located on the south end zone field level wall.

2017 — A new FieldTurf surface was installed.

2018 — ONEOK Club had a complete renovation and an LED board was added to the north end zone.



Case Athletic Complex

The Case Athletic Complex opened in June 2007, less than three years after the plans were unveiled for the facility that houses Golden Hurricane football.

On November 11, 2004, University of Tulsa President Steadman Upham unveiled plans for the Case Athletic Complex to be located in the north end zone of Skelly Stadium. Excavation began on January 13, 2006.

The 30,000 square foot complex was built at a cost of \$10 million, and it began phase one of the renovation of Skelly Field. Phase Two began following the 2007 football campaign, when Skelly Field at H.A. Chapman Stadium underwent major renovations.

The Case Athletic Complex, named for Mike Case, a developer and philanthropist who made a significant financial gift for the project, houses football coaches offices, meeting rooms, game day suites, academic support center for all student-athletes, football locker room and equipment room, athletic training room, video production suite and Lettermen's Club suite.

A renovation of the locker room was completed in the summer of 2018.

The facility provides the Tulsa football program with an exceptional every-day use facility, as well as providing all TU student-athletes with an area dedicated to academic enhancement.



Tulsa returns 53 letterwinners and 33 players who have started at least one game in their careers.

2021 Tulsa Season Preview

The 2020 season was quite a ride for the Tulsa Golden Hurricane faithful. The unusual season that was marred by postponements and cancellations due to COVID-19, was still a fun-filled adventure for the Hurricane.

There were four comeback victories, a 'Hail Mary' pass, a 96-yard walk-off interception in overtime, a 6-1 regular season record, an undefeated league mark, an appearance in the American Athletic Conference Championship Game, a third bowl game appearance in the last six years and awards galore for one Hurricane player.

What does 2021 hold for the Golden Hurricane?

Tulsa returns a total of 53 lettermen, including 24 on offense, 26 on defense and three specialists for the 2021 campaign.

Nine returning starters and 16 players who have started at least one career game are back on the offensive side of the ball for the Hurricane. Davis Brin and Seth Boomer bring experience to the Tulsa quarterback position, while the school's 5th leading rusher of all time, Shamari Brooks, returns this season after missing the 2020 campaign with an injury.

Freshman All-America left tackle Tyler Smith anchors an offensive line that returns all five players who earned all-conference honors in 2020.

Tulsa's receiving corps returns 99.6 percent of its receiving yards as seven letterwinners are back. Keylon Stokes has led Tulsa in receiving yardage in each of the last three seasons and comes into the 2021 season ranked 12th in school history with 2,402 career yards.

Despite losing College Football's Defensive Player of the Year, linebacker Zaven Collins, to the NFL, the Tulsa defense still returns a lot of quality and depth.

Defensively, the Hurricane returns eight starters to a lineup that was one of the top two defenses in the American Athletic Conference last year. Tulsa ranked second in the league for pass defense, rush

defense, total defense and scoring defense, while also ranking among the nation's best in each of those categories.

The Hurricane allowed just 21.6 points per game, 144.6 rushing yards, 189 passing yards and 333.6 total yards in 2020.

Tulsa's front line in its 3-3-5 defense is stout with all three starters returning, while first-team all-conference tackle Jason Player leads the way. Player can be dominant as witnessed by his 12-tackle, 4.5 TFL performance at Navy a year ago.

Returning starting linebackers Trevon Reeves and second-team all-conference performer Justin Wright anchor the linebacker corps for the Hurricane. The duo combined for 105 tackles and 14.5 tackles for lost yardage last season.

The secondary returns 10 letterwinners, while eight of those return to the safety positions. The cornerback slot was hit the hardest by departures, but three transfers have joined the roster to add depth and experience to that position.

Tulsa returns all of its specialists in the third phase of the game.

THE OFFENSE

Quarterbacks

Although two-year starter Zach Smith has graduated, the cupboard is not bare at the quarterback position for the Hurricane. Two returning signal-callers have played some major moments for Tulsa over the past three seasons.

Senior Seth Boomer (6-3, 201) and junior Davis Brin (6-2, 201) both have played quality minutes for

the Hurricane. Brin took most of the snaps during spring drills while Boomer was still recovering from a season-ending injury.

Brin comes into the 2021 season with confidence in leading the Hurricane offense.

A year ago when subbing for injured quarterbacks Smith and Boomer, Brin turned in a spectacular performance in a comeback victory against Tulane. Trailing 14-0 in the fourth quarter, Brin guided the Hurricane on two scoring drives to tie the score at 14 and launched a 'Hail Mary' pass 37 yards to JuanCarlos Santana in the end zone to send the game into overtime after the made extra point.

In that game, Brin completed 18-of-28 passes for 266 yard and two touchdowns.

Boomer has had some big career moments as well and none bigger than when he replaced an injured Smith in a 2019 game against UCF and led Tulsa to a 34-31 victory.

In 2018, when he saw his most extensive playing time, Boomer completed 101-of-198 passes for 1,378 yards and nine TDs overall, while in the final five games he completed 61.2-percent of his passes for 945 yards and seven TDs with just two pickoffs.

Redshirt freshman Roman Fuller (6-4, 196) came to Tulsa at mid-semester 2020 after completing his career at Decatur (Texas) High School. He threw for over 9,000 yards and 90 touchdowns with a 66.4 completion percentage in his three prep seasons. True freshman Braylon Braxton (6-3, 205) is a dual-threat quarterback from Independence (Texas) High School who passed for over 6,000 yards and rushed for another 2,000-plus yards in his prep career.

Walk-on Carson Collins (6-1, 205) adds depth to the position.

Running Backs

The Hurricane will have three returning faces and three completely new faces on the running back corps in 2021.

Tulsa gets back the school's fifth-leading rusher of all-time as senior Shamari Brooks (5-8, 190) returns from a missed 2020 season due to an ACL injury.

In addition, Tulsa's second-leading rusher from a year ago Deneric Prince (6-0, 215), who was in his first season after transferring from Texas A&M, rushed for 475 yards, a 5.4 average and four touchdowns.

The third familiar face, although he didn't get many offensive snaps a year ago, is Missouri transfer Anthony Watkins (5-11, 207).

Brooks returns to the field with 2,700 career yards and 23 touchdowns to his name. He is 1,217 yards shy of tying for the school's career rushing lead of 3,917 yards, held by D'Angelo Brewer.

After just missing a 1,000-yard rushing season in 2018 with 967 yards, Brooks rushed for 1,046 yards and six touchdowns in 2019, becoming just the 21st player in school history with a 1,000-yard season. He enters the 2021 campaign ranked 5th on

the school's career rushing chart and 12th on the all-time TD rushing list.

The newcomers to the running back corps include one four-year transfer, one junior college transplant and one high school rookie.

Powerful Steven Anderson (6-2, 242) transfers from Southern Mississippi after sitting out last season in Hattiesburg. Anderson rushed for 513 yards and nine touchdowns in his two seasons with the Golden Eagles. JC transfer Jordan Ford (5-10, 188) was an NJCAA All-America performer last season after rushing for a nation-leading 1,039 yards and 12 touchdowns.

Rookie Bill Jackson (5-10, 195) averaged over 122 yards per game and 10.6 yards per carry in his final two seasons at Cardinal Ritter College Prep.

Offensive Line

Tulsa's offensive line returns intact from the 2020 campaign as all five starters earned all-conference honors a year ago. The returning starters have combined for 92 starts and 119 games played.

On the right side, Chris Paul (6-4, 324) at tackle and guard Dylan Couch (6-3, 297) are the anchors, Gerard Wheeler (6-3, 337) sits in the middle of the offensive front at center, while Dante Bivens (6-4, 324) at guard and Freshman All-America tackle Tyler Smith (6-6, 322) anchor the left side for the Hurricane.

Smith collected Freshman All-America honors from the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) and The Athletic as he started all nine games a year ago. Smith also earned first-team all-league honors, while Paul was a second-team selection. Bivens, Couch and Wheeler each received honorable mention all-AAC accolades.

Paul leads the way with 28 career starts, followed by Wheeler's 20, Couch's 17, Bivens' 16 and Smith with 11.

As the four seniors and one sophomore lock down the starting spots after a very productive 2020 campaign, it's not to say that there will not be some battles brewing during the preseason.

X'Zauvea Gadlin (6-4, 314) started all 12 games at right tackle in the 2019 campaign but sat out last season. Bryce Bray (6-4, 323) sat out last year as well after transferring from Oklahoma State, where he started 11 contests in 2019. Both Gadlin and Bray give the Hurricane versatility as to where they can line up on the offensive front.

That's not all the starting experience that returns to the front line. Graduate guard Tiller Bucktrot (6-4, 307) has played in 45 games with five offensive line starts, while redshirt freshman Jaden Muskrat (6-3, 303) started the final game of the 2020 season at right tackle for an injured Chris Paul.

Muskrat will start the preseason behind Smith at left tackle, while Bucktrot and Gadlin are listed at the left guard spot.

Sophomore Gabe Cantu (6-4, 294), from Tulsa's Union High School, played as a true freshman last season and is listed as the backup at the center position. Cantu is joined by Nebraska transfer Will Farniok (6-3, 295), who appeared in four games over the last two seasons with the Cornhuskers.

On the right side, sophomores Chester Baah (6-3, 302) and Jeremy Jones (6-5, 319) sit behind Couch at the guard spot. At right tackle, Bray and redshirt freshman Dillon Wade (6-4, 302) are listed to back up Paul.

Versatility is the term that can be used for the Hurricane offensive front in 2021, as multiple players have seen valuable playing and have been coached to play multiple positions on the line.

Tight Ends

The tight end position has been critical to the offensive success for the Hurricane and nothing will change in the 2021 campaign.

Tulsa returns three letterwinners at tight end, including two players who have started games in their careers.

Sophomore Ethan Hall (6-3, 240) started four games last year, while junior James Palmer (6-1, 237) has started 10 games in the last two seasons. The tandem has combined for 13.3 yards per catch and two touchdowns over the past two campaigns.

Senior letterman Abe Anderson (6-3, 246) has seen valuable playing time in a reserve role for the Hurricane.

Two redshirts, sophomore Grayson Boomer (6-5, 247) and Bayne Tryon (6-2, 233), bring good size and athleticism to the position. Boomer, the younger brother of quarterback Seth, sat out last season after transferring from Oklahoma State.

Wide Receivers

The receiver position is loaded with returnees from the 2020 campaign as seven letterwinners return to the unit, including four that each totaled over 25 receptions and 13 yards per catch a year ago.

In all, 99.6 percent of Tulsa's receiving yards from last season is back.

Leading the way for the Hurricane is fifth-year senior Keylon Stokes (5-10, 198). The inside receiver has led Tulsa in receiving yards in each of the last three seasons. He caught 46 passes for 644 yards and three TDs a year ago.

A year earlier, Stokes went over 1,000 yards on 62 receptions for 1,040 yards and six touchdowns. He enters the 2021 campaign with 2,402 receiving yards and 11 touchdowns to rank 12th on the school's career receiving chart.

Stokes is joined by – Sam Crawford Jr. (6-1, 209) and JuanCarlos Santana (6-0, 176) – in the starting lineup at receiver. Crawford, a two-year starter, caught 28 passes for 374 yards and one TD last year, while Santana hauled in 34 receptions for 544 yards, four TDs and a team-high 16.0 yards per catch. There was perhaps no bigger catch in 2020 then Santana's 'Hail Mary' reception in the end zone to pull the Hurricane to within an extra point

as time expired in regulation against Tulane.

Senior Josh Johnson (5-11, 179) may have come off the bench in most of the nine games a season ago, but he was dynamic with 38 receptions for 499 yards and a team-best six touchdowns.

The entire quartet of receivers at the top of the Hurricane receiving chart will each surpass 1,000 career yards early in the 2021 season. Stokes with 2,402 and Crawford with 1,151 yards already reached the mark, while Johnson needs just six yards to reach 1,000 yards in his Tulsa career and Santana is 223 yards shy of the 1,000-yard plateau.

Seniors Josh Stewart (6-3, 212) and Cannon Montgomery (5-10, 174) and sophomore Malik Rodgers (5-10-170) have also seen valuable playing time at the receiver spot for the Hurricane. Stewart caught 10 passes for 94 yards and Rodgers had 85 yards on seven receptions a year ago, while Montgomery started one game and had one reception.

Transfer Ezra Naylor II (6-4, 206) brings great size to the Hurricane receiving corps. He comes to Tulsa from Kansas after catching five passes for 66 yards last season. Two redshirt freshmen looking to get some playing time this season are Malachai Jones (6-0, 189) and Jalen Paxton (6-0, 182).

Both Jones and Paxton had solid prep careers before spending 2020 with a redshirt season. Jones totaled 87 receptions for 1,806 yards and 19 TDs in his three seasons at Westfield (Texas) High School, while Paxton caught 41 passes for 854 yards and 11 TDs his senior season at Manvel (Texas) High School, the same school that produced Stokes.

Rookies Scottie Alexander (6-2, 198) and Marquis Shoulders (5-10, 165) also bring solid credentials from the Texas High School ranks, while walk-ons Kamdyn Benjamin (5-9, 168), Kemani Brown (5-10, 160) and Corbin Daniels (6-1, 182) add depth to the receiving corps.

THE DEFENSE

Defensive Line

The defensive line returns eight letterwinners to Tulsa's 3-man front with a total of 56 starts among four of those returnees.

Tackle Jaxon Player (6-0, 294), a fourth-year senior, joins fifth-year senior nose guard Tyarise Stevenson (6-3, 365) and fourth-year junior end Anthony Goodlow (6-5, 274) as Tulsa's returning starters.

Player made the move from nose to tackle last year and created a perfect fortress in the interior of the defensive front with Stevenson. Player, who has 17 career starts, totaled 37 tackles and was second on the team with 9.5 stops for lost yardage. Stevenson, who has started 27 career games, is a mountain of a man in the middle. Last year, he totaled 17 tackles and 2.5 TFLs.

Goodlow started five of Tulsa's nine games and tallied 32 tackles, while sharing the team-high for sacks with four.

Cullen Wick (6-4, 264) will battle with Goodlow for the starting spot at the end position. Wick has seven career starts and last year totaled 12 stops and 3.5 tackles for lost yardage in an injury-laden season.

Senior Deven Lamp (6-4, 253) missed most of the 2020 season with injuries, but when healthy he can be effective against opposing offenses. He will split time on both sides of the defensive front. Sophomore Everitt Rogers (6-2, 303) saw valuable playing time at nose guard last year as a true freshman and will once again make a strong one-two punch with Stevenson.

Another returning letterwinner who played as a true freshman last season was Haydon Grant (6-5, 250). He, like Rogers, will only get better with playing time and experience. Grant's first career tackle went for a four-yad loss in the USF game a year ago.

Graduate transfer Elijah Taylor (6-3, 280) will add more pop to the defensive front. He brings collegiate experience from Notre Dame and most recently Eastern Kentucky. In his career, Taylor has totaled 52 tackles and five stops for lost yardage.

The Hurricane will look for added depth from returnees Bryce Alonso (6-3, 254) and Joseph Anderson (6-0, 272), both juniors, as well as sophomores Cooper Laake (6-3, 262) and Darrius Murdock (6-4, 273).

Tulsa's lone high school newcomer to the defensive line is all-state selection Owen Ostroski

(6-2, 245) from nearby Holland Hall High School. Ostroski was dominant as a senior while racking up 94 tackles, 41 for loss and 15 sacks in helping his prep team register a 12-0 record en route to a Class 3A state title.

Linebackers

The biggest loss that the Hurricane linebacking corps endured from last year was when College Football's Defensive Player of the Year Zaven Collins declared for the NFL draft and was chosen with the 16th pick in the first round by the Arizona Cardinals.

Collins was the Bronko Nagurski, Chuck Bednarik and Lombardi Award winner in 2020, while also earning Consensus All-America and AAC Defensive Player of the Year accolades.

But... the cupboard is not bare in 2021.

A total of eight lettermen return as does six players with starting collegiate experience, including five with the Hurricane.

Graduate Treyvon Reeves (6-2, 224) is the returning starter at the STAR position and back for his fifth season of competition after tallying 43 tackles and 5.5 stops for lost yardage last year. Senior Grant Sawyer (6-2, 220) will battle Reeves for the starting spot, but no matter who gets the nod both will see considerable playing time. A year ago, Sawyer totaled 23 tackles and was fourth on the squad with seven tackles for lost yardage.

Junior Brian Johnson (6-1, 193), who transferred to Tulsa last year from Texas A&M, will also compete for playing time. He had five stops in just six games a season ago. Freshman Jaden Moore (6-3, 220) and walk-on Sam Clayton (6-0, 201) add depth at the STAR spot.

Second-team all-conference selection Justin Wright (6-2, 239) returns to hold down the starting spot at the MIKE position. He had a break-out year in 2020 with 62 tackles, nine stops for -23 yards and also had one interception and one fumble

recovery. Sophomore Dorian Hopkins (6-0, 235) saw valuable playing time last year at the MIKE slot while totaling nine tackles.

Walk-ons Trevor Reh (6-2, 223) and Daniel Giddens II (6-1, 217) add depth to the position.

The task of filling in for the All-American Collins at the WILL position will fall to returnees Robert Revels III (6-2, 217) and Yohance Burnett (6-1, 223) and graduate transfer Jon-Michael Terry (6-3, 252).

In 2018, the WILL position was Revels' until an injury sidelined him and gave way for Collins to star. Since then, Revels has seen valuable playing time before and after the injury and this year will compete for a starting spot. After transferring from Navarro Junior College, Burnett missed the 2018 and 2020 seasons with ACL injuries. In 2019, he played in all 12 games and collected 34 tackles.

Terry comes to Tulsa after playing 42 games in four seasons at Oklahoma. He had 52 career tackles and 5.5 stops for lost yards with the Sooners.

Junior Mitchell Kulkin (6-0, 213) and sophomore Bershard Glaspie Jr. (6-2, 209) add depth to the WILL position. Kulkin was a key member of the special teams unit last year and when called upon at linebacker performed solidly.

Defensive Secondary

Tulsa returns 10 lettermen to the secondary, including six players who have started at least one game in their careers.

The safety and nickel safety positions return eight of those letterwinners.

Tulsa's returning leader in tackles and pass breakups is strong safety Kendarin Ray (6-4, 200). The junior had 63 tackles and seven breakups a year ago. He is backed up by sophomore Jaise Oliver (6-2, 201) and Jett Hendrix (6-0, 189). Oliver totaled 11 tackles, while Hendrix had five stops.

The free safety spot is manned by returning starter TieNeal Martin (6-1, 203), while LJ Wallace (6-3, 200) also brings experience to the position. Martin had 27 tackles and six pass breakups in the

2020 season.

Redshirt freshman Sean O'Keefe (6-2, 194) continues in providing length on the backend for the Hurricane and will be looked upon to add quality depth in 2020. True freshman ion Hopes (6-3, 180) also adds great size and athletic ability at the safety spot.

At the nickel safety position, graduate Cristian Williams (6-0, 180) returns for a seventh year due to the COVID year. He returned in 2020 after being granted the year when he missed most of the 2018 season with what at the time was thought to be a career-ending injury.

Williams totaled 48 stops and four pass breakups a year ago, while backup Bryson Powers (6-0, 198) totaled 17 tackles, forced two fumbles and had two fumble recoveries. Powers has made eight career starts for the Hurricane.

Daiquain Jackson (5-10, 213) has played a vital role on Tulsa's special teams unit, but also adds solid depth at the nickel spot.

Walk-ons Brad Hensley (6-0, 172) at free safety and Hunter Rangel (5-9, 180) at nickel add depth to the positions.

The cornerback position was hit the hardest by departures as starters Akayleb Evans, Allie Green and Ryan Nixon left the roster. Two letterwinners – Tyon Davis (6-0, 180) and Reggie Ellis (6-0, 185) – return the only experience on the corners.

Davis saw considerable playing time in all nine games a year ago and recorded 16 tackles, including 14 solos, and added two pass breakups and forced one fumble. Ellis saw playing time in the secondary as well as on special teams and had three tackles as a redshirt freshman.

The Hurricane will look toward incoming transfers Travon Fuller (6-1, 180), Kenney Solomon (6-0, 185) and Tyree Carlisle (6-1, 180) to help fill the void at cornerback. Fuller is a graduate transfer from Texas A&M, where he played in 40 games and recorded 21 tackles for the Aggies.

Solomon comes to Tulsa after two seasons at Tennessee, playing his freshman season at corner and running back as a sophomore. Carlisle is a junior college transfer from Independence Community College.

A pair of redshirt freshmen, DaMarco Williams (6-5, 190) and Kaylon Washington (6-2, 207), bring great size and length to the corners.

THE SPECIAL TEAMS

Tulsa's special teams returns its four specialists for the 2021 campaign.

After handling only kickoffs a year earlier, Zack Long (6-2, 177) was called upon to take over placements in 2020. Long took over placements after the first game and went on to knock through 12-of-15 field goals and 25-of-26 PATs. He has also averaged 56.4 yards in his two seasons handling the kick-off duties.

Long's adventure to his role as Tulsa's kicker is not the normal path. He only played soccer in high school and didn't kick a football until joining the Tulsa football team as a walk-on in the spring of 2019.

Redshirt freshman Tyler Tipton (6-2, 183) will compete for the kicking duties, while fellow fresh-

man redshirt Alex Haight (5-10, 172) is also on hand.

Australian Lachlan Wilson (6-3, 194) returns for his second season as the Hurricane punter. The sophomore did not begin playing American football until arriving on campus in the fall of 2019. Before coming to the states, Wilson played Australian football for the Heidelberg Football Club, where he started four years and played the full forward position, which requires punting for goals and passing.

Wilson was solid in his first season as Tulsa's punter with an average of 42.9 yards, while placing 14 of his 42 punts inside the 20-yard line. In just his second career game, Wilson punted seven times for a 45.1 average with four placed inside the 10-yard line and a long of 67 yards in Tulsa's win over #11 UCF. For his performance, Wilson was named the league's Special Teams Player of the Week.

Adam Higuera (6-1, 224) returns for his fifth year as Tulsa's deep snapper. Higuera has been steady handling all the deep snapping duties and was recognized this preseason as an All-America projection by Phil Steele's College Football Magazine.

As steady as Higuera has been snapping, so has holder Cannon Montgomery (5-10, 174), who enters his fourth year as the holder on all placements.

Keylon Stokes (5-10, 198), ranked third all-time for all-purpose yardage in school history with 3,956 yards, is back for the Hurricane. He has tallied 1,244 kickoff return and 99 punt return yards in his career.

Stokes and a bevy of talented skill players will have opportunities to handle returns this year.

SEVENTH YEAR



There was no more excitement for Tulsa football than what the 2020 season provided under Head Coach Philip Montgomery.

In his sixth year, Montgomery led Tulsa to an undefeated 6-0 conference record, an appearance in the AAC Championship Game against No. 6-ranked Cincinnati and a return to a bowl game.

This season is the seventh for Montgomery as The University of Tulsa's head football coach. Considered one of the brightest offensive minds in college football, Montgomery became Tulsa's 33rd head football coach on December 11, 2014.

Montgomery brought excitement back to H.A. Chapman Stadium with his potent offensive style in his first year as the Tulsa head coach, transforming a previous two-win team into a squad that won six games in 2015. He led his first two teams to consecutive bowl game appearances and guided the 2016 team to a 10-win season, the 10th double-digit win campaign in school history.

In year one, Tulsa ranked among the nation's leaders the entire season for passing, scoring and total offense, while appearing in the 2015 Camping World Independence Bowl. Tulsa completed the 2015 season ranked 11th nationally in passing, 13th in total offense and 21st in scoring.

After that first year, Montgomery's second team took a giant leap by posting a 10-3 record, finishing in second place in the American Athletic Conference West Division and claiming a 55-10 victory over Central Michigan in the 2016 Miami Beach Bowl. The 2016 Tulsa squad finished the season among the nation's best for total offense (527.0), scoring offense (42.5), rushing offense (261.7) and passing (265.3). The Hurricane ranked 4th for total offense, 7th for scoring, 8th for rushing and 30th for passing.

Tulsa's offense also established an NCAA record in 2016, becoming the first team in FBS/DI history with a 3,000-yard passer (Dane Evans), two 1,000-yard rushers (James Flanders and D'Angelo Brewer) and two 1,000-yard receivers (Keevan Lucas and Josh Atkinson).

Tulsa established 11 individual school records on offense in 2016, including nine career records, one single-season and one single-game record. It was also an offense that set a school record with eight 300+ rushing games. The defensive unit has shown marked improvement since day one of Montgomery's tenure and in 2018 held opponents to 120+ yards less than the year before while transitioning to a 3-3-5 defense.

The Hurricane fielded a young squad, both offensively and defensively, during the 2017 campaign and suffered setbacks against three top-25 teams, while also losing two games on last-second field goals. Tulsa's offense finished the 2017 campaign ranked 14th nationally in rushing with a 247.3 average per game, while D'Angelo Brewer became the school's and American Athletic Conference's all-time rushing leader.

Tulsa's 2018 offense showed signs of a bright future with a red-shirt freshman quarterback, two sophomores leading the running attack and another sophomore leading the receiving corps in yards and receptions. In 2019, a season-ending 49-24 road win at East Carolina gave the Hurricane a 4-8 record with earlier wins over San Jose State, Wyoming and UCF. An overtime loss at #24 SMU and a last-second loss against #25 Memphis kept the Hurricane from bowl eligibility.

The 2020 season saw the Hurricane play in their first American Athletic Conference Championship Game in the school's first seven seasons as a league member. Tulsa defeated two nationally-ranked opponents for the first time in school history and the play of Zaven Collins propelled him into being honored as a Consensus All-American and the National Defensive Player of the Year, winning both the Chuck Bednarik and Bronko Nagurski Trophies.

Montgomery has compiled an overall 31-40 record after six seasons.

In his tenure as a collegiate coach, Tulsa's the 2020 season marked the 12th time that Montgomery helped take a team to a Bowl game when the

Hurricane appeared in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl.

With Tulsa's 2016 Miami Beach Bowl appearance Montgomery became just the fourth Tulsa head coach to take his first two teams to a bowl game.

Before coming to Tulsa, Montgomery logged nearly two decades of coaching experience, including seven seasons (2008-14) at Baylor University, where he served as the offensive coordinator in his final four years for the Big 12 powerhouse. The Bears posted 10 or more wins in three of his last four seasons, including 11 victories in each of his last two years there. In 2014, Baylor produced an 11-1 record and ranked as high as No. 4 in the Associated Press poll.

A Texas native, Montgomery jumped from the high school level to the collegiate ranks in 2003 when he became the running backs and quarterback coach at the University of Houston. He then moved with head coach Art Briles to Baylor in 2008.

In his career, Montgomery has tutored several award-winning quarterbacks, including Big 12 Player of the Year Bryce Petty, Heisman Trophy winner Robert Griffin III, Baylor All-American Nick Florence, Conference USA MVP Kevin Kolb and Houston standout Case Keenum.

At Tulsa, quarterback Dane Evans completed his career in 2016 as the school's all-time passing, total offense and TD passes leader under Montgomery's tutelage.

Following Baylor's record-breaking 2013 Big 12 championship season, Montgomery was honored as the Offensive Coordinator of the Year by FootballScoop.com and was named a finalist for the Broyles Award given to the nation's top assistant. In 2011, Montgomery was selected as the National Offensive Coordinator of the Year by Rivals.com and was the Quarterback Coach of the Year by SpeedTracs/FootballScoop.com.

Montgomery called plays for an offense ranked among the nation's top two in each of his final four seasons at Baylor. In 2014, Baylor's 581.3 yards per game and 48.8 points led the nation, while the Bears also led the nation in total offense in 2013 (618.8) and ranked second in 2012 (572.2) and 2011 (587.1).

For three straight seasons at Baylor, each with a different quarterback, Montgomery's pupils earned All-America honors. In 2013, Petty joined the list after throwing for 4,200 yards and 32 TDs. He finished seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting and was named the unanimous Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year. In 2012, Florence threw for a school-record 4,309 yards in 2012 and was named an honorable mention All-American by Sports Illustrated.

As backfield coach in 2011 Montgomery coached two All-Americans on an offense that set or tied 101 school records. The Bears completed that season with a 10-3 record and finished ranked 12th (Coaches) and 13th (AP) in the national polls.

In 2010, Griffin III set or tied 11 school records, including the then-single-season passing mark with 3,501 yards. In all, Montgomery assisted a Baylor offense that established 55 school records and ranked 13th nationally (475.3) that season.

Montgomery coached a 2008 Baylor backfield that was as productive as any BU offense in more than a decade. The Bears total points (28.0), rushing yards (2,349) and rushing TDs (29) were the most since 1994, and the total offense average (376.4) was the highest since 1995. Griffin, who threw for 2,091

yards, rushed for 843 and accounted for 28 TDs in 2008, earned Freshman All-America honors under Montgomery's tutelage.

Montgomery arrived at Baylor following five seasons coaching the offensive backfield at Houston, and serving as co-offensive coordinator in 2006 and 2007. During his Houston tenure, the Cougar offense ranked as one of the nation's most prolific. In the 2007 regular season, Houston ranked fourth nationally in total offense (513.1), 10th in rushing offense (239.9), 17th in scoring offense (36.3) and 27th in passing offense (273.2).

Prior to joining the Cougars' coaching staff, Montgomery served one year as the offensive coordinator at Denton (Texas) High School and helped that team compile a 10-2 record and the 2002 Bi-district

crown. Before that, Montgomery was the quarterback and backfield coach at Stephenville High School for six seasons. He was an integral part of a program that won back-to-back Class 4A Division II state championships in 1998 and 1999.

A four-year letterman at Tarleton State, Montgomery began his coaching career as a student assistant at his alma mater, as he worked with the running backs and served as the summer weight room coordinator for two seasons.

Montgomery, 49, received his bachelor's degree in exercise and sports studies from Tarleton in 1995. He and his wife, Ashli, have two children: Cannon and Maci. Cannon is a redshirt senior football student-athlete at Tulsa and Maci is a junior member of the Golden Hurricane spirit squad.

SEVENTH YEAR



Joseph Gillespie is in his third season as defensive coordinator at The University of Tulsa in 2021. In his seventh year at Tulsa, Gillespie continues to coach linebackers for the Golden Hurricane. Gillespie came to Tulsa in January 2015 following 20 years as a high school football coach in the state of Texas.

Gillespie was promoted to defensive coordinator on January 3, 2019, following the retirement of Bill Young.

In 2020, Gillespie was named the *FootballScoop* Linebackers Coach of the Year and was a finalist for Defensive Coordinator of the Year as well.

Gillespie tutored Consensus All-America linebacker and the 2020 Chuck Bednarik, Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Lombardi Award Winner Zaven Collins. During the season, the 6'4" linebacker won the Chuck Bednarik, Walter Camp and Bronko Nagurski Defensive Player of the Week awards in three separate weeks and earned The American's Defensive Player of the Week four times.

But Tulsa's linebacking corps was more than just its leader. In fact, sophomore Justin Wright led the unit with 63 tackles en route to earning second-team all-conference honors, and senior Treyvon Reeves ranked fifth on the team with 43 stops.

Under Gillespie's direction, Tulsa's 2020 defense was ranked second in The American for total defense, scoring defense, rushing defense, pass defense and pass defense efficiency. Tulsa also ranked among the nation's best defenses for a variety of statistical categories. The Hurricane held opponents to 333.6 total yards (19th in NCAA) and 21.6 points per game (27th in NCAA). Tulsa also ranked 18th for fewest passing yards, 19th nationally in pass efficiency defense, 20th in red zone defense and 43rd in rushing defense.

In the 2020 season, Tulsa's defense totaled 69 tackles for loss, 23 quarterback sacks, 32 pass breakups, 10 forced fumbles, 10 fumble recoveries and six interceptions, including two returned for touchdowns.

Collins was the 16th pick in the first round of the NFL Draft by the Arizona Cardinals, becoming the third Hurricane defender to be drafted within the last two years. A year earlier, cornerback Reggie Robinson II was a fourth round Dallas Cowboys draft choice and defensive end Trevis Gipson was selected by the Chicago Bears in the fifth round.

Gillespie helped transition the Hurricane from a base 4-man front to a 3-3-5 alignment in 2018 as Tulsa's defensive numbers emphatically improved. Tulsa ended the 2018 regular season with the nation's 8th best pass defense, while allowing opponents 120+ yards less in total offense than a year earlier. The defensive unit continued to show

improvement last season, cutting opponents total yardage to under 400 yards per game.

He has been a part of three bowl teams with the Hurricane, including the 2015 Camping World Independence Bowl, 2016 Miami Beach Bowl and 2020 Armed Forces Bowl.

Before coming to Tulsa, Gillespie spent seven years (2008-14) as the athletic director and head football coach at Stephenville (Texas) High School. His teams compiled a .758 winning percentage with an overall 72-23 record, while winning the district championship three times, sharing the district crown once, advancing to the state playoffs seven times and winning one state championship.

Gillespie led his 2012 team to a 13-1 overall record and the Class 3A state title, while a year later his team compiled a 12-2 mark and advanced to the Class 4A state semifinals. Gillespie's 2014 team finished the season with a 9-4 record and advanced to the state quarterfinal round.

He coached former Auburn star and current New England Patriots quarterback Jarrett Stidham at Stephenville.

In his first season, Gillespie led Stephenville to a 10-4 record and a quarterfinal appearance in the 2008 Class 4A state playoffs. His 2009 team recorded a 9-3 mark and was undefeated in District 7-4A, while in 2010 posted an 8-6 record and advanced to the Class 4A state quarterfinals. The 2011 team registered an overall 11-3 mark and again advanced to the Class 4A state quarterfinals.

Gillespie earned District Coach of the Year honors four times (2009, 2011, 2012 and 2013) and was the Big Country Coach of the Year for three seasons (2008, 2011 and 2012).

Before becoming the Stephenville head coach in February 2008, Gillespie served 13 years as an assistant coach at the school. He coached under Art Briles for five years, Texas High School Hall of Honor inductee Mike Copeland for three seasons and Chad Morris for five years.

As an assistant coach, Gillespie helped lead Stephenville to two state titles, coming in 1998 and 1999. Gillespie coached linebackers and safeties under Morris and was the co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach under Copeland.

A Stephenville native, Gillespie earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Angelo State in 1994.

Gillespie and his wife, Jodi, have three children: sons Josh and Jake, daughter Chelsea and son-in-law, Tyler, grandson Emmerson and granddaughter Ayla.

Carlton Buckels

Defensive Passing Game Coordinator & Cornerbacks Coach

FOURTH YEAR



Carlton Buckels enters his fourth season on the Golden Hurricane coaching staff after joining The University of Tulsa in March 2018. He was promoted to defensive passing game coordinator and moved to coaching the cornerbacks in March 2021 after his first three seasons as safeties coach.

Buckles has 22 years of collegiate coaching experience, all as a defensive secondary coach.

Tulsa's 2020 defense ranked second in the American Athletic Conference for total defense, scoring defense, rushing defense, pass defense and pass defense efficiency. Nationally, Tulsa was 18th for fewest passing yards, 19th nationally in pass efficiency defense, 19th for total defense and 27th for fewest points per game.

In Buckels' first year, the 2018 Tulsa defense completed the season with the nation's eighth best pass defense, holding the opposition to 174.6 yards per game. Tulsa also led the American Athletic Conference in pass defense and ranked fourth for defensive pass efficiency.

Last year, sophomore safety Kendarin Ray led the Hurricane in tackles and pass breakups. In 2019, Buckels' two starting safeties, Brandon Johnson and Manny Bunch, ranked third and fourth on the team for tackles and tied for second in pass breakups.

Buckles came to Tulsa following one season as the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Belhaven University in Jackson, Mississippi.

A native of Louisiana, Buckels played collegiately at LSU and coached high school football in the state, allowing the Hurricane to expand its recruiting blueprint in the state of Louisiana even more.

Buckles received his start in collegiate coaching at his alma mater, LSU, where he served as a graduate assistant under Nick Saban and Gerry Dinardo. He worked with the defense and special teams, while earning his master's degree in 2001.

Before beginning his collegiate coaching career, Buckels coached at Hammonds (La.) High School from 1996-99, helping the Tornados to the Class 4A state semifinals in 1996 and 1997 as a defensive assistant coach.

Buckles' collegiate coaching stops have included Delta State (2001-02), Southeastern Louisiana (2003-04), New Mexico State (2005-07), North Texas (2009-10) and Baylor University (2011-16). In the summer of 2010, Buckels worked with the NFL's Oakland Raiders coaching staff as a part of the Bill Walsh Minority Coaching Fellowship Program.

Buckles was a two-time all-state defensive back at Amite (La.) High School before going on to a four-year career at LSU. A four-year letterman (1989-92), Buckels served as team captain and earned special teams MVP honors in 1991. He tallied six career interceptions and returned one for a touchdown.

After LSU, he had stints in professional football with the CFL's Baltimore Stallions and the semi-pro

Louisiana Bayou Thunder.

Buckles and his wife, Kyra, have three sons: Justin, Carsyn and Carlon.

Jayden Everett

Running Backs Coach

FIRST YEAR

Jayden Everett joined The University of Tulsa coaching staff as running backs coach in March 2021.

Everett came to Tulsa following two seasons (2019-20) as the running backs coach at the University of Akron. Before that, Everett served as the running backs coach at Central Michigan for two seasons (2017-18).

At Akron, Everett helped develop a strong core of running backs, most notable being Teon Dollard, who became the first Zip to earn first-team All-MAC honors at running back in school history, and only the fourth Akron offensive player to do so. Dollard rushed for 666 yards and six touchdowns on 112 carries.

In 2017, Central Michigan's Jonathan Ward emerged as a budding star under Everett's tutelage, rushing for 1,019 yards, rolling up 470 yards in receptions and scoring 13 touchdowns. He became the first CMU back to rush for 1,000 yards since 2014. Ward, who ranked second in the MAC with an average of 5.7 yards per carry, was among a slew of talented returnees with whom Everett worked. A 2018 *USA Today* preseason Top 25 running back, he was ranked No. 21, one of only two backs to rush for 1,000 yards and catch passes for over 500 yards in 2017. Ward is now a member of the Arizona Cardinals backfield.

Everett's most notable recruit at Central Michigan was running back Lew Nichols Jr., who became the 2020 MAC Freshman of the Year.

Before joining the Chippewas, Everett spent four seasons (2013-16) at his alma mater, Indiana State, as running backs coach. He also served as ISU's recruiting coordinator in 2016. Everett

coached standout running back Shakir Bell, who completed his career ranked second in school history with 4,214 rushing yards. Zach Hanson is in his second season on The University of Tulsa coaching staff. He was appointed offensive line coach in February 2020, coming to the Golden Hurricane following one season at the University of Oklahoma.

In his first year with the Hurricane all five of Hanson's offensive linemen earned American Athletic Conference postseason honors, while redshirt freshman Tyler Smith was a Freshman All-America selection by *The Athletic* and FWAA. Smith was also a first-team all-conference pick and fellow tackle Chris Paul earned second team honors. Center Gerard Warren and guards Dante Bivens and Dylan Coach were honorable mention performers.

Before coming to Tulsa, Hanson was a senior offensive analyst in 2019 where he helped the Sooners reach the College Football Playoffs. Previously, Hanson spent the 2018 season as the tight ends and assistant offensive line coach at his

alma mater, Kansas State, under legendary coach Bill Snyder.

Prior to his K-State return, Hanson spent two seasons (2016-17) at North Carolina working as a graduate assistant for special teams. Hanson helped develop the Tar Heels' special teams' unit during his tenure. The punt coverage team led the nation in 2016, allowing opponents only two yards on nine returns. Carolina also finished the season ranked second in the nation for kickoff return average (26.97).

Under Hanson's tutelage, freshman punter Tom Sheldon earned *USA Today* Freshman All-America accolades, while ranking in the top-20 nationally for net punting. Senior place-kicker Nick Weiler earned ACC honorable mention merits after booting 15 field goals, including a 54-yard game-winner at Florida State.

Hanson spent the previous four seasons (2012-15) at K-State, including the final three as an offensive graduate assistant. He served as K-State's offensive quality control coach in 2012 as he assisted in film breakdown and scouting reports among other duties. After working with the offensive line for his first three seasons on staff, Hanson spent the fourth working with K-State's wide receivers. As a member of the staff, Hanson helped the Wildcats earn four bowl appearances, including a trip to the Fiesta Bowl in the Big 12 Championship season of 2012.

Hanson, who played in 37 games for the Wildcats as an offensive tackle from 2009-11, earned 2011 first-team All-Big 12 and second-team Academic All-Big 12 accolades. He started at left tackle for the Wildcats in 2011, helping K-State earn a 10-3 record and an appearance in the AT&T Cotton Bowl. Hanson also started several games in 2010, playing significant time while rotating between left and right tackle throughout the season en route to earning honorable mention All-Big 12 merits.

Calvin Lowry is in his seventh season coaching the Golden Hurricane receivers and his first as Co-Passing Game Coordinator. He also coaches Tulsa's special teams. A three-year NFL veteran, Lowry joined The University of Tulsa football coaching staff on January 2, 2015..

He has been a part of three bowl teams with the Hurricane, including the 2015 Camping World Independence Bowl, 2016 Miami Beach Bowl and 2020 Armed Forces Bowl.

In his tenure, Lowry has had five Hurricane five receivers surpass 1,000 yards in a single season. In his first three years, Lowry tutored three receivers – Keegan Lucas, Keyarris Garrett and Josh Atkinson – who completed their careers ranked among the top-7 receiving leaders in school history. Lucas and Garrett each surpassed 3,000 yards in their careers, while Atkinson had 2,600+ receiving yards.

In 2015, Garrett was the nation's leading receiver with 1,588 yards for a 122.2-yard average per game, while Lucas and Atkinson each ranked among the top-35 nationally in 2016. Garrett (2015) and Lucas (2016) earned first-team American Athletic Conference honors.

Keylon Stokes became the fifth 1,000-yard receiver in a season under Lowry when he hauled in 62 passes for 1,040 yards in 2019. In the nine-game 2020 season, Tulsa had four receivers average over 13 yards per reception and over 40 yards per game.

Before coming to Tulsa, Lowry spent three seasons at Baylor University, including two years as an assistant director of operations and one as a graduate assistant coach. He worked with Baylor's offense and special teams in that one season.

Previously, Lowry spent one season at St. Andrew's Episcopal High School in Austin, Texas, where he coached wide receivers, secondary and special teams in 2011.

A former All-Big Ten safety, Lowry spent three full seasons in the NFL, where he played special teams and safety for the Tennessee Titans (2006 and 2007), Denver Broncos (2008) and Jacksonville Jaguars (2008). He also spent the 2009 training camp with the Detroit Lions. Lowry was a fourth-round draft pick of the Titans in 2006. He played in 43 games and totaled 86 tackles, 13 pass deflections and started 14 games in his NFL career. Lowry's best season statistically came in the 2007 season when he collected 57 tackles, including 42 solos, and had two interceptions for Tennessee.

A four-year letterman and starter at Penn State, Lowry was a first-team All-Big Ten safety in 2005 as a senior after collecting 79 tackles and four interceptions. He totaled nine career interceptions and was PSU's leading punt returner for three seasons. In 2002, Lowry became the first true freshman to start for legendary Head Coach Joe Paterno.

Lowry was a four-year standout at Douglas Byrd High School in Fayetteville, N.C., as a wide receiver and defensive back. A native of Fort Hood,

Texas, Lowry called Fayetteville home from age 3 through college.

Lowry received his bachelor's degree in Crime, Law and Justice from Penn State in 2007.

Jordan Najvar is in his sixth year on the Tulsa coaching staff and his fourth coaching the tight ends. He came to Tulsa in January 2016 and spent his first two seasons as an offensive quality control coach.

Najvar was promoted to Golden Hurricane tight ends coach in February 2018. Under his tutelage, nearly 20 percent of receptions by Tulsa tight ends have gone for touchdowns over the last three seasons.

Najvar has been involved in seven bowl games in his career, including five as a player and two as a coach, both with the Hurricane. He was a part of the 2016 Miami Beach Bowl and 2020 Armed Forces Bowl teams.

In his first season at Tulsa, the 2016 Hurricane offense set a school record with eight 300+ rushing games and also ranked among the nation's top-10 for total offense (4th), scoring (7th) and rushing (8th). In 2017, the Tulsa offense was 14th in the nation for rushing and ranked 44th for total offense, while in 2018 the Hurricane had the nation's 35th best rushing offense.

Najvar came to Tulsa after playing professionally for two seasons. He was an undrafted free agent signee in 2014 with the Dallas Cowboys, where he spent one year. He also spent a portion of the 2015 season with the Brooklyn Bolts of the FXFL Developmental League.

A three-year starting tight end at Baylor (2011-13), Najvar was a three-time all-Big 12 honorable mention selection with the Bears. Najvar transferred to Baylor in 2010 from Stanford, where he

Nickel Safeties Coach

10TH YEAR



Luke Olson is in his 10th year on the Tulsa football coaching staff and his third as a full-time assistant coach. Olson coaches the nickel safeties after being promoted to the position in February 2019. He also coordinated the punt return unit the last two seasons.

At Tulsa, Olson served as a graduate assistant coach for three seasons and four years as a defensive quality control coach.

Tulsa has reached a bowl game four times in his tenure, including the 2012 AutoZone Liberty Bowl, 2015 Camping World Independence Bowl, 2016 Miami Beach Bowl and 2020 Armed Forces Bowl.

Tulsa's 2020 defense was ranked second in The American for total defense, scoring defense, rushing defense, pass defense and pass defense efficiency. Tulsa also ranked among the nation's best defenses for a variety of statistical categories. The nickel safety position was responsible for 72 tackles, five pass breakups and four forced fumbles last year. In 2019, the position totaled 81 total tackles, three pass break-ups, three forced fumbles and one interception.

Olson was part of the 2018 coaching staff that saw its defense transition from a base 4-man front to a 3-3-5 alignment. The Hurricane finished the season with the nation's 8th best pass defense, while also allowing opponents 120+ yards less in total offense than a year earlier.

In 2016, the Tulsa defense held opponents to 10 points and 110.1 yards fewer than in the 2015

season. Tulsa's defense also forced 21 turnovers with 15 of those takeaways leading to 101 points in the 2016 campaign.

Previously, Olson served as a graduate assistant coach for two seasons (2013-14), helping coach the defensive backs. Before that, he assisted coaching the defensive line as a graduate assistant in 2012.

During his coaching tenure at Tulsa, Olson has been involved in every aspect of helping prepare the Tulsa defense from directing the offensive scout team, film break down, defensive signal-calling, coaching the STAR linebacker and the nickel safety positions, as well as other responsibilities. Olson has also coordinated the Philip Montgomery Football Camps since 2018.

When Olson helped coach the Tulsa defensive line in 2012, the Hurricane defense ranked among the nation's leaders for quarterback sacks, while defensive linemen totaled 32 of 53 team sacks for -205 yards. The Hurricane won the 2012 Conference USA Championship and AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

Before coming to Tulsa, Olson was a four-year starter (2008-11) at Southern Nazarene University, where he played free safety and linebacker. Olson was an Academic all-Central States Football League (CSFL) selection each year, while earning all-conference accolades in 2009.

Olson earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Southern Nazarene in 2012, while receiving a master's degree in May 2014 from Tulsa in Methods in Educational Research.

Olson played prep football at Tulsa's Union High School.

Kendrick Shaver was named to the Tulsa football coaching staff as safeties coach in March 2021.

A native Oklahoman, Shaver has coached safeties, cornerbacks and outside linebackers in his career and has also served a stint as co-defensive coordinator since beginning his collegiate coaching career in 2004. Shaver, most recently, spent

two seasons (2018-19) at Washington State, where he served as the Cougar safeties and NICKEL coach.

He was a part of two bowl games at Washington State, including the 2018 Alamo Bowl and 2019 Cheez-It Bowl. In 2018, Shaver's group of safeties and Nickels combined for six interceptions and 10 tackles-for-loss while helping the Cougars finish fourth in the Pac-12 in total defense, fourth in pass defense and tied for second in takeaways.

Prior to WSU, Shaver coached seven seasons (2011-17) at Utah State, including the final two as the co-defensive coordinator. Shaver spent six seasons coaching in the secondary before working with outside linebackers in 2017. He was part of a Utah State program that played in a school-record six-straight bowl games, to go along with a 2012 Western Athletic Conference championship.

In his final two seasons, the Aggie defense ranked among the top-20 nationally in fewest passing yards allowed, finishing the 2017 season ranked 19th for allowing 182.5 passing yards per game. The Aggies also forced 29 turnovers that season to rank sixth nationally.

Throughout his seven years on the Aggies' defensive staff, Utah State was at or the near the top of the Mountain West Conference and among the top third of the national defensive leaders in several categories. In 2013 and 2014, the USU defense ranked seventh and 12th, respectively, in scoring defense. He also mentored future NFL draft selections Will Davis (2013) and Nevin Lawson (2014).

Shaver was named FootballScoop.com's Co-Defensive Backs National Coach of the Year in 2012. He also served an NFL Minority Coaching Fellowship with the Oakland Raiders in 2014.

Before his appointment at Utah State, Shaver spent four years (2007-10) as the secondary coach at Northern Colorado. He also served as the secondary coach and recruiting coordinator at Northeastern Oklahoma A&M (2006), and defensive and special teams graduate assistant at Eastern Kentucky (2004-05).

Shaver began his coaching career at Hillcrest (Mo.) High School, where he coached defensive backs and wide receivers in 2002.

Beau Trahan

Co-Passing Game Coordinator & Quarterbacks Coach

SIXTH YEAR



Beau Trahan enters his sixth season as a member of The University of Tulsa football coaching staff, joining the Golden Hurricane in January 2016. Trahan is in his first season as Co-Passing Game Coordinator, while coaching the Tulsa quarterbacks.

Two of his protogees rank among the school's career top-10 passers. Dane Evans is Tulsa's all-time leader with 11,680 yards and Zach Smith with 5,226 yards in just two seasons is eighth on the school's career passing chart.

In 2016, Evans became the school's career leader for passing yards, completions, attempts, 300-yard passing games, total offense and TD passes. Evans threw for 3,348 yards and 32 touchdowns during the 2016 season under Trahan's tutelage, thus helping the Hurricane post a 10-3 record and win the Miami Beach Bowl that year. It was also an offense that set an NCAA record by becoming the first FBS/DI school to have a 3,000-yard passer, two 1,000-yard rushers and two 1,000-yard receivers in the same season.

Trahan tutored freshman quarterback starters in two consecutive seasons, 2017 and 2018. In the 2018 campaign, redshirt freshman Seth Boomer showed steady progress by completing 61.2-percent of his passes for 945 yards, seven TDs and two interceptions in Tulsa's final five games.

In 2019, junior Zach Smith threw for 3,279 yards and 19 touchdowns with a 131.9 pass efficiency rating after sitting out a transfer year in 2018. Smith averaged 216.3 yards per game with 13 TDs in last year's shortened nine-game season.

Before coming to Tulsa, Trahan spent eight years at Baylor University. He spent his final two seasons as the Bears' assistant athletic director in charge of high school relations and coordinator of recruiting for football. Before that, Trahan served as Baylor's director of football operations for three seasons and previously was the director of high school relations for three years.

A four-year letterman at the University of Texas (1999-2002), Trahan began his collegiate playing career as a quarterback and then moved to safety. He returned to the quarterback position in 2001 and 2002. Trahan served as a team captain during his senior season of 2002.

Following his playing career, Trahan launched his collegiate coaching career in 2003 as a graduate assistant on the defensive side of the ball at Texas. He assisted with coaching the defensive backs and special teams. From UT, Trahan joined the coach-

ing staff at the University of Houston in 2004 as an offensive graduate assistant coach, coaching under Philip Montgomery. He coached tight ends for the Cougars and assisted with coaching the special teams.

From 2005-08, Trahan was an assistant coach at Dickinson (Texas) High School, where he coached the quarterbacks and served as co-offensive coordinator under his father, legendary Warren "Bull" Trahan.

Trahan received his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from the University of Texas in 2002. He and his wife, Lauren, have two daughters: Abigail and Anne.

He was part of a coaching staff in 2019 that helped EKU's defense finish second in the OVC in points allowed, second in total defense, second in rushing defense and third in passing defense. Eastern Kentucky was fifth in the nation in third down defense, seventh in fourth down defense, 11th in red-zone defense, 15th in rushing defense, 16th in total defense and 22nd in scoring defense in 2019.

Before his time at EKU, Williams spent two seasons as the defensive line coach at Kansas (2017-18). Under Williams' guidance, defensive tackle Daniel Wise earned first-team All-Big 12 honors in 2017 and 2018. Defensive end Dorance Armstrong Jr. was a second team all-conference honoree in 2017. Wise had one of the best seasons of any defensive lineman in the Big 12 in 2017 as he turned in 16 tackles-for-loss, including seven sacks. He ranked second in the Big 12 in tackles for a loss and 11th in the FBS rankings.

Williams arrived at Kansas after spending five seasons (2012-16) as the defensive line coach at Ohio. The 2016 Bobcat defense produced 104 tackles-for-loss, manufactured 44 sacks and held opponents to 104.4 yards rushing per game. Williams' defensive line broke through blocking schemes for 59.5 tackles for a loss and sacked the quarterback 31.5 times. Williams tutored the 2016 Mid-American Conference (MAC) Defensive Player of the Year Tarell Basham to a team-high 11.5 sacks. Williams also helped Casey Sayles to third team All-MAC honors with six sacks and 7.5 tackles for a loss.

In 2014, the Bobcat defense was stout against the run allowing only 132 yards on the ground per game and holding opponents to under 100 yards in six games. Williams' defensive line recorded 12 sacks. In 2013, Williams directed a defensive line that accounted for 36 sacks, which tied for 20th in the country and ranked second in the MAC.

Basham made an immediate impact as a rookie, totaling 7.5 sacks, which tied for fifth all-time for a single season. He was named to the Football Writers Association of American (FWAA) Freshmen All-America Team.

In his first season at Ohio, Williams led a defensive line unit that combined for 249 tackles, 39 tackles-for-loss and 14.5 sacks on a team that played in and won the Independence Bowl.

Before his tenure at Ohio, Williams was the defensive line coach at New Mexico State (2009-11), Nebraska-Kearney (2007-08), Colorado State (2007), Holy Cross (1996-97), Eastern Washington (1995), Portland State (1992-94) and Sonoma State (1988-91). He also served as the defensive ends coach at Colorado State (1999-06) and San Jose State (1998). Williams also served as the special team's coordinator at San Jose State and Holy Cross.

During his career, Williams has recruited California, Georgia, Illinois, Louisiana, Michigan, Texas, Florida and Ohio. He played collegiately at Riverside City College and Sonoma State University.

Williams and his wife, Felicia, have three sons, Jessien, Jesse III and Albert.

A college coaching veteran of 32 years, Jesse Williams joined The University of Tulsa coaching staff in February 2021 as defensive line coach.

Williams has coached the defensive line for all 32 of those seasons. He started his career at his alma mater, Sonoma State, in 1988, and has also coaches at Portland State, Eastern Washington, Holy Cross, San Jose State, Colorado State, Nebraska-Kearney, New Mexico State, Ohio, Kansas and his most recent stint at Eastern Kentucky.

Williams came to Tulsa after spending the 2019 season at Eastern Kentucky. He coached FCS first-team All-American and Ohio Valley Conference Defensive Player of the Year Aaron Patrick in 2019. Williams also tutored Taquan Evans to second team all-conference recognition. Evans' eight sacks in 2019 were the ninth most in one season in program history.

Brad Carson

PRESIDENT

Brad Carson is The University of Tulsa's 21st president. Having built a distinguished career in public service, law and education, before becoming president of TU, Carson was a professor at the University of Virginia, teaching courses related to national security and public sector innovation. He also served as a senior advisor at Boston Consulting Group.

In 2015, President Barack Obama appointed Carson acting under secretary of defense for personnel and readiness at the U.S. Department of Defense. There, he oversaw the human resources, military readiness, education, training and health care of the nearly 5 million service members, civilian employees and their dependents within the Department of Defense and managed an internal organization of 30,000 employees.

Prior to that, Carson served as the under secretary of the U.S. Army, where he managed the daily operations of the largest military service, and as general counsel of the U.S. Army, where he oversaw the service's worldwide legal operations.

Carson is widely published and is a noted authority on national security, energy policy and American politics. From 2001 to 2005, Carson

served two terms as a U.S. congressman, representing Oklahoma's 2nd District. Later, he was appointed to the faculty of TU's Collins College of Business and College of Law, where he taught courses on energy policy, property law, negotiation and game theory, globalization and law and literature. In 2008, Carson deployed during Operation Iraqi Freedom as an intelligence officer and was awarded the Bronze Star for his service.

Carson brings to TU a strong commitment to diversity and inclusion, having spent most of his career working, directly or indirectly, in this area. This interest arises naturally from his childhood growing up on Indian reservations around the country and, later, representing the congressional district that is home to the Cherokee Nation. Carson served as president and chief executive officer of Cherokee Nation Businesses, where he refocused the organization's corporate strategy and governance and significantly increased revenues.

Raised in Oklahoma, Carson received his BA from Baylor University and was a Rhodes Scholar at the University of Oxford. He then went on to earn a JD at the University of Oklahoma.



Rick Dickson

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Rick Dickson, a Tulsa native who led The University of Tulsa's athletics program in the early 1990s, returned to his alma mater as Director of Athletics in September 2020.

Dickson's prolific career includes five years as athletic director at The University of Tulsa from 1990 to 1994 before leading athletic programs at Washington State University (1994-2000) and Tulane University (2000-2015). Programs under Dickson's leadership saw dozens of conference championships and scores well above the national average in the NCAA's Academic Performance Rates.

Dickson attended Tulsa's Bishop Kelley High School and played football for the Golden Hurricane before graduating from TU in 1977.

Under Dickson's tenure in the early 1990s, Tulsa's football program landed a berth in the Freedom Bowl in 1991 and the men's basketball program saw Sweet 16 success in the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament under coach Tubby Smith, who Dickson hired. Before leaving Tulsa for Washington State in 1994, Dickson helped the university secure membership in the Western Athletic Conference.

At Washington State, Dickson oversaw an athletics program that was recognized nationally for its success in dealing with gender equity issues. He raised funds for a capital campaign that funded scholarships and endowments, an indoor practice facility, and the renovation of Bohler Gymnasium. Washington State enjoyed its highest ever Learfield Cup Ranking during his tenure, highlighted in 1998 by the football team's first Rose Bowl appearance in 67 years.

While at Tulane, Dickson was credited with

helping the athletic program and community rebound after the destruction of Hurricane Katrina in 2005. Teams under his tenure won 41 conference titles and advanced to NCAA postseason play 36 times.

Following a 2003 Board Review that resulted in a unanimous resolution reaffirming the institution's Div-1A status, Dickson assumed the task of building a permanent foundation of support for Tulane Athletics through the Perpetual Wave Campaign. During the review, Dickson guided the department through an intense campaign that saw football season ticket sales more than triple, as well as secure funding for the new Greer Baseball Field, Yulman Football Stadium, Devlin Fieldhouse, The Hertz Center and numerous other facilities and program updates.

Following his retirement in 2016, Dickson formed R.P. Dickson Consulting LLC, which has assisted many universities with multiple projects including Title IX reviews, departmental organization, fundraising and marketing campaigns, and facility development.

In 2019, Dickson accepted a year-long role as the CFP New Orleans ambassador, serving the Extra Yards for Teachers Campaign that supports public school teachers of New Orleans.

Dickson replaced Derrick Gragg, who led Tulsa athletics since 2013 and announced in August he was leaving TU for a position at the NCAA as senior vice president for inclusion, education and community engagement.

Dickson and his wife, Brenda, who graduated from TU in 1979, have four adult children: Kari, Kasi, Kelli, and Doug, and six grandchildren.



Linebacker Zaven Collins was named College Football's Defensive Player of the Year, winning the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Chuck Bednarik Award. He also was the Lombardi Award winner.

GAME 1

#11 Oklahoma State 16, Tulsa 7

Sept. 19, 2020 • Boone Pickens Stadium

STILLWATER, Okla. — The 11th-ranked Oklahoma State Cowboys scored 13 fourth quarter points to pull out a 16-7 victory over Tulsa in front of a COVID altered crowd of 14,668 fans at Boone Pickens Stadium.

Tulsa held a four-point lead, 7-3, heading into the final quarter, a lead the Hurricane took with just under two minutes remaining before halftime.

On the game's first possession, OSU marched 77 yards in 18 plays, but the Hurricane defense stiffened inside the 20-yard line and stopped the Cowboys at the 10 for a 27-yard field goal. After that OSU drive, the Golden Hurricane defense held the home team to just 17 total yards the remainder of the first half.

Tulsa took its 7-3 lead on a three-play, 56-yard drive that took just 0:56 off the clock in the second quarter as Zach Smith found Josh Johnson in the front corner of the end zone for a 16-yard score. The drive was set up by Smith's 41-yard toss to Keylon Stokes advancing to the OSU 15-yard line with just 1:38 left in the first half.

In the final period, the Cowboys took a 10-7 lead after a six-play, 81-yard drive that took only 2:06 off the clock.

Tulsa put together a 67-yard, 11-play drive of its own, marching to the OSU three-yard line before a false start penalty on third-and-goal moved the Hurricane back to the eight-yard line. Tulsa's 26-yard field goal attempt went wide left. The Cowboys added two field goals on its next two possessions in the final 4:27 for the win.

For the game, Tulsa's defense totaled a whopping 14 tackles for 56 lost yards, six quarterback sacks, forced two turnovers and held OSU to 289 yards.

GAME 2

Tulsa 34, #11 UCF 26

Oct. 3, 2020 • Spectrum Stadium

ORLANDO, Fla. — Tulsa scored the final 15 points to overcome an 18-point deficit to take down the nation's 11th-ranked UCF Knights, 34-26, at Spectrum Stadium.

The win snapped a 21-game home winning streak for the Knights. The last team to defeat UCF on its home field was the 2016 Tulsa team on Nov. 19, 2016, by a score of 35-20. The victory was also Tulsa's first against a ranked opponent since handing #24 Hawaii a 62-35 loss in the 2010 Hawaii Bowl, and it's the highest-ranked opponent Tulsa has defeated since a 35-34 home win over No. 15 Texas A&M in September 1996.

After trailing 16-0 in the first 7:02 of the game, Tulsa cut its halftime deficit to 11 points at 23-12. The Hurricane scored in the first 0:11 of the second half on a 34-yard pass from Zack Smith to Sam Crawford Jr., making the score 23-19. The Hurricane took its first lead, 31-26, with 12:56 left in the fourth quarter as Smith hit Keylon Stokes in the back of the end zone, capping a five-play, 61-yard drive in taking just 2:22 off the clock.

Tulsa scored the final 15 points, including the final three points on a 34-yard field goal Zack Long field goal that gave Tulsa its final margin of victory at 34-26.

For the game, Tulsa's special teams recovered two fumbles, while the defense intercepted one pass, had 10 tackles for -23 yards and nine pass breakups. Zaven Collins led the Hurricane defense with 10 tackles, 3.5 TFLs for -11 yards, two pass break-ups, one interception for a 13-yard return and scored Tulsa's first points on a safety.

TAMPA, Fla. — Tulsa moved to 2-0 in the American Athletic Conference with a 42-13 victory over the USF Bulls at Raymond James Stadium.

It was the first 2-0 start for Tulsa in AAC play in its seven-year membership and the first time since 2012 that the Hurricane has put together two straight conference road wins.

It was an all-around performance for the Hurricane as the offense gained 462 total yards, averaging 7.5 yards per play. Tulsa's defense held USF to 305 yards and forced three turnovers. Zach Smith led Tulsa to five scoring drives and completed 16-of-24 passes for 233 yards, while Zaven Collins' interception return gave Tulsa its sixth touchdown.

The Hurricane scored on its opening drive going 65 yards in 4 plays followed by two USF field goals for a 7-6 score. Tulsa scored two touchdowns in the second quarter for a 21-6 halftime lead.

After USF scored first in the third period to make the score 21-13, Tulsa tallied the final 21 points, all in the third quarter, on a 62-yard Deneric Prince run, a 38-yard Collins interception return and a one-yard Corey Taylor run.

TULSA, Okla. — TK Wilkerson scored his second touchdown of the game with 0:29 left to give Tulsa a 34-30 comeback victory over the East Caroline Pirates at H.A. Chapman Stadium.

Tulsa moved to 3-1 on the season and 3-0 in American Athletic Conference play.

After trailing by 14 points at halftime, 17-3, the Hurricane scored on five of its six second-half possessions, including four touchdowns that each capped drives of over 70 yards.


TULSA, Okla. — Tulsa posted its third straight comeback victory by overcoming a 21-point deficit for a 28-24 win over the 19th-ranked SMU Mustangs at H.A. Chapman Stadium.

The win gave Tulsa its second victory over a top-25 opponent, marking the first season in school history that the Golden Hurricane posted two wins over ranked opponents.

SMU took a 21-0 lead on the first play of the second quarter and led at halftime by a score of 24-7. After those early SMU scores, Tulsa outscored the Mustangs 28-3 over the final 44 minutes, including all 21 second-half points as the Hurricane defense held the Mustangs scoreless in the final 30 minutes.

Trailing 24-21, Tulsa took possession of the ball at their own 35-yard line with 4:02 left on the game clock. Passes of 12 and 29 yards from Zach Smith to Keylon Stokes put Tulsa at the SMU 24-yard line. Three straight TK Wilkerson runs of 14, three and three yards put the Hurricane on the SMU four-yard line to set up a third-and-goal pass from Smith to tight end James Palmer for the touchdown and a 28-24 lead.

With just over one minute remaining in the contest Zaven Collins' interception of a Shane Buechele pass sealed the victory for the Hurricane.

TULSA, Okla. — The 25th-ranked Tulsa Golden Hurricane scored 30 points in the final period and two overtimes to claim a 30-24 win over the Tulane Green Wave in a Thursday night game at H.A. Chapman Stadium.

After being shutout through three quarters and trailing, 14-0, Tulsa scored 21 points in the fourth quarter and nine more in overtime for its fourth double-digit comeback win of the season. In overtime, each team scored on field goals in the first period and then on Tulane's second possession, Tulsa All-American Zaven Collins intercepted a third-and-goal pass and went 96 yards for the game-winning score.

In sending the game to overtime, it took a spectacular fourth quarter offensive performance led by third-string quarterback Davis Brin.

Tulsa lost starting quarterback Zach Smith in the first half and backup Seth Boomer in the third quarter with injuries, thus putting Brin in the driver's seat. The sophomore rushed for one touchdown and threw for two more in the fourth quarter comeback. Brin guided the Hurricane to an 84-yard, 10-play drive and ran the final 18 yards for the first Tulsa score at the 9:17 mark of the 4th quarter. After the Tulsa defense held Tulane to eight yards in five plays, Brin again took Tulsa down the field and on a fourth-and-15 completed a 19-yard pass to Josh Johnson in the back of the end zone to tie the game at 14-14 with 3:16 left in the contest.

Tulane took the ensuing kickoff 71 yards to the Tulsa 28-yard line and the Green Wave took a 21-14 lead with less than two minutes on the clock.

Starting from their own 25-yard line, Tulsa took possession at the 1:38 mark. Brin completed 5-of-8 passes to reach the Tulane 37-yard line and with just 0:06 left Brin took the snap on third-and-seven, avoided a tackler and launched a 'Hail Mary' pass to the right corner of the end zone to a waiting JC Santana, who went up and brought in the 37-yarder to send the game to OT.

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — Tulsa used a third quarter touchdown and four Zack Long field goals to claim a 19-6 victory over the Navy Midshipmen at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium.

The win clinched Tulsa's spot in the American Athletic Conference Championship game against the Cincinnati Bearcats.

Tulsa's defense held the Midshipmen to six points, the lowest for a Tulsa opponent since Sept. 10, 2011, when Tulane scored just three points.

Zack Long connected on second quarter field goals covering 48 and 25 yards for a 6-3 halftime lead. Navy made the score 6-3 before halftime and began the second half with a 60-yard drive in 14 plays to tie the score, 6-6, at the 7:08 mark of the third quarter.

Tulsa's first touchdown of the game came at the 1:33 mark of the third period when Zach Smith threw 66 yards to Josh Johnson for a 13-6 lead. Long's third field goal, a 37-yarder, gave Tulsa a 10-point lead at 16-6 in the fourth period. He knocked through his final field goal of 36 yards with 2:54 remaining on the game clock for the 19-6 win.

For the game, Tulsa outgained the Mids, 296 to 153, as the Hurricane had 128 rushing yards and 168 through the air. Tulsa's defense totaled 12 TFLs for -49 yards and five sacks, as tackle Jaxon Player dominated with a career-high 12 tackles, 4.5 TFLs for -12 yards and two sacks.

FORT WORTH, Texas — Tulsa dominated the game statistically, but the Hurricane comeback bid against the SEC's Mississippi State Bulldogs fell short, 28-26, in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl at Amon G. Carter Stadium.

After scoring only 13 points between them in the first half, the two teams combined for 41 second-half points.

The Hurricane pulled to within two points early at the 12:30 mark of the fourth quarter when Corey Taylor II ran in from five yards out, capping a 32-yard, nine-play drive to make the score 21-19. Tulsa's pass on the two-point conversion attempt skipped off Keylon Stokes' hands, thus keeping it a two-point MSU advantage.

Trailing 28-19 with 8:01 remaining, Tulsa marched inside MSU territory but an interception at the Bulldogs' six-yard line ended Tulsa's threat. The Hurricane defense held Mississippi State to seven yards in three plays on the subsequent possession. Tulsa's offense took the ball at the 2:54 mark and traveled 55 yards in six plays to make the score 28-26 at the 1:23 mark.

The ensuing onside kick, after being bobbled, was corralled by an MSU player, thus securing the Bulldogs two-point win.

Tulsa out-gained MSU 484 to 271 yards in total offense, while the Hurricane defense, playing without College Football's Defensive Player of the Year Zaven Collins, held the Bulldogs to 109 yards below their season average. Tulsa nickel safety Cristian Williams was named Tulsa's Game MVP with seven tackles and one pass breakup.

2020 Season Review

Season Recap ...

- Tulsa finished the season with a 6-3 record and a 6-0 mark in the American Athletic Conference.
- The 2020 college football season was interrupted by COVID-19, as teams played a different number of games ... Tulsa played seven of 12 regular season games and added a contest in the AAC championship and bowl game.
- The Hurricane was ranked in the national polls during 2020, six weeks in the AP poll and five weeks in the Coaches poll ... Tulsa was ranked as high as 18th in the AP poll (Dec. 6) and 19th in the Coaches poll (Dec. 6).
- Tulsa tied for first place in the regular season with a 6-0 record and played in the AAC Championship game, falling 27-24 to #9 Cincinnati on a last second field goal.
- Tulsa's 6-0 AAC record marked the best league start in its seven years as an AAC member ... it was also the best conference record for a Tulsa team since Tulsa started 7-0 in Conference USA in 2012.
- Tulsa had a 6-game winning streak after a season-opening loss ... it was the longest winning streak for Tulsa since seven straight wins in the 2012 season.
- Tulsa was 2-2 against top-25 teams, defeating #11 UCF (34-26) and #19 SMU (28-24) and falling 16-7 at #11 Oklahoma State and 27-24 at #9 Cincinnati.
- Tulsa was invited to play in its 22nd bowl game as the Hurricane played the SEC's Mississippi State in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl.

All-Americans ...

- Tulsa had two All-Americans in the 2020 season.
- Junior linebacker Zaven Collins was a unanimous consensus first-team All-American.
- Freshman left tackle Tyler Smith was named Freshman All-America by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) and The Athletic.
- Collins earned first-team honors by the Associated Press, FWAA, AFCA, Walter Camp Foundation, The Sporting News, USA Today, CBS Sports, Pro Football Focus, The Athletic and Phil Steele Magazine.
- Collins became Tulsa's 11th first-team All-America selection honored by any publication or service... he joined receiver Howard Twilley (1965) as Tulsa's only consensus All-Americans.

Collins Named College Football's Defensive Player of the Year, Winning the Bronko Nagurski and Chuck Bednarik Awards ...

- Tulsa linebacker Zaven Collins was named the winner of the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Chuck Bednarik Award, which are the two national defensive player of the year awards.
- He was also named the winner of the Lombardi Award, given to the top player in FBS regardless of position, based on the Lombardi Award's criteria of "performance and leadership honed by character and resiliency" and named after legendary NFL coach Vince Lombardi.
- Collins was also named the runner-up for the Butkus Award, given to the nation's top linebacker ... he was the lone non-Power 5 selection chosen to the Butkus list.
- Collins was a three-time winner of the National Defensive Player of the Week Award, coming in different weeks this year – the Bednarik, the Bronko Nagurski and the Walter Camp Foundation.
- He was named the American Athletic Conference Defensive Player of the Week four times (#11 UCF, USF, #19 SMU and Tulane).
- In eight games, Collins totaled 53 tackles, 11.5 TFLs, four sacks, four interceptions with two TDs.
- Two of his INTs were game-clinchers ... his INT against #19 SMU stopped any possible final scoring drive for the Mustangs ... his pick-6 against Tulane in overtime went 96 yards for the game-winning score.
- Collins has declared for the NFL draft and did not play in the Armed Forces Bowl ... he was the 16th pick in the first round of the NFL Draft by the Arizona Cardinals

Tulsa Ranked In Associated Press Poll For Six Straight Weeks...

- Tulsa was ranked in the Associated Press poll for the final six weeks of the regular season, the most weeks ranked and the most consecutively for Tulsa since 1945 when Tulsa was ranked for eight weeks, and five consecutively.
- Following the AAC Championship game, Tulsa was ranked 22nd in the AP poll and 23rd in the USA Today Amway Coaches poll.
- Tulsa was ranked as high as No. 18 in the Associated Press poll and 19th in the USA Today Amway Coaches poll the week of Dec. 6
- Tulsa moved into the AP's top-25 on Nov. 15 with at No. 25 following a 28-24 win over No. 19 SMU ... Tulsa jumped to No. 24 a week later after a win over Tulane.
- Tulsa debuted in the USA Today Amway Coaches poll at No. 25 on Nov. 22.
- The AP ranking this year is the first time Tulsa has been ranked in the AP poll since ending the 2010 season ranked 24th nationally ... before that, Tulsa was ranked in the AP poll for three weeks during 2008.
- The last time Tulsa was in the USA Today Coaches poll was at the conclusion of the 2012 season when the Hurricane was ranked No. 25.
- Tulsa received votes in both AP and Coaches polls since the Oct. 4 rankings.
- In the College Football Playoff (CFP) rankings, Tulsa began at No. 25, and has moved to its' highest ranking of 23rd on Dec. 13.

From Preseason No. 9 to the AAC Championship...

- Tulsa was picked to finish in ninth place in the 2020 American Athletic Conference preseason coaches poll.
- In its first AAC game, Tulsa faced the preseason first-place team UCF on Oct. 3 and came away with an 18-point comeback win (34-26) over the #11-ranked Knights.
- Tulsa went on to defeat the preseason-picked No. 4 (SMU), No. 5 (Navy) and No. 6 (Tulane) teams.
- In the AAC Championship Game, Tulsa faced preseason No. 2 and the nation's 6th-ranked Cincinnati Bearcats, falling 27-24 on a field goal as time expired.

Collins Named Unanimous AAC Defensive Player of the Year...

- Linebacker Zaven Collins was unanimously chosen as the American Athletic Conference Defensive Player of the Year, becoming the first player in league history to earn unanimous player-of-the-year honors.
- Collins became the first Tulsa player named as the league's Defensive Player of the Year.
- He became the eighth Tulsa defender in school history to earn a Conference Defensive Player of the Year award, including five past winners in the MVC and two in C-USA.

13 Tulsa Players Earn American Honors...

- Tulsa had a total of 13 players earn American Athletic Conference all-conference honors ... three players were named first team, five to the second team and another five players earned honorable mention accolades.
- Tulsa's first-team all-AAC selections are Zaven Collins, defensive lineman Jaxon Player and offensive tackle Tyler Smith ... unanimous selection, Collins is a two-time all-league performer after earning second team honors a year ago, while Player and Smith are first-year selections.
- The five second-team selections include wide receiver Keylon Stokes and offensive tackle Chris Paul, safety Cristian Williams, linebacker Justin Wright and place-kicker Zack Long.
- Tulsa's honorable mention selections include three offensive linemen -- Dante Bivens, Dylan Couch and Gerard Wheeler -- giving league honors to all five Hurricane players on the offensive front ... on defense, senior cornerback Allie Green IV and sophomore safety Kendarin Ray also earned honorable mention merits.

Tyler Smith Named Freshman All-American by the Athletic; On FWAA Freshman All-America List...

- Tulsa red-shirt freshman left tackle Tyler Smith was named to The Athletic's and Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) Freshman All-America first team.
- He started all nine games in 2020 and played every offensive snap in seven games, including against No. 11-ranked teams Oklahoma State, UCF, No. 6 Cincinnati and Mississippi State.
- Smith left the USF game late in the first half with an injury but returned the next week and played the entire game against East Carolina ... he missed one play in the SMU game.

Taking Down Two Top-20 Teams For First Time...

- Tulsa's 34-26 win over #11 UCF was the first for the Hurricane against a ranked opponent since handing #24 Hawaii a 62-35 loss in the 2010 Hawaii Bowl.
- It was the first win over a top-15 opponent since Tulsa defeated No. 15 Texas A&M 35-34 in Sept. 1991.
- Before that, it was 1971 that Tulsa defeated a higher ranked team with a 21-20 win over #7 Arkansas.
- The win also snapped a 21-game home winning streak for UCF ... the last team to defeat UCF on its home field was the 2016 Tulsa team on Nov. 19, 2016, 35-20.
- When Tulsa defeated No. 19 SMU on Nov. 14, it marked the first time in school history that Tulsa defeated two ranked teams in the same season.

FWAA National Team of the Week...

- For its 34-26 win at #11-ranked UCF, Tulsa was named the FWAA/Reveal Suits National Team of the Week.
- Trailing 16-0 and 23-5, Tulsa came back from that 18-point deficit and outscored the UCF Knights 29-3 over the final 30:53 of the game.
- Tulsa scored on a 48-yard pass play at the 0:53 of the 2nd quarter, going 88 yards in 4 plays and taking 0:41 off the clock.
- The Hurricane added a 34-yard TD toss in the first 0:11 of the 3rd quarter on a one-play 34-yard drive in just 0:06.
- Tulsa took its first lead, 31-26, at the 12:56 mark of the 4th period, capping a 5-play, 61-yard drive ... Zack Long's 34-yard FG with 1:30 remaining in the game gave Tulsa its' 8-point lead.

American Athletic Conference

The American Athletic Conference consists of 12 prestigious institutions: the University of Central Florida, the University of Cincinnati, East Carolina University, the University of Houston, the University of Memphis, the U.S. Naval Academy (in football only), the University of South Florida, Southern Methodist University, Temple University, Tulane University, the University of Tulsa, and Wichita State University (in basketball and Olympic sports).

Under the leadership of commissioner Mike Aresco, the American Athletic Conference has fashioned an impressive list of accomplishments in the competitive arena, in the classroom and in support of student-athlete welfare. The American is firmly established as a Power 6 conference thanks to its collection of national team and individual championships, football and basketball postseason victories, expansive media rights contract with ESPN, and its commitment to providing the highest levels of support for student-athletes.

The league has produced four NCAA championship teams in addition to three New Year's Six bowl champions (UCF in 2013 and 2017; Houston in 2015), two NCAA Men's Final Four participants, six Women's Final Four teams, an NIT cham-

pion, 13 NCAA individual championships, and a Rhodes Scholar. Additionally, American Athletic Conference teams have advanced to the College World Series, qualified for the match play round of the NCAA Men's Golf Championship and registered multiple top-10 finishes at the NCAA Cross Country and Outdoor Track and Field championships.

The American has seen a member school claim a spot in a New Year's Six bowl six times in the league's first eight football seasons, including the 2020 campaign, when Cincinnati reached the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl. The American finished the 2019 football season with four top-25 teams; among the 10 FBS conferences, only the SEC and Big Ten had more ranked teams in the final polls.

Individual teams in The American have enjoyed some of their best football seasons in program history as members of the conference. UCF finished in the national top 10 twice as a conference member – in 2013 and 2017. Houston went 13-1 in the 2015 football season, setting a school record for wins, while Navy won a program-record 11 games in 2015, its first season in the conference, and matched that mark with its 2019 campaign. Memphis, which had not won 10 games in a season since 1938, has registered three 10-win seasons in

the last six years (2015, 2017, 2019), including a school-record 12 wins in 2019. Temple enjoyed its first 10-win season in school history in 2015. South Florida finished in the top 25 for the first two times in program history (2016, 2017). Cincinnati registered its third and fourth 11-win seasons in program history in 2018 and 2019 and was ranked No. 8 at the end of the 2020 season. SMU returned to national prominence in 2019 with a 10-win season, during which the Mustangs were ranked as high as No. 14 nationally. Tulsa returned to the top 25 for the first time in 11 years in 2020. East Carolina earned a top-20 ranking in 2014, while Tulane has played in three consecutive bowl games for the first time in school history.

Since the conference's reconstitution in 2013-14, teams from The American have registered top-10 national rankings in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, baseball, men's soccer, women's soccer, women's lacrosse, men's golf, men's cross country and men's track and field.

Under The American's banner, Houston's men's basketball team reached the 2021 NCAA Final Four and was ranked No. 3 in the final coaches' poll, while Memphis claimed the 2021 NIT title. Houston's men's track and field team took



third place at the 2018 and 2019 NCAA Outdoor Championships. Tulsa has registered top-six national finishes at the 2019 and 2020 NCAA Men's Cross Country Championships.

American Athletic Conference student-athletes have distinguished themselves in all facets of intercollegiate athletics. Memphis quarterback Brady White was the 2020 winner of the National Football Foundation's James V. Campbell Trophy as the top scholar-athlete in college football. Temple linebacker Tyler Matakevich won the Bednarik Award and the Nagurski Trophy as the nation's top defensive player in 2015, while Tulsa linebacker Zaven Collins repeated that feat in 2020. Houston's Ed Oliver won the 2017 Outland Trophy as the nation's best interior lineman. The American has had three top-10 Heisman Trophy finishes as UCF quarterback McKenzie Milton was eighth in 2017 and sixth in 2018, while Navy quarterback Keenan Reynolds was fifth in 2015. Reynolds was also selected as the winner of the 2016 AAU James E. Sullivan Award as the nation's top amateur athlete.

Additionally, SMU's Avery Acker was chosen as the Division I women's volleyball Academic All-America of the Year in 2015, while Tulsa cross country standout Kirk Smith was chosen as a Rhodes Scholar in the fall of 2016.

American Athletic Conference alumni have made their mark in professional and international sports as well, beginning with the selection of UCF quarterback Blake Bortles by the Jacksonville Jaguars with the No. 3 pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. A number of American Athletic Conference athletes have been selected in the first round of the professional

entry drafts in football, basketball, baseball and soccer, including former Memphis center James Wiseman, who was the No. 2 pick in the 2020 NBA Draft, and former Wichita State third-baseman Alec Bohm, the No. 3 selection in the 2018 Major League Baseball Draft. Former SMU standout Bryson DeChambeau, who was the 2014 American Athletic Conference individual champion, went on to win the 2015 NCAA Championship, the 2015 US Amateur title and has since become one of the top players on the PGA Tour, including a win at the 2020 U.S. Open. Former Memphis tennis player Joe Salisbury, a 2014 all-conference selection, has gone on to win the 2020 Australian Open men's doubles championship and the 2021 French Open mixed doubles title. Former Tulane standout Dominik Koepfer has earned a top-50 world ranking in men's tennis. Cincinnati's Jordan Thompson was named to the 12-player United States Olympic volleyball team, which will compete in Tokyo in 2021.

The American announced a lucrative and comprehensive media rights extension with ESPN in May of 2019, providing the conference with a stronger and more extensive presence on ESPN's primary television networks (ABC, ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU). Since the extension took effect in the 2020-21 academic year, a minimum of 40 regular-season football telecasts and 60 regular-season men's basketball games per season will appear on those primary networks. Nearly every conference-controlled game in all sports will appear either on an ESPN network or on ESPN+. The football championship game, all rounds of the men's basketball championship, and multiple rounds of the women's basketball championship, will be on linear ESPN television networks.

The first six American Athletic Conference Football Championships were televised by ABC as part of Championship Saturday. Subsequent championship games will appear on either ABC or ESPN through the duration of the 12-year extension.

American Athletic Conference teams have access to the pinnacle of college football's postseason structure. An American representative would be chosen for the College Football Playoff semifinals if it is among the top four teams in the CFP selection committee's final ranking. Otherwise, the league would place its champion in a New Year's Bowl if it is ranked higher than the champions of Conference USA, the Mid-American Conference, the Mountain West Conference and the Sun Belt Conference.

Additionally, The American holds primary or secondary partnerships with an expansive group bowls for the new cycle, which began in 2020, ensuring multiple annual matchups against the nation's top conferences and providing desirable postseason destinations for member institutions.

Away from the competitive arena, The American has established itself as a leader in the area of student-athlete wellness, both through the adoption of NCAA autonomous legislation on matters including full cost of attendance and nutrition. The conference, in conjunction with its Student-Athlete Advisory Committee has also launched the Pow6rful Minds campaign to improve awareness and education on mental issues and recognize the scholarly achievements of the conference's student-athletes.





1895: THE LEGACY BEGINS

The legacy of Tulsa football began when the Bacone School for Indians and Henry Kendall College, which later became The University of Tulsa, did battle in 1895. It was one of the first football games in the Indian Territory and the game caused a lot of excitement within the student bodies of each school as well as the citizens of the Territory.

People in Indian Territory were excited by the prospects of having football in the area, but no one really understood how the game was played. The Kendall team didn't even actually have a coach in that first season. A young transfer student from Springfield, Missouri, named Norman Leard stepped up to the task.

Although there was no score recorded, Kendall College won the only game the team played that year.

Football struggled to gain its prominence at the college. The college played only 19 games between 1900 and 1910. No teams were fielded in 1903, 1904, 1906, 1907 or 1911.

Kendall College's reappearance on the collegiate football scene in 1912 came at a time when the game itself was becoming modernized. New rules altered the game. Offenses were allowed four downs to make 10 yards. The length of the playing field was reduced from 110 to 100 yards, and most importantly, the 20-yard limit on forward passes was removed.

By 1914, the resurrection of Kendall College football was in full swing and two men helped spur that along. Sam McBirney, a Tulsa banker, and Francis Schmidt came on the scene. In 1914, McBirney led the team to a 7-2 record with five shutout victories, and followed that season with a 6-1 record in 1915.

It wasn't just McBirney who jump-started the football program. Ivan Grove, who was one player instrumental in building the Kendall football program, was the key to undefeated seasons of 1916 and 1919. He quarterbacked the Presbyterians from 1914 through 1916, and again in 1919.

During the 1916 season, Grove and receivers Virgil Jones and Madison "Puny" Blevins developed the controversial "tower play". The play called for Jones and Blevins to sprint down field, Blevins would stop, lift Jones onto his shoulders, and Grove would toss the ball to Jones. At that time, there were no rules against such a play. But it only worked once for the Kendallites in a 117-0 thrashing of Missouri School of Mines.


That was the type of domination Kendall experienced in 1916. The season ended with Kendall producing an undefeated 10-0 record, and laying claim to the unofficial title of "state champions."

While the team turned in their uniforms that season, a few Tulsa businessmen wanted one more game for the Kendall team, against the fabulous Irish of Notre Dame. How close Kendall came to playing Notre Dame in the finale of the 1916 season probably will never be known, but a definite move was underway with some of the town's wealthiest oilmen reportedly backing the promotion.

Prior to the 1917 season, McBirney went back to his bank, and Schmidt, an assistant coach under McBirney, went to fight in World War I, as did a number of players. As a result, the 1917 season was a rough one for Kendall College.

Hal Medford took the coaching reins, but enrollment dropped drastically as did the male population. With only two varsity players available, Medford took the initiative to recruit players from Kendall Academy to fill the roster. The team had many weak areas and Medford had a hard time finding players to strengthen those areas. The team went without a win, thus it was called "the season that fell victim to the Kaiser's war."

By 1919, the Presbyterians were back in full force and primed for a comeback. Schmidt came back from the war ready to coach, and McBirney joined him as an assistant coach this time. All the players from previous years were back now, including Grove, and optimism was high.

The team played nine games, but only three were seen as serious threats — Oklahoma, Oklahoma A&M and Arkansas. The powerful Kendall team with Grove, John Young, Benton Springer, Harry Miller and Vergil Jones back in 1919, pummeled its first opponent, Oklahoma Baptist. Kendall scored 22 touchdowns and 20 conversions to amass a 152-0 victory.

Tulsa went on to defeated two of its main rivals, including 27-0 against Oklahoma and a 63-7 victory over Arkansas. Tulsa and Oklahoma A&M tied 7-7.

By the turn of the century, Henry Kendall College was on the map as a team to reckon with on the field.

THE GLORIOUS TWENTIES

Schmidt took Henry Kendall College into the new decade with another undefeated season in 1920, the third such season in the brief history of the school. Kendall outscored its opponents in 1920, 621 to 21 points.

As the decade progressed, changes ranging from coaching to the name of the university itself altered the face of Kendall football.

The first thing to change was the actual name of the university. On February 8, 1921, The University of Tulsa was born. The administration of Kendall College believed that by taking on the name of the city, more support from its citizens would follow. This change was met with immediate increases in donations, thus proving its effectiveness.

Schmidt, who led the 1921 team to a 6-3 record, was preparing for the 1922 season when he was named the head coach at the University of Arkansas.

Enter the name Howard Acher. When he took over the position, Acher saw great potential in his team and wanted to publicize it by creating a new identity with a new nickname. Sports writers and others had called the school by any number of names from the Presbyterians to the Orange and Black, to the Kendallites.

After an opening day win against a strong Texas Christian University team in 1922, Acher put his mind to work. The press had claimed that the Kendall football team blew through its opponents like a tornado. So, it figured that Tornadoes, would be the nickname with "golden" added to identify the color of the uniforms. However, it was later found that Georgia Tech had claimed that name, so from tornado it was evolved meteorologically to a hurricane. Thus the squad voted, and the name "Golden Hurricane" became the new team moniker with the gold added because of the jersey color.


TU lived up to its nickname as the Golden Hurricane blew through the Texas A&M defense in the next game with pass after pass from quarterback Rex Thomas. TU won its first game as the Golden Hurricane by a score of 13-10.

A perfect 9-0 record in was followed with two straight losing seasons, and after the 1924 season Acher resigned his position as head coach. His replacement was quite a shock to everyone as Elmer "Gloomy Gus" Henderson was chosen to take over the coaching reins. The selection of Henderson wasn't as much of a surprise as was his acceptance of the offer. He was coming from a program at the University of Southern California where, "one All American was in the game, and his substitute on the bench was an All American." No one could understand why he would leave such a program. But the reason was simple, his lucrative contract at Tulsa.

Known as "Gloomy Gus" because of his pessimism when speaking for publication, he found success easy at Tulsa. He taught his team five new formations, and put the team back on its feet after only three wins over the previous two seasons. His first few seasons resulted in 13 wins and four losses, and by 1927, Golden Hurricane football was well on its way to recovery.

In 1928, prosperity in America and the success of Tulsa football, inspired Henderson to dream of a new stadium. He took his dream to the rich oilmen of Tulsa, and they supported it. A short time later, Henderson saw his dream come true. The University of Tulsa football team had a new home to go along with the new philosophy and nickname.

The first game in Skelly Stadium was played on Oct. 4, 1930. Tulsa defeated Arkansas 26-6.



TULSA FOOTBALL GETS A NEW HOME

The 1930 season saw Coach Henderson's dream of a new home for Tulsa football became a reality. Though the Depression had hit hard, the need for a new stadium was growing by the day.

McNulty Park, the original home of the Golden Hurricane, had become archaic by modern collegiate standards. In actuality, it was a baseball field that only measured 90 yards. This meant teams had to cross the goal line once, place the ball back on the 10 yard line, and cross the goal line again in order to score.

By 1930, the new stadium had been approved and funding for the \$300,000 project had been acquired, so there could be no stopping. The stadium was built to hold 15,000 spectators, and the north and south ends were left open for future growth. Capacity now stands at 40,235. The stadium was named after William G. Skelly, a local oilman, who donated \$125,000 to the project. The balance was raised by Tulsa businessmen by organizing the Stadium Corporation of Tulsa.

The stadium was dedicated at the 1930 season opener against Arkansas. The Golden Hurricane christened their new home with a 26-6 victory.

One of the mainstays for the Golden Hurricane during this transition was Chet Benefiel who played for TU from 1928 to 1931. The halfback's exploits on the football field was said to have spurred the support for TU football that resulted in the building of Skelly Field. Benefiel earned honorable mention All-America honors in 1930, and captained two teams. He was Oklahoma Back of the Year in 1929, and was selected to the All-Oklahoma team in 1929 and 1930.

As the Hurricane adapted to its new surroundings, the team's prosperity grew. Henderson's 1933 team was the highlight of the decade.

The Golden Hurricane played seven games that season, posting victories over rivals Oklahoma, Kansas and Arkansas. The Hurricane also soundly beat Oklahoma Central, Washburn and George Washington. The lone setback TU suffered was at the hands of Texas A&M. Wins over such strong competition caused the team of 1933 to be called one of the best in Tulsa football history.

When Henderson decided to leave his coaching post in 1935, TU went in search of a successor. What they found was yet another Rose Bowl champion coach from Southern Methodist University named Vic Hurt. At first, Hurt didn't accept the position, but with some persuasive recruiting talk and a visit to campus, he accepted.

Hurt's tenure lasted three seasons and after the 1938 season, he stepped down to take the head coaching post at Kansas.

Former TU player Chet Benefiel moved up from his freshman coaching position to be Hurt's successor. In 1940, Benefiel led the Hurricane to share the Missouri Valley Conference Championship in 1940. However, his contract was not renewed for the next season. As a result, Tulsa hired Henry Frnka who would lead the Hurricane through one of the most successful decades in Tulsa football history.

TULSA GOES TO FIVE STRAIGHT NEW YEARS DAY BOWL GAMES — THE FIRST SCHOOL TO ACCOMPLISH THAT FEAT

The 1940s saw great development in the strength and notoriety of the University of Tulsa Golden Hurricane. Players like Glenn Dobbs, Sax Judd, Bobby Jack Stuart and N.A. Keithley, combined with the coaching of Frnka meant five straight bowl berths. Tulsa became the first school to go to five straight New Years Day Bowl Games, starting with the Sun Bowl on January 1, 1942. Two Sugar Bowls, the Orange Bowl and Oil Bowl followed.

Frnka brought a fervent love of the game and a strong desire to learn as much as he could about the game to Tulsa. He built a national football powerhouse en route to a career record of 40-9-2 in his five years.

The bowl appearances began in 1941 as the Hurricane posted a 7-2 regular season record. By early December, there had been no talk of a bowl bid for the Hurricane. A 13-6 loss to Arkansas seemed to have dashed any bowl dreams the team may have had. However, on December 4, word came that TU had in fact been invited to the Sun Bowl to play Texas Tech in El Paso, Texas on January 1, 1942.

Tech was favored in the game, but that fact did not intimidate the Hurricane. As the waning minutes of the game approached and the game still scoreless, Dobbs connected with Judd who fell over the goal line for the game's only points. Tulsa emerged victorious from its first bowl game.


Tulsa's bowl dynasty gained strength in 1942. At the end of the regular season, the Hurricane had the only perfect record in college football going at 10-0.

It had been rumored that the Hurricane was in line for the Rose Bowl, but when the invitation came, it was from New Orleans and the Sugar Bowl. Tulsa's opponent would be Tennessee.

Tulsa struck first in that January 1, 1943 game. On TU's second possession, Dobbs went to work picking apart the Vols' defense to put the Hurricane on top 6-0. As the game went on, TU saw its lead dissipate. The Volunteers pulled to within one point just before halftime.

A safety and another Tennessee touchdown in the second half gave the Vols a 14-7 victory, and ending Tulsa's hope of going 11-0 on the season and being

able to claim the nation's number one ranking. Tulsa ended the season 10-1 and ranked fourth in the nation.

The 1943 season saw Tulsa receive a second straight invitation to the Sugar Bowl. This time the opponent would be Georgia Tech.

After the Tulsa offense failed to gain a first down, Clyde LeForce faked a field goal and threw the ball to Ed Shedlosky for a 6-0 Tulsa lead on the first Hurricane possession. At the start of the second quarter, TU struck again on a Jimmy Ford 76-yard touchdown run putting TU in command 12-0. Then, the Yellow Jackets got on the scoreboard making it a 12-7 game. By halftime, the score stood at 18-7.

As the second half began, the Yellow Jackets began a comeback that broke the backs of the Hurricane. Tech quickly scored a touchdown to bring the score to 18-13. A 78-yard drive hammered the final nail in the Hurricane's coffin as the game ended in a 20-18 heartbreakin defeat.

As the next season took shape, TU was looking good for a fourth straight bowl game. Tulsa's wish came true when the Hurricane received word that they'd have a chance to avenge the previous year's bowl loss to Georgia Tech. This time Tulsa would face Tech in the Orange Bowl on January 1, 1945.

Tulsa scored two first quarter touchdowns and added a third TD in the third quarter before Tech was able to get on the scoreboard. Tech had a third period score and each team scored once more in the final quarter, as Tulsa held on for a 26-14 win.

Coming off that bowl victory, TU was hungry for another, and that hunger grew as the 1945 season began. Hopes of another big bowl appearance were strong, but setbacks near the end of the season deflated those hopes somewhat. However, Tulsa impressed the Oil Bowl selection committee enough with a 20-18 win over Hondo Air Base in the regular season finale to earn a bowl bid. Thus, the Golden Hurricane found itself in its fifth straight bowl game playing Georgia.

The Oil Bowl game was close throughout, as each team capitalized on turnovers and the score stayed 7-6 until the fourth quarter, when the Bulldogs scored 13 of their 20 points in that quarter. Tulsa came out on the short end of a 20-6 battle.

Although that loss ended Tulsa's bowl appearances for a time, the accomplishment of having gone to five straight bowl games put The University of Tulsa on the college football map. The Frnka era also ended with the Oil Bowl game. But, his contributions to Tulsa kept alive a tradition of quality football that ranks with some of the best in the country that carried into the 1950s.

THE BOWL LEGACY CONTINUES

J.O. "Buddy" Brothers moved into the head coaching position in 1946 and took the Hurricane program into the 1950s, but not before posting a 9-1 record in 1946. Tulsa hit a low point in 1948 with an 0-9-1 record, but two years later Tulsa bounced back with a 9-1 mark in 1950.



Ellis Jones, a one armed guard, was named as a Football All-American in 1945.

The highlight of the 1950s was Tulsa's visit to the Gator Bowl following the 1952 season where they met a strong Florida team. That season, the Hurricane posted an 8-2-1 record as TU renewed their bowl tradition.

Several players played key roles in the success of that 1952 team. Of course, it all started with inspiration from Coach Brothers, who was born with no left hand. He inspired his players with his courage and determination not to allow his handicap to get in the way. Tom Ham, a player for Brothers on that 1952 team, once said "coach Brothers showed his toughness every day at practice." His toughness spurred the Hurricane to success in 1952.

Coach Brothers was voted Missouri Valley Coach of the Year in 1949 and 1951. His Hurricane teams had a career record of 26-5-1, winning two Missouri Valley Conference championships.


Tulsa was also blessed with exceptional talent in 1952. Tommy Hudspeth, Marvin Matuszak and Howard Waugh were tri-captains. Hudspeth was

a strong defensive back for the Hurricane and was selected to the All-Oklahoma decade football team of the 1950s.

Matuszak, hailed as one of the best linemen in Tulsa history, was the first Hurricane player to twice be named first team All-America. Waugh was a record-setting running back. He led the nation in rushing with 1,372 yards and averaging 6.8 yards per rush.

These three men led a strong Hurricane team into the Florida game. From the time the Hurricane took the field against Florida in the Gator Bowl, they knew they were in for a battle. Florida scored the first time they had the ball, and again on a 37-yard pass play in the second quarter.

When TU took the field for the second half, the Hurricane constructed a drive of 73 yards for their first score pulling the Hurricane within a touchdown at

14-7. Tulsa's second scoring drive covered 46 yards, capped by Waugh leaping into the end zone after the Hurricane recovered a fumble at the Gators' 46-yard line. However, Tom Miner's PAT went wide left leaving Florida with a one-point lead, 14-13.

TU had one final scoring opportunity after another Florida fumble with six minutes remaining in the game. The Hurricane traveled to the Gators' 4-yard line, but had to settle for a field goal attempt that missed, allowing Florida to hold on for a 14-13 victory. Although Tulsa lost that bowl game, the 1952 team and those previous to it had some of the best players in Tulsa history.

PASSING WAS THE NAME OF THE GAME IN THE 1960S

As the 1960s took shape, Glenn Dobbs became the head football coach at his alma mater in 1961. Dobbs revitalized Tulsa's passing attack making the Hurricane offense a threat whenever it took the field. Tulsa led the nation in passing for five straight seasons — 1962, 1963, 1964, 1965 and 1966.

Although the 1963 season produced only a 5-5 record, Tulsa's offense, spearheaded by quarterback Jerry Rhome, averaged 199.3 yards passing per contest.

Until 1964, college football was dominated by running attacks. The nation saw Tulsa's vaunted offensive attack in 1964 as the best passing team the nation had ever seen.

For 30 years teams avoided passing the ball because they thought running the ball was a better way to play the game.

What took years for college football to develop, Rhome and company obliterated in two years. In 1964, the Rhome-Twilley connection broke 20 NCAA records for total offense, passing, receiving and scoring. The notoriety those impressive statistical numbers gave the two Hurricane standouts helped lead them to back-to-back Heisman Trophy runner-up finishes, Rhome in 1964 and Twilley in 1965.

Dobbs obviously didn't believe in the ground attack philosophy. He was one of the Hurricane's most prolific passers himself, so it's no wonder he brought his aerial philosophy back to Tulsa. Under Dobbs' guidance, the Hurricane offense passed 52 percent of the time, well above the 29 percent Tulsa's opponents were averaging.

Behind that strong offense, the 1964 team won all but two regular season games leaving the Hurricane with an 8-2 record and an invitation to the Bluebonnet Bowl in Houston, Texas to face Mississippi.

In that game, Tulsa dominated with its passing game as the Hurricane came from behind to re-establish themselves as a strong bowl team by winning 14-7,

and finishing the season with a 9-2 mark.

The 1965 season saw a quarterback named Billy Guy Anderson rise up to lead the Hurricane. It wasn't long before Anderson started breaking the records Rhome had set the year before. Anderson was the nation's leading passer as he took Tulsa to yet another Bluebonnet Bowl.


Twilley was more of a threat than ever as he put his team and NCAA records of the previous year to shame. He caught 134 passes for 1,779 yards and 16 touchdowns in 1965, and came up just short in the Heisman Trophy balloting, as did Rhome the year before, finishing second to USC's Mike Garrett.

The Golden Hurricane went into the Bluebonnet Bowl against Tennessee with an 8-2 record hoping to repeat the success of its previous Bluebonnet Bowl appearance. However, things were rough for the Hurricane this time, as Tulsa could cross the Volunteers' 20-yard line only twice.

Tennessee jumped out to a 14-0 lead as they capitalized on two Tulsa fumbles. They also returned a punt for a third score, and turned an interception into their fourth score. The volunteers put the game out of reach on their last touchdown in the third quarter. Tennessee won the game 27-6.

In the 1960s, Tulsa took the collegiate passing game to a level never seen before. The Hurricane averaged nearly 318 yards in 1964, and increased that average to 346 yards a year later. Under the tutelage of Dobbs, it was Rhome, Anderson and Twilley who helped revolutionize the way college football was played.

Lineman Marvin Matuszak (1951) was Tulsa's first two-time All-American.



NFL TALENT FLOURISHES

The 1970s continued the wealth of talent going through the Hurricane program and entering the professional ranks. Some of the players Tulsa turned out that decade went into the NFL and became legends of the game. Names like Steve Largent and Drew Pearson went on to successful careers in the NFL.

When F.A. Dry took over as head coach at mid-season 1972, replacing Claude Gibson after six games, he was faced with the immediate challenge of creating an understanding of his philosophy. That philosophy. He believed that strong organization was key to a successful team.

From the moment Dry took the helm, things began to improve for the Hurricane. His first game came the night after he accepted the head coaching position. Before that game, TU had gone 1-5, but upset Louisville and won its final two games to post a 3-2 record under Dry, and 4-7 on the year. It would be the only year during Dry's four-and-a-half year tenure, that the Hurricane would suffer a losing season. A year later, Dry led Tulsa to a 6-5 record and first place in the Missouri Valley Conference.

The 1976 season was the highlight of the Dry Era as he coached the team to a 7-4 record, a Missouri Valley Conference championship, and a berth in the first Independence Bowl where the Hurricane faced McNeese State University.

Things looked promising for the Hurricane at first as they constructed a 65-yard drive capped by a Thomas Bailey one-yard jaunt into the end zone for the first TU score, but at halftime, Tulsa clung to a slight 7-6 lead.

As the second half started, McNeese State produced a 65-yard scoring drive of their own, topped with a two-point conversion giving them the lead 14-7. The Hurricane scored on a blocked field goal attempt, but the PAT was no good, so the Hurricane stayed a point shy of the lead at 14-13.

After Tulsa made a fourth quarter 38-yard field goal to go ahead 16-14, TU seemed to have the game in the palm of their hands, but McNeese State answered by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive during the final two minutes that put the Hurricane down to defeat 20-16.

Dry made great strides in revitalizing Hurricane football. During his tenure, he posted a 31-18-1 record, and coached many standout players. Twenty-seven of them went into the pro ranks most of which were drafted.

Skelly Stadium was expanded to 40,235 seats in 1964.



One player who wasn't drafted, turned out to be one of the best NFL receivers of all-time. Drew Pearson signed a free agent contract in 1972 with the Dallas Cowboys where he established himself as one of the best receivers in National Football League history.

After two years as Tulsa's quarterback, he went to the receiving end of the ball and led TU to the Missouri Valley Conference championship in 1971. As a receiver for the Hurricane, Pearson caught 55 passes for 1,119 yards placing him tenth in receiving in TU history. His senior season, Pearson averaged 20.9 yards per catch scoring five touchdowns. Pearson was signed with the Dallas Cowboys as a free agent in 1972.

Steve Largent, who would become an NFL Hall of Fame inductee, was favorably compared to Howard Twilley while at Tulsa. In 1974 and again in 1975, Largent led the nation in touchdown receptions with 14 touchdowns each year. He was a two-time selection for the all-MVC team and was named to the Associated Press second team All-American squad in 1975. Largent averaged 17.5 yards per catch for his career, and caught 51 passes for 1,000 yards his senior season.

In 1977, offensive lineman Steve August was a first round draft selection of the Seattle Seahawks.


These players and others, along with the man who coached them made a mark on Tulsa football history. Some made a mark on the NFL as well. The teams of the 1970s helped Tulsa build a reputation for developing quality players who can make a difference on a team.

NO JUSTICE

John Cooper took over the Tulsa football program in 1977, and suffered through a 3-8 campaign, but in 1978 he rebounded the troops for an impressive 9-2 record.

Perhaps one of the best football teams was assembled in 1982. The only blemish on the season was a loss to nationally-ranked Arkansas. However, Tulsa's 10-1 season and top-20 national ranking was not good enough to impress Bowl scouts.

In that same season, college football fans new about a tandem of running backs at SMU, nicknamed the Pony Express — Eric Dickerson and Craig James. But what college football fans may not have known was that Tulsa has the only other pair of running backs in the country to rush for over 1,000 yards each — Micheal Gunter and Ken Lacy. In a takeoff of the Pony Express, Tulsa's tandem was dubbed the "Palomino Express".



That season, Tulsa was not the only 10-1 team snubbed from the Bowl picture, as New Mexico was in the same situation as the Hurricane. Tulsa and New Mexico fans cried out for justice, and Justice is just what they received.

Tulsa and New Mexico would square off in the Justice Bowl on December 19, 1982. At 1:15 p.m. that afternoon, radio stations in the two cities carried the play-by-play of a fictitious matchup between the two schools. In Tulsa, the Hurricane would win the game, and in New Mexico the Lobos triumphed.

BOWL GAMES CLOSE OUT 1980S, USHER IN THE '90S

Coach Cooper enjoyed a successful tenure taking Tulsa football into the 1980s, while a former Tulsa quarterback would take Hurricane football out of the '80s and into the 1990s. When Dave Rader became head coach in 1988, he became an expansion of Tulsa football's past.

Between Cooper and Rader, Tulsa had two coaches for a total of three seasons. Don Morton was the head coach in 1985 and 1986, while George Henshaw coached the Hurricane for the 1987 season.

Under Rader, Tulsa football experienced a roller coaster ride. The highest points were two bowl games — 1989 Independence Bowl and 1991 Freedom Bowl.

In 1989, the Hurricane posted a 6-5 regular season mark, and represented the Independent Football Alliance at the Independence Bowl, where the Hurricane faced a strong Oregon team from the PAC-10. The Ducks had a second-place conference finish, and was a 16-point favorite, but TU obviously didn't gamble. TU gave the Ducks all the fight they could handle.

Tulsa struck first on a one-yard TD run from Brett Adams, but Oregon bounced back as they put together scoring drives of 54 and 79 yards of their own to take the lead 10-7. The Hurricane took a 17-10 lead into halftime on a field goal and a blocked punt return for a touchdown.

Tulsa scored once more in the third quarter to build their lead to 24-10, but Oregon came back scoring two quick touchdowns to knot the game at 24. As time wound down in the fourth period, the officials ruled against TU on a fumble recovery allowing the Ducks to continue a drive that ended with a final field goal and a victory. Though the Hurricane suffered a heartbreaking loss, that bowl game allowed TU to get back into the college football spotlight.

That spotlight continued to shine in the 1991 season as Tulsa produced a 10-2 season and a number 21 ranking in the final Associated Press football poll. A season that saw the Hurricane upset 15th-ranked Texas A&M 35-34 at Skelly Stadium, and post a come-from-behind 13-10 victory over Southern Mississippi in the "snow bowl" was capped by an invitation to the Freedom Bowl in Anaheim, California, where Tulsa met San Diego State and star running back Marshall Faulk.

At halftime, the two teams went into the locker room deadlocked at 10-10. In the second half, the Tulsa defense became a wall that the Aztecs offense couldn't penetrate, holding them to just 83 yards of total offense.

Late in the game with the Hurricane up by three points, San Diego State muffed a punt at their own eight-yard line resulting in a Tulsa recovery. Two plays later, the Hurricane scored to make the final score 28-17. That Hurricane team went down in Tulsa football history as one of only five teams to have a 10-win season.

Eight Tulsa players from that team went into the NFL, including the likes of quarterbacks T.J. Rubley and Gus Frerotte, lineman Jerry Ostroski, receiver Chris Penn, and defensive stalwarts Barry Minter and Tracy Scroggins.

Since 1991, Tulsa football has been in a transition period, moving from a football independent to the Western Athletic Conference. Tulsa became a member of the WAC in 1996, and had its best season of league play in 2001, winning four games.

Tulsa football did not enjoy much success in the 1990s but as history has proven, success was not far away.

TULSA GOES TO EIGHT BOWL GAMES IN 12 YEARS

The Golden Hurricane won the 2005 Conference USA Championship in its first season as a league member.

The Steve Kragthorpe Era began with a bang in 2003, as the Golden Hurricane had its first winning season and first bowl appearance in 12 years. Tulsa posted an 8-5 overall record, and placed second in the WAC with a 6-2 mark.

In his first year as head coach, Kragthorpe led Tulsa to the biggest turn-around in college football with a seven-win improvement from the previous season. Tulsa made the school's 12th bowl appearance as the Hurricane played Georgia Tech in the Humanitarian Bowl on January 3, 2004. Tulsa football returned to its roots in 2003 as the Golden Hurricane became an offensive juggernaut, scoring over 30 points in seven games and averaging 30.8 points per game.

With an 8-5 record in 2003, Tulsa's seven-win improvement from the previous year was the biggest turn-around in college football for that season.

Although Tulsa only posted four wins in 2004, including two overtime losses, junior Ashlan Davis, a junior college transfer, made NCAA history becoming the first player to run-back five kickoff returns for touchdowns in a single season. He broke the previous NCAA mark of three.

The 2005 season began another new era for the Hurricane as Tulsa officially became a member of Conference USA on July 1, 2005. It would be a year to remember in the first as a C-USA member.

In conference action, Tulsa defeated the preseason favorite to win the C-USA East, Southern Miss, as well as the preseason #3 team in the East Division, Memphis, in the regular season en route to posting a 6-2 league record, winning the C-USA West Division title and playing in the inaugural Conference USA Football Championship Game presented by Xbox 360.

Tulsa captured a 44-27 win in the league championship game over UCF in Orlando, Florida, on Dec. 3, 2005, and received an invitation following the game to play in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl in Memphis, Tennessee.

Tulsa was matched up against former Western Athletic Conference rival Fresno State in the Liberty Bowl game. Tulsa amassed 430 yards in the game and scored 14 points in the final 10:35 of the game to capture a 31-24 victory over the Bulldogs in front of 54,894 fans.

The Hurricane finished the season with an overall 9-4 record as senior All-American Garrett Mills became the single-season receiving leader in NCAA history for tight ends.

In 2006, Tulsa made its second straight bowl appearance, a feat not accomplished since back-to-back Bluebonnet Bowl appearances in 1964 and '65. The Hurricane played in the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl and finished the season with an 8-5 record.

The 2007 campaign, the first for former Hurricane defensive coordinator Todd Graham as head coach, proved to be a record-setting season for the Golden Hurricane. Tulsa set 29 school records, 15 C-USA marks and four NCAA records, en route to leading the nation in total offense with 543.9 yards behind Wuerffel Trophy Award winner Paul Smith at quarterback. Tulsa met up with Bowling Green of the Mid-American Conference in the GMAC Bowl and came away with the largest margin of victory in NCAA Bowl history with a 63-7 win over the Falcons. With a 10-4 record, this Tulsa team became one of only six in school history to reach 10 wins.



Tulsa won the back-to-back GMAC Bowl titles after the 2007 and 2008 seasons.

A year later, the Hurricane won a school record 11 games by posting an 11-3 mark in 2008, established more school records, won the C-USA West Division title and made its' second straight appearance in the GMAC Bowl, defeating No. 22-ranked Ball State by a score of 45-13.

For the second consecutive season, Tulsa again led the nation in total offense with 569.9 yards per game. The Hurricane scored a school record 661 points, while finishing second nationally in scoring with a 47.2 average. Senior running back Tarrion Adams became the school's single-game, single-season and career record-holder for rushing, while senior placekicker Jarod Tracy set the all-time scoring record.

Only 10 times in NCAA history has a school led the nation in total offense in back-to-back years. Tulsa has done it three of those 10 times (1951-52, 1964-65, and 2007-08).

Tulsa captured its third 10-win season in four years with a 10-3 record in 2010. The season was highlighted with one of the most prestigious wins in school history, a 28-27 road win over Notre Dame, as well as a 62-35 victory against 24th-ranked Hawaii in the Sheraton Hawaii Bowl.

Receiver and kick return specialist Damaris Johnson became the NCAA's all-time record-holder for career all-purpose yards (7,796) and kickoff return yards (3,417). He went on to earn second-team Associated Press All-America honors, while Tulsa finished the season ranked 24th in the final AP poll.

ANOTHER 11-WIN SEASON FOR THE HURRICANE

Tulsa alumnus Bill Blankenship took over as head coach in January 2011 and encountered a schedule that featured three top-10 teams in the first four weeks of the season, including #1 Oklahoma, #7 Oklahoma State and #4 Boise State in three of the first four weeks. Tulsa faced its fourth top-10 opponent in the final regular season game of the year as No. 7 Houston handed the Hurricane a home loss.

Blankenship led the Hurricane to an 8-5 overall record in year one, making the school's seventh bowl appearance in nine years. Tulsa faced BYU at the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl, falling in the last minute by a score of 24-21.


In 2012, Blankenship's group posted seven straight victories following an opening road loss at Iowa State. Tulsa won the Conference USA Championship with an overtime win over UCF in the title game, thus setting up a second match-up against Iowa State in the 2012 AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

This time, Tulsa got the best of the Cyclones with a 31-17 victory at Liberty Bowl Stadium in Memphis, Tenn. With the win, Tulsa finished the season with an 11-3 record, tying the school mark for most wins in a season.

MONTGOMERY TAKES TULSA TO THREE MORE BOWL GAMES

Following two losing seasons, Tulsa named Baylor Offensive Coordinator Philip Montgomery as the school's new head coach. The Hurricane offense was among the nation's top units, ranking 11th for passing (333.2 ypg) and 13th for total yards (507.4 ypg) in Montgomery's first at the helm of the program.

Tulsa began the 2015 season with wins over FAU and at New Mexico, before dropping a 14-point decision at #16 Oklahoma. The Hurricane needed a final quarter comeback for a 45-34 victory in the regular season finale at Tulane to become bowl eligible with a 6-6 record. In addition to Oklahoma, two more of the six losses came to nationally-ranked opponents #17 Memphis and #16 Navy, as well as one that would end the season in the final rankings, Houston.



2012 AutoZone Liberty Bowl Champions

The Hurricane returned to the postseason with a trip to Shreveport, Louisiana to face Virginia Tech in Frank Beamer's final game as the Hokies head coach. Trailing 45-21 in the second quarter, Tulsa out-scored VT 31-10 over the final 33 minutes and fell just shy in a 55-52 loss.

Despite a final 6-7 record and bowl game loss, the momentum was established to put Tulsa football back into the conversation of conference championships and consistent bowl game appearances.

A year later, Montgomery led the Hurricane to a 10-3 season and 6-2 mark for a second-place finish in the American Athletic Conference's West Division. The 2016 campaign was a record-setting season as the Hurricane became the first team in NCAA FBS/DI history with a 3,000-yard passer (Dane Evans), two 1,000-yard rushers (D'Angelo Brewer and James Flanders) and two 1,000-yard receivers (Josh Atkinson and Keevan Lucas) in the same year.

Tulsa's offense also had a school-record eight 300+ rushing games, while the Hurricane defense had 15 takeaways that led to 101 points and had improvements from a year earlier of allowing the opposition 10 less points and 110 less yards.

Tulsa put an exclamation point on the 2016 season with a 55-10 victory over Central Michigan in the Miami Beach Bowl.

In 2017, two players put themselves atop the school's career performance lists – D'Angelo Brewer became the all-time rushing leader with 3,917 yards and Redford Jones became Tulsa's career scoring leader with 319 points.

The 2020 season was one that college football will never forget as the season was altered by COVID-19. The Hurricane team had eight games affected by the pandemic, but was able to play seven regular season contests and two in the postseason.

Tulsa tied Cincinnati for the league title with a 6-0 AAC mark and went down to the final seconds in the championship game as the Bearcats knocked through a last second field goal for a 27-24 victory. The Hurricane made its third appearance in the Armed Forces Bowl to close out the season.

The campaign was highlighted by the play of the nation's Defensive Player of the year, linebacker Zaven Collins. Collins won the Bronko Nagurski, Chuck Bednarik and Lombardi Awards, while earning consensus All-America honors.



D'Angelo Brewer became the school's career rushing leader in 2017, while also breaking the American Athletic Conference all-time rushing record that year. He concluded his career with 3,917 rushing yards.

Tulsa earned its first bowl bid with a 7-2 regular season record. Tulsa's only losses were against Texas Christian, 6-0, and Arkansas, 13-6, in Henry Frnka's first season as head coach.

The game with the Red Raiders, which was played before a partisan Texas crowd, proved to be a defensive struggle. Tulsa's defense held Tech to four first downs and 104 yards of total offense. In the first half, the Raiders pushed the ball to the Tulsa 15-yard line, but the Hurricane defense forced Tech to try a field goal, which missed and resulted in a scoreless first half.

After intermission, Tulsa's Glenn Dobbs punted the ball from the Hurricane 14-yard line out of Tech's end zone, giving Tulsa the momentum. Late in the game, Tulsa mounted a 71-yard touchdown drive behind the passing of Dobbs, who finished the day with 239 passing yards.

With only a few minutes remaining, Dobbs passed to Sax Judd for a 32-yard score, but Dobbs' PAT attempt was blocked. Tulsa intercepted a Tech pass to preserve the 6-0 victory.

Tennessee 14, Tulsa 7



Tennessee nosed out Tulsa, 14-7, in the ninth Sugar Bowl football game before 70,000 fans on a beautiful sunny afternoon.

Tulsa scored first on an aerial march of 60 yards headed by All-American Glenn Dobbs early in the second period. Dobbs threw to end Cal Purdin for the score, while Clyde LeForce kicked the extra point. Later in the same period Tennessee countered with six points of their own and at halftime Tulsa held a slim 7-6 advantage.

The Volunteer's power told the story in the second half, as Tennessee scored a safety by blocking one of Dobbs' punts to take the lead in the third period, 8-7. The Volunteers added another touchdown by its powerful running game in the fourth quarter.



With Tennessee leading 14-7 in the waning minutes of the game, the Hurricane drove to the UT 11-yard line and was within one play of a tie, before Tennessee's Bill Nowling intercepted an N.A. Keithley pass to end any hopes of a Tulsa victory.



Tulsa made its second straight trip to the Sugar Bowl but failed in its bid for a victory over Georgia Tech in front of 69,000 fans.

For the first three periods and past the middle of the fourth, Tulsa clung

to the lead. But in the end, Tulsa could not withstand an offensive attack led by Tech All-American Eddie Prokop who led the 72-yard drive that gave the Yellow Jackets a 20-18 decision.

Tulsa stopped a Tech drive following the opening kickoff, and from their own 14-yard line marched 86 yards to score in the first five minutes. A fake field goal by Clyde LeForce ended up in a TD pass to Ed Shedlosky. TU tailback Jimmy Ford ran around left end for a 79-yard touchdown on the first play of the second quarter for a 12-0 Hurricane lead.

Prior to halftime, Tech scored on a 71-yard drive, followed by a six-yard TD run by TU's LeForce to give the Hurricane an 18-7 halftime lead. Tech made it 18-13 in the third period, and put together a 79-yard drive for a two-point lead in the final quarter. Tulsa could get only as close as the Tech 34-yard line before the final horn sounded.

Prokop gained 199 yards on 29 carries for Georgia Tech, while Tulsa's Ford had 119 yards on 14 carries.

Tulsa sought revenge against the Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets for the come-from-behind victory in the previous year's Sugar Bowl. This time Tulsa handed the Jackets a 26-12 loss in front of 29,426 fans at the Orange Bowl.

The Hurricane jumped out to a 14-0 first quarter lead and held that same advantage at halftime. On Tulsa's first play of the third quarter, the Hurricane used some razzle-dazzle as Perry Moss threw to Nip Goodnight at the 35-yard line, who then lateraled to Barney White, who sped straight down the north side line for six points, making the score 20-0.

Tech came back with six points of their own in the third period. Tulsa's Camp Wilson quickly quieted the crowd taking the Tech kickoff on the 10-yard line and racing 90 yards for a 26-6 Tulsa lead. Georgia Tech added six points in the final quarter to pull within 14 points of the victorious Hurricane.



Just as Georgia had capitalized on a poor punt, Tulsa capitalized on a fumble that was recovered at the Georgia 13-yard line. Five plays later Camp Wilson went over for the touchdown from one yard out giving Tulsa what would be their only score of the game.

The score remained 7-6 through three quarters, but Georgia threw a 47-yard touchdown pass on its second fourth quarter possession, and added a 68-yard punt return for a touchdown by Charlie Trippi. Tulsa had two more opportunities to score but failed.



The Gators scored the first time they had the ball, driving 78 yards in 11 plays. Florida scored again in the second period on a 37-yard pass play, capping an 80-yard, 13-play drive. But in the second half, Tulsa's offense threw the Florida defense off balance with the running of Jake Roberts.

The Hurricane put together drives of 73 and 46 yards in the second half. Roberts ran for a three-yard touchdown in the third quarter, followed by a Tom Miner extra point. Tulsa's next touchdown drive began following a Florida fumble at their own 46-yard line. Howard Waugh went over from three yards out for the touchdown. Miner's extra point attempt went wide to the left.

With six minutes left to play, the Hurricane recovered another Florida fumble. Tulsa drove to the Gators' four-yard line, but had to settle for a field goal that again went wide left. Florida was left with just under three minutes to hold onto the ball and the victory.

Ole Miss opened the scoring with a one-yard Weatherley run in the second quarter. Rhome answered on a fourth down situation with a one-yard run of his own with 6:15 remaining in the first half. The Tulsa drive covered 72 yards.

In the third quarter, Rhome threw 35 yards to flanker Eddie Fletcher for the go-ahead touchdown that proved to be the game-winner.

Other than a 44-yard, 11-play touchdown drive in the closing minutes of the first quarter that saw Gary McDermott run in from one yard out, Tulsa did not cross the Tennessee 20-yard line until the last minute of the game.



Tennessee, who jumped out to a 6-0 lead, scored its first and second touchdowns on drives of 48 and 33 yards following Tulsa fumbles. Tennessee's third touchdown came on a seven-yard drive after a 45-yard punt return.

The Volunteers led 20-6 at halftime and put the game out of reach with their final touchdown early in the third quarter, coming after another Tulsa turnover. Statistically, Tulsa outgained the Volunteers by 105 yards, including a 250 to 37-yard advantage in the passing department.



At halftime, Tulsa held onto a 7-6 lead. However, in the third quarter the Cowboys took a 14-7 lead with a 63-yard drive and two-point conversion.

On their next possession, McNeese attempted a 51-yard field goal that was blocked, recovered and returned by Tulsa's Mel McGowen 65 yards for a score. The extra-point-attempt was blocked and the Southland Conference champions led 14-13 with 4:07 remaining in the third period.

With 4:22 remaining, Tulsa appeared to have won the game when Steve Cox kicked a three-pointer from 38 yards out to put his team ahead, 16-14. However, McNeese drove 80 yards from their own 20-yard line in the last two minutes and Hadnot raced the final 25 yards for the winning score.

The PAC-10 Conference's second-place team, the Oregon Ducks, entered the Independence Bowl against Tulsa as 16-point favorites, only to hang on for a controversial 27-24 win. The Hurricane went into the game without the services of All-America receiver Dan Bitson, who suffered numerous injuries in an automobile accident two weeks earlier.

The Hurricane scored first on a Brett Adams one-yard run. Oregon put together drives of 54 and 79 yards to take a 10-7 lead, until a Tulsa field goal of 26 yards by David Fuess knotted the score at 10-10 with just over two minutes to play in the first half.

Tulsa took the halftime lead, 17-10, on a blocked punt by Herbert Harvey. Derrick Williams picked up the ball and raced 21 yards for the score with 22 seconds left on the first half clock.

Adams added another one-yard touchdown run in the third period as Tulsa took a 24-10 lead. However, Oregon scored two touchdowns in a six-minute span late in the third quarter and early in the fourth.

With just over three minutes to play, an apparent Tulsa recovery of an Oregon fumble was overruled by the officials. Thus, the Ducks converted on a 20-yard field goal to capture a 27-24 victory.

Tulsa, making its second bowl appearance in three years and its first at-large showing since 1976, notched its first bowl victory since 1964 with a 28-17 win over San Diego State in the eighth Freedom Bowl.

Tulsa's veteran offensive line opened huge holes for tailback Ron Jackson, who grabbed Most Valuable Player honors as he rushed by 211 yards and a Freedom Bowl record four touchdowns on 46 carries. The junior scored once in each of the four quarters, accounting for touchdown runs

of 10, 6, 4 and 4 yards, respectively.

The teams were deadlocked at the end of the first and second quarters. Tulsa's defense came alive after intermission holding the potent Aztec offense to just three points and 83 total yards.

Tulsa led 21-17 late in the game when Gus Frerotte's booming 54-yard punt was mishandled by Aztec return specialist T.C. Wright at his own 8-yard line. Billy Cole recovered for Tulsa and the Hurricane scored two plays later to seal the win. The victory earned Tulsa a ranking of 21st in the final Associated Press and CNN/USA Today polls.

Tulsa won five straight games to end the regular season and claimed second-place in the Western Athletic Conference. The game marked Tulsa's first bowl appearance in 12 years and the eight wins was more than the previous three seasons put together. Although the Hurricane enjoyed its trip to Boise, Idaho, the game was another story. Despite trailing just 10-3 at halftime, Georgia Tech had controlled the first half out-gaining the Hurricane 129-20.

The second half was more of the P.J. Daniels show for Tech. The running back had 104 yards at halftime, and ended the game with 307 rushing yards and four touchdowns. While the Tulsa defense couldn't stop Daniels, the Hurricane offense was giving the Yellow Jackets a short field with six lost fumbles. Six of Tech's eight touchdown drives began inside the Tulsa 40-yard line, and four of those TDs coming after a Tulsa fumble.

Tech put up 42 second-half points and went on for a 52-10 victory, the most lopsided Bowl loss for the Hurricane in 12 postseason appearances.

Tulsa amassed 430 yards for the game and scored 14 points in the final 10:35 of the game to capture a 31-24 victory over the Fresno State Bulldogs in the 47th Annual AutoZone Liberty Bowl in front of 54,894 fans at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium.

The win for Tulsa was its' fifth bowl win in 13 games, and snapped Fresno State's bowl winning streak in consecutive years at three.

Hurricane sophomore Paul Smith, who completed 18-of-27 passes for 234 yards and one touchdown and scored the winning TD on a four-yard run, was named the Most Valuable Player. Senior Ashlan Davis had his first career 100+ receiving game with 128 yards on eight catches, while being named Tulsa's Offensive Player of the Game and sophomore defensive back Anthony Germany was selected as Tulsa's Defensive Player of the Game after intercepting one pass and breaking up two passes.

Trailing 24-17, the Hurricane early in the fourth quarter, Tulsa gained 162 yards while holding the Bulldogs to 77 yards in the final stanza. Tulsa won its second Bowl game in the last three years with a 63-7 victory over Bowling Green in the GMAC Bowl at Ladd-Peebles Stadium. Tulsa improved to 10-4 giving the Hurricane the school's sixth 10-win season in the 108-year history of football.

The 56-point victory was the largest in NCAA Bowl history.

Tulsa quarterback Paul Smith completed 27-of-45 passes for 312 yards and five touchdowns, while becoming only the seventh player in NCAA history to surpass 5,000 passing yards in a season.

Tulsa capitalized on three first quarter turnovers by Bowling Green and took a 21-0 lead at the end of one quarter. The Hurricane increased its lead to 35-0 at halftime, capitalizing on another Falcon turnover.

The Hurricane opened the second-half with an eight-play, 78-yard drive in just 2:11 that saw Smith throw the final 14 yards to Trae Johnson, to give the Hurricane a 42-0 lead at the 12:49 mark. BGSU scored its first points of the game on the subsequent kickoff with a 78-yard return.

Tulsa scored one more time in the third quarter on a Paul Smith two-yard run. While the senior threw fourth quarter TD passes of three yards to Charles Clay and six yards to A.J. Whitmore.

Tulsa's offense was unstoppable and the defense was dominant as the Golden Hurricane posted an impressive 55-10 victory over Central Michigan in the 2016 Miami Beach Bowl on a Monday afternoon in front of 15,262 fans at Marlins Park. Tulsa finished the season with a 10-3 record, the 10th 10-win season in school history, while also capturing the school's 10th bowl game victory.

Tulsa's offense put the Hurricane into NCAA lore, becoming the first team in DI/FBS history to have a 3,000-yard passer (Dane Evans), two 1,000-yard rushers (D'Angelo Brewer and James Flanders) and two 1,000-yard receivers (Josh Atkinson and Keevan Lucas). It didn't take the Hurricane offense long to accomplish that feat as Evans' 30-yard pass to Atkinson in the middle of the second quarter put the Hurricane quintet into the NCAA record books.

With a 27-3 halftime lead, the Hurricane came out in the second half and scored three more touchdowns to take a 48-3 lead after three quarters. Flanders began the second-half scoring barrage with a 17-yard TD run after an earlier 31-yard run in that same series, capping a 56-yard, five-play drive.

While the Hurricane offense gained 581 yards, the defense held Central Michigan to 355 total yards and only 10 points, tying for the fewest points Tulsa had allowed this year. Tulsa's defense had three interceptions, including a bowl record 66-yard return for a touchdown by end Jesse Brubaker.



Tulsa dominated the game statistically, but the Hurricane comeback bid against the SEC's Mississippi State Bulldogs fell short, 28-26, in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl at Amon G. Carter Stadium.

Trailing 28-19 with 8:01 remaining in the game, Tulsa went on a 6-play, 55-yard scoring drive that saw Zach Smith throw the final 15 yards to Keylon Stokes. The ensuing onside kick, after being bobbled, was corralled by an MSU player, thus securing the Bulldogs two-point win.

Tulsa out-gained MSU 484 to 271 in total offense, as the Hurricane gained 347 yards via the air and 137 rushing yards. The Hurricane defense, playing without College Football's Defensive Player of the Year Zaven Collins, held the Bulldogs to 123 yards on the ground and 148 passing yards, 109 yards below MSU's season average for total yards.

The Hurricane pulled to within two points early in the 4th quarter when Corey Taylor II ran in from five yards out to cap a 32-yard, 9-play drive making the score 21-19. Tulsa's pass on a two-point conversion attempt skipped off of Keylon Stokes' hands, thus keeping it a two-point MSU advantage.

Tulsa nickel safety Cristian Williams was named Tulsa's Game MVP with seven tackles and one pass breakup.



#14 • BILLY GUY ANDERSON • He followed in the footsteps of an All-American, and he played only one year, but Billy Guy Anderson became Tulsa's most prolific passer. He established 10 school passing records. In his first game at quarterback for Tulsa, he completed 25 of 47 passes for two touchdowns and 230 yards. In his final collegiate regular season game, he threw successive scoring bombs of 60, 63 and 51 yards in the fourth quarter to defeat Colorado State. On that same day, he set an NCAA record as he passed for 502 yards. As a senior, he completed 58 percent of his passes for 3,464 yards and 30 touchdowns. His jersey was retired on September 23, 1995.

#45 • GLENN DOBBS • A star tailback for the Golden Hurricane teams of 1940, '41, and '42, Glenn Dobbs was an All-America selection in 1942. One of the best passers and punters in college history, Dobbs led Tulsa to a 25-6 record with two post-season bowl games in his three seasons. He returned to TU as athletics director in 1955 after playing professional football and in 1961 was named Tulsa's head football coach. He was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame in 1980 and to the TU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1982.

#31 • ELLIS JONES • A courageous performer, Ellis Jones was the one-armed player who helped lead the University to three bowl appearances in 1942, '43, '44. He was the defensive standout in the 1945 College All-Star game against the Chicago Bears, collecting three tackles behind the line of scrimmage in the same series. A 1983 inductee into the TU Athletic Hall of Fame.

#83 • STEVE LARGENT • An All-America receiver at Tulsa, Steve Largent went on to a Hall of Fame career with the Seattle Seahawks. He was a two-time all-Missouri Valley Conference selection. As a senior in 1975, Largent caught 51 passes for 1,000 yards, 19.5 yards per reception and 14 touchdowns. As a junior, Largent caught 52 passes for 884 yards and 14 TDs. He had career totals of 136 receptions for 2,385 yards and 32 touchdowns. His jersey was retired on October 26, 2008.

#64 • MARVIN MATUSZAK • Possibly the top lineman in the University of Tulsa's history, Marvin Matuszak was a two-time first-team All-America choice in 1951 and '52. He was an all-Missouri Valley Conference pick as well and led the Golden Hurricane into the 1953 Gator Bowl

against Florida. Matuszak was a longtime standout in both the National and American Football Leagues. He was inducted into the TU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1983.


#55 • JERRY OSTROSKI • A first-team Associated Press All-America selection in 1991, Jerry Ostroski helped lead the Golden Hurricane to a 10-2 record and victory in the Freedom Bowl. As a true freshman in 1988, Ostroski was the only rookie to letter as a part-time starter on the offensive line. He was a full-time starter for his final three seasons and as a senior graded 91 percent for blocking consistency with 49 knockdowns. He also earned All-America honors by the FWAA, The Sporting News, UPI and College and Pro Football Weekly his senior season. Ostroski was inducted into the TU Athletic Hall of Fame in 2008. His jersey was retired on October 27, 2018.

#36 • FELTO PREWITT • Considered to be one of the top centers in Golden Hurricane history, Felto Prewitt starred on the bowl teams of 1943, '44, and '45. He gained first team All-America honors in 1945 and went on to play with the Baltimore Colts of the National Football League.

#17 • JERRY RHOME • Possibly the most polished passer in college football history, Jerry Rhome made a shambles of NCAA passing and total offense records in 1963 and 1964. He threw for a career 4,779 yards and 42 touchdowns. In 1964, when he passed for 2,870 yards and 32 TD's, Rhome was the runner-up to Notre Dame quarterback John Huarte in the Heisman Trophy voting. He was selected as the Collegiate Player-of-the-Year in several polls and made nearly every All-America team. Elected to the TU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1984. He was a College Football Hall of Fame inductee in 1998.

#81 • HOWARD TWILLEY • A consensus All-America choice in 1965, Howard Twilley set nearly every Golden Hurricane receiving record and set most national marks. He followed Jerry Rhome as the runner-up in the Heisman Trophy voting in 1965, placing second to Southern California halfback Mike Garrett. He caught a career 261 passes for 3,343 yards and 32 touchdowns. Twilley was the captain of the Academic All-American team in 1965. He went on to star for the Miami Dolphins of the NFL. He was selected to the TU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1984 and was a College Football Hall of Fame inductee in 1992.


The 2008 Courage Award Goes to Wilson Holloway

The University of Tulsa's Wilson Holloway was the 2008 winner of the FedEx Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award. Holloway, a red-shirt freshman offensive lineman, battled cancer when a softball-sized mass was discovered in his chest in the spring of 2008. Holloway was presented with the award at the BCS Championship Game on January 8, 2009 in Miami, Florida. He was also honored that day at the Football Writers Association of America's (FWAA) annual awards breakfast. A select group of writers from the FWAA vote on the winner Courage Award winner each year. The requirements for nomination include displaying courage on or off the field, including overcoming an injury or physical handicap, preventing a disaster or living through hardship. (Note: Wilson Holloway passed away on February 16, 2011).

Paul Smith Gets Wuerffel Trophy in 2007

In 2007, senior quarterback Paul Smith had a record-setting year, establishing himself as Tulsa's all-time passing leader. He was also presented with the Third Annual Wuerffel Trophy. The prestigious Wuerffel Trophy, named after former University of Florida quarterback Danny Wuerffel, is given to the college football player who best combines exemplary community service with athletic and academic achievement.

Zaven Collins Named College Football's National Defensive Player of the Year in 2020

A unanimous consensus All-American Zaven Collins was named college football's defensive player of the year after winning the two national awards given to the best defender – the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Chuck Bednarik Award. Collins was also the winner of the Lombardi Award. The Lombardi is presented to the top FBS player, regardless of position, based on the Lombardi Award's criteria of "performance and leadership honed by character and resiliency." The award was formerly given to the best college football defensive lineman or linebacker up until 2017. Collins was also named the 2020 CFB on FOX Defensive Player of the Year and the Butkus Award runner-up, which goes to the nation's top linebacker.

Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductees

BOB ST. CLAIR • 1990 Inductee

Bob St. Clair, who was a tackle for The University of Tulsa in 1952, was a 1990 inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. St. Clair played professional football for the San Francisco 49ers from 1953-63. In 11 seasons, he was a five-time starter in the Pro Bowl. He played both ways for the 49ers and also starred on the special teams. St. Clair is one of Tulsa's greatest defensive tackles. He came to Tulsa for the 1952 season after transferring from San Francisco. He played on Tulsa's 1952 Gator Bowl team.

JIM FINKS • 1995 Inductee

Jim Finks was an outstanding quarterback at The University of Tulsa from 1946-48. He played seven seasons for the Pittsburgh Steelers after being drafted in the 12th round. Following his playing career, he went on to an illustrious career as a team administrator, serving as chief executive officer with the Minnesota Vikings (1964-73), Chicago Bears (1974-82) and the New Orleans Saints (1986-93). At Tulsa, he threw for 2,796 yards and 18 touchdowns and was selected all-conference in 1947 and '48. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame posthumously in 1995.

STEVE LARGENT • 1995 Inductee

Steve Largent played at The University of Tulsa from 1972-75 and then went on to a 14-year career with the Seattle Seahawks. Largent ended his career in the NFL with league career records for receptions (819), yards (13,089), touchdowns (100), consecutive games with a reception (177), 50-catch seasons (10) and 1,000-yard seasons (8). He was selected to play in the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl game seven times. Largent was originally drafted on the fourth round in 1976 by the Houston Oilers, was waived by the Oilers, recalled, and traded to the Seahawks that same year. At Tulsa, Largent was a two-time first-team all-Missouri Valley Conference pick and was a second-team All-American in 1975. He caught 136 passes for 2,385 yards and 32 TDs at Tulsa. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1995.

DREW PEARSON • 2021 Inductee

Drew Pearson came to The University of Tulsa from South River, New Jersey, as a quarterback and moved to receiver as a junior. Pearson rose to become one of the NFL's greatest wide receivers and earned the nickname "Mr. Clutch". He completed his career with 489 receptions and 7,822 receiving yards, along with 189 rushing yards, 155 yards returning kickoffs, and 50 touchdowns in 156 games played. Pearson signed with Dallas as a free agent in 1973 and in that first season caught 22 passes for 388 yards and two touchdowns. A year later, Pearson turned in a season that saw him pull in 62 passes for 1,087 yards. Pearson was a three-time Pro Bowl selection, three-time first-team All-Pro and was named to the NFL's 1970s All-Decade Team. At Tulsa, Pearson finished his career with 55 receptions for 1,119 yards, eight TDs and a 20.3-yard average per reception.

Canadian Football League Hall of Fame Inductees

JERRY KEELING • 1989 CFL Inductee

Keeling played quarterback at The University of Tulsa and was an all-Missouri Valley Conference performer in 1959 and 1960. He starred for the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League as a defensive back, and was selected to the all-CFL team three times. Keeling played on two Grey Cup winning teams.

KAYE VAUGHAN • 1978 CFL Inductee

Vaughan was an outstanding tackle at The University of Tulsa from 1950-52 and in the Canadian Football League for 12 seasons. He was selected to the CFL's Eastern Conference all-star team 10 times while playing for the Ottawa Rough Riders.

Conference History

In the early years, Tulsa competed in the Oklahoma Collegiate Conference for 11 seasons. Tulsa posted a 46-7-4 record and won five league titles. The Hurricane spent four seasons as members of the Big Four Conference, winning three conference championships while registering a 12-1 mark.

From 1935 to 1985, The University of Tulsa competed for the Missouri Valley Conference football championship. After becoming a member of the conference in 1934, Tulsa proceeded to win the league championship its first four years and eight of its first nine years in the conference.

In 50 years of competition in the Missouri Valley

Conference, Tulsa won more conference championships than any other team in the history of the league. TU has to its credit 25 Missouri Valley Conference titles, including 19 outright titles and six co-championships.

Following the 1985 season, Tulsa withdrew its football membership from the Missouri Valley Conference. The league then closed down its operation of football as a conference sport. Before leaving the MVC, Tulsa won the final six league championships (1980-1985).

Tulsa played as an independent for 10 seasons before becoming a member of the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) beginning with the 1996 season,

while the 2004 campaign was the last in the WAC for the Hurricane. Tulsa's best finish in nine years in the WAC was second place with a 6-2 league record in 2003.

The 2005 season was the first for Tulsa in Conference USA, and the Golden Hurricane responded that season by winning the school's first conference title since 1985. Tulsa's affiliation with C-USA ended after the 2013 season, and in nine years, Tulsa posted an overall 49-23-1 mark, four West Division titles and two C-USA Championships.

Tulsa began its membership in the American Athletic Conference in the 2014 season.
