OPENING KICK

BGSU OPENS 104TH SEASON OF FOOTBALL

- Bowling Green State University opens its 104th season of football at UCLA on Saturday.
- The Falcons open a season against a Pac-12 opponent for the first time since heading to Eugene to open the 2018 season against the Oregon Ducks.

BOWLING GREEN VS. UCLA

- Saturday is the first meeting between Bowling Green and UCLA in football.
- Saturday marks the first time UCLA will host a MAC school.
- BGSU is only the second MAC school UCLA will have played. UCLA's only previous game against a MAC school was when Temple was in the league. They met in the 2009 EagleBank Bowl in Washington, D.C.

FIVE TOP STORYLINES

• Bowling Green is the only MAC school to ever play at the Rose Bowl. Bowling Green, the fifth-winningest program from the 1960s behind Alabama, Texas, Arkansas and Mississippi, faced Cal State Los Angeles at the Rose Bowl on Nov. 25, 1967, in front of 2,464 fans. BGSU won, the game 42-27. It was the final game of **Bob Gibson**'s head coaching career at BGSU, Gibson, a long-time assistant coach of **Doyt Perry**, replaced the hall of fame coach upon retirement in 1965.



ILB Darren Anders led the MAC in 2021 with 10.33 tackles per game. He also finished No. 8 in the nation in tackles. Anders is a preseason PFN first-team All-American

- Since the start of the FBS era in 1978, Saturday marks the first time a MAC school will play a game at the Rose Bowl.
- Bowling Green is playing on a grass surface for only the second time in the Scot Loeffler era BGSU also played on grass in the 2021 season opener at Tennessee's Neyland Stadium. Saturday marks just the third time over 51 games that Bowling Green will play on a grass surface.
- Preseason All-American Darren Anders was No. 8 in the nation in 2021 with 10.33 tackles per game. He is one of three players in all of FBS over the past two seasons to rank in the Top-15 nationally in tackles and the only one who returns to the college football ranks in 2022.
- BGSU quarterback Matt McDonald hails from Newport Beach, Calif., and will become the fourth McDonald in his family to play a game at the Rose Bowl. He joins his father, Paul (USC) and his brothers, Michael (USC) and Andrew (New Mexico State). More on page four.

#ToTheMoon: BYTHE NUMBERS

Saturday is BGSU's fourth all-time game against a school from the Pac-12 and first since opening the 2018 season at Oregon.

THE FALCONS

The nickname Falcons was chosen for BGSU athletic teams in 1927. It was suggested by the sports editor of the Daily Sentinel Tribune, who thought the nickname was fitting because it was indicative of a powerful bird that was small in stature, its coloring represented the school colors, and, like the athlete, the falcon must go through a long period of training before battle. Freddie and Frieda Falcon are the campus mascots.

UNIVERSITY COLORS

The historical story behind how BGSU began using Brown and Orange as its school colors dates back to 1914.

Dr. Williams, the university's first President, gathered a group of people which included a Dr. L.L.Winslow from Industrial Arts as a selection committee for the school's new colors. While on an interurban (or trolley) ride to Toledo, Dr. Winslow sat behind a woman wearing a large hat adorned with beautiful brown and orange feathers. It is unclear whether or not she ever actually gave him a few of these feathers from her hat, however, he was so interested in the color scheme of the pair that he convinced the committee to approve the combination of Brown and Orange.

INSPIRATION TO THE CLEVELAND BROWNS

It was early in the calendar year of 1946 and Browns general manager/head coach Paul Brown was scouring Ohio, looking for a training camp site for that summer on which the team could get ready for its inaugural season in the start-up All-America Football Conference.

His travels took him to Bowling Green and Bowling Green State University. Brown was interested in the school because it was far enough away from Cleveland that he could sequester his team there away from all the noise and chatter of the big city, but close enough that the Browns, when they needed to, could get back to Cleveland in a decent amount of time (two hours-plus at a point in history before the existence of the Ohio Turnpike).

Brown was getting a tour when he stopped in an athletic building. What caught his attention was a framed BGSU football jersey on a wall. He really liked the school's orange-and-brown color combination and the rest is history.

SONGS OF BGSU

President Ralph McDonald opened a five-year contest during which each year a college song was chosen and presented on Honors Day. At the end of the five-year period, a committee convened to listen to all five winners. Edith Ludwig Bell's composition was publicly presented as The Alma Mater of BGSU at the Golden Anniversary Convocation on May 19, 1960.

Before 1948, there was not an official fight song for campus. The Commoners, a men's independent group, created a contest for a new fight song. Following the students' lead, campus officials asked the music department to develop an official fight song. Dr. Wayne Bohrnstedt, assistant professor of music from 1947-53, composed the current song, "Forward Falcons." The words were written by Sidney Freeman, a graduate assistant in the English department.

Brought to Bowling Green over half a century ago by original SICSIC member and World War II veteran Gilbert Fox, "Ay Ziggy Zoomba" is BGSUs unofficial fight song. In 1946, Fox, an Army Air Corps bombardier who served in Italy, brought his interpretation based upon a Zulu war chant back to the University.

YOU ARE NOT FORGOTTEN

Bowling Green has a permanently unoccupied seat in Doyt Perry Stadium to honor the tens of thousands of military personnel who are or were prisoners of war (POW) or have been declared missing in action (MIA).

POW/MIA Chair of Honor is a national program designed to remember prisoners of war and those missing in action. The chair was permanently installed in the stadium in 2014 to help visitors and fans remember that even though our service members are not with us, they are not forgotten

THE HOLLYWOOD CONNECTION - BGSU EDITION

- In the spirit of playing in Southern California, Bowling Green has a few connections to Hollywood.
- The late actor Bernie Casey was an All-American (1960) for the Falcons and was a member of BGSU's 1959 National Championship team (small college). Casey was a first-round selection (ninth overall) in the 1961 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. He enjoyed an eight-year NFL career with the 49ers and Los Angeles Rams. Afterward he enjoyed an acting career that spanned five decades and included films like Revenge of the Nerds, Under Siege, Brian's Song, Another 48 Hours and Never Say Never Again.
- In the movie "That Thing You Do," there is Villapiano's, the "spaghetti place out by the airport," which was named after former Bowling Green great Phil Villapiano. Tom Hanks, who grew up during his formative years in Oakland, was a fan of the Raiders and Phil Villapiano, who he used to call "Phil Villa-The Playah-piano." Hanks wrote, directed, and appeared in "That Thing You Do."

THE MCDONALD ROSE BOWL CONNECTION

- Bowling Green quarterback, Matt McDonald, is the son of former USC quarterback Paul McDonald. Matt will become the fourth McDonald in his family to play inside the Rose Bowl.
- While Matt hails from Newport Beach, Calif., Saturday marks his first career game at the Rose Bowl.
- His dad, Paul, played three games inside the historic edifice, all of which were Trojan wins in the Rose Bowl game. Paul was 2-0 as a starter, including leading USC to the 1978 national championship. Paul never played UCLA at the Rose Bowl since UCLA also played home games at the Coliseum until 1982.
- Paul was part of three Rose Bowl wins (1976, 1978, 1979) with the Trojans.
- Matt's older brother Michael was a USC quarterback from 2003-07 and was on the Trojan roster for five trips to the Rose Bowl, including three Rose Bowl games.
- Matt's other older brother, Andrew, was the starting quarterback for New Mexico State when the Aggies came to UCLA and the Rose Bowl in 2013.

MORE ON THAT VILLAPIANO GUY

- BGSU alum Phil Villapiano was a key member of the Oakland Raiders' Super Bowl XI championship that was played at the Rose Bowl.
- His momentum changing goal-line tackle against the Vikings forced a fumble that was recovered by the Raiders' Willie Hall, helping the Raiders to victory.

BOWLING GREEN - UCLA CONNECTIONS

- UCLA offensive line coach Tim Drevno was the offensive line coach and offensive coordinator at Michigan with current BGSU passing game coordinator and wide receiver coach Erik Campbell.

BGSU'S CALIFORNIA CONNECTION

- Bowling Green has a few California connections on its roster. In addition to Matt McDonald is wide receiver Austin Osborne, who was the primary receiving target in high school for McDonald at Mission Viejo High School in California. The PrepStart All-American caught 36 passes for 961 yards and 16 touchdowns as a junior during McDonald's senior season at Mission Viejo.
- McDonald started his high school career at Mater Dei where he won the starting job over JT Daniels. After an injury knocked McDonald out of the lineup, Daniels kept the starting job. McDonald then moved on to Mission Viejo HS.
- OLB Bryce Brand claims Detroit as his hometown, but as a kid his parents moved to Concord, Calif., where he played at Clayton Valley Charter.
- DL Kitione Tau also hails from Concord, Calif. He played at Clayton Valley Charter with Brand before moving on to Pittsburg High School. Tau comes to BGSU via Laney CC and was a true freshman for the Eagles when the school was featured on the fifth season of Netflix's Last Chance U.
- CB Davon Ferguson made his collegiate debut for Hartnell College in Salinas, Calif., making 55 tackles and two interceptions in 2017 before heading to Kansas for 2018-20.

THE ROSE BOWL IS NO NEW VENUE FOR THESE FALCONS

- Despite no MAC team every playing at UCLA and only the 1967
 Falcon team being the only other MAC squad to play a game at the Rose Bowl, the historic edifice is not a stranger to many within the Bowling Green program. Here are some connections to the historic sadium, the "Granddaddy of them All" and the BGSU program:
- Bowling Green head coach Scot Loeffler is a 1998 graduate of Michigan and was on Lloyd Carr's Michigan staff for the 1998, 2004, 2005 and 2007 Rose Bowls. He was a student assistant on Michigan's 1997 National Championship team that beat Washington State in the 1998 Rose Bowl. He was UM's quarterbacks coach for the 2004, 2005 and 2007 Rose Bowls.
- BGSU associate head coach and inside linebackers coach Steve Morrison is a 1994 Michigan alum. He played in the 1992 and 1993 Rose Bowl games for Michigan. He later was an assistant coach for Michigan and was on staff for the 2003 and 2005 Rose Bowls.
- BGSU passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach Erik Campbell is a 1988 graduate of Michigan. He played in the 1987 Rose Bowl and coached in four more: 1998, 2004, 2005, 2007 as Michigan's wide receiver coach and assistant head coach.
- BGSŪ running backs coach Brian White has coached in two Rose Bowls as the offensive coordinator and running backs coach at Wisconsin (1999 & 2000).
- Fresno native and outside linebackers coach Sammy Lawanson was Arizona State's staff from 2012-13, which included the Sun Devils' 2013 regular season trip to the Rose Bowl to face UCLA.
- BGSU center Jakari Robinson was part of the 2018 Cincinnati team that opened the 2018 season at UCLA.
- BGSU wide receiver and Rancho Santa Margarita native Austin Osborne was part of Washington's squad that faced Ohio State in the 2019 Rose Bowl.
- Football strength & conditioning coach Kevin Tolbert, who played football at Navy for hall of fame coach George Welsh, was also at Michigan as an assistant strength coach for the Wolverines during Carr's tenue. He was part of Michigan's 2004, 2005 and 2007 Rose Bowl teams. He was also on staff at Stanford when the Cardinal came to UCLA and the Rose Bowl in 2010.
- A Carlsbad, Calif., native, BGSU assistant AD for strategic communications Vincent Briedis grew up attending UCLA football games at the Rose Bowl. At the age of four he would sell a cup full of peanuts from his parents' giant Price Club (Costco precursor) bag for a nickel to the fans sitting around him.



COACH LOEFFLER AND COMPANY ENTERYEAR NUMBER FOUR

- BGSU Director of Athletics Bob Moosbrugger named veteran Scot Loeffler as the 20th head coach in Bowling Green history on Nov. 28, 2018.
- Although the 2019 season marked Loeffler's first as a head coach, the Ohio native brought a wealth of high-level college football experience with him to Bowling Green. Loeffler has served as the offensive coordinator at Boston College, Virginia Tech, Auburn and Temple. He has also coached at Florida, his alma mater Michigan, and Central Michigan -- as well as the Detroit Lions.
- Loeffler has coached seven quarterbacks who went on to play in the NFL, a list that includes: Tom Brady, Tim Tebow, Brian Griese, Chad Henne, Drew Henson, John Navarre and Logan Thomas. His teams have qualified for 17 bowl games, including coaching for Michigan's 1997 Rose Bowl team that won the national championship.

COACHING STAFF CHANGES HEADING INTO 2022

- BGSU head coach Scot Loeffler experienced minimal changes to his coaching staff.
- BGSU alum and former NFL tight end Alex Bayer returned home as the special teams coordinator, replacing Bob Ligashesky who left for the same position at Syracuse.
- Tight end coach Greg Nosal and quarterbacks coach Max Warner were elevated to co-offensive coordinators after Terry Malone left for a spot on the LSU coaching staff.
- Sammy Lawanson joined the BGSU staff as the outside linebackers coach after Cato June was hired for the same position with the Indianapolis Colts.
- Brian White was hired as the running backs coach to cover the position group vacated with Malone leaving for LSU. White has coached some elite running backs over his career, including Wisconsin's Ron Dayne during his Heisman Trophy winning season, as well as Boston College's AJ Dillon. White was on staff with Loeffler at Florida (2009-10) and Boston College (2016-18).

DUEL-SPORT ATHLETE IN GAZAREK

- •TE Levi Gazarek is also a RHP on the Bowling Green baseball team.
- He is one of 15 FBS players that is also on a baseball roster for next spring.
- Gazarek pitched 42.1 innings in 2022, going 2-3 with a 7.87 ERA. He notched 22 strikeouts and made five starts.
- Last season for BGSU Gazarek appeared in all 12 football games with 10 starts.
- He made his first collegiate catches at Tennessee in the 2021 season opener caught his for 23 yards. He finished last season with 10 receptions for 88 yards.
- In the spring of 2021, Gazarek pitched 8.0 innings, striking out five.

CURRENT FBS HEAD COACHESTHAT COACHED AT BOWLING GREEN

- Eight current FBS head coaches served as either a GA, full-time assistant coach or head coach at Bowling Green. Only Alabama (13), Arizona (9), Ohio State (9), Tennessee (9) and Texas Tech (9) have more.
- BGSU can claim: Dino Babers (Syracuse), Matt Campbell (Iowa State), Dave Clawson (Wake Forest), Stan Drayton (Temple), Mike Elko (Duke), Clark Lea (Vanderbilt), Sean Lewis (Kent State) and Scot Loeffler (Bowling Green).

BOWLING GREEN RETURNS THE PRODUCTION

- Bowling Green, one of the nation's youngest teams in 2021, is No. 1 in the nation entering 2022 in terms of returning production.
- BGSU returns 92 percent of its production per ESPN's Bill Connelly, which is tops in the nation.
- Northern Illinois is the only other MAC school in the Top 35 as the Huskies come in at No. 8 with 82 percent production returning.

STARTING EXPERIENCE RETURNS FOR BGSU

- Bowling Green returns 35 Falcons that have starting experience at BGSU. Compared to last year on opening day when only 16 Falcons had starting experience.
- BGSU returns nine starters on offense and nine starters on defense from 2021.
- Compared to the 2020 season, BGSU had eight players with freshman eligibility status in 2020 that made starts and 20 true freshmen saw game action.
- Among FBS schools in 2020, BGSU's 20 true freshmen on the field was tied for the sixth most in the country. It was the highest total in the Mid-American Conference.

ANDERS CONTINUES TO BE ELITE

- ILB Darren Anders was a first-team All-MAC honoree in 2021 after leading the league in tackles (10.3 per game) and finishing No. 8 in the nation in tackles per game.
- One of three players in all of FBS over the last two seasons to rank in the top-15 nationally in tackles and is the only one who returns to CFB in 2022.
- He was one of three FBS players in 2021 with 120+ tackles, 3.0+ sacks, 1+ fumbles recovered and 1+ interceptions (one of two through the regular season) and only one returning to CFB in 2022.
- Anders, who has also been named to the Butkus Award, Bednarik Award, Lombardi Award and Nagurski Trophy watch lists, leads all Mid-American Conference players in total watch lists named to with four. He is the first Bowling Green player to be named to four different watch lists.
- He was also named a first-team preseason Pro Football Network All-American.

ANDERS HAS BEEN ON POINT SINCE 2020

- Bowling Green's Darren Anders ranks No. 1 in the nation among active players in tackles per game dating back to the start of the 2020 season.

- Darren Anders had a special season for the Falcons in 2021. Since 2000, he is one of 28 FBS players to notch 120+ tackles (12), 9.0+ tackles for loss (9.5), 3.0+ sacks (3.0), 1+ fumble recoveries (1) and 1+ interceptions (1) in a season.
- Of the 28 players since 2000 to notch these numbers, only Anders, TCU's Paul Dawson in 2014, Troy's Carlton Martial in 2019, Tulane's Trent Mackey in 2011, Akron's Ulysees Gilbert III in 2017 and UCLA's Eric Kendricks in 2014 also recorded a "pick-6."

WATCH OUT FOR KARL BROOKS

- DL Karl Brooks returns in 2021 after finishing the regular season in 2021 No. 5 in the MAC with 7.5 sacks.
- Brooks is No. 7 all-time in BGSU history with 17.5 sacks.
- Brooks earned third-team All-MAC honors in 2021.

FERGUSON IS A BIG RETURN FOR BGSU IN 2022

- CB Davon Ferguson was having a monster year in 2021 when he suffered a non-contact injury against Eastern Michigan that sidelined him for the rest of the year, missing the final 4.5 games of the season.
- •When he went down with injury, he was the only player in the nation with 60+ tackles (68), 2.0+ sacks (2) and 4+ passes defended (4).
- He was also No. 1 in the MAC and No. 14 in the nation with 5.6 solo tackles per game at the time of his injury.
- Made five stops and 2.0 sacks in win at Minnesota.
- Made a career-high 17 tackles at MAC champion NIU with 10 solo stops.
- Ferguson was named a preseason honorable mention All-American by Pro Football Network.

ANDERSON MAKESTHE GRADE FORTHE FALCONS

- S Jordan Anderson was one of the most consistent safeties in the nation.
- •The third-team All-MAC safety was the top safety in the MAC and No. 9 among all "Group of 5" safeties per Pro Football Focus' grades.
- Anderson was one of three FBŠ players in the nation in 2021 to record 3+ INTs, 2+ fumble recoveries and 5+ PBUs, joining Penn State's Ji'ayir Brown and East Carolina's Ja'Quan McMillian.

LOEFFLER QUARTERBACKS AND THE LOMBARDITROPHY

 Bowling Green head coach Scot Loeffler has coached seven quarterbacks who went on to play in the NFL. Those seven quarterbacks have gone on to win a combined nine Super Bowl championships (Tom Brady - 7; Brian Griese - 1; Chad Henne - 1).

- Bowling Green welcomes 16 transfers for the 2022 season, which includes Chris Bacon (Georgia State), Jake Burns (Cincinnati), Cedric Dunbar II (Jackson State), Tunde Fatukasi (Rutgers), Odieu Hiliare (Alabama A&M), Delonus Kabir (Florida A&M), CJ Lewis (Boston College), Leiris Manzi (Hocking College), Jordan Oladokun (Samford), Camden Orth (LIU), Jakari Robinson (Memphis), Owen Rozanc (West Liberty), Kameren Stewart (Coastal Carolina), Kitione Tau (Laney CC), DJ Taylor (Wake Forest), Bronson Warner (Abilene Christian).
- Burns and Robinson were all at Cincinnati in 2020 when the Bearcats won the AAC and faced Georgia in the Peach Bowl. Robinson started the Peach Bowl at center and transferred to Memphis in 2021.
- Lewis and BGSU quarterback Matt McDonald were both in the same recruiting class at Boston College in 2017. McDonald transferred from Boston College to Bowling Green in 2019 when head coach Scot Loeffler left BC to take the BGSU head coaching job.
- •Tau spent 2019 and 2021 at Laney CC in California. The 2020 season was lost due to COVID-19. During Tau's 2019 season, Laney was featured in season five of Netflix's Last Chance U.
- Hiliare's older brother, Hygens Succes, played linebacker at Florida while BGSU head coach Scot Loeffler was the quarterback coach.

BRODEN READY TO TAKE THAT NEXT STEP IN 2022

- WRTyrone Broden had a breakout season in 2021 as he led BGSU with 596 receiving yards on 36 receptions. He also had a team-best five receiving touchdowns. His 16.56 yards per reception ranked No. 4 in the MAC and No. 57 nationally.
- Broden is listed at 6-7, but was only 5-8 as a junior in high school. He was 6-4 by his senior year in high school and 6-5 by the time he arrived at BGSU in 2019. While he has been at Bowling Green, he has grown to 6-7.

DEFENSETOOK A GIANT LEAP LAST SEASON

- The Bowling Green defense finished 2021 No. 64 in total defense, allowing 373.9 yards per game. Despite losing starters later in the season like Davon Ferguson and Bryce Brand for the year, it was still the best team defensive effort since 2013, the last time BGSU allowed below 400 yards of total offense in a game.
- •The 2021 season was the first under defensive coordinator Eric Lewis, who joined Scot Loeffler's staff in 2020 as the defensive backs coach. He was elevated to defensive coordinator in 2021. Lewis is the son of long-time college and NFL coach Sherman Lewis.

HILIARE'S GAME RECEPTION STREAK

- Bowling Green's Odieu Hiliare brings a 22-game reception streak into the season opener at UCLA. It is tied for No. 14 in the nation among active streaks and is the third-best in the MAC behind No. 3 Dylan Drummon (EMU, 31) and No. 11 Jayston Jackson (Ball State, 25).
- Minnesota's Chris Autman-Bell currently has the best active streak in the nation at 38 games.

ZIMMERLY WAS IN A CLASS OF HIS OWN IN 2021

• C Cade Zimmerly earned his first career start at Tennessee in the 2021 season opener. He as the only offensive or defensive true freshman walk-on to start a game in all of 2021. Georgia Southern had a placekicker Britton Williams that started on special teams.

HARDAMON AN ADDED BOOST FOR FALCON DEFENSE

- DE Demetrius Hardamon is a walk-on after transferring from NAIA Georgetown College in Kentucky.
- He made his FBS debut last season at Ohio. It was the only game for the Falcons he appeared in prior to 2021.
- With injuries on the defensive side of the ball, Hardamon has seen more time.
- Hardamon made his first career start last time out at Miami (OH).
- He had a career-high 10 tackles at Buffalo.
- He has made 19 tackles, 4.0 tackles for loss, 0.5 sacks and three QB hurries over BGSU's last three games. He also blocked a PAT at Miami (OH).

MCDONALD ELEVATING GAMETOWARDTHE END OF LAST SEASON

- Since throwing three interceptions in the Akron (Oct. 9, 2021) game, QB Matt McDonald has thrown for 1,149 yards, seven touchdowns and only one interception over the past six games.
- McDonald has gone 115 passes since his last interception, which came on his first pass of the third quarter against Eastern Michigan.
- However, McDonald has been sacked 17 times over the last four games, which makes up 43.6 percent of times he has been sacked in 2021.
- McDonald is the son of former Cleveland Brown starting quarterback Paul McDonald. Paul led the USCTrojans to the 1979 National Title and was a first-team All-American and first-team academic All-American for the Trojans.

2022 BOWLING GREEN FOOTBALL

BGSU NEEDS TO REPLACE THE KICKING GAME IN 2022

- Not only is Alex Bayer BGSU's new special teams coordinator, but he is tasked with breaking
 in a new placekicker, punter and long snapper in 2022.
- Nate Needham graduates and moves on after earning first-team All-America honors from the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) in 2021. The Lou Groza Award semifinalist finished the regular season in 2021 No. 1 in the nation with a 95 percent success rate, including going 12-of-13 from 40+ and 2-fo-2 from 50+.
- BGŠU welcomes West Liberty transfer Owen Rozanc who left WLU No. 5 all-time in school history with 197 points, 33 field goals and 98 PATs. Also in the mix is Mason Lawler, who has kicked off the past three seasons for the Falcons. He is 1-of-2 on career field goal attemps. Freshman Eathan Warner, sophomore Jack Sauder and redshirt freshman Alan Anaya all have yet to appear in a collegiate game.
- BGSU lost punter Matt Naranjo to graduation as well. Naranjo was a third-team All-MAC punter in 2021 after averaging 41.6 yards per punt.
- BGSU brings in Aussie punter Sami Sir from Melbourne, Australia. Upon high school graduation Sir worked at the Melbourne Airport as an aviation protection officer from 2014-19. His uncle, Sedat Sir, was the first Turkish professional Australian rules football player from 1994-98. He comes to BGSU via Prokick Australia, which he joined in 2019 and was coached by Nathan Chapman and John Smith. Lawler also has punted during his career at BGSU and is in the mix too.
- James Carolan, one of BGSU's captains in 2021, also graduated after being the primary long snapper since 2017. Freshman Dominic Konopka and redshirt freshman George Carlson are the only long snappers on the roster to replace Carolan.

DOYT PERRY STADIUM

Doyt Perry Stadium is named in honor of the man who led Bowling Green to a 77-11-5 record in his 10 years as the head coach of the Falcons.

Doyt L. Perry was simply one of the greatest football coaches of his day. His .855 winning percentage over 10 seasons in the 1950s and 1960s remains one of the highest in football history. In fact, Perry is sixth all-time behind Bob Reade (Augustana), Knute Rockne (Notre Dame), Frank Leahy (Notre Dame), Larry Kehres (Mount Union) and Jeff Devanney (Trinity, Conn.) in winning percentage among coaches with at least 10 years of service on the collegiate level. Perry served as the BGSU athletic director for seven years (1965-71) after stepping down as football coach.

Bowling Green won the first game ever played in Perry Stadium, defeating Dayton, 13-0, on Oct. 1, 1966. The football facility at BGSU was formally dedicated as Doyt L. Perry Stadium on Sept. 26, 1992.

Bowling Green has played 284 games in the venue. BGSU's all-time record at Doyt Perry Stadium stands at 171-107-6.

Scot Loeffler Head Coach • Fourth Season

Scot Loeffler is in his fourth season as the head coach at Bowling Green State University. The 20th head coach of the Bowling Green football program, Loeffler came to BGSU after serving as deputy head coach and offensive coordinator at Boston College.

Coming to BGSU, Loeffler inherited one of the nation's biggest rebuilding projects as the BGSU offense and defense both ranked nearly last in the nation in both offensive and defensive production the season before his arrival.

The gains during Loeffler's tenure started to take root in 2021 as the Falcons enjoyed some signature wins, highlighted by a 14-10 triumph at Minnesota. The Gophers ultimately finished the year 9-4 and in second place in the West division of the Big Ten. BGSU's gains in 2021 were foundational as the Flacons were one of the nation's youngest teams with 71 student-athletes on the roster that were taking part in their first

or second season of college football.

The BGSU defense led the way in 2021 as it recorded its best season dating back to the 2013 MAC championship year, allowing opponents only 373.7 yards per game. Nate Needham earned first-team All-America honors from the Football Writers Association of America after leading the nation in field goal percentage through the regular season (.950) on 19-of-20 field goal attempts. He was only the third Falcon to earn first-team honors from the FWAA, the second-oldest All-America team.

Linebacker Darren Anders, Needham and tight end Christian Sims all earned first-team All-MAC honors, giving BGSU the most first-team nods since the 2015 MAC championship season. Anders led the MAC and was No. 8 in the nation with 10.3 tackles per game. Sims led the MAC tight ends with 41 receptions and 418 receiving yards.

Loeffler's second season at Bowling Green came during the Covid-19 pandemic when the MAC started its season late and the Falcons played only five games. Despite going winless, the young Falcons had valuable game experience. Tight end Quintin Morris earned first-team All-MAC honors after leading the league in tight end receptions and tight end receiving yards.

In his first season at Bowling Green, the Falcons built a foundation for success. Although BGSU went just 3-9 overall and 2-6 in MAC play, the program started the rebuild in many ways. Most notably, the Falcons defeated rival Toledo 20-7 to end a nine-game losing streak in the Battle of I-75.

In BGSU's three victories (overToledo, Akron and Morgan State), the Falcons outscored their opponents 101-16, highlighting explosive offensive performances and stifling defensive efforts. Bowling Green held Morgan State to just 70 yards of offense and Akron to 100 yards. BGSU gave up just one touchdown in those three victories.

Loeffler's coaching career, which spans back to his time as a student assistant at Michigan during the 1996 season, includes stops at Michigan, Central Michigan, Florida,Temple, Auburn, VirginiaTech and Boston College. He also spent a year coaching the quarterbacks for the Detroit Lions.

Over his career, Loeffler has coached seven quarterbacks who went on to play in the NFL -Tom Brady, Tim Tebow, Brian Griese, Chad Henne, Drew Henson, John Navarre and LoganThomas. Those seven quarterbacks have won a combined nine Super Bowl championships (Tom Brady, 7; Brian Griese, 1; Chad Henne, 1). He has also directed a potent rushing attack at Boston College behind AJ Dillon, who was 12th nationally in rushing yards per game in 2018. Dillon was the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2017 and the nation's second-leading rusher among freshmen. Dillon was later drafted in the second round by the Green Bay Packers in the 2020 NFL Draft.

In 2018, Boston College scored 40+ points in four of its first five games, including an average of 52.7 points in consecutive wins over Massachusetts, Holy Cross and Wake Forest. The Eagles then defeated Temple 45-35 and Louisville 38-20. The team ended the regular season at 7-5 overall.

Prior to coming to BGSU, Loeffler's teams have played in 15 bowl games in the 17 seasons he has been a college

In 2017, Loeffler's offense posted 35+ points in three consecutive games for the first time in 15 years at Boston College. The team scored 40+ points in consecutive conference games for the first time in the program's Big East and ACC history. The rushing offense climbed from 96th to 25th in the country and the Eagles were one of the faster teams in the nation, ranking 18th nationally in total plays.

In 2016, his first year on staff at Boston College, the Eagles won a bowl game for the first time in nine years. Prior to his tenure at Boston College, Loeffler served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under Frank
Beamer at Virginia Tech from 2013-15. He mentored Logan Thomas, who finished his collegiate career by breaking career records for passing yards, attempts, touchdown passes and rushing touchdowns by a quarterback. He oversaw a trio of wide receivers who became the first group in Virginia Tech history to each record 40 or more receptions in a season. While at Virginia Tech he directed a VT offense that went into Columbus, Ohio, and defeated Ohio State, 35-21, in the Buckeyes only loss during their 2014 national championship season.

As the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Auburn in 2012, Loeffler mentored Tre Mason, a 1000-yard rusher who became the first non-quarterback to lead Auburn in total offense since Bo Jackson in 1985.

Loeffler guided Temple to the seventh-best rushing average in the nation as offensive coordinator in 2011 and running back Bernard Pierce ranked sixth nationally, including 107 yards on the ground in Doyt L. Perry Stadium in a 13-10 BGSU victory. That team went on to win the program's first bowl game since 1979.

Prior to his time at Temple, he was the quarterbacks coach at Florida under former BGSU head coach Urban Meyer, helping the unit to the best pass efficiency in the nation in 2009. He guided Tebow in his final season in Gainesville as he passed for 2,895 yards and 21 touchdowns. Tebow graduated from Florida with five NCAA, 14 SEC and 28 school

In 2008, Loeffler worked with the Detroit Lions' guarterbacks, following his tenure at Michigan. From 2002-07, he coached quarterbacks for the Wolverines. Chad Henne became the first true freshman quarterback to lead his team to a BigTen title and start in a BCS game, while John Navarre became Michigan's first All-BigTen first-team quarterback

Along with his time at Temple, Loeffler has familiarity in the Mid-American Conference as he was Central Michigan's quarterbacks coach from 2000-01. Prior to that, he was a graduate assistant and student assistant at Michigan, working with Brady and Griese. He was part of the Wolverines' undefeated national championship season in 1997.

A native of Barberton, Ohio and Barberton High School, Loeffler played quarterback at Michigan from 1993-96. A 1998 graduate of Michigan, Loeffler earned his undergraduate degree in history with a minor in political science

Loeffler is married to Amie, who holds an undergraduate degree in chemistry from Bowling Green in 1999 and a graduate degree in chemistry in 2005. The couple has three children – Luke, Alexis and Mary Elizabeth.

DID YOU KNOW?

QB Matt McDonald and WR Austin Osborne were high school teammates at Mission Viejo High School in Southern California. Osborne was part of MVHS's 2015 state championship team. That year McDonald was the starting QB at Mater Dei and was injured early in the season and while he was out with injury JT Daniels (West Virginia) took over. In 2016, McDonald took over at Mission Viejo and teamed up with Osborne. Osborne holds school records for receiving touchdowns in a game (4), season (20) and a career (46).

- OT Tunde Fatukasi started playing the drums in church when he was six years old. He taught himself to play the drums and has played over the years at churches in the USA and Nigeria. Fatukasi's older brothers Foley (Jaguars) and Olakunle (Buccaneers) currently play in the NFL. The Fatukasi family was displaced from their Far Rockaway, N.Y., due to Hurricane Sandy. The family of five lived in a hotel for three months and then a friend's apartment after that while their home was fixed.
- While in high school, WR **Jaedyn McK-instry** overcame rhabdomyosarcoma, a cancer that mostly affects children and forms in soft skeletal muscle tissue. The cancer was determined to be in stage 4 based on location paratesticular, lymph node and lung and required surgical removal. He was given only a 50 percent chance of surviving. He beat it and returned to high school sports in the fall of 2019
- Head coach Scot Loeffler, associate head coach (LBs) Steve Morrison, and passing game coordinator (WRs) Erik Campbell were all on staff with each other at Michigan under former head coach Lloyd Carr.
- •The Falcons have a unique legacy on their team in 2022. Tight end **Bryce Boyer** is a fourth-generation falcon. His dad (Lee), grandfather (Chester) and great grandfather (Rodney) all played football at Bowling Green. Research to this point has the Boyers as the second four-generation family in FBS history and first that is a direct line of son-yfather-ygrandfather-ygreat grandfather. Washington State is the other, but it was a direct line of three and a maternal grandfather.
- Co-Offensive Coordinator **Greg Nosal** played offensive guard at Virginia Tech and in 2010 received the nickname "Nine-Fingers Nosal" after he lost the tip of his pinkie during a game with Central Michigan. His pinkie got stuck in a facemask on a block and the tip was ripped off. They found it in his glove, put it on ice and Nosal played the rest of the game with his hand tapped up. Later in the fourth quarter they stiched it back on his finger.
- BĠSU director of football operations **Damaris Linker** is one of six female director of football operations at the FBS level that oversee the entire operation for the program. Along with **Dani Coppes**, BGSU's football sports medicine provider, Bowling Green and Kansas State are the only schools in the nation with female leads over football operations and sports medicine.
