

- For the first time in history, the UCF football team is headed to the Military Bowl. UCF will meet Atlantic Coast Conference representative Duke at 2 p.m. on Wednesday, Dec. 28, 2022, in 34,000seat Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium in Annapolis, Maryland, in the Military Bowl presented by Peraton, benefiting the USO. The game will be televised by ESPN.
- It's a program-record seventh consecutive postseason bowl appearance for the Knights, the 10th in 11 seasons and the 14th in 18 years. UCF also previously played in the NCAA Division II playoffs in 1987 and in the NCAA FCS Playoffs in 1990 and 1993.
- UCF is looking for its seventh bowl win in program history and second consecutive after the Knights defeated Florida in the Gasparilla Bowl. A win against the Blue Devils would give UCF a bowl win in consecutive years for just the second time (2012-13).
- The Knights are also in search of their ninth 10-win season in program history and their fourth in the last six seasons. UCF last won 10 games in 2019 with a 10-3 mark, after compiling a 12-1 record in 2018 and a 13-0 mark in 2017.
- UCF just completed its final season in the American Athletic Conference. In 10 seasons as a member of the AAC, the Knights compiled a 57-23 (.713) mark in regular-season conference games.
- UCF accepted an invitation to join the Big 12 Conference on Sept. 10, 2021, then-Big 12 commissioner Bob Bowlsby, UCF director of athletics Terry Mohajir, and UCF President Alex Cartwright announced in a release. The Knights athletics program has now moved from Division III, Division II, the FCS level, the FBS level that included time in the MAC, Conference USA, the AAC, and now to the Big 12 Conference.
- UCF's red zone defense continues to rank among the best in the country at No. 5 nationally, as opponents have scored on 68% of their trips to the red zone, converting on 37-of-54 attempts. The Knights have allowed 24 touchdowns in the red zone in 54 trips for opponents, a 44% rate. UCF has forced at least one red zone stop in 10 of its 13 games this season, headlined by a season-high five red zone stops against Georgia Tech.
- The Knights' rushing attack ranks eighth nationally, averaging 236.1 rushing yards per game. UCF has rushed for 200 or more yards in nine of its 13 games this season, headlined by a season-high 345 rushing yards in the win over South Florida. The Knights' 33 rushing touchdowns this season are tied for 10th nationally and lead the conference.
- UCF's offense has been ranked among the nation's best throughout the season, as the squad is 11th with 480.6 yards per game. The Knights are one of just four teams (Ohio State, Oklahoma, Tennessee) nationally to surpass 650 yards of total offense in two games this season. UCF had a season-high 737 yards against Temple, the second most by any team in a single game this year, and 653 yards against Florida Atlantic.





The Military Bowl matchup will be the first meeting between the programs, as the Knights and Blue Devils have never met on the gridiron. Duke and UCF share two common opponents this season, as both teams defeated Temple (UCF: 70-13, Duke: 30-0) and the Knights defeated Georgia Tech (27-10), while the Blue Devils were edged in overtime by the Yellow Jackets (23-20).

LAST TIME OUT

NEW ORLEANS – In search of its fifth American Athletic Conference (AAC) Championship, 22nd-ranked UCF football came up just short of achieving its season-long goal as No. 18 Tulane earned a 45-28 victory at Yulman Stadium. The Knights move to 9-4 on the season, while the Green Wave improve to 11-2.

Playing in its first conference championship game, Tulane was able to hold off a late comeback as the Knights cut the deficit to 31-28 with 9:48 remaining in the fourth quarter but the Green Wave responded with a touchdown to regain a 10-point lead and went on to win by 17 points.

"First of all, give Tulane all the credit. They're a really good team and we knew that coming in," said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. "We didn't play our best, but they had something to do with that. I'm proud of our team and the way we fought back. We got off a tough start, but we fought back and made a three-point game at 31-28 and it was right there before us. Give them credit, they went down and scored to take the momentum back."

Following a tough first half, UCF scored 21 points and compiled 292 total yards but the Knights were unable to slow down the Green Wave offense as it logged 365 yards in the second half to score 28 points to secure the victory.

Despite being hampered by injury, John Rhys Plumlee battled and finished the night 21-of-39 for 209 yards with a touchdown. Isaiah Bowser led the rushing attack with 85 yards on 20 carries with a score, while Kobe Hudson brought in four catches for 98 yards and two touchdowns.

KNIGHT NOTES

SEVENTH CONSECUTIVE BOWL APPEARANCE

For the first time in history, the UCF football team will play in the Military Bowl.

UCF (9-4) will meet Atlantic Coast Conference representative Duke (8-4) at 2 p.m. EST on Wednesday, Dec. 28, 2022, in 34,000-seat Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium in Annapolis, Maryland, in the Military Bowl presented by Peraton, benefiting the USO. The game will be televised by ESPN.

It's a program-record seventh consecutive postseason bowl appearance for the Knights, the 10th in 11 seasons and the 14th in 18 years. UCF also previously played in the NCAA Division II playoffs in 1987 and in the NCAA FCS Playoffs in 1990 and 1993.

The Knights previously have played twice each in the Fiesta Bowl (following 2014 and 2018 seasons), Liberty Bowl (2007 and 2010), St. Petersburg Bowl (2009 and 2014) and Gasparilla Bowl (2019 and 2021) and once each in the Hawaii Bowl (2005), Beef O'Brady's Bowl (2012), Cure Bowl (2016), Peach Bowl (2017) and Boca Raton Bowl (2020).

The Military Bowl has been played since 2008—the first two seasons as the EagleBank Bowl and then as the Military Bowl beginning with the 2010 campaign. The game benefits the USO and Patriot Point, the Military Bowl Foundation's 294-acre retreat for wounded, ill and injured service members, their families and caregivers.

ADDISON WILLIAMS PROMOTED TO DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Addison Williams, UCF's defensive backs coach the last two years and the Knights' assistant head coach in 2022, has been named defensive coordinator by head coach Gus Malzahn.

"Addison is a rising star in the coaching profession," said Malzahn. "He is not only a great coach, but a super person. I'm excited to have him running our defense."

Williams, in his second season with UCF, has helped the Knights turn what once was a youthful secondary into one of the most improved and productive units on the roster.

Veteran Knight cornerbacks Davonte Brown (31 career starts), Corey Thornton (26) and Brandon Adams played a noteworthy role in UCF standing third in the American Athletic Conference in team pass efficiency defense in 2022. That duo also helped UCF rank fifth nationally in red-zone defense.

UNIQUE CONNECTION

All-AAC linebacker Jason Johnson will notice a familiar face on the sidelines when the Knights face Duke. After spending three seasons at Eastern Illinois, Johnson entered the transfer portal after his head coach Adam Cushing accepted the run game coordinator and offensive line coach position with the Blue Devils.

UCF VERSUS THE ACC

UCF will face its third ACC opponent of the season when it takes on Duke in the bowl game. The Knights fell to Louisville, 20-14, but defeated Georgia Tech, 27-10.

Duke and UCF share two common opponents this season, as both teams defeated Temple (UCF: 70-13, Duke: 30-0) and the Knights defeated Georgia Tech (27-10), while the Blue Devils were edged in overtime by the Yellow Jackets (23-20).

WRAPPING UP THE AMERICAN

UCF wrapped up play in the American Athletic Conference by playing for its fifth conference championship on Saturday, Dec. 3. The Knights won the title in the first year of the conference in 2013, again in 2014, 2017 and 2018. UCF's four AAC Championships are the most of any school.

UCF compiled a 57-23 (.713) mark in regular-season conference games in 10 seasons as a member of the American Athletic Conference, which is the most wins and best winning percentage of any team.

WELCOME TO THE BIG 12

Effective July 1, 2023, UCF will be one of 14 members of the Big 12 Conference. The Knights will join the league along with BYU, Cincinnati and Houston.

UCF participates in every sport sponsored by the Big 12 except equestrian, gymnastics, swimming & diving and wrestling. The Big 12 sponsors every sport UCF competes in except men's soccer, which will join the Sun Belt Conference.

This marks the second time in the Conference's 26-year history that new members were added. Baylor, Iowa State, Kansas State, Kansas, Oklahoma State and Texas Tech have been members since the Big 12 began in 1996, with TCU and West Virginia joining in 2011.

MATCHUP TO KEEP AN EYE ON

Both teams love to run the football. In fact, UCF has rushed for 200 or more yards in nine of its 13 games this season and Duke has surpassed the 200 rushing yards mark in six games.

The Knights are seventh nationally and second in the American Athletic Conference with 236 rushing yards per game, while the Blue Devils are 40th in the nation and third in the Atlantic Coast Conference with 184.8.

Defensively, UCF has allowed 156.2 rushing yards per game and opponents have averaged 121.1 against Duke.

PLUMLEE CHASING HISTORY

With 11 rushing touchdowns this season, UCF quarterback John Rhys Plumlee is one rushing touchdown shy of tying for the most by a quarterback in a single season in program history. Daunte Culpepper holds the record with 12 rushing touchdowns in a single season set in 1998.

POSTSEASON HONORS

Second-team All-America long snapper Alex Ward joined a quintet of other UCF football players—offensive linemen Lokahi Pauole and Ryan Swoboda, defensive linemen Ricky Barber and Tre'mon Morris-Brash and linebacker Jason Johnson—on the American Athletic Conference all-league first team selected by Phil Steele. In addition to the six Knights on the first team, three players earned second-team honors, five merited third-team recognition while three others were named to the fourth team.

Morris-Brash (51 tackles, team-high 13 TFL for 49 yards, team-high 6 sacks for 37 yards, 4 PBU, 7 QBH, 2 FR for 104 yards, 1 FF), Johnson (team-high 119 tackles, 4 TFL for 19, 1 sack for 12, 4 QBHs, 2 FR, 2 FF) and Barber (44 tackles, 7.5 TFL, 3 sacks for 22 yards, 4 PBU, team-high 12 QBH) paced the UCF defense that led the nation much of the season in red-zone defense. Pauole and Swoboda were members of a stellar UCF offensive line that has the Knights ranked 11th nationally and leading the AAC in total offense, averaging 480.6 yards per game. Additionally, that group has paved the way for UCF to rush for 200 or more yards in nine of its 13 games this season as the Knights currently stand eighth nationally in rushing at 236.1 yards per outing. Ward was a finalist for the Patrick Mannelly Award for the second straight year.

Quarterback John Rhys Plumlee (197 of 312 passing for 2,404 yards, 14 TDs; 145 rushes for 841 yards, 11 TDs), center Matt Lee and receiver Ryan O'Keefe (teamhigh 73 catches for 725 yards, 5 TDs; 23 carries for 222 yards rushing) made the second team.

Running back RJ Harvey (112 carries for 767 yards, 5 TDs; 19 catches for 190 yards), offensive guard Sam Jackson, safety Divaad Wilson (41 tackles, 1 TFL, 3 INTs for 12, 4 PBU, 2 QBHs, 1 FR, 1 FF), kicker Colton Boomer (14 of 15 on field goals) and punt returner Xavier Townsend (9.3 average on 19 returns) all claimed third-team honors. Running back Isaiah Bowser (team-high 194 carries for 760 yards, team-high 14 TDs; 14 receptions for 185 yards), wide receiver Javon Baker (54 catches for 747 yards, 5 TDs) and linebacker Jeremiah Jean-Baptiste (52 tackles, 5 TFL, 4 PBU, 1 sack, 1 QBH, 1 FF) were selected to the fourth team.

APPROACHING MILESTONE

Fifth-year running back Isaiah Bowser heads into the bowl game just one rushing touchdown shy of tying UCF Hall of Famer Latavius Murray for the second most in a single season with 15. Kevin Smith owns the program record with 29 rushing touchdowns during the 2007 season.

Bowser currently owns 14 to tie for the third most in a single season along with Marquette Smith, Brynn Harvey and Storm Johnson. His 14 rushing scores are the most for a Knights running back since 2013 when Johnson accomplished the feat.

COMMITTED TO THE RUN

UCF has rushed for 200 or more yards in nine of its 13 games this season and has accomplished the feat in 10 of its last 14 games dating back to the win over Florida in last year's bowl game.

The Knights are seventh nationally with 236.0 rushing yards per game and their 3,068 total yards rushing this season are also fifth nationally. It marks just the fourth time UCF has eclipsed 3,000 rushing yards in a single season and third time as an FBS program. The Knights rushed for a program record 3,448 yards in 2018, 3,287 in 2007 and 3,017 in 1990 (FCS).

MODEL OF CONSISTENCY

UCF has started the same five players on the offensive line in all 13 games this season. Three of the five have been starting for the past few years, led by offensive guards Sam Jackson and Lokahi Pauole and center Matthew Lee.

The trio welcomed a pair of transfers this season in tackles Tylan Grable (Jacksonville State) and Ryan Swoboda (Virginia). The group quickly gelled during preseason camp and all five have garnered All-AAC honors (third team or better) from at least one publication.

JOHNSON MAKING HIS MARK

Senior linebacker Jason Johnson eclipsed 100 tackles for the season against Navy. He now owns 119 this season to rank 13th nationally. Johnson is one of just seven players in the American Athletic Conference to eclipse 100 tackles this season.

With four more tackles, Johnson would rank among the top 10 in UCF program history for a single season. His 119 tackles are the most in a single season for the Knights since 2012 when Kemal Ishmael tallied 124.

SCORING FIRST

UCF has scored first in seven games this season and the Knights are a perfect 7-0 when scoring first.

WARD NAMED FINALIST FOR MANNELLY AWARD

For the second consecutive year, UCF All-America long snapper Alex Ward was one of three finalists for the 2022 Patrick Mannelly Award. Named after former NFL long snapper Patrick Mannelly, the award benefits Bernie's Book Bank, a non-profit that provides books for underserved communities in the Chicago, Illinois, area.

BREAKOUT GAME FOR BARBER

Defensive tackle Ricky Barber turned in the best game of his collegiate career against Navy, tallying a career-high 13 tackles and was in the backfield causing havoc throughout the day. He topped his previous career best of 10 tackles he recorded at a previous school.

His 13 tackles are tied for the second most by a UCF player in a single game this season, behind Jason Johnson's 15 at East Carolina.

Barber tallied two tackles for loss and a sack against the Midshipmen.

WAR ON I-4

This year's War On I-4 matchup had a little extra excitement, as UCF and USF have met on the field in each of the last 10 years. With the Knights move to the Big 12 Conference next season, the rivalry game will likely not be played as often.

UCF has now won the last six matchups in the series with this year's 46-39 thriller.

The universities are located less than 100 miles apart off of Interstate-4.

The Knights lead the Bulls in the War On I-4 across all sports this season with two UCF volleyball wins, one women's soccer win, one football win and by finishing ahead of South Florida at the American Athletic Cross Country Championship.

UCF's and USF's fan bases have long engaged in a passionate rivalry between the universities divided by 100 miles and the I-4 corridor between Tampa and Orlando. The Green and Gold and the Black and Gold will now compete for yearlong bragging rights in one of the freshest and most energized rivalries in college athletics.





13 STRAIGHT AGAINST FLORIDA TEAMS

With the win against South Florida in the War on I-4, UCF has now won 13 straight games against teams from the state of Florida. That list includes a win over Florida in the Gasparilla Bowl last season and six consecutive victories against South Florida.

CLOSE CALLS

Prior to the loss against Tulane in the AAC Championship Game, UCF's previous five games were decided by seven or fewer points. The Knights started the streak with a four-point win against Cincinnati (25-21), followed by a seven-point road wins against Memphis (35-28) and Tulane (38-31), a three-point loss to Navy (17-14) before earning a seven-point road win at South Florida.

UCF has been within a single possession of taking the lead in the fourth quarter of three of its four losses this season. The Knights lost to Louisville and Navy by a single possession and cut the Tulane lead to three at 31-28 in the AAC Championship Game.

PLUMLEE GARNERS MORE WEEKLY HONORS

Following his performance against Tulane on Nov. 12, quarterback John Rhys Plumlee was named American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Week for the third time this season. He was also tabbed to the Davey O'Brien Great 8 List and named a Manning Award Star of the Week.

Plumlee set the Knights' program record for rushing yards by a quarterback in a single game with 176 on 18 attempts to lift UCF to a 38-31 win at then-No. 17 Tulane. The previous mark of 122 was held by Vic Penn, who accomplished the feat against Middle Tennessee in 1999.

Playing nearly two hours from his hometown of Hattiesburg, Mississippi, Plumlee ignited the Knights' offense early in the game as he raced 47 yards down the field to the three-yard line to set up a Colton Boomer 25-yard field goal on the opening drive of the game. After a quick three-and-out by Tulane's offense, Plumlee took off for a 67-yard touchdown run to give the Knights a 10-0 lead on the longest rush of the season for UCF.

He found the end zone for the second time rushing in the third quarter, scoring on a nine-yard run to give UCF a 31-14 lead.

Plumlee completed 17 passes for 132 yards, connecting with Javon Baker on an eight-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter. His play helped UCF record its first ranked road win since 2013 when the program defeated No. 8 Louisville, 38-35.

WHAT A DRIVE BY BOWSER

As UCF looked to secure the win against Tulane and keep the clock going, the Knights turned to their fifth-year running back Isaiah Bowser. He rushed 12 times for 41 yards on a 16-play, 75-yard drive in the fourth quarter to chew up 8:07 on the clock. Bowser's incredible runs gave UCF a 38-24 lead after he capped the drive with a one-yard touchdown run to give the Knights a 14-point advantage with only 3:32 remaining.

For the fourth time this season, Bowser found the end zone twice to extend his season total to 13 at the time. Bowser's first score gave the Knights a 17-7 lead and his second of the day late in the fourth quarter helped put the game away.

FIRST TOUCHDOWN PASS, FIRST TOUCHDOWN CATCH

In the win against Memphis, UCF perfectly executed one of its special plays as Isaiah Bowser lined up in the wildcat formation and found wide receiver Stephen Martin for a touchdown on a jump pass from the four-yard line. It was Bowser's first career touchdown pass and Martin's first career touchdown grab.

HOME-FIELD ADVANTAGE

UCF's all-time record of 78-24 (.767) ranks in the top 15 in the nation for best win percentage in a current home stadium.

Since 2017, the Knights are 35-4 in home games at FBC Mortgage Stadium.

The Knights finished the 2021 season undefeated at home, marking the seventh time in UCF's FBS era, the ninth overall, and the fourth time in the last five years. Only 22 teams in the nation completed the 2021 regular season undefeated at home.

AMONG THE BEST IN THE COUNTRY

UCF's red zone defense continues to rank among the best in the country at No. 5 nationally, as opponents have scored on 68% of their trips to the red zone, converting on 37 of 54 attempts. The Knights have allowed 24 touchdowns in the red zone in 54 trips for opponents, a 44% rate. UCF has forced at least one red zone stop in 10 of its 13 games this season, headlined by a season-high five red zone stops against Georgia Tech.

FINISHING STRONG

UCF has been at its best in the fourth quarters of games this season, as the Knights have scored 132 points, which is the most they have scored in any quarter this season. Additionally, UCF's defense has only allowed 79 points in the fourth quarter.

DOMINANT DEFENSE

UCF held Cincinnati to 35 rushing yards, the fewest for the Bearcats since a matchup against UConn on Oct. 8, 2016 (2 rushing yards). That mark is also the fewest the Knights have yielded in a conference game since Oct. 1, 2016, versus East Carolina (33 rushing yards).

UCF limited Cincinnati to 30 total yards of offense in the first quarter, the fewest yards the Bearcats have had in the first quarter of a game this season and just the second time Cincinnati has been held scoreless in the opening quarter.

Cincinnati's 159 yards in the first half were the fewest during a regular season game at halftime this season.

NO MORE THAN 21

The Knights have only allowed an opponent to score more than 21 points in a game five times this season. Dating back to last season, UCF has held its opponents to 21 points or fewer in 11 of the last 16 games.

SNAPPING THE STREAK

Prior to the loss against UCF, Cincinnati had won its last 19 games against conference opponents to tie the record set by the Knights from 2017 to 2019. The Bearcats' last loss to an American Athletic Conference team was to Memphis 34-24 on Nov. 29, 2019.

UCF picked up its first ranked win since the 2018 matchup against Cincinnati (6-2, 3-1) and first under second-year head coach Gus Malzahn.

RECEIVING RECOGNITION

Following their standout performances in UCF's 25-21 win over No. 20 Cincinnati, junior defensive end Josh Celiscar was named American Athletic Conference Defensive Player of the Week and running back RJ Harvey earned a spot on the Weekly Honor Roll.

Celiscar led a stellar defensive effort against the Bearcats, tallying five solo stops, including a sack and a tackle for loss. He was all over the field and brought down Cincinnati quarterback Ben Bryant in the end zone for his first career safety to swing the momentum in the game.

Harvey turned in one of the best performances of his collegiate career in one of the biggest games that the redshirt junior has appeared to lead UCF to the victory. Facing the top defense in the conference, Harvey gashed the Bearcats for several big runs. He recorded then-career highs in carries (18), yards (84) and touchdowns (2).

COLTON BOOMER

Freshman kicker Colton Boomer's perfect streak came to end at Memphis, as his attempt from 64 yards after an inadvertent snap missed towards the end of the first half. Boomer opened the season 10 for 10 on field-goal attempts to tie Matt Prater for fourth in UCF history for consecutive field goals made.

The Lake Mary, Florida, native was a perfect four for four on field-goal attempts and was one for one on PATs in the win against Georgia Tech. His four field goals in a single game matched the UCF program record and were the most in a game since 2016.

Boomer is the first Knights freshman to accomplish the feat since Matt Prater in 2002.

Boomer is now 14 of 15 on the year, which ranks eighth nationally in field-goal percentage (.933) and leads the American.

JOHNSON AMONG NATION'S ELITE

Senior linebacker Jason Johnson tallied a season high 15 tackles at East Carolina to eclipse 300 for his career. He currently ranks 10th among active FBS players with 354 career tackles.

MALZAHN TABBED TO PAUL "BEAR" BRYANT AWARD WATCH LIST

UCF head coach Gus Malzahn is one of 25 active football coaches named to the American Heart Association's 2022 Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year Award watch list. The award is given each January to a college football coach for contributions that make the sport better for athletes and fans alike by demonstrating grit, integrity and a winning approach to coaching and life, both on and off the field. Malzahn was the recipient of the award in 2013 while at Auburn.

WARD NAMED SEMIFINALIST FOR WILLIAM V. CAMPBELL TROPHY

UCF All-America long snapper Alex Ward was named a semifinalist for the 2022 William V. Campbell Trophy®, which is college football's premier scholar-athlete award. The impressive list of candidates boasts an impressive 3.62 average GPA, with more than half of the semifinalists having already earned their bachelor's degrees.

Celebrating its 33rd year, the Campbell Trophy® recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.

Ward graduated in December 2021 with a degree in mechanical engineering and is currently pursuing a second degree in integrated business from the College of Business Administration. He was named to the Order of Pegasus last spring, earning the most prestigious honor for any UCF student. Ward also was a dean's list selection for the spring 2022 semester.

A fifth-year player from Fort Walton Beach, Florida, Ward was named a Patrick Mannelly Award (presented annually to the top long snapper in college football) finalists in both 2021 and 2022.

Ward earned third-team All-America honors in 2021 and second team honors from Phil Steele in 2022 and also was selected first-team All-American Athletic Conference by Steele in both seasons as well.

LUCKY NUMBER THREE

UCF's 70 points scored in the win over Temple are the third most in program history and also the third most total points by an FBS team in a game this season. The Knights scored 73 points versus Austin Peay on Oct. 28, 2017, to set the program record and also tallied 71 points in a win over Gardner-Webb in 1992.

Ohio State's 77 points against Toledo are the most by an FBS team this season, while Utah and Western Kentucky have scored 73 points in a game this year.

OFFENSIVE OUTBURST

UCF's 737 yards of total offense against Temple mark the first time the Knights have surpassed 700 total yards in a game since Memphis on Oct. 17, 2020. The 737 yards are the second-highest mark in the FBS this season, only behind Ohio State's 763 total yards against Toledo.

PLUMLEE GARNERS AAC, DAVEY O'BRIEN GREAT 8 AND MANNING AWARD HONORS Following one of the best performances in program history, UCF quarterback John Rhys Plumlee was named American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Week, Davey O'Brien Great 8 List and a Manning Award Star of the Week on Oct. 17.

Plumlee tied the program record with seven total touchdowns in the 70-13 win over Temple with four passing and three rushing. The Hattiesburg, Mississippi, native tied the mark set by former UCF standouts Darin Slack in 1987 and Daunte Culpepper in 1998. His seven touchdowns are the most by any player in the American Athletic Conference this season.He threw for a career-high 373 yards on 18-for-22 passing and he rushed for 37 yards on seven attempts. Plumlee ignited the scoring for UCF in the contest, scoring from nine yards out to cap a 10-play, 74-yard drive in the first quarter to give the Knights a 7-3 lead.





PLUMLEE GARNERS AAC, DAVEY O'BRIEN GREAT 8 AND MANNING AWARD HONORS (CONT.)

After Temple scored to take a 10-7 advantage, Plumlee found the end zone for the second time on the day with a one-yard rush to help UCF regain the lead, 14-10. Plumlee's third rushing touchdown with five seconds remaining in the first half pushed the Knights' lead to 22 heading into halftime.

Plumlee closed out his day by throwing a touchdown pass on each of his last three throws with an 11-yard strike to O'Keefe, 68-yard pass to O'Keefe and 64-yard touchdown to Hudson. In the third quarter, he was five for five and threw for 198 yards with three touchdowns.

#UCFinSPACE GAME

The #UCFinSpace game has been played annually since the 2017 season and the Knights are 6-0 all-time in space games with the win against Temple on Oct. 13. The game recognizes the University of Central Florida's roots, founded as Florida Technological University in 1963 with the mission of providing personnel to support the growing U.S. space program at the Kennedy Space Center and Cape Canaveral Air Force Station. As the academic scope expanded beyond its original focus on engineering and technology, the school was renamed the University of Central Florida in 1978.

BAKER'S BREAKOUT

Wide receiver Javon Baker enjoyed a breakout game in the win over SMU, as the junior reeled in six passes for a career-high 138 receiving yards. That total ranks among the top receiving performances by a player in the American Athletic Conference.

100-YARD RECEIVING DUO

Javon Baker's 138 receiving yards and Ryan O'Keefe's 117 receiving yards versus SMU marked the first time a pair of Knights receivers surpassed 100 yards in the same game since Marlon Williams and Jaylon Robinson accomplished the feat against Temple on Nov. 13, 2020.

UCF is one of just four AAC schools this season to have more than one 100-yard receiver in a game, joining Cincinnati, SMU and Tulsa.

HALFTIME ADJUSTMENTS

UCF's halftime adjustments in the SMU game were felt almost immediately in the second half, as the Knights scored 31 points and limited SMU to just six. UCF's 31 second-half points were the most in a second half since Oct. 26, 2019, against Temple when the Knights scored 35 points in the second half.

After gaining 145 offensive yards in the first half, UCF had 204 in the third quarter alone and 339 total yards in the second half.

HOME SWEET HOME

UCF was one of only seven FBS teams to play five of its first six 2022 games in their home stadium. The Knights played South Carolina State and Louisville at home, went on the road to play FAU, followed by three straight home games versus Georgia Tech, SMU and Temple.

The others to play five of the first six at home are Auburn (only road game was at Georgia after five at home), Florida (at Tennessee), Ohio State (at Michigan State after five at home), Pittsburgh (at Western Michigan), Syracuse (at Connecticut) and UCLA (at Colorado).

This is only the fifth time—and first since 1993—that UCF played five of its first six at home. The Knights competed at the FCS level in '93 when East Carolina was the lone road game and UCF won all five at home. UCF also played five of the first six at home in 1985, 1987 and 1988 while competing at the NCAA Division II level.

BULLARD'S SPECIAL

Junior safety Quadric Bullard logged his second blocked punt return for a touchdown this season in the second quarter of the win against Georgia Tech. After Jarvis Ware tallied the block, Bullard scooped up the football and raced 29 yards for the touchdown.

Credited statistically as a punt return touchdown, Bullard is the one of just two players in the country with two punt returns for a touchdown.

In the season opener, he recorded the first blocked punt for UCF since Sept. 7, 2019, with his block in the fourth quarter against South Carolina State. He then recovered the punt in the end zone for the first punt returned for a touchdown for UCF since Nov. 12, 2016, against Cincinnati. It was Bullard's first career touchdown.

PLUMLEE TABBED AAC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Following a stellar performance in the 40-14 win at Florida Atlantic, UCF quarterback John Rhys Plumlee was named American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Week, the conference announced Sept. 19.

Plumlee helped lead the Knights to a bounce back win in Boca Raton, as he threw for a career-high 339 yards and completed a career-best 25 passes. He completed nearly 70% of his passes and threw for a touchdown. He gashed the Owls' defense with 20 rushing attempts for 121 yards and two rushing touchdowns.

With Plumlee leading the charge, UCF rushed for 314 yards and passed for 339 yards to surpass 600 yards of total offense for the second time this season.

In addition to earning the AAC honors, Plumlee was one of eight players named to the Davey O'Brien Great 8 List, which recognizes the National Quarterback of the Week following the Florida Atlantic game.

DEFENSE DOMINATES

After allowing 14 points in the first quarter at Florida Atlantic, the UCF defense dominated for the remainder of the game and held the Owls scoreless for the final three quarters. The Knights held FAU to zero yards of offense in the third quarter and just 18 yards in the fourth quarter.

FOUR DIFFERENT DAYS OF THE WEEK

UCF has played games this season on four different days of the week. The Knights opened the season against South Carolina State on a Thursday and also played Temple on a Thursday, played Louisville on a Friday, Florida Atlantic, Georgia Tech, East Carolina, Memphis, Tulane and Navy on Saturdays and SMU on a Wednesday.

The Knights are the one of just four FBS teams to play a game on four different days of the week this season, joining Central Michigan, Eastern Michigan and Toledo.

FEELING SPECIAL

UCF blocked a field goal attempt for the first time this season in the win at Florida Atlantic Sept. 17. Following a stellar goal-line stop from the defense, redshirt junior defensive tackle Keenan Hester got a a great push and leaped into the air to get his hand on a 19-yard field-goal attempt from the Owls.

It was UCF's first field-goal block since Sept. 19, 2020, at Georgia Tech when Noah Hancock blocked a field goal in the second quarter.

It was the second big play on special teams for the Knights this season, after Quadric Bullard blocked a punt and returned it for a touchdown in the season opener against South Carolina State.





HOLLER'S CAREER DAY

Alec Holler turned in a career day against Florida Atlantic, as the tight end reeled in three catches for a career-high 115 yards. Holler nearly doubled his career receiving yards in the contest, as he entered the game with 192 yards.

Holler caught a 64-yard pass from John Rhys Plumlee in the second quarter, which is a career long and was the longest passing play of the season for UCF at the time.

FIRST OF HIS CAREER

Running back RJ Harvey recorded his first career rushing touchdown with a three-yard run in the third quarter at Florida Atlantic. Defensive tackle Lee Hunter notched the first sack of his career in the contest, taking down the Owls' quarterback for a loss of seven yards in the third.

COLLEGIATE DEBUTS

Freshman placekicker Colton Boomer and punter Mitch McCarthy both made their collegiate debuts against Florida Atlantic. Boomer drilled a 41-yard field goal on the first attempt of his career in the second quarter.

McCarthy's first career punt went for 46 yards with only a three-yard return. It was the only time UCF punted on the day.

EVERYONE'S WATCHING

The UCF-Louisville game on Sept. 9 was the most viewed ESPN2 Friday game since 2013 with more than 1.8 million viewers. The mark was also the most watched regular season game on ESPN2 since 2017 at the time it occurred.

QUITE THE DEBUT FOR PLUMLEE

Making his debut in a UCF uniform against South Carolina State, quarterback John Rhys Plumlee wowed Knights fans with a stellar performance as he finished the night 20 of 31 passing for 308 yards and four touchdowns. He was also a factor with his legs, accounting for 100 yards rushing on 16 attempts with another score to account for five of UCF's seven TDs in the season-opening 56-10 win against South Carolina State.

Playing quarterback for the first time since 2020, Plumlee quickly acclimated to the position and led a Knights offense that piled up 605 total yards, the most by an AAC team in week one or week 0.

It was Plumlee's first game with both a rushing and passing TD in his career. Additionally, he tallied a career high with four passing TDs.

FIRST CATCH, FIRST TOUCHDOWN

Redshirt senior tight end Zach Marsh Wojan recorded his first career catch in the season opener against South Carolina State, reeling in a 21-yard pass from Plumlee for his first career touchdown.

The Vacaville, California, native started three consecutive games with the team coming out in a two-tight end set against Louisville, Florida Atlantic and Georgia Tech.

SENIOR BOWL WATCH LIST

A half-dozen UCF football standouts—running back Isaiah Bowser, tight end Kemore Gamble, offensive tackle Tylan Grable, quarterback John Rhys Plumlee and safety Divaad Wilson—were named to the watch list for the 2023 Reese's Senior Bowl all-star game (Feb. 4, 2023, in Mobile, Alabama).

LEADING THE CHARGE

Running back Isaiah Bowser, defensive lineman Josh Celiscar, offensive lineman Sam Jackson were selected captains of the 2022 UCF football squad by vote of their teammates. Jackson was also a captain during the 2021 season as well.

MALZAHNS CONTRIBUTE TO UCF

UCF head football coach Gus Malzahn and his wife Kristi have made a \$250,000 gift commitment to McNamara Cove which is part of "The Gateway" football campus project made possible by Sharon and Marc Hagle (https://ucfknights.com/news/2022/6/28/football-sharon-and-marc-hagle-commit-more-than-5-million-to-ucf-athletics.aspx).

The commitment marks a major step forward in creating momentum for UCF's Mission XII initiative (www.missionXII.com) as the Knights look toward their official transition to the Big 12 Conference July 1, 2023.

"We are excited about the future for UCF," said Kristi and Gus Malzahn. "We love Orlando, This Place, our amazing fans and our players. McNamara Cove, among other projects and initiatives for UCF Athletics, is a game-changer in the lives of our student-athletes. Just as we always challenge our players, our goal is to use our influence in a positive way and hopefully this gift does that and helps us compete for championships moving forward in the Big 12."

According to UCF vice president and director of athletics Terry Mohajir, "We are grateful that Kristi and Gus made a commitment to help fund our ongoing efforts to further develop the Kenneth G. Dixon Athletics Village, specifically McNamara Cove. We believe this gift will allow us to better serve our student-athletes and the UCF community. We hope their leadership inspires others."

The future vision of the UCF football campus was first presented to UCF Board of Trustees in August 2021, including significant proposed new elements that will enhance the Knights' ability to compete for football championships. The intent is to create a dedicated football campus that will consolidate Knights' facilities in the areas of housing, nutrition, sports medicine and recovery, sports performance, academics and career services.

McNamara Cove will provide UCF student-athletes a place for recovery and recreation each day. It will also deliver one of the most unique tailgating experiences in college football and host many team, alumni and community events throughout the year.

BURNETT, MURRAY HEADLINE 2022 UCF ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME CLASS

Two former UCF football greats—Joe Burnett and Latavius Murray--headlined the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame class for 2022.

That duo was joined by fellow inductees Mackenzie Audas (softball), Linda Gooch (cheer coach), and Krystina Sarff (rowing).

That quintet was officially inducted into the Hall of Fame on Sept. 23 and honored on the field at halftime of the UCF-Georgia Tech football game the following day at FBC Mortgage Stadium.

The UCF Athletics Hall of Fame since 1998 has been inducting former Knight players and coaches and others connected to the UCF program.

Here are details on Burnett and Murray:

Joe Burnett, Football, 2005-2008

- --record-setting cornerback and return specialist for Knights
- --named first-team All-American as senior in 2008 by ESPN.com and Sports Illustrated, as only player in country to rank in NCAA top 20 in both punt and kickoff returns (he led Conference USA in both categories); a second-team pick by Walter Camp Foundation; named Conference USA Special Teams Player of Year in 2008
- --an eight-time first-team all-Conference USA selection (four as punt returner, three as defensive back, one as kickoff returner)
- --named to Freshman All-America teams in 2005 by Football Writers Association of America (FWAA), Rivals.com, CollegeFootballNews.com and The Sporting News
- --helped UCF to its first two bowl berths (2005 Hawaii, 2007 Liberty) and school's first conference championship in 2007
- --holds UCF record with 16 career interceptions; set UCF and Conference USA career marks for punt return yards with 1,304; set UCF records for most punt returns (96) and tied the record for most punt return touchdowns with three --averaged 13.6 average yards per punt return and 28.7 yards per kick return, along with two touchdowns

UCF FOOTBALL ON RADIO

Longtime UCF radio play-by-play veteran Marc Daniels is in his 28th season in that role in 2022. He's also UCF's director of broadcasting. Analyst Gary Parris (a former Florida State player) is in his 27th season in that position. They are joined by Scott Adams (pre-game host and sideline reporter—in his 21st season), Frank Lovre (engineer, in his 31st season) and Chris Vazquez (producer, in his fifth season).

A new addition for 2022 is former UCF quarterback McKenzie Milton. He is part of the pre-game show looking at the week's opponent and "KZ's Keys to the Game" segment. He appears on the "Orlando Health Jewett Orthopedic Institute Tailgate Show" before each game this season. Milton also served as a sideline analyst for selected home games this season.

Pre-game coverage begins two hours before kickoff and features a preview of the game with interviews from UCF players and coaches--including coach Gus Malzahn and athletics director Terry Mohajir. All games and radio shows can be heard on 96.9FM/740AM--and UCF fans can access all broadcasts from anywhere with the iHeart app (search for 96.9 The Game).

UCF ADDS SPANISH RADIO BROADCAST FOR HOME FOOTBALL GAMES

UCF home football games for the first time in 2022 will feature a Spanish radio broadcast, presented by Florida Blue and accessible through a link from the main athletics webpage, UCFKnights.com.

There are more than 62 million Hispanics in the United States, and an estimated 41.7 million U.S. residents, or 13.5% of the population, speak Spanish at home.

The U.S. Department of Education officially designated UCF as a Hispanic Serving Institution in 2019, paving the way for the university to secure additional federal funding to improve the educational experience of Hispanic and low-income students. To become a qualifying institution, Hispanic enrollment must be at least 25% of full-time-equivalent undergraduate students. UCF's Hispanic enrollment was 28% for Fall 2021.

UCF has invested in numerous pathways that serve Hispanic students and position them to succeed, including peer mentoring programs, leadership development and a variety of partnerships including one with Google to assist students with developing their digital skills for career readiness. This summer, UCF joined the Alliance of Hispanic Serving Research Universities, which aims to double the number of Hispanic doctoral students and increase the number of Hispanic faculty by 20%. Last year, UCF earned the prestigious Seal of Excelencia from Excelencia in Education, a reflection of the university's commitment to accelerating Hispanic student success, and Hispanic Outlook magazine ranked UCF among the top schools for awarding bachelor's and master's degrees to Hispanic students.

Carlos Bohorquez, who handles play by play, has been the Spanish radio playby-play voice for the NFL Tampa Bay Buccaneers since 2018. Bohorquez has additional experience calling soccer matches in his native Venezuela and here in the United States. He also has worked on numerous shows on Univision and currently serves as the producer for Todo Tampa Bay.

Sergio Ruiz Torres, the color analyst, is the Spanish play-by-play voice of MLS Orlando City SC. Ruiz is in his eighth season at the helm on Acción 97.9FM/810AM. A former sports anchor for Univisión Orlando, the native of Venezuela also serves as a producer and reporter for Telemundo Orlando and previously broadcast World Cup qualifying, Copa America and Copa Libertadores matches.

"We are excited to add Spanish broadcasts for all UCF football home games this season," says Marc Daniels, UCF director of broadcasting and radio play-by-play voice of the Knights. "As Knight Nation continues to grow across the area and beyond, we feel this allows us to serve the demand of that growing fan base. We are thrilled to add Carlos and Sergio to our broadcast team of talent. They bring tremendous experience and passion and look forward to the new season."

The Spanish broadcast streams will be available for all seven UCF home games at FBC Mortgage Stadium.

UCF SELLS OUT SEASON TICKET ALLOTMENT AGAIN IN 2022

UCF sold out its allotment of home football season tickets in 2022 for the third time in four years (also in 2019 and 2021). Meanwhile, the Knights are coming off a handful of their highest season attendance averages in school history:

- --Both in 2007 (the year FBC Mortgage Stadium opened—then known as Bright House Networks Stadium) and again in 2018 (when UCF finished 8-0 at home) the Knights averaged a season-record 44,018 spectators for each game in a facility that officially seats 44,206.
- --In 2019 UCF again was unbeaten at home (at 6-0) while averaging 43,788 fans per game (third-highest season average).
- --Then in Gus Malzahn's first season at UCF in 2021, the Knights did not lose any of their seven home games while averaging 40,427 fans per contest (fifth-highest mark all-time).
- --UCF's first two home games in 2022 averaged 44,111, just less than 100 below capacity.
- --The single-game high-water mark in 2018 came when 47,795 fans viewed UCF's victory over 19th-ranked Cincinnati on a weekend when ESPN Game Day came to UCF for the first time. That number is the second-highest single-game figure for Spectrum Stadium (48,453 fans watched the 2009 home game against Miami).

Since it opened in 2007 the Knights' home stadium has added a premium chair-back seating and club area, the Carl Black and Gold Cabana, on the east side of the field and a similar Stadium Club on the west side, also including chair-back seats and premium amenities. The Carl Black and Gold Cabana area expanded in 2019 with the addition of approximately 900 more gold chair-back seats. Other major premium additions were field cabanas in the south end zone in 2017 and then in the north end zone in 2018—and loge cabanas on the south side in 2018 and north side for 2019.

Gus Malzahn's first two seasons as UCF head football coach in 2021 and 2022 have featured overall 9-4 marks, consecutive postseason bowl invitations (10th and 11th straight for teams coached by Malzahn and sixth and seventh straight for UCF) and a 2022 conference title game qualification as his Knight teams have injected themselves onto the list of elite collegiate programs.

His 2022 squad produced significant regular-season victories over ranked Cincinnati and Tulane squads—followed by an appearance in the American Athletic Conference Championship Game for the first time since 2018. In 2021 Malzahn's unit finished with six wins in the Knights' final seven games, a 29-17 Gasparilla Bowl triumph over Florida, a perfect 7-0 home record—and an eye-opening response to a parade of injuries to key personnel.

The Knights in 2022 excelled on both sides of the line of scrimmage. UCF stands among the national leaders on offense (11th in total offense at 480.6 yards per game and eighth in rushing at 236.1 yards per contest) while also leading the nation in red-zone defense much of the season (currently fifth at .685) and allowing only 23.2 points per game. Malzahn's team also ranks seventh in first downs, 12th in fumbles recovered (12) to pace the league, 13th in fourth-down conversions (.654) to lead the AAC, 16th in third-down conversions (.472), 26th in scoring (34.4) and 27th in fewest penalties per game

UCF in 2022 led the AAC in total offense and ranked second in rushing. The improved Knight attack jumped 55 NCAA ranking slots in total offense, 20 in rushing, 36 in passing and 11 in scoring. The UCF defense improved its season averages in rush defense and scoring defense.

The Knights notched regular-season triumphs over two-time defending AAC champion Cincinnati by coming from behind twice in the final period—and recorded an impressive road win over regular-season AAC champion Tulane while running for 336 rushing yards. Two of UCF's losses (Louisville and Navy) came by a combined nine points—while each of the final three Knight regular-season road games (Memphis, No. 17 Tulane, South Florida) ended in a seven-

UCF in 2022 had 16 All-AAC first- or second-team selections: offensive guards Sam Jackson and Lokahi Pauole, center Matt Lee, offensive tackle Ryan Swoboda, defensive linemen Ricky Barber and Tre'mon Morris-Brash, linebacker Jason Johnson, cornerback Davonte Brown and long snapper Alex Ward as first-team picks to go with secondteamers Ryan O'Keefe and Javon Baker at wide receiver, Isaiah Bowser and RJ Harvey at running back, John Rhys Plumlee at quarterback plus defensive backs Justin Hodges and Divaad Wilson. In addition Ward for the second straight year was named one of three finalists for the Patrick Mannelly Award as well as a second-team All-American. Both Barber and Brown were named honorable mention All-America, and Brown was named the AAC Cornerback of the Year by Pro Football Network.

Malzahn's Knights began the season by recording the largest comeback victory in UCF history in a 36-31 weather-delayed triumph over Boise State. His first team in Orlando prospered by pulling out three other wins by four-point margins and playing six games overall decided by a touchdown or less—with two UCF defeats coming by a combined 11 points.

The Knights had to survive the early-season loss of their starting

quarterback (Dillon Gabriel-he missed the last 10 games) as well as lengthy sideline stints for their best defensive player (tackle Kalia Davis—he missed the last eight games), their top running back (Isaiah Bowser—he missed five games) and their most dangerous receiver (Jaylon Robinson—he missed six games). They finished the campaign by running for 288 yards in the bowl triumph over Florida in front of 63,669 fans in Tampa.

One of three finalists for the Steve Spurrier Award presented by the Football Writers Association of America to the best head coach in his first year at a school, Malzahn saw long snapper Alex Ward win third-team All-America honors from Phil Steele, while defensive end Big Kat Bryant was a first-team All-American Athletic Conference pick by three different selectors. Pro Football Network named Bryant the AAC Newcomer of the Year and the league's Defensive Lineman of the Year.

Eight other UCF players received at least one first- or second-team All-AAC honor—linebacker Tatum Bethune, receivers Ryan O'Keefe and Brandon Johnson, offensive linemen Lokahi Pauole, Cole Schneider and Marcus Tatum, and defensive backs Quadric

Bullard and Divaad Wilson.

UCF in 2021 ranked seventh nationally in team pass efficiency defense (after ranking 104th in that NCAA statistical category the previous year), while also showing dramatic improvement in several other statistical categories:

-An upgrade of 86 slots in passing yards allowed compared to 2020,

while permitting 89.1 fewer passing yards in 2021
--An improvement of 70 slots in total defense, while allowing 122.5 fewer yards per game compared to the previous season

Malzahn and his staff then capped their first season by building the highest-rated recruiting class in UCF history (rated 38th overall by 247Sports, including both high school players and transfers).

Malzahn, who led Auburn to the Bowl Championship Series National Championship Game following the 2013 season in the first of eight straight years his Tigers qualified for bowl games, was named the ninth head football coach at UCF on Feb. 15, 2021. He begins his second season with the Knights in 2022.

In eight years as head football coach at Auburn, Malzahn also led the Tigers to a Southeastern Conference Championship, two SEC West Division titles and six New Year's Day bowl selections to go with those eight postseason appearances.

Malzahn, now 95-46 (.679) in 11 seasons overall as a head coach, has helped teams to seven conference championship game appearances in his 16 seasons as a collegiate coach, including winning a pair of SEC Championships at Auburn (2010, 2013) and a Sun Belt Championship at Arkansas State in 2012. In the final Associated Press rankings his Auburn teams finished second (2013), 10th (2017), 22nd (2014) and 24th (2016).

The 2013 Bear Bryant, Bobby Bowden, Eddie Robinson, Home Depot, Sporting News, SB Nation, Liberty Mutual and Associated Press National Coach of the Year, Malzahn earned SEC Coach-of-the-Year National Coach of the Year, Maizann earned SEC Coach-of-the-Year honors that season after guiding Auburn to the biggest turnaround in SEC history. He led the Tigers to a 12-2 record and one of the most memorable seasons in school history in 2013, with historic wins over Georgia and top-ranked Alabama and a record-setting SEC Championship Game win over fifth-ranked Missouri. He became just the third coach in SEC history to win an SEC title in his first year at a school, joining LSU's Bernie Moore in 1935 and Ole Miss' John Vaught







in 1947.

The 34-28 victory over top-rated Alabama in 2013 came on a memorable 100-yard return of a Tide missed field goal on the final play of the game. Malzahn's Tiger squads also defeated seventh-ranked Texas A&M in 2013, seventh-rated Ole Miss in 2014, second-ranked Georgia and top-rated Alabama in 2017 and fifth-ranked Alabama in 2019.

After his eight seasons at Auburn, Malzahn qualified as the second-longest tenured head coach at one school in the SEC. He is one of only 10 active FBS head coaches to take a team to a national championship game. During his time with the Tigers, Auburn was one of only three SEC schools to play in multiple SEC Championships games and play for a national championship.

Malzahn has produced 15 1,000-yard rushers in 16 seasons as a college coach, including Heisman Trophy finalist Tre Mason (1,816) and Nick Marshall (1,068) in 2013 and Cameron-Artis Payne (1,608) in 2014. Kamryn Pettway ran for 1,123 yards in 2016 (despite missing significant time with injuries) and Kerryon Johnson led the SEC with 1,320 yards in 2017.

On three occasions, Malzahn has had two 1,000-yard rushers in the same season: 2013 and 2010 (both Auburn) and 2006 (Arkansas). Malzahn has also coached five 1,000-yard receivers and three 3,000- yard passers. His 2007 Tulsa team had three 1,000-yard receivers.

During Malzahn's eight years at Auburn, the Tigers had the top rushing offense in the SEC, averaging 228.6 yards per game. In 2013, Auburn led the nation in rushing at 328.3 yards per game, the first SEC team to do so. Three of the top six team rushing totals in SEC history (2010, 2013, 2016) came under Malzahn's leadership. Auburn became just the second team in SEC history to gain more than 7,000 yards of total offense in a season in 2013, finishing the year with 7,018 yards (also Texas A&M in 2012).

The Tigers set a school record with 48 rushing TDs in 2013 and set a school record against SEC opponents with 677 yards of total offense versus Missouri in the 2013 SEC Championship Game. The Tigers set SEC Championship Game team records with 26 rushing first downs, 74 rushing attempts, 545 rushing yards and seven rushing TDs

Mason, the 2013 SEC Player of the Year, ranked third in the nation with 23 TDs, was fifth nationally with 1,816 yards rushing, sixth with 10.7 points per game, sixth with 169.57 all-purpose yards per game and eighth with 129.7 rushing yards per game. He set Auburn single-season records for rushing yards and all-purpose yards (2,374) and was second with 317 rushing attempts. His 46 rushing attempts and 304 rushing yards versus fifth-rated Missouri set SEC Championship Game records and fell three yards shy of the Auburn record.

In Malzahn's eight seasons at Auburn 32 players were selected in the National Football League Draft, highlighted by four first-round picks--including Derrick Brown (No. 7) and Noah Igbinoghene (No. 30) in 2020. Malzahn's other

first-round picks were Greg Robinson (No. 2 overall) and Dee Ford (No. 23) in 2014. In the last two drafts combined (2020 and 2021), 12 Auburn players were drafted, most for the Tigers in a two-year span in the common draft era.

Malzahn coached 14 All-Americans as head coach at Auburn, including consensus selections center Reese Dismukes (2014) and defensive lineman Derrick Brown (2019). Brown won the Lott IMPACT Trophy in 2019, while Dismukes was named the 2014 Rimington Award winner as the nation's top center.

The Tigers faced the nation's most difficult schedule collectively during Malzahn's eight years at Auburn, facing 38 ranked opponents, including 21 in the top 10. Auburn was the nation's only program in 2016 to face both the No. 1- and No. 2-ranked programs and in 2017 it faced three of the four College Football Playoff semifinalists a total of four times, earning two wins.

Malzahn and his coaching proved highly successful on the recruiting trail, recording five consecutive top-10 nationally ranked recruiting classes, a first in Auburn history. Six of his eight recruiting classes rated in the top 11 nationally.

Malzahn, who won the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 2010 while helping the Tigers to the national title, returned to Auburn after serving as the head coach at Arkansas State in 2012 when he led the program to a 9-3 regular-season mark and the Sun Belt Conference title. In that role he worked hand in hand with current UCF vice president and director of athletics Terry Mohajir who was named the Red Wolves' vice chancellor and director of athletics in the middle of that 2012 season and remained in that role until coming to UCF in early 2021.

As offensive coordinator, Malzahn made an immediate impact during his tenure at Auburn, highlighted by a record-setting offense in 2010 when the Tigers finished 14-0 and claimed the school's first national title since 1957. Malzahn's arrival in 2009 and style of offense marked a drastic turnaround from the 2008 season when Auburn struggled offensively. In a two-year period, the Tigers improved from a tie for 110th to seventh in the nation in scoring offense (from 17.3 to 41.2) and from 104th to seventh in total offense.

The 2010 Auburn offense set nine school records while leading the SEC and finishing in the top 10 nationally in six statistical categories. Malzahn coached Heisman Trophy winner Cam Newton, who had one of the best single-season performances at the position in college football history. Newton threw for 2,908 yards and 30 TDs, while rushing for 1,586 yards and 20 TDs. Newton, the numberone overall selection in the 2011 NFL Draft, also won the Davey O'Brien, Manning and Maxwell awards.

During two seasons (2007-08) as assistant head coach and co-offensive coordinator at Tulsa, Malzahn's offenses were among the nation's finest, ranking first nationally in total offense. Tulsa's offense in 2007 established nine team and 12 individual school records. The 2008 Tulsa offense averaged 569.9 yards per game and was second

MALZAHN **AT HOME**

Malzahn now holds a record of 58-13 (.816) at home as a collegiate head coach. He was 5-1 in 2012 at Arkansas State, at Auburn went 8-0 in 2013, 6-1 in 2014, 3-4 in 2015, 6-2 in 2016, 7-0 in 2017, 5-2 in 2018, 6-1 in 2019 and 4-1 in 2020, finished 2021 with UCF 7-0 and was 5-2 this year. He started his tenure at Auburn with 13 consecutive home victories.



NATIONAL **COACH OF THE YEAR**

Gus Malzahn earned multiple national coach of the year awards in 2013, including the Eddie Robinson Award, the Bobby Bowden Award, and the Bear Bryant Award, as well as national coach of the year honors from Home Depot, the Associated Press, Liberty Mutual, Sporting News, SB Nation, and USSA Amos Alonzo Stagg.

nationally, averaging 47.2 points per games. Malzahn in 2006 spent one season at Arkansas as offensive coordinator, coaching Heisman Trophy runner-up Darren McFadden and helping the SEC West champion Razorbacks finish fourth nationally in rushing.

Malzahn's coaching career began in his home state of Arkansas at the high school level. In 14 seasons as a high school head coach, Malzahn led seven teams to the state championship game and won three titles. In July 2013, he was inducted into the Arkansas High School Sports Hall of Fame. After one year as defensive coordinator in 1991 he spent four years (1992-95) as head coach at Hughes (Arkansas) High School, five years in 1996-2000 as head coach at Shiloh (Arkansas) High School and five years (2001-05) as head coach at Springdale (Arkansas) High School.

Born in Irving, Texas, Malzahn graduated from high school in Fort Smith, Arkansas, and played football at Arkansas (wide receiver in 1984-85) and Henderson State (receiver and punter in 1988-89), earning his bachelor's degree from Henderson State in 1990. As a player he helped the Razorbacks to the 1984 Liberty Bowl and the 1985 Holiday Bowl (a win over Arizona State).

Malzahn and his wife Kristi (Otwell) are parents of two daughters, Kylie (Collin) Peek and Kenzie (Charl) Stander.

TIGHT ENDS/SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR | SECOND SEASON

Brian Blackmon's second season as UCF's tight end coach and special teams coordinator in 2022 was highlighted by the selection of long snapper Alex Ward as a Patrick Mannelly Award finalist for the second consecutive season—and the emergence of rookie placekicker Colton Boomer, Australian punter Mitch McCarthy and rookie punt returner Xavier Townsend. Ward also earned second-team All-America honors from Phil Steele

In addition, veteran tight end Alec Holler excelled at the tight end slot, finishing with 20 receptions for 258 yards and doing yeoman's work as a blocker. His lone touchdown reception in 2022 was the game-winner with 20 seconds left as the Knights came from behind

to defeat South Florida in the regular-season finale.

Boomer took over the top field-goal kicking role early in 2022 and ended up connecting on 14 of his 15 attempts. He led the American Athletic Conference in field-goal percentage (eighth nationally at .933) and ranked fourth in the conference at field goals per game (1.27). Pro Football Focus and Phil Steele named him a third-team All-AAC pick.

Meanwhile, McCarthy claimed the number-one punting job a few weeks into the 2022 season and finished with a 42.9-yard average.

In the return game in 2022, freshman Townsend finished 18th nationally (third in the AAC) in punt returns at 9.3 yards each. He earned third-team All-AAC honors as a punt returner from Phil Steele. The Knights also blocked three punts and returned two of those for scores.

Blackmon's initial season at UCF saw Ward win third-team All-America honors (Phil Steele) and the emergence of Holler, a former Knights walk-on.

One of three finalists for the Mannelly Award as the top long snapper in college football in both 2021 and 2022, Ward also was a first-team All-AAC pick by Phil Steele in 2021.

Holler moved into the 2021 starting lineup at midseason and caught 19 passes overall for 192 yards, including TD receptions versus Temple (two) and Boise State. Those 19 receptions marked the most by a UCF tight end since Michael Colubiale's 21 in 2018.

On the special teams side in 2021, punter Andrew Osteen (he averaged 41.1 yards per kick) had 30 of his 71 attempts end with fair catches and another 18 downed inside the 20—while Daniel Obarski produced touchbacks on 38 of 75 kickoffs.

Blackmon, a former member of Gus Malzahn's Auburn football staff and one of the most successful and respected high school coaches in the state of Alabama, rejoined Malzahn at UCF on Feb. 21, 2021. He is in his second year on the Knights' staff in 2022.

Blackmon in 2020 concluded his third season on the Troy football staff. He added the role of special teams coordinator prior to the 2019 season after coaching Troy's tight ends and S-backs in 2018. Blackmon also coached the Trojan running backs in 2019 and then in 2020 worked exclusively with special teams. He joined the Troy staff following one season as an offensive analyst under Malzahn at Auburn after a 21-year career at Opelika (Alabama) High School.

In 2020, Troy finished 19th in punt-return defense (2.91 yards each), led the Sun Belt Conference (ranking 28th nationally) in net punting at 40.63 and blocked three kicks. Punter Jack Martin was a first-team All-Sun Belt pick as he led the country with his 45.8 net punting average—while his 46.1 per-punt average was sixth nationally. Martin allowed just four returns on his punts for a combined seven yards, while having no touchbacks and 52% fair catches.

In one season coaching the running backs in 2019 Blackmon was dealt one of the most difficult hands in the country as Troy lost Sun Belt Preseason Offensive Player of the Year B.J. Smith and two other running backs in week two to injury. He mentored Smith's replacement, DK Billingsley, toward a season where he rushed for 901 yards and 10 TDs.

Troy was once again one of the top special teams units in the country in 2019, ranking 17th in opponent kickoff return yards while limiting returns to just a 17.85-yard average. The Trojans finished the season ranked number one in the country according to ESPN's special teams efficiency rating.

Blackmon also assisted with the Trojan special teams in 2018 as Troy finished fourth nationally in net punting. Tyler Sumpter set the school record by averaging 45.1 yards per punt (11th nationally), and the Trojans were ninth in the country averaging 25.0 yards per kickoff return. Sumpter finished one field goal shy of setting the school record with 18 makes on the year, and Troy was one of just 24 teams nationally to not allow a blocked kick.

Blackmon's first season at Troy in 2018 resulted in a 10-3 overall record, a victory at Nebraska and the Trojans' third straight bowl victory (42-32 over Buffalo in the Dollar General Bowl in Mobile). Smith turned in the fourth-best rushing season in school history with 1,186 yards (second in the Sun Belt) behind the blocking of Troy's tight ends and S-backs.

In Blackmon's lone season with the Tigers and Malzahn in 2017, Auburn's offense ranked in the top 30 nationally in total offense, rushing, pass efficiency and scoring as the Tigers won the Southeastern Conference West Division and played in the SEC Championship



Game. Running back Kerryon Johnson was named the SEC Offensive Player of the Year and Auburn finished the season with a Peach Bowl appearance against UCF after knocking off a pair of No. 1 teams—Georgia and Alabama—over the regular season's final three weeks.

Blackmon served as head coach of the Opelika High School football program in his final eight seasons (2009-16) at the school, while also serving as the athletics director during the same time period before leaving for Auburn in February 2017.

Opelika advanced to a pair of Alabama 6A state championship games (2012 and 2016), and the Bulldogs compiled a 69-25 record during Blackmon's tenure. He was honored as 6A Coach of the Year in 2012 by the Alabama Sports Writers Association, the Alabama Football Coaches Association, the Opelika-Auburn News, Columbus SportsVision and AL.com.

The Bulldogs won three consecutive region championships and advanced to the playoffs in seven of his eight seasons as head coach. Blackmon left Opelika as the third-winningest coach in the then-99-year history of the high school.

He has served as president of the Alabama High School Athletic Directors and Coaches Association and on the advisory, Hall of Fame, reclassification and all-star selection committees of the Alabama High School Athletic Association. Additionally, he served on the high school task force of USA Football and as a district board member of the Alabama Football Coaches Association.

Blackmon spent his first 13 years at Opelika as the offensive coordinator under legendary head coach Spence McCracken. He also served as assistant athletics director from 2001-08 and coached the soccer, wrestling and golf teams at Opelika. He was named the Alabama Assistant Coach of the Year following the 2004 season and was a consistent figure on the coaching staffs of the Alabama-Mississippi and North-South all-star games.

A graduate of Robert E. Lee High School in Montgomery, Alabama, Blackmon was part of the 1991 state champion football team and was inducted into the school's hall of fame in 2017. Blackmon played one season at North Alabama before transferring to Troy to complete his studies.

Blackmon earned his bachelor's degree in accounting from Troy in 1996 and a master's degree in business education from Auburn in 1998. He and his wife Kellie have two children--Cade, a quarterback at Samford, and Carlyle.

DAVIDGIBBS CO-DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/SECONDARY | SECOND SEASON

UCF co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach David Gibbs played a major role in the Knights' defensive surge in 2021 and 2022—as his youthful yet talented secondary developed into one of the most productive in the country.

UCF played its way into the American Athletic Conference Championship Game in 2022 with dynamic wins over ranked Cincinnati and Tulane teams—with the Knight defense ranking first nationally in red-zone defense much of the fall (fifth to finish the regular season). UCF held seven opponents to 20 or fewer points and allowed 21.3 points per game overall (third in AAC).

Cornerback Davonte Brown and defensive tackle Ricky Barber claimed honorable mention All-America honors for 2022 from Pro Football Network—with Brown also named AAC Cornerback of the Year. Cornerback Corey Thornton received third-team All-AAC recognition from Pro Football Focus for his 2022 play—while defenders Barber, Tre'mon Morris-Brash and Jason Johnson all merited first-team all-conference recognition by vote of AAC coaches (Brown was first team by PFN). Phil Steele named Barber, Morris-Brash and Johnson to its all-league first team.

Johnson led the Knights in tackles in 2022 (9.2 per game, second in AAC)—while safety Koby Perry topped the UCF secondary with 46 tackles and safety Divaad Wilson contributed three interceptions.

As the Knights won six of their final seven games to finish the 2021 season (including a Gasparilla Bowl triumph over Florida), the UCF defense permitted just 11.8 points per game in those six victories. The Knights averaged 8.1 tackles for loss and 5.0 sacks in those six games—and finished the regular season ranked seventh nationally in pass efficiency defense (110.73) and 26th in tackles for loss (6.8 per game).

Gibbs and his secondary in 2021 made significant contributions as the Knights improved 97 spots in the NCAA pass efficiency defense ratings from 2020 and also allowed 89.1 fewer passing yards per game in 2021—an improvement of 86 slots in the final NCAA statistics.

Winning postseason honors for 2021 among UCF defensive backs were safety Quadric Bullard (second-team All-AAC by Pro Football Focus and fourth team by Phil Steele), Wilson (second-team All-AAC by vote of league coaches, third team by PFF, fourth team by Phil Steele) and cornerbacks Brown and Thornton (both third-team All-AAC by PFF). Bullard and Wilson ranked second and fourth, respectively, in tackles for the Knights in 2021.

Gibbs, a 29-year veteran of the coaching industry, including 13 seasons as a defensive coordinator in the college ranks and nine seasons as a defensive backs coach for three different National Football League teams, was named co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach on Gus Malzahn's UCF football coaching staff on Feb. 18, 2021. He is in his second season at UCF in 2022.

Gibbs was the secondary coach at Missouri in 2019 and 2020--after spending four seasons as defensive coordinator (2015-18) at Texas Tech, where his defenses became known as some of the top turnover-creating units in the country.

Mizzou's defense in 2019 allowed the fewest first downs (195) of any Football Bowl Subdivision program while also ranking sixth nationally in pass defense (179.3 yards per game) under Gibbs. The Tigers were ninth in pass efficiency defense, 14th in total defense (312.0) and 16th in scoring defense (19.4).

In 2017, Texas Tech led the Big 12 Conference and ranked sixth nationally with 29 forced turnovers, including four defensive scores, most by a Texas Tech defense since 2001. From 2013-17, Gibbs' defenses at Tech and Houston forced a combined 140 turnovers, tied for most in the nation among any defensive coordinator during that five-year span. Gibbs previously served as defensive coordinator at Minnesota (1997-2000), Auburn (2005) and Houston (2013-14) and also took over as interim head coach for the Cougars' appearance in the 2015 Armed Forces Bowl. In that game, Gibbs' team posted the biggest fourth-quarter comeback win in bowl-game history, overcoming a 31-6 deficit with just 11 minutes remaining to notch a thrilling 35-34 victory over Pittsburgh.

In his first season at the helm of the Red Raider defense in 2015, Gibbs preached the importance of forcing turnovers and the effects showed as Tech went from a minus-13 turnover margin in 2014 to plus-two in 2015. The Red Raiders picked off 15 passes and recovered 10 fumbles in 2015, a year after forcing just 15 turnovers altogether.

Gibbs quickly changed the defensive culture at Houston shortly after his arrival in 2013. The Cougars ranked as the third-most improved scoring defense nationally and ranked 20th in the country after allowing 21.8 points per game, a significant improvement from the 36 points per game Houston surrendered in 2012.

The 2013 Houston defense led the nation with 43 turnovers forced to pace the Cougars to a best-in-the-nation plus-25 turnover margin. Trevon Stewart led the nation and set a Houston record with six fumble recoveries, while Adrian McDonald led the AAC with six interceptions.

The dramatic defensive overhaul under Gibbs continued in 2014 as Houston finished the regular season ranked 11th nationally in scoring defense at 19.5 points per game and 19th nationally in total defense at 334.6 yards per game. The Houston defense was fifth nationally with 30 takeaways, including 19 interceptions (sixth nationally).

Prior to Houston, Gibbs' last collegiate coaching stop was in 2005 when he served as defensive coordinator at Auburn. The Tiger defense ranked sixth nationally in scoring



defense, allowing just 15.5 points per game that season, while ranking 11th in sacks (39) and 16th in third-down defense.

On the professional level, Gibbs spent a combined nine seasons in Denver, Kansas City and Houston as a defensive backs coach. Teams sporting Gibbs on staff finished in the top 12 of total defense five times and advanced to the NFL Playoffs on three occasions. Three players who worked under Gibbs earned NFL Pro Bowl selections—Champ Bailey, John Lynch and Deltha O'Neal.

Prior to joining the professional ranks, Gibbs became the youngest coordinator on the FBS level at the time as the then-29-year-old took over as defensive coordinator at Minnesota in 1997. Gibbs improved a Minnesota defense that had ranked last in the Big Ten in 1996 to one ranked eighth in the nation in pass efficiency defense and scoring defense by 1999.

Under Gibbs' tutelage, Minnesota's Tyrone Carter won the 1999 Jim Thorpe Award and back-to-back All-America honors in 1998 and 1999. Defensive end Lamanzer Williams earned All-America honors in 1997 as Gibbs' defense produced an All-American in three straight seasons for the first time at Minnesota since 1961–63.

Gibbs earned his first full-time coaching position in 1995 at Kansas, where he coached the program's defensive backs. The Jayhawks advanced to just their eighth bowl game in program history in Gibbs' first year when they defeated UCLA in the Aloha Bowl. Gibbs earned his first coaching opportunity with back-to-back two-year stints as a graduate assistant at both Colorado and Oklahoma.

The Auburn, Alabama, native was a four-year letterman at Colorado from 1987-90. He started at defensive back for the 1990 national title-winning Buffalo team and the 11-1 1989 team that finished fourth nationally in the final polls. Gibbs graduated from Colorado in 1990, earning Academic All-Big Eight honors as a senior.

HERB**HAND** OFFENSIVE LINE | SECOND SEASON

Herb Hand proved again in 2022 and 2021 why he qualifies as one of the top offensive line coaches in the nation—as all five of his UCF starters earned some sort of earned some sort of postseason honors in both seasons. UCF was the only American Athletic Conference team to have all five starters recognized by Pro Football Focus in both 2021 and 2022.

coaches named tackle Ryan Swoboda and guard Lokahi Pauole to the 2022 all-league first team, while PFF tabbed guard Sam Jackson and center Matt Lee to its first team. Tackle Tylan Grable received third-team recognition from PFF. Pro Football Network selected Pauole to the All-AAC first team, Lee to the second team and named Swoboda as an honorable mention pick. Phil Steele tabbed Swoboda and Pauole to its first team, Lee to the second team and Jackson to the third.

The Knights in 2022 dominated in terms of running the football, ranking eighth nationally and tops in the AAC at 236.1 yards per outing. That sort of production enabled UCF to also rank 11th nationally in total offense (480.6 yards per game) and score 34.4 points per contest. The Knights rushed for a season-high 345 yards versus South Florida, added 336 in the road win at 17th-rated Tulane and two other times hit the 300-yard mark (Florida Atlantic and Temple). The UCF line play helped running back Isaiah Bowser account for 14 rushing touchdowns (14th nationally and second in the AAC). (14th nationally and second in the AAC).

PFF named guard Cole Schneider to its second team of 2021 All-AAC performers-- Lee and Pauole made the third team, while tackles Jackson and Marcus Tatum both merited honorable mention notice. On the All-AAC squad selected by league coaches, Pauole made the second team, while Schneider and Tatum were honorable mention picks. In addition, Phil Steele selected Pauole and Tatum second-team all-league, while naming Schneider to the third team. PFN placed Schneider on the All-AAC second team and handed Lee and Jackson honorable mention recognition. honorable mention recognition.

With the Knights claiming victories in six of their final seven games to close the 2021 season, Hand's charges played key roles in leading a UCF offense that was forced to play major portions of the season without quarterback starter Dillon Gabriel, Bowser and receiver Jaylon Robinson. The Knights capped the year by running for 288 yards in their Gasparilla Bowl win over Florida—and only LSU with 321 ran for more versus the Gators in 2021. USA Today recognized that effort by selecting Lee to its all-bowl team. to its all-bowl team.

Hand worked with Gus Malzahn at Tulsa in 2007-08 when they produced the number-one offense in the country and also coached the Auburn offensive line that helped the Tigers rank as one of three finalists for the 2017 Joe Moore Award as the top offensive line in the nation.

Hand joined Malzahn's UCF football staff on Feb. 18, 2021, and is concluding his second season in Orlando in 2022.

Before coming to UCF Hand spent three seasons as co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Texas (2018-20) and enjoyed great success in stints at Auburn, Penn State, Vanderbilt, West Virginia and Tulsa. He has coached in offenses that produced all-time leading rushers at West Virginia, Tulsa and Vanderbilt. Hand has worked with programs that produced six conference championships in addition to three division championships. championships.

In both 2020 and 2019, both Texas center Zach Shackelford and left tackle Samuel Cosmi earned All-Big 12 honors. Cosmi was a unanimous first-team all-league pick in 2020 and went on to earn third-team All-America honors from the Associated Press. In his three years at Texas, Hand saw nine offensive linemen earn All-Big 12 recognition.


After Hand's unit paved the way for Texas to rush for 231 yards against 11th-ranked Utah in the 2019 Valero Alamo Bowl, the Longhorns' offensive line received all-bowl recognition from Sports Illustrated. Cosmi was recognized individually by the Associated Press and ESPN as an all-bowl performer for his Alamo Bowl showing.

In 2018, all five starting offensive linemen garnered All-Big 12 honors, led by center Shackelford's first-team recognition (AP). Calvin Anderson, Elijah Rodriguez and Patrick Vahe were honorable mention picks, while Cosmi received votes as the Big 12 Offensive Freshman of the Year and was a Freshman All-American.

A three-time finalist for Offensive Line Coach of the Year by Football Scoop (2008, 2016-17), Hand was also co-coordinator for an offense that led the nation in total

offense for two consecutive years (2007-08) at Tulsa, one of which is the only offense to feature a 5,000-yard passer, a 1,000-yard rusher and three 1,000 yard receivers (2007). He has also coached five Freshman All-Americans.

Hand came to Austin from Auburn, where he served for two seasons as offensive line coach under Malzahn, whom he was previously co-coordinator with at Tulsa. While at Auburn, Hand's offensive line was named one of three finalists for the Joe Moore Award (nation's top offensive line) in 2017, and the unit was a semifinalist for the award in 2016. During that time, along with his tenure at Vanderbilt, he coached players who earned 11 Southeastern Conference Offensive Lineman of the Week Awards.



Under Hand, right guard Braden Smith earned first-team All-America honors from Associated Press and also earned the SEC's Jacobs Blocking Trophy as the top blocker in the conference. Left tackle Austin Golson was tabbed third-team All-SEC by Phil Steele. The line paved the way for running back Kerryon Johnson to rank 15th nationally in rushing yards per game (115.9) and ninth in rushing TDs (18), while being named SEC Offensive Player of the Year and second-team All-America.

In 2016, Auburn led the SEC and was sixth nationally in rushing with 271.3 yards per game. Two offensive linemen in Smith and left guard Alex Kozan garnered interient in Smith and left guard Alex Rozan garnered second-team All-America honors and both were first-team All-SEC selections. Right tackle Robert Leff also took home All-SEC recognition. The line cleared the way for running back Kamryn Pettway to lead the SEC and rank 11th in the nation in rushing yards per game (122.4 yards per game). Auburn finished 2016 with an 8-5 record and an appearance in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Hand went to Auburn after two seasons at Penn State as the run game coordinator and offensive line coach. In 2015, the unit blocked for Big Ten Freshman of the Year Saquon Barkley as he set Penn State's freshman rushing record with 1,076 yards. In 2014, Hand's young offensive line steadily improved and produced second-round NFL Draft pick Donovan Smith, an offensive tackle chosen by Tampa Bay.

Hand coached the offensive line at Vanderbilt from

Hand coached the offensive 2010-13, adding run game coordinator duties in 2013. In 2013, Vanderbilt's offensive line blocked for 34 rushing touchdowns, including a school-record 14 by running back Jerron Seymour. Hand helped center Wesley Johnson earn All-SEC honors in 2012 and 2013 and then end up selected in the fifth round of the 2014 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers. Hand's 2011-12 offensive lines were instrumental in Zac Stacy breaking the Vanderbilt season and career (3,143 yards) rushing records at that time.

Prior to Vanderbilt, Hand worked three years at Tulsa, worked three years at Tulsa, serving as assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. Hand helped guide Tulsa to consecutive GMAC Bowl appearances behind one of the NCAA's most explosive spread offenses, while mentoring four Freshman All-Americans.

2007 quarterback Paul Smith passed for



yards, while running back Tarrion Adams rushed for 1,225 yards—and the trio of Brennan Marion (1,244), Trae Johnson (1,088) and Charles Clay (1,024) each topped 1,000 receiving yards. The offense led the nation with 543.9 total yards per game, was third with 371.0 passing yards per game and sixth with 41.1 points per game. A year later, the offense averaged 569.9 total yards per game, while ranking in the top 10 in both rushing (fifth/268.0 yards per game) and passing (ninth/301.9) offense. The scoring offense ranked second with 47.2 points per game.

Hand spent six years (2001-06) at West Virginia, serving as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator. He helped the Mountaineers win three Big East Conference titles and go to five straight bowl games during the span, including a 38-35 victory over SEC champion Georgia in the 2006 Sugar Bowl. In 2006, West Virginia finished with an 11-2 record with an offense that ranked second nationally in rushing, third in scoring and fourth in total offense. offense.

Prior to West Virginia, Hand served as an offensive graduate assistant at Clemson for two seasons (1999-2000), as the Tigers participated in the 1999 Peach Bowl and 2001 Gator Bowl. Before that, he served as defensive coordinator and special teams coordinator at Concord College in West Virginia in 1997-98. He also was defensive coordinator at another West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference program, Glenville State, where he helped the Pioneers win three WVIAC Championships in 1994. 1995 and 1996. Championships in 1994, 1995 and 1996.

Hand earned his bachelor's degree in history from Hamilton College in 1990, where he was a three-year starter on the offensive line for the Continentals, serving as team captain and earning All-New England Small College Athletic Conference honors in 1989. He earned a master's degree in business administration in 1993 from West Virginia Wesleyan while serving as a graduate assistant coach.

A native of Westmoreland, New York, Hand and his wife, Debbie, have three children—sons Trey and Cade and a daughter, Bailey.

TIMHARRISJR. co-offensive coordinator/running backs i second season

UCF co-offensive coordinator and running back coach Tim Harris Jr. helped pave the way for a dominant 2022 Knight running attack and an offense that led the American Athletic Conference in total yards per contest, ranking 11th in the country in that category.

That came a year after UCF's late-season surge in 2021 that produced six wins in the final seven outings as the Knights survived major injuries that prompted personnel challenges at quarterback, running back and wide receiver.

UCF leads the AAC and rates eighth nationally in rushing at 236.1 yards per game in 2022—led by veteran Isaiah Bowser (194 carries for 760 yards) who's second in the AAC (14th nationally) with his 14

rushing touchdowns while amassing 49 more carries in than any other Knight back. Bowser has plenty of help from RJ Harvey (112 for 767, 5 TDs) as well as speed demon Johnny Richardson (51 for 340). Harvey paced the Knights with a gaudy 6.8-yards-percarry mark, with Richardson right behind at 6.7.

Bowser in 2022 won second-team All-AAC recognition from conference coaches and Pro Football Network (Fourth from Phil Steele), while Harvey merited second-team all-league notice from PFN and third-team all-league honors from Pro Football Focus and Phil Steele. They worked behind an experienced UCF offensive line that saw all five starters earn some sort of all-conference recognition for the second consecutive season.

Harris' running back corps began 2021 with a bang, as veteran Bowser ran for 172 yards and the game-winning touchdown in the season-opening comeback win over Boise State and then accounted for four first-half rushing TDs a week later versus Bethune-Cookman. Injuries kept Bowser off the field in five later games—providing more opportunities for Richardson and Marc-Antony Richards late in the year—then Bowser rebounded with a dominating 155-yard, two-TD performance in UCF's Gasparilla Bowl win over Florida.

After adding 110 rushing yards of his own against Florida, Richardson ended up leading the Knights in rushing with 733 yards, ranking seventh in the AAC in all-purpose yardage at 96.92 per game. He earned fourth-team All-AAC honors from Phil Steele. Auburn transfer Richards contributed another 309 yards and scored the game-winning TD in the final minute to help defeat East Carolina.

Harris, an integral part of Florida International's football success the previous half-dozen years (2015-20) as running back coach and eventually offensive coordinator and play-caller, was named co-offensive coordinator and running back coach on Gus Malzahn's new football coaching staff at UCF on Feb. 21, 2021. He is concluding his second season on the Knights' staff in 2022.

In 2020 Harris tutored a Florida International running attack led by Phil Steele third-team all-league selection D'vonte Price, the league leader in rush yards per carry (6.84). Price also ranked 11th in the nation for rush yards per game after averaging 116.2 yards per contest. He finished over the century mark for rushing in all but one game in 2020, earning a career-high 178 yards against Florida Atlantic.

Harris oversaw a balanced rushing attack in 2019 that produced a pair of NFL rookie free agents in Anthony Jones and Napoleon Maxwell. The duo's highlight of the season came in the win over Charlotte, as Jones (117) and Maxwell (114) rushed over the century mark. It was just the seventh game in Florida International history that the Panthers had at least two players go over 100 yards rushing in the same game. Harris oversaw five of Florida International's seven games in program history with two or more running backs over the century mark. Jones continued his success over the course of the season as he strung together a streak of three games over 100 yards rushing, becoming just the second Panther to achieve that feat.

During the 2018 season, Harris developed his unit into one of the most productive ground attacks in Conference USA and one of the most successful in program history. Florida International broke the school's single-season records for rushing TDs (27) and rush yards per carry (4.8), while also logging the second-most rushing yards (2,286) in program history and the second-highest rush-yards-per-game average (175.8).

In 2018 Florida International finished third in Conference USA in rushing yards, rush yards per game and rushing TDs, while averaging the second-highest rush yards per carry in the conference. Under Harris, running backs Jones and Maxwell finished first and third on the team with eight and seven TDs, respectively. Harris developed Jones into a 2018 All-Conference USA honorable mention selection despite only having him available for six games. Harris implemented a balanced ground attack that helped running backs Maxwell, Price and Shawndarrius Phillips all finish with top-20 rankings in Conference USA rushing yards. Maxwell and Price also finished third and fourth on the team, respectively, with 771 and 743 all-purpose yards.

The 2017 season was a banner year for the Panther offense, with Florida International amassing 5,100 total yards to come 37 yards shy of setting a program record. Florida International scored 333 points in 2017, second in program history for a single season. The Panthers were masters at moving the chains as well, with Florida International setting a school record for first downs (269) in a season. Florida International also ranked first in the NCAA for red-zone offense after scoring on 40 of 41 attempts (97.6%).

On the ground, the Panthers earned the second-most rushing TDs (20), yards (2,069) and yards per game (159.2) in school history. Overall, Florida International finished with four games over 200 yards on the ground, while the 379 yards against Massachusetts rank as the third most for a single game in school history. Under Harris' guidance, three players gained over 450 yards rushing in 2017 with Alex Gardner leading the running back stable with 719 ground yards.



Harris came to Florida International after one year as the head coach of Booker T. Washington (Florida) High School in 2014. In his first season as head coach, the Florida Class 4A Coach of the Year (and son of longtime legendary Washington coach and 2012 and 2013 Florida Dairy Farmers Coach of the Year Tim "ice" Harris) led the Tornadoes to their second-straight 14-0 record, their third-straight Florida 4A state title and a No. 2 final national ranking (USA Today). The Tornadoes capped the title run with a 54-35 state championship win over Jacksonville Bolles.

Harris Jr. was named the 2014 Florida Dairy Farmers Football Coach of the Year, the 2014 Miami Dolphins George Smith South Florida High School Football Coach of the Year, the 2014 NIKE Football State Coach of the Year and a finalist for the 2014 U.S. Army All-American National Coach of the Year.

Prior to taking over the reins in 2014, Harris was the offensive coordinator for the Tornadoes for five seasons. During that time he also coached wide receivers and quarterbacks. In 2013, Harris helped Booker T. Washington win the 2013 national championship, averaging 41.9 points per game.

He also served as the Tornadoes' head track and field coach from 2010-2014. During that time, Washington won the 2014 Florida 2A Boys Track & Field State Championship and was the state runner-up in 2013. Harris was awarded the Miami-Dade County Boys Track & Field Coach of the Year honor in 2013.

Harris was a four-time NCAA All-American in the 800 meters and six-time (indoors and outdoors) Atlantic Coast Conference champion in the 800 for the University of Miami track and field team. A 2022 inductee into the University of Miami Sports Hall of Fame, Harris still holds the 'Canes' indoor record in the 800.

He earned a degree in English and creative writing from Miami in 2008.

Harris and his wife Nicolette are parents of a son, Timothy.

GRANT**HEARD WIDE RECEIVERS** I FIRST SEASON

Grant Heard's first season in 2022 as receivers coach on UCF coach Gus Malzahn's staff produced one of the most potent pass-catching combinations in Knight annals.

Heard tutored three blue-chip receivers who combined to create a difficult-to-defend unit paced by second-team All-American Athletic Conference veterans Ryan O'Keefe (team-high 73 catches for 725 yards, 5 touchdowns; 107.3 all-purpose yards per game) and Alabama transfer Javon Baker (54 for team-high 747, 5 TDs)--plus Auburn transfer Kobe Hudson (34 for 578, 7 TDs; an average of 17.0 yards per reception). All of Hudson's catches came over the final nine games.

That trio alone combined for 161 catches for 2,050 yards—while helping the Knights rank among the national leaders in total offense (11th at 480.6 yards per game). AAC coaches and Phil Steele rewarded O'Keefe with second-team all-league honors, while Pro Football Focus tabbed Baker a second team selection and he garnered fourth team from Phil Steele.

Heard came to Orlando after most recently serving as Indiana's receivers coach for five years (2017-21)—the last two as the Hoosiers' co-offensive coordinator and previous three as passing game coordinator. The former Ole Miss receiver spent the previous five seasons coaching receivers at his alma mater.

Under Heard's direction in 2020, Ty Fryfogle became the first Hoosier wideout since 2007 to earn All-America honors (third team) and the first in program history to be named Big Ten Richter-Howard Receiver of the Year. Nine times Hoosiers earned all-conference honors during Heard's time in Bloomington, highlighted by Fryfogle's 2020 first-team recognition.

Fryfogle, the first B1G pass-catcher with back-to-back 200-yard games, also was one of 11 Biletnikoff Award semifinalists in 2020. He finished his career sixth on the school's career lists in receptions (158) and yardage (2,231) and tied for 10th in receiving touchdowns (10).

Whop Philyor, a 2021 free-agent signing of the Minnesota Vikings, closed out his career as Indiana's all-time leader in double-digit catch games (seven), fourth in receptions (180), tied for fourth in 100-yard games (seven) and ninth in yardage (2,067).

A second-team all-league selection, Philyor became the seventh Hoosier to reach 1,000 yards (1,002) on 70 catches in 2019. His receptions ranked third in the Big Ten and sixth on Indiana's single-season list, while his yardage totals were fourth and seventh, respectively.

From 2017-19, the Hoosiers finished in the top three in the conference in passing offense. They ranked second in 2019 (25th nationally), and third in 2018 and 2017 (tied for 35th nationally). En route to 2018 honorable-mention All-B1G recognition, current Tennessee Titan Nick Westbrook led the team with 590 yards.

Three wideouts earned 2017 all-league recognition, including first-teamer Simmie Cobbs Jr. Cobbs (72) and Luke Timian (68). They finished second and third in the league and shared fourth and sixth on the Indiana single-season list in catches. Additionally, Cobbs was fourth in the Big Ten in yardage (841) and tied for sixth in receiving scores (8), which shared 10th on Indiana's single-season charts.

Heard completed his fifth campaign as the wide receivers coach at Ole Miss in 2016. He worked with current Hoosiers head coach Tom Allen at Ole Miss (2012-14), Arkansas State (2011) and Lambuth (2008-09).

Heard mentored 2015 Biletnikoff Award finalist Laquon Treadwell, the program's first Biletnikoff finalist. Treadwell caught 82 passes (second in the SEC) for a league-leading 1,153 yards and 11 TDs. Treadwell broke 15 school records in 2015 and was selected in the first round of the NFL Draft by Minnesota, while fellow Rebel standout Cody Core was selected in the sixth round by Cincinnati.

Heard's 2015 receiving corps was one of four in the nation with seven or more players who caught at least 20 balls. Ole Miss broke nearly every offensive school record, while it led the conference and ranked in the Top 10 nationally in scoring (40.8), total (517.8), and passing offense (334.7).

In 2014, Ole Miss was the only SEC team with three receivers in the top 12 in TD receptions. The previous year Treadwell (5.58) and current New England Patriots wideout Donte Moncrief (4.42) ranked inside the league's top eight in catches per game. Moncrief was sixth in the SEC in yards per game (68.8).


The 2013 SEC Freshman of the Year, Treadwell set freshman records in receptions (67), yardage (557) and scores (five). He topped all SEC freshman receivers in catches, yardage and TDs.

Moncrief declared for the NFL Draft after his junior year and finished his career in the top three in program history in receptions, yardage and TDs. He was selected by the Indianapolis Colts in the third round (90th pick).

Heard served as passing game coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Arkansas State (2010-11). Quarterback Ryan Aplin, the 2011 Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year, established school single-season records for total offense and passing yardage per game, and he ranked 10th in the nation in total offense.

His passing attack ranked 16th in the nation, and the Red Wolves finished 24th in total offense en route to a Sun Belt championship and a GoDaddy.com Bowl appearance.

Prior to Arkansas State, Heard spent 2008 and 2009 as Lambuth's offensive coordinator.



The 2008 Eagles accumulated 5,861 yards and became the top-ranked offense in the NAIA. Lambuth finished third in the nation in scoring offense and fourth in passing efficiency that year.

Upon completion of his playing career, Heard started his coaching career as the quarterbacks, wide receivers and special teams coach at Jackson Preparatory High School (Miss.) in 2002. He moved on to Hargrave Military Academy (Va.), where he led the wide receivers and helped Hargrave to an 8-1 record the following campaign.

He joined the collegiate ranks as an offensive graduate assistant at NC State in 2004, and he returned to Ole Miss as an offensive graduate assistant in 2005-06. He assisted in coaching the receivers and tight ends, and he tutored future NFL players Mike Wallace, Shay Hodge, Marshay Green, Mike Espy and Taye Biddle.

In 2007, Heard moved on to Western Michigan and coached wide receivers. He oversaw first-team All-Mid-American Conference selection Jamarko Simmons, the 15th-ranked receiver in the nation, and the receiving corps gained over 3,000 yards and scored 23 TDs

A wide receiver at Ole Miss (1996-2000), Heard helped the Rebels to four bowl games and graduated as the school's all-time leader in career catches and scores. He earned his bachelor's degree in 2001.

He signed with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2002 and was sent to play in NFL Europe. He appeared in pre-season games for San Francisco in 2001.

Grant is married to the former Renata Nowacki, a four-year letter-winner on the Ole Miss volleyball team in 1997-2000, and the couple has a son Jayden and a daughter Avery. His brother Ronnie was also a standout at Ole Miss and in the NFL.

KENNYINGRAM DEFENSIVE ENDS/RUSH I SECOND SEASON

Kenny Ingram, UCF's second-year defensive ends coach, helped the Knights win nine games and a bowl invitation for the second straight season in 2022 while producing dramatic improvement in UCF's overall defensive profile.

That comes after the Knights completed a late-season defensive push to close out the 2021 regular season with six wins in the last seven games, capped by a Gasparilla Bowl victory over Florida.

Integral to that 2022 improvement are the two UCF regulars at end—senior Tre'mon Morris-Brash (third on team with 51 tackles, team-high 13 tackles for loss and team-leading six sacks, twice as many as any other player totaled) and junior Josh Celiscar (49 tackles, 8.5 TFL, 3 sacks, 5 quarterback hurries and 3 forced fumbles) as only junior among Knight captain selections.

Morris-Brash received first-team All-American Athletic Conference recognition from league coaches and Phil Steele (second team from Pro Football Network and third team, by Pro Football Focus), while Celiscar was a PFN honorable mention pick.

Another of Ingram's charges, veteran end and 2021 captain Big Kat Bryant, who claimed first-team All-American Athletic Conference honors by vote of league coaches a year ago. He also was a first-team selection by Phil Steele and PFN—and the PFN AAC Newcomer of the Year and AAC Defensive Lineman of the Year. Bryant ended up the Knights' leader in sacks, tackles for losses and quarterback hurries.

In addition in 2021, Morris-Brash claimed honorable mention All-AAC notice from PFF.

That group helped UCF average 8.1 tackles for loss and 5.0 sacks over its last six victories—and finish the regular season ranked seventh nationally in pass efficiency defense (110.73) and 26th in tackles for loss (6.8 per game). Ingram and his linemen helped the Knights improve 70 spots in NCAA total defense rankings while averaging 122.5 fewer yards allowed per game than in 2020.

Ingram, a veteran defensive coach and former member of Gus Malzahn's Auburn football staff, joined Malzahn's UCF coaching staff on Feb. 24, 2021. He is finishing his second season with the Knights in 2022.

He previously coached at Arkansas State under Malzahn, helping the Red Wolves win the 2012 Sun Belt Conference title as the team's defensive line coach. Ingram assisted the Arkansas State defensive interior line during the 2020 campaign after coaching defensive tackles at Arkansas in 2019.

Ingram also served as director of player relations at Auburn under Malzahn in 2017-18 in his second stint with the Tigers. He held that same position in 2013-14 at Auburn.

Ingram's years at Auburn featured postseason bowl appearances every season—including the Bowl Championship Series national title game after the 2013 campaign. In between stops at Auburn, he coached the defensive tackles at Cincinnati in 2015 and 2016 under Tommy Tuberville—with the Bearcats advancing to the Hawai'i Bowl in 2015.

Ingram began his collegiate career at Tennessee State in 2005 as the Tigers' defensive line coach. He quickly moved back to his hometown of Memphis in 2006, taking over the linebackers for the University of Memphis before being named defensive coordinator in 2009. While at Memphis, he helped the Tigers to the 2007 New Orleans Bowl and 2008 St. Petersburg Bowl.

Prior to his collegiate coaching career, Ingram was the head coach at Melrose High School in Memphis from 2002-04. He led the Golden Wildcats to a 37-4 overall record after serving as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. He was a three-time regional coach of the year and the Memphis Commercial Appeal's 2004 Coach of the Year for Metro Memphis. He led the school to one appearance in the state finals and a pair of appearances in the state semifinals.

He was selected to serve as the Liberty Bowl All-Star Game defensive coordinator in 2003 and was a member of the Tennessee East-West Shrine All-Star Game coaching staff that same season. He was an assistant coach for the Tennessee-Kentucky All-Star Game in 2004. Ingram taught and coached at Corry Middle School in Memphis and worked in the Youth Habilitation Center prior to moving to Melrose.

Ingram starred in football at Whitehaven High School in Memphis, then was a fouryear letterman at Arkansas State, serving as team co-captain in 1992. At Arkansas State, Ingram played for head coach Steve Caldwell. He received his bachelor's degree in political science in 1999 from Arkansas State.

He and his wife, Carla, are parents of five children--Kendrien, Taylor, Kameron and twins Kennedy and Karleigh.

KENNYMARTIN DEFENSIVE TACKLES | SECOND SEASON

Orlando native Kenny Martin, UCF's defensive tackle coach, has figured prominently in the Knights' defensive turnaround over the 2022 and 2021 campaigns.

Martin's charges played noteworthy roles in 2022 with veteran Anthony Montalvo (43 tackles, 6.5 tackles for loss, 5 QB hurries) adding experience with his 35 career starts in a Knight uniform and Ricky Barber (44 tackles, 7.5 TFL, 3 sacks, team-high 12 QB hurries) claiming honorable mention All-America honors from Pro Football Network. Barber was a first-team All-American Athletic Conference pick by both

the league's coaches, PFN and Phil Steele.

The Knights' defensive tackles assisted the UCF defense in leading the country in redzone defense much of the year, ultimately finishing fifth to close the regular season. Meanwhile Martin's charges helped UCF reach the nine-victory mark for a second consecutive year as the Knights advanced to the AAC Championship game for the first time in four years and qualified for a bowl game for the seventh straight season.

As UCF won six of its final seven games to close the 2021 season (capped by a Gasparilla Bowl win over Florida), the Knight defense permitted only 11.8 points per game in those six combined victories. UCF averaged 8.1 tackles for loss and 5.0 sacks in those six games—and finished the regular season ranked seventh nationally in pass efficiency defense (110.73) and 26th in tackles for loss (6.8 per game).

Among Martin's charges at tackle in 2021 were Western Kentucky transfer Barber (29 tackles, 5.5 tackles for loss), Montalvo (34 tackles) and sophomore Keenan Hester (24 tackles). That group helped the UCF defense improve 70 spots in NCAA total defense rankings—averaging 122.5 fewer total yards per game allowed in 2021 compared to the previous season.

Martin previously was defensive tackle coach from 2018-20 for Western Kentucky defenses that ranked among the most productive in the country. He joined Gus Malzahn's UCF football staff on Feb. 23, 2021, and finishes his second year with the Knights in 2022.

A former defensive lineman for the Hilltoppers, Martin first returned to his alma mater in 2016 and worked with the defensive tackle position group for five seasons, the first two as a graduate assistant coach.

In 2020 Martin helped the Western Kentucky defense rank eighth in the nation in passing yards allowed (177.3), 28th in total yards allowed (348.7) and 41st in points allowed (25.3) per game. Among the defensive tackle group, redshirt freshman Barber was named a Football Writers Association of America Freshman All-American. His 88 total tackles tied for fifth among all Football Bowl Subdivision defensive linemen regardless of class. Phil Steele tabbed Barber as an All-Conference USA second-teamer and Jeremy Darvin, the other starting tackle, as a third-teamer.

In 2019 Martin helped mentor his group into one of the most solid positions on the field. Darvin and Jaylon George earned All-Conference USA honorable mention recognition, while Barber was named to the Conference USA All-Freshman Team. Western Kentucky allowed only 20.1 total points per game, the lowest mark for the program since 2004, to rank 22nd nationally. The Hilltoppers held opponents to a 29.7% rate (51 of 172) on third down (sixth in the FBS) and ranked third in the FBS with only 82 missed tackles. Western Kentucky was 24th in total defense at 335.5 yards allowed per game.

In 2018 Martin's work developed George into one of the top defensive tackles in Conference USA as an all-league selection by Pro Football Focus. In 2017, senior Chris Johnson earned All-Conference USA honorable mention accolades after leading all defenders in quarterback hurries from his tackle position.

In 2016, Martin helped senior Keith Brown set a single-season record for total tackles with 131 en route to earning All-Conference USA first-team honors along with PFF second-team All-America recognition. The Hilltoppers finished the campaign with the second-ranked rushing defense, surrendering just 97.2 yards per game. Western Kentucky also led the conference in scoring defense as it won a second consecutive league championship (under head coach Jeff Brohm, now at Purdue) and third consecutive bowl game.



A four-year letterman for Western Kentucky (the last three under current Florida Atlantic coach Willie Taggart), Martin started 42 games from 2009-12 (74 career tackles) and was a member of the Hilltoppers' first FBS bowl team in the 2012 Little Caesar's Pizza Bowl.

As a coach, Martin helped Western Kentucky participate in the 2016 Boca Raton Bowl (won 51-31 over Memphis), 2017 Cure Bowl, 2019 First Responder Bowl (won 23-20 over Western Michigan) and 2020 LendingTree Bowl—as well as the 2021 Gasparilla Bowl (a 29-17 triumph over Florida) once he came to UCF.

Prior to returning to Western Kentucky, Martin was the defensive line coach at the University of Virginia-Wise in 2015. Martin also served as the defensive coordinator at Warren Central High School in Bowling Green, Kentucky, in 2014. He got his start in coaching as the co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach at his former high school, Ocoee High School, in Orlando in 2013.

Martin is a 2012 Western Kentucky graduate with a degree in sociology.

He and his wife, the former Tasha Babb, have a daughter Khloe and son Tre.

ADDISONWILLIAMS DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/CORNERBACKS | SECOND SEASON

Addison Williams, in his second season as UCF cornerbacks coach in 2022, has helped the Knights turn what once was a youthful secondary into one of the most improved and productive units on the roster. Williams was promoted to defensive coordinator on Dec. 18, 2022.

Veteran Knight corners Davonte Brown (31 career starts), Corey Thornton (26) and Brandon Adams played a noteworthy role in UCF standing third in the American Athletic Conference in team pass efficiency defense in 2022. That duo also helped UCF rank fifth

nationally in red-zone defense. For his work in 2022 Brown claimed honorable mention All-America and AAC Cornerback of the Year honors from Pro Football Network. Thornton was a third-team All-AAC pick by Pro Football Focus as the Knights posted nine regular-season wins and claimed a second consecutive bowl invitation under head coach Gus Malzahn.

UCF in 2021 ranked seventh nationally in pass efficiency defense (an improvement of 97 spots in NCAA statistical rankings), as the Knights closed the year with six victories in their final seven assignments to finish 9-4. UCF's cornerbacks played critical roles as the Knights improved 86 slots in the passing yards allowed category, moving to 35th in 2021 (210.1 yards per game, 89.1 fewer than 2020).

A pair of Williams' corners received 2021 postseason honors—as sophomores Brown and Thornton both were named third-team All-AAC by PFF. Williams also played a major role enabling talented true freshman Adams to start six late-season games for the Knights.

A former member of Malzahn's football staff at Auburn and the Coastal Carolina safeties coach in 2020, Williams rejoined Malzahn and his UCF coaching staff on Feb. 22, 2021, and is finishing his second season with the Knights in 2022.

Williams helped the Chanticleers to an unbeaten and record-setting 2020 regular season, an overall 11-1 record and final rankings of 14th in both the Associated Press and poll of coaches (highest in Sun Belt Conference history).

The Chants finished 8-0 in winning the Sun Belt title in 2020. Coastal posted the only undefeated regular season by a football team in Sun Belt history, which included two wins over Football Bowl Subdivision top-25 nationally ranked opponents (eighth-rated BYU and 21st-ranked Louisiana), the first two in program history, and four wins over top-50 opponents. Williams helped Coastal Carolina rank third nationally in 2020 with 16 interceptions (plus second in overall turnovers gained with 25) and 16th in team pass efficiency defense.

Williams came to Coastal Carolina after one season as an analyst and assistant to Malzahn for Auburn football in 2019. He ventured to Auburn from Furman, where he had been promoted to defensive coordinator in the spring of 2019. At Furman, Williams served as cornerbacks coach for the 2017 and 2018 seasons, helping the Paladins win a share of the 2018 Southern Conference title.

From 2013-16, Williams was the defensive backs coach (2013-16) and defensive coordinator (2016) at Tusculum College, where he mentored 2016 South Atlantic Conference Defensive Freshman of the Year and All-American Jay Boyd and All-American Cameron Thomas, who led the league in interceptions (five) and passes defended (15) in 2015.

Williams played three seasons at cornerback for South Carolina from 2007-09, appearing in 26 games before an injury ended his career. He was a three-time member of the Southeastern Conference academic honor roll and received the 2009 Harold White GPA Award.

He served as a student assistant coach for the 2010 Gamecocks who won the SEC East title and was a defensive graduate assistant at South Carolina during the 2011-12 seasons, helping the Gamecocks to a 22-4 overall record and wins in both the Capital One and Outback bowls. While at South Carolina, he worked with All-SEC defensive backs Antonio Allen, D.J. Swearinger and Stephon Gilmore.



A native of Atlanta, Georgia, where he earned all-state and all-conference football honors at Westlake High School, Williams earned a bachelor's degree in sports and entertainment management from South Carolina in 2010.

He and his wife Chelsea are parents of a son, Ace.

ORLANDO – The UCF football team came out strong in its home opener against South Carolina State Thursday Night at FBC Mortgage Stadium, scoring 28 unanswered to start the evening in route to a 56-10 victory. The win was the Knights' seventh straight in home openers.

The Black and Gold received the ball to start the game, giving quarterback John Rhys Plumlee his introduction to Knights fans. Plumlee found Javon Baker on a crossing route for a 12-yard touchdown pass, capping off the Knights 70-yard opening drive.

Plumlee found the end zone twice more in the first quarter, with a beautiful 30-yard pass to Kemore Gamble. Just over four minutes later, he decided to take it himself, weaving past the Bulldogs defense for a 17-yard touchdown rush and pushing the Knights to an early 21-0 lead. Before the end of the half, Isaiah Bowser recorded his first of two rushing touchdowns of the game, and UCF took a commanding 28-3 lead into the locker room at the half.

The Bulldogs notched their only touchdown of the game in the third quarter, to which the Knights responded with another 28 unanswered point run to close the game. Plumlee recorded two more touchdowns in his debut, finding both Johnny Richardson on an 18-yard pass and Zach Marsh-Wojan on a 21-yard pass.

Special teams showed their strength in the first minutes of the fourth quarter, as Quadric Bullard blocked a Bulldogs punt and recovered it in the endzone for a defensive score, pushing the score to its final margin of 56-10. The blocked punt was the first since Sept. 7, 2019. The returned touchdown was the first since Nov. 12, 2016 against Cincinnati


With a five-touchdown performance from Plumlee, frehsman Thomas Castellanos also gave a worthy introduction to the fans with a 32-yard rush in his first drive.

ORLANDO – Despite a pair of opportunities to tie the score or take the lead late, the UCF football team came up short against the Louisville Cardinals, 20-14, Friday night at FBC Mortgage Stadium. The Knights move to 1-1 on the year, while the Cardinals improve to 1-1.

"Obviously an extremely tough loss," said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. "We came out of the game playing well. We were in control of the game and at halftime had some momentum. The third quarter we came out and did nothing really offensively at all.

"We had a long touchdown called back for holding I think, it was a second of the game. Our defense did a good job at the end, that gave us a chance. We just didn't get things done down there."

Trailing late in the fourth quarter, the UCF defense came up with a big fourth down stop to give the offense a chance to knot the score with 5:41 remaining. Quarterback John Rhys Plumlee found wide receiver Javon Baker for a 24-yard pass to put the Knights in the red zone. A three-yard rush from Isaiah Bowser gave UCF first and goal from the nine-yard line, but the Black and Gold was unable to convert.

The Knights defense rose to the occasion once again to force a Louisville punt with 1:41 on the clock, but UCF was unable to get in the endzone and turned the ball over after an unsuccessful fourth-down attempt.

After Louisville scored on its opening drive following a touchdown from Tiyon Evans, UCF countered with a 10 play, 80-yard drive capped off by Bowser's two-yard touchdown run to even the game at 7-7. Bowser found the endzone a few minutes later, this time from three yards out to give the Knights a 14-7 lead.

Louisville trimmed the UCF advantage to 14-10 after a 35-yard field goal from James Turner and the Cards took the lead after quarterback Malik Cunningham broke loose for a 43-yard touchdown run to make it 17-14.

UCF had a few big plays called back in the second half due to penalties and the Knights were not able to find the endzone.

Jason Johnson led a strong defensive effort with 12 tackles, including nine solo stops. Jeremiah Jean-Baptiste tallied seven and Quadric Bullard had four.

BOCA RATON, Fla. – After allowing just 18 yards in the second half, UCF football bounced back in a big way with a 40-14 win against Florida Atlantic Saturday night at FAU Stadium. The Knights defense held the Owls to zero yards in the third quarter and only allowed 18 yards in the fourth quarter.

UCF (2-1) has now won all four games in the series against Florida Atlantic (2-2), including a perfect 2-0 record at FAU Stadium.

Florida Atlantic scored on its opening drive of the game, but UCF quickly responded to knot the score at 7-7. Following consecutive passes to Ryan O'Keefe and Xavier Townsend, Knights quarterback John Rhys Plumlee called his own number and scored on a rushing play from seven yards out.

The Owls scored a second touchdown with a few seconds remaining in the first quarter, but the Knights defense held Florida Atlantic scoreless for the final three quarters.

A 41-yard field goal from freshman kicker Colton Boomer, making his collegiate debut, cut the UCF deficit to 14-10 and Plumlee scored his second rushing touchdown of the game a few minutes later to give the Knights a 16-14 lead at halftime. The Hattiesburg, Mississippi, native turned in a career performance with 121 rushing yards, a career-high 339 passing yards and 25 completions for three total touchdowns.

The second half was all UCF with the Knights compiling 327 yards of total offense and limiting Florida Atlantic to 18 total yards.

Isaiah Bowser opened the second-half scoring with a one-yard rushing touchdown, his fifth of the season. The Sidney, Ohio, native has scored a rushing touchdown in all three games this season and dating back to the bowl game last year, Bowser has seven touchdowns in his last four games.

A three-yard touchdown run from RJ Harvey pushed the Knights' lead to 30-14 on the redshirt junior running back's first career touchdown.

Boomer connected on a 29-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to finish a perfect 2-2 on field goal attempts, stretching the UCF advantage to 33-14. Javon Baker reeled in a 20-yard pass from Plumlee for the final score of the game to cap a nine-play, 69-yard drive.

ORLANDO - Headlined by 284 yards rushing, the UCF football team defeated Georgia Tech 27-10 Saturday afternoon at FBC Mortgage Stadium. For the third time this season, the Knights held an opponent to 14 points or less.

"It was a good, hard fought win at home," said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. "Our crowd was unbelievable, and we really appreciate our crowd. We started out with a 20-play drive, I think it took almost 10 minutes and we only got three points with that. That's really the first time I've seen that. Probably the big play of the game was the blocked punt right before halftime, that gave us some momentum going into halftime.

"Our defense got off the field and came back out. We were able to establish a run better once the second half got going. I think we had 285 yards rushing. There's a lot of things we can correct, which is good. We got a quality win. I'm very proud of our players and our coaches.

UCF scored first in the game following a 20-play, 71-yard opened drive capped by a 21-yard field goal from freshman Colton Boomer. The game's opening drive featured 17 running plays and chewed up 9:47. It was the longest scoring drive by time of possession since Oct. 27, 2012, in a 54-17 UCF win over Marshall.

Georgia Tech countered with a 59-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Jeff Sims to wide receiver Malachi Carter in the second quarter, as the Yellow Jackets pulled ahead 7-3. A few minutes later, Boomer connected on his second field goal of the game from 31 yards out, as the Knights regained the lead 10-7.

A big play on special teams helped UCF head into the locker room at halftime with momentum leading 13-7, as redshirt senior Jarvis Ware powered through the Yellow Jackets line to get a hand on the punt attempt from David Shanahan. For the second time this season, Quadric Bullard scooped up the blocked punt and returned it 29 yards for the touchdown. It was the first blocked punt of Ware's career.

For the second consecutive game, the Knights defense was stellar in the second half as Georgia Tech was just 1-for-7 on third down attempts, 0-for-3 on fourth down attempts and 0-for-3 on red zone opportunities.

"Our defense did a good job," Malzahn added. "We did give up some yards, but once we got into the red zone, they came up big time and time again. Our team is growing, I thought it was a quality win."

The teams traded field goals in the third quarter, with Boomer connecting from 37 yards and Georgia Tech's Jude Kelley making a 42-yarder to cut the UCF lead to 16-10 heading into the fourth quarter.

John Rhys Plumlee scored his fourth rushing touchdown of the season with 10:37 remaining in the game, breaking free along the right side for a 28-yard scamper. He finished the game with 100 rushing yards on 16 attempts.

Boomer matched the Knights program record with his fourth field goal of the game to push the UCF lead to 27-10. The Lake Mary, Florida, native is the first player to make four field goals in a single game since Matthew Wright against South Carolina State on Sept.

Jason Johnson led the UCF defense with eight tackles, while Jeremiah Jean-Baptiste returned to the lineup for the Knights and contributed seven, including 2.0 TFLs.

ORLANDO – Thanks to a strong second half, the UCF football team opened American Athletic Conference play with a 41-19 win over SMU Wednesday night at FBC Mortgage Stadium. Trailing 13-10 at halftime, the Knights outscored the Mustangs 31-6 in the second half with SMU scoring as time expired.

"First of all, I'm really proud of our team and the way we played, specifically in the second half," said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. "We've been talking all week about we've got to come out in the second half and play good football and we did that. We dominated the second half.

"We played our best football game, and I'm telling you hats off to SMU. They're a really good team and Coach Lashlee is a great coach. We wish them nothing but the best moving forward."

The game was a difference of two halves, as SMU compiled 287 yards of total offense to UCF's 145 to take a three-point lead into the intermission. It was a different story in the second half; however, as the Knights came out of the locker room and dominated for the remainder of the game.

UCF recorded 204 yards of offense in the third quarter, passing for 148 yards and rushing for 56 yards. The Knights' defense was stellar in the quarter, shutting out SMU and limiting the Mustangs to just 83 yards. SMU was 0-for-3 on third-down conversions and 0-for-2 fourth-down conversions in the third quarter.

Isaiah Bowser ignited the offense with a one-yard touchdown run to give UCF a 17-13 lead after the extra point from Colton Boomer. Ryan O'Keefe found the endzone for the first time this season on a 26-yard pass from John Rhys Plumlee with 3:07 remaining to push the Knights' advantage to

UCF's defense pressure continued in the fourth quarter, as Tre'mon Morris-Brash tackled SMU quarterback Tanner Mordecai in the endzone for a six-yard loss and the Knights first safety since the 2021 season opener against Boise State.

Plumlee found O'Keefe for his second touchdown reception of the game on a 58-yard pass, as O'Keefe scampered down the left side of the field. Bowser recorded his third rushing touchdown of the game and eighth of the season to take over the AAC lead, extending UCF's lead to 41-13.

Several Knights turned in their best performances of the season, as Javon Baker caught a career-best six passes for 138 yards, which was also a personal best. O'Keefe's 117 yards receiving were a season-high and Plumlee surpassed 300 yards passing for the third time this season.

Jeremiah Jean-Baptiste, Jason Johnson and Koby Perry led UCF in tackles with nine each. The Knights defense tallied seven tackles for loss, eight pass break ups and five quarterback hurries.

ORLANDO – In its annual Space Game, the UCF football team played out of this world to rout the Temple Owls, 70-13, Thursday night at FBC Mortgage Stadium. The Knights' 70 points scored are the third most in program history and third most by an FBS team this season.

UCF moves to 5-1 on the year and 2-0 in American Athletic Conference play, while Temple falls to 2-4 and 0-2 in league action. The Knights remained unbeaten in their annual Space Game with a record of 6-0 following the win.

'I'm real pleased with our team," said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. "I think we played our best football game tonight. Early on they moved the football, but our defense held them to field goals. Offensively, I thought we had some good rhythm early and had some good drives. Probably the key drive of the whole game was right before halftime. We were able to punch that in and give its one broathing room. give it some breathing room.

"Our defense played really well in the second half, I think they gave up around 90 yards and held another opponent under 20 points. I think that's the ninth in a row or something like that."

UCF's offense was firing on all cylinders in the game, recording 737 total yards – the second most by an FBS team in a single game this season behind Ohio State's 763 yards against Toledo. The Knights rushed for more than 300 yards for the second time this season and passed for 433 yards, the most in a game since Oct. 24, 2020, against Tulane when UCF had 422.


Knights quarterback John Rhys Plumlee had arguably one of the best Knights quarterback John Rhys Plumlee had arguably one of the best performances of his career, as he tied the program record with seven touchdowns responsible for with four passing and three rushing. The Hattiesburg, Mississippi, native tied the mark set by former UCF standouts Darin Slack in 1987 and Daunte Culpepper in 1998. His seven touchdowns are the most by any player in the American Athletic Conference this season. Plumlee threw for a career-high 373 yards on 18-for-22 passing and he rushed for 37 yards on seven attempts. He ignited the scoring for UCF in the contest, scoring from nine yards out to cap a 10-play, 74-yard drive in the first quarter to give the Knights a 7-3 lead.

After Temple scored to take a 10-7 advantage, Plumlee found the endzone for the second time on the day with a one-yard rush to help UCF regain the lead. 14-10.

"Our quarterback, he played extremely well," Malzahn added. "Not very many times I think, I've had an offense that had 400 yards passing and 300 yards rushing so I'm real proud. That team [Temple] had a real defense coming in, you know they were top 10 statistically in a lot of different categories, so I'm real pleased with our team."

The Knights scored 21 points in the second quarter to pull away and take a 35-13 lead into halftime, as UCF has led at the intermission in five of its six games this season. Isaiah Bowser found the endzone for the 10th time this season and Kobe Hudson recorded his first touchdown in a UCF uniform moments later. Plumlee's third rushing touchdown with five seconds remaining in the first half pushed the Knights' lead to 22 heading into halftime - its largest lead at halftime this season.

GREENVILLE, N.C. – The UCF football team was outdone in its first American Athletic Conference road game of the season at East Carolina 34-13 Saturday evening at Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium. The Knights couldn't overcome four turnovers and suffered their second loss of the season.

"Give East Carolina the credit, they got after us and beat us in all three phases of the game," said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. "What stood out to me was that they controlled the tempo and time of possession, we couldn't get off the field."

UCF (5-2, 2-1 AAC) moved the ball well in the first half, but saw its first two drives end with a turnover. It was the first time the Knights turned the football over since the Georgia Tech game.

After the UCF pressure forced a missed field goal on East Carolina's (5-3, 3-2) first drive of the game, the Pirates got on the board with a 28-yard field goal with two minutes remaining in the opening period.

The Knights had a nine-play, 59-yard drive end on a fumble early in the second quarter and East Carolina turned the miscue into a touchdown to grab a 10-0 lead.

Freshman kicker Colton Boomer ignited the scoring for UCF in the game, as he connected on a 27-yard field goal as time expired in the first half. The kick capped a five-play, 70-yard drive for the Knights in 44 seconds to end the shutout prior to the intermission.

For just the second time this season, UCF trailed at halftime, but the Knights marched down the field on their opening drive of the third quarter. Isaiah Bowser found the endzone for the 10th time this season, scoring from three yards out to trim the Knights deficit to

ECU countered with a touchdown and a field goal to pull ahead 27-10 and take control of the game. Boomer connected on his second field goal attempt of the game from 36 yards to make it 27-13, but UCF couldn't get any closer.

Linebacker Jason Johnson led the UCF defense with 15 tackles, while Tre'mon Morris-Brash added six tackles, 2.5 tackles for loss and a

"Disappointing loss, but we've gotta find a way to put it behind us," Malzahn added.

UCF will return to action at home next weekend when the Knights welcome No. 21 Cincinnati to FBC Mortgage Stadium for its homecoming game. Kickoff is set for 3:30 p.m. on ESPN.

ORLANDO – The UCF football team bounced back in a big way on Saturday with a strong performance to take down No. 20 Cincinnati 25-21 on Homecoming at FBC Mortgage Stadium. With the win, the Knights snapped the Bearcats' 19-game winning streak against American Athletic Conference opponents, as Cincinnati looked to set the conference record for consecutive wins.

UCF (6-2, 3-1 AAC) picked up its first ranked win since the 2018 matchup against Cincinnati (6-2, 3-1) and first under second-year head coach Gus Malzahn. The Knights remained unbeaten in home AAC games in the last two seasons under Malzahn's direction, improving to 7-0. UCF is now bowl eligible for the 13th time in school history and the seventh consecutive year, the only team from the state of Florida that is bowl eligible at this point in the season.

"First of all, I'm just real proud of our team. This was a huge win for us," said Malzahn. "I think everybody know's that. Sometimes it's how you win that really can help you moving forward. I'm real proud of our team, you know, that's a championship program we beat.

'They went down and scored with three minutes left and took all the momentum, but then Mikey Keene came in and drove us down the field. It was one of those championship type of drives.

In his first action of the season, sophomore quarterback Mikey Keene came up big for UCF leading a pair of Knights scoring drives including the game-winner in the fourth quarter. After taking a hit in the second quarter, quarterback John Rhys Plumlee was removed from the game and did not return but Keene turned in a stellar outing to lift the Knights to the victory.

Keene finished the game 15-for-21 with 176 yards, completing 71% of his passes.

After both teams punted on their opening drives, UCF struck first in the game after a seven-play, 53-yard drive capped by a 26-yard field goal from Colton Boomer. Three big runs by Plumlee, Ryan O'Keefe and Johnny Richardson set up the Knights' first score.

Running back RJ Harvey had the best game of his career, as he rushed 18 times for 84 yards with two touchdowns – all of which are career highs. He found the endzone late in the first quarter on a 26-yard run to give UCF a 10-0 lead.

The Knights defense shut down any thoughts of a late score, as K.D. McDaniel sacked Bryant and forced a fumble which was nearly recovered by UCF but resulted in a 20-yard loss for the Bearcats.

MEMPHIS – Headlined by forcing three red zone stops, the 25th-ranked UCF football team earned a hard-fought 35-28 road win at Memphis Saturday afternoon at Simmons Bank Liberty Stadium. The Knights moved to 7-2 on the year and 4-1 in American Athletic Conference (AAC) play, earning the first conference road win of the season, while Memphis falls to 4-5 and 2-4 in league action.

As the nation's top red zone defense, UCF came up big again on Saturday forcing a turnover on downs, interception and a missed field goal. In 36 trips to the red zone for opponents this season, the Knights have only allowed 12 touchdowns (33%).

With the score knotted at 21-21 heading to the fourth quarter, UCF capped a nine-play, 61-yard drive to take a 28-21 lead after quarterback Mikey Keene connected with Kobe Hudson for the second time on the day for a 13-yard touchdown.

On Memphis' next drive, Divaad Wilson picked off quarterback Seth Henigan to give the Knights the ball back with their second turnover of the day to have a chance to add to their lead. It was Wilson's third interception of the season and second interception of the game for UCF.

After the teams traded possessions with both ending in punts, Keene found wide receiver Javon Baker in the back of the endzone for his third touchdown pass of the day, extending the UCF lead to 35-21 following the extra point from Colton Boomer.

The Tigers answered with a six-play, 61-yard drive to cut the deficit to 35-28 after a 14-yard touchdown pass from Henigan to Joe Scates. Needing a few first downs to continue running the clock and retain possession, Alec Holler made one of the biggest plays of the day on third down to keep the drive going. He caught the pass at the UCF 19-yard line, made the first defender miss and then leaped across the line to gain to pick up the first down.


After Memphis used its final timeout, Isaiah Bowser burst through the middle for 19 yards to give UCF another first down and the ability to run out the clock for the win.

After winning the toss and electing to receive, UCF marched down the field on its opening possession to grab a 7-0 lead after a 22-yard touchdown run from RJ Harvey. He took the handoff from Keene and bounced it to the sideline to score his fourth touchdown of the season.

The Tigers countered on their first possession with a 10-play, 75-yard drive to even the score at 7-7 after a seven-yard touchdown run from Brandon Thomas.

NEW ORLEANS – Needing to play one of its best games of the season on the road at No. 17 Tulane, the 22nd-ranked UCF football team was up for the challenge. Headlined by a season-high 336 rushing yards, the Knights earned a 38-31 road win against the Green Wave Saturday evening at Yulman Stadium.

UCF (8-2, 5-1 AAC) handed the Green Wave (8-2, 5-1) their first conference loss of the season and first home AAC loss in nearly a full calendar year. The win was also the Knights' first ranked road win since 2013 when the program defeated No. 8 Louisville, 38-35.

With the win, UCF now sits in a three-way tie for first place in the American Athletic Conference but the Knights control their own destiny thanks to defeating Tulane and Cincinnati, the other two teams tied for first.

"Real proud of our team," said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. "Going on the road against a top-20 team in one of the biggest games that they've had here in probably a really long time and our guys played really well. Defensively, we were down three starters and had a bunch of young guys that haven't played a lot in the game, and I thought they battled. We forced turnovers and almost had three."

Dubbed as a battle between the American's top defenses statistically, to the Affection of the


Tulane entered the game allowing 127 rushing yards per game and had only given up four rushing touchdowns. After it was all said and done Saturday, UCF more than doubled the rushing yards mark and tallied at least four rushing touchdowns in a game for the fourth time this season.

Making his return to the field, John Rhys Plumlee started at quarterback for the Knights and rushed for 176 yards to set the program record for rushing yards by a quarterback in a single game. The previous mark of 122 was held by Vic Penn, who accomplished the feat against Middle Tennessee in 1999.

Playing nearly two hours from his hometown of Hattiesburg, Mississippi, Plumlee ignited the Knights offense early in the game as he raced 47 yards down the field to the three-yard line to set up a Colton Boomer 25-yard field goal on the opening drive of the game. After a quick three-and-out by Tulane's offense, Plumlee took off for a 67-yard touchdown run to give the Knights a 10-0 lead on the longest rush of the season for UCF.

ORLANDO – Despite allowing just 82 yards and three points in the second half, the 20th-ranked UCF football team came up short against Navy 17-14 Saturday afternoon at FBC Mortgage Stadium. Points were at a premium in the contest, as both teams' strong defenses were on display and offenses were held well below their season averages.

"First of all, extremely tough loss. It was real disappointing for our guys, especially our seniors in their last home game and everything that went with that," said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. "Give them [Navy] credit. They did what it took to win the game. First half, they had the ball quite a bit. We had opportunities, but we got field goals down there going in and you have to score touchdowns."



Navy countered with a field goal on its next possession, but after that offense was limited on both sides. One its lone possession in the fourth quarter, UCF was unable to convert on fourth down from the Navy 37-yard line as Keene's pass to Baker was broken up by Navy's Mbiti Williams Jr.

Following a great first half in which UCF led 28-7 at the break, South Florida countered in the second half and took the lead 39-38 in the fourth quarter, but the Knights had an answer. With the drive starting on the 18-yard line, UCF needed to move the ball the length of the field and did just that.

Wide receiver Javon Baker made a great catch on a deep pass down the middle for a 41-yard gain and a few plays later tight end Alec Holler made a fantastic one-handed grab in the endzone to give UCF a 47-49 lead after the two-point conversion.

"I'm so proud of our team, it's hard to win in college football rivalry games. There's nothing like it and we got their best," said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. "We were in control of the game in the first half, but we had three turnovers in the second half. Our guys just kept fighting and we found a way to win."

With the win, UCF finishes the regular season with a 9-3 overall record and a 6-2 mark in AAC play. The Knights won the head-to-head tiebreaker with Cincinnati and will play in the AAC Championship game for the third time. UCF also appeared in the game in 2017 when the squad defeated Memphis 62-55 and 2018 when the Knights took days Memphis 64. when the Knights took down Memphis 56-41.

After winning the toss and electing to receive the opening kick, UCF put together a six-play, 75-yard drive to score on its first possession and take a 7-0 lead. Quarterback John Rhys Plumlee kept the read option and raced 64 yards down the sideline for his 10th rushing touchdown of the season, tying Jeff Godfrey for the second most rushing touchdowns by a quarterback in a single season.


UCF made it a 14-0 advantage later in the first quarter, as running back RJ Harvey scored on a three-yard rush as the Knights moved the ball 85 yards on 13 plays in 5:35.

Plumlee scored for the second time on the day with 11:25 remaining the second quarter with a 20-yard rush and he found Ryan O'Keefe for a touchdown pass to push the UCF lead to 28-0. South Florida scored with 40 seconds left in the first half on a two-yard grab from Sean Atkins.

At halftime, UCF owned 318 yards of total offense with 245 rushing yards, while the Knights limited the Bulls to 200 overall yards and forced a pair of South Florida turnovers.

NEW ORLEANS – In search of its fifth American Athletic Conference (AAC) Championship, 22nd-ranked UCF football came up just short of achieving its season-long goal as No. 18 Tulane earned a 45-28 victory Saturday night at Yulman Stadium.

Playing in its first conference championship game, Tulane was able to hold off a late comeback as the Knights cut the deficit to 31-28 with 9:48 remaining in the fourth quarter but the Green Wave responded with a touchdown to regain a 10-point lead and went on to win by 17 points.

"First of all, give Tulane all the credit. They're a really good team and we knew that coming in," said UCF head coach Gus Malzahn. "We didn't play our best, but they had something to do with that. I'm proud of our team and the way we fought back. We got off a tough start, but we fought back and made a three-point game at 31-28 and it was right there before us. Give them credit, they went down and scored to take the momentum back."

Following a tough first half, UCF scored 21 points and compiled 292 total yards but the Knights were unable to slow down the Green Wave offense as they logged 365 yards in the second half to score 28 points to secure the victory.

Tulane started fast in the game, scoring on its first two drives to own a 10-0 lead following the first quarter. UCF grabbed momentum in the contest after a big fourth down stop, as Walter Yates III powered through the Green Wave offensive line to bring down quarterback Michael Pratt for no gain and force the turnover.

The Knights quickly converted the turnover into points, as Isaiah Bowser rushed six times for 19 yards to put UCF within a few yards of the end zone and Xavier Townsend punched it in on a five-yard rush to score his first career touchdown.

A touchdown pass from Michael Pratt to Lawrence Keys III and a 60-yard touchdown run gave Tulane a 24-7 lead right after halftime. After missing most of the first half, as he battled a leg injury, UCF quarterback John Rhys Plumlee reentered the game in the third quarter and immediately provided the Knights with a spark.

Plumlee found wide receiver Kobe Hudson for a 17-vard touchdown pass to give the Pine Mountain, Georgia, native a team-leading six receiving TDs. The Green Wave answered with a big play, as Deuce Watts caught a short pass and raced 73 yards for a touchdown to make it a 31-14 advantage.

UCF picked the perfect time to pull out one of its special plays, as Plumlee threw a lateral pass to running back RJ Harvey, who then found Hudson for a 49-yard touchdown pass. It was Harvey's first career pass and first touchdown throw.

2005 SHERATON HAWAII BOWL

NEVADA	19

HONOLULU - UCF dropped a 49-48 overtime decision to Nevada in the 2005 Sheraton Hawaii Bowl, the first bowl game in school history. The Knights finished the season with an 8-5 record, just one year after going 0-11. The turnaround of seven games from 2004 placed UCF tied with seven other schools for the fourth-best single-season turnaround in Football Bowl Subdivision history.

UCF kicker Matt Prater, who had three field goals during the game, missed the game-tying extra point wide right, giving the Wolf Pack the win.

B.J. Mitchell ran for 178 yards and two touchdowns, and Robert Hubbard had 126 yards rushing and three touchdowns for the Wolf Pack (9-3), who finished with their best season since 1996 and spoiled UCF's bowl debut.

UCF's Brandon Marshall caught a 16-yard pass for a touchdown that tied the game at 42 with 55 seconds left. The score capped a four-play, 48-yard drive that took just 37 seconds.

Prater booted a 46-yard field goal with 1:32 left to draw UCF to 42-35, and the Knights recovered the onside kick with no time-outs left, setting up Marshall's dramatic catch that sent the game into overtime.

Trailing 32-28, the Wolf Pack took the lead on Hubbard's 5-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter. Nevada scored again on Rowe's 7-yard scoring pass to Travis Branzell for a 42-32 lead with 3:18 remaining.

Kevin Smith, Conference USA's Freshman of the Year, scored on a 78-yard run, the second longest run from scrimmage in UCF history, to give the Knights a 14-0 lead in the first quarter. The run was the longest in school history by a freshman and in UCF's 10-year Football Bowl Subdivision history. The longest run from scrimmage in UCF history was Elgin Davis' 79-yard scoring run vs. Samford (Nov. 15, 1986).

The 78-yard touchdown run by Smith was the second-longest run by a true freshman in the NCAA during the year. It also marked the longest run in Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl history.



Brandon Marshall was named UCF's MVP of the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl after posting 11 receptions for 210 yards and three touchdowns vs. Nevada.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. - UCF's memorable season came to a close in a 10-3 loss to Mississippi State in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl. Playing at the site of Paul "Bear" Bryant's final game, the Bulldogs used power running and a dominant defense to top the Knights.

Anthony Dixon powered in from the one for the winning touchdown with 1:54 to go and most valuable player Derek Pegues picked off two passes in a game featuring anemic offenses and 17 punts.

The Bulldogs (8-5) kept the Knights (10-4) out of the end zone and Kevin Smith from breaking the single-season rushing record. The junior finished with 119 yards, leaving him 61 shy of Barry Sanders' mark of 2,628 yards set for Oklahoma State in 1988.

"I was trying to find the holes, but they were playing faster than us," said Smith.

Dixon finished with 86 yards and became the seventh Bulldogs runner to go over 1,000 yards (1,066). But like the rest of the Bulldogs, he was ineffective much of the game.

The teams were tied 3-3 at halftime, mostly due to conservative play-calling.

Neither team converted a third down in the first half (0 for 16) as Mississippi State was held to 84 total yards and UCF to 79.

Kyle Israel had 12 yards passing and two interceptions by halftime and Mississippi State's Wes Carroll had 15 yards and an interception. UCF also didn't get much help from kicker Michael Torres, who gave the Knights a 3-0 lead in the second quarter with a 45-yard field goal, but missed from 32 and 37 in the second half.

"I think those missed field goals were big momentum breakers," UCF coach George O'Leary said. "Give Mississippi State credit. They fought hard and didn't turn the ball over. That usually means you're going to come up with a close win like that."

Mississippi State finished with 199 total yards and Blake McAdams tied the Liberty Bowl record with 11 punts. But the Bulldogs came up with just enough big plays after Keith Fitzhugh picked off Israel's pass at the Mississippi State 41 with 5:47 left.

Carroll, pulled the series before, returned and responded with two rushes for 17 yards and two completions for 15 yards. All went for first downs and spurred a 10-play, 59-yard drive that consumed 3:53 and finally led to a touchdown.

Derek Pegues, fittingly, made the final key defensive play, knocking down a fourth-down pass on UCF's final drive. The Bulldogs held the Knights to 219 yards and forced four turnovers.



ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. - The St. Petersburg Bowl presented what seemed to be a perfect storm for UCF on Saturday night with 20,000 of its fans packed inside Tropicana Field and a hot football team positioned for the first bowl victory in school history.

But an avalanche of errors combined with speedy, physical opponent in Rutgers ruined what could have been a dreamy, feel-good night for UCF's program and its hopeful

Down four points late in the second quarter, UCF allowed an interception return to sap its momentum and the Knights could never mount much of a comeback in a disappointing 45-24 loss to Rutgers in the second St. Petersburg Bowl presented by Beef 'O' Brady's.

"As I told the players, I'm embarrassed for the football team that we didn't go out and do a better job for the fanbase and for the football program," UCF coach George O'Leary said.

"I thought we beat ourselves a lot in a lot of situations out there," a frustrated O'Leary continued. "Right now, Rutgers defense was just a lot better than our offense and that was the difference in the game."

UCF (8-5) had hoped that the momentum of a strong finish to the regular season, one in which it won the final six conference games and knocked off Marshall, Houston and UAB down the stretch, would carry over to the bowl game. But problems on both sides of the ball sabotaged the Knights' chances of pulling off the upset in this game.

Playing before roughly 20,000 Knights fans among the Tropicana Field crowd of 29,763, UCF netted just 35 yards on the ground, 33 of them coming in the fourth quarter when the outcome of the game was already decided. And in the passing game, two Brett Hodges' interceptions led to 14 points for Rutgers, bowl winners for a fourth consecutive season. And UCF's defense yielded 380 yards and eight third-down conversions.

``The offense put up 14 points and a field goal early and defensively we played our butts off. We didn't want to go out like this, and this is so disappointing," senior defensive tackle Travis Timmons said. ``It's just such a big letdown. We're 0-14 now against Big East teams and 0-3 in bowl games. Torrell (Troup), Bruce (Miller) and myself along the defensive line wanted to change all of that, but unfortunately things didn't go the way we wanted them to."

Rutgers (9-4) played like an experienced team in its fifth consecutive bowl, using big plays on offense and an attacking defense to frustrate the Knights. Rutgers got six sacks and two interceptions defensively and freshman quarterback Tom Savage threw for 294 yards and two TDs.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. - A UCF football program clearly on the rise as a powerhouse to be reckoned with nationally registered a landmark victory in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl, beating Southeastern Conference power Georgia while registering the school's first-ever bowl victory.

When UCF sophomore safety Kemal Ishmael batted down a Hail Mary pass that seemed to hang in the air forever, it preserved No. 24 UCF's 10-6 defeat of Georgia and set off a wild celebration among the 8,000 Knights' fans who roared with noise inside the Liberty Bowl.

Doing something for a first time is never easy, and this first-ever bowl victory for UCF went down to the final seconds. Georgia quarterback Aaron Murray heaved a pass into the end zone for 6-foot-4 superstar wide out A.J. Green, but Ishmael was there to make the game-saving play that is sure to live in the history of the program for years to come.

Sophomore tailback Latavius Murray, the game's Outstanding Offensive Player and the MVP, scored on a 10-yard run with 9:01 to play to put the Knights ahead 10-6. And a defense that was dominant a couple of weeks ago in the Conference USA title game made it stand up. They held a Georgia offense that came in averaging 34.3 points a game to just two field goals and no touchdowns.

Freshman quarterback Jeff Godfrey capped a stellar first season on campus, helping the program win a C-USA title and the school's first bowl game. Let the comparisons to UCF legend Daunte Culpepper begin after he joined the school's lore. He completed 16 of 29 passes for 117 yards.

Georgia drove 61 yards on the first drive of the second half, but again had to settle for a Blair Walsh 42-yard field goal when the Knights got crucial pass break-ups from Ishmael and senior cornerback Justin Boddie. That 6-3 Georgia lead would be its final advantage of the game because they couldn't score against UCF's gritty defense.

UCF appeared to have scored first for the 13th time in 14 games when Quincy McDuffie took the opening kickoff back 98 yards. McDuffie, one of only nine players in the nation to return two kicks for touchdowns, hit a seam and sprinted for an apparent touchdown. However, the return was negated by a holding penalty on UCF special teams are Ronnie Weaver.

Georgia's first drive started at the 2-yard line following a 56-yard boot by UCF senior punter Blake Clingan, but the Bulldogs proceeded to march 95 yards in the next 15 plays. But the Knights stiffened up near the goal line, forcing Georgia to settle for a field goal that put the `Dogs up 3-0, and the Knights tied the game up 3-3 just before the half.



ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. - The slogan of UCF for 2012 was "Finish." And the Knights did just that with an exclamation point in the 2012 Beef `O' Brady's Bowl. UCF earned its second bowl victory in program history with a 38-17 win over Ball State.

Led by the all-time winningest senior class in school history, UCF clinched its 10th victory of the season behind an impressive effort by the duo of senior running back Latavius Murray and sophomore signal-caller Blake Bortles. Bortles capped his first full season in style, earning MVP honors while finishing 22-of-33 for 271 yards and three passing touchdowns. He also led the team with a career-high 80 yards on the ground and another score.

Murray was just as impressive, cashing in for three touchdowns (all in the first half) and 104 total yards, with 71 on the ground and 33 through the air on a team-high six catches.

The defense also did its part in the drubbing of the Cardinals. Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year Kemal Ishmael finished his career with 367 tackles after recording seven in the contest. He also forced his sixth career fumble and two pass break-ups. Fellow senior defensive end Troy Davis also went out in style with 1.5 sacks to crack the UCF top 10 with 18-career QB take downs.

After winning the toss and receiving the ball to start the game, UCF matriculated down the field, mixing the run and pass well on a 13-play, 78-yard drive that was capped off by a Bortles-to-Murray touchdown connection. The drive ate 7:33 off the clock and was aided by the sophomore QB's ability to evade the pass rush, while also connecting with rookie Breshad Perriman three times for 21 yards and a pair of first downs.

With the defense forcing a quick three-and-out, UCF's offense continued its impressive start with a seven-play 58-yard drive that saw Murray reach pay-dirt on a short 2-yard burst. The Knights closed out the first quarter outgaining the Cardinals, 160-15.

Ball State would settle in, however, with an 82-yard drive for seven points that saw Keith Wenning hit Willie Snead from seven-yards out to make it a 13-7 contest in the second quarter.

UCF responded with Bortles completely taking over on the ensuing drive. The Oviedo native became a dual threat on the drive, rushing three times for 32 yards, including a 6-yard scramble up the middle that saw him bulldoze a pair of Cardinal defenders on his way to the end zone. He capped the scoring drive with UCF's first two-point conversion since Sept. 5, 2009, hitting senior H-back Dontravius Floyd in the back of the end zone.

Ball State drove right back into UCF territory, reaching the Knights' 10-yard line prior to freshman DL Thomas Niles sacking Wenning for an 11-yard loss. The third-down tackle for loss resulted in a much longer field-goal attempt, which sailed well left of the uprights.

Starting on its own 32-yard line with just 55 seconds left in the half, Bortles hit junior Jeff Godfrey and Murray for 12 and 10 yards before launching a 45-yard beauty to a streaking Perriman, who finished with a career-best 90 yards on five catches, on the far side line. The career-long reception led to Bortles hitting Murray for the second time in the half, this time from five yards out with just five ticks left on the first-half clock.

After a 45-yard field goal by Schott to make it 28-10 with 7:54 left in the third quarter, the Cardinals attempted an onside kick that redshirt sophomore running back Cedric Thompson grabbed out of the air safely to set up the Knights at the BSU 49-yard line.

Bortles continued to shred the Ball State defense with the prime field position. He racked up 41 of the next 49 yards through the air, tying his career record and a Beef `O' Brady's Bowl mark with touchdown pass No. 3 from seven yards out to fellow sophomore J.J. Worton.

Sophomore Shawn Moffitt would cap the Knights' scoring on the year with a 25-yard field goal to make it 38-10. The Cardinals tacked on a late touchdown to account for the final tally of 38-17. On the season, UCF finished with 496 total points, second all-time in program history.

UCF came into the season with just one victory over a ranked opponent and ended the historic effort with their second over a ranked squad in 2013 alone. To make the accomplishment even more impressive, both wins over ranked teams came against Top 10 opponents.

Junior quarterback Blake Bortles was named the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl Offensive Player of the Game after racking up 301 passing yards and three touchdowns to go along with a career-high 93 yards rushing and a touchdown.

UCF's offense matched Baylor's high-powered attack every step of the way. The Bears came into the contest leading the NCAA in scoring offense and total offense, but it was the Knights who racked up 52 points and 558 total yards for the victory. The points and yardage were the largest totals ever by UCF in a bowl game and against a ranked opponent.

Much was said before the game about how the Knights' defense would stack up against Baylor's up-tempo offense. UCF, however, came into the game with the 13th-ranked scoring defense in the nation. The Knights forced seven Baylor punts and two turnovers, while holding the Bears 11 points and 75 yards beneath their season averages.

The Knights began to put the wild back-and-forth affair on ice when Storm Johnson ripped off a 40-yard touchdown run to give UCF a 49-35 advantage with 10:26 remaining. Johnson set a new career high with 124 rushing yards and matched his season-high mark with three rushing touchdowns. The Knights accounted for the winning total with a 36-yard field goal from Shawn Moffitt with less than five minutes remaining.

UCF got off to a roaring start. After receiving the opening kickoff, the Knights churned out 76 yards in six rush attempts, capped off by an 11-yard touchdown burst by Johnson. This marked the first touchdown drive of the season for the Knights that came without a single pass attempt.

After forcing a three-and-out, the Black and Gold again marched down the field, primarily on the strength of its rushing attack. After Bortles found Breshad Perriman streaking down the left sideline for a 34-yard gain, UCF returned to its ground control attack with four consecutive running plays. Johnson's 2-yard touchdown plunge gave the Knights a 14-0 advantage just eight minutes into the contest.

Junior Rannell Hall proved once again that his nickname, "Speedy" is appropriate as he took two short, second-quarter passes to the house. Both catches were made near the line of scrimmage and featured Hall out-running the Baylor secondary, with help from some terrific blocking from fellow wideouts Josh Reese, J.J. Worton and Taylor Oldham.

While Bortles brought home Offensive Player of the Game honors, Terrance Plummer was named Defensive Player of the Game. The junior linebacker racked up a game-high 14 tackles, including half a sack. Sean Maag (12 tackles) and Clayton Geathers (10 tackles) both recorded double-digit stops as well.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. - The UCF Knights fell just short of another stirring comeback at Tropicana Field in the Bitcoin St. Petersburg Bowl. UCF trailed North Carolina State 34-13 in the fourth quarter, and mounted a rally before falling, 34-27.

A Niklas Sade field goal put the Wolfpack on top by 21 points with 12:37 remaining in the contest. But senior captain Josh Reese, who scored all three of the UCF (9-4) touchdowns, hauled in a 14-yard strike from quarterback Justin Holman less than three minutes later, bringing a huge, partisan UCF crowd back into the game.

When the UCF defense got a three-and-out, the Knights' faithful really began believing. However, a Holman interception slowed the Knights' momentum mid-way through the fourth quarter.

NC State (8-5) had two empty possessions, punting and missing a field goal, but a great deal of time ran off the clock.

The Knights started moving the ball again when they took over with 2:56 remaining. Just 1:12 later, Reese found the end zone a third time on a 2-yard pass from Holman. That score pulled UCF within seven points, 34-27.

With 1:44 remaining and no timeouts, the Knights needed to recover an onside kick to have a chance. NC State secured the kick and was able to run out the clock.

Meanwhile, thousands of Knight fans chanted "UCF! UCF! UCF!" and saluted their team as they left the field. An estimated 20,000-plus UCF fans made the short trip and were a part of a near-sellout of 26,675.

The Knights opened the scoring on the first possession of the game. A 40-yard Shawn Moffitt field goal put the Knights on top 3-0. But NC State answered on its first possession with an 18-yard halfback pass to Jaylen Samuels to go on top 7-3. The Knights regained the lead 10-7 early in the second quarter. Holman rifled a pass to Reese at the goal line from six yards out.

But it was all Wolfpack for the next two-plus quarters, as NC State outscored the Knights 27-3 to go on top by 21 points. Wolfpack quarterback Jacoby Brissett found a wide open Johnathan Alston for a 37-yard score to make it 14-10. An NC State field goal with 3:16 remaining in the first half pushed the score to 17-10 at halftime. Matt Dayes ran up the middle for a 19-yard score on the opening drive of the second half, putting the Wolfpack on top 24-10.

The Knights got three points back after Wolfpack turnover, with Moffitt hitting from 36 yards out to make it 24-13. NC State answered with another Dayes score, as he went untouched up the middle late in the third, making it 31-13.

For the game, the Wolfpack out-gained the Knights 487-373. Brissett was named the game's MVP after passing for 262 yards and rushing for 31 more. Holman threw for 291 yards on 23-of-53 with three scores to pace the UCF offense. Breshad Perriman had nine receptions for 138 yards. Defensively, UCF was led by senior captain Clayton Geathers, who racked up 14 tackles.



ORLANDO – The UCF football team couldn't overcome a number of miscues in Saturday night's Cure Bowl, falling to Arkansas State 31-13.

Despite the outcome, UCF head coach Scott Frost expressed the amount of pride he has in what the Knights accomplished this season. He had a message of gratitude for the seniors, who played their final game in the Black & Gold.

"What this team has accomplished, I'm proud of them, happy for them. I'm hungry to accomplish more," Frost said. "I had a simple message for our team. I thanked the seniors. Everything we say about our seniors we mean from the bottom of our heart. These guys could have gone a lot of different directions. They didn't have to sacrifice and put in the effort and be leaders for our team and totally take a new direction in a new way of doing things that our coaching staff was asking them to do. They all did; they all led us. I'm proud to be their coach."

The Red Wolves scored 14 points off turnovers and added a touchdown on a blocked punt, which opened the scoring. Those 17 points were a huge difference in a contest where the two defenses were dominant. Arkansas State rushed for just 29 yards, while the Knights only managed 12. UCF passed for 211 yards, while the Red Wolves threw it for 205. Neither squad managed more than 234 yards. Combined, the two teams were 6-for-35 on third down.

"I think when either team's defense is on the field it was the superior unit on the field and we kind of knew that going in," Frost said.

A nightmare first quarter for UCF left Arkansas State with a 17-0 lead after 15 minutes of play. A blocked punt was recovered in the end zone for the Red Wolves. A long Arkansas State pass play led to a field goal to make it 10-0. On the ensuing kickoff, a fumble set the Red Wolves up with a short field that was converted into a touchdown to account for the 17 points.

The Knights found some offense in the second quarter. Tre'Quan Smith made another of his patented circus catches. The 34-yard completion set up an 11-yard scoring strike from McKenzie Milton to a wide-open Taylor Oldham. Following an Arkansas State fumble, Matthew Wright converted a 45-yard field goal to pull the Knights within seven, 17-10 at the intermission.

But a 75-yard touchdown pass less than a minute into the third quarter swung the momentum back to Arkansas State. Wright's second field goal of the game late in the third quarter got the Knights back within 11, 24-13. The Red Wolves took over deep in UCF territory late in the third quarter on a fumbled UCF punt and turned it into a touchdown on the first play of the fourth quarter, accounting for the final tally.

ATLANTA, Ga. (UCFKnights.com) – Behind 21 unanswered points in the second half, the UCF football team capped a perfect 13-0 season with a 34-27 win over No. 7 Auburn in the 2018 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl on New Year's Day.

Down seven late in the third quarter, the No. 12 Knights stormed back into the game. Quarterback McKenzie Milton hit Otis Anderson on a screen pass that the freshman took to the end zone to tie the game with 1:30 to play in the third. Following a Tigers punt, the Knights offense drove back into Auburn territory. Milton danced around a few would-be tacklers, stepped up in the pocket and found a cutting Dredrick Snelson from eight yards out to give the Knights a 27-20 lead.

Auburn took over at their own 20-yard line with 6:58 left to play and a chance to even the score. Tigers quarterback Jarrett Stidham threw a pass that was intended for a cutting receiver for a short gain, but senior Chequan Burkett stepped in front to intercept the pass. The native of Montgomery, Ala., had no one in front of him and sprinted 45 yards to the end zone for the game-winning score.

Burkett, along with Shaquem Griffin and the UCF defense, gave the Tigers all they could handle. UCF racked up a season-high six sacks and 11 tackles for loss. UCF recorded a pair of takeaways. In addition to Burkett's pick-six, A.J. Wooten set up the Knights' first touchdown in the second quarter. The redshirt junior jarred the ball loose from Stidham, and it bounced into the hands of Tre Neal, which later led to an 18-yard scoring run for Milton.

- Milton was 16-of-35 for 242 and a pair of passing touchdowns and added a score on the ground, earning Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl Offensive MVP honors.
- After slow start in the first half, Milton was nearly unstoppable in the second half. He completed 13 of 18 passes for 212 yards.
- The sophomore led the team in rushing with a career-high 116 yards for 8.9 yards per carry. Milton now holds the UCF record for single-season rushing yards by a quarterback. The previous record was 566, set by Jeff Godfrey in 2010. Milton finished the season with 613.

GLENDALE, Ariz. (UCFKnights.com) – Senior defensive lineman Titus Davis took a knee on the 35-yard-line, his silence only interrupted by teammates who approached to extend their hand or a hug.

Senior linebacker Pat Jasinski hugged quarterback McKenzie Milton and told him he loved him like a brother.

Senior punter Mac Loudermilk thanked a slew of teammates one by one before taking a moment for himself to stand near the end zone and soak up the scene before him as memories of the past five years brought tears to his eyes.

The No. 7 UCF football team didn't get the ride-off-into-the-sunset ending it was hoping for in its 40-32 loss to No. 11 LSU at Tuesday's PlayStation Fiesta Bowl.

But this journey was something they'll never forget.

"I wouldn't trade this for anything in the world. Do I wish this game would have come out a little bit differently? Yeah. It's bittersweet," Loudermilk said. "What I want is for people to know this team pushes through any adversity there is, no matter what it is. I hope we stir the pot for expansion. I hope we've opened some people's eyes that we play real ball, and we can play with anybody. There is no limit to this team. Orlando has a hometown team and I think the school is only going to skyrocket from here."

The Streak that Knight Nation will Always Remember

The Knights' spectacular win streak came to an end after 25 games and a span of 745 days, dating to Aug. 31, 2017. The accomplishment will be listed in the NCAA record book among the longest win streaks ever recorded and marks the fourth-longest win streak this millennium (Miami, 34 – 2000-03; Florida State, 29 – 2012-14; Alabama, 26 – 2015-16).

During the last two years, the Knights won two War On I-4 rivalry matchups against USF. They bested four different nationally ranked opponents. They set an American Athletic Conference record for all-conference honorees in a single season. They welcomed ESPN's iconic show College GameDay to campus for the first time. They won two conference championships. They won the 2018 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and celebrated a national championship season.

And despite all that, those accomplishments will always fall second to the brotherhood and family they gained.

"I told the team in the locker room, 'You wipe y'all tears,'" linebacker Nate Evans said. "I know it's hard for some of these seniors, it's their last game. But football doesn't last forever. It's just a game. It's going to end. The memories that we have together as this UCF football team (are) going to last forever."

Greg McCrae gave the Knights their first touchdown of the 2019 PlayStation Fiesta Bowl, one of his 10 rushing scores on the season. As a sophomore, McCrae rushed for 1,182 yards on the ground



TAMPA – After nearly a month off from playing, the UCF football team got things started quickly on Monday afternoon, scoring 21 points in the first eight minutes on the way to 48-25 victory over Marshall at the 2019 Bad Boy Mowers Gasparilla Bowl at Raymond James Stadium.

Two of the Knights' (10-3) first three scores came from the defense, as Richie Grant snagged his first pick of the season and returned it 39 yards for a touchdown on the third play from scrimmage.

After punts from both teams, freshman Dillon Gabriel led a 6-play, 65-yard drive that culminated with a 26-yard Greg McCrae touchdown to put the Knights up 14-0 less than six minutes into the game.

Marshall (8-5) then began a drive at its own 21-yard line and advanced it to UCF's 40-yard line, before the Knights defense struck again. Tre'Mon Morris-Brash knocked down a backwards pass and picked it up to record the first forced fumble and the first fumble recovery of his career. Better than that, he then ran 55 yards to the end zone to give his team a 21-0 advantage it never looked back from.

A penalty-riddled, defensive-minded second quarter came and went with the Knights going into the locker room with a 24-7 lead.

The offense took its turn after the break, as the two teams totaled 39 combined points in the third quarter. Following the hour-long period, UCF found itself leading 45-25.

Gabriel, who was named the game's Most Valuable Player after the win, hit Otis Anderson on a 4th-and-7 screen pass that went 35 yards to paydirt to get things started in the quarter. Gabriel also rushed for a score and connected with Marlon Williams on a 75-yard score down the sideline to give the Knights a 45-25 lead heading into the final frame.

The Knights' offense controlled the clock and the defense kept the Herd at bay in the fourth quarter. Dylan Barnas's second field goal of the game, at the 9:01 mark, was the lone score of the period, and UCF left Tampa with the 48-25 victory over its former rival.

The Knights' 586 yards of total offense and 310 yards rushing both marked program records in a bowl game, while the 48 points were just four points shy of the 52 scored against Baylor in the 2014 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

The defense totaled five turnovers on the day, another UCF bowl-game record.

The game's MVP, Gabriel finished the day 14-of-24 for 260 yards passing with two touchdowns and no interceptions. The true freshman also added a scored on the ground.

UCF finished the 2019 season at 10-3, the program's third straight 10-win season, a first for UCF.

BOCA RATON, Fla. - The UCF football team closed out the 2020 season at the RoofClaim.com Boca Raton Bowl, falling to 13th-ranked BYU by a score of 49-23 Tuesday evening at FAU Stadium in Boca Raton.

The Knights concluded the campaign with a record of 6-4, marking the winningest four-season span and winningest five-season span in program history, dating back to 2017 and 2016, respectively.

BYU (11-1) scored the first 21 points of the game and never looked back, leading 35-10 at halftime and 49-17 after three quarters of play.

Cougars quarterback Zach Wilson was 26-of-34 for 425 yards with three touchdowns through the air. He also ran for two scores on five rushes for 12 yards on the ground. Tyler Allgeier led the BYU ground attack with 19 rushes for 173 yards and a touchdown.

For UCF, quarterback Dillon Gabriel went 21-of-45 for 217 yards and threw two touchdown passes, one to Jaylon Robinson and one to Jacob Harris. Greg McCrae rushed 18 times for 77 yards and a score on the ground.

Jermaine McMillian led a depleted UCF defense with a career-high 11 total tackles, while Tatum Bethune had five tackles and a sack.

Tuesday marked the fifth consecutive season that the Knights have played in a bowl game, the first such stretch in program history.

TAMPA – It marked UCF's 50th win in the last five seasons. That's 11 more than any other team in the state of Florida during that span, including the Gators. The Knights added to that Sunshine State dominance on Thursday, defeating Florida 29-17 in the 2021 Union Home Mortgage Gasparilla Bowl at a full-capacity Raymond James Stadium.

It's UCF's third bowl victory since 2017, which is also the most of any team in the state. And this is all before the Knights begin play in the Big 12 Conference, which could begin as early as the 2023 season.

In head coach Gus Malzahn's first season at UCF, he overcame many injuries to key players, and one of his own – a broken bone in his leg suffered late in the regular season – while leading his squad to nine wins with a true freshman at quarterback.

Keene went 7-3 as a starter for the Knights, finishing an efficient 14-of-22 for 144 yards and 54-yard touchdown pass to the game's Most Valuable Player, Ryan O'Keefe.

O'Keefe finished with seven receptions for 85 yards and the one score, while also rushing for 110 yards on four carries and totaled a Gasparilla Bowl record 251 all-purpose yards with a pair of kick returns for 56 yards.

He, running back Isaiah Bowser, and a stout defense carried the Knights to victory.

Bowser, who missed plenty of time this season due to injuries, returned in fine form, carrying the ball a career-high and Gasparilla Bowl record 35 times for 155 yards and two touchdowns. The Knight leaned on the senior back in the second half, giving him the ball 23 times, which led to 116 yards as UCF put the game away.

UCF outscored the Gators 20-7 in the second half and didn't allow Florida to score after a third-quarter touchdown that gave the Blue and Orange a 17-16 lead. The Knights held the Gators scoreless for almost 23 minutes to end the game.

The Knights had a pair of sacks from Cam Goode and Jeremiah Jean-Baptiste and a trio of pass breakups from Davonte Brown to help keep Florida at bay in the second half.

Special teams did its part too, led by Daniel Obarski's three made field goals. The kicker hit from 34 yards, 21 yards, and 33 yards to tie the UCF record for most field goals made in a game.

The Knights finished the season 9-4, recording nine or more wins for the fourth time in the last five seasons, and have a whole lot of momentum heading into the offseason.
