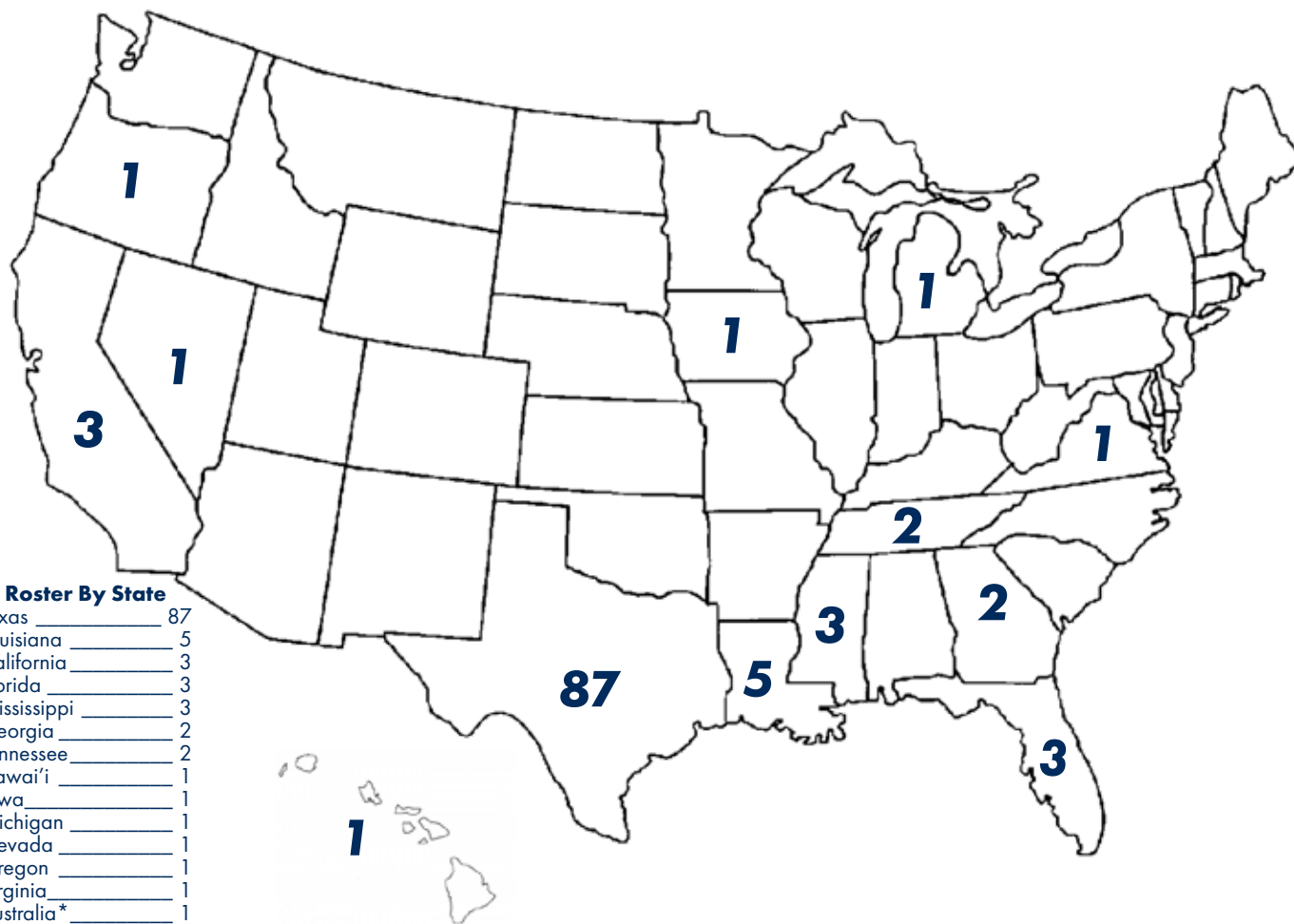

BUILDING THE NEXT GENERATION OF GREAT COLLEGE PROGRAMS

Conference USA is building the next generation of great college programs with innovative partnerships, dynamic leadership and diverse membership. A league rich in history and tradition, C-USA prides itself on upholding unwavering standards of success and integrity throughout the ever-changing landscape of collegiate athletics. The commitment to excellence, leadership and its student-athletes in competition, academics and community remains at the forefront as the league embarks on its 28th season.

Conference USA membership for the 2022-23 season includes Charlotte, FIU, Florida Atlantic, Louisiana Tech, Middle Tennessee, North Texas, Rice, UAB, UTEP, UTSA and WKU. Additionally, Dallas Baptist joins competition in baseball as an associate member.

Debuting in 1995, Conference USA teams have combined for 129 bowl appearances in football, 114 NCAA Tournament appearances in basketball, including three Final Fours, 78 NCAA baseball appearances including six College World Series berths, 100 NCAA soccer tournament appearances including five trips to the College Cup, and 41 individual national champions in track and field and cross country. The league celebrated its first team national championship with Marshall winning the 2020 Men's Soccer College Cup with a thrilling overtime victory.

Success is not limited to athletic achievement as more than 265 Conference USA student-athletes have garnered Academic All-America honors, and more than 877 have achieved academic all-district laurels and thousands of student-athletes have earned a college degree.

Conference USA sponsors competition in 18 sports – eight for men (baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field) and 10 for women (basketball, beach volleyball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball).

The league promotes the scholar-athlete ideal, honoring outstanding academic achievement with numerous conference-sponsored awards, including the Commissioner's Honor Roll and the Commissioner's Academic Medal as well as sport-specific All-Academic teams.

C-USA annually awards 11 Jim Castañeda Postgraduate Scholarships, along with the Sport Academic Awards, Scholar-Athletes of the Year and the Institutional Academic Excellence Award. Additionally, Conference USA presents a Spirit of Service Award three times each year, recognizing student-athletes who excel on the field, in the classroom and give back to the community through significant service efforts and participation.

With a commitment to community involvement, the conference developed several initiatives to maintain strong ties in C-USA cities, as well as with fans and alumni across the country. C-USA schools also place a priority on giving back to their communities through volunteer service with local and national organizations. Individually, student-athletes are recognized each season through the Spirit of Service award.

In addition to the numerous NCAA Tournament berths, C-USA has sent three softball teams to the Women's College World Series and four volleyball teams to the NCAA Sweet 16. The league has also had 41 national champions in NCAA track and field competition, one national champion in diving, and numerous NCAA individual and team competitors in cross country, golf, swimming, tennis, and track and field. The Michael L. Slive Athlete of the Year Award, named after the league's first commissioner, recognizes the most outstanding male and female student-athlete each season.

SUCCESS OFF THE FIELD

C-USA institutions are among the nation's best in academic performance of student-athletes, bolstered by the fact that student-athletes at league schools have a higher graduation rate than the general student population. Among C-USA's 5,300 student-athletes, there are champions off the playing field as well. In 27 years, more than 52,000 student-athletes have been named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll or received the Commissioner's Academic Medal, indicative of outstanding achievement in the classroom. Honor Roll is awarded to student-athletes in Conference sponsored sports that have achieved a 3.0 cumulative GPA or above, while Academic Medal recipients have achieved a 3.75 cumulative GPA or above.

C-USA MULTIMEDIA PARTNERS

C-USA enjoys significant exposure through various multimedia partners. Partnerships include CBS Sports Network, ESPN and Stadium. The multi-tiered selection process that is rooted in partnering with all entities has substantially increased the number of national, regional and digital appearances for football, men's and women's basketball and conference Olympic sports.

CUSA.TV

Conference USA introduced CUSA TV in the fall of 2016. Powered by Sidearm Sports, CUSA TV includes live streaming of non-televised events, video on demand, specialty events, regular-season and championship event highlights, press conferences and feature stories. Available exclusively at CUSA.tv, it is one-stop online access to the league and each school has its own branded channel and URL.

C-USA IN THE COMMUNITY

Conference USA values the performances of its student-athletes on and off the playing field. The league also places an emphasis on cultivating relationships in C-USA member communities through volunteer service and has implemented several initiatives designed to maintain strong ties within our communities, as well as with fans and alumni across the country. Individually, student-athletes are recognized each season through the Spirit of Service award.

GOVERNANCE

Conference USA has significant representation in the NCAA governance structure. The presidents of the member institutions serve as the league's Board of Directors.

A PROUD HISTORY

Conference USA was formed in 1995 and quickly emerged as one of the nation's top conferences. The conference unveiled its name, logo and commissioner April 24, 1995, in Chicago. The league's charter members were Charlotte, Cincinnati, DePaul, Houston, Louisville, Marquette, Memphis, Saint Louis, Southern Miss, Tulane, UAB and USF. Eleven of the institutions began athletic participation in 1995, while Houston joined competition in the fall of 1996.

The league's headquarters were established in Chicago and, after nine years, relocated to the current office in Dallas, Texas. Britton Banowsky was named Commissioner in October 2002, succeeding Mike Slive, the league's first Commissioner. In October 2015, Judy MacLeod became the league's third Commissioner.

C-USA added East Carolina (September, 1996) and the United States Military Academy (March, 1997) as football members. ECU began league competition in 1997; Army in 1998 and UAB began football play in 1999. The league brought in TCU and ECU (1999) for all sports and they began competition in 2001. USF started C-USA football in 2003. Marshall, Rice, SMU, Tulsa, UCF and UTEP became full-time Conference USA members for all sports in 2005.

In 2013, charter member Charlotte returned to C-USA and was joined by new members FIU, Florida Atlantic, Louisiana Tech, Middle Tennessee, North Texas, Old Dominion and UTSA. WKU joined the league on July 1, 2014.

In November 2021, Conference USA added Jacksonville State, Liberty, New Mexico State and Sam Houston State to join the league on July 1, 2023.



2022 RYAN C-USA FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Conference USA will host its 18th annual football championship game in 2022.

The event, slated for Friday, Dec. 2, will be televised by CBS Sports Network. The team with the highest league winning percentage will serve as host site for the game.

The title game will feature the top two finishers in the league’s regular season, as there will be a divisionless format in 2022. Eleven different schools have hosted the first 17 championship games.

« 2022 CONFERENCE USA BOWL SYNOPSIS »

Conference USA's bowl lineup is in year three of the six-year cycle from 2020-25. The conference is guaranteed seven bowl appearances in each year of the new cycle and will have associations with up to 16 different bowls.

As part of the current bowl cycle, C-USA will annually send teams to the Bahamas Bowl against a Mid-American Conference opponent, and to the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl, against a Sun Belt Conference school. The league has participated in all seven Bahamas Bowls and has placed a team in the New Orleans Bowl 16 times in its first 20 years.

C-USA will also continue its long-standing relationship with the SoFi Hawai'i Bowl. The league is set to participate in the Honolulu-based game this season and again in 2024.

As previously announced, the league will continue its relationship with the Radiance Technologies Independence Bowl. C-USA is guaranteed to send a team to the Shreveport, Louisiana-based bowl in 2025, while holding a secondary agreement with the bowl in the other years of the cycle.

The conference's remaining guaranteed selections in the cycle (either four or five per season) will include the LendingTree Bowl (Mobile, Alabama) or from among 11 games which are owned and operated by ESPN Events.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

C-USA and the College Football Playoff

As a member of the College Football Playoff, Conference USA will be a part of one of the CFP bowls if it produces the highest rated champion from among the American Athletic, C-USA, Mid-American, Mountain West and Sun Belt Conferences.

The Playoff

During the 2014-15 season, college football entered a new era when postseason playoffs began. The format is simple: top four teams, two semifinals played in bowl games, and a national championship game played in a different city each year. Each semifinal will be played during the New Year's holiday with the national championship game in prime time on a Monday night at least a week later.

The Selection Committee

A selection committee will choose the four teams for the playoff based on their performance during the regular season, including, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won, and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that No. 1 will play No. 4 in one semifinal and No. 2 will meet No. 3 in the other, with the two winners advancing to the national championship game.

The Rotation

The semifinals will rotate among six different bowls, extending the experience to more fans. In the years when the bowls are not hosting semifinals, the bowls will feature eight other teams in four compelling matchups.

For the 2022-23 season, the Capital One Orange Bowl (Dec. 30) the Rose Bowl Game presented by Northwestern Mutual, the Allstate Sugar Bowl (Dec. 31), and Goodyear Cotton Bowl (Jan. 2) will host its regular bowl games, while the Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl (Dec. 31), VRBO Fiesta Bowl (Dec. 1) will host semifinals. The College Football Championship will be held on Monday, Jan. 9 in Inglewood, California, at SoFi Stadium.

UTSA MEDIA POLICY

Media Coverage

The UTSA Athletics Communications Office assists members of the media with their coverage of all 17 Roadrunners sports by coordinating interviews and providing feature ideas, notes, statistics and any other information needed. Media members may check the athletics department’s website — goUTSA.com — for the latest information on all UTSA sports.

Football Season Credentials

Season credentials and parking requests for UTSA home games must be requested by emailing Associate Athletics Director for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu). Only media covering the Roadrunners on a consistent basis and on assignment will be considered. A lost season credential will result in passes being issued on a game-by-game basis, if available.

Football Single-Game Credentials

Credential and parking requests for individual home games should be emailed to Associate Athletics Director for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu) by 5 p.m. on Wednesday of the respective week, but early requests are encouraged and appreciated. Credentials only will be granted to media on assignment. For UTSA road games, please contact Associate Athletics Director for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu) by 5 p.m. on Monday of the preceding week for the game you wish to cover and include any parking needs you may have.

Non-Football Credentials

Media wishing to apply for credentials to cover other UTSA home events should send a request to the Athletics Communications Office for the sport they wish to cover at least 24 hours prior to the event. These credentials WILL NOT allow access to cover UTSA home football games.

Credential Will Call

Credentials can be mailed upon request or picked up in person with proper identification at the Athletics Communications Office located on the UTSA Main Campus. For home football games, media that has not yet received credentials may pick those up beginning three hours prior to kickoff at the Alamodome Media Entrance located at the East 50-yard line glass doors.

Football Game Day Parking

Media with a UTSA Football Game Day Parking Pass may park in Lot A (south of Alamodome/northeast corner of IH-37 & Cesar Chavez Boulevard interchange). Requests must be made to Associate Athletics Director for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu) at least one week in advance. Passes are issued on a single-game basis only and there are limited quantities per game. There are no season parking passes for UTSA football games.

Non-Game Day Media Parking

Media needing to drive onto UTSA’s Main Campus for interviews may request a visitor parking permit by contacting the UTSA

Athletics Communications Office for the sport they are covering at least 24 hours in advance of arrival.

Alamodome Access

All media members must enter the Alamodome through the media entrance located on the East 50-yard line glass doors. The entrance and all press work areas will open three hours prior to kickoff. No media members will be allowed to enter the Alamodome through the South Loading Dock. A UTSA-issued credential or game ticket is required for entrance to all home football games.

Press Box Services

The Alamodome press box is located on the Mezzanine Level (Level 3) of the east side of the facility. A UTSA-issued credential is required for entrance to the press box. Game notes, flip cards, game programs, official stats, notes and quotes will be provided online. A limited amount of hard copies of flip cards and final stats will be available to the media. Wireless internet access is complimentary for working media members. Media members who wish to order a dedicated internet connection or phone line must contact Jason Bippert of the Alamodome at jason.bippert@sanantonio.gov. Seats will be assigned according to UTSA’s credential criteria.

Live Statistics

UTSA will provide live statistics online at goUTSA.com for all home events and real-time statistics to credentialed media through a private URL that will be provided on football game days.

Photographers/Videographers

Photographers and videographers on assignment are welcome to shoot all UTSA home events with proper credentials requested through the Athletics Communications Office. For sideline access at home football games at the Alamodome, photographers and videographers will be required to check in for a photo vest. A work room is located in Meeting Room A near the northeast tunnel to the field and it is equipped with complimentary hard-wired and wireless internet access, flip cards and refreshments. Photographers who wish to order a dedicated internet connection must contact Jason Bippert of the Alamodome at jason.bippert@sanantonio.gov. Photographers and videographers will not have a reserved seat in the Alamodome press box. Upper photo and video area requests should be made in the press box at least two hours prior to kickoff.

Postgame Interview Rooms

Postgame interview rooms for all home football games are located on Field Level (Level 1) on the east side of the Alamodome. UTSA will hold a postgame press conference for head coach Jeff Traylor and requested student-athletes after a 10-minute cooling off period. The UTSA locker room is closed and there will be no interviews conducted on the field except for the television network that is broadcasting the game. All requests for the visiting team should be made with that team's SID.



Interview Policy

All interviews with UTSA student-athletes and coaches must be arranged at least 24 hours in advance by contacting the Athletics Communications Office. Telephone interviews are available to the media on a "call-back" basis ONLY and at a time that is convenient for the interviewee. Contact information (i.e., cell phone numbers) for student-athletes and coaches will not be provided to the media.

Football Media Availability

During the season, UTSA head coach Jeff Traylor will be available on Monday mornings at a weekly media roundtable. Traylor and student-athletes will be available following practice on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

Practice Policies

UTSA football practices will be held on Main Campus (unless otherwise noted). Practices are closed, but portions of some practices may be open to members of accredited media outlets with a UTSA-issued credential. Media planning to shoot this portion of practice should contact Associate AD for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu) to confirm arrangements and practice times. Questions pertaining to practice schedules and specific media information regarding coverage for all other sports may be directed to the UTSA Athletics Communications Office.

Introduced as UTSA's third head coach on Dec. 9, 2019, Jeff Traylor has had an immediate and positive impact on the program, university and city of San Antonio in a short period of time.

Traylor has turned around the program by instilling his 210 Triangle of Toughness culture, producing results on and off the field. The Gilmer, Texas, native took over a team that won a combined seven games in the two seasons prior to his arrival and has led the Roadrunners to a 19-7 record in his first two years at the helm, the best two-year ledger by any UTSA coach.

Under Traylor's tutelage, UTSA enjoyed a record-setting campaign in 2021. The Roadrunners won their first 11 games, were nationally ranked (as high as No. 15) for the first time in school history and captured the program's first league title by winning the Conference USA Championship with a 49-41 victory over WKU on Dec. 3. UTSA capped the season with its second straight and third overall bowl appearance against San Diego State in the Tropical Smoothie Café Frisco Bowl.

Traylor has been honored for his success as the 2021 C-USA Coach of the Year, the AFCA FBS Regional Coach of the Year for Region 4 and a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award, AFCA National Coach of the Year and George Munger College Coach Of the Year Award. A member of the Paul "Bear" Bryant Awards Coach of the Year watch list, he was chosen as the 2021 San Antonio Express-News Sportsman of the Year.

Traylor's student-athletes have received an unprecedented number of conference and national awards during his tenure. A school-record 23 Roadrunners received recognition on the all-conference and C-USA All-Freshman teams in 2021 with Sincere McCormick earning C-USA Offensive Player of the Year accolades for the second straight season. McCormick also was an Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award finalist and a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award for the second straight year. Frank Harris landed on semifinalist lists for the Davey O'Brien and Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Awards, while Hunter Duplessis was a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy for the second year in a row. Harris and McCormick each collected Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award National Player of the Week honors, while Harris also was a Manning Award Quarterback of the Week. Additionally, UTSA collected nine C-USA weekly awards during the 2021 season.

Traylor guided the Roadrunners to a 7-5 overall record, a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and an appearance in the 2020 SERVPRO First Responder Bowl in his first season at the helm. The Roadrunners received votes in a national poll, collecting two votes for the Associated Press Top 25 following the 3-0 start, for the first time in program history and the 3-0 start and seven wins are the most by a first-year UTSA head coach.

Lucas Dean, Duplessis and McCormick received All-America accolades, while McCormick also was a finalist for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award. Additionally, Duplessis (Campbell Trophy, Lou Groza) and McCormick (Doak Walker) were national award semifinalists, while

Harris made the Davey O'Brien QB Class of 2020. Dean was tabbed C-USA Special Teams Player of the Year and McCormick was named C-USA Offensive Player of the Year, while a total of 23 Roadrunners were recognized by the league's head coaches, including 19 as all-conference and four on the all-freshman team. The Roadrunners collected a program-record 11 C-USA Player of the Week certificates and a trio of national player of the week accolades in McCormick (Earl Campbell Tyler Rose National Player of the Week), Dean (Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week) and Rashad Wisdom (Jim Thorpe Award Player of the Week).

UTSA student-athletes have been honored for their work in the classroom under Traylor, as well. Duplessis was the 2020-21 C-USA Football Scholar Athlete of the Year, a 2021 CoSIDA Academic All-American, a C-USA All-Academic Team selection and a CoSIDA Academic All-District pick. In 2021, Dean and Ahoifitu Maka joined Duplessis on the C-USA All-Academic Team and CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team, with Maka earning the latter nod for the second time.

Traylor has more than 30 years of coaching experience including a highly successful 15-year career as head coach at Gilmer High School, where he led teams to three state championships and two state runner-up finishes and won more than 87% of his games, a winning percentage that ranks 10th all-time in Texas high school history.

Prior to coming to the Alamo City, the Gilmer native served as associate head coach and running backs coach for two seasons at Arkansas, where he helped sign the school's first top-20 recruiting class. Prior to that, he served in the same role at SMU for the 2017 season. He began his collegiate coaching career as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Texas in 2015 before becoming the Longhorns' associate head coach for offense and wide receivers coach the following year.

Traylor's impact on the offense was felt immediately in his first season at Arkansas, as his running backs corps racked up 1,721 yards and 11

touchdowns in 2018. The unit was led by Rakeem Boyd, who rushed for more than 100 yards in three different SEC games, including a season-best 113 against Vanderbilt. The Houston Stratford High School product took over the starting tailback role in the fifth game of the season and his most impressive stretch of the season came during a four-game stretch against Alabama, Ole Miss, Tulsa and Vanderbilt, as he topped the century mark three times and totaled 423 yards. His 102 yards against Alabama made him the first Arkansas running back to eclipse 100 yards against the Crimson Tide since Darren McFadden in 2007.

In Traylor's second season coaching the Arkansas running backs, Boyd rushed for 1,133 yards and eight touchdowns on

184 carries (6.2 avg.) to spearhead a ground game that accumulated 1,766 yards. Boyd topped 100 yards in five contests, including a season-best 185 and two scores on just eight attempts against Western Kentucky. He also rushed for 100-plus against Portland State (114), Colorado State (122), Kentucky (134) and Mississippi (114).

Prior to his time at Arkansas, Traylor spent the 2017 season as associate head coach and running backs coach at SMU under Chad Morris. He also served as the Mustangs' interim coach before joining Morris' staff at Arkansas.

During his one year at SMU, Traylor's running backs piled up 2,223 yards on the ground. Three players rushed for 500-plus yards, with Xavier Jones leading the group at 1,075. The Mustangs topped the 200-yard mark on the ground six times, including a season-best 311 in a win against Arkansas State. SMU ranked in the top 20 nationally in several offensive categories, including 12th in scoring offense and 15th in total offense.

Prior to his time in Dallas, Traylor spent two seasons at Texas. He was the tight ends coach and special teams coordinator in 2015 and then the associate head for offense and wide receivers coach in 2016, when

the Longhorns boasted the nation's No. 16-ranked offense that averaged 491.3 yards per game. During his time as the lead recruiter, he helped the Longhorns sign the No. 7-ranked recruiting class in the country in back-to-back years and was named Scout.com's Big 12 Recruiter of the Year. He recruited punter Michael Dickson, who went on to earn multiple All-America honors, win Big 12 Conference Special Teams Player of the Year in 2016 and 2017 as well as the 2017 Ray Guy Award, and currently punts for the Seattle Seahawks.

Traylor built his hometown program into a prep powerhouse during his 15-year tenure leading the Buckeyes.

A four-time Texas High School Coach of the Year, he posted a 175-26 record (.871 winning percentage) and led Gilmer to five state championship game appearances, three state titles (2004, '09, '14) and 12 district crowns. The Buckeyes turned in a pair of perfect 16-0 seasons, won 10-or-more games 11 times and registered seven 13-win seasons and three 15-win campaigns during his career.

In 2014, his undefeated Class 4A Division II state championship team boasted one of the most prolific offenses in Texas prep history. Gilmer scored 950 points, the second-most in state history, averaging 59.4 points and 536.1 yards over the 16-game season. The Buckeyes topped 60 points nine times, including two 80-point performances. Gilmer also averaged 536.1 total yards per game (8,577 yards) behind a balanced 293.9 passing yards and 242.1 rushing yards per contest. The defense was equally dominant, allowing only 276 points (17.3) with five single-digit efforts and two shutouts, while recording 23 interceptions and forcing 17 fumbles. Gilmer closed out the season with a win over West Orange-Stark and had eight different players earn 4A All-State honors from either the Associated Press or Texas Sports Writers Association.

Gilmer's two other state titles under Traylor both came in Class 3A in 2004 (Division II) and 2009 (Division I), before the change in class structure in Texas high school football moved the school into 4A. After 15 years on its sidelines, Gilmer renamed Buckeye Stadium to Jeff Traylor Stadium to honor his successful career.

Inducted into the East Texas Coaches Association Hall of Honor in 2019, Traylor has received numerous coaching honors, including being named Coach of the Decade (2000s) by the Tyler Morning Telegraph. He is a 12-time District Coach of the Year, four-time East Texas Coach of the Year and a four-time Ted Jeffries Award winner. He has received the Carl Padilla Coach of the Year, KYKX Coach of the Year and Old Coach Network Coach of the Year awards twice each.

Traylor began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Big Sandy High School in 1990-93 before a seven-year stint (1994-2000) at Jacksonville High School where he served as passing coordinator, defensive backs coach, receivers coach and special teams coordinator. There, he helped coach future NFL quarterbacks Josh McCown and Luke McCown and former Texas A&M standout signal-caller Randy McCown.

A 1986 graduate of Gilmer High School, Traylor earned both undergraduate (1990) and graduate (2002) degrees in education from Stephen F. Austin while playing football as a walk-on.

He and his wife, Cari, have three children: Jordan, Jacob and Jaci.

Justin Burke was named UTSA's special teams coordinator and tight ends coach on Jan. 28 and promoted to associate head coach on June 1, after serving the 2020 and 2021 seasons as an offensive analyst for the Roadrunners. He previously was the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at USF in 2017-19.

A veteran of college football staffs for more than a decade, Burke spent two seasons (2020-21) as an analyst for the UTSA offensive staff. During his time in San Antonio, the Roadrunners have posted a 19-7 record, won a conference championship and made a pair of bowl appearances. The offensive side of the ball earned a total of 16 All-Conference USA accolades during his first two years on the staff.

In his first year on the staff, UTSA registered a 7-5 overall record, finished second in C-USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and earned a spot in the First Responder Bowl.

Burke was promoted to senior analyst for the offense prior to his second season at UTSA. The Roadrunners finished with a 12-2 record to set school records for most wins and best winning percentage in a season, were nationally ranked (as high as No. 15) for the first time in school history and captured their first league title by winning the C-USA Championship with a 49-41 victory over WKU. UTSA capped the season with its second straight and third overall bowl appearance against San Diego State in the Tropical Smoothie Café Frisco Bowl.

Prior to his arrival in San Antonio, Burke was the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at USF for three seasons, spending two years on the same staff as UTSA co-offensive coordinator Matt Mattox. During his tenure, the Bulls won 21 games and made a pair of bowl appearances.

In his first season at USF, the Bulls capped a 10-2 campaign with a 38-34 victory against Texas Tech in the 2017 Birmingham Bowl. Burke led a special teams unit that saw kicker Emilio Nadelman earn first team all-conference honors and set the program's single-season scoring record with 115 points. Nadelman made a school-record 21 field goals and established a USF single-game mark by scoring 19 points against Temple, including going 5 for 5 on field goals. He led the American Athletic Conference and ranked 19th nationally by making a USF single-season record 84.0 percent of his field goals. Punter Jonathan Hernandez ranked second in the league with a 43.4 yards-per-punt average.

In his second season with the Bulls, Burke helped lead tight end Mitch Wilcox to first team all-conference honors and USF season records for a tight end of 43 receptions for 540 yards, including a single-game record eight catches for 109 yards at Illinois.

In 2019, Wilcox again earned all-league accolades and went on to play in the East-West Shrine Bowl before landing in the NFL with the Cincinnati Bengals.

Prior to his tenure at USF, Burke served as a quality control special assistant working with tight ends at Texas during the 2016 season. He also worked as an offensive special assistant (2014-15) at Texas. During his time at Texas, he was a part of the same staffs as Traylor, Mattox and UTSA co-offensive coordinator Will Stein.

Burke was an offensive quality control assistant (2013) and offensive graduate assistant (2011-2012) at his alma mater, Louisville. During his time on the staff, the Cardinals won a pair of Big East Conference titles (2011, 2012) and had the nation's fourth-best winning percentage (23-3; 88.5%) over the 2012 and 2013 seasons. He worked with quarterbacks, including Will Stein, as well as wide receivers and tight ends, and he helped mentor 2012 Big East Offensive Player of the Year Teddy Bridgewater and first team All-AAC wide receiver Devante Parker.

Burke played quarterback at Louisville (2008-10) and North Carolina State (2006-08). He was a two-year letterman and started eight games at Louisville. Jess Loopp is in his third season as a member of UTSA's defensive coaching staff. He was promoted to co-defensive coordinator in January 2021 after serving as recruiting coordinator and safeties coach in his first year with the Roadrunners.

Loopp played a key role on the staff in 2020, including helping to coordinate the defense during the last two months of the campaign. The Roadrunners finished with a 7-5 record, a second-place finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. UTSA led C-USA in sacks (25), tackles for loss (85), interceptions (11), takeaways (19) and turnover margin (+7). In fact, the Roadrunners ranked in the top 30 nationally in five categories — 19th in turnovers gained, 23rd in passes intercepted, 25th in fumbles recovered (8), 26th in turnover margin and 29th in tackles for loss per game (7.1).

Loopp, who will continue to coach the program's safeties, helped mentor Rashad Wisdom to first-team all-conference honors in 2020. Under his tutelage, Wisdom led UTSA in total tackles with 95, solo tackles with 60 and interceptions with four, which tied the school's single-season standard, paced C-USA and ranked eighth among all FBS players. Additionally, safeties Kelechi Nwachuku and Antonio Parks also blossomed during their first year under Loopp. Parks registered 50 tackles, including 32 solo stops, two pass breakups, a pair of quarterback hurries, one interception, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery, while Nwachuku posted 56 total tackles, 35 solo stops and three PBUs.

In his second season in San Antonio and first as co-defensive coordinator, Loopp helped the Roadrunners emerge as one of the best in the FBS in creating turnovers with 25 takeaways to rank 10th in the nation. UTSA also finished the campaign ranked 14th in the country in rushing defense (114.7) and fourth nationally with 14 fumble recoveries. The defense recorded 88 tackles for loss on the year including a school-record 33 sacks with first-team all-conference performer Clarence Hicks setting the pace with a program-record 10.5 sacks.

Loopp helped guide UTSA to several single-game program records in 2021. The Roadrunners posted the first two shutouts in school history with a 54-0 rout of Lamar and a 45-0 blanking of Rice in which UTSA limited the Owls to 102 total yards, the fewest allowed in a game. For the season, the defense held four opponents to fewer than 200 yards. Seven teams failed to gain 100 yards on the ground and three offenses posted 52 or fewer passing yards against the Roadrunners.

Under Loopp's tutelage, Wisdom enjoyed another first-team all-conference campaign at safety, registering a team-high 88 total tackles and 67 solo stops to go along with four tackles for loss, six pass breakups, one forced fumble and a QB hurry. His defensive backfield mate, Antonio Parks, pitched in with 49 tackles, four PBUs and a pair of interceptions. A total of 10 defenders were chosen for the all-league squad, including defensive lineman Brandon Brown, who also landed on the C-USA All-Freshman Team.

The defense helped UTSA to a 12-2 record in 2021, the most wins and best winning percentage (.857) in program history. The Roadrunners won their first conference title with a 49-41 victory over WKU in the C-USA Championship Game, were nationally ranked (as high as No. 15) for the first time and made their second straight and third overall bowl appearance when they met San Diego State in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Loopp joined the Roadrunners after spending the 2019 season as the senior offensive analyst at Arkansas. He also has served on staffs at Rice, SMU and Tulsa and on the high school level during a coaching career that has seen him mentor 15 all-conference performers, two bowl game MVPs, one Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist and four players who went on to the NFL.

Prior to his time at Arkansas, Loopp coached safeties during the 2018 season at Prosper High School after a three-year stint as the secondary coach at SMU in 2015-17.

In 2016, SMU's defense was statistically one of the 10 most-improved in college football. The Mustangs ranked seventh nationally in interceptions per game, and Loopp's secondary was responsible for 16 of the 18 picks. Following the season, defensive backs Darrion Millines and Horace Richardson, who each ranked in the top 15 for interceptions in 2016, were named first-team All-Conference.

Loopp spent eight total years at Tulsa — six as a full-time assistant coach (2007,

2010-2014), three as a graduate assistant coach (2003-05) and one as director of high school relations (2009).

During his tenure with the Golden Hurricane, Loopp was part of six bowl games - 2003 Humanitarian Bowl, 2005 and 2012 AutoZone Liberty Bowls, 2008 GMAC Bowl, 2010 Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl and the 2011 Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl. He has also been a part of Tulsa's two Conference USA Championship seasons in 2005 and 2012.

Under Loopp's tutelage, Dexter McCoil became the school's career-leader for interceptions in 2012 and along with fellow safety Demarco Nelson earned all-conference accolades. In 2011, the Tulsa defense ranked 12th nationally for interceptions and 25th for turnovers gained. Matt Mattox was elevated to UTSA's co-offensive coordinator on Jan. 8, 2022, after serving as the Roadrunners' run game coordinator and offensive line coach for the previous two seasons.

In his first season with the Roadrunners, he helped the offense to a record-setting season that resulted in a 7-5 record, a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 6-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

With Mattox installed as run game coordinator, UTSA broke single-season school records for rushing yards (2,585), rushing yards per game (215.4), yards per rush (5.21) and rushing touchdowns (24). His offensive line helped pave the way for All-America running back and 2020 Conference USA Offensive Player of the Year Sincere McCormick. The Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award finalist and Doak Walker Award semifinalist shattered UTSA's single-season marks for yards (1,467), carries (249) and touchdowns (11) while finishing second in the FBS with a program-record 133.4 rushing yards per game. The Roadrunners also smashed single-game standards for total yards (624) and rushing yards (443) in a game in a regular season-finale rout of North Texas.

Three members of his offensive line group — Spencer Burford, Makai Hart and Ahofitu Maka — garnered second-team all-conference accolades, while Demetris Allen was a C-USA All-Freshman Team selection. Burford also was named to the Dave Campbell's Texas Football All-Texas College First Team and Maka was a Rimington Award watch list member for the nation's top center.

In his second season at UTSA, the Roadrunners continued their record-setting ways. UTSA went 12-2 to set program records for most wins and best winning percentage (.857) in a season. The Roadrunners captured their first conference title with a 49-41 win over WKU in the C-USA Championship Game, were nationally ranked (as high as No. 15) for the first time and made their second straight and third overall bowl appearance when they faced San Diego State in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

UTSA broke school records for total points (516), points per game (36.9), first downs (320), total offense (6,146) and yards per game (439.0). The Roadrunners rushed for 2,569 yards — the second-best total in program annals — and a UTSA-record 26 touchdowns. McCormick repeated as C-USA Offensive Player of the Year and improved his own single-season standards for rushing yards (1,479), rushing TDs (15), rushes (298) and all-purpose yards (1,663) on his way to earning All-America accolades from the Associated Press, FWAA and Phil Steele, as well as landing on the finalist list for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award and semifinalist list for the Doak Walker Award.

Four of Mattox's offensive linemen were recognized by the league's head coaches, as Burford earned first-team honors, Maka was tabbed to the second team and Hart and Terrell Haynes received honorable mention. Burford, a fourth-round draft pick by the San Francisco 49ers, and Maka also garnered first- and second-team All-Texas College Team plaudits from Dave Campbell's Texas Football.

Mattox joined the Roadrunners after spending the 2019 season as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at McNeese.

A 17-year coaching veteran, Mattox also has spent time at Bowling Green, Eastern Illinois, South Florida, Texas and Tulsa.

In 2019, he oversaw a McNeese offense that posted an increase in every statistical category from the previous year, including the following: 382 total offensive yards per game, an increase of 92 yards from 2018; 165 yards rushing (+54 from 2018); 220 yards passing (+40); 26 points scored per game (+6); 24 passing TDs (+12); 12 rushing TDs (+8). In addition, the Cowboys ranked second in the Southland Conference in rushing in league games with a 170.7 average.

Mattox spent the 2017-18 seasons as the run game coordinator and offensive line coach at USF.

In 2018, he helped lead a running game that averaged more than 208 yards per contest to rank in the top 30 nationally.

In his first season at USF, Mattox tutored an offensive line unit that saw guard Jeremi Hall earn first team all-conference honors and tackle Marcus Norman earn second-team honors. Senior running backs Darius Tice (986 yards and 11 TD) and D'Ernest Johnson (836 yards and 7 TD) both had career-best years and joined second team, all-conference quarterback Quinton Flowers (1,078 yards and 11 TD) in helping USF run for 3,169 yards and 30 touchdowns. The Bulls ranked eighth in the nation in rushing offense (264.1 ypg), sixth in total offense (513.0 ypg) and 10th in scoring offense (38.3 ppg). The Bulls ran for 200 yards or more in nine games, eclipsing 300 yards in five and ranked 29th nationally in sacks allowed (1.50 spg).

Prior to USF, Mattox spent the 2016 season at Texas. He also coached at Tulsa (2015), Bowling Green (2014) and Eastern Illinois (2013).

As the run game coordinator and offensive line coach at Texas, Mattox coached All-Americans Connor Williams (left tackle) and running back D'Onta Foreman, who helped the Longhorns average 491.3 yards per game (16th in FBS) and 239.3 rushing yards per game (17th). The offense set a school record in 2016, totaling seven games with more than 500 yards. Under Mattox's guidance, Foreman finished second nationally with 2,028 rushing yards in 11 games, just the ninth Power 5 Conference player in NCAA history to record 2,000 yards in a season without the help of a bowl game. Foreman was named the 2016 Doak Walker Award winner and the 2016 Big 12 Conference Offensive Player of the Year.

The Texas offensive line was a semifinalist for the Joe Moore Award, presented annually to the top offensive line unit in college football. Williams, who was drafted in the

second round by the Dallas Cowboys in 2018, earned first-team All-Big 12 honors and was honorable mention for conference Offensive Lineman of the Year, while Kent Perkins was a second team selection on the offensive line.

In 2015, Mattox worked as co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach to help lead a Tulsa attack that ranked 11th nationally in passing (333 ypg), 13th in total offense (507 ypg) and 21st in scoring (37 ppg). The offense was led by American Athletic Conference first-team receiver Keyarris Garrett, who finished with 1,588 receiving yards, 122.2 yards per game. Josh Atkinson amassed 1,071 receiving yards, while quarterback Dane Evans passed for 4,332 yards and 25 touchdowns.

Prior to Tulsa, Mattox was the co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Bowling Green in 2014. The Falcons gained 432.9 yards per game to rank 41st nationally in total yards, while averaging 173.0 yards on the ground and 259.9 yards passing, all without starting quarterback Matt Johnson, who was injured and would the next year become the 2015 Mid-American Conference Offensive Player of the Year. Offensive lineman Alex Huettel was tabbed second-team All-Mid-American Conference and was named to the 2015 preseason Lombardi Award watch list, while wide receiver Roger Lewis recorded 1,093 receiving yards and earned first-team All-MAC honors.

During the 2013 season, Mattox served as the offensive line coach at Eastern Illinois, which led the FCS in total offense (589.5 ypg) and scoring (48.2 ppg), while ranking second with 372.4 passing yards, and 20th with 217.1 rushing yards per game, leading to a 12-2 record and an Ohio Valley Conference Championship.

Behind third-team All-Americans Dominic Pagliara and Collin Seibert, the offensive line paved the way for the record-setting offense that included quarterback Jimmy Garoppolo, who was named the 2013 Walter Payton Award winner, the FCS equivalent of the Heisman Trophy. Consensus first-team All-American Erik Lora led the nation in receptions with 123, which tied for second in FCS history. In addition to Paliara and Seibert, offensive linemen Nick Borre was tabbed second-team All-OVC, and Jimmy Lowery was on the All-Newcomer Team.

Before Eastern Illinois, Mattox spent six years as an offensive line/tight ends coach in the junior college ranks.

He served as the offensive coordinator during the 2012 season at Coffeyville Community College in Kansas. In his one season at Coffeyville, the offense averaged 370.2 total yards, including 170.2 rushing, and 28.8 points per game. Five of Coffeyville's offensive players earned all-conference honors, including center D.J. Lynn and guard Hayden Chandler.

Prior to Coffeyville, Mattox was the offensive line/tight ends coach at Butler (Kan.) Community College. During five seasons with the school from 2007-11, he helped coach the program to four conference and NJCAA Region VI Championships. In his tenure, he coached 31 all-conference offensive linemen and six junior college All-Americans.

In 2010, Butler advanced to the national championship game and finished the season ranked second in the nation with an 11-1 record and a conference and region title. The offense averaged 38.0 points per game, including a 40.4 average in region games, while recording over 370 yards per game.

The 2011 season also saw Butler post an 11-1 record with conference and region championships, along with a bowl win and a No. 2 final national ranking. The offense averaged 48.6 points and 499.3 yards per game in region play heading into the bowl and finished averaging 46.3 points for the season with just under 480 yards of offense.

Mattox began his coaching career at Houston, first working with the football program as an assistant strength coach in 2005 and then as a graduate assistant in 2006, assisting with the offensive tackles. Houston posted a 10-4 record in 2006, won the Conference USA Championship and made an appearance in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

A native of Holton, Kan., Mattox was a second-team junior college All-American tight end at Butler Community College. He played his final two collegiate seasons (2002-03) at Houston, moving from tight end to offensive tackle prior to his senior season. As a senior, Mattox earned second-team All-Conference USA honors at offensive tackle as the Cougars posted a 7-6 record and played in the Hawaii Bowl.

Mattox earned his bachelor's degree in sports administration with a minor in health from Houston in 2005.

Will Stein was elevated to UTSA's co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach on Jan. 8, 2022, after spending the previous two seasons as the Roadrunners' pass game coordinator and wide receivers coach.

In his first season in San Antonio, he helped the Roadrunners to a 7-5 record, a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 6-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. His wide receivers group combined for 170 receptions, 1,923 receiving yards and 16 touchdowns, while helping lead a balanced offensive attack that piled up 2,399 passing yards and a school-record 2,585 rushing yards.

A pair of his wide receivers — Joshua Cephus and Zakhari Franklin — earned honorable mention all-conference recognition. Cephus tied the program's single-season receptions record with 58 while tallying 547 yards and five TDs. Despite missing the first two games, Franklin eclipsed the UTSA season standard for receiving yards with 694 on 49 catches, and he also led the squad with seven scores through the air.

Under Stein's tutelage, the UTSA wideouts smashed records and emerged as one of the top groups in the FBS in 2021. Cephus, Franklin and De'Corian Clark combined to catch 204 passes for 2,585 yards and 25 TDs and made UTSA one of only three teams (Appalachian State, Ohio State) to have three receivers with at least 50 receptions and 750 yards.

Franklin, a first-team all-conference selection, set program records with 81 catches, 1,027 yards, 79.0 yards per game and 12 touchdowns, while Cephus, an honorable mention all-league pick, was on the receiving end of 71 passes for 819 yards and six scores. Clark had a career year with 755 yards and seven TDs on 52 receptions, as the trio now owns the top three spots on the program's single-season list for receptions and receiving yards.

Stein's wide receivers help the Roadrunners set single-season standards for total points (516), points per game (36.9), first downs (320), total offense (6,146), yards per game (439.0), passing yards (3,577), passing yards per game (255.5) and passing touchdowns (27). UTSA finished the 2021 campaign with a 12-2 record, setting a program record for most wins and best winning percentage (.857). The Roadrunners won their first conference title with a 49-41 victory over WKU in the C-USA Championship Game, were nationally ranked (as high as No. 15) for the first time and made their second straight and third overall bowl appearance when they met San Diego State in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Stein came to UTSA after spending the previous two seasons as the assistant head coach, offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and recruiting coordinator at Lake Travis High School in Austin.

During his two years at Lake Travis, he helped lead the Cavaliers to a 26-4 combined record and back-to-back appearances in the state semifinal round of the Class 6A Division I playoffs. He also mentored a pair of high school All-Americans during his tenure.

In his first year as offensive coordinator, Lake Travis posted 3,937 yards and 54 touchdowns passing and 2,578 yards and 31 TDs rushing, averaging 434.3 yards and 41.1 points per game.

In 2019, Stein's offense racked up 3,877 yards and 40 touchdowns through the air and 2,776 yards and 43 TDs on the ground while averaging 443.5 yards and 42.6 points per game.

Prior to his time at Lake Travis, Stein worked alongside UTSA head coach Jeff Taylor on Charlie Strong's staff at Texas in 2015-16. He served as offensive quality control and worked with the wide receivers.

Stein then worked with Texas' quarterbacks for the 2017 campaign and helped the Longhorns win the Texas Bowl, their first bowl victory since 2012.

A former standout cornerback at Tulsa and a six-year pro, Nick Graham joined the UTSA football staff as cornerbacks coach on Dec. 11, 2019.

In his first season in San Antonio, Graham helped the Roadrunners to a 7-5 record, a second-place finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. He was a key member of a defensive staff that helped UTSA lead C-USA in sacks (25), tackles for loss (85), interceptions (11), takeaways (19) and turnover margin (+7). In fact, the Roadrunners ranked in the top 30 nationally in five categories — 19th in turnovers gained, 23rd in passes intercepted, 25th in fumbles recovered (8), 26th in turnover margin and 29th in tackles for loss per game (7.1).

Graham's presence was felt immediately by the cornerbacks in 2020. Corey Mayfield Jr. received honorable mention all-conference recognition after posting a team-best six pass breakups to go along with a pair of interceptions, one forced fumble, 37 tackles and three tackles for loss. Ken Robinson was named to the C-USA All-Freshman Team after tallying 28 stops, three PBUs and a forced fumble in nine games. Additionally, Tariq Woolen, a converted wide receiver, made seven starts and recorded 35 tackles, 3.5 TFL, four PBUs, one interception and a forced fumble in 11 contests.

In his second season in San Antonio, Graham helped UTSA to a 12-2 record for the most wins and best winning percentage (.857) in program history. The Roadrunners won their first conference title with a 49-41 victory over WKU in the C-USA Championship Game, were nationally ranked (as high as No. 15) for the first time and made their second straight and third overall bowl appearance when they met San Diego State in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Graham's cornerbacks helped the Roadrunners emerged as one of the best in the FBS in creating turnovers with 25 takeaways to rank 10th in the nation. Ken Robinson led the unit with 41 tackles and seven pass breakups to go along with 2.5 tackles for loss, and Mayfield, an honorable mention all-league performer, posted 37 stops, three PBUs and a pair of interceptions, including a 49-yard pick six in the 45-0 shutout of Rice. Woolen, a fifth-round draft pick by the Seattle Seahawks, added 25 tackles, five PBUs, 2.5 TFLs and an interception en route to honorable mention all-conference accolades despite missing five contests, while Jahmal Sam logged 36 tackles, three tackles for loss, two interceptions, a pair of pass breakups while splitting time between cornerback and safety.

Graham came to the Roadrunners after spending the 2019 season at McNeese as the safeties coach. His position group was led by second-team All-Southland Conference safety Cory McCoy, who posted three

interceptions, 15 pass breakups and 2.5 tackles for loss.

Julian Griffin is in his third season as UTSA's running backs coach after joining the staff on Dec. 11, 2019.

In his first year with the Roadrunners, Griffin's running backs helped the offense to a 7-5 overall record, a runner-up finish in the Conference USA West Division with a 6-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

UTSA broke single-season school records for rushing yards (2,585), rushing yards per game (215.4), yards per rush (5.21) and rushing touchdowns (24) behind Sincere McCormick, who shattered UTSA's single-season marks for yards (1,467), carries (249) and touchdowns (11) while finishing second in the FBS with a program-record 133.4 rushing yards per game. The Roadrunners also smashed single-game standards for total yards (624) and rushing yards (443) in a game in a regular season-finale rout of North Texas.

Griffin, who was named to Dave Campbell's Texas Football 40 Under 40 list in June 2021, mentored McCormick to second-team All-America accolades by both the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) and Phil Steele. The Conference USA Offensive Player of the Year and Dave Campbell's Texas Football Texas College Player of the Year logged seven 100-yard games on the ground, including five with 150-plus yards. The Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award finalist and Doak Walker Award semifinalist was a four-time C-USA Offensive Player of the Week honoree in 2020.

In his second season overseeing the running backs, Griffin's stable helped the Roadrunners smash more records, including single-season marks for total points (516), points per game (36.9), first downs (320), total offense (6,146) and yards per game (439.0). In his first season at Arkansas, Griffin helped the Razorbacks to 1,721 rushing yards, with Boyd totaling 734 yards on 123 carries. LaMichael Pettway had 30 catches for 499 yards and four TDs.

Griffin was an offensive quality control assistant at SMU for the 2017 season, helping the Mustangs offense rank in the top 20 nationally in several offensive categories, including 12th in scoring offense (37.8 ppg) and 15th (478.5 ypg) in total offense. SMU won seven games behind an offense that scored 37.9 points per contest. Running back Xavier Jones rushed 182 times for 1,075 yards and nine TDs in 2017, while quarterback Ben Hicks threw for 3,569 yards and 33 TDs. Wide receiver Trey Quinn led the team with 114 catches for 1,236 yards and 13 TDs, while Courtland Sutton, a second-round pick by the Denver Broncos in 2018, also eclipsed the 1,000-receiving mark with 1,085 yards and 12 TDs.

A former standout player and veteran of coaching staffs for more than a decade, Siddiq Haynes was named UTSA's defensive line coach in March 2022.

Haynes moved into his new role after spending the 2021 season as an analyst for the UTSA defensive staff. He helped the Roadrunners register a 12-2 record, earn a national ranking as high as No. 15, capture the Conference USA crown with a 49-41 win over WKU and make their second straight and third overall bowl game.

The UTSA defense recorded the first two shutouts in school history with a 54-0 rout of Lamar and a 45-0 blanking of Rice in 2021. The Roadrunners ranked 14th in the country in rushing defense (114.7 ypg) and fourth nationally with 14 fumble recoveries, and they set school standards for sacks (33) and sacks per game (2.4).

Haynes worked with the defensive linemen during his first season in San Antonio. Jaylon Haynes earned second-team all-conference honors, Brandon Brown was named to the C-USA All-Freshman Team and joined Lorenzo Dantzler as honorable mention all-league performers.

Haynes joined the UTSA staff following a seven-season stint at Sam Houston where he helped the Bearkats consistently rank among the best programs in the FCS. He was a graduate assistant in 2014-16 before being promoted to the defensive line coach for his final four campaigns in Huntsville.

He played a key role in helping Sam Houston win the 2020 FCS National Championship during a season that was played in Spring 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Bearkats led the country with 23 takeaways including a national-best 14 recovered fumbles, and they ranked fourth nationally with 12.0 tackles for loss per game, seventh with 3.7 sacks per contest and 11th in rushing defense (94.9 ypg). Four of his players — Jahari Kay, Jevon Leon, Trace Mascorro and Joseph Wallace — all earned national and all-conference honors.

In 2019, Sam Houston paced the FCS in rushing defense (69.9 ypg), opponents third-down conversion rate (27.9%) and team tackles for loss (10.9 avg). The defense pitched a pair of shutouts, the first time since 2012 with two shutouts in a season. The Bearkats ranked in the top 10 in the FCS in scoring defense (8th/17.8 ppg), turnovers gained (6th/30), sacks per game (2nd/3.58 spg), team passing efficiency defense (3rd/106.07) and red zone defense (6th/68.8%).

Three defensive linemen collected all-conference honors in 2019, including Mascorro nabbing Southland Conference Newcomer of the Year and first-team all-league accolades. Meanwhile Wallace was a second-team choice and Leon garnered third-team All-SLC and Freshman All-America credentials after leading all FCS freshmen in TFLs (16.0) and sacks (8.5).

The Kats' defense took a big step forward in 2018, ranking in the top three in the nation in sacks and second in the country in tackles per loss.

Defensive end Derick Roberson led the nation in sacks on his way to being named a finalist for the Buck Buchanan Award as the top defensive player in the nation.

Haynes also played a big part in the development of PJ Hall, who was eventually taken in the second round of the 2018 NFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders. He was a four-time, first team all-conference selection, an All-American and the runner-up for the 2016 Buck Buchanan Award. Hall finished his career as the all-time FCS leader in tackles for loss and he ranked second in school history in career sacks.

Haynes spent his first three years in Huntsville serving in numerous capacities including heading up the Bearkats' community service activities. He spearheaded a program that took advantage of the Fall 2020 semester off due to the COVID-19 pandemic, focusing on racial injustice issues on a national, local and in-house level.

A star defensive tackle for K.C. Keeler at Delaware from 2007 to 2010, Haynes was a member of the Blue Hens' squads that earned a berth in the FCS National Championship games in both 2007 and 2010.

As a senior, he was an all-conference selection and the 2010 Allstate American Football Coaches Association Good Works Team Captain, the first in the history of the award program. A former walk-on, Haynes contributed to a variety of community service organizations, including the Boys & Girls Club of Greater Newark, DuPont Children's Hospital, New Castle Youth Football and the Special Olympics of Delaware. He also supported various cancer initiatives, such as lung cancer walks and bone marrow drives.

A native of Durham, N.C., Haynes earned his bachelor's degree in English language and literature in 2011 from Delaware.

Following graduation, Haynes worked for two years as head of community outreach for the Delaware Athletics Marketing Department, as well as spending several years in the corporate world before entering the coaching ranks.

Former Texas high school coach Joe Price III was named UTSA's wide receivers coach on Jan. 27, 2022.

Price spent the previous two seasons as UTSA's Director of Player Personnel, where he was responsible for initial identification and evaluation of prospects, managing the prospect video database, oversight of the day-to-day recruiting operations, organization of recruiting events and materials and assisting with roster management.

In his first year in San Antonio, the Roadrunners posted a 7-5 overall record, registered a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and earned a spot in the First Responder Bowl.

In his second season with the program, UTSA finished with a 12-2 record to set the school record for most wins and best winning percentage in a season. The Roadrunners were nationally ranked (as high as No. 15) for the first time in school history and captured their first league title by winning the C-USA Championship with a 49-41 victory over WKU. UTSA capped the season with its second straight and third overall bowl appearance against San Diego State in the Tropical Smoothie Café Frisco Bowl.

Price joined UTSA after spending the 2019 season as the Director of High School Relations for the Illinois football program. During his one year in Champaign, the Fighting Illini won six games and made their first bowl appearance since 2014 when they played California in the Redbox Bowl.

Prior to his time at Illinois, Price spent 10 years as a high school coach in the Galena Park Independent School District. In addition to his coaching duties, he also was responsible for a variety of football operations, including fundraising, summer camps, serving as a liaison to college coaches, developing a website and producing highlight videos for college-bound athletes.

Price was the passing game coordinator, wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at perennial prep powerhouse North Shore High School from 2014 to 2018. In 2018, North Shore was named national champion by MaxPreps after posting a perfect 16-0 record and outscoring opponents 854-199, winning by an average margin of 41 points per game. North Shore capped its title run by beating Duncanville, 41-36, on a Hail Mary pass as time expired at AT&T Stadium.

Price got his coaching start in 2009 as an assistant coach, video coordinator, player development coordinator and recruiting coordinator at Galena Park High School.

A coaching veteran for more than two decades, Brad Sherrod is in his second season as UTSA's linebackers coach.

In his first year in San Antonio, Sherrod helped lead UTSA to a 12-2 record, the most wins and best winning percentage (.857) in program history. The Roadrunners won their first conference title with a 49-41 victory over WKU in the 2021 C-USA Championship Game, were nationally ranked (as high as No. 15) for the first time and made their second straight and third overall bowl appearance when they met San Diego State in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

Under Sherrod's tutelage, inside linebackers Trevor Harmanson and Jamal Ligon collected honorable mention all-conference accolades in 2021. That duo combined to register 120 tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss, two sacks, three quarterback hurries and a pair of interceptions.

In his first year with the Roadrunners, they emerged as one of the best in the FBS in creating turnovers with 25 takeaways to rank 10th in the nation. UTSA also finished the campaign ranked 14th in the country in rushing defense (114.7) and fourth nationally with 14 fumble recoveries. The defense recorded 88 tackles for loss in 2021 including a school-record 33 sacks, with first-team all-conference performer Clarence Hicks setting the pace with a program-record 10.5 sacks.

Sherrod, who spent more than a decade on the coaching staff at his alma mater, Duke, came to UTSA from Tennessee State, where he was the Tigers' safeties coach in 2020, a season that was postponed to this spring due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

His long coaching career also has landed him on staffs at Delaware, East Tennessee State, Elon, Massachusetts, Sam Houston State, Wake Forest and Western Carolina.

Prior to his tenure at Tennessee State, Sherrod spent three seasons as the outside linebackers coach at Wake Forest. There, he tutored Justin Strnad, a 2020 fifth-round draft pick of the Denver Broncos who led all Atlantic Coast Conference linebackers and finished third nationally with three interceptions in 2017.

In his first season with the program, he helped lead the Demon Deacons to a Belk Bowl victory over Texas A&M to cap an 8-5 season. The defense broke the school record for tackles for loss in a season and also recorded 17 tackles for loss against Florida State, the most by a Power 5 Conference team in a single game during the 2017 season.

Sherrod also helped guide Wake Forest seven wins and a Birmingham Bowl victory over Memphis in 2018. The following year, the Demon Deacons posted an 8-4 regular season record and made an appearance in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl.

Prior to Wake Forest, Sherrod spent three years at Sam Houston State, where he was on the same staff as Rod Wright. He was co-defensive coordinator for his first two seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2016. The Bearkats went 34-10, earned three FCS playoff berths, won a Southland Conference title, defeated nine top-25 opponents and posted a pair of top-four national finishes during his three-year tenure in Huntsville.

While at Sam Houston, he coached a pair of All-Americans and eight all-conference performers. He mentored P.J. Hall, a current NFL defensive lineman who was a Buck Buchanan finalist, first-team All-American and Southland Conference Defensive Player of the Year in 2016. He also tutored Justin Johnson to first-team All-America and all-conference accolades.

In 2016, he helped Sam Houston post a 12-1 record and achieve a No. 1 ranking in the FCS final regular season poll. The Bearkats lost to eventual national champion James Madison in the quarterfinal round of the FCS playoffs.

Sherrod served as the defensive coordinator at Elon in 2013 after a three-year stint as the linebackers coach at Delaware where he coached

current NFL veteran Paul Worrilo, a first team all-conference performer, the conference's defensive rookie of the year, Jeff Williams and all-conference linebacker Matt Marcocelle. In his first year with the Blue Hens in 2010, the program went 12-3 and advanced to the FCS title game. That year the Delaware defense led the FCS in scoring defense (12.1 points per game) and was fifth in total defense (280.7 yards per game).

Sherrod spent the 2008 and 2009 seasons at Western Carolina, where he coached running backs and linebackers.

He spent 11 seasons on the staff at his alma mater, Duke, where he tutored the linebackers for nine years from 1997 to 2005, tight ends in 2006 and running backs in his final two campaigns. He tutored several standout players, including Chike Egbuniwe, all-conference linebacker Ryan Fowler and Ryan Stallmeyer, who all finished their careers in Duke's career top 10 for tackles. He also mentored Mike Brown Tavuilili, who earned freshman All-America honors in 2005 and went on to garner All-America and first-team all-conference honors after leading the league in tackles as a senior.

Sherrod's coaching career began in 1995 at UMass, where he served as a graduate assistant for the defensive tackles before heading to East Tennessee State as linebackers coach in 1996. He helped lead ETSU to a No. 8 national ranking, a 10-3 record and the second round of the FCS playoffs.

He has served two internships in the NFL, spending the summer of 1998 with the Dallas Cowboys and the 2000 preseason with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Sherrod is a 2007 graduate of the NCAA Expert Coaches Academy.

During his playing career at Duke, Sherrod was a team captain who earned second team All-ACC and Academic All-ACC honors as a senior in 1993 when he led the Blue Devils and ranked fifth in the ACC with 113 total tackles. A native of Monroe, N.C., Sherrod had 279 career stops during his Duke career from 1990-93.

A veteran of the Texas high school coaching ranks for nearly two decades, Kurt Traylor is in his first season as UTSA's assistant offensive line coach after serving as tight ends coach following his hiring on Dec. 19, 2019.

In his first season with the Roadrunners, Traylor helped UTSA to a record-setting season on offense that resulted in a 7-5 record, a runner-up finish in the Conference USA West Division at 6-2 and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. The Roadrunners broke single-season school records for rushing yards (2,585), rushing yards per game (215.4), yards per rush (5.21) and rushing touchdowns (24) and also smashed single-game standards for total yards (624) and rushing yards (443) in a game in a regular season-finale rout of North Texas.

Traylor mentored the tight ends, led by honorable mention all-conference performer Leroy Watson, to a combined 23 catches for 289 yards while also helping pave the way for UTSA's potent ground attack led by All-America running back Sincere McCormick, who set single-season records for rushing yards (1,467), carries (249) and touchdowns (11) in 2020.

In his second year, the Roadrunners continued their record-setting ways, finishing 12-2 to set program records for most wins and best winning percentage (.857) in a season. The Roadrunners captured their first conference title with a 49-41 win over WKU in the C-USA Championship Game, were nationally ranked (as high as No. 15) for the first time and made their second straight and third overall bowl appearance when they faced San Diego State in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl.

UTSA broke school records for total points (516), points per game (36.9), first downs (320), total offense (6,146) and yards per game (439.0). His tight ends, including C-USA All-Freshman Team selection Dan Dishman, combined for 28 receptions, 357 receiving yards and three scores, and they helped the ground attack tally 2,569 rushing yards — the second-best total in program annals — and a UTSA-record 26 touchdowns. McCormick repeated as C-USA Offensive Player of the Year and improved his own single-season standards for rushing yards (1,479), rushing TDs (15), rushes (298) and all-purpose yards (1,663) on his way to earning All-America accolades from the Associated Press, FWAA and Phil Steele, as well as landing on the finalist list for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award and semifinalist list for the Doak Walker Award.

Prior to joining the Roadrunners, Traylor was the head coach at Tyler Lee High School for three seasons (2017-19), where he coached 2020 UTSA signee Jamal Ligon. The younger brother of UTSA head coach Jeff Traylor, he guided the Raiders to 14 wins during his tenure and led the program to its first playoff appearance in five seasons in 2019. His first season at Tyler Lee resulted in the program's first winning record since 2008 and a victory over rival Tyler John Tyler.

Traylor also started several different programs at Lee, including Adopt a Raider, Honorary Teachers Captains, BEAST Texas Passing Academy and the Coaches Outreach Program.

Prior to Tyler Lee, Traylor spent 17 years as an assistant coach at Gilmer High School. He helped lead the Buckeyes to three state titles, two additional state championship game appearances, 14 district titles and 16 playoff appearances.

Traylor was a key part of a staff that transformed Gilmer into a perennial prep powerhouse, serving as the offensive run game coordinator, offensive line coach and offseason coordinator. During his tenure, he coached numerous all-state players, including David Snow, a U.S. Army All-American who went on to star on the offensive line at Texas.

In his first year in Gilmer, the Buckeyes recorded their first winning season since 1996. In his second year, the Buckeyes won a district title and made their first playoff appearance since 1991. Gilmer repeated as district champions and made the playoffs again in year three.

In 2003, Gilmer posted a 13-1 record and recorded its first playoff win since 1991 while advancing to the regional final.

One year later, the Buckeyes turned in a perfect 16-0 record in winning the Class 3A State Championship. That squad was led by Class 3A Player of the Year Manuel Johnson, who went on to play wide receiver at Oklahoma and was drafted in the seventh round by the Dallas Cowboys.

In 2014, Gilmer posted a perfect 16-0 record en route to the Class 4A Division II State Championship. The Buckeyes boasted one of the most prolific offenses in Texas prep history, scoring 950 points in 16 games, the second-most in state history, and averaging 59.4 points and 536.1 yards per game. The Buckeyes topped 60-plus points nine times, including two 80-point performances. Gilmer also averaged 536.1 total yards per game (8,577 yards) behind a balanced 293.9 passing yards and 242.1 rushing yards per contest.

Gilmer's two other state titles came in Class 3A in 2004 (Division II) and 2009 (Division I), before the change in class structure in Texas high school football moved the school into 4A. The Buckeyes also were state finalists in 2007, when they were the only school in the nation to boast two U.S. Army All-Americans, and 2012. Gilmer also advanced to the state semifinal round during his last two seasons (2015-16).

Traylor gained his first coaching experience on the collegiate level as a graduate assistant at Texas A&M in 2002-03.

Traylor began his coaching career as junior high football coach at West Rusk in 1995 before a four-year stint (1996-99) at Jacksonville High School as the offensive line coach.

Traylor played offensive line at Gilmer High School, Cisco Junior College and Southwest Baptist University.

He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Texas A&M-Commerce in 1995.

He and his wife, Katie, have four children, Allie, Rylie, Will and Kole.

A former assistant coach for UTSA's first five seasons and offensive coordinator for four, Kevin Brown is in his third year overseeing operations of the football program. He was promoted to Assistant Athletics Director for Football in 2022 after a two-year tenure as Director of Football Operations.

Brown, who was an assistant coach under Larry Coker from 2011 to 2015, came to UTSA after spending two years as an offensive coordinator on the prep level. He is responsible for assisting the coaching staff with day-to-day operations of the program, coordinating practice schedules and team travel, assisting with summer camps, collaborating with campus organizations and organizing community service projects, among other duties.

In Brown's first year as UTSA's Director of Football Operations, the Roadrunners posted a 7-5 overall record, registered a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and earned a spot in the 2020 SERVPRO First Responder Bowl, the program's second bowl appearance.

Brown returned to the Roadrunners after a stint as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Boerne High School during the 2019 season. He helped the Greyhounds to a 7-4 record and a Class 4A Division I playoff appearance in his only season. Under his tutelage, the offense passed for 2,447 yards and 25 touchdowns and rushed for 919 yards and 10 TDs.

Prior to his time in Boerne, Brown was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at TMI Episcopal in San Antonio in 2018.

Brown spent the 2017 season as the wide receivers coach at Lamar, an FCS member of the Southland Conference. His position group combined to catch 160 passes for 1,876 yards and seven touchdowns. He also was responsible for the Cardinals' kickoff return unit, which tallied 832 yards on 40 returns.

An integral part of the UTSA coaching staff during its startup era, Brown coached the Roadrunners' tight ends during the inaugural 2011 campaign before being promoted in 2012 to offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, and he remained in that role through the 2015 season.

Brown's offense produced the program's first 1,000-yard rusher in 2015, as Jarveon Williams gained 1,086 yards and scored eight touchdowns on 173 carries. Additionally, tight end David Morgan II caught 45 passes for 566 yards and five TDs en route to becoming UTSA's first All-American when he garnered second-team accolades from USA TODAY and honorable mention from SI.com. Morgan, a second-team all-conference choice that year, was the program's first NFL Draft pick when the Vikings selected him in the sixth round the following spring. All totaled, the Roadrunners' balanced attack tallied 4,347 yards of offense — 2,026 on the ground and 2,321 through the air — that fall.

In 2014, Brown's offense compiled 3,570 total yards. His quarterbacks combined for 2,069 yards and seven touchdowns on 202-of-355 passing and an additional 275 rushing yards despite battling numerous injuries throughout the season. Offensive guard Scott Inskeep, wide receiver Kam Jones and Morgan all garnered honorable mention All-Conference USA accolades.

In 2013, Brown helped lead UTSA to a 7-5 overall record, including finishing second in the West Division with a 6-2 mark in their first season in C-USA. He mentored an offense that averaged 417.8 yards (175.4

rush/242.4 pass) and 25.6 points per game, with his quarterbacks combining for 2,909 yards and 13 touchdowns through the air and 371 yards and seven scores on the ground. Inskeep collected second-team all-league honors, while Jones, offensive tackle Cody Harris, tight end Cole Hubble and quarterback Eric Soza all were named honorable mention all-conference.

Brown helped guide the Roadrunners to an 8-4 overall record and a 3-3 mark in its first and only season in the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) in 2012. The campaign was highlighted by historic wins against South Alabama, the program's first road and FBS victory, and New Mexico State, its first conference win. The offense averaged 31.2 points and 390.2 yards (159.2 rush/231.0 pass) per game and scored 44 touchdowns. He tutored the quarterbacks to 2,772 yards and 23 TDs through the air against only six interceptions, as the group combined for a 141.46 efficiency rating. Inskeep collected second-team All-WAC accolades, while Jones, Harris, Hubble and running back Evans Okotcha received honorable mention.

The Waco native helped the Roadrunners to a 4-6 record in 2011 as the tight ends coach. The offense averaged 26.6 points and 364.5 yards (144.8 rush/219.7 pass) per game and scored 31 touchdowns during the inaugural campaign. UTSA's tight ends accounted for 262 receiving yards and a pair of TDs, with Morgan tallying 214 and both scores on 13 catches as a true freshman.

Prior to his first tenure at UTSA, Brown served as the receivers coach at Texas State for four seasons, where he helped the Bobcats break numerous school records.

In 2009, wide receiver Da'Marcus Griggs recorded 80 receptions en route to earning second-team All-Southland Conference honors. All totaled, Brown's wide receivers unit combined to catch 203 passes for 2,657 yards and 21 touchdowns that season.

A year earlier, Cameron Luke was named a third-team All-American after posting 73 receptions for two more records of 1,268 yards and 17 touchdowns. Luke broke the original record that he set in 2007 with 60 catches for 1,035 yards and 12 TDs and was named first-team all-conference.

Brown's corps combined to catch 185 passes for 2,800 yards and 27 touchdowns in 2008, and a year earlier, his receivers hauled in 137 throws for 1,825 yards and 17 scores.

Prior to his time at Texas State, Brown was an offensive graduate assistant coach at TCU, his alma mater, for three seasons. Among his responsibilities at TCU were working with the Horned Frogs' offensive linemen, film breakdown of opposing defenses and charting the opposition's defense from the press box on game days.

During his playing career as a wide receiver at TCU from 1998-2002, Brown caught 39 passes for 567 yards, an average of 14.5 yards per reception. He hauled in 16 passes for 208 yards as a senior in 2002 and also had four touchdown receptions during his career.

Brown was a member of five bowl teams. The Horned Frogs defeated USC, 28-19, at the 1998 Sun Bowl and East Carolina, 28-14, in the 1999 Mobile Alabama Bowl. Brown capped his career as a member of TCU's 2002 Conference USA championship team, which beat Colorado State, 17-3, in the AXA Liberty Bowl.

The Horned Frogs made three more bowl appearances while Brown served on the coaching staff. TCU downed Northern Illinois, 37-7, in the 2006 Poinsettia Bowl and edged Iowa State, 27-24, in the 2005 EV1.net Houston Bowl after falling to Boise State by a score of 34-31 in the 2003 Fort Worth Bowl.

Brown graduated from TCU in 2002 with a bachelor's degree in business management and earned master's degrees in education administration (2004) and liberal arts (2006) from TCU.

A former prep standout, Brown was a first-team all-state wide receiver at Waco Midway High School in 1997.

He is married to the former Erika Davis. The couple has one daughter, Naomi.

Zach Brown is in his first year as UTSA's Director of Player Personnel after a two-year stint as a defensive analyst for the Roadrunners which included serving as Senior Analyst and Director of Defensive Recruiting in 2021.

Among Brown's many responsibilities in his new role are initial identification and evaluation of prospects, managing prospect video and database, oversight of the day-to-day recruiting operations, organization of recruiting events and material and assisting with roster management.

During Brown's first two seasons on the UTSA staff, the Roadrunners posted a 19-7 record, won the 2021 Conference USA Championship, were nationally ranked for the first time in program history and made back-to-back bowl appearances. The defense emerged as one of the nation's best at forcing turnovers and earned a combined 21 all-conference and C-USA All-Freshman Team selections in those two seasons.

Brown worked primarily with the nickel/strong side outside linebacker position during his two seasons as an analyst for the defensive staff.

In 2021, Brown helped UTSA post a 12-2 record, earn a national ranking as high as No. 15, capture the C-USA crown with a 49-41 win over WKU and make its second straight and third overall bowl game. The defense recorded the first two shutouts in school history with a 54-0 rout of Lamar and a 45-0 blanking of Rice. The Roadrunners ranked 14th in the country in rushing defense (114.7 ypg) and fourth nationally with 14 fumble recoveries, and they set school standards for sacks (33) and sacks per game (2.4).

Brown was integral in the emergence of Clarence Hicks as one of the league's top defenders, as the outside linebacker broke the school record with 10.5 sacks and registered 16.5 tackles for loss, 37 total tackles, six quarterback hurries, two pass breakups, one interception and a forced fumble en route to first-team all-conference and honorable mention All-America accolades. He also helped mentor Dadrion Taylor to a career season with 44 tackles, 5.5 TFLs, 2.5 sacks, a pair of QB pressures and a 51-yard interception return for a touchdown.

Brown joined the UTSA staff prior to the 2020 season and was a defensive analyst before being promoted to interim linebackers coach in November. That year he helped the Roadrunners win seven games, finish second in the C-USA West Division and make the program's first bowl appearance since 2016. The defense led the conference in sacks (25), tackles for loss (85), interceptions (11), takeaways (19) and turnover margin (+7). In fact, the Roadrunners ranked in the top 30 nationally in five categories — 19th in turnovers gained, 23rd in passes intercepted, 25th in fumbles recovered (8), 26th in turnover margin and 29th in tackles for loss per game (7.1).

Prior to coming to San Antonio, Brown spent three seasons at Ole Miss. He was a graduate assistant in 2017 before being promoted to Player Personnel Analyst for the defense for the 2018 and '19 campaigns. The Rebels climbed from 113th in the FBS to 60th in points allowed per game during his tenure. He worked directly with five defensive backs who went on to the NFL including Javien Hamilton, Myles Hartsfield, A.J. Moore, C.J. Moore and Ken Webster.

Brown spent two years at St. Lawrence University, an NCAA Division III member of the Liberty League. He was a graduate assistant and defensive backs coach in 2015 before being elevated to the full-time defensive backs coach and recruiting coordinator in 2016.

During his time in Canton, N.Y., the Saints won back-to-back Liberty League Championships. St. Lawrence ranked second nationally in scoring defense and 10th in total defense in 2016 after finishing the previous season sixth in the nation with 23 interceptions and 16th in pass defense (159.6 ypg). Leondre Simmon was named an All-American and first-team all-conference at cornerback, while James Holley-Grisham garnered first-team all-league honors both seasons and was named 2015 Liberty League Special Teams Player of the Year as a punt returner.

He spent the 2013 season at Columbia as a volunteer defensive intern before being promoted to quality control for that side of the ball in 2014. He worked with the outside linebackers and defensive backs during his time with the Lions.

Brown got his coaching start at Christian Brothers Academy in Syracuse, N.Y., for one season before joining the staff at Skaneateles (N.Y.) High School for three years.

Brown earned his bachelor's degree in journalism from Syracuse in 2012 and his master's degree in journalism from Columbia in 2014.

A veteran of the UTSA staff since 2016, Ryan Filo was promoted to Assistant Athletics Director for Sports Performance in 2022 after a three-year stint as director of strength & conditioning that was preceded by three years as the Roadrunners' head football strength & conditioning coach.

During his time leading the football program's strength & conditioning regimen, Filo has helped develop and transform more than 500 student-athletes. He has been instrumental in the development of several players who have gone on to professional careers, including 2018 NFL first-round pick Marcus Davenport of the New Orleans Saints and 2022 draft selections Spencer Burford and Tariq Woolen.

Filo came to the Alamo City after spending seven years in various roles on LSU's strength & conditioning staff, including his last nine months as the associate director.

Filo began his LSU career as an intern in January 2009 and spent his first year working with the nationally-ranked football and baseball teams.

In 2010, Filo moved into a graduate assistant position, where he served as the head strength & conditioning coach for women's soccer while continuing to help with the football and baseball teams.

He was the head strength & conditioning coach for men's basketball during the 2011-12 season, and he also began a four-year stint as an assistant strength & conditioning coach for football in 2011. Filo was promoted to associate director of strength & conditioning for football in May 2015.

During his LSU tenure, Filo coached, designed and implemented annual training programs for six first-round NFL draft picks and 40 NFL players. He also was the internship coordinator and academic liaison for the football strength & conditioning staff.

Filo is a Certified Strength & Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) and a member of the National Strength & Conditioning Association (NSCA) and Certified Strength & Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCA). He also has a Level 1 Sports Performance Coach Certification from USA Weightlifting (USAW).

A native of Richfield, Wis., Filo was a four-year letterwinner in football and member of the dean's list at Wisconsin-La Crosse from 2005-08.

Filo earned his bachelor's degree from Wisconsin-La Crosse in 2009 and his master's degree in kinesiology from LSU in 2014.

DR. LISA CAMPOS



UTSA Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics

Introduced as UTSA's Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics and Athletics Director on Nov. 17, 2017, Dr. Lisa Campos has made an immediate and positive impact on the athletics department, university and community during her time in San Antonio.

One of Campos' first tasks upon her hiring was to develop and implement a new strategic plan for the future of UTSA Athletics and align with UTSA President Taylor Eighmy's vision and strategic initiatives for the university. Less than one year later, she introduced the Roadrunner Game Plan, which utilizes three winning values — Excellence, Integrity and Unity — to focus on developing and enhancing the student-athlete experience, creating a culture of excellence, developing resources and uniting the community. The plan's emphasis to develop champions in the classroom, in competition and in life has been evident during her tenure.

In the last three years, UTSA student-athletes have set numerous department records for academic success including achieving an 82% graduation success rate in the most recent report and currently boasting an average team GPA of 3.24 as of the Spring 2022 semester. Additionally, student-athletes have collected more than 200 Conference USA Commissioner's academic medals and over 800 C-USA Honor Roll certificates during her tenure.

Under her leadership, UTSA's sport programs have produced 13 All-Americans, earned more than 150 all-conference honors and captured 24 individual conference titles and a trio of team conference crowns in the last three years including the 2021 C-USA Football Championship.

In her second year at the helm, Campos led a campus-wide collaboration with Brenda Tracy, a sexual assault survivor, public speaker and founder of the national campaign and nonprofit, Set The Expectation. Their work led to UTSA becoming the first university in the nation to implement the Tracy Rule, the most comprehensive Serious Misconduct rule in the NCAA.

Campos also has overseen the implementation of the Roadrunner Leadership and Professional Development Academy, which offers personal wellness, freshman transition and career development workshops to UTSA's 350-plus student-athletes. She also introduced UTSA Athletics Diversity & Inclusion Excellence, an initiative that seeks to foster a diverse and inclusive culture for the entire campus.

In June 2021, Campos helped UTSA become one of the first Conference USA institutions to introduce an educational and life skills program in anticipation of NCAA and state legislation related to name, image and likeness (NIL) activities. Runners Go Bold is a comprehensive program providing Roadrunner student-athletes with the knowledge and skills to build their personal brands and financial acumen.

Campos also worked closely with the Roadrunner Foundation and colleagues on campus to guide one of the most ambitious projects in the history of UTSA Athletics — the development of the new state-of-the-art Roadrunner Athletics Center of Excellence, which opened in August 2021. The \$40.8 million, 94,700-square-foot facility serves as the central hub for UTSA Athletics and promotes the academic success, health, wellness and performance of student-athletes.

Campos has overseen the highest fundraising year in UTSA Athletics history, while also achieving the highest back-to-back fundraising years in department history. She also engineered a balanced 2020 fiscal year budget despite a major loss of revenue resulting from the pandemic.

Under Campos' leadership, UTSA Athletics has increased its brand presence and awareness in San Antonio and has extended its community outreach initiatives, including Operation Defend the Dome, a ticket donation program for area active-duty and veteran military members and their families. As a result, 42,071 fans — the second-largest home crowd in UTSA football history — packed the Alamodome against Baylor on Sept. 8, 2018. Additionally, UTSA led Conference USA in average home attendance during her first full football season in the Alamo City and again in 2021, drawing 41,148 fans to the conference championship game, the third-largest crowd in program history, and an average of 26,643 for seven home games.

Campos also served as a panelist for the 2018 Greater San Antonio Women in Leadership Symposium, and she was instrumental in UTSA's role as host institution for the 2018 Men's Final Four and 2021 Women's Final Four and in the city landing the 2025 Men's Final Four.

Nationally, Campos currently sits on the NCAA Division I Council, a high-level group responsible for the day-to-day decisions that impact Division I athletics. She also serves as chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committee and on the board of the LEAD1 Association, a membership organization that represents the NCAA Division I

Football Bowl Subdivision athletics directors.

Campos also has served as chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committee and NCAA Women's Soccer Committee, and has been a member of the NCAA Division I Football Oversight Committee, NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and NCAA Rifle Committee.

Campos came to UTSA after five years as the Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics at Northern Arizona University (NAU), where she led the athletics department through a rebrand and transformed it into one of the Big Sky Conference's premier programs.

During her time in Flagstaff, NAU captured 32 Big Sky and Western Athletic Conference championships and nine teams advanced to NCAA postseason competition, including the first NCAA Division I Championship in school history by the men's cross country team in 2016.

Under her leadership, the Lumberjacks collected two Big Sky Conference Presidents' Cup trophies for overall excellence in competition and in the classroom. The Lumberjacks' athletic achievements led to the men's programs winning the Big Sky All-Sports Trophy four consecutive times from 2014-17. The women's teams captured the trophy in 2014 and 2017.

In the 2016-17 academic year, NAU won eight conference championships and swept the Big Sky All-Sports Trophies for the second time under Campos' guidance.

When Campos was named Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics at NAU, she became one of 26 females and the youngest in the country to lead a Division I program at the time of her hire. In Spring 2017, she was recognized by Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal's Forty Under 40.

Prior to her time at NAU, Campos was an associate athletics director (2003-06) and senior associate athletics director (2006-12) at UTEP after serving as the university's assistant dean of students from 2001-03.

During her time in El Paso, she cultivated several significant gifts to the program and oversaw a multimillion-dollar budget. Campos also served as sport administrator for the men's and women's cross country, women's soccer, women's volleyball, women's basketball and men's and women's track & field programs. Campos also was the primary administrator for compliance, CHAMPS/Life Skills, strength and conditioning, sports medicine and cheerleading.

Besides serving on a number of NCAA committees while at UTEP, Campos also was a member of the Conference USA Joint Group and served on the Senior Woman Administrator administrative group. In 2005-06, when UTEP joined Conference USA, she served on the C-USA Strategic Planning Committee and assisted in the development of the realigned Conference USA's vision, core values, mission and strategic objectives. She also represented UTEP on conference committees, including the budget subcommittee, legislative committee, championships selection committee and various sport committees.

Campos earned both her bachelor's degree in business administration and her master's degree in student affairs in higher education from Colorado State. She holds a doctorate degree in educational leadership from UTEP.

She and her husband, Darren D'Attilio, have a son, Christopher.

CHAMPAIGN, ILL. — Frank Harris passed for 280 yards and Zakhari Franklin had a career-best 155 receiving yards to help lead UTSA to a 37-30 victory over Illinois on Saturday night at Memorial Stadium.

The Roadrunners led throughout in logging the program's second victory against a team from a Power Five conference, improving to 9-2 all-time in season openers in the process. UTSA's other triumph over a P5 program was a 17-10 decision over Baylor in the 2017 lid-lifter.

Harris and Franklin led an offense that piled up 497 yards in the Roadrunners' first meeting with a Big Ten Conference school, as Sincere McCormick registered his fourth straight 100-yard game on the ground with 117 yards on 31 carries. Brenden Brady added 67 yards and a pair of scores on 11 totes. Harris completed 20 of 32 passes and tossed one touchdown pass to Franklin, who had a game-high 10 receptions. Joshua Cephus pitched in with six catches for 73 yards.

Defensively, Trevor Harmanson and Tariq Woolen posted nine tackles apiece, while Jamal Ligon and Dadrion Taylor each made six stops.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 11 UTSA 54, LAMAR 0 SAN ANTONIO (ALAMODOME)

SAN ANTONIO — Sheldon Jones returned a punt for a touchdown, Charles Wiley had a score on a fumble return and UTSA posted the first shutout and largest margin of victory in program history in a 54-0 rout of Lamar on Saturday night at the Alamodome.

The Roadrunners racked up 427 yards of offense and held the Cardinals (1-1) to 122 yards — the fewest yards allowed in school history — in racing out to their second straight 2-0 start to a season. UTSA's 54-point margin of victory bettered the previous standard of 53 set in the 56-3 triumph over Northwestern Oklahoma State in 2012.

Jones registered the second punt return TD in school annals when he fielded the ball off one bounce and dashed 76 yards to paydirt to put UTSA on top just three minutes into the game. The New Orleans native now joins Kenny Harrison, who had a 79-yard punt return in the 2012 win over Texas State, as the only two Roadrunners to return a punt for a score.

Meanwhile, Wiley scooped up a loose ball in the second quarter and rambled 44 yards to the end zone to help push the home team's lead to 27-0. The Stockbridge, Ga., native now owns the third longest fumble return in school history and the second longest that resulted in a score.

SAN ANTONIO — UTSA held Middle Tennessee to fewer than 200 yards of offense and off the scoreboard until the final three and a half minutes in a 27-13 victory in the Conference USA opener for both teams on Saturday at the Alamodome.

The Roadrunners limited the Blue Raiders (1-2) to only eight rushing yards in registering their second straight and fourth overall 3-0 start to a season. UTSA posted nine tackles for loss, including five sacks, and now has allowed just 321 total yards in the last two games combined followed last week's 54-0 shutout of Lamar.

Rashad Wisdom paced the defense with six tackles, while Charles Wiley tallied five stops, including 1.5 sacks, and a pair of quarterback hurries. Trumane Bell II led all players with two sacks and 2.5 tackles for loss in a four-tackle performance, and Lorenzo Dantzler had three QB pressures and his second career fumble return for a touchdown.

Offensively, Frank Harris completed 24 of 39 passes for 264 yards and two TDs. Zakhari Franklin hauled in eight passes for 114 yards — his second 100-yard receiving game of the year and seventh of his career — and a touchdown, while Joshua Cephus also caught eight balls for 84 yards and a score. Sincere McCormick topped the 100-yard mark on the ground for the second time this season and 12th of his career with 105 yards on 23 rushes, as he became the program's all-time leader in rushing attempts with 487.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 25 UTSA 31, MEMPHIS 28 MEMPHIS (LIBERTY BOWL)

MEMPHIS — Sincere McCormick piled up 217 all-purpose yards, Clarence Hicks posted a pair of sacks and Hunter Duplessis kicked a 42-yard field goal as time expired to help UTSA rally from a 21-point deficit for a 31-28 victory over Memphis on Saturday, snapping the Tigers' 17-game winning streak at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium.

The Roadrunners, who improved to 4-0 for the first time since 2012, found themselves down 21-0 a little more than nine minutes into their first meeting with the Tigers (3-1). UTSA stormed back to tie the score at 28-all with 10 and a half minutes left to play before completing the rally with Duplessis' game winner, sending Memphis to its first home non-conference loss in 23 games.

McCormick broke his own school record by rushing 41 times for 184 yards and three touchdowns, and the Converse Judson High School product added 33 receiving yards on three catches to lead the offense. It marked his third 100-yard rushing performance of the season and program-best 13th of his career.

Frank Harris completed 18 of 28 passes for 186 yards and a score. Zakhari Franklin had a team-high seven receptions for 51 yards and a TD and Joshua Cephus caught six passes for 82 yards.

UTSA finished the first quarter with zero total yards, but outgained the Tigers 399-230 over the final 45 minutes in the school-record comeback. The Roadrunners also finished the game with a 35:42-24:18 advantage in time of possession.

Meanwhile, Hicks tallied a team-high six tackles, including three tackles for loss and his pair of sacks. The super senior's strip sack of Memphis quarterback Seth Henigan with a little more than 10 minutes left resulted in a Lorenzo Dantzler fumble recovery and 12-yard return to the Tigers 7-yard line. Four plays later on fourth-down-and-goal from the 1, McCormick found the end zone for the third time to help the Roadrunners knot the score.

UTSA's defense forced a punt and with 2:46 remaining the Roadrunners began their game-winning drive. McCormick carried seven times on the possession, including a 22-yard dash to the Memphis 24 for a first down. From there, UTSA used McCormick to run the clock down to two seconds for Duplessis' game winner from 42 yards.

SAN ANTONIO — Frank Harris passed for 278 yards and two touchdowns and Dadrian Taylor registered a pair of sacks, as UTSA held off UNLV 24-17 to equal the best start in program history on Saturday at the Alamodome.

The Roadrunners built a 24-10 second-half lead but had to hold off the Rebels (0-5) in the final minute, using a sack from DeQuarius Henry and Clarence Hicks on fourth down to seal the win and match the 2012 team's 5-0 start as the best in school history. UTSA's eighth win in the last nine games also improved second-year head coach Jeff Traylor to 12-5.

Sincere McCormick logged his fourth 100-yard rushing game of the season and school-record 14th of his career with 120 yards on 23 carries, while Joshua Cephus had eight catches for 83 yards and a TD and Zakhari Franklin hauled in eight passes for 50 yards to help UTSA pile up 564 yards of offense.

SAN ANTONIO — Trevor Harmanson and Corey Mayfield Jr. each had an interception return for a touchdown and Joshua Cephus caught a pair of TD passes to lead UTSA to a 45-0 shutout of Rice in Conference USA action on Saturday night in front of 27,515 fans at the Alamodome.

The Roadrunners held the Owls to 102 yards of offense — a school record for fewest yards allowed — to improve to 7-0 overall and 3-0 in league play for the first time in school history with their second shutout of the season and largest margin of victory in a conference game. UTSA now is riding the longest winning streak in program annals and has won 10 of its last 11 contests dating back to last season.

The two interception returns for scores marked the third time UTSA has posted two defensive touchdowns in a game and the first since the 25-6 win at UTEP in 2015. It was Mayfield's second INT of the season and fourth of his career, while Harmanson picked off a pass for the second time as a Roadrunner to go along with a sack for a 9-yard loss.

Offensively, UTSA piled up 403 yards of offense, including a season-high 261 on the ground. Sincere McCormick led the way by posting his fifth 100-yard game of the season and school-record 15th of his career with 117 yards on 13 carries (9.0 ypc), while B.J. Daniels added 54 yards on seven rushes.

Frank Harris completed 12 of 19 passes for 125 yards and two touchdowns and also ran for 47 yards on five totes. His favorite target was Cephus, who had four catches for 63 yards and the two scores.

RUSTON, La. — Sincere McCormick rushed for 113 yards and three touchdowns, Zakhari Franklin had 118 receiving yards and a pair of scores and Clarence Hicks posted two and a half sacks to lead No. 24 UTSA to a 45-16 victory over Louisiana Tech in Conference USA action on Saturday night at Joe Aillet Stadium.

The Roadrunners erased an early deficit to register their first-ever win against the Bulldogs (2-5, 1-2) in Ruston, running their school-record winning streak to eight games to start the season. UTSA also improved to 4-0 in league play for the first time in program history, staying atop the C-USA West Division.

McCormick's third straight and sixth 100-yard game of the season and school-record 16th of his career helped pace a balanced offensive attack that piled up 406 total yards, 213 on the ground and 193 through the air. For the second time this season and third time in his career, the Converse Judson High School product reached the end zone three times to match the school record.

Franklin's third 100-yard output of the fall and UTSA-record eighth of his career led the aerial attack, and he did his damage on just five catches. The Cedar Hill native also became the school's all-time receptions leader, as the career receiving yardage record-holder now has 132.

Meanwhile, Hicks led a pressure defense that equaled season highs for sacks with six and tackles for loss with 10. The six sacks actually tied the school record for a game done twice previously, including against UNLV earlier this month. The Pensacola, Fla., native totaled four tackles with 2.5 sacks and a pair of quarterback hurries.

EL PASO — Sincere McCormick rushed for 169 yards and Zakhari Franklin racked up 114 receiving yards and two touchdown catches to help lead No. 16 UTSA to a 44-23 victory over UTEP in Conference USA action on Saturday night in front of 31,658 fans at the Sun Bowl.

The Roadrunners extended their school-record winning streak to nine games in running their overall record to 9-0 — their most victories in a season — and league mark to 5-0. UTSA also improved to 5-0 all-time against the Miners (6-3, 3-2) in El Paso with their 12th win in the last 13 games.

McCormick logged his seventh 100-yard performance of the season, tying his own school standard, and UTSA-record 17th of his career on 21 carries, surpassing the 1,000-yard barrier for the second straight season in the process (1,060). The Converse Judson High School product also had a touchdown on the ground and caught a pair of passes for 20 yards.

Franklin did his damage through the air, catching 10 passes en route to his fourth 100-yard output of the season, matching his own UTSA record and extending his career mark to nine.

Frank Harris directed the offense to its fourth straight game of scoring 40 or more points. The Schertz Clemens High School graduate completed 22 of 34 passes for 286 yards and two touchdowns and he also ran for 76 yards and a pair of scores, helping UTSA tally 562 yards of offense, including a season-best 276 rushing.

Rashad Wisdom paced the defense with 10 tackles, including eight solo stops, to go with a pass breakup. Antonio Parks posted a pair of PBUs and three tackles, while Trumane Bell II, Brandon Brown, Jaylon Haynes, Denzel Feaster and Charles Wiley recorded a tackle for loss apiece.

SAN ANTONIO — UTSA forced three turnovers in the fourth quarter to help the Roadrunners outlast Southern Miss 27-17 in Conference USA action on Saturday in front of a season-high 30,105 fans at the Alamodome.

UTSA used the key takeaways to help break a 17-17 tie after three quarters and run its record to 10-0 overall and 6-0 in the league. The Roadrunners came up with a pair of fumble recoveries and an interception in the final six minutes and 39 seconds to help seal their program-record eighth straight home win and push their school-record winning streak to double figures.

Trevor Harmanson forced a fumble on Golden Eagles quarterback Antavio Willis that was recovered by Jahmal Sam at the Southern Miss 33-yard line to help set up Hunter Duplessis for a 24-yard field goal with 4:39 left that gave UTSA the lead for good at 20-17.

On Southern Miss' next possession deep in its own territory, Corey Mayfield Jr. stripped the ball loose from Willis and Charles Wiley scooped it up and returned it to the 9-yard line. On the next play, Sincere McCormick pounded his way into the end zone to help provide the final 10-point margin.

Antonio Parks then picked off a Willis pass attempt on the next drive and raced 44 yards down the sideline to the USM 10 with a little more than two minutes left to play to help seal UTSA's 13th win in the last 14 contests.

McCormick rushed for 90 yards and the touchdown on 19 carries, while Joshua Cephus registered his first 100-yard receiving game with eight catches for 106 yards, including a 40-yard catch-and-run score just before halftime that helped knot the score at 10-10.

Frank Harris completed 17 of 30 passes for 227 yards and two TDs and the Schertz Clemens High School product added 54 yards on the ground to help the offense post 370 yards for the day.

Meanwhile, the defense limited the Golden Eagles to 189 yards, the fourth time holding an opponent to fewer than 200 yards this season. UTSA also yielded just 53 passing yards, the third time allowing 60 or less yards through the air this season.

Jamal Ligon led the way with nine tackles, Harmanson made eight stops and Rashad Wisdom posted six tackles for the Roadrunners. Jaylon Haynes had four tackles, including 1.5 behind the line of scrimmage and a sack while Mayfield Jr. logged a pair of stops for loss and a sack as part of three total tackles.

SAN ANTONIO — Oscar Cardenas caught a touchdown pass from Frank Harris with three seconds left to lift No. 15 UTSA to a 34-31 victory over UAB, clinching the Conference USA West Division title on Saturday in front of a season-high 35,147 at the Alamodome.

Trailing by four points with one minute and six seconds left and no timeouts remaining, the Roadrunners (11-0, 7-0) drove 77 yards for the winning score to push their school-record winning streak to 11 games and their league winning streak to 10, and secure the right to host the 2021 Ryan Conference USA Championship Game at 6 p.m. on Friday, Dec. 3. UTSA also won for the program-record ninth straight time at home in the fifth-largest crowd in school annals.

Cardenas also had a 28-yard reception on the second play of the final drive that moved the ball from the UTSA 23-yard line out to midfield. Harris then completed consecutive passes to De'Corian Clark for six and 33 yards, setting up the Roadrunners at the UAB 10. Harris, who threw for 323 yards and three TDs on 25-of-36 passing, scrambled down to the 1-yard line only to be stopped short with nine seconds left on the clock. Following an incompletion on second and goal, Harris scooped up a low snap and found Cardenas, who hauled in the game-winner after a deflection near the back of the end zone.

Hunter Duplessis — who made a pair of key field goals — drilled the extra point to give UTSA a three-point cushion and then Dadrion Taylor made the game-clinching tackle on the ensuing kickoff to end the game.

The defending conference champion Blazers (7-4, 5-2) took a 31-27 lead with 5:19 remaining on a 15-yard TD run by Dwayne McBride, who rushed for 114 yards on 24 carries.

That score came after UTSA took its first lead of the day at 27-24 on a 49-yard field goal by Duplessis with 1:21 left in the third quarter.

SATURDAY, NOV. 27 NORTH TEXAS 45, UTSA 23 DENTON, TEXAS (APOGEE STADIUM)

DENTON, Texas — North Texas converted three first-half fumble recoveries into 21 points and rushed for 340 yards in a 45-23 victory over UTSA on a cool and rainy Saturday afternoon at Apogee Stadium.

The Mean Green (6-6, 5-3) ended the Roadrunners' perfect season, dropping the Conference USA West Division champions to 11-1 overall and 7-1 in the league. The loss also snapped UTSA-record streaks for consecutive overall and conference wins at 11 and 10, respectively.

Frank Harris rushed for 97 yards and a touchdown and threw for 59 yards, while Brenden Brady and Sincere McCormick added 71 and 60 yards on the ground, respectively.

UNT, which saw Ikaika Ragsdale rush for 142 yards and two touchdowns and DeAndre Torrey go for 108 and three scores, used the three first-half takeaways to build a 31-13 halftime lead.

After a 34-yard field goal by Ethan Mooney on the game's opening possession gave the Mean Green a 3-0 lead, UNT recovered a fumble at the UTSA 26-yard line on the ensuing kickoff return. Four plays, later DeAndre Torrey found the end zone from two yards to make it 10-0.

Hunter Duplessis split the uprights from 29 yards with 5:05 left in the opening quarter to get the visitors on the board.

UTSA turned it over again deep on its own end of the field, this time on a muffed punt that UNT recovered at the 15-yard line. Four plays later, Torrey found paydirt again from four yards out to help increase the lead to 17-3.

The Roadrunners pulled to within 17-6 after Duplessis kicked a 27-yard field goal early in the second stanza. After the defense forced a punt, Harris scrambled and broke several tackles on his way to a 69-yard touchdown to help cut the Mean Green advantage to four midway through the second.

UNT answered with an eight-play, 77-yard march that resulted in a 15-yard TD run by Ragsdale.

FRIDAY, DEC. 3 UTSA 49, WKU 41 SAN ANTONIO (ALAMODOME)

SAN ANTONIO — Sincere McCormick rushed for 204 yards and three touchdowns and Jahmal Sam intercepted a pass as time expired to help lead UTSA to a 49-41 victory over WKU in the 2021 Ryan Conference USA Championship Game on Friday night in front of 41,118, the third-largest crowd in school history, at the Alamodome.

Playing in their 11th season of football and second under head coach Jeff Traylor, the Roadrunners captured their first conference title and improved to 12-1 on the season with their school-record 10th straight home win. UTSA also won for the 15th time in the last 17 contests in beating the Hilltoppers (8-5) for the second time this season.

McCormick's second career 200-yard game came on 36 carries, and a 218-yard, two-touchdown night from quarterback Frank Harris helped propel an offense that piled up 556 yards.

Meanwhile Sam had one of two interceptions and three takeaways, as Donyai Taylor recovered a muffed punt and Antonio Parks picked off a pass on back-to-back possessions early in the second half to help UTSA build a 29-point advantage. UTSA's defense held the Hilltoppers to a C-USA Championship-Game record minus-9 rushing yards, the seventh opponent limited to fewer than 100 yards on the ground.

Rashad Wisdom paced the Roadrunners with eight tackles, while Clarence Hicks posted four tackles and a pair of sacks to break the program's single-season sacks record with 10. Sam had seven stops to go along with his pick and Parks made four tackles in addition to his interception.

FRISCO, Texas — No. 24 San Diego State scored 17 unanswered points over the midway point of the game to erase a 14-7 deficit and cruise to a 38-24 victory over No. 24/25 UTSA in the Tropical Smoothie Cafe Frisco Bowl on Tuesday night at Toyota Stadium.

Under the direction of Conference USA Coach of the Year Jeff Traylor, the shorthanded Roadrunners saw their most successful season in the program's 11-year history come to an end in their second straight bowl appearance, finishing with a 12-2 record for the most wins and best winning percentage by any UTSA team.

The Aztecs (12-2) rode the right arm of quarterback Lucas Johnson, who completed 24 of 36 passes for 333 yards and three touchdowns to lead SDSU to 489 yards of offense on the night. Jesse Matthews had 11 receptions for 175 yards and a pair of scores and Greg Bell rushed for 101 yards and a TD on 26 carries.

Playing without more than a dozen regulars, UTSA took an early lead before the Aztecs reeled off 10 unanswered points to close the first half with a three-point lead and then push their advantage to 17 after a score on the first drive of the second half.

Brady rushed for 76 yards and a TD on 16 carries while Clark hauled in six passes for 72 yards to help pace the UTSA offense.

Defensively, Denzel Feaster and Jamal Ligon posted eight tackles apiece, while Ken Robinson and Antonio Parks pitched in with seven and six, respectively.

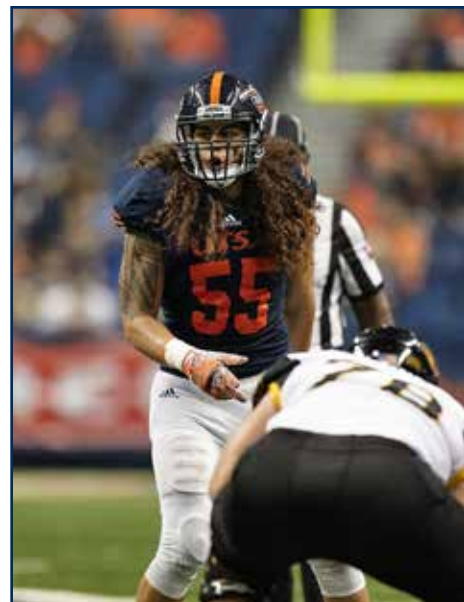

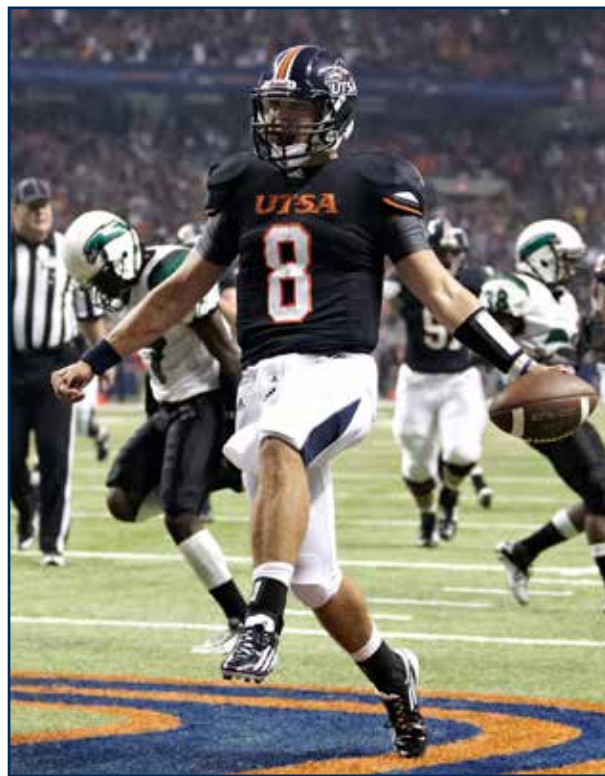

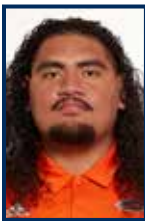
