Coach Ron Caragher enters his second season leading a program that has 17 wins in the last two years and 17 returning starters for 2014.

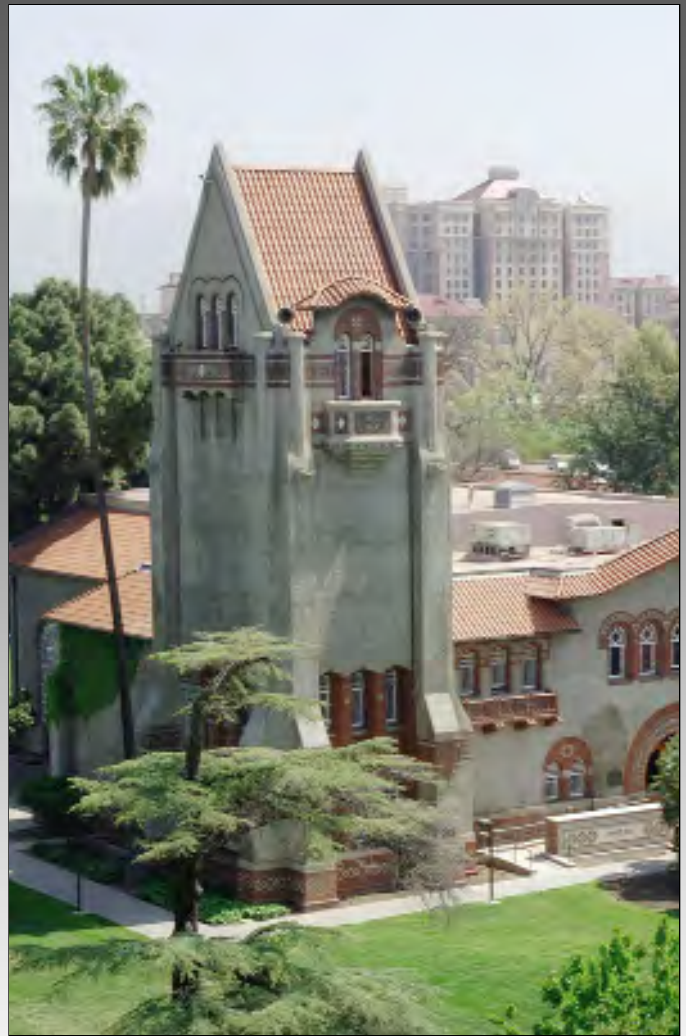

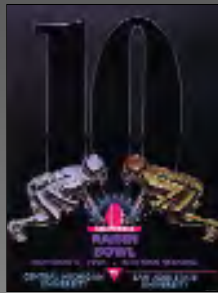

Tony Jackson was a co-captain of the 1970 football team. He retired with the rank of Major General in the United States Marine Corps in 2011.



Charles "Chuck" Davidson is a 1957 graduate who is a successful Bay Area home builder. He is founder of DKB Homes LLP, the Charles W. Davidson Co., Davidson Homes, DKD Property Mgt., and L&D Construction. His endeavors support the Bay Area economy and local education. Mr. Davidson is an avid fan of Spartan football and generous supporter of the University.



Dick Vermeil was a quarterback on the 1956 and 1957 teams. He is the only football coach to engineer coaching victories in a Rose Bowl and a Super Bowl.

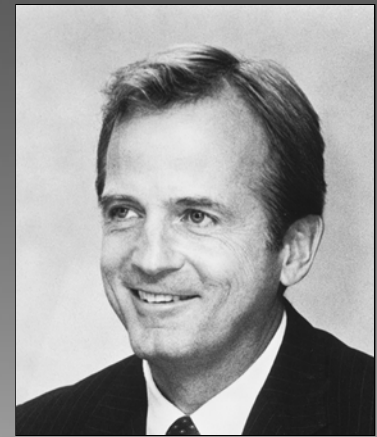
Success Stories

The Campus Village

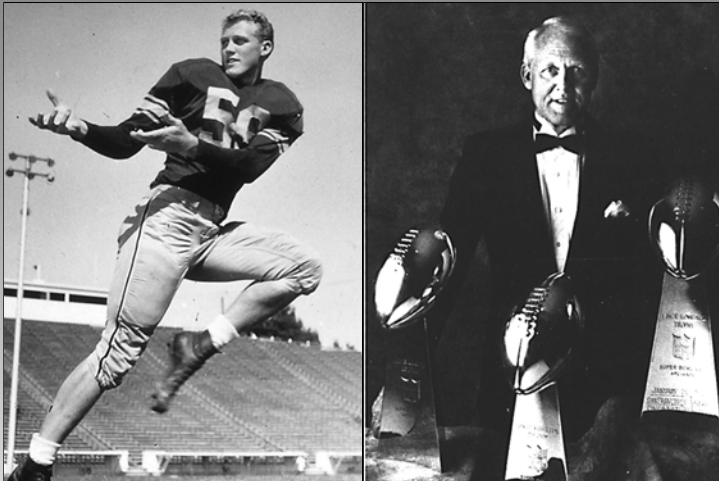

Success Stories



Bill Walsh was an end on the 1952 and 1953 Spartan teams. He earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from San Jose State. Walsh stayed intimately involved in football and became one of the game's most successful coaches leading the San Francisco 49ers to three Super Bowl victories in the 1980's. He is the only Spartan who is an inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.



Tommie Smith (front) and John Carlos (back) played professional football after their days at San Jose State. The two world-class sprinters from the 1960's are best known for their actions on the Olympic Games victory stand following Smith's gold-medal performance in 1968. A statue commemorating their historic event is located on the university's main campus.

College Of Humanities & The Arts

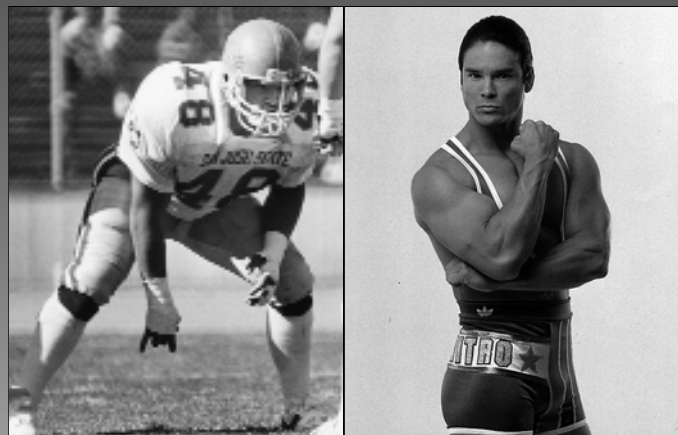

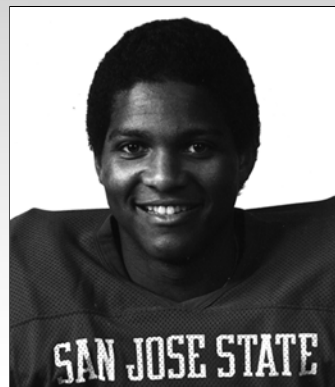

Danny Clark was a 1985 all-conference defensive lineman for the Spartans. He went on to star as Nitro in the original American Gladiators television series.



Steve Clarkson was the Spartans' starting quarterback during the 1980 through 1982 seasons. Today, he is the premier evaluator and developer of young quarterbacks nationally and conducts the Steve Clarkson Dreammaker Tour.

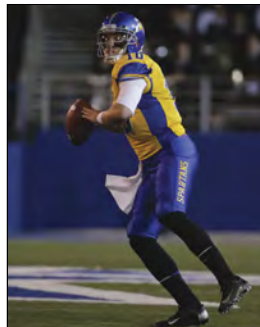

Coaching Staff



Ron Caragher accepted the head football coaching position at San José State University in December 2012.

Caragher filled highlight reels in his first season leading the Spartans. For the first time in 21 years covering five predecessors, a first-year San Jose State football head coach produced a .500 or better winning percentage and a winning record in conference play. The Spartans finished 5-3 in

their first season of Mountain West Conference action. In the university's previous two moves into new conferences in 1969/70 and 1996, San Jose State finished no better .500 in the league standings.

San Jose State concluded its season with its first victory over a top-20 team in 13 years when the Spartans outscored #16/ #13-Fresno State, 62-52, ending a string of 21 consecutive losses to nationally-ranked opponents.

San José State possessed one of the most balanced and potent offenses nationally en route to a 6-6 overall record that included eight post-season bowl teams. The Spartans set single-season school records for total offense, most passing yards, most first downs and most field goals, ranked in the top-20 nationally in passing offense and total offense per game and shared the top spot nationally for blocking kicks.

San Jose State's academic achievements were noteworthy, too. A program best 16 players earned academic all-conference honors - two more than the previous best of 14 in 2007. Two Spartan seniors were named to the National Football Foundation's Hampshire Honor Society. In the previous six years combined, there was only one San Jose State player honored. And, the program remains third among the seven Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) in California for its Academic Progress Rate score with an all-time high 967 (out of 1,000) score.

Caragher came to San José State after six seasons at the University of San Diego (USD). The Toreros compiled a 44-22 win-loss record and were the 2007, 2011 and 2012 Pioneer Football League co-champions. Overall in seven seasons, Caragher's head coaching record is 50-28.

Twice, in 2007 and 2011, he was a nominee for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award established by The Sports Network to recognize the top head coach in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS). After his third 9-2 win-loss season record at USD, he was named the 2011 Pioneer Football League Coach of the Year.

"Having grown up in the San José area, I understand the rich tradition of Spartan Football - it's lineage of great coaches, terrific teams, and outstanding players," Caragher said when he was introduced as the Spartans' head coach.

San José State is Caragher's fourth university in a coaching career that includes six bowl appearances between 1994 and 2006. The 1990 UCLA graduate got his first taste of college coaching as a graduate assistant at his alma mater in 1994. He was promoted to a full-time assistant's position in 1996. In seven seasons with the Bruins, he coached wide receivers, punters and kickers.

Before accepting the University of San Diego head coaching position, Caragher worked four years as the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Kentucky. In 2006, the Wildcats posted an 8-5 record, was invited to a bowl game for the first time in seven years and concluded the season with a Music City Bowl victory - Kentucky's first bowl win since 1984.

Born on January 24, 1967, in nearby Redwood City, Calif., the 47-year old Caragher grew up in San José and nearby Morgan Hill, and graduated from San José's Bellarmine Prep.

A college quarterback, Caragher played on the 1985 through 1989 UCLA teams that won four consecutive bowl games including the 1986 Rose Bowl.

He and his wife, Wendy, have three sons - Josh, Ryan and Scott. Wendy is the San José State women's tennis volunteer assistant coach.

Keith Carter joined the San Jose State University football coaching staff in February 2014 as the offensive line coach/running game coordinator.

Carter comes to the Spartans after two seasons as the Offensive Quality Control Coach for the Seattle Seahawks. The Seahawks qualified for the National Football Conference play-offs each season he was there. Seattle advanced to the Division Round in 2012 and won Super Bowl XLVIII in February 2014.

The new San Jose State assistant coach teams again with Head Coach Ron Caragher at the University of San Diego (USD). The two worked together during the 2009 through 2011 seasons. He was the tight ends coach in 2009 and the offensive line coach in 2010 and 2011 with the Toreros. USD won a share of the Pioneer League championship in 2011.

The 2005 UCLA graduate began his coaching career at his alma mater as an undergraduate assistant. The Bruins finished the season winning the Sun Bowl and were ranked 13th in the final Associated Press poll.



Carter next coached the tight ends and managed the football team's academic responsibilities at Wagner College in 2006. Linebacker Bryan Brand was named a 2006 ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District I award winner. Brand is the most recent and one of only two Wagner players to earn the University Division recognition in the 21st century.

Carter returned to the West Coast in 2007 when he named the offensive line coach at the University of Redlands. In his two seasons there, the Bulldogs produced a combined 15-4 win-loss record. Redlands won the 2007 Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title.

Jimmie Dougherty joined the San José State University football coaching staff in January 2013 as the Spartans' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He adds the title of assistant head coach for the 2014 season.

Dougherty was the mastermind behind one of the top offenses in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) in 2013. Nationally, the Spartans were sixth in passing offense (355.9 yards/game), 15th in total offense (493.2 yards/game) and averaged 32.4 points per game while tackling a schedule that included eight bowl teams.

San José State's offense set 10 single-season team school records and its players had a hand in tying or establishing more than 35 new individual single-game, season and career University football standards. In his creative and tactical multi-dimension offense, nine players caught 10 or more passes for the season, four led the team in rushing in at least one game and 11 offensive players scored a touchdown.

Dougherty worked directly with David Fales, one of college's football's top quarterbacks, to produce a passing game that gained more than 4,000 yards for the second season in a row. Dougherty's overall accomplishments were noticed nationally as a 2013 nominee for the Broyles Award honoring the top assistant coach in the NCAA Division I FBS football.

He came to San José State after spending the 2009 through 2012 seasons coaching wide receivers at the University of Washington. In his last three seasons with the Huskies, Washington participated in the 2010 Holiday, 2011 Alamo and 2012 Maaco Las Vegas Bowls. For 2012, Dougherty added the title of passing game coordinator. Quarterback Keith Price threw 54 of his UW career-record 75 touchdown passes while Dougherty was on the Huskies staff. Wide receiver Jermaine Kearse completed his second season with the Seattle Seahawks in 2013 after finishing his UW career second in receptions (180), receiving yards (2,871) and touchdown catches (29).

The Spartans' offensive coordinator is reunited with San José State head coach Ron Caragher. The two worked together in 2007 and 2008 at the University of San Diego. In all, Dougherty coached five seasons with the Toreros - the first three with current San Francisco 49ers head coach Jim Harbaugh. Dougherty's players included San Francisco 49ers quarterback Josh Johnson, who completed his sixth National Football League season in 2013.

A quarterback at the University of Missouri during the 1997 through 2001 seasons, Dougherty began his coaching career at Illinois Wesleyan College in 2002 and was there two seasons coaching defensive backs.

The 2001 Missouri graduate majored in interdisciplinary studies. Dougherty earned his master's degree in sports management from Illinois State University in 2004.

He and his wife, Harper, two daughters, Collins and Ellie.

Special Teams Coordinator

Fred Guidici is in his third season as a member of the San José State University football coaching staff. In 2014, he will coordinate all of the Spartans' special teams units.

In his first two seasons, the Spartans were special on special teams in a multitude of ways. At the end of the 2013 season, San José State shared the national lead with North Texas and Air Force blocking seven opponent's kick scoring tries. Three of them came in the San Diego State game alone. For the first time in school history, the Spartans recorded back-to-back seasons of at least 100 kick-scoring points with 105 in 2013 following up on the school-record 108 in 2012. Punter Harrison Waid finished his four-year career as the University's career leader in yards per punt. And, San José State executed its first inside kick attempt in two years and the results produced an eventual touchdown in the school's 62-52 victory over #16-Fresno State. The win was the Spartans' first over a top-20 ranked opponent since the 2000 season.

Guidici joined the San José State University staff in March 2012 as the special teams coordinator and running backs coach. The Spartans produced effective special teams in many respects setting a single-season school record for kick-scoring points, producing the program's highest percentage of field goals made in a season, scoring points on punt defense and tying the San José State season record for kickoffs returned for a touchdown. He also coached the Spartans' first 1,000-yard rusher in six seasons, De'Leon Eskridge, and mentored two of his senior running backs to National Football League free agent opportunities.

A long-time Bay Area resident, Guidici returned to his alma mater after a 16-year career at Menlo College in nearby Atherton, Calif., with three seasons as the Oaks' head coach. The 2011 Menlo squad was the school's first in eight years to post a .500 or better win-loss record.

The 1989 San José State graduate has more than 20 years of professional and college coaching experience. He coached at Santa Clara University for three seasons (1990-92), Stanford University for two seasons (1993-94) and at Menlo College (1996-2011). Guidici worked with current San José State wide receivers coach Terry Malley at Santa Clara and the late Bill Walsh as a defensive assistant coach.

Jones joined the staff in January 2013, after serving as the defensive line coach and special teams coordinator at the University of Northern Colorado in 2011 and 2012.

Jones also coached at Dartmouth (2005, 2008-10), Kentucky State (2007), Kansas State (2006), Prairie View A&M (2004), Texas Southern (1996 as a student assistant, 2003), Wagner (2000-02), Cornell (1999), Morehouse (1998) and Bowling Green (1997 as a graduate assistant).



Besides coaching defensive linemen, Jones was a defensive coordinator at Prairie View A&M and Wagner and a special teams coordinator at Northern Colorado, Kentucky State and Cornell.

Malley specializes in nurturing young players into meaningful contributors. To date, his Spartans earned four all-conference honors, two freshman honorable mention All-America honors and set 14 school single-season and career records. Chandler Jones and Noel Grigsby, two of his wide receivers in 2011 and 2012, signed NFL free agent contracts in May 2014. Billy Freeman, the returning starter at tight end, was an honorable mention All-Mountain West choice as a freshman a year ago.

Malley came to the Spartans after spending 14 seasons with the San José SaberCats where he was regarded as one of the keenest offensive minds in Arena Football League history. In his nine seasons as the team's offensive coordinator, San José won three Arena Football League championships, led the league in scoring four times and was second four other seasons.

With 35 years of coaching experience, Malley's coaching roots are in the Bay Area. Two-year stints at San José's Leland High (1976-77) and Moreau High in Hayward (1978-79) preceded five seasons (1980-84) as an assistant coach for legendary coach Pat Malley, his dad, at Santa Clara University, his alma mater. Terry was named head coach in 1985 and led the Broncos to a 47-39-1 win-loss record over eight seasons. Six of his eight teams were nationally-ranked among NCAA Division II schools.

Malley coached 27 all-conference players including long-time National Football League pros Brent Jones, a standout tight end for the San Francisco 49ers, and two-time Pro Bowl punter Bryan Barker. He was the Western Football Conference Coach of the Year in 1985, his first season, directing Santa Clara to an 8-2-1 record and a conference championship.

His first experience in professional football came in 1994 when he was named the Director of Football Operations for the SaberCats, an Arena Football League expansion franchise. Malley added the duties of General Manager in 1995. In 1999, he returned to the field as the offensive coordinator and retained his general manager responsibilities through 2006.

As a player, Malley was a quarterback, team captain and four-year letterwinner for Santa Clara during the 1972 through 1975 seasons. The 1976 Santa Clara University graduate majored in business management. He and his wife, Leslie, have three children – Christina and sons, Patrick and Ryan.

Terry and Leslie Malley



A two-time Super Bowl winner, Greg Robinson was appointed San Jose State University's defensive coordinator and linebackers coach in February 2014.

Robinson brings five decades of National Football League (NFL) and NCAA Division I coaching experience to the Spartans. He was the Denver Broncos defensive coordinator (1995-2000) when the Broncos won Super Bowls XXXII and XXXIII in 1998 and 1999, respectively. He also was the defensive coordinator for

the New York Jets (1994) and the Kansas City Chiefs (2001-03).

The new San Jose State defensive coordinator coordinated defenses for the University of Texas (2004 & 2013) and the University of Michigan (2009 & 2010). The 2004 Texas team won the 2005 Rose Bowl and 2010 Michigan team played in the 2011 Gator Bowl.

Born on October 9, 1951, the Los Angeles native began his coaching career in 1975 at the University of the Pacific. In his early coaching years, he also worked at Cal State Fullerton (1977-79), North Carolina State (1980-81) and UCLA (1982-89). At UCLA, he was the defensive line coach (1982-88) and offensive coordinator (1989) when Caragher was a Bruins quarterback during the 1985 through 1989 seasons.

Overall, Robinson is a coach of 16 teams to play in a bowl game or advance to the NFL playoffs. During the 2005 through the 2008 seasons, he was the head coach at Syracuse University.

Robinson is a 1975 graduate of the University of the Pacific. He played linebacker and tight end for the 1972 through 1974 Tigers teams and was the recipient of the team's Most Inspirational Player Award as a senior.

He and his wife, Laura, are the parents of three adult children – Dominic, Lindsay and Leslie.

Running Backs Coach



Andrew Rolin joined the San Jose State University football coaching staff in July 2013 as the running backs coach. A graduate assistant for the 2013 season, he was promoted to an assistant coaching position in March 2014.

In his first season with San Jose State, the Spartans set single season school records for total offense yardage (5,919) and average yards per game (493.2). San Jose State was 15th nationally in total offense with its most diversified and effective ground game since 2006. By season's end, five players started at least one game as a running back. Few would forecast at the start of the season that the Spartans would rely heavily on any freshmen running backs, but it was four freshmen that handled the bulk of the load. In 2013, four different Spartans led the team in single-game rushing.

Redshirt freshman Jarrod Lawson, the team's leading rusher despite only rushing 10 times in the first four games, was named a CollegeFootballNews.com honorable mention Freshman All-American. Lawson's 788 rushing yards were a San Jose State freshman single season record and eighth best among all 2013 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) freshmen.

Lawson and two more freshmen Thomas Tucker, a converted defensive back, and Tim Crawley, capable of playing either running back or wide receiver, became the first trio of San Jose State running backs with 20 or more receptions each in a season since 1979.

Rolin came to the Spartans after spending 2012 as a graduate assistant at the University of Washington. He worked with the offensive coaching staff and in season primarily with a tight ends group that featured John Mackey Award finalist Austin Seferian-Jenkins. Rolin also helped guide a running backs crew that included Bishop Sankey, fourth nationally in rushing in 2013 with 1,870 yards and 20 TDs.

Joe Staab joined the San José State University football coaching staff in January 2013 as the safeties coach. In 2014, he will be coaching the outside linebackers.

Staab came to the Spartans after four seasons with Ron Caragher at the University of San Diego. He coached the safeties and was the recruiting coordinator his last three seasons (2010-12). Donté Williams joined the San José State University football staff in January 2013 as the cornerbacks coach. In January 2014, he was promoted to defensive backs coach with responsibilities for the entire secondary.



In his first season with the Spartans in 2013, he coached Bené Benwikere to first-team All-Mountain West honors. Benwikere went on to play in the East-West Shrine Game and was selected by the Carolina Panthers in the NFL Draft's fifth round. Dasheon Frierson, a returning starter opposite Benwikere, set a single-game school record with five passes defended in the Hawai'i win.

His impact on the program extends into the daily recruitment of future San José State players. He was recognized by 247 Sports.com as the Mountain West Conference's "Recruiter of the Year" and was listed as the runner-up by Scout.com for the same honor.

Williams came to the Spartans after two seasons as a graduate assistant at the University of Washington working with cornerbacks and linebackers. He was at University of Nevada as an assistant linebacker coach in 2010.

Williams began his coaching career in 2007 as an assistant coach at Los Angeles Harbor College. He also worked one season each at El Camino College (2008) and Mt. San Antonio College (2009).

In 2012, Williams completed a summer coaching internship with the Seattle Seahawks. Prior to the start of the Spartans' 2014 camp, he was a guest coach in the New Era All-Star Game in Japan.

The 2006 Idaho State University graduate played college football at Syracuse in 2003 and Idaho State in 2004 and 2005. Professionally, Williams played two seasons in Arena Football League 2 (AF2) for the Rio Grande Valley Dorados (2007) and Arkansas Twisters (2008). He was a first-team all-league player and a defensive team captain in each of his two seasons.

Marc Baker is in his first season as a San José State University graduate assistant. In 2014, he will work with the defensive linemen.

Baker is in his second season with the Spartans after serving as a volunteer in 2013. He had responsibilities connected with football operations and the defensive unit's players and coaches.

His college football career began at the College of San Mateo in 2009. Baker is pursuing a master's degree in kinesiology with a sports management concentration at San José State.

Dom Capers (Carolina, Houston), Herman Edwards (New York Jets, Kansas City), Dennis Erickson (Seattle, San Francisco) and John Mackovic (Kansas City) are former San José State assistant football coaches who went on to NFL head coaching jobs. Marty Feldman, another Spartan assistant coach, was the Oakland Raiders' head coach when the team belonged to the American Football League.

Mike Martz (St. Louis) was a one-time San José State graduate assistant who became a NFL head coach.

Former San José State head coaches Dudley DeGroot (Washington) and Darryl Rogers (Detroit) later took NFL head coaching positions.

Neil Parry, one of the most inspirational football players of his generation, is in his third season as a San José State University as a graduate assistant working with the defense.

Parry has seven seasons of high school and college coaching experience. He began his career in 2007 as the defensive coordinator at Sobrato High School in Morgan Hill, Calif. After four seasons, he was a graduate assistant at UC Davis in 2011.

The Sonora, Calif., native enrolled at San José State in 1999 as a non-scholarship defensive back. His playing career was interrupted in 2000 when he suffered a compound fracture of his right leg in the October 14 game against UTEP. Nine days later, the leg was amputated 18 centimeters below the knee. More than 25 surgeries and nearly three years later, he returned as a special teams player on September 18, 2003 against Nevada.

Parry finished the 2003 season playing in eight games and was named a team captain for the second time in his career. He is only one of five San José State players to be named or elected a team captain more than once. Parry's final college football game was in the 2004 East-West Shrine All-Star Game.

As a student, he was greeted personally by United States Presidents Bill Clinton in 2000 and George W. Bush in 2003.

His comeback story earned him a 2004 ESPY nomination. Parry was the recipient of the 2003 Disney Spirit Award at the annual ESPN College Football Awards Show. Other awards include the Gene Autry Courage in Sports Award from the Tempe (Ariz.) Sports Authority, the first Most Inspirational Award from the New Orleans Bowl, an Arete Award for Courage in Sports, a Jim Valvano Don't Ever Give Up Award from the V Foundation and a Most Inspirational Athlete of the Year Award from the Philadelphia Sportswriters and Broadcasters Association.

He and his wife, Rougeyar, are the parents of three children, Leonidas, Klanoosh and Valentina.

Osumi came to the Spartans in 2005 after serving five seasons as the video director/producer for the University of California athletics department. Besides his work at Cal, Osumi has worked for the San Francisco 49ers as a video assistant during mini-camps and training camps.

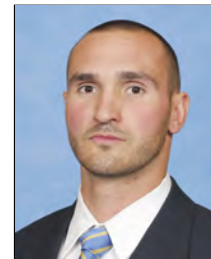

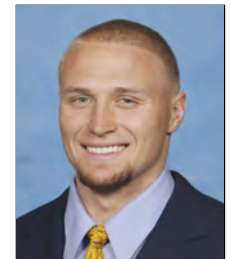
Osumi earned his master's degree from Chico State in 1996 and went on to become video coordinator at the University of Hawai'i for the 1997 and 1998 school years.



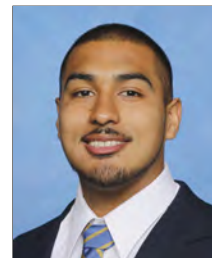

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MW continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its 16th year, the MW has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West has marked several achievements over its first 15 years of existence, most notably becoming the first to establish a sports television network dedicated solely to an intercollegiate athletic conference (The Mtn.). The Mountain West also was the first to experiment with the coaches' challenge in the college football instant replay system, and was the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference to participate in four BCS bowl games, winning three. In 2011-12, the Mountain West was among the first conferences to implement a league-wide state-of-the-art basketball instant replay system.

Additionally, the Mountain West was the first conference to have a member institution with No. 1 overall picks in both the NFL and NBA drafts in the same year (Utah's Alex Smith and Andrew Bogut, respectively in 2005). With UNLV's Anthony Bennett claiming the No. 1 pick in the 2013 NBA Draft, the Mountain West is one of three conferences to have multiple No. 1 NBA draft selections since 2000. Also, with San Diego State's Stephen Strasburg earning the No. 1 pick in the 2009 MLB Draft, the Mountain West is one of two conferences to have the No. 1 selection in each of the NFL, NBA and MLB drafts since the MW was founded in 1999.



The pending changes in the NCAA governance structure set the table for another Conference first, when two members of the MW Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) were included in the June 2014 meeting of the Mountain West Board of Directors. New Mexico track and field athlete Kendall Spencer, the national chair of the 2014-15 NCAA Division I Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, and Air Force Academy volleyball player Emma Dridge joined the BOD members in this historic meeting to advance the discussion on student-athlete involvement in the NCAA and MW governance structure.

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders five MW institutions (Air Force, Boise State, Colorado State, New Mexico and Utah State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert cities of Las Vegas and Reno, home to UNLV and Nevada, respectively, while Fresno State, San Diego State and San José State add a West coast influence with their locations in Central, Southern and Northern California. The inclusion of the Hawai'i football program extends the Mountain West footprint to the beautiful islands in the Pacific Ocean.

Did You Know?

San José State was scheduled to play two games in Hawaii to end the 1941 season. The Spartans were in Honolulu when the attack on Pearl Harbor occurred on December 7, 1941. Many players immediately joined the local police force or the armed services. The games against the University of Hawai'i on December 13 and Willamette College of Oregon on December 16 were cancelled.

In 1981 and 1987, San José State was the "mythical champion" of the San Francisco Bay Area. The Spartans defeated both California and Stanford in those two seasons.

A SPARTAN SAFETY WAS SCORED:

San José State scored a safety when Bené Benwikere blocked a punt by Bowling Green punter Brian Schmiedebusch out of the end zone in a 29-20 win in the Military Bowl on December 27, 2012.

AN OPPONENT SAFETY WAS SCORED:

Brigham Young scored a safety when quarterback Matt Faulkner was tackled in the end zone in the Spartans' 29-16 loss to BYU on October 8, 2010.

TWO BROTHERS SCORED IN THE SAME SAN JOSÉ STATE GAME:

James Callier, Jr., caught a 2-point conversion pass and James T. Callier caught an 8-yard touchdown pass in the Spartans' 31-21 win at New Mexico State on November 4, 2006.

A PLAYER KICKED THREE OR MORE FIELD GOALS:

Austin Lopez kicked field goals of 47, 44 and 50 yards in a 38-16 loss at Nevada on November 16, 2013...**and by the opponent:** Utah State's Nick Diaz kicked field goals of 24, 45, 24 and 21 yards when Utah State beat San José State, 40-12, on September 27, 2013.

A SPARTAN LED THE NATION IN A STATISTICAL CATEGORY AT THE END OF A SEASON:

Nick Gilliam made a 37-yard field goal on the final play of the game in San José State's 38-35 victory over Illinois in 2002.

San José State and Fresno State combined for 114 points in a 62-52 Spartan victory on October 2, 2004. There are 10 times in school history in which 100 or more points were scored in a football game.

The Spartans scored 28 points in the first quarter of the 52-24 win over UTSA on October 20, 2012.

New Mexico State wide receiver Taveon Rogers caught an 8-yard pass from quarterback Matt Christian as the Aggies defeated the Spartans, 29-27, on October 30, 2010.

A SHUTOUT WAS RECORDED:

San José State shut out Sacramento State, 24-0, on August 29, 2013... **and by the opponent:** Boise State blanked the Spartans, 48-0, on October 16, 2010.

SAN JOSÉ STATE DEFEATED A NATIONALLY-RANKED OPPONENT:

San José State defeated #16-ranked Fresno State, 62-52, on November 29, 2013.

THE SPARTANS PLAYED AN OVERTIME GAME:

Spartan Stadium



The San José State University football team has played its home games in Spartan Stadium since 1933. The Spartans won the first football game played in the stadium, 44-0, over San Francisco State, on October 7. Since then, the Spartans have played 371 games over 77 seasons. The team's 100th win in the stadium came on October 21, 1967, against New Mexico, 52-14. The 200th victory occurred in 2005. SJSU's home field record is 229-132-17 entering the 2014 season.

Spartan Stadium currently seats 30,456 for football. Every seat puts the spectator either close to or right on top of the action. Two stadium expansions and renovations in the 1980's increased the seating capacity from 18,000 to over 30,000.

A FieldTurf surface replaced natural grass in 2009. Two new scoreboards - one on the East side and a state-of-the-art videoboard were installed in 2011.

The multi-purpose facility is the site of the school's annual commencement ceremony. Concerts, professional and collegiate soccer, religious convocations, band competitions and high school football games also take place at Spartan Stadium.

Five Silicon Valley Football Classics were held in Spartan Stadium. Air Force in 2000, Michigan State in 2001, Fresno State in 2002, UCLA in 2003 and Northern Illinois in 2004 were bowl-game winners. The 1999 Women's World Cup and 1999 NCAA Women's College Cup soccer events attracted record-setting crowds.

The largest attendance at a home football game was a 31,681 sellout crowd at the 2003 win over Grambling State. The game marked the first time under the current stadium configuration that San José State had a "sellout" prior to game day.

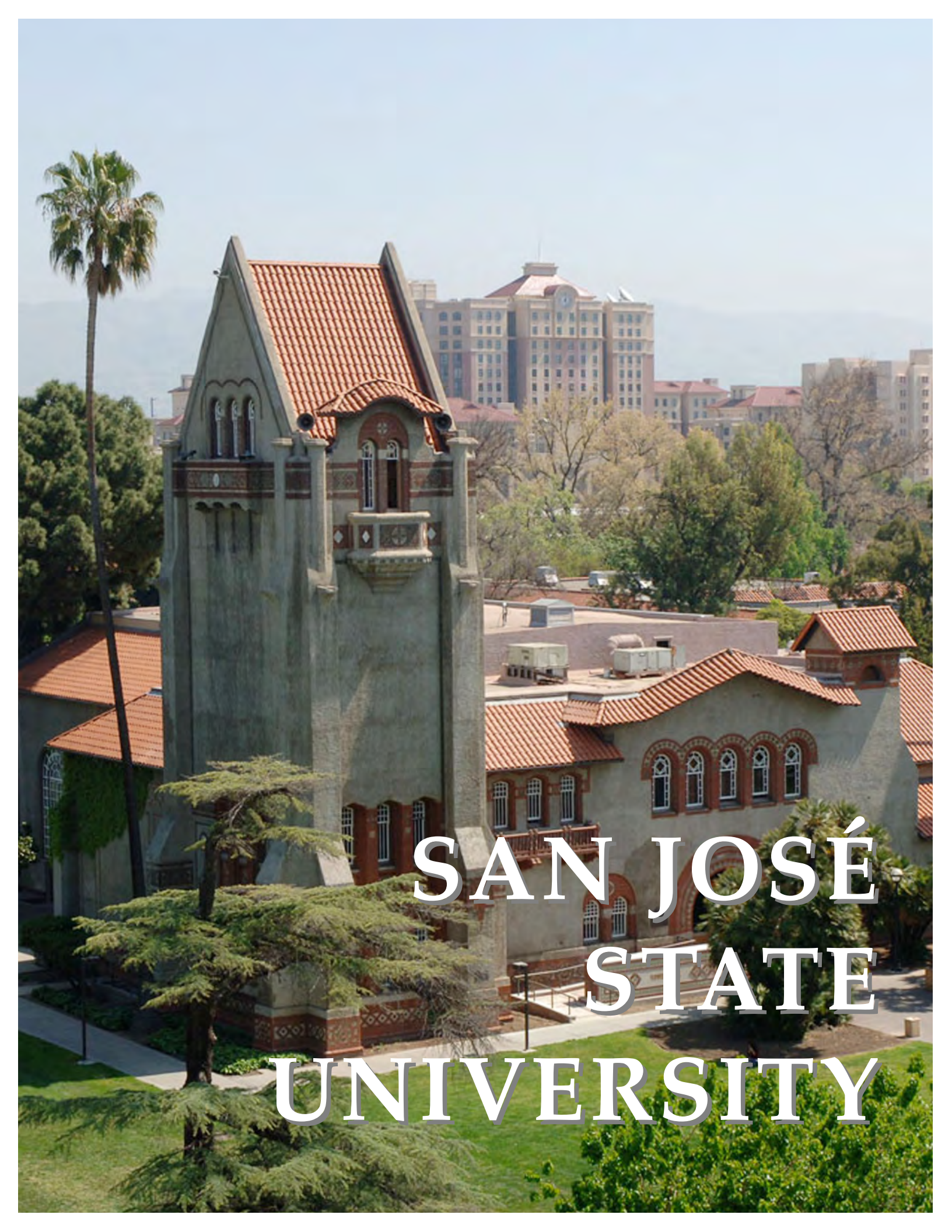
The largest crowd to attend any event in the stadium was estimated at 37,000 for a ZZ Top music concert.

Qayoumi served as president of California State University East Bay from 2006 to 2011. He came to Cal State East Bay from California State University Northridge, where he served as vice president for administration and finance and chief financial officer from 2000 to 2006, and was also a tenured professor of engineering management. He has over 32 years of engineering and administrative experience in several universities. Qayoumi also served as an engineer on a variety of projects in the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia. He has made presentations at numerous conferences across the United States and in 10 other countries.

A senior member of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE), Qayoumi served as a Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award examiner and senior examiner from 2000 to 2003. He also was senior examiner for the Missouri Quality Program from 1997 to 2000.

Qayoumi has served his native country in various financial capacities. He was the senior advisor to the minister of finance of Afghanistan from 2002 to 2005 and served on the board of directors for the Central Bank of Afghanistan from 2003 to 2006.

A senior fellow with California Council on Science and Technology (CCST), Qayoumi is also a member of several local Boards including the Bay Area Council, the Bay Area Council Economic Institute, the Silicon Valley Leadership Group, Joint Venture Silicon Valley, KQED, the Commonwealth Club, Blue Shield of California, Project Lead the Way, and California STEM Learning Network.

Qayoumi has been married for 33 years to Najia Karim.



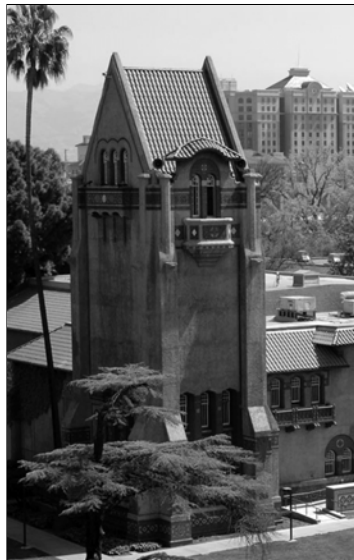

San José State University's place in history is well-established. Founded in 1857, it was the first public institution of higher education on the West Coast. From its humble beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, it has matured into a master's university offering 191 bachelor's and master's degrees.

The university's 27,000 students study in eight fully-accredited colleges: Applied Sciences and the Arts, Business, Education, Engineering, Humanities and the Arts, Science, Social Sciences and Social Work.

One strength of the academic program is the broad general education curriculum that brings common elements -- critical thinking, writing and communication skills, and cultural pluralism -- to diverse studies.

Academic strength also is seen in the university's nationally-recognized programs. Examples include the School of Music, the School of Art and Design, the School of Journalism and Mass Communications, the School of Nursing and the School of Library and Information Science.

In each discipline, quality teaching remains a priority. Tenured faculty teach introductory as well as advanced courses with an emphasis on small classes. Learning facilities include computer-equipped classrooms, the Western world's only undergraduate nuclear science facility and North America's largest Beethoven Center. Focusing on applied research, faculty receive a growing number of contracts and grants each year. From Moss Landing Marine Research Laboratory to the NASA Ames Research Center, faculty are exploring everything from the depths of the ocean to the surface of Mars.

San José State University also finds strength in its diversity. For first-generation students, it is a gateway to economic independence and social mobility. It is also an incubator of cultural and intellectual development and an opportunity for lifelong learning. Students range in age from first-time freshmen to college transfers to professionals seeking additional education. Student demographics – with ethnic pluralism – provide the benefits of multiple cultures and diverse student interests and activities. From residence life to athletic teams to social clubs to co-op jobs – student activities meet the needs of this diverse student body.

Gene Bleymaier, one of the most-experienced and accomplished athletics directors in college athletics, was named San José State University's director of athletics on May 24, 2012.

In his first two years, the Spartans' athletics and academic achievements cover a wide spectrum. Since July 2013, Bleymaier led the University's transition into the Mountain West Conference, added the sports of women's indoor and outdoor track and field and women's sand volleyball and conceived plans for new and upgraded athletics facilities.

The 2012-13 year was one of the University's best for comprehensive athletics success. The Spartans won 11 football games in a season for the first time since 1940, were listed in the final BCS standings for the first time in school history at #24, won the 2012 Military Bowl and were voted #21 nationally in the season-ending Associated Press and USA Today/ESPN coaches polls. San José State won Western Athletic Conference championships in women's swimming, women's tennis and softball. The Spartans finished an all-time best 106th out of the 295 NCAA Division I programs in the final Learfield Sports Directors Cup standings that measure overall program success in national competition.

Bleymaier came to San José State with an impressive array of personal and professional accomplishments from 30 years as Boise State University's athletics director.

He directed the Broncos through three conference affiliation upgrades to comprehensive success in conference and national competition. Boise State posted thirty-three top-25 finishes in nine different sports. Most recognizable was Boise State football's ascension to a national brand. The Broncos were the only football program from 2009 through 2011 to finish in the top-10 each year in the Associated Press and coaches' final polls and had six top-10 finishes in the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) standings between 2004 and 2011.

In 10 years of WAC membership, the Broncos were the only three-time winner of the Commissioner's Cup signifying the conference's best overall athletics program. There were conference championships in 11 sports – five men's and six women's programs. Boise State coaches earned 31 Coach of the Year awards and Bronco student-athletes received conference Athlete of the Year awards 35 times and 68 All-America honors over a 10-year span.

Academically, the Broncos consistently produced the highest Academic Progress Rate (APR) score among WAC football-playing members. The NCAA recognized Boise State in 2010 with a Public Recognition Award for achieving an APR score

that ranked in the top-10 percent for all NCAA Division I football-playing schools. The Boise State student-athlete population also produced a five consecutive semesters of cumulative grade-point averages over 3.00 per semester.

Bleymaier can take credit for conceiving Boise State's unique blue artificial turf for Bronco Stadium. Installed in 1986, it remains one of the most distinguishing playing surfaces in the United States. His fundraising acumen and vision led to the creation of enhanced practice and competition facilities for football, track and field, basketball, softball, tennis, and women's gymnastics over a 15-year span. New sports medicine, student-athlete support services and strength and conditioning facilities also were constructed.

In August 2013, Boise State unveiled the Gene Bleymaier Football Complex honoring his accomplishments at the University.

In 1997, he founded the post-season Humanitarian Bowl game. Now known as the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, the Boise-hosted game now is in its 18th year attracting top college football teams.

For his exemplary leadership, Bleymaier received the 2008 Astro Turf Athletics Director of the Year and the 2011 Bobby Dodd Athletics Director of the Year Awards. In 2009, he was one of five finalists for the *Street and Smith's Sports Business Journal* and *Sports Business Daily* Athletic Director of the Year Award and the only nominee from a non-automatic qualifying Bowl Championships Series (BCS) conference school.

The 1975 UCLA graduate was a three-year letter-winning tight end on the Bruins' 1972 through 1974 football teams. Bleymaier was a third-team All-Pacific 8 Conference selection and was the 1974 recipient of the UCLA Alumni Association's Outstanding Senior Award.

His college coaches were legendary San José State alum Dick Vermeil and Pepper Rodgers.

Bleymaier earned a law degree from Loyola Law School in 1978. He served as a UCLA assistant athletics director before joining the Boise State athletics department in 1981 as an assistant athletics director. In 1982, he was promoted to the Broncos' athletics director.

He and his wife, Danell, have four adult children, Maribeth, Joe, Claire and Tom; and a granddaughter, Madeleine.

John Poch returned to San José State University in January 2009. As the Deputy Director of Athletics/External Operations, his duties include managing the department's external relations components of fund raising and community relations and serving as the sports supervisor for baseball and women's tennis. He also has a lead role in the fund raising for the Spartan Stadium Vermeil-Walsh Athletic Complex.

Previously, Poch served as the Tournament Director of the 1999 and 2000 NCAA Women's College Cup hosted by San José State University and was an assistant coach for the Spartans' women's soccer team from 1995 to 2000. Under his direction, the 1999 College Cup attracted more than 28,000 spectators for two semifinal contests and the championship match. The 14,410 in attendance for the championship game remains the top attendance figure for any college women's soccer contest.

As a San José State assistant coach, he was on the ground floor of the new Spartan program. In its first five seasons, San José State posted a 53-44-3 overall win-loss record.

Poch is a successful youth soccer coach with United States Soccer Federation and National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) national licenses. He coached the San José Pioneer High School boys' teams to three Central Coast Section championships and was named the National Coach of the Year in 2001 by the NSCAA.

From 2000 through 2008, he was the executive director of the After-School All-Stars of Greater San José - a program targeting at-risk youths. In his eight years, After-School All-Stars grew from a two-person staff with a \$275,000 annual operating budget to a full-time staff of 36 and 230 part-time employees and a \$3.9-million budget comprised largely of dollars raised through his fundraising acumen and direction. More than 3,000 students from 50-plus elementary and middle schools in San José were After-School All-Stars beneficiaries.

In 2011, Poch completed course work in the Sports Management Institute - a collaboration of the Universities of Southern California, Texas, Michigan, Notre Dame and North Carolina. The Sports Management Institute provides a specialized executive management program for sports professionals.

He is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), NAADD (National Association of Athletic Development Directors) and AFP (Association of Fundraising Professionals) and remains well-connected in San José. He also serves on the board of directors for After-School All-Stars.

The 2001 San José State University graduate majored in kinesiology. He is currently pursuing a master's degree in sport management at San José State. As a student-athlete, he played football at West Valley College before enrolling at San José State.

John and his wife, Debora, a 1988 San José University graduate, are the parents of one daughter, Nicole.

Marie Tuite joined the San José State University athletics administrative team in an executive capacity in June 2010. Presently, she is the Deputy Director of Athletics/Internal Operations.

From April through June 2012, Tuite also was the Interim Director of Athletics. In that time, she took a leadership role in San José State's invitation and acceptance to join the Mountain West in July 2013.

Tuite oversees all of the Spartans' internal components and affairs. She manages the department's daily operations, has direct supervision of student services, compliance and business affairs, manages future football scheduling and serves as a sports supervisor for men's and women's basketball.

Her professional career includes executive positions at Pacific-12 Conference universities and the NCAA. She came to the Spartans from Seattle University where she was a Special Assistant to the Athletics Director. Tuite assisted Seattle University's transition to NCAA Division I athletics status.

Tuite then relocated to the NCAA office in the Kansas City area and served as an Assistant Director of Championships from 1989 to 1994. She assisted the organization's sport committees in the administration of the National Collegiate Championships program and coordinated the Association's corporate partner, merchandising, promotional, and official ball programs for NCAA championships.

She returned to a campus setting in 1994 as a senior associate athletics director at the University of Washington. Her duties included overseeing the process and appointment of new head coaches, directing day-to-day operations including fiscal responsibility and leadership opportunities for numerous sports, and initiating and implementing "keys to success" for priority Husky sports programs.

A two-sport student-athlete and graduate of Central Michigan University, she was inducted into the university's Athletics Hall of Fame in 1990 as just the third female inductee. Tuite played field hockey and was a star basketball player who majored in physical education. She earned her master's degree from her alma mater in athletic administration.

Tuite is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), NACWAA (National Association of Collegiate Women's Athletics Administrators) and the Women's Sports Foundation. In May 2012, she was one of 41 local female executives honored at the 28th annual Tribute to Women Awards program by the YWCA Silicon Valley.

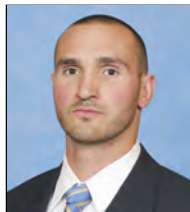

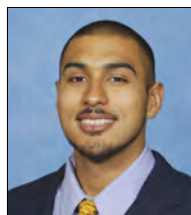

Office Location

The athletics media relations office is located at 1393 S. 7th Street, San José, CA 95112. Parking and work space for the media are available.

Credential Requests

Credentials are issued for news and editorial coverage on a case-by-case basis to those filing game stories, accredited members from established media outlets, and personnel assigned by the sports information office. Requests should be directed to Lawrence Fan, Athletics Media Relations Director. The credential recipient agrees to all conditions set forth by the University relating to conduct and print, video, audio, digital and photographic game coverage.

Press Box

The Spartan Stadium press box is located on the 7th Street side of the stadium and is an open-air facility. Carry a jacket. The press box remains open three hours after each contest.



Game Day Parking

Media parking is located in Lot 1, located on 7th and Humboldt streets. Media parking passes for home games are issued by the athletics media relations office.

Photographers

Credentials are issued to newspapers, wire services, video crews and team photographers. NCAA rules limit photographers to a wide area behind the restraining line around the playing field and outside the 25-yard lines.

Play-by-Play Television

Contact Lawrence Fan in writing at least 30 days prior to a game concerning video play-by-play of San José State University home football games.

Radio Broadcasts

The radio broadcast booth for the designated official flagship station of the visiting team at Spartan Stadium is Box B on the mezzanine level of the press box and has space for five working individuals. ISDN and regular telephone service are provided.

Production Truck & Satellite Uplink Parking

Production truck and satellite uplink parking is on the 7th street side of the stadium. Arrangements must be made to park a truck overnight inside Spartan Stadium.

Scouts

Space limitations prohibit seating and standing in the press box for scouting purposes.

Spotters & Statisticians

Requests for spotters and/or statisticians should be placed two weeks prior to a home game.

Statistics & Services

Game statistics, play-by-play accounts and post-game quotes are compiled and distributed. FAX service is available. A meal is available two hours before kickoff.

Team Practices & In-Person Interviews

During the season, the Spartans practice in the morning. In-person, post-practice interview opportunities with the student-athletes, generally, occur at approximately 11:00 a.m. on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Please contact the athletics media relations office in advance with your interview request.
